Red River Haven Open House Attracts 200

The Open House Sunday, March 23, of the new wing of Red River Nursing Home in Bogata marked the latest in a pattern of growth of the community-owned business that has spanned 11 years.

More than 200 visitors viewed the new wing Sunday, and the addition brought the number of beds in the home to 141. Mrs. Ralph Cawley is the administrator, and Mrs. David Rolan is assistant administrator.

Six of the original employees of the home are still working, and they include Bertha McCall and Gladys Hobbs, who were LVN's at the time of the opening and retain their titles. Annie L. Walker was a nurse's aide at the time of the opening August 1, 1963, and since then, with the assistance of the home, has become an LVN. Virginia Cheatham, Doris Arnold and Myrtle Wilkerson are nurse's aides at Red River, and are also original employees.

Mrs. Nannie B. Walker, 87, was admitted to Red River Haven Nursing Home on the opening date, and is the only resident still there admitted on that date. She was born December 12, 1886, and was making her home with her sister, Mrs. Bol Stegall of Clarksville when she was admitted.

The present board of directors is composed of Pleas Turner, president; Dr. E. E. Brooks, vice president; Mrs. Ralph Cawley, secretary-treasurer and administrator; and the directors, Joe Ford, Virginia Kirkland, A. L. Buckman, Dr. Jack Trout and Rayford Lowe.

Red River Haven observed its first open house Wednesday, July 1, 1963, when the northernmost section of the present structure was opened with 41 beds. Mrs. Charles Wilson was the supervisor of nurses, and E. E. Kirkland was the administrator until his death January 27, 1974.

The other original directors and members of the board were Dr. E. E. Brooks, president; Pleas Turner, vice president; William Rozell, treasurer; Mrs. Wilson; Aubrey Buckman; James Castle-

man and Guy Smelser. More than 700 attended the first open house, and the facility was recognized as the first of its kind to be constructed and equipped specifically as a nursing home for the elderly in Red River County.

In February, 1965, a new 20 bed wing was occupied by Red River Haven residents. The structure was connected to the original building by an enlarged day room and kitchen service area. Housed in the addition of 1965 were an isolation room, 17 private

rooms and one semi-private room. The addition brought the number of beds to 60 at the time of construction, but by the time another addition was completed December 1, 1967, the number of beds totaled 86.

Another addition completed September 1, 1969 brought the number of beds to 111, and this last wing has brought the number to 141.

Eight new residents were to be admitted Monday, Mrs. Cawley said, but more vacancies exist and residents may be admitted at any time.

and second place Idabel, Oklahoma 46-40 in the running events, but were unable to make up for a poor showing in the field events.

Bad luck, injuries and illness hampered the Rebels in the field events, beginning with high jumper Jimmy Curties' injured back with his first jump. Terry Giddens efforts in high jumping netted fifth place and two points. Giddens fouled slightly on what would have been the winning leap in the long jump and finished with sixth place and one point. Jerry Curties, who has been ill with flu, and Danny Black both failed to place in pole vault. The only other point in the field came from W. M. Simpson's lower than usual sixth place.

The Rebels made a somewhat better showing in the running events by scoring 46 points, but couldn't catch up with New Boston, which scored 56 field points. The Rebs set two new school records and tied one other on the cold, cloudy day. The 440 yard relay team set a record with a time of 44.6 seconds to finish second to the Hughes Springs team.

Ricky Norman was a double gold medal winner when he tied his own school record of 15.1 seconds in the 120 yard high hurdles and set a new school record of 41.9 seconds in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Other point getters besides Norman were Glen Fulbright, Giddens, Randy Jones, and W. M. Simpson, second place in 440 yard

Texas Water Quality Board Wants Public Opinion

The Texas Water Quality Board, the state's water quality management agency, has long followed a policy of assuring the public of the right to become involved in the governmental decision-making process, and the agency is presently developing a plan to get citizens of the state more involved in matters over which the Board exercises control.

A proposal for a program of public participation in water pollution control is being drawn in accordance with guidelines established by the Environmental Protection Agency, the federal agency given the responsibility of administering the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972.

The Board is eager for citizens to express their ideas concerning how such a plan should be written, and a series of four public hearings have been scheduled to give the public an opportunity to submit ideas and suggestions prior to final development of the program.

The first of these hearings will be held on March 29th in the Council Chamber of the Dallas City Hall, starting at 10:00 a.m. Other hearings will be held in the Institute of Texas Cultures at the HemisFair Plaza in San Antonio on April 2nd, the Third Floor

Funeral Costs Vary

Funeral expenses vary widely, so consider several factors when planning one, a home management specialist advises.

"For one, ask a friend or clergyman to help with arrangements. He will probably be more willing to question prices or services," Lillian Cochran with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, pointed out.

"As another precaution, ask for prices on the casket, funeral service and other charges before disclosing insurance, pension or government death benefits due the family."

Also find out what a "one price includes everything" package deal includes. Ask whether extra charges are levied on certain services or goods, the specialist emphasized.

"When considering a casket with a long-term warranty, decide whether it's worth the extra cost. After all, who will check the casket 30 years

Eastern Tent Caterpillars Active

Those large thick webs in the forks and crotches of various fruit, shade and forest trees in East Texas are sure signs of an infestation of eastern tent caterpillars, says Dr. Ken Lewis, area entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The hairy brown caterpillars use the web as a sort of apartment house, congregating there during the night and in rainy weather.

Wild cherry trees are the

favorite hosts and are probably the starting points for wider outbreaks of the caterpillars. Apple, plum, pear, peach and other ornamental trees are also attacked.

When the caterpillars are abundant, they often eat all the leaves on a tree, weakening it considerably. Although trees are seldom killed outright and may produce new leaves later in the summer, fruit production may be reduced. Additionally, the nests are unsightly in yard trees and the caterpillars are an annoyance crawling around yards and buildings in search of more food or a place to spin their cocoons, the specialist said.

The young larvae hatch in mid-March about the time the wild cherry leaves begin to unfold. When full grown, after four to six weeks of feeding, the caterpillars are two to two and one-half inches long. When mature, the larvae leave the tent or web and form cocoons on the bark of trees, fences, sides of buildings or in debris on the

ground. The reddish-brown moths emerge in late June and deposit the eggs in bands around the twigs. There is only one generation a year.

"Young caterpillars can be killed by the use of any one of several insecticides," Lewis said. "Sprays containing two pounds of 50 percent wettable powder Carbaryl (Sevin) or two pounds of 25 percent wettable powder Malathion mixed in 100 gallons of water are used effectively by many homeowners. Always follow the manufacturer's directions for mixing and applying the pesticides," he cautioned.

Spraying may not be necessary if the tents are removed from the trees by winding them on a pole or brush and then burning them. Do not leave worms crawling on the tree. The bands of eggs should be pruned or removed from the tree in the winter to prevent buildups of caterpillars. "Since each egg collar contains 150 to 350 eggs, many caterpillars are prevented from hatching," Lewis concluded.

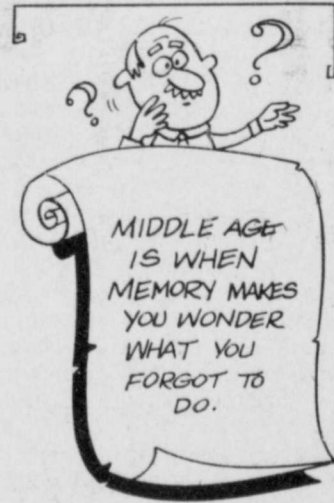

Should an object fall into a power line, do not attempt to free it yourself. Call Community Public Service Company and we will send an experienced person to remove it. And when planting trees, remember to plant them away from power lines so they won't grow up into the lines later.

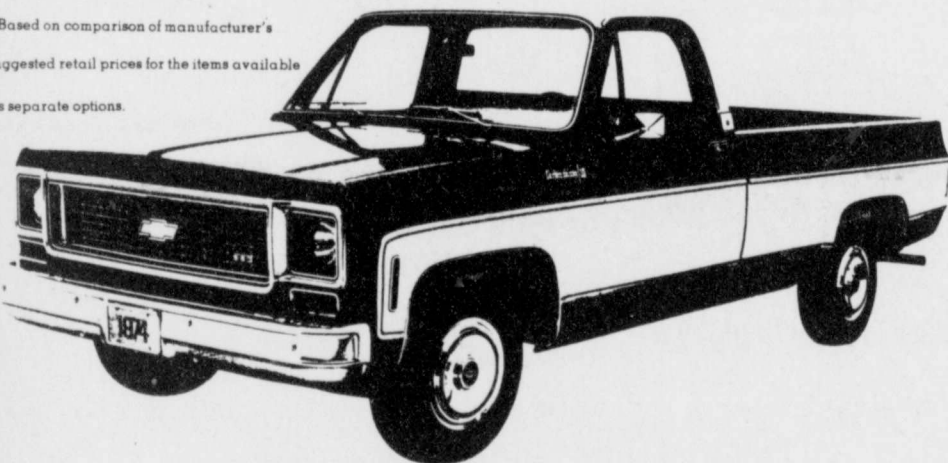

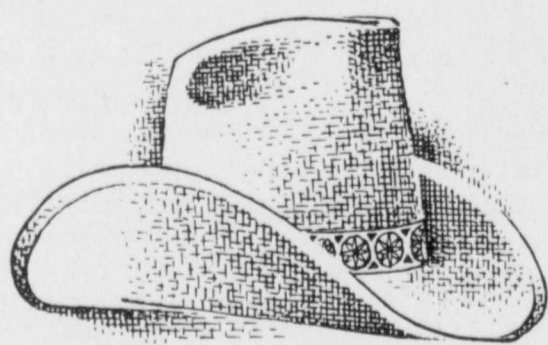
