**Bid awarded for construction project at Wolf Stadium**

At their regular monthly meeting Monday night, the Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees awarded a bid to Johnston Construction Company for construction of the dressing rooms and concession stand at Wolf Stadium.

School board members, wanting to come to a decision Monday so as not to delay completion of the facility before September 15, authorized Superintendent Russell Merket to negotiate with the construction company on the details of the bid proposal, such as including foundation testing by the construction company but deleting the cabinets and finding another source for their construction.

The girls dressing rooms are the most important part of this project, said Larry Blessingame, board president, adding that the restrooms and dressing rooms accounted for

the majority of the project's cost.

The girls need a place to dress for sports activities, Merket told the board. In addition, the restrooms need to comply with the American Disabilities Act, he said.

Johnson Construction Company of Big Spring was the low bidder at \$144,206. Five bids were submitted, none of whom were Mitchell County companies. The second lowest bid was for \$161,072.

Cost of the project was greater than anticipated but had to be done, Merket said.

Plans call for all the facilities under one roof—dressing rooms, restrooms with hot water in the girls room and a concession stand.

Board members voted unanimously to require a September 1 completion date with September 15 as the latest acceptable date.

**Fourth Fest cancelled**

Fourth Fest will not be held this year, Chamber of Commerce officials announced today.

The festival was originally scheduled to be held July 1 at Ruddick Park.

The event was cancelled because of the many activities planned during that time, said Dori Shutt, Chamber of Commerce director.

Activities scheduled for the fourth of July weekend and holiday include the High Plains Jr. Rodeo, which will be held June 29, 30 and July 1, and the annual Colorado City Fly-In scheduled July 4.

**33rd annual Fly-In set for July 4th**

The Fourth of July Fly-In, an annual event here, will be held for the 33rd time this year.

Sponsored by the Colorado City July 4th Fly-In Association and the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, the event is the oldest free-fly-in breakfast in the state of Texas.

Fly-In Association Chairman J. O. Dockrey participated in the very first fly-in which was held at the old Truelock airstrip east of town.

"There were two airplanes. I flew in with a Taylorcraft," said Dockrey. "They had advertised giving airplane rides at \$1 apiece. It was really windy that day. Some people wanted a ride on the plane and I turned down the dollar because

it was so windy. That was even before I knew how to make crosswind landings."

Dockrey said that in those first years, Clyde Buckalew, a cook at the Spade Ranch, cooked the breakfast for the pilots—sourdough biscuits over a wood fire.

Over the years, there has been a variety of aviation-related activities at the fly-ins—air shows, parachute jumping, and aerobatics.

And visitors have been able to see all different kinds of aircraft—antique planes, those used to train pilots in World War II, helicopters, sea planes—everything from a 1937 Grumman Goose to a 1946 PBY Catalina Flying Boat.

**Sanchez family learning to deal with son's illness**

Chris Sanchez's father, Daniel, said his family has come a long way since they found out that Christopher has a rare bone cancer.

It was only a month ago. "It's the worst news a parent can get when they find out their child has cancer," Sanchez said.

"At first, we refused to believe it. We've accepted it now and are dealing with it," he said.

The Sanchez family will be returning to M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston this weekend so 10-year-old Chris can begin the second of 10 weeks of chemotherapy treatments.

The cancer that started in his leg has spread to both lungs, Mr. Sanchez said. Following the chemotherapy and tests to determine

whether the treatment has shrunk the tumors, Chris will undergo an operation the third week of August on his lungs and will have one leg amputated up to his hip. After that, he'll go to a Lubbock or Midland hospital for more chemotherapy.

Chris's mother, Betty Sanchez, is 7 months pregnant with their third child and her due date is the same week as Chris's operation. He has one brother, Michael, 8.

"Chris's spirits are really high now but when he first found out that he had cancer and had to have his leg amputated, he was very down. He refused to eat and he didn't talk very much," said Daniel Sanchez.

"My favorite pastime is cooking," said Jamie Rivera as she began giving the information for this week's Cook's Corner. Although she didn't do much cooking in high school, being busy with extracurricular activities, she did learn to cook by trial and error.

There haven't been a whole lot of errors along the way, but just like everyone else Jamie does have a "gravy story." All she would admit to was that it was "so thick you could throw it against a wall and it would stick."

Jamie has tried for years to master her granny's biscuits—for which there was no written recipe, of course. Just some of this and some of that. Those of us who have tried to duplicate a recipe like that can sympathize with her. She says her family got real tired of biscuits for breakfast the last time she worked on her technique. She made biscuits for two weeks every morning and got closer to the "real" thing than she had ever gotten before.

Jamie has turned her passion for

cooking into a sideline, so to speak, of her cleaning business. She will cook for the people she cleans for, along with cooking for the public when her schedule allows. In fact, she just helped prepare the brunch at the museum for the Berman family. She says she truly enjoyed doing the work on that.

Jamie began her cleaning and cooking business so that she might set her own hours and be home with her children more. Now she is so busy with her business, she isn't home much at all. Her husband, Raul, does some cooking and she says he is very good at it. Maybe he'll be in Cook's Corner someday.

Jamie is sharing four recipes with us today, one of which is her most asked for, the Bacon Roll-Ups. Enjoy!

**SOUR CREAM POUND CAKE**  
1 yellow cake mix  
1 (8 oz.) carton sour cream  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
3/4 cup vegetable oil  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Mix together. Pour into bundt pan and bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes until done.

**MOM'S DIXIE DOGS**  
1 1/3 cups flour  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
2/3 cup milk  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tsp. prepared mustard  
Boil franks in water and pat dry. Fold in batter and deep fry until brown. Serve with mustard or catsup. Kids love these!

**PINEAPPLE NUT COOKIES**  
1 cup shortening  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1 flat can drained pineapple  
1 cup nuts  
4 cups flour  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. salt  
Cream shortening. Add sugars and beat well. Add eggs and beat until fluffy. Add pineapple alternately with sifted dry ingredients. Add vanilla and nuts (you may use walnuts). Place teaspoon-size dough on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes only. Makes approximately 40 cookies.

**BACON ROLL-UPS**  
(Great for breakfast gatherings)  
1 tube crescent rolls  
1 lb. bacon  
8 oz. sour cream  
1/2 tsp. onion salt  
Fry bacon until crisp. Mix sour cream and onion salt. Open each crescent roll. Spread with approximately 1 tablespoon sour cream mixture and top with crumbled bacon. Roll as usual. Bake at 375 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

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## Pre-paid tuition plan is underrated legislation

"The legislature took action in the final hours of its 74th session that will affect the lives of Texans for generations to come," State Comptroller John Sharp recently said.

"Virtually unnoticed in the waning hours of the recent legislative session was final passage of the *Texas Tomorrow Fund*, a pre-paid tuition plan that is perhaps the most underrated legislation state lawmakers considered this year," Sharp said.

"The *Texas Tomorrow Fund* will allow parents to purchase college tuition and fees at any Texas community college or state university at today's prices. It's a way to cheat inflation and invest in your children and grandchildren to guarantee they can afford the college education they will want.

"This 'pay now, learn later' plan

can save parents the headache of worrying whether they will be able to afford their children's college when the time comes," Sharp said.

The *Texas Tomorrow Fund* was proposed by Sharp in his Texas Performance Review report, *Gaining Ground*.

State Senator Gonzalo Barrientos, who sponsored the bill in the Senate, said, "I'm concerned about the huge debt so many students must take on these days to make it out of college. If we can encourage parents to make tuition purchases today with this plan, at a guaranteed rate, we can help the Texas college students of tomorrow begin their careers after college without the burden of a student loan debt."

As proposed by Sharp in *Gaining Ground*, money placed in the fund would be invested and earn interest during the years before the child goes to college so that the fund would yield enough to pay for the student's education.

## July 17th is final day to certify crops

The final date for certification of spring seeded crops will be July 17, 1995. The Mitchell County CFSA office is currently taking appointments to certify anyone who has an adequate stand of the crop.

At the time of certification of cotton acres, the boll weevil assessment fee may be paid at the county CFSA office. Payment is not required at that time, however. The payment is due July 15, 1995 and may be paid any time before then directly to the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

For an appointment to certify, either stop by the Mitchell County CFSA office or call 728-2651.

## CISD tax office to be closed June 26th-30th

The Colorado ISD business/tax office will be closed June 26-30 for vacation.

According to the tax assessor/collector of the Colorado ISD, on July 1, 1995, an additional 15% will be added to 1994 delinquent taxes, bringing the total additional charges to 35.7% of the 1994 tax bill.

Taxpayers should pay prior to this date to avoid the additional cost. The CISD tax office will accept payments postmarked prior to the July 1 deadline without making the additional charge.

## OIL & GAS NEWS

A new producer has been brought online in Mitchell County's East Iatan Howard Field, with Parker and Parsley Development as the operator.

Located nine miles southwest of Westbrook, the well is designated as the No. 296 Mary Foster.

It pumped 48 barrels of oil per day plus 186 barrels of water. The well bottomed at 3,200 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the San Angelo/Clear Fork Formation, 2,376 to 3,090 feet into the hole.

Showing ability to produce a combined 74 barrels of oil per day plus 402 barrels of water, four new producers have been completed in the Iatan Field, Mitchell County, nine miles southwest of Westbrook. Parker and Parsley Development Co. is the operator.

The wells are designated as the No. 320, No. 322, No. 324 and No. 326 Mary Foster.

They came in pumping eight, 10, 18 and 38 barrels of oil per day plus 135, 55, 127 and 85 barrels of water, respectively. Production will

be from perforations in the San Andres Formation, ranging from 1,804 to 2,011 feet into the hole.

Crego Exploration of Dallas is preparing to conduct a recompletion for extended production in the Silver Tank Field, Mitchell County. The No. 1 W.L. Ellwood Trust is about 16.5 miles south of Colorado City.

Crego will be seeking new pay at a depth of 7,310 feet. Location is in a 640-acre unit in the H&TCRR Co. Survey.

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



## Sales tax rebates for city down

Mitchell County received \$39,003 in June sales tax rebates, according to a recent report from the state comptroller's office.  
 However, Colorado City rebates dropped 6 percent from payments last year. Sales tax rebates have dropped 4.83 percent in Colorado City in the first six months of the year in comparison to the first half of 1994.  
 A slight slowdown in retail sales in June was reported in other areas around the state.  
 "The Texas economy continues to grow at a very healthy pace, although retail sales have slowed somewhat from the fast pace of recent months," State Comptroller

John Sharp said last week as he delivered a total of \$125.6 million in June sales tax rebates, an 8.7 percent increase over payments of one year ago.  
 Colorado City's net payment for June was \$24,903.56. Loraine received \$13,158.18.  
 Westbrook showed a 63.46 percent increase from last year with a \$941.44 June rebate in comparison to a payment in 1994 of \$575.91.  
 This month's city and county sales tax rebates include taxes collected on April sales and reported to the Comptroller in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

## CHIEF LONE WOLF

If you had been standing in a field a couple of miles north of Westbrook in June of 1920, you could have witnessed history being made. The first oil well in the Permian Basin blew in after being shot with nitroglycerine. Fannie Bess Earnest Sivalls was there!

"They turned out school [in Colorado City] and we all went out," she told us. At the time, she was 14 years old. Fannie Bess and hundreds of others watched patiently for the big eruption.

"The oil blew up over the derrick, just like you see in old pictures, and everybody cheered. Oh, it was exciting."

From that roaring beginning 72 years ago, the Westbrook Field has been a steady producer of oil. In fact, any day now the 100 millionth barrel of oil is expected to be pumped, making the field a "major" one.

Edwin Z. Snyder, who grew up in the oil business in Mitchell County (his father was Marcus and his uncle Hiram "Pop" Snyder), says, "If they found an area like Westbrook today, they would be talking about a major find."

As far as the Colorado Record was concerned when it published its June 25, 1920 edition, this event was monumental.

"The daily papers all over the United States will today carry the announcement of this discovery," the Record stated, "and in less than 30 days Colorado [City] expects to have a population of 10 to 20 thousand."

Whoa! Even for the discovery of oil that's pretty rapid growth. The Record went on to say, "lease-hounds are arriving on every train." The well, the Underwriter's T&P Number One, was going to be a gusher.

"It's estimated," the Record continued, "it will produce 1,000 barrels per day and not improbably 2,000 barrels."

J. Vaughn, a New York City man and a director for the Underwriter Company, predicted the well would put Colorado City "before the world."

"People will flock to your county from everywhere and your city will increase in population to the extent of an overflow," he predicted. We'll find out why that didn't happen shortly, but for the time being, let's go back to the first oil well in the Permian Basin.

Mrs. Sivalls has several vivid memories of that day. First, she recalls hearing that the man who shot the nitroglycerine, which caused the well to blow in, had been drinking the night before and, frankly, he had a little too much.

"I don't know if this is true," she told us, "but I had heard he was tight. If he hadn't done it correctly, there would have been a lot of dead people around there."

Secondly, she remembers her schoolmate Robert (Maters) Brennan turned the occasion into a profitable venture for himself.

"He was always an enterprising young man," she said. "He brought a couple of wash tubs out there and they were filled with ice and bottled drinks. He made some easy money."

Actually, the famed first well of the Permian Basin may have been drilled in the wrong place. Earnest Porter, Ocala, Fla. (the world's great geologist, according to the late Jimmy Kelly), says he thinks he recalls reading something to that effect in a pamphlet once upon a time.

The heavy equipment, such as a boiler, the engine, etc., had to be taken to the site in wagons.

"The rigs in those days were built from scratch from timbers and spikes," Porter stated. "All this equipment was being hauled by wagons, pulled by mules."

"The boiler wagon [as Porter heard it] became stuck in mud which was created by a gully washer a few days earlier. It was really stuck! They were still less than a mile from the intended location, so they built the rig, fired up the boiler and the rest is history."

One hundred million barrels of history, to be exact. Course, that goes back to June of 1923. Now, 72 years later, the Underwriter's T&P Number One is still pumping oil. It never did put out the aforementioned 1,000 to 2,000 barrels per day, but it's still churning out a barrel or two each day.

Getting back to Edwin Snyder, he's now editor of the publication *Drilling Reports*. He says Standard Oil eventually bought the entire Westbrook Field, including a well that was owned by his grandfather, R.H. Looney and Edwin's father, Marcus Snyder.

"My dad was involved in the cattle business and he was off somewhere," Snyder told us, "and Judge Looney sold the well [to Standard] for \$50,000."

"Dad got back and he was upset, but that was a lot of money at the time. Judge Looney said, 'That was one of those offers you couldn't refuse,' although he didn't want to sell, either."

At the time, oil was bringing \$5 a barrel. "I think the damn well is still producing," Snyder added.

So, what happened to the predicted oil boom in Mitchell County? "You did have a boom there," Snyder stated, "but it wasn't like some of the others." In 1923, he notes, the famed Santa Rita was brought in (Big Lake) and it was a much more prolific well.

Like, say, several thousand barrels a day. And that shifted the attention away from Mitchell County. However, it will never lessen the importance of men like Dr. P.C. Coleman, who leased the land where many of the early wells were drilled, nor L.W. Sandusky, an attorney and Stephen Samuel Owen and Samuel A. Sloan, respected leaders in the oil industry.

Snyder says the Permian Basin (and the Westbrook Field) will be producing for a "long time to come." Eventually, horizontal drilling will be utilized here, thus prolonging the field's life "for many, many years."

It's thought that the Westbrook Field still has as much as 40%-50% of its oil left in the pay zones. And while the Santa Rita may have blown the Westbrook Field off the front pages of newspapers in the early 1920s, it's interesting to note the T&P Number One, now owned by Fina and called number 701, is still producing.

The Santa Rita has been plugged. It's possible, like the tortoise and the hare, the Westbrook Field may yet overtake the Big Lake Field (Santa Rita).

One hundred million barrels and counting.

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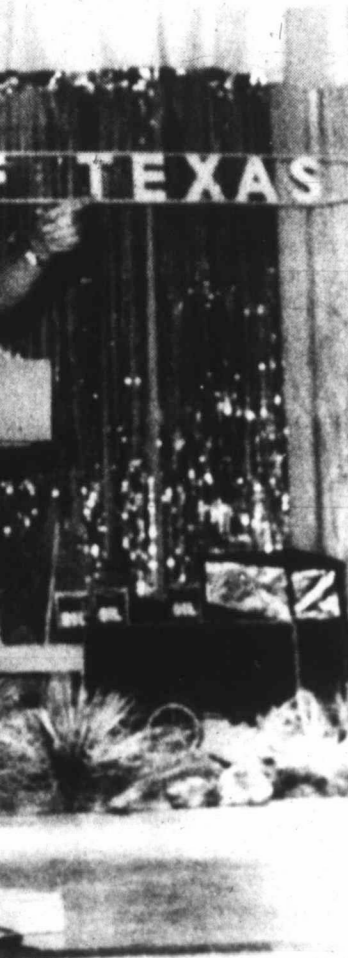

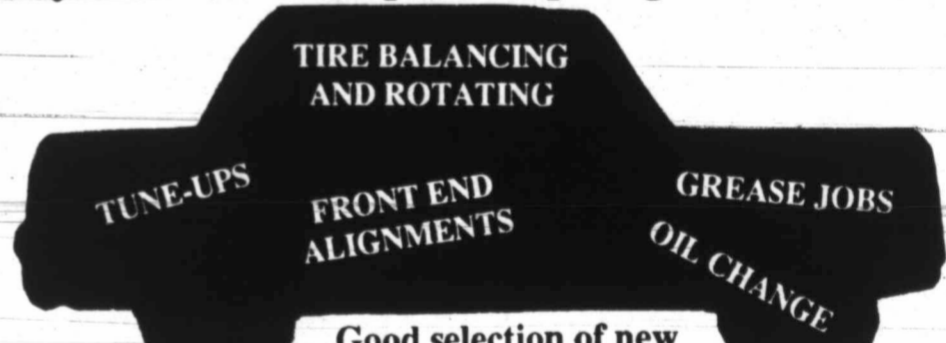

## Rural linemen still troubleshooters

When a power line goes down in West Texas, more than just the lights go out. Cotton gins stop ginning, oil leases stop pumping, pipelines stop flowing, irrigation pumps stop running, injection wells stop pushing oil into well-bores, disposal wells stop putting salt water downhole and tanks begin to overflow.

Most outages are corrected within minutes, but even minutes without power can put a serious dent in oil and gas operations, says Ulen North, vice president and chief operating officer of Cap Rock Electric, a cooperative serving 27 counties in the farming, ranching and oil country of the Permian Basin.

Among the counties served are Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Ector, Fisher, Glasscock, Howard, Irion, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Reagan, Scurry, Sterling, Tom Green, Upton and Rankin. With 24,010 meters in this farming, ranching and oil country, keeping the power on is an important task.

It's the reason utility companies such as Cap Rock turn to their most seasoned and skilled linemen to get things back up and running quickly.

To become a rural lineman for Cap Rock, one normally spends three to 10 years on a highline construction crew learning every trick of the trade, the territory and the customers.

In the utility world, rural linemen are considered a class unto themselves—a rugged bunch of individuals who brave wind, rain, hail and freezing cold to replace blown fuses and transformers to get the power back on.

When he came into the neighborhood, children would gather around to watch him swagger to a pole, loop his climbing belt around and bound up it like a cap, plunging his hooks deep in the crossote.

"Dogs weren't so impressed. 'Dogs seemed to have an aversion to climbing gear. Without it they were as friendly as you want, but put on the gear and they would begin to bark and want to bite. I don't know what it was," said D.A. Stanley, a 35-year veteran lineman with Cap Rock Electric in Stanton.

Linemen today generally hoist themselves to the top of a pole in a fiberglass bucket mounted on the back of a service truck.

"Going from hooks to buckets was the biggest change in our industry," said Bill Allred, another 35-year veteran with Cap Rock Electric. Ask them why both have been doing the same job at Cap Rock Electric for over 35 years and they'll tell you that it's addictive. "It gets in your blood," says Allred. "The longer you do it, the more you want to do it." He describes it as a rewarding job that provides challenge, an opportunity to make lots of friends and to do something good every time you go to work.

Cap Rock Electric has eight linemen on call at its Stanton headquarters to maintain almost 8,000 miles of its mostly rural electric lines in West Texas. Outage calls can range from zero to 400 when a lightning storm hits. That's when extra help is called in. "On a stormy night, it can get pretty hectic," said Walter Taylor, Cap Rock dispatcher.

The general rule is to get the power back on within an hour. If it goes over an hour, the department manager comes in. "If it goes two hours, they get me on the phone, even if it's 3 a.m.," said North.

"Lightning can really do damage," says D.A. Stanley. "It seems to have a fondness for night security lights and transformers. Working on a pole in the lightning is the most dangerous part of the job, and dispatchers try to keep linemen away from it unless it is absolutely necessary."

An electric lineman may put in a full eight-hour day but is on call 24 hours. If he goes out to dinner or a movie, he carries a beeper.

"Even if we're not needed at the trouble site, we are often consulted as to its location or possible solutions," Allred said.

The dispatchers are just as important as the linemen in getting the power back on. "They are the nerve center for the whole operation, the link between customers and crews," North said.

Dispatcher Walter Taylor said that on a stormy night it can get "pretty intense."

Emergencies are not uncommon to the linemen who prow the back roads of West Texas.

Cap Rock linemen James Mashburn and Donnie Thompson didn't set out to become heroes on a rainy night in May of 1993, but they did.

When the pair came across Clarice Shafer's overturned vehicle in a ditch of raging floodwater, they knocked out a window and lifted the 79-year-old widow to safety with their bucket truck.

"She was so cold and weak, I knew we were going to have to go in the car and get her," Mashburn said.

For their efforts, Mashburn and Thompson were named "Texas Rural Heroes for 1993" by the Texas Farm Bureau, and were nominated for the Andrew Carnegie Hero Award.

Seeing an older lineman watching over a young lineman to make sure he follows all safety precautions is like watching a father caring for a son, North said. "They really care for each other and a veteran lineman will really chew out a new one to make his point, he said.

Allred and Stanley say the technology of the electric utility industry has changed so much that even they can't believe it. One thing that has not changed, however, is the need to get the lights back on.
