Foshee resigns position

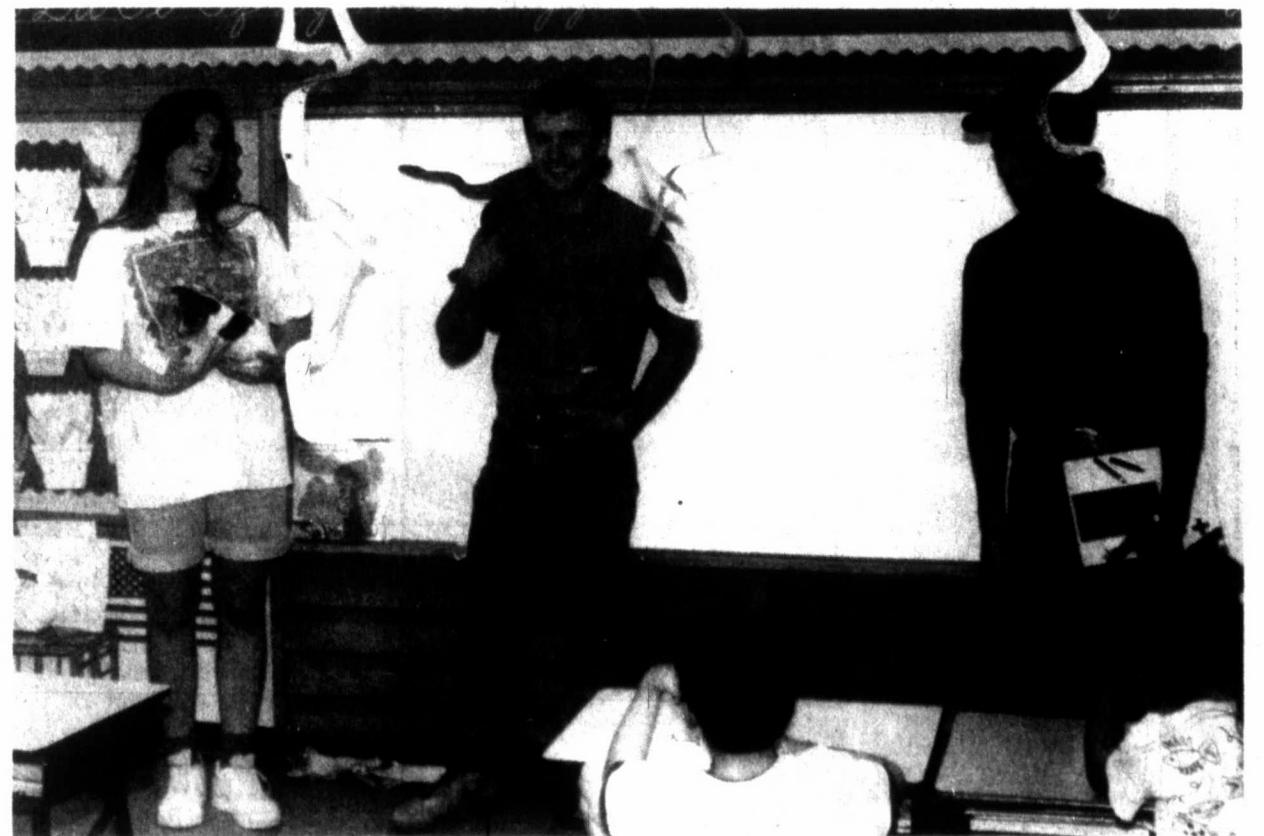

Prison celebration plans continue

The 'Prison Celebration and Rob Junell Appreciation Day' to be held at Ruddick Park, from 4-8:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 23, will be sponsored by the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce.

"We're expecting the most people to be in the park at one time since the last Indian War," said Chamber official Bob Reily.

Activities that are scheduled include a meal, entertainment and a program recognizing the efforts which brought approval to the bid submitted by the board of economic development to locate a Texas Department of Criminal Justice unit in Mitchell County.

Ruddick Park will be roped off and closed to parking for the day, with Chamber officials requesting that those attending the event park at the east end -- by the cemetery -- and ride the buses which will be provided.

Chamber officials said that plans

are for a meal consisting of hamburgers, fried pies and a drink and entertainment in the form of a mariachi band, to be held from 4-6 p.m. in the area between the swimming pool and the amphitheater.

A program recognizing elected officials and dignitaries who helped support Mitchell County's prison package is planned from 6-7 p.m. at the amphitheater.

From 7-8:30 p.m. the popular country-western band Mason Dixon is scheduled to appear in concert at the amphitheater.

Over 200 state dignitaries and prison officials have been sent invitations from Chamber officials, inviting them to take part in the celebration.

Everyone will be required to have a ticket for the meal, but everyone in the community is invited to attend the program and the entertainment that will be provided.

Advance tickets needed for free meal in park

Advance tickets will be required for everyone who wishes to eat at the "Prison Celebration and Rob Junell Appreciation Day," to be held at Ruddick Park on Saturday, May 23.

Chamber officials note that tickets will be available from May 11 - 20, at no-cost from the following locations: Colorado City -- Chamber of Commerce office, City National Bank, First National Bank and Wood's Boots.

Loraine -- First State Bank. Westbrook -- D & S Corner Store. The tickets will provide the Chamber committee estimates required for preparing the food.

Officials request that an adult pick-up the required tickets for their family.

No alcoholic beverages will be allowed at the celebration, said organizers of the event.

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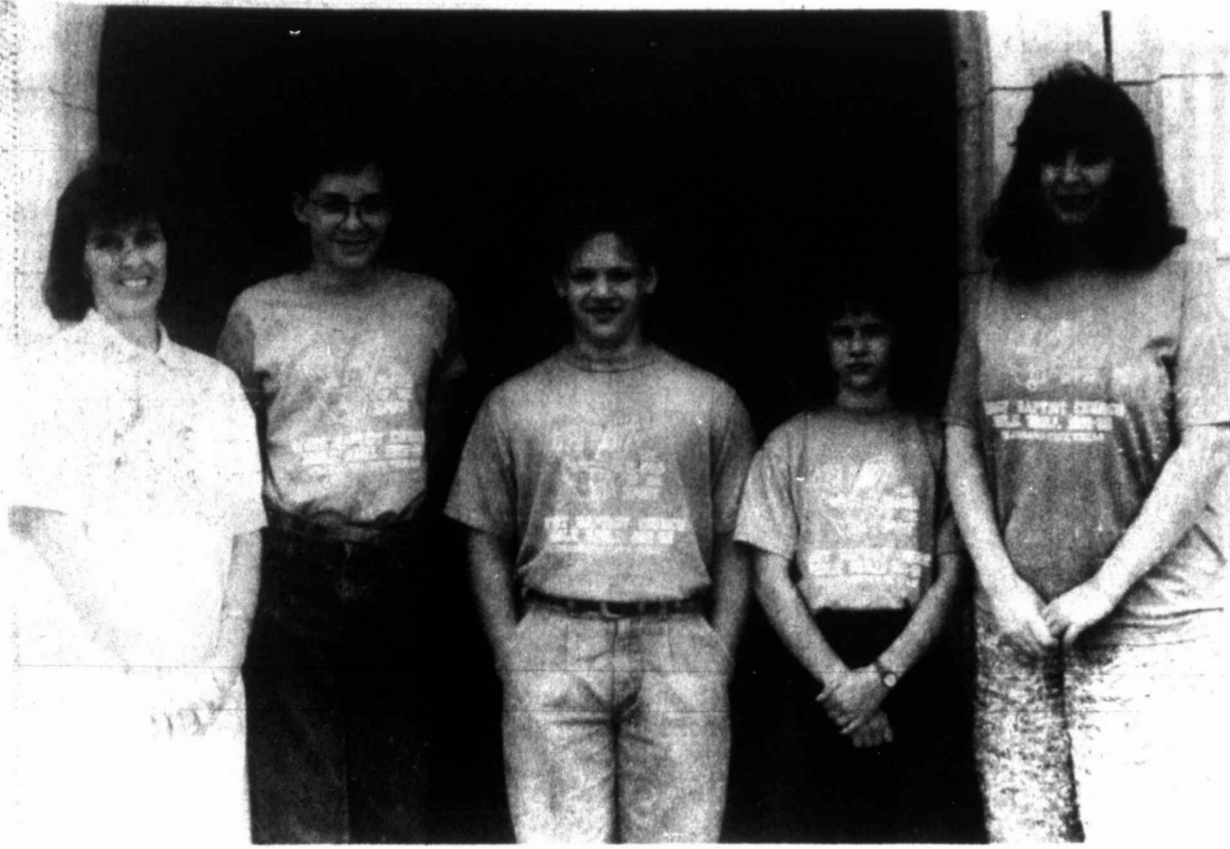

Students from Colorado City's First Baptist Church demonstrated their memory skills and Bible knowledge as eleven 4th, 5th and 6th graders participated in the recent Children's and Youth Bible Drill.

The participants for the 1991-1992 year were Mica Merrell, Genece Brannan, Micah Brannan, Crystal Bolen, Rachel Bolen,

Ashley Turner, Kamie Stubblefield, Johnnie Riggs, Faith Feaster, Angela Riggs and Colby Slater.

Each of these students advanced to the Associational Drill in Snyder.

The third and final level of competition for the children was the State Drill held in Abilene on April 10-11.

In the State Drill, Kamie Stubblefield and Faith Feaster received a rating of Good for making 8 or fewer mistakes.

Ashley Turner received an Excellent rating for 4 or fewer mistakes.

Rachel Bolen, Crystal Bolen, Colby Slater and Johnnie Riggs received a rating of Superior for 2 or fewer mistakes.

Mica Merrell and Angela Riggs received a rating of State Winner Perfect for making no mistakes.

They also received a Bible, presented to them by Harold Hanson, coordinator of Discipleship Training Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Those competing were expected to learn the names of the books of the Bible in the proper order and be able to locate them in the Bible.

They also memorized and could quote the 25 verses and references selected by the Discipleship Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

A drill involved four categories of six calls each with a 10-second time limit on each call.

To advance from the Associational Drill to the State Drill, the child is allowed 8 or fewer mistakes.

Each child is judged on an individual basis.

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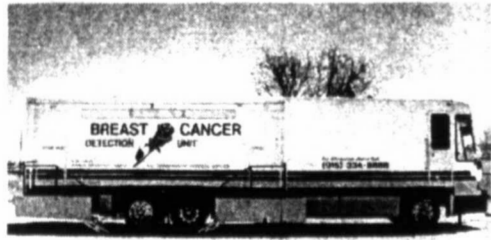


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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$65.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

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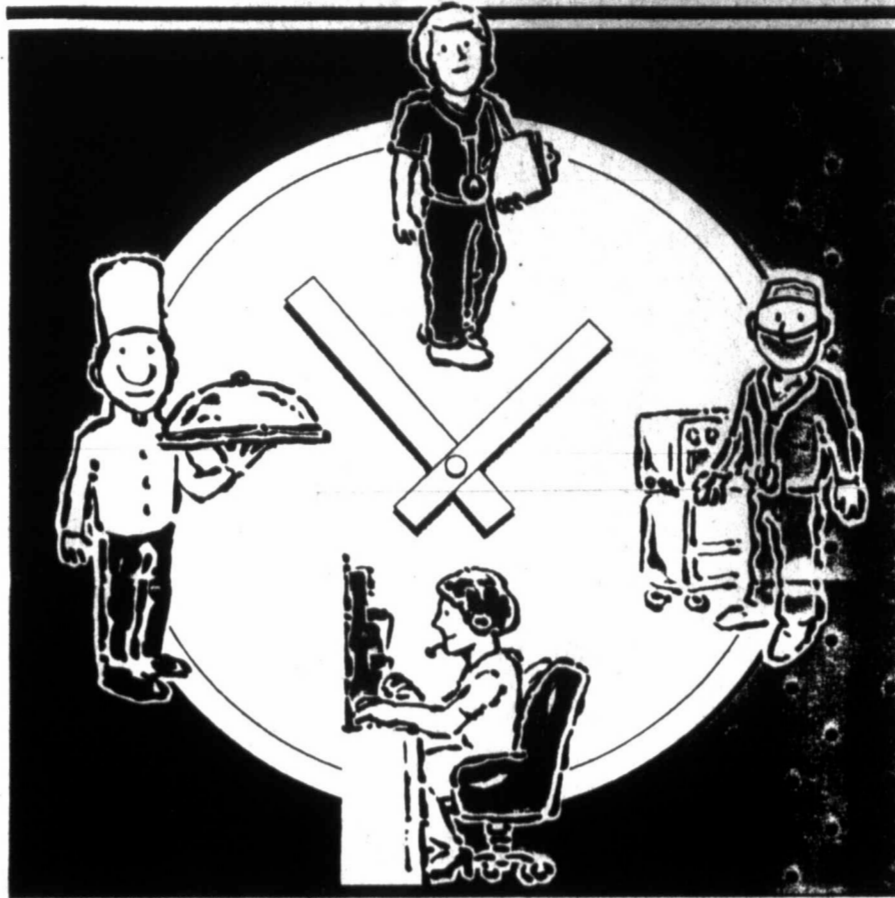

## When to Call an Ambulance

### Recognizing Emergencies

How do you tell the difference between a true emergency and a minor problem? Certain symptoms are so alarming that the need for emergency care—or even an ambulance—is obvious. But what should you do about more common illnesses and injuries?

Only a doctor can diagnose medical problems. But, you can protect your family's health by learning to recognize certain symptoms.

Know which symptoms to watch for. According to the American College of Emergency Physicians, the following are warning signs of a medical emergency:

- Difficulty breathing, shortness of breath
- Chest or upper abdominal pain or pressure
- Fainting
- Sudden dizziness, weakness or change in vision
- Change in mental status (such as unusual behavior, confusion, difficulty arousing)
- Sudden, severe pain anywhere in the body
- Bleeding that won't stop
- Severe or persistent vomiting
- Coughing up or vomiting blood
- Suicidal or homicidal feelings

You should also be familiar with the symptoms of common illnesses and injuries.

Talk to your regular doctor *before* you have an emergency. Ask what you should do if you think someone in your family needs emergency care. Should you call the doctor's office first? Should you go straight to the emergency department? What should you do when the doctor's office is closed?

Trust your instincts. Parents are usually very good at recognizing signs of unusual behavior or other symptoms that indicate an emergency. Many other factors, including the time of day, other medical problems, or state of mind, can make an otherwise minor medical problem an "emergency."

### When to Call an Ambulance

When should you call an ambulance instead of driving to the emergency department? Ask yourself the following questions:

- Is the victim's condition life-threatening?
- Could the victim's condition worsen and become life-threatening on the way to the hospital?
- Could moving the victim cause further injury?
- Does the victim need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?
- Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting the victim to the hospital?

If the answer to any of these questions is "yes," or if you are unsure, it's best to call an ambulance. This is true even though you can sometimes get to the hospital faster by driving than by calling an ambulance. Paramedics and emergency medical technicians communicate with the physician in the emergency department by radio. They are trained to begin medical treatment on the way to the hospital. This prevents any delay that could occur if the patient is driven to the emergency department. The ambulance can also alert the emergency department of the patient's condition in advance.

If you live in a community with a single emergency number, calling for help is easy. Just dial 9-1-1. If your community does not have the 9-1-1 emergency number, keep the numbers of the fire, police, and emergency medical services near your telephone. When you call for help, speak calmly and clearly. Give your name, the address, phone number, location of victim (such as upstairs in the bedroom), and nature of the problem. Don't hang up until the dispatcher tells you to. They may need additional information or need to give you instructions.

## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

**The Law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:**

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property.
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

**Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB\***

**Usual Deadline**  
 On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

**Special Deadlines**  
 For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

\*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

**Informal Review**  
 For an informal review, please call 728-5028 for an appointment.

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board**  
 If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).  
 The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 12th & Hickory St., Colorado City, Texas.  
 Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

**Review by the District Court**  
 After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

# Rosas is determined to succeed

Rosemary Rosas does not only rely on her sheer athletic ability to succeed in discus throwing, she relies on "psychobernetics" and intimidation, she says.

Grant Taft, Baylor University coach passed on the "psychobernetics" method on to Coach Rick Robinson, Rosas' discus coach, and he passed it onto her.

"It's a vision I see before I sleep of myself competing," said Rosas. "It puts a certain something in my throwing and I do see the improvement the next day."

"When I go to a meet and I see this girl throwing way out there, the way the Perrington girls did, I say to myself, 'I can do a lot better than that!'" she says.

"I have to put myself just a step better than everybody else."

Rosas believes that her sport, a sport in which 1992 marks the third year she has gone to regionals in discus and the first that she has captured the top place in her region, is at least half psychological.

"Success is always possible, but you've got to have your mind in it completely with nothing else on it but winning," she said.

This assertiveness is why she does so well and loves her sport so much, she says.

"I like all sports, but discus is different than say, golf and tennis, because it is such a tough sport."

Her fondness of discus is also helped by her various wins, "Knowing that I do good helps my

confidence, now I go into contests knowing that I can do good."

"I also try not to be as hard on myself because I can, at times, be hard on myself, I just try not to let it all get to me."

Rosas believes that having her biggest regionals competition next to her, practicing alongside of her, pushes her to advance her throws.

Christi Hulme, the runner up in regionals and first in district, also qualified for the state meet that has only eight 3A discus contestants in the state of Texas.

"I probably wouldn't do as well without Christi there because when she's thrown better than me, I try that much harder," said Rosas.

She adds that when she is ahead of Hulme, "she tries harder too."

Their relationship is not only competitive, but is one "where we can tell each other what the other is doing wrong."

No one threw as far as Hulme and Rosas did in regionals, no one threw past the 120's, but Hulme threw 128' 10" and Rosas threw 134' 2".

"There was no real competition for us," said Rosas, "especially since the girls from Perrington, who could throw in the 140's, graduated last year."

Robinson has coached Rosas since before entering high school.

"I admire him so much because he enjoys the competition so much," she said.

She views him as a "second dad, I can trust him with my deepest secrets and I know he'll do whatever he can for me."

"He's made me work hard and offered some little quote or some little story about sports, like what Zig Ziggler says," she says, "that helps me."

Zig Ziggler is an author and public speaker on motivation whose psychology Robinson promotes to his athletes and some of his classes.

Coach Robinson is second on her list of people to thank for her belief in self, next to her parents, Mrs. Amelia Garcia and Mr. and Mrs. Frank and Mary Rosas.

Her boyfriend and the student body offer her encouragement.

"I smile and try not to show my disappointment in front of other people," she said.

"But when I see my boyfriend, I say, 'I can't believe I didn't do as good as I thought I would!'"

Each coach has added something to what she is today, she said.

Kathy Marshall, seventh, eighth and ninth grade coach, "introduced determination to us."

"She was so tough on us, she was a tough lady, and we didn't know what she was doing, but she knew that we would do better in high school, when we were more mature."

Middle school coach, Anita Graham also taught her technique and how to play sports correctly.

Wayne Alexander, her basketball coach for three years, is "hard to get respect from, you have to earn it."

Says Rosas, "The harder you work in practice, the more playing time you'll have."

Technique, introduced by Graham is what Alexander continued to teach her.

"He's not about running, running, running, he's more about technique and strategy."

In academics, Rosas's interest lies in government and history.

That interest was first sparked by Orphie Conner, her American history teacher.

"I loved history so much that I didn't even need to take notes, she made it so interesting."

Now in high school, she finds economics and government interesting because Robinson is not only a good coach, but a good teacher as well who "makes it like life, he doesn't just teach terms, but life."

She doesn't plan to pursue sports after she graduates this May, but plans to go into the medical field or physical education taking her basic courses at Western Texas College in Snyder.

Says Rosas, "Sports has taught me to reach my goals even in something like math and computers and to always give it all I've got."



## Kindergarten, Pre-K round-up set

Kindergarten and pre-kindergarten round-up will be here soon. It will be held May 12 & 13 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Kelly Elementary. The child enrolled for kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 1, 1992. The child enrolled for pre-kindergarten must be 4 years old on or before September 1, 1992. Please be aware that no child will be enrolled for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten without a state birth certificate (not the hospital certificate with the footprints on it). A state certificate may be obtained from the county seat where the child was born.

The child enrolling in the pre-kindergarten program must also qualify under the bilingual program or the free lunch program. The pre-kindergarten program is a half day program where the child will either attend the morning or afternoon session but not both.

Transportation to and from school must be provided by the parents. Meals will not be served to children in the pre-kindergarten program for those who qualify under the lunch program.

Please help us plan for the next school year by bringing your child to the round-up. We will be able to start the new school year in a better way if we know how many students to expect. Please notify anyone else that you may know if with pre-school age children.

Also, when enrolling your child in pre-kindergarten or kindergarten please have their social security number and their immunization record with you or the address from which the immunization record can be obtained. The following immunizations are required upon enrollment in the Colorado Independent School District according to Texas law:

\* Oral Polio: At least three

doses of oral polio vaccine are required. At least one of those must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

\* DTP: At least three doses of DTP vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

\* Measles: One dose of measles vaccine received after 12 months is required or provide a physician-validated history of measles illness.

\* Mumps: One dose of mumps vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of

mumps illness.

\* Rubella: One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.
