Industry Meeting Set Community-Wide Friday Night

Colorado City Industrial Team and Chamber of Commerce are calling a special community-wide meeting Friday night in Civic House.

Time will be 7:30 p.m. with citizens from all areas of the community urged to attend.

Project committees, working within the Industrial Team and Chamber of Commerce, have been busy gathering data and plans during the last week in a new hurry-up program activity.

The two civic organizations scheduled the meeting to discuss developments within recent days in their industrial development programs.

"This meeting will discuss prospects and plans vital to

the business, industrial and governmental welfare of our entire community," said Thompson and Bridgford.

"It is urgent for our community's welfare that our citizens hear these prospects and participate in a course of action."

Town To Salute Jet Don Maynard

In the fall of 1952 a lean-legged kid who hitched up his socks up calf-high played his last football game for Colorado High before starting in graduation year basketball and track.

Last Sunday this same guy still with the penchant for hitching up his socks - broke the all-time record for professional football pass catching before 50,000-cheering fans in New York City's Shea Stadium.

Next month he comes back to Colorado City for his own Don Maynard day and a special toast from the community where his football career began.

Maynard accepted the invita-

tion Wednesday of the Chamber of Commerce to be honored for his outstanding sports achievement.

He was at Shea Stadium preparing for a workout with his New York Jets, already Eastern Division champs of American Football, when the Colorado City phone call came through from Bob Reilly, Chamber toastmaster and sports committee chairman and Joe Weaver.

The sports committee will sponsor the Maynard Day program which will be highlighted by a dinner with the Jet flanker.

"Don was eager for the event," said Reilly, and was

genuinely pleased that we were happy for his great career and wanted to honor him."

Maynard, who starred at Texas Western (now University of Texas at El Paso) after graduation from Colorado High in spring of 1953, will come to Colorado City immediately after playing in the American Football League All-Star game Jan. 19 in Miami, Fla.

"We expect to schedule Don Maynard Day in mid-January, depending upon Don's schedule," Reilly said.

Refinery's Final Wake

They buried Col-Tex Refinery here Friday night.

Well, not exactly, but the 1968 annual Col-Tex senior employees dinner was the closest thing to a wake any refinery ever had.

It was the traditional time to pay tribute to old-timers at the old plant which has poured power into America's go and piped profits to its owners ever since great Permian Basin oil resources were first tapped more than 40 years ago.

But, highballs, thick steaks, cigar smoke and all the awards

could not lessen the impact of that Jan. 12 target date for shutting down the refinery and sending its crews to Cosden in Big Spring.

Even the jokes pointed to the move down Interstate 20.

Maybe it was best that the top brass of Cosden and Fina were not at the banquet tables in Villa Inn Restaurant. It has been the custom all these years for the parent firm's president to join the crowd, lend to the merrymaking.

This time, though, Cosden's new boss, Paul Meek, couldn't

make it and he sent his regrets via telegram.

Jerry Allen, who is over all of Cosden's refineries, sensed the atmosphere when his turn came to stand in for his president.

"I've never performed at a wake before," he spoke, then quipped that it was the liveliest of the few Col-Tex award dinners he has attended.

For the record, he pin-pointed that Jan. 12, 1968, as the date for closing Col-Tex, which will be a Sunday.

A few other Cosden visitors

from Big Spring tried their hand, too. Ernie Richardson, a refinery superintendent, told the gang good naturedly "we've got work for you" over at the Cosden plant.

"When we come to Big Spring," kidded A. A. (Coon) Free, something of a tradition himself at the dinners, "just get out of the way."

Pipeline workers joked that more rain might slow work on a necessary 6-inch line and delay the shutdown. And some safety expert said something about fellowship and the move to Big Spring is "just changing the place for our association."

You could tell those guys who had given their life's work to the old plant on the hillside were having a hard time buying that line.

"Can I come as a visitor?" asked Johnny Miller, a gnarled little veteran who retires this month after 36 years.

Jack Y. Smith, who as industrial relations chief for Cosden emceed dinners like these, sensed the mood and just sort of called the roll while he lined-up the presentation of service watches, ruby and diamond pins. There was a silent pause in memory of three "seniors"

who died since the last dinner a year ago—Charlie Wakefield, retired Col-Tex superintendent E. L. (Stumpy) Tiller and pipeline Blackie Hines.

Miller, Hank Bryant and Farris Lipps stood up for a round of applause just because they had retired during the same period.

"You are getting a damn good bunch of men," Miller told the visitors.

Two hundred years of combined service stood up when Lee Lavender, Pete Dillard, Toby Brown, Earl Webber, Les Wat-

son and Tommy Mosely were applauded simply for old-time's sake.

They liked it - amidst the smoke and jokes and catcalls and called out nicknames which are known only to those who have worked elbow-elbow for years.

Especially this night they had a feeling for men and refinery and years.

"Stand up back there," somebody yelled for Alvin Byrd.

He did.

"There is 42 years of Col-

Tex," the yell came again, as Alvin beamed silently.

Joe Gunning, who was one of the first to make the trip to Big Spring years ago from Col-Tex, turned to a friend and recalled when he first came to Colorado City and Col-Tex from Oklahoma and the then parent firm, Anderson-Prichard.

"That was 30 years ago... it just doesn't seem that long."

They seemed more restless this year. More walking around. Less attention to the planned See COL-TEX Page 7

football player, caught three touchdown passes - two in 42 seconds - Sunday against Miami in New York to surpass the all-time pro record held by Raymond Berry of the National Football League's Baltimore Colts.

Maynard's 160 yards with seven completions increased his total yardage to 9,332 yards for his 10-year career.

Already this 1968 season he has caught 32 passes from the Jets' Joe Namath and Babe Parilli for 1,194 yards.

All the rest - one season with Hamilton in Canadian football was nil - have been with New York in the American League.

Over the pro route, which began in 1958 with 5 completions while a rookie with New York Giants of the National League, he has averaged more than 20 yards per pass catch with 479 completions.

Before this record-breaking season, 1967 was his greatest when he was voted "Most Valuable Player" on the Jets by his teammates.

He led the AFL in yards gained receiving last fall with 1,434 and averaged 20.2 yards per catch. He was second to teammate George Sauer, another Texan, in total receptions for the Jets with 71, four short of Sauer who broke Maynard's club record of 72 previously set in 1960. He grabbed 10 touchdown passes last year to rank third in the league and the AFL in 100-yard performances per game with 9 and topped 'em all with 164 yards for a single game with five catches against Boston.

He tied a club record and missed an AFL mark in '67 also
