Those important grid ratings

The football season is back — with its usual frustrations.

In its only editorial last week The Crosbyton Review called for an elimination of the football team ranking system because "they are abused by coaches who are concerned about increasing the prestige of their teams."

What prompted all The Review's concern was one particular play in the Crosbyton Chief's opening 41 to 0 loss a couple of weekends ago to the Floydada Whirlwinds, the Lopes' foe this Friday night at Floydada.

Leading 27 to 0 and with 5:19 to go in the second period, the Winds successfully pulled off an onside kick on the kickoff after tallying their fourth touchdown.

Said the Review after crediting the Whirlwinds with being "without doubt one of the top AA squads in the state with 'awesome talent.'" That tactic was about as unnecessary as an iceman in December. In fact, the Whirlwinds are too good a squad to have to revert to gimmicks in a one-sided contest.

The run-up-the-score and raise-our-rating

theory is nothing new. Remember the lop-sided counts — sometimes running as high as 80 points — that Denver City produced against opponents a few years ago? The editorial continued.

"Without a rating system, the strong teams still will prevail, but not by such top heavy scores," the editorial concluded.

While Floydada obviously "goofed" with its onside kick (it fumbled and didn't score again before half anyway), the ratings are here to stay because the ever-loving fans want them, that's why.

The only super silly deal with the ratings are in college ball where pollsters rank only the top 10, but the also rans go along and are called the second 10 to get about 20 teams rated.

If you are going to rank more than 10, vote for more than 10. The present way, the pollster who votes for his home club out of prejudice gets a very juicy chance of having that undeserving team ranked somewhere in the second 10 when it doesn't belong there at all.

Texas Tech has been in this position several times in recent years.

Joint law effort accepted

From all The Dispatch hears, almost everyone is well pleased with the operation to date of the combined city-county law enforcement force under Sheriff Gene Gandy.

The city council, which is now footing half the bill for the expanded sheriff's department, likes the way it is working out.

The sheriff and his deputies deserve a full measure of credit for this affirmative reaction. They are working together with a single-mindedness of purpose always desired but seldom attained in law enforcement.

It is proving again that city-county cooperation works here in Post and Garza County.

After all, that was the purpose of the federal aid originally offered, but eventually lost, to show what could be done if a community tried to put it together.

Statebeat

AUSTIN — O. P. Carillo, the deposed district judge from Duval County whose impeachment trial is pending in the state Senate, can't seem to stay out of the news.

And it's no wonder. The man began his trial in federal court in Corpus Christi with his brother, Ramiro, as the co-defendant in an income tax indictment which could see him go to jail. And even if he is successful in that defense, he still has to face trial in the legislature.

After the one-day session on September 3 when the Senate voted to defer its consideration of Carillo until September 29, the judge's lawyers released to the press a 170-page legal brief which responds to the charges posed by the House of Representatives in the impeachment articles. To say the least, the job done by the defense is not only impressive, it raises some very interesting legal and moral questions germane to the legislature itself.

For starters, the brief makes note of the Texas constitution of 1876 which pretty well outlines the ways in which the House can be called back into session for special concerns after expiration of the normal term. And because Governor Briscoe didn't issue the call for a special session (the House called itself back via a resolution), the constitutionality of the House reconvening comes into question.

In addition, the House's impeachment committee continued meeting immediately after the 64th legislature's adjournment, and since standing committees are part of the regular session, their dissolution is axiomatic when the session ends. In this case, however, the committee kept right on meeting, but the authorization for the parleys is dubious when viewed legally.

Not only that, but the committee met and took action of a final or definitive nature while in executive session (prohibited by statute), thus being in violation of the Texas Open Meetings Act, a misdemeanor for which there is criminal and monetary punishment for those who willingly participate officially (meaning, then, members of the House).

Moreover, the committee failed to give the required 72-hour notice to Carillo and instead provided only 24-hour notice in an instance or two, a further abrogation of the Open Meetings Act. You would think that, which lawyers ought to know, legal requirements would be met.

That's not all. Here comes the good part.

The man who initiated the whole impeachment process in the House, Terry Canales of Premont, was legal counsel for Archer Parr before he was sent to the federal pen. And Archer Parr, you see, is the head honcho of the political faction in Duval County which is adamantly opposed to the Carillo faction.

We are further advised by the Carillo attorneys in the legal brief that two other organs of courts and government, namely the Judicial Qualifications Commission and the Texas Supreme Court, have prior jurisdiction over the legislature in the dealing with matters of impeachment. And in the case of the Commission at least, action had already been taken to deal with the Carillo matter before the House voted 19 out of 11 impeachment articles over to the Senate for trial.

A noteworthy point of law is also at issue here. Part of the genius of the American system of justice, we are told in 8th grade civics, is the protection of the citizen being charged with a crime or threatened with legal punishment. Now consider Carillo — he was suspended from his judgeship when the House voted the articles to the Senate, the same as an indictment by a grand jury, but at that time neither Carillo nor his attorneys had been given any opportunity to cross examine witnesses which testified against the judge before the House's impeachment committee.

Now if the legislature is going to be consistent, it would naturally have to apply such standards fairly, against legislators and judges alike. Thus it is interesting that one legislator, when indicted for buying a pickup truck with state postage stamps, was still allowed to sit in his chair and cast votes on the state laws that affect citizens like you and me.

And it's not the only instance. The same principle had the same result when another legislator was indicted for using people on the state payroll and under his supervision for the performance of personal services.

It would appear based on this amalgamation of evidence and other de facto considerations, that more than one standard is being applied to the implementation of law as it exists on the state books. And the obvious hermeneutic in such an ar-

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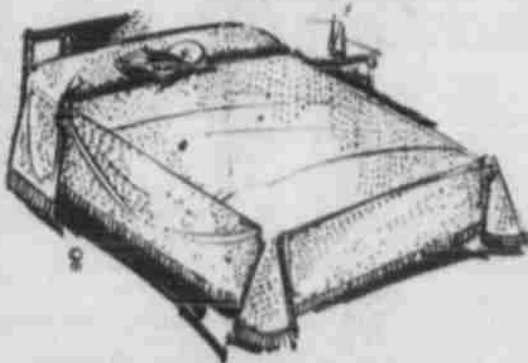
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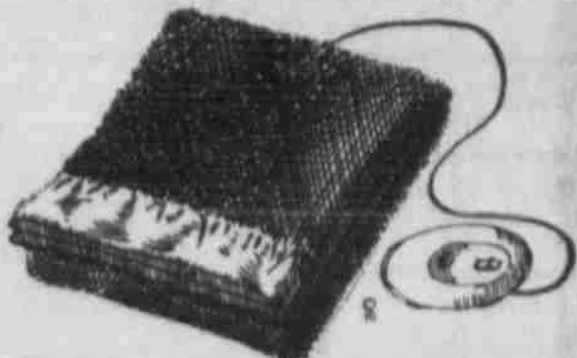

Basic life saving skills for emergency situations will be given by Patricia Craig.
Instructors for the course will be Zoe Kirkpatrick and Kathy Rankin.
After this two and one half hour training course, one should be able to successfully resuscitate a non-breathing person and keep his heart-beating if it has stopped.
Under cover of night, old veteran General Armas Ward moved in troops to dig redoubts. Through some foul-up the digging took place on Breed's hill. (So the Battle of Bunker Hill was the Battle of Breed's Hill. When history states an error, it remains stated.)

Finally, massive lines of red-uniformed troops began their frontal attack. Somehow, raw, untrained defenders found the discipline to "wait for the whites of their eyes." Their last-minute volleys mowed down their attackers.
Twice the assaults were turned back. On the third attempt, after firing their last two rounds, the Colonists retreated. The British had gained Breed's Hill with devastating results. They had lost nearly a half of their forces. Over a thousand men had died in the battle. There was another casualty. They had lost their cocksure attitude.
King George declared the colonies in open rebellion. A common soldier added his judgment. "Don't give the yankees time to dig."

Oversupply of cattle is depressing beef market

COLLEGE STATION — The "numbers game" may sometimes tend to get a little confusing when agricultural projections or estimates are issued. But there is one number that is currently bearing heavily on the total cattle industry of the nation — the immense number of feeder cattle on farms and ranches.

"That, along with only a moderate increase in cattle feeding, is the key reason for the continued low cattle prices," contends Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

There were about 59.2 million head of feeder cattle on hand as of July 1, and Uvacek estimates that some 6.5 million of these will be slaughtered as non-fed cattle and calves during the remainder of this year. That would still leave some 52.6 million feeder animals on pastures and ranges.

"This high number of feeders is about the same as the number on hand last year,"

notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "And, of course, the oversupply continues to depress the market."

Uvacek points out that some easing in grain prices that may result from a bountiful harvest this fall could boost cattle feeding. This segment of the industry has been in the doldrums due to the cost-price squeeze.

He feels, however, that any increase in movement of feeders to feedlots will be slow, which means that cow-calf producers will continue to get poor prices for their animals until well into 1976. "Hopefully, by then, the oversupply situation will have eased somewhat,"

Farm Topics

Robbing the cradle as far as calves are concerned may be both economical and tasty, according to Woodrow W. Bailey, a livestock and meat specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"If you have a weaning age calf or can buy one, eat it," emphasizes Bailey. "Up until two years ago, this type of calf would bring twice as much money in an auction to go to the feedlots in West Texas as it was worth on your table. Recently, these calves have been bringing 34 cents a pound at auctions compared to fed cattle at about 53 cents."

Because these calves have never been fed grain and are not old enough to marinate, the meat is not as desirable as heavy choice beef for charcoal broiling.

"Any other method of preparing calf meat is ideal," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. "It is even better than veal and can be substituted in a veal recipe."

Bailey says some physicians recommend this type of beef because it has less fat.

He explains that baby beef or calf, as it is advertised in grocery stores and meat markets, should be slaughtered at seven to eight months, right at weaning age.

"Calves should not be weaned and fed for 30 days prior to slaughtering, as some people practice. If you do feed them for only a month, you're wasting time and money," contends Bailey.

"If you feed them for this short period, the first week they'll just bawl; the second week, they'll nibble; the third, they'll eat a little; and the fourth, they'll eat enough to gain back what they lost during the three-week adjustment period," says Bailey. "The best time to get them is right after weaning."

How important is a 90 per cent or better calf crop at today's low market prices?

The number of calves weaned from all breeding cows in the herd at the start of the breeding season is more important today than ever as cattlemen try to stay in business, believes Don Parks, area economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Increasing the per cent calf crop is second only to increasing market prices when considering ways to improve profits.

Calf crops vary from 60 per cent to 90 per cent and over in today's herds. The 60 per cent crop may be due to inadequate nutrition, limited genetic capability, semen infertility or disease. Whatever the cause, it must be identified and corrected, contends Parks. Some producers feel that the depressed market will not justify feeding cows as well as when prices are good. This is not true when nutrition is limited enough to delay the cow's heat cycle and conception.

Parks estimates at \$7.80 the cost per cow of each 21-day heat cycle delay, considering a 26-cent per pound market price, a 1.6 pound daily gain, a 90 per cent calf crop and all calves being weaned the same time. A rancher who cannot adequately feed cows so they return to estrus shortly after calving, cannot afford to keep them.

Another way to look at the expense of low per cent calf crops is by figuring the production cost per pound at different calf crops. For ex-

ample, out-of-pocket pasture livestock and labor expenses of maintaining a cow a year in South Central Texas approach \$125. Considering a 450-pound weaning weight, the production cost per pound would be 31 cents with a 90 per cent calf crop but 46 cents with a 60 per cent calf crop. Adding the annual fixed cost to the \$125 out-of-pocket cost will increase the production cost per pound even more, points out the economist.

After correcting the environmental limitations of reproduction, such as nutrition and diseases, Parks advises beef producers to consider the genetic reproductive capability of the cow. Herd records are useful in identifying the breeding regularity of each cow. Such records frequently indi-

cate that a cow identified as a slow breeder will continually be a slow breeder. Eliminating such cows from the herd can increase the herd's reproductive performance and provide better replacement heifers.

Palpating cows 45 days after removing bulls is helpful in eliminating non-breeders or slow breeders. As calves are weaned, the unbred cows can be sold. This eliminates the feeding expenses of keeping the cows until the next calving season.

Increasing the reproductive performance of the cow herd is a profitable management practice, contends the economist.

Lopes show poise, power in whacking Coahoma, 20-0

March to touchdown from opening kickoff in rain

Marching 61 yards for a touchdown in 11 plays with the opening kickoff, Coach Bobby Davis's Post Antelopes completely dominated the Coahoma Bulldogs in the rain, mud and chill of Antelope Stadium Friday night to score an

It was fourth and two for Post on the Coahoma 36 three plays later. This time Davis slashed for six on a keeper for a first.

A few plays later with a third and nine on Coahoma's 20, Dudley reversed to the right and broke into the clear for the touchdown. He then stepped back and drilled the placement kick through the uprights.

With 6:13 left of the quarter, Coahoma finally got its hands on the football but only for three plays before kicking.

Neither side could muster a In the second period, the Bulldogs drove 28 yards to the Post 35, but then were pushed back and forced to punt.

The Lopes took the wobbly 10-yard kick on their 33 and went 67 yards in seven plays for the score with Dorland getting the last ten for the six-pointer. In the drive Davis got 11 on a keeper and then threw a key nine-yard pass to Dudley on a sprintout for the first down on Coahoma's 10.

On the final play of the half, Davis on a bootleg to his left broke around end for 35 yards to the Bulldog 30.

Post got 163 of its 230 rushing yards in that first half and nine of its 13 first downs.

The visitors cranked up after the second half kickoff and drove to midfield where George (Shorty) Hester, playing line-backer on defense, pounced on the only Coahoma fumble recovered by the Lopes during the game.

Several other Coahoma bobbles bounced right into the arms of other Bulldogs and one of them coughed up by Tindol flew into a surprised Coahoma line-man's hands on the fly.

Late in the third and early in the fourth the Lopes drove from their 23 to Coahoma's 29, aided by a 19-yard sweep by Davis and a beautiful diving catch of an over-center pass by Tight-end Mike Waldrup.

But then a fumble which Waldrup pounced on for a save cost the Lopes five yards and when Dudley was called for the reverse that had worked so well earlier he was dumped for a eight yard loss to end the threat.

Defensive back Mike Shepherd had an interception of a Tindol pass on the Coahoma 38 wiped out by penalty with 6:28 left, but when the Coahoma quarterback faded and fired again he didn't get a welcome whistle.

Instead Davis intercepted and 10 yards downfield, cut back to his left and found himself in the clear to race in with the final touchdown.

When Tindol went to the air in desperation again, Dorland gathered in the ball on the Post 34. A fumble on the Post 47 gave Coahoma a final shot and this time after three more incompletions Tindol got off his only completion of the game as the gun sounded.

Besides Davis's 92 yards running, Fullback Perry Rogers got 32 in 10 shots at the middle, Dorland totaled 39 in seven carries, Dudley 49 in four before being dropped for an eight-yard loss on his last effort. Tailback Edward Price 15 yards in five carries, Randy Baker one in three, and Shepherd losing 10 on an end-around which went awry.

Sophomore Quarterback Brad Shepherd made two brief appearances behind Davis as he is being given some experience.

Despite the slippery playing conditions which caused a lot of ball juggling by both clubs, the Lopes came out of the contest with only two minor injuries, a slight ankle sprain by Guard Buddy Britton and a sore elbow by Halfback Dorland.

Coach Davis and his assistants expressed themselves as well pleased with the Lopes opening showing.

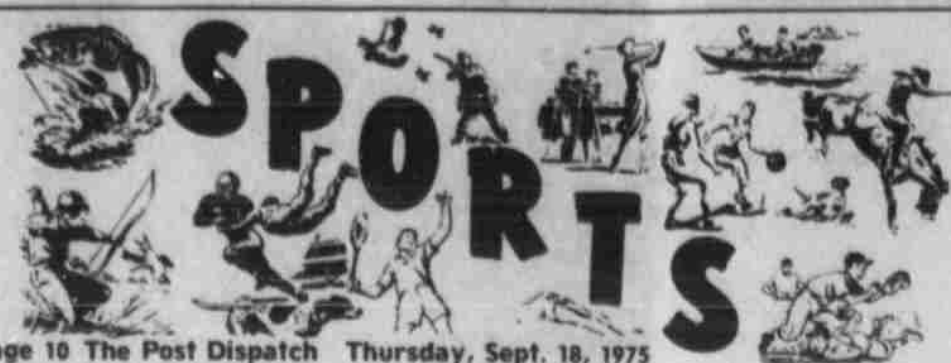
"Of course we've got some mistakes to correct and areas to improve," Coach Davis told The Dispatch, "but overall it was a good effort for the opener. That first drive from the kickoff was what we wanted."

The offensive line was outstanding, but Ray Martinez, Benny Greene and Mike Shepherd were cited by Davis for the top efforts.

Defensive Tackle Danny Saldivar and Nose Guard Mike Babb also drew high praise with Coach Davis pointing to a fine overall defensive effort, especially by the interior line and linebackers.

A light rain and a chilly north wind combined to hold the crowd down and keep the Antelope marching band from staging its initial halftime marching show of the fall.

Dorland returned Coahoma's kickoff to the Post 29 and on the first play Davis faked the Bulldog defense almost out of their shoes and ran 17 yards around the right end of a keeper.

Whirlwinds feature dazzling air attack

Probably the toughest foe on the Post 1975 schedule will be faced Friday night when Coach Bobby Davis takes his Antelopes to Floydada to meet the offensive-minded Whirlwinds.

"They're a real fine football team," Coach Davis told The Dispatch when asked to comment on the Floydada ball club. "They probably have their best offensive team this year since I've been in Post — especially in their passing game."

On the throwing end of that aerial game is Quarterback Jay Womack, a fine passer and a pretty good runner.

Most often on the catching end is Split End Donzell Minner, the speedster who caught Dennis McDonald from behind here last year after McDonald broke for 35 yards and appeared to be headed for

a touchdown in the rain and mud. The two teams were scoreless at the time, but Floydada later pushed one across and won 6-0.

In two victories over Crosbyton and Cooper, Womack has completed 14 out of 22 passes, a fantastic 63 per cent completion average for a high school senior. In two games the Winds gained 311 yards by air for an average gain of over 22 yards per successful strike, or 14 yards every time Womack put it up.

Floydada took its opener from the Class A Crosbyton Chiefs, 41 to 0, and last Friday night manhandled the Cooper Pirates on a wet field, 36-0, although the statistics were not really as uneven as the score. It's obvious that the Winds have something in the way of

defense too as the opposition hasn't put a point on the board in those two games.

All the Floydada offense isn't running by any means. The Winds have two halfback swifties in the backfield to handle the running in 175-pound Kelvin Ratliff and 145-pound Mickey Minnett, plus Elton Ratliff to punch up the middle.

The Floydada attack features the wishbone set which isn't normally considered a good passing formation.

The Winds are so good they expect to hit the state top 10 ranking in Class AA any week now. What the Lopes have in mind for Friday night is to doom those hopes for at least the immediate future.

The Post squad is fit and ready.

Letterman Duke Bell will take the field for the first time against Floydada. He is sure to see action on the specialty teams and probably as a backup at nose guard. He also plays split end on offense.

Bell got a slow start because of a ruptured appendix in late summer.

Coach Davis figures to go with the same starters who opened against Coahoma, and did so well.

He isn't talking a lot about his club's chances against Floydada, but you have to remember the last time the Lopes invaded Floydada they turned the Whirlwinds into a light breeze and came home with the victory on a tough ball game.

The one Friday night is expected to be just as rugged.

On offense, Floydada is expected to start Steve Moore, 180, and Billy Marrielle, 192 at the tackles; Gregy Bishop, 198, and Gary Nixon, 192 at guards; Randy Duke, 213, at center. Tight end will be Greg Goen, 150, and split end of course Minner.

Every one of the attack unit is a senior but Womack and Minnett.

On defense, Floydada starts eight of the offensive starters with Jerry McGuire, reserve quarterback, at one defensive half; Alvin Stafel, 170 pound senior, at one tackle; and Jay Lackey, 153 pound junior at one of the linebackers.

Going both ways with their defensive positions listed here are Ratliff and Ratliff at ends, Moore at tackle, Duke and Marrielle at guards, Nixon at one linebacker, Minner at defensive halfback and Minnett at safety.

from five to seven cents a gallon as it is now in most states." He explained in these inflated times the highway department is hard pressed for enough money with which to operate. He added: "they're cutting back on employees now."

(Editor's Note: Plans already have been announced to close the resident engineer's office in Colorado City which employs seven people.)

Hance said some of the legislature's most important actions were in the bills it killed, citing the senate's rejection of a state EOP which would have been used to oppose discrimination in the job field.

Add 270 new state employees in a EOP and think of the turmoil they would cause trying to justify their jobs, the state senator said.

As for food stamps, Hance said he went to Austin for his first session "slightly against food stamps" and came away at its close "violently opposed to them." They can bankrupt this country," he said, citing the millions of dollars Texas had to spend just to administer the program by federal guidelines.

He told Rotarians anyone knowing of a case of food stamp fraud should call the information to his office and he will have it investigated.

Hance said one of the big inflationary causes in this country is that the federal government doesn't operate on a balanced budget as does the state of Texas.

"Congress can just vote to spend more money and print more money any time they want to," Hance said.

"It is not easy to serve in state government," Hance concluded. In response to some questions, he said the state "didn't squander all its surplus at the beginning of the session."

At the start of his talk, he reviewed legislative appropriation procedures and said in his opinion "the state of Texas does a good job with its budget."

Post in the low number of county slots assigned to Garza in the in-school youth program. Luis Perez, South Plains Community Action program director, told the group that federal administrators of the manpower program do not like to put too high a percentage of federal funds into the "in-school youth program" because it does not lead directly to placement of individuals in fulltime regular jobs.

Jack Alexander and Sue Shytles argued that it was much better for the labor market to keep young people in school to obtain education before trying to get into the job field than to attempting to work unemployed into regular positions through the federal on job training, another of the five in the manpower program.

Carlson told the group that Garza had a very poor record last year in permanent placing of workers in regular jobs through "on job training" in which federal government pays employers to train workers.

He said employers this year aren't receiving as much federal money and must promise a permanent job if the trainee qualifies in the training program.

Bill Powell, also from South Plains Community Action Inc., reported to the Garza group that programs sought by the Garza committee in the spring are either still awaiting federal funding or the ironing out of procedures at the state level.

Mrs. Shytles, Lorenzo Alexander Center director here, reported all goals accomplished over the summer except for the summer recreation program which never got off the ground here due in part to delays in getting federal funding.

Twenty-seven Garza youth were placed in summer jobs through the manpower program (six of these in Southland), "so, we did have a summer youth program of another kind," she said.

She made over 300 contacts a month for each of the three summer months in various aspects of her job with the health clinic completing school physicals for 22 in August. She said adults now can obtain blood tests and immunization at the health clinic.

She reminded that enrollment for adult education night classes here will be Sept. 29 between 7 and 10 p. m. at the high school and urged local adults to "fill them up."

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S. J. R. NO. 11) SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed session sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:

Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

efficiency of the executive branch.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective January 1, 1976, except Article III, Section 5, which becomes effective January 1, 1981.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary is amended to:

Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the JUDICIARY PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the VOTING AND ELECTION PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VII, Section 9, which becomes effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the general provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article X, General Provisions, is amended to:

Provide the basic requirements relating to public officeholders such as the official oath and residency requirements. The provision defining the separate and community property of spouses is retained, and the protection of a homestead from forced sale is continued. The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business at more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibition or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lotteries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and raffles. The presently existing provisions for retirement benefits of teachers and other public employees are modified to allow the state to con-

tribute more than 10%.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county officers are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The calling of a limited or unlimited constitutional convention with voter approval is provided. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising the MODE OF AMENDING PROVISIONS of the Texas Constitution."

If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.
