Attorneys for the Judsonia Development Co. have withdrawn their motion for a writ of attachment against the Texas officials who are holding the territory on the Red River, which is in litigation and which pending the action of the Supreme Court at Washington in appointment of a Federal receivership.

The Oklahoma authorities have asked for the appointment of a Federal receiver, and in case the receivership is established the application for writ of attachment will be permanently withdrawn.

FIRE AT WINTERS DOES DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT \$50,000; STILL BURNING

Fire broke out simultaneously in a car of cedar posts and a car of oats, standing fifteen yards apart on the A. & S. track at Winters, at noon Saturday.

The fire soon spread to other property and at three o'clock The Ledger received a phone message from its correspondent at Winters stating that unless the fire broke out in other places, the fire company would be able to control it.

The fire spread from the two cars to other cars and to the cotton platform, where there were about one hundred bales of cotton, and to a warehouse near the track.

Up to three o'clock Saturday afternoon the following property had been destroyed:

One car cedar posts
One car oats
One car cotton
100 bales cotton and platform
A. & S. warehouse
One car crude oil

All the property except the car of oil was in the hands of the A. & S. and the railroad suffers the loss, but no doubt is fully insured.

The car of oil had been pumped from the car into an underground tank and belonged to oil drillers, probably Hazlett & Harrison.

The volunteer fire company at Winters soon had the pump at the city water works pump station throwing pressure direct into

the mains and the heroic efforts kept the fire from spreading to other property.

A high West wind was blowing, and had the fire spread to other property it would have swept a wide path across the city, and caused loss running into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The fire is supposed to have originated from sparks from a gin, where cotton bolls were being used for fuel, as parties claim to have seen sparks flying from the gin in the direction of the property destroyed.

ALLIES PREVENT GERMAN MOVEMENT

PARIS, March 27.—The allies have refused the German government permission to send seventy-five thousand Reichswehr troops from the occupied Rhine provinces to restore order.

This decision came following Germany's refusal to allow the allies to occupy cities of Frankfurt and Darmstadt as a guarantee that any troops sent to the Ruhr district to down the communists would be withdrawn as soon as order was restored.

OLDEST CHURCH IN CITY GOING DOWN

Another one of the city's old landmarks is being converted into second hand lumber, and one of the oldest, if not the oldest, buildings, in Ballinger, is being torn down.

C. S. Guin recently purchased the old Cumberland Presbyterian church building and is having same torn down. He will use the best part of the material in building other houses.

Mr. Guin stated that the dimension material in the building was better than could be bought today, notwithstanding that the building was constructed about fifty years ago at old Runnels.

For several years the building has been used for a kindergarten building. It was moved here from Old Runnels in 1886, and for many years occupied the lot where the Eighth Street Presbyterian church now stands. It was moved back and replaced with the stone church about twenty-five years ago.

Recently T. S. Lankford purchased the lots back of the 8th Street church, including the old building and he sold the building to Mr. Guin.

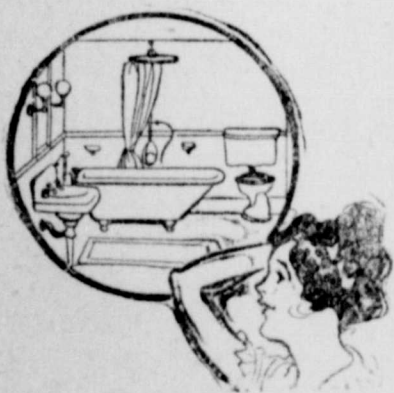

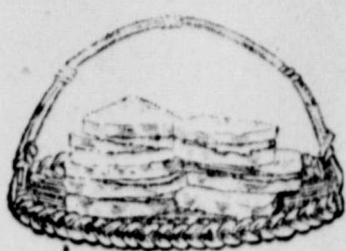

PAINT ROCK, March 27.—A flurry was created in oil circles here Thursday when it was announced that there was a showing of oil in the Texas-Meers Oil Co.'s shallow test that is being drilled on Mrs. Cora M. Hartgrove's ranch, Section 232, about twelve miles east of this place and south of the Schultz well No. 2.

Drilling is going forward today and the company is confident that pay oil will be struck. Jeff Meers, president of the operating concern, is an experienced "wildcat" operator and asserts that the prospects for oil on the Hartgrove field are the best he has ever had. The shallow test was spudded in about two months ago to determine the near-surface formations before starting a deep well. Headquarters of the company are at Brady.
