City manager resigns

The Colorado City Council voted to accept the resignation of City Manager Rick Crowley during a called meeting Tuesday night.

Rick Crowley, who has been city manager since January 1981, stated that his resignation would be effective March 23, 1984. Crowley accepted the position of Administrative Assistant for the city of Rock-

wall near Dallas.

In his resignation letter to the City Council members and Mayor Elmer Martin, Crowley expressed his appreciation to the council for their assistance.

"I have certainly enjoyed my work for the City of Colorado City, and I would like to express my sincerest appreciation to the Mayor and City Council members

for their assistance and support during the past two years," Crowley said.

"I could not have asked for a more congenial and professional group to work for. It has also been a pleasure to work with the City staff and the citizens for Colorado City."

Crowley said such a move would also help him complete his grad-

uate degree.

The Council and Mayor voiced their appreciation and gratitude to Crowley for his service to Colorado City.

"We have really enjoyed working with you," Mayor Martin said. "You have been a good city manager."

"I really can't say enough." Mayor Martin appointed a committee consist-

ing of Jesse Munoz, Jr., Ray Mason and Robert Hoback to look into the possibility of obtaining an interim city manager or a fulltime person to fill the vacancy.

The City Council also took a step closer to the proposed building of a new and much needed fire station.

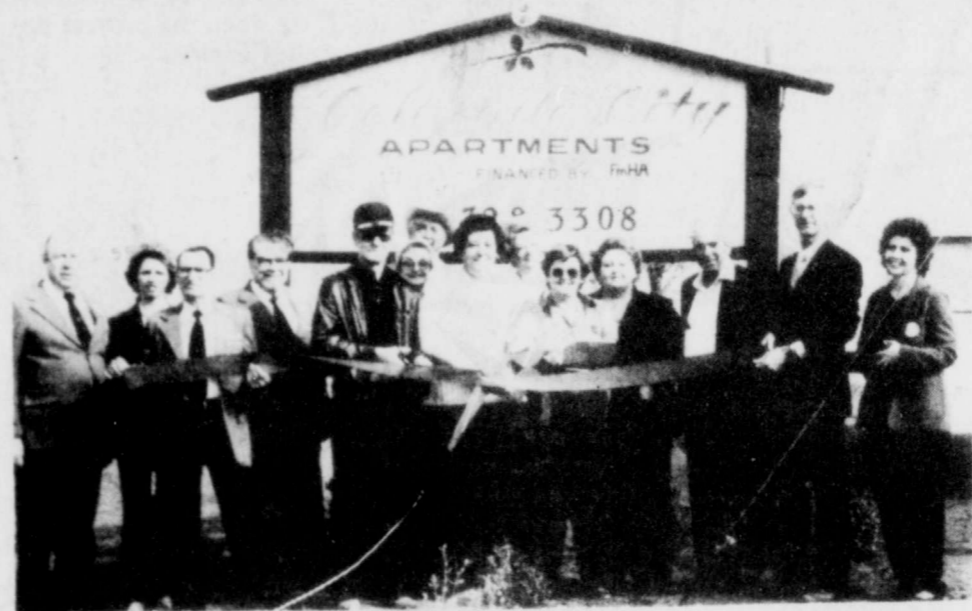

Rogers Cottonseed Co. sells to Japanese firm

The acquisition of Rogers Cottonseed Co. of Waco by a Japanese firm may not have that much direct impact on Rogers Delinted Cottonseed Co. in Mitchell County, said local plant manager W. A. Findley. Yazaki Corp. of Japan acquired the parent company early in February. Rogers Cottonseed Co. has been in Waco for 40 years.

The Waco-based company has specialized in the development of low-gossypol, glandless cotton varieties since the mid 1960's.

"I don't know of any changes right now," Findley said. "Long range plans are to make this plant into a 100 percent glandless cottonseed production plant."

"We will have a glandless block in Colo-

rado City this year. We will be paying a premium also."

It had been rumored that the Colorado City plant might be converted into a flour mill using the cottonseed. However, Findley said he had not been advised of

such a development.

"In the next five to six years, and this is just a guess, we will probably convert into a 100 percent glandless plant."

Findley said the production at the Rogers Delinted Cottonseed Co. in C-City would increase this year.

The plant is currently processing seed acquired from the Texas High Plains, which is approximately 20,000 acres, he said.

The plant will be seeking to acquire an additional 10,000 acres for

the upcoming year, he said.

"The way that I understand what we will do is process the seed from here as planting seed and seed from the High Plains will be for human consumption."

Rogers Cottonseed of Waco has already supplied cottonseed kernels under the trademark Cot-N-Nuts for Protein Wheat Bread, manufactured by Mrs. Baird's Bakeries. The kernels are also possible additives for frankfurters, salads, desserts and candy.

The Waco seed company has processing plants for food-grade cotton in Waco. Its main storage and purchasing facility is here in Colorado City.

Crime rate remains high

The crime rate for Colorado City for February remained high, said Colorado City Police Chief Ed Wheat quoting statistics from the Police Department Monthly Report Crime Figures.

The only serious crime reported over the weekend to the department was the burglary of a motor vehicle, Wheat said. The crime occurred at 617 E. 9th St., from 10 p.m. through 12 a.m. Approximately \$177 worth of items, credit cards and cash were taken from a vehicle at that residence.

The vehicle belonged to a person visiting the owner of the resident at that particular address. Bill Grimes was the investigating officer.

The department is also investigating another rash of stolen bicycles. One theft occurred at 705 Vine St. and another took place at 727 Cedar St.

The number of thefts, burglaries and arson were still up for February. Wheat said. The more serious crimes are still up he added.

The police department cleared 55 of the 85 crimes investigated. Seven cases were filed with the County and District Attorneys' Office.

Green pleas guilty in shooting incident

A Colorado City man pled guilty to a lesser charge of voluntary manslaughter and was sentenced to 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections in the 32nd District Court Monday.

James Lee Green, 30, pled guilty to the shooting death of John Frank Emerson on August 9, 1983. Green was arrested by the Colorado City Police Department following the incident and arraigned later. Bond was set by Justice of the Peace Charles Ray Watlington at \$25,000.

The prices for the food items was at aregular price and not at a sale price set by the store. Prices for produce were not quoted since they fluctuate from day to day.

pursue the matter of speaking with the CISD about obtaining land for the proposed site.

The most suitable land for the proposed fire station would be behind the CISD Administrative Building, said Crowley according to a study conducted last year.

Crowley said the city had received some response from some individuals from the private sector as to actual funding a portion of the cost. The city was asked to match a portion of the funds, Crowley said.

After visiting some 12 fire stations, Crowley said that the cost of building a fire station to house the city's four fire vehicles would be approximately \$200,000 to \$250,000.

The City Council also rejected all bids made on an AR-15 semi-automatic rifle put up for bids. The bids were rejected on a recommendation made by City Attorney Pete McKinney that the rifle not be sold to an individual but to a law enforcement agency.

The council also approved Housing Rehabilitation Program Guidelines under a Community Development Block Grant. The grant will provide for the rehabilitation of existing owner-occupancy housing for low and moderate income persons.

The grant will be provided for persons living in the northwest part of town (Sands area).





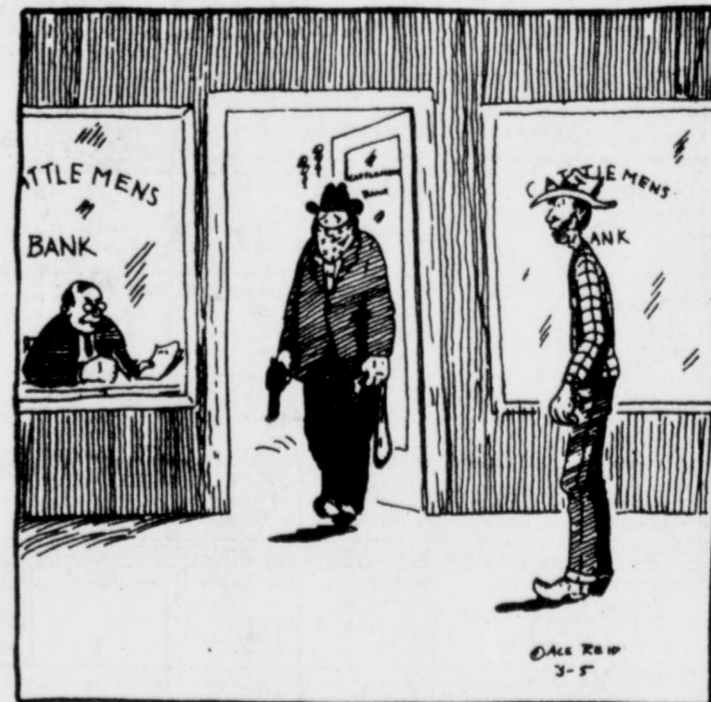
