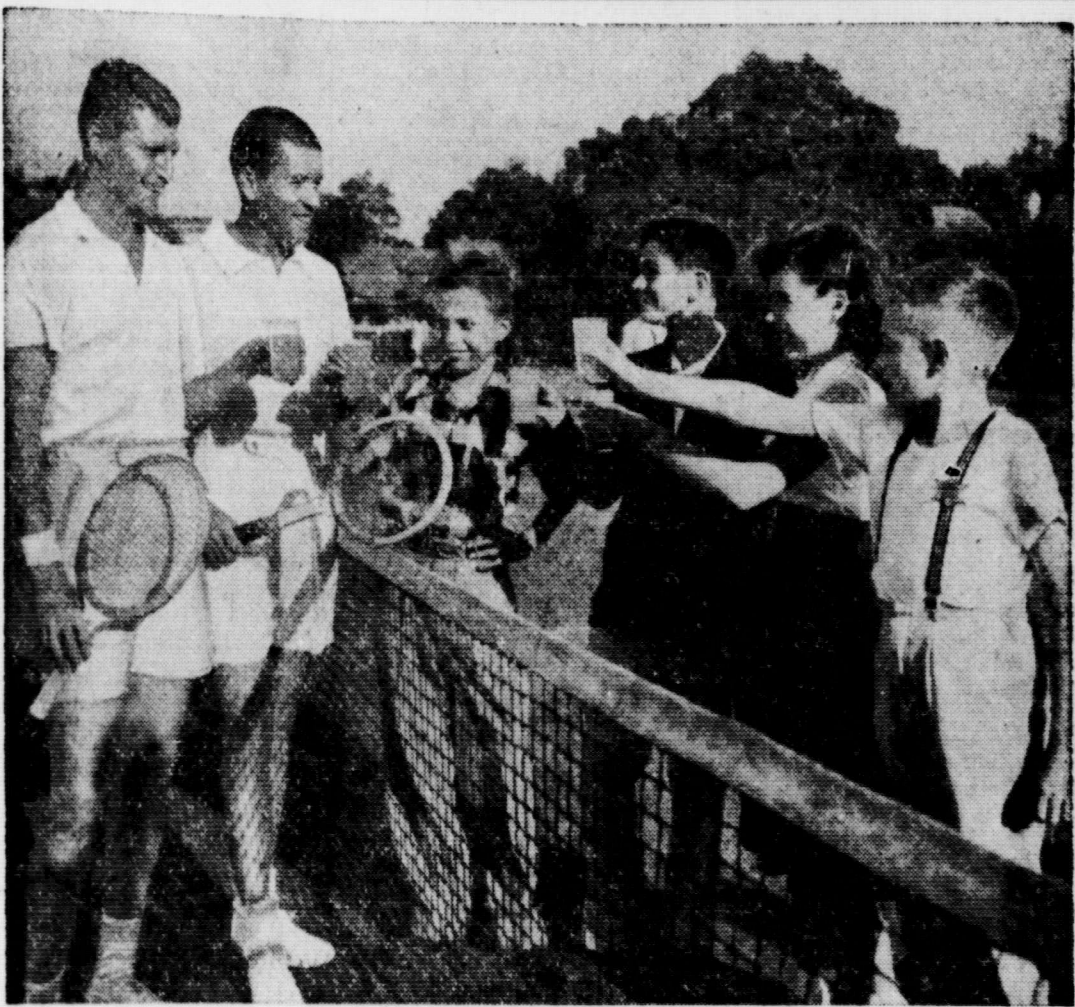

POLL IN CISCO AREA INDICATES DEMOCRATIC VICTORY THIS FALL

If the results of a poll taken in Cisco last week are any indication of what to expect in November, Governor Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic standard bearer, will nose out GOP nominee D. D. Eisenhower at the polls.

In a poll taken, 85 Ciscoans were interviewed, and 43 of those asked which of the candidates they expected to support, named Stevenson. Mr. Eisenhower was the choice of 32 of those polled and 10 said that they were undecided.

Included in the poll were five business men, 10 farmers and ranchers, 15 housewives, 25 white collar workers and five professional men. Business men were divided four for Stevenson and one for Eisenhower; farmers were four for Ike, five for Adlai and one undecided. Nine of the 15

Budget Hearing Is Called Monday At Courthouse

The Eastland County Commissioners' Court will hold a budget hearing at 10 a. m. Monday at the courthouse, according to an announcement Saturday. The public has been invited to hear a discussion of the proposed 1952-53 budget at that time.

County Auditor Earl O'Brien will submit a proposed budget for the hearing. The preliminary budget indicates that the new tax rate will be 75 cents per \$100 valuation as compared with 60 cents during the past few years.

The preliminary budget estimates receipts of \$317,923 and budgets expenditures of \$312,605. The proposed budget will be read in detail at the meeting.

The county will send out 1952 tax statements around October 1 when collections will begin at the offices of Tax Assessor-Collector Stanley Webb. Mr. Webb reported that tax statements work is progressing on schedule.

Born in Mineral Wells, he made his home in Cisco for a number of years. While in Cisco, he operated a news stand. He moved to Odessa 16 years ago and was in the service station business.

Maintenance Of Highways Costly

AUSTIN, Sept. 13. — If Texas could spend all its highway income on construction of new highways it would have a system of new roads unequalled anywhere.

Maintenance, however, is becoming such a factor in use of highway revenue that it is eating fast into the total amount of money paid by the highway users, according to a study of the Texas Good Roads Association just released.

In 1952 road maintenance will take some \$42 million out of the \$120 million total that will be available to the highway department, according to the figures.

"It must be remembered that we have many hundreds of miles of highways, built back in the Model T days, that are now carrying from 2,000 to 4,000 automobiles a day," said General Ike Ashburn, executive vice-president of TGRA.

Maverick Eleven Is Defeated Here

The Cisco High School Loboes made a good impression on the home folks Friday night as they struck in each quarter to triumph 26-to-6 over the Eastland High Mavericks in the opening game of the 1952 football season at Chesley Field. A crowd estimated at more than 3,000 fans attended the contest.

The new Lobo machine, featuring several players up from last year's "B" team and the junior high squad, looked good in the victory, which avenged a 13-to-6 setback handed Cisco by Eastland in the final game of the 1951 season.

The "T" formation, introduced for the first time at Cisco High this year by Coaches Jack Everett and Jay Williams, was effective most of the evening. The work of Boy Gallagher, the "man under" convinced fans that he will be a top-grade field general before the season is very old.

The work of big Sherwood Gaines at tackle and as middle guard on the defense and of Bill Smith, freshman end, was the talk of the town Saturday. Other line standouts included Daniel Grey, tackle; Bob Qualls, center, and Irv Brunkenhoefer, defensive end and offensive fullback.

Brunkenhoefer demonstrated a lot of power and drive in the ball carrying department, and Half-backs Bobby Black and Bob Lloyd were impressive in all departments. Both of the backs showed that they're going to be top ball handlers in this circuit.

Eastland's Vern Meroney and James Jessop were the stars of the Maverick backfield, and Don Roff and J. D. Hanson stood out in the line.

Opening the game, the Loboes drove to a touchdown the first time they got a chance. Brunkenhoefer captured the kickoff on his 44 yard line. Gallagher got five yards, and Black circled for nine to the Eastland 45. Black and Brunkenhoefer picked up eight yards and Gallagher made a first and ten on the 30. Brunkenhoefer and Lloyd got 11 yards, and Black ended the drive with a 16 yard scamper for touchdown. Brunkenhoefer missed the up-ricks.

Eastland took the kickoff on their 30 and Jessop circled left and for 14 yards. The Lobo line held and Hanson punted. Marcos Gallegos made a 23-yard return to midfield. Lloyd made two eight-yard dashes, and Brunkenhoefer plowed through center for 21 yards to the Maverick 14. Black and Lloyd made nine yards as the first period ended.

Lloyd drove to the 1-yard line and a 15-yard penalty ended the threat, Eastland taking over on downs on their 10. Meroney got through for 14 yards, and Bill Smith recovered a Maverick fumble on their 30. Lloyd and Black got 9 yards, and Brunkenhoefer drove 6 to the 14. Black got loose for 13 yards, and Lloyd hit center for a touchdown. Brunkenhoefer converted.

In the third period, Hanson took the kickoff 36 yards to the Eastland 46. Four line plays missed a first down by a yard, and Cisco took over on the Lobo 47. Gallagher passed 30 yards to Webb and interference was ruled, giving the Loboes a first down on the Maverick 27. Black got through for 7 yards, and Lloyd drove 10 yards, fumbling and Eastland recovering on their 18.

The Mavericks tried four line bucks again and the Loboes held, taking over on the Eastland 27. The Loboes missed a first down on four bucks by a yard, and the Mavericks took over. Two passes and a line play failed and Hanson punted short to the Eastland 24. Black drove to the 17; Brunkenhoefer made 6 and then fumbled, Eastland recovering on their 4 yard line. Meroney then fumbled behind the goal and Bill Smith fell on the ball for a touchdown. Gallagher missed the goal.

Opening the fourth period, Eastland punted to the Cisco 25. Here the Loboes fumbled, and Roff covered the ball on the Cisco 27.

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THE PLACE OF EDUCATION

The Seventh Annual Report of the Profession to the Public, released recently by the National Education Association, warns that American enterprise and ingenuity are not inherited by the children and youth of the nation but can be kept alive only by the American program of public education.

The report, entitled "The Public School," was released by its author, Willard E. Givens, executive secretary of the NEA, as thousands of public schools throughout the nation prepared to open their doors for another academic year.

"American enterprise and ingenuity are known around the world," says Secretary Givens. "They are envied by some, misinterpreted by others, respected by all. At work in a free nation they have produced the wealthiest and most powerful nation in the history of mankind."

"These traits must be consciously cultivated. One of the purposes of the modern public school is to keep them vigorously alive. The public school does not regard the Three R's as the whole education. It places great emphasis also upon those robust qualities of initiative, self-dependence, and imagination which meant so much to the material success of the American people."

Describing the school as a "vital center of community life," Secretary Givens says, "The public school upholds for its students those freedoms which brought their ancestors to this continent. The school that subjects its students to the yoke, produces citizens who are willing to wear it."

Calling attention to the attempts being made today to weaken American ideology and to destroy American freedoms, Secretary Givens emphasizes that freedom is more important today than at any other time in the nation's history.

"Our ability to withstand the menace of communism may well depend upon the vigor with which we demonstrate the vitality of our belief in our freedoms, and the

persistence with which we resist the encroachments of dictatorship upon our free public schools," he adds.

The report discusses the necessity of close cooperation between the home and the public school. "Time has greatly changed the home and the public school as educational institutions," it continues. "The large family home and its domestic economy in which youth were prepared for an identical domestic economy are far behind us in the stream of history."

"Modern life takes the members of the home to the office and shop and factory as well as to the field to earn a living in skills that are highly specialized. Even a large percentage of the mothers are employed. The public school has taken over in some measure many of the educational activities of the home."

"However, parents have not abdicated their responsibility," the report emphasizes. "No school operates effectively very long without a high level of community understanding, interest and participation, which involves not only parents but other citizens." Its program supplements and reinforces the educational opportunities which the home and the community afford. The public school is not a detached institution. . . . The close relationship of the public school to home and community is a protection against its use to promote the interests of a powerful party or the propaganda of a dictator."

Discussing the unifying effect of the public school, Secretary Givens emphasizes that no other institution except the public school touches the life of every citizen.

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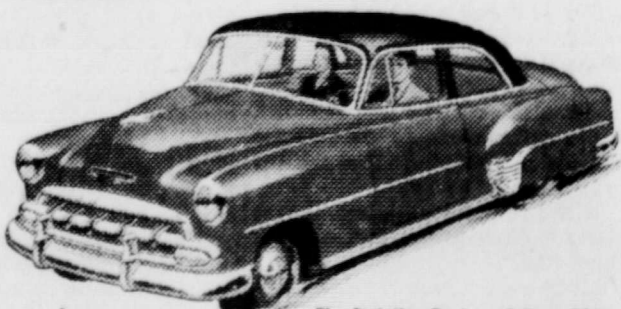

Area Clubwomen Hear Federation President In Dinner Speech Here

Approximately 125 area clubwomen and guests heard an address by Mrs. Van Hooks Stubbs, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, at dinner Thursday night, September 11, in the Methodist church. Mrs. Stubbs' subject was "We chart our course from the past." The occasion was the combined meeting of all area clubs belonging to the City Federation.

Mrs. Stubbs discussed the work of the Texas clubwomen in the past and outlined the work to be taken for the next year. She stated that hot water and sanitary drinking fountains in the public schools are direct results of the work of clubwomen.

A Department of Public Welfare is sponsored by Federated clubs and this department is divided into several phases, among these are mental health, community life, international affairs and Americanism, Mrs. Stubbs said.

An increase in the number of alcoholics brought many guests from all over the state to help and resulted in the organization of the mental health department. Federated clubwomen were urged by their state president to request assembly programs in the high schools in which movies on alcoholism and drug addiction could be shown. Mrs. Stubbs stated that competent speakers on these subjects could also be obtained to supplement the educational movies.

She pointed out that it is the duty of the adult to teach youth that they belong to their respective communities and that their communities belong to them. She also said that it is the duty of the adult to provide adequate and proper recreational facilities.

Mrs. Stubbs said that the Texas Federation was third in contributions to Korea last year and has now adopted Austria. The Cisco District has assumed responsibility for a part of contributions to children's hospitals which are sent to an American woman in Vienna for distribution.

She urged area clubwomen to discharge their responsibilities as citizens by voting in national, state, county and city elections, pointing out that women's votes exceed in numbers those of men by two million.

United Service Organizations are the medium through which Texas clubwomen discharge their duties to the men in the armed forces, Mrs. Stubbs said.

HEALTH TALKS

Preschool health examinations are a good start toward the ideal goal of cooperation between parents on the one hand and health workers like doctors and nurses on the other. The doctor, the go-between, can tell the school authorities about defects which Susie may have, such as bad hearing, which need to be considered in the teaching program. At the same time, he can let the parents know the fault needs to be corrected before it becomes an actual handicap.

Once the doctor has had his say, barring accidents and illness Susie is in the hands of the teacher until time for another health examination. The teacher, who has a chance to observe her all day, especially in relation to her classmates, is in a good position to notice any changes which show she doesn't feel well or any signs of a possible hearing defect. Usually she sends the child to the school nurse or doctor who may or may not confirm

what she has suspected. What happens next? If Susie is actually ill, she is sent home with a note. If she can't hear well, her parents may get a call or a visit from the doctor or nurse. Most parents are glad to help improve their child's well-being and wisely plan their budget to allow for needed medical care. A few may resent this attention from those whom they might consider "outsiders."

If Susie's parents are wise and big enough to take it, though, they will do what they can to get rid of the cold or other illness for which she had to leave school. If they need to, they will seek medical advice and aid to get her back to normal health and will see that she gets a hearing aid if she needs it to keep up with her classmates.

It is Susie's birthright and that of every child to be as healthy and as near normal as possible and thus to get the most from a school education. This is the purpose of the ideal, three-way cooperation among parents, teacher and doctor.
