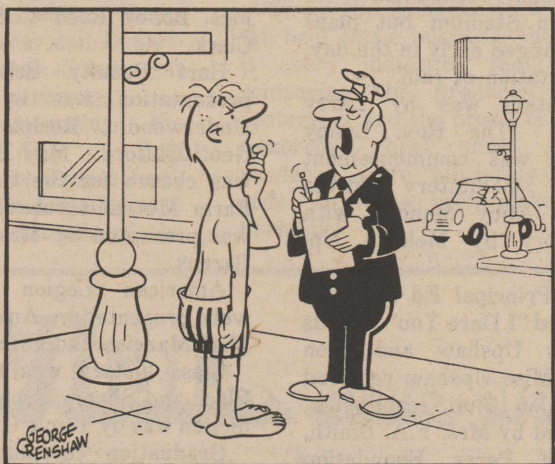

Clerk-Carrier Exam Open To Public May 30-June 5

Postmaster Betty J. Sanders has announced that the Clerk-Carrier examination will be opened to the public at 8 a.m. and will close to the public June 5 at 5 p.m. and urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment.

"We have not opened our register in quite some time and an examination of it has led us to believe that it is out of date, and that many of the names on the register are people who have moved or for some reason are no longer available to take postal jobs, Mrs. Sanders said.

"I do not want to give the impression we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the Postmaster said. "I anticipate approximately two vacancies will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring people from our up-dated job register. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we

want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking the exams."

The Postmaster said the Postal Service established the policy two years ago of extending eligibility indefinitely for those on the job register because little hiring was being done. "On October 8 those who have been on the job register for more than two years will lose their eligibility. They will have to reapply to compete for a standing on the new register," she said.

Postmaster Sanders explained those wishing to take the exam could by contacting Postmaster, in person, Post Office, Hart, Tex. 79043 during the period May 30, 8 a.m. through June 5, 5 p.m.

Starting salaries for Clerk/Carrier, Part-Time Flexible, PS-5, is \$6.90 per hour with steps taking rate up to \$8.19 per hour over an eight year period. Twelve steps with maximum time between steps of 52 weeks, minimum of 26 weeks. Beginning salary for Full-Time Clerk/Carrier employees is \$13,916 per annum with steps up to \$16,501 per annum over an eight year period. New hires are employed as part-time who are paid at these hourly rates. The hourly rates are just about equivalent to the annual salaries but do not include pay for 9 holidays that full-time employees get.

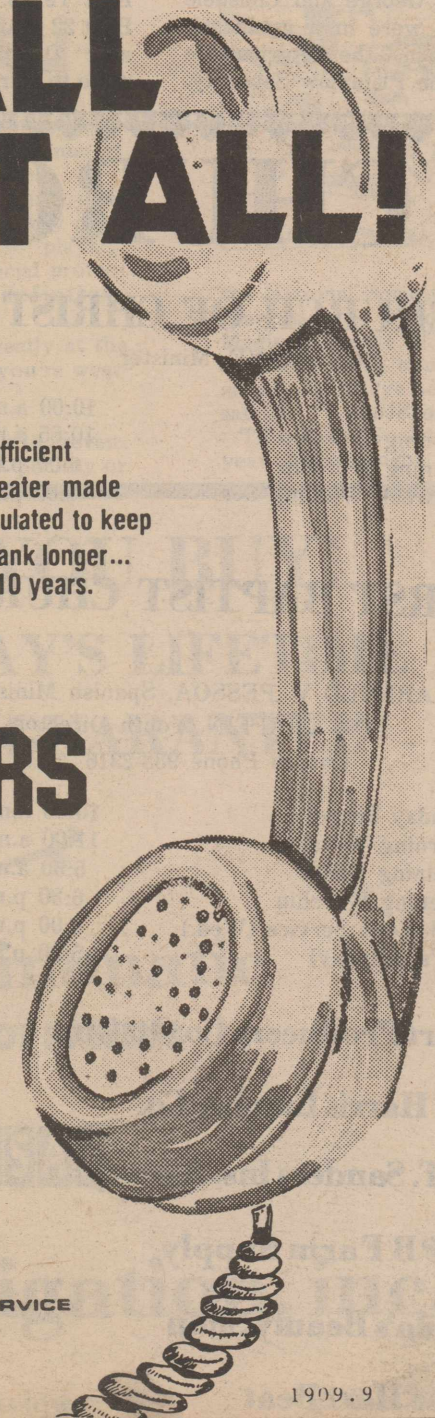

FROZEN FRUIT DELIGHT

1 can Eagle Brand milk
2 c Cool Whip
¼ c lemon juice
2 cans blueberries, drained
¼ t almond flavoring
1 can crushed pineapple, drained
1 c crushed pecans

Mix eagle Brand milk and Cool Whip in mixing bowl and beat at medium speed with mixer until mixed thoroughly, then add lemon juice and almond flavoring.

Stir in with fork or spoon blueberries, pineapple and pecans.

Pour into oblong dish and freeze until ready to serve.

BUSY DAY FRUIT SALAD

2 c orange sections, diced
2 c pineapple chunks, drained
1 c sliced peaches, diced
Mix and put on lettuce leaves. Serve with mayonnaise blended with pineapple syrup. Use 1 cup mayonnaise and ¼ cup syrup from pineapple.

7-UP JELLO SALAD

2 - 3 oz pkgs lime Jello
2 c boiling water
2 c 7-up

Mix Jello with water and stir

until Jello is dissolved. Add 7-up, then add 2 cups marshmallows and 1 cup drained pineapple. Save juice. Refrigerate.

Cook over low heat until thick:

2 T butter
2 T flour
1 egg
½ c sugar
1 c pineapple juice

Let cool, then spread over Jello mixture. Top with whipped topping and marshmallows.

CARAMEL ICE CREAM DELIGHT

Topping:

2 c flour
½ c oatmeal
1 c chopped nuts
½ c brown sugar, packed
2 sticks oleo

Mix altogether and spread on cookie sheet. Bake at 300° for 20 min. Stir every 5 min. Take out and cool and divide in half. Spread ½ of mixture in 9x13 pan. Pour 1 - 11 oz jar of caramel topping over crumbs mixture. Spoon ½ gal. ice cream that has been softened over crumb mixture. Then spread another jar of caramel topping over ice cream. Then sprinkle rest of crumbs on top. Place in freezer until frozen hard then cut into squares. Serves 24.

Rain Falls Here Friday, Some Light Hail Damages

Welcome rains fell Friday afternoon and Saturday bringing broad smiles to the faces of local farmers but some concern to others who also received light hail.

In the city, rain gauge measurements indicated 2.30 inches in Friday's fall but approximately three-tenths Saturday. Amounts were heavier in some areas north-

ward and eastward.

Lorenza Lee, north of town, got 2.60 Friday and .30 Saturday with light hail. East of the city, Theron Morrison reported 2 inches Friday with an additional half inch Saturday.

Rainfall lessened a few miles south and west. Robert Lewis Hawkins reports just one inch west of town.

Public Service Company Files For Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it has filed for a general retail rate increase in the cities and counties served by the company in Texas.

The request was made with the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas on or about May 12, 1978 and the company is requesting that the increase become effective 35 days after the filing date.

It is expected that the proposed new rates will result in an increase of approximately 10 per cent for residential, commercial, industrial and school customers. This would result in an increase of about 8.8 per cent in the company's total revenues from Texas, or about \$22 million annually. Rates to wholesale customers and for retail service to municipal customers would not be affected.

The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for residential, commercial and industrial service was granted in 1975 and amounted to about 10 per cent.

Increased costs of building new power plants, as well as the increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the proposed increase.

In 1972, SPS made the commitment to switch from gas to coal as the primary fuel for their generating plants. This decision was made due to a long-range forecast which indicated increases in the cost of gas and diminishing availability. The present cost of new gas is about 70 per cent higher than the cost of coal. Government regulations have restricted the use of gas as a

boiler fuel.

Southwestern's first coal plant, a \$100 million, 356.7 megawatt facility located in the north part of the company's system, went on the line in 1976. The total cost of this plant was almost three times more than a gas-fired plant of the same size. The second 356.7 mw coal unit is scheduled to go on the line in June of this year. This new unit will also help stabilize fuel costs.

Ricky Rowland and Jackie Ethridge have been elected by their team mates as Captains of the 1978 Longhorn Football team.

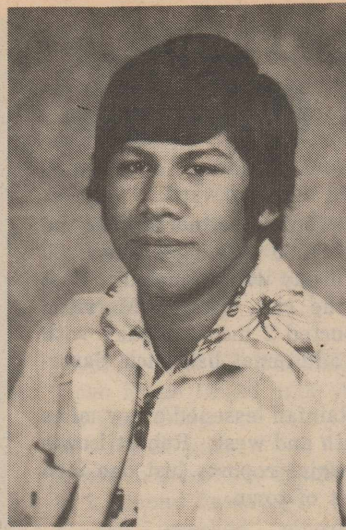

so adjustments had to be made. After the initial excitement, the situation was under control.

There were myths and misconceptions that had to be erased. One example would be "stereotyping". Patterns of speech had to be changed, too - such as "you guys". Women soldiers do not want to feel "apart" from the entire group.

Genuine, honest and open discussion with all members of a unit clears the air and surfaces any internal problems to the point where they can be dealt with on an equitable basis.

The average enlisted woman, according to data, is 21 years old, Caucasian and comes from a southern state; she is a high school graduate. She lives in the barracks and has the personal freedom associated with owning her own vehicle. She is in good physical condition, somewhat more mature than her male counterpart.

The enlisted woman is here to stay. She is determined to succeed, and she expects support of the predominately male chain of command. She has enthusiasm and wants to be treated like a soldier - fair and equal. Successful commanders respect the difference between male and female soldiers and expect the same professional standards from both.

CALVING TIME -- THE PAYOFF - Calving time is the real payoff for the cattleman, but he's got to have a tight rein on what's going on to prevent calf losses, emphasizes a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Calf losses during or shortly after calving are the second leading cause of decreased calf crop percentage. Proper management to reduce calf losses include close evaluation of the expectant cow, proper feeding, preparation of needed equipment, and close examination during and after delivery.

Beef Production Short Course To Be Held June 12-15 In Olton

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held June 12-15 in the Vo Ag shop at Olton High School. Sponsored jointly by the vocational agriculture department and Olton Young Farmers, the four-session course will be led by Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, beef production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of Texas Education Agency and Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University.

Fee for attending the workshop is \$5. Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the

training sessions. Sessions are slated for 8 p.m. each evening.

Dr. Krehbiel states, "The field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter."

"From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business."

Dr. Krehbiel indicates that the course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, half crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma.

He has served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas and animal geneticist for the USDA in Montana. Prior to joining the Agricultural Education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

Board members accepted resignations of athletic director and head football coach Bill Taylor and top assistant football coach Robert Mears.

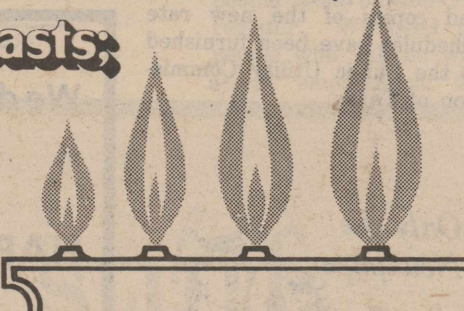
Taylor has been associated with the local school system six years, becoming head coach two years ago.

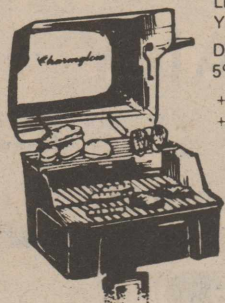

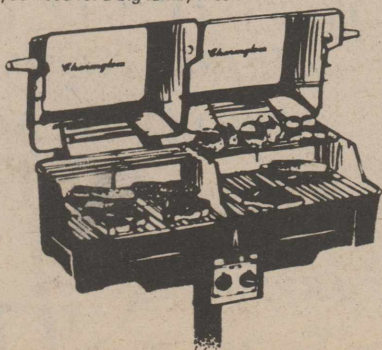

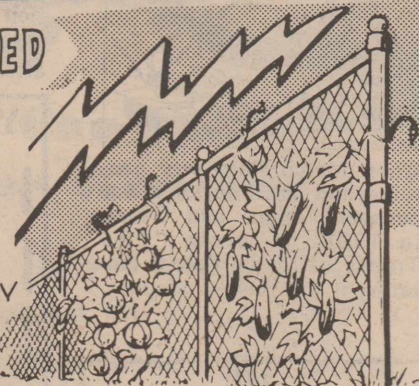
