The farmers not only expect 50 bu. of corn to the acre, but they get it, not rubbins but good big corn. Every kind of garden truck does well there also.

Mr. Harper, of Litwalton sold \$250 worth of hogs in Lynn County recently, that's some hogs alright. Mr. Harper also sold 50 head of stock cattle at \$13 around, which is a good price, especially at this time of the year.

A railroad has been surveyed through Garza county, and a town laid out, which is to be the county seat as well as the objective point of the road. An outfit is coming shortly to begin the work of improvement necessary before any business enterprises can be put into commission. Mr. Post is backing the enterprise, and is going to put a lot of money in the town, and it is safe to guess that Post-town will be one of the coming towns of the west.

SHORTAGE OF CHILDREN.

The cry has recently been raised in Baltimore that the new child labor law makes it impossible for some of the factories to operate successfully because of the number of children taken out of their employ and sent to school. Mr. Schomfarber of the Bureau of Labor Statistics says the truth is that factories are always short of child labor merely because it is cheap labor.

"Their cry of shortage is purely a question of economy with them. They could get all the men they want at from a dollar and a quarter to two dollars a day to do the carrying out and cleaning up but they want boys because boys are cheap, and if they cannot get boys they want girls or women who are forced to work for what they can get."—National Child Labor Committee in Woman's Home Companion for March.
