## Opinions Mixed On School Board Votes

Two programs adopted by the Aransas County School Board are viewed by some area parents as a "good start" toward solving what some parents and educators have viewed as major problems in the district.

Other parents however still have reservations about school board actions aimed at alleviating over-

crowding in the school district and establishing a "grouping" program.

The board, meeting on Monday, May 11 (as reported in the Wednesday, May 13 Pilot) passed two programs into action, one of which called for the grouping in three "ability" levels, of children (in grades two through five) in the subjects of reading, English and math. The other program

enacted was an attendance shift in county elementary schools to alleviate the overcrowding problems in Rockport Elementary where 711 students are currently enrolled.

The proposed programs are on the editorial page of today's Pilot as School Superintendent Joe Randow presented them to the School Board.

The proposal was submitted by a group of elementary teachers working as representatives from grades two through five. The rep group began work on the feasibility of such a plan at the request of Randow in April following that month's school board meeting at which a large group of parents, forming the Committee For Better Schools, presented their proposal, "Individualized Grouping of Students", to the board.

At that same meeting, parents had questioned the board for over two hours in regards to various grievances they held with county schools. Paramount among those problems was the overcrowded situation at Rockport Elementary School.

The attendance proposal voted on by the board last Monday is an effort to alleviate that situation. The proposal was one of four presented to the board by Randow, all of which are printed below in the exact manner Randow gave them to the board.

The proposal chosen was "B", recommended directly to the board by Randow, (See PARENTS, Page 11)

## Appraiser Hired For HEB Street Closing Request

Paul Koepke and Associates of Corpus Christi have been retained to appraise property involved in the proposed closing of Mimosa Street — with H.E.B. to pay the \$750 cost.

The action was taken in Monday's, May 11, city council session. H.E.B. has requested that Mimosa Street be closed between Magnolia and Austin streets to allow for future expansion of the company's Rockport store.

The company had earlier agreed to pay the costs of the appraisal.

In other action Monday, the council presented resolutions to Charlie Gar-

rett, honoring his 20 years of service on the city council, and to Alderwoman Betty Jean Ward in honor of her husband, the late E. Dan Ward, in recognition of his profound influence upon the development of Rockport.

Mrs. Ward was elected to the council last August to fill the vacancy created by the death of her husband earlier.

A request by Oliver Hensler for permission to connect to the city's sanitary sewer lines on Highway 35 North was referred to Urban Engineers for further study.

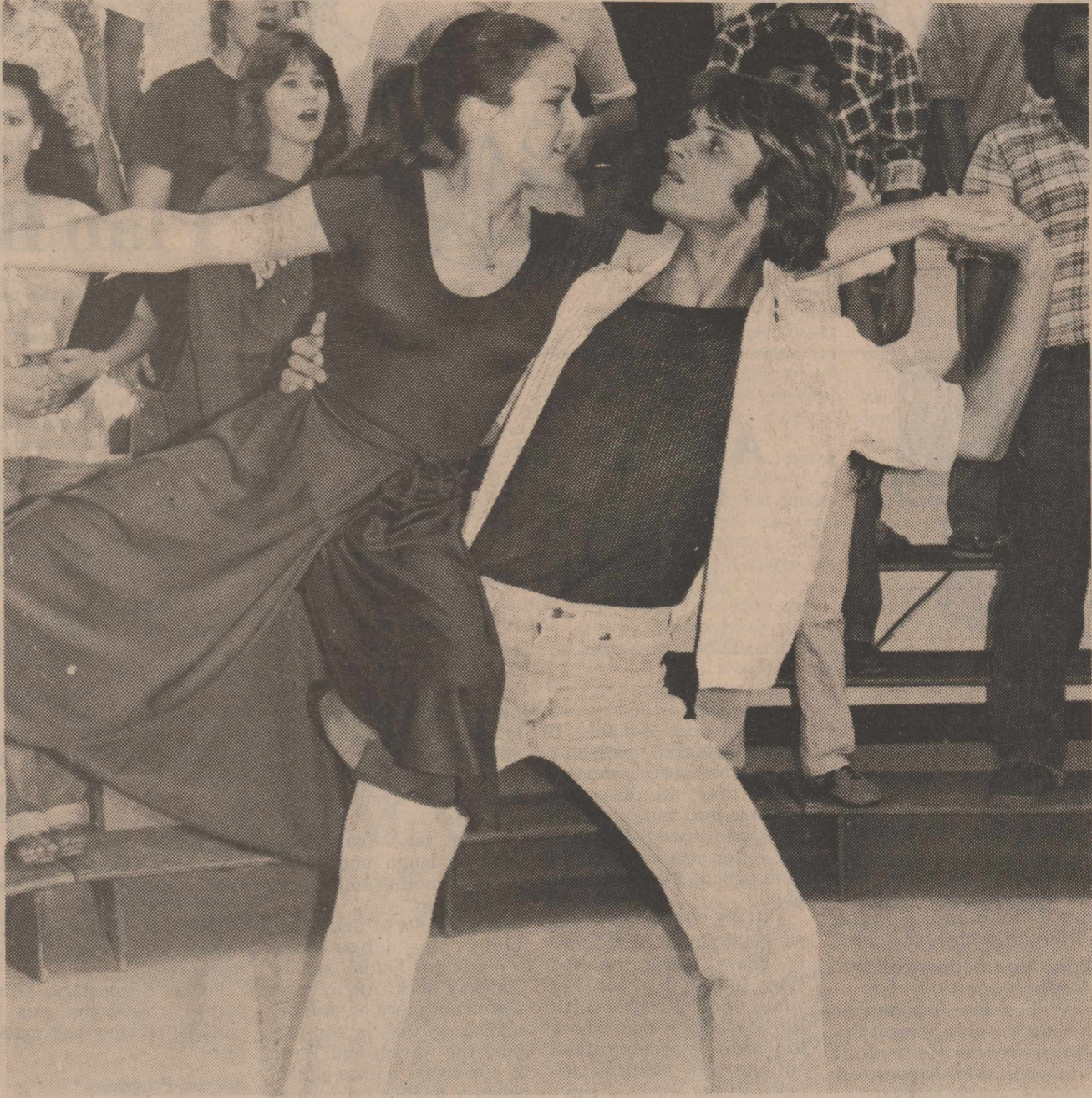
Hensler is requesting permission to connect to the line a proposed

development which will be located on the land presently occupied by Oak Shore Inn.

Commercial Motors of Aransas Pass was awarded bid on the purchase of a half-ton pickup. Commercial Motors bid \$6,998.44 which was some \$45 higher than the low bidder — Vista Motors of Corpus Christi — but the council opted for the slightly higher bid based on the closer proximity of Commercial Motors and a shorter delivery date.

Also bidding on the vehicle was Weber Motor Company of Cuero with the high bid of \$7,094.

## TP&W Funds Allocated For Aransas Park Projects

The Aransas County Navigation District was notified that the Texas Parks and Wildlife has authorized distribution of funds for local parks and recreation projects and \$60,135 has been authorized for Rockport.

In an interview with Hillis Dominguez, Director of the Aransas County Navigation District he said the money would be used for two pavilions and signs for a bike path. Asked where pavilions would be located Dominguez said "We don't know yet."

Dominguez also said that the Texas Parks and Wild-

life approved the funds for the signs for a bike path but did not approve funds for the bike path.

He said that originally the Aransas County Navigation District ask for funds for the bike path, three pavilions, a slide, a volleyball court and an obstacle course. Only two pavilions were approved and the bike trail signs.

But Dominguez added that none of this matters because, he said, "Bill Kopt, in Austin, says the funds have been frozen."

Funds were authorized by TP&W to several other areas including Cameron County, City of Houston,

Nueces County and the City of Plano as well as other locations. The TP&W authorized distribution of \$2,627,413 from the Texas Local Parks, Recreation and Open Space Fund

The \$60,135 authorized for the Rockport area is under a classification of projects approved to be sent to the federal government for funding consideration from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, in the event that federal funds currently frozen are released by the president.

been chartered by the state of Texas as a non-profit organization and all contributions are tax deductible and membership is open to the public.

The purpose of the museum will be to collect, preserve, study and exhibit articles and documents from periods of our state's maritime history.

The museum will concentrate on such things as the Spanish Galleons, Pirates Jean La Fitte and Henry Morgan as well as old sailing schooners and our own Texas Navy. But the Museum will not deal only with the past.

## Rockport Cable To Reconsider Service

FULTON — Complaints about lack of cable service to parts of Fulton led to a pledge by Rockport Cable Television president Oliver Hensler that he would personally "take another look at the situation."

Hensler made the statement during Tuesday night's meeting of the Fulton city council after his company was requested, by a letter from the council, to send a representative to the Tuesday night session.

The item was one of several on an agenda that also included election of a mayor pro tem and a decision on how much to charge for copies of Fulton's new city map.

James Metzger was unanimously re-elected to be mayor pro tem for the year.

In response to complaints that Rockport Cable did not service all areas of Fulton, Hensler told the council that the company is "forced by the people who loan us money to make this (the cable operation) economical."

He added that the usual formula for determining if the operation is "financially viable" is a ratio of 50 homes per mile.

"However," he added, "we are always willing to come back and restudy the

## Austin at Wharf

THE LIVING ROOM IN our house is never the tidiest place you've ever seen. Certainly no one would ever think that an interior decorator and a camera crew for a slick back magazine had just departed. Kitty, I know, may have once dreamed of that sort of thing but she finally, after a fashion, learned to live with me.

Books, magazines, newspapers are forever everywhere. In a way I never finish with any of them. "Aren't you finished with...?" I'm sometimes asked. I hesitate and wind up toting armfuls into the den. There is always a little something here, or there that I want to read again, paragraphs from an article that I've marked with a highlighter.

The piles of papers sometimes get sort of big and I try to find something I've marked. I know exactly what it is but have one hell of a time finding the right paper. Often enough I give up and turn to something else.

One of my favorite newspapers is the Christian Science Monitor, to my knowledge the world's only international newspaper. There is always at least one copy on a coffee table. The name plate often brings a quizzical look to the faces of visitors, especially those who know me at all well, have heard me expound my

views on religion, philosophy, history and whatever. "Are you a Christian Scientist?" I know they want to ask.

In Texas no one knows — at least very few know — exactly what a CS is, myself included perhaps. The response to the question might be a rather vague "They're people who don't believe in doctors???" Maybe?

Well, it does happen that no one has ever popped the question to me. However, if it should ever happen I'd replay honestly and say no.

And no doubt I might add: "What's wrong with being a CS — better or worse than being a Roman Catholic, a Baptist, Methodist, or even an Episcopalian (which I once more or less, was)?"

No, I read the Monitor because it is by long odds, the best, the most literate and objective newspaper in the world. I might easily continue the string of adjectives. Suffice that you will find it on the desk of every editor worth his salt, here and abroad.

That circumstance I find consoling. Our craft, call it "newspapering", is not always the most respected in the world. I am forever heartened when I visit a colleague and see the Monitor on his desk. His paper may be a rag, chock ablock with sensational headlines and photos.

How good or bad he is I can tell by the Monitor. If they are stacked neatly in a corner, obviously unread, I know they are there to impress me, and others. If they are opened helter skelter, often marked with a blue pencil, I warm to the guy.

I HOPE THAT I'VE LED no one to think the Monitor is heavy going, stuffed shirt. Indeed it is not. For years, until his retirement a few days ago, a chap whose last name is Pelley turned out the best political cartoons in the world. I can't remember his first name but it is at hand. I could do a bit of digging and find it.

The announcement of his retiring inspired me to write to the editors and offer a kindly comment. I'll find that announcement one day and do it. There is another chap, John Gould, who has for years offered periodic columns from his Down East in the State of Maine. He is both humorous and philosophical, although some people don't see him that way, perhaps even think him corny.

I tried a bit of Gould on a friend the other day and got only a polite smile. Gould was writing about Middlewestern college professors who come to Maine in the summer to study local folklore. The Maine folks sort of lay things on. They have a good time and the profs go home happy.

I'll force an example upon you. A prof asks one Dobbie Metcalf: "Where does this road go?"

"No place — stays right where we built it." I laugh. Friend smiles.

What is it about the human animal that makes

him pursue a thing when he knows the other party is not amused.

I try again. An old-timer is asked: "lived here all your life?"

"Not yet," came the reply. I laugh and in response, another smile. Now I can't stop.

Gould tells of one Wash Libby, a lobsterman. "Wash was haulin' out by Halfway Rock. Along come a stinkpot piece of summer mahogany that is clip-topping the waves, and Wash is somewhat hornsoggled when it fetches up, swings alongside and hails him.

"My good man," says a cockatoo in a yacht bonnet, "might we purchase some lobsters?"

"Boy lobsters or girl lobsters," says Wash.

"Does it make a difference?"

"Depends," says Wash.

"Depends on what you're going to do with 'em."

"How so?"

"Boilin' boys; but for a stew, no."

"We expect to have them boiled."

"Boys it is then," said Wash. "And how many?"

Wash had to guess at the weight since he didn't have any scales aboard.

"How much?" he was asked.

"Well," said Wash, "they's one-fifteen at the Cove, but away out here I guess I'd have to get one-thirty."

While I was rolling on the floor laughing at the subtle Wash I got a tolerant smile in return for my humor which wasn't even original. —ahab

## Grouping Program Outlined

The following is the grouping program adopted by the Aransas County School Board last Monday.

This proposal is submitted by the Elementary faculty members, Building Principals and Administration. This proposal is a basic outline of proposed curriculum changes which are recommended effective for the 1981-82 school year.

Recommendations: 1. It is recommended that the following subjects be ability grouped in three levels.

A. Second Grade: Reading for one and one-half hours per day. Math for one hour per day.

B. Third Grade: Lan-

guage Arts Block (English and Reading) two hours fifteen minutes per day. Math for one hour per day.

C. Fourth Grade: Language Arts Block (English and Reading) two hours fifteen minutes per day. Math for one hour per day.

D. Fifth Grade: (Semi-Departmentalized) Reading one hour per day. English one hour per day. Math one hour per day.

II. Grouping Procedures: A. Reading or Language Arts Block - the following items will be used in grouping of students: Language Battery Test - Achievement Test. Diagnostic Reading Test. Total Reading Battery - Achievement Test. Teacher Re-

commendations. Silvaroli Reading Test.

B. Math - the following items will be used in grouping of students: Diagnostic Math Test. Total Math Battery on Achievement Test. Teacher Recommendations. Parent Request.

C. It is also recommended that students may be transferred either up or down between groups only after both teachers have considered the transfer. This transfer would take place at the end of a six weeks period.

A parent may request in writing that a child be moved from one level to another level followed by a conference with the

teachers involved.

III. Grading System: A. Grade level - It is recommended that for all subjects ability grouped, the grade level of performance be placed on the report card along with the student's grade. For example: A student in the fourth grade performing one year below grade level would have a grade placement of 32 indicating third grade second semester.

B. Numerical Grades: It is recommended that students above the first grade receive numerical grades rather than alphabetical grades. A grade of 70 is to be the lowest passing grade.

## 'Plan B' To Ease Overcrowding

The following is the program adopted by the Aransas County School Board to alleviate overcrowding in the county's schools.

Below is a breakdown of projected enrollments for 1981-82 school year based on current attendance zones, a breakdown of available classrooms, needs for special programs, some possible changes in attendance lines and needs based on these changes.

Projected Enrollment The totals below include moving transferred students back to Fulton.

Classrooms Available Rockport Elementary: 31 regular classrooms plus two portable buildings.

Live Oak Elementary: 20 regular classrooms plus a music room.

Fulton Elementary: eight regular classrooms plus a portable building and music room.

Special Programs Title I: We presently have 2½ teacher units at Rockport Elementary, 1 teacher unit at Live Oak, and ½ teacher unit at Fulton.

Special Education: We presently have 3½ teacher units at Rockport Elementary, 1 teacher unit at Live Oak and 3½ teacher units at Fulton.

Music: We presently have 1½ teacher units at Rockport Elementary, 1 teacher unit at Live Oak and ½ teacher unit at Fulton.

Possible Solutions: With each possible solution, I will give you some possible strong points as well

as points which may create other problems.

A. Effects on Fulton and Rockport by moving Harbor Oaks, Key Allegro and Little Bay Shores from Rockport to Fulton.

The first number represents the number of students enrolled in the grade, the second number represents the number of teachers and the third number represents the average class size.

Comments: This would necessitate the purchase of five classrooms which would probably cost approximately \$100,000, a double cafeteria serving time like other campuses, increase in library budget, need for one additional teacher aide and one custodian.

This would mean moving the present 27 transfer students plus 39 additional students from the Rockport campus. This would result in an approximate ethnic balance of 13 percent Asian, 12 percent Hispanic, 75 percent Anglo at Fulton. At Rockport, Asian 3 percent, Black 3 percent, Hispanic 35 percent, Anglo 59 percent.

B. Effects on Fulton, Rockport and Live Oak by moving Harbor Oaks, Key Allegro, and Little Bay Shores from Rockport to Fulton and moving Copano Cove from Live Oak to

Comments: In addition to the comments found in A above, this would also lower the pupil-teacher ratios across the District, allowing for growth. At least two bus routes would be changed. We may be getting very close to overcrowding the restrooms at Fulton. Counting Special Education students, this would place about 243 students on this campus. This plan would leave two vacant rooms at both Live Oak and Rockport.

C. Effects if attendance lines remained as established and move four fifth grade sections to Live Oak.

Comments: This would necessitate placing 2 portable buildings on the Live Oak campus, and purchasing a large number of library books for 5th grade students. This would mean transferring about 44 students from Fulton to Rockport in order to decrease oversized classes at Fulton. This arrangement would leave us short one classroom for special education at Rockport and no vacant classrooms at Live Oak or Fulton.

## "Low Down" FROM THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

(A Column for Readers Who Haven't Time to Review the Congressional Record Daily)

### LEARN ENGLISH OR ELSE—

Senator S.I. (Sam) Hayskawa (Calif.)... Today I am introducing a constitutional amendment declaring as the law of the land what is already a political and social reality: That English is the official language of the United States.

"This amendment is needed to clarify the confusing signals we have given in recent years to immigrant groups. For example, the requirements for naturalization as a U.S. citizen say you must be able to read, write and speak words in ordinary usage in the English language."

"And though you must be a citizen to vote, some recent legislation has required bilingual ballots in some areas. This amendment would end that contradictory, logically conflicting situation."

"Bilingual education programs were originally designed to help non-English-speaking children learn English quickly so they could join the mainstream of education and of our society..."

"We are being dishonest... if we tell them they can take full part in American life without learning the English language... As the son of an immigrant to an English-speaking country, I know this from personal experience. If I spoke no English, my world would be limited to the Japanese-speaking com-

munity, and no matter how talented I was, I could never do business, seek employment, or take part in public affairs outside that community."

"Let me explain what the amendment will do, upon its passage by Congress and the ratification by three-fourths of the States."

"It will establish English as the official language of State, Federal and the local government business; It will abolish requirements for bilingual election materials..."

"It will end the false promise being made to new immigrants that English is unnecessary for them; It will not prevent the use of any other language within communities, churches or cultural schools; My amendment will not prevent public schools from offering instruction in other languages, nor will it prevent schools and colleges from requiring some study of a foreign language..."

CRUMP'S GRASS ROOTS COMMENT

While English is the standard language in the United States, it is not the Official language. English is spoken by more than 250 million people around the world, but it is not the leader. That honor belongs to the national language of China, spoken by more than 650 million people.

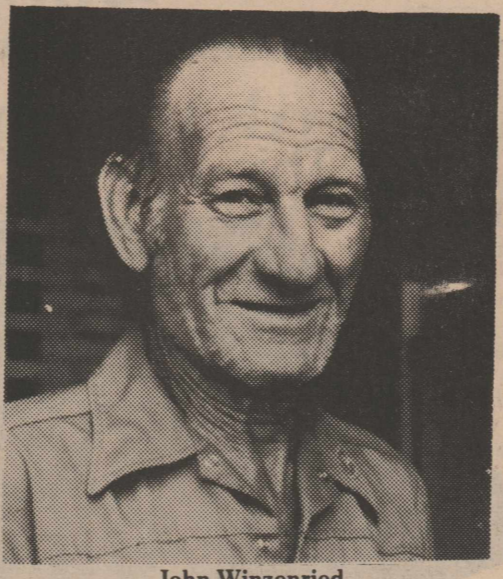

## School Board Honors High School Athletes

Meeting last Monday, May 11, the County School Board of Trustees imple-

mented both a grouping plan and a comprehensive program to alleviate overcrowding at Rockport Elementary,

as reported in Wednesday's Pilot. In other board action that

night, the group passed two special resolutions honoring those Rockport-Fulton High School athletes participating in State competition.

Teresa Moore, Belinda Cross, Bob Ayers, Anthony Paul, Kevin Viken, Connie Flores, Raul Castro, Peter Booth, Jesse M. Scott, III and Micheal Simmons were named in the resolution as having "exhibited a natural talent, perseverance in the pursuit of learning, and dili-

gence and application of time to the tasks set before them."

Another resolution honoring students on the Rockport-Fulton High School Track Team was also passed

by the Board in recognition of the team's District and Region wins.

Both these resolutions, signed by Board President Ottie Mundine and Secretary Polly Bracht, were designated as part of the "permanent record of the Aransas County Independent School District."

Both were also published Wednesday, May 13, in the Pilot's Legal section.

In other action, upon the recommendation of School Superintendent Joe Rando, the Board voted to continue

to employ the firm of McCarthy, Milliken and

Green of Beeville as the independent auditor of all school accounts. The firm has been handling the

school's accounts and Board President Ottie Mundine agreed with Rando, "We hope we have the best audited school around. Everything we do is inside the audit."

School accounts are usually audited the latter part of September.

The board voted to call for bids on the school's bank depository for the next biennium. At this time, First National Bank is serving the district but the depository contract expires on August 31.

Bids received in response

to the Board's call will be opened in the June meeting of the Board.

After hearing from the large group of parents at the end of the meeting, the Board met in executive session.

After the session, the announcement was made of the resignations of district employees Linda L. Miles, John D. Washko, Pat E. Smith, Dwayne Bishop, Mary Bishop, Mary Pelanco and Kay Christian.

New employees okayed during the executive session and announced afterward were Jan B. Powers, a high school homemaking teacher; Scott L. Powers, high school coach; tennis and P.E. coach Arthur E. Weiss, Junior High coach and math teacher

Tim B. Tate, girls' P.E. teacher in Junior High,

Sharon S. Figart and Alan W. Hildebrand, social studies teacher and Junior High Coach.

Rando's Superintendent's report explained to the board the future receipt of \$14,000 from the board's liability insurance carrier in relation to a lawsuit with one Jose Lopez, that after six years, was settled in 1979 in the board's favor.

Rando also informed the group of the meeting of the Board of Equalization on June 3 and 4 for personal and real property. On June 5, the equalization board will meet with the county and city to hear from Pritchard and Abbot mineral and industrial representatives.

The final portion of Rando's report was a reminder about graduation ceremonies for the high school, to be held on Thursday, May 28, on the football field.

## Traffic Deaths Reach Record

AUSTIN — Texas traffic deaths for 1980 reached a record number for the fourth consecutive year, according to the Department of Public Safety. The count for last year shows 4,424 persons killed on Texas streets and highways, reflecting an increase of 4.6 percent or 195 more deaths, said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director.

"Exceeding the speed limit was considered as having caused 1,040 deaths or 23 percent of the total fatalities," Adams said. "Additionally, reports by investigating officers throughout the state attributed 1,006 deaths to driving while intoxicated accidents. This figure would have been much higher if Texas law allowed police to obtain alcohol content levels from blood samples from all drivers involved in fatal accidents."

Total accidents reported by state and local police during 1980 were down by 3.5 percent. Last year, 432,940 accidents were reported as compared to 448,814 during 1979. The DPS said the lower accident rate was offset by an increase in fatalities due to the large car versus small car mix. "This is a newly created phenomenon on the number of deaths reported as the statistics show the chances of a death are about eight times greater in a sub-compact car than in a full-size car

with which it collides," he said.

"Of all the fatalities, 57 percent or 2,542 persons were killed in single vehicle accidents," Adams said. "Additionally, over half of the total fatalities were under the age of 29."

Motorcycle deaths also climbed again. "Three hundred and seventy-eight motorcycle deaths were reported which is an increase of over six percent from the previous year. And 74 percent of those killed were not wearing protective headgear," he said.

Pedestrian deaths also increased from 650 in 1979 to 723 last year.

Estimates show that the number of vehicles registered in the state last year was 10,500,000 (10-and-one-half million) and the total miles driven increased slightly to 103,255,000,000 (103 billion, 255 million).

Adams said he thinks that more people would have been killed had it not been for the 55 mph speed limit. "This is truly a life-saving law that has also reduced the severity of injuries and helped conserve fuel. If the speed limit was increased, drivers would increase their speed and the death rate would climb to an even higher level.

"Seat belt usage would also help lower the fatality figures," according to Adams. "Over 98 percent of those killed did not use their seat belts, and yet it is

a device which is installed in most vehicles. Still, we find that the vast majority of the drivers and passengers simply don't buckle them up," he said.

Noting that 1981 traffic deaths are already running four percent above the total for the same period last year, Adams called for greater cooperation by the driving public.

KERRVILLE — A fairground is rising on the 16-acre, grass covered site of the Texas State Arts and Crafts Fair in Kerrville.

Huge striped tents tower above colorful concessions stands and outdoor artists' booths.

Two weekends of arts, crafts, food, music and outdoor relaxation are planned for May 23-24 and May 30-31.

In the Pioneer Village, Texas will pay fond tribute to their own rich and varied heritage. Craftspeople who descended from the original pioneers will show the old crafts techniques in a setting reminiscent of two early Texas homes.

Costumed children will chink between the cedar logs with flat stones and mud, then run to keep the canvas in the window cooler wet.

Headlining the first weekend, May 23-24, are the Mountain Vagabonds who will be singing and yodeling with a German and Swiss flair. Twelve-foot long Alp horns, imported from Switzerland, will echo their call across the Hill Country landscape.

Beautifully costumed mariachis from San Antonio will represent the Texas Hispanic culture. The Los Parentes Mariachi Band, playing many of their own compositions, will appear exclusively the second weekend of the Fair, May 30-31.

A children's vaudeville troupe from Austin, the "Pina

Players", will captivate visitors at 1:30 each Fair afternoon. Under partial sponsorship of the Texas Commission on the Arts, the "Players" combine song, dance and costuming in a program to delight Fair goers of all ages.

Other programs from the Fair's two stages include country-western and bluegrass bands, magic and mime acts. All concerts are free to Fair ticket holders, and shaded seating areas are provided.

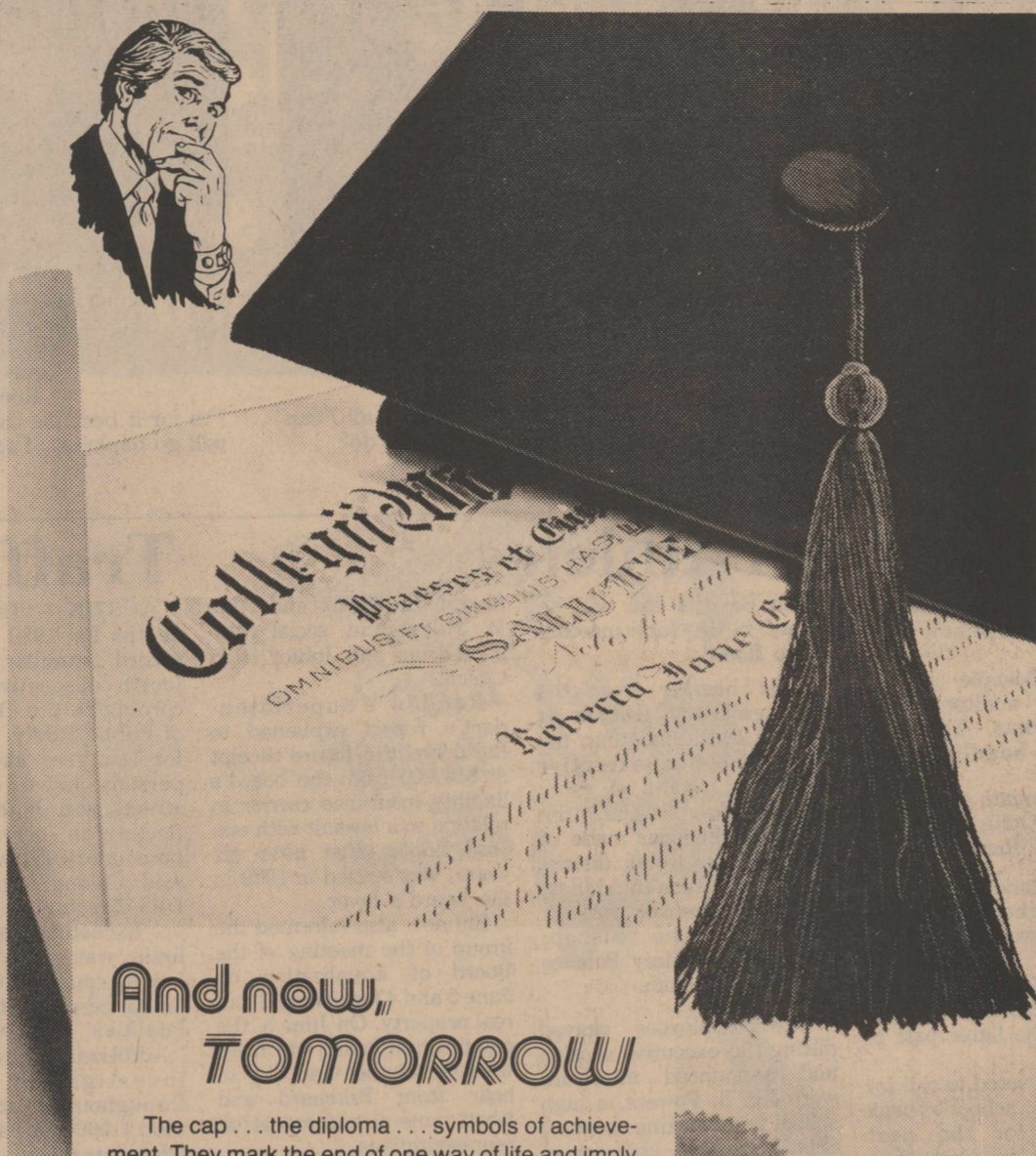

# The Shepherd's Staff

 Since my first article on the problems between the American and Vietnamese shrimpers, I have been listening to, asking questions of and talking to both sides. I want to reaffirm that each one of us has the right to be free to look after our own self-interest and right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

This issue is complicated by governmental programs, policies, rules, regulations and laws of land and sea, and there seems to be no clear avenues for settlement. Because those involved are polarized and both sides are developing a hard line, I call upon both sides to be submissive to the other.

I feel my influence as a Christian pastor, whatever that may be, should be understood and felt. All I have is the power of the Word of God, and since both sides strongly profess Christian belief and faith I feel a strong demand by God to speak the words on my heart. It is a judgement on our common faith in the living Christ that this disagreement is allowed to continue.

An application of the Resurrection faith to this problem has four elements:

(1) In the resurrection I am received and accepted and loved of God. I am a worthy person because God loves me in Christ.

(2) The past is received and forgiven; past events have no control over our lives. We can change.

(3) The future is open; all is possible with God. We can solve this problem locally if we are not blinded and blocked by pre-judging.

(4) In the Resurrection faith each one is received. If God loves me, then he loves you. We are all brothers and sisters in the Fatherhood of God.

If we live out of this faith, I believe the Christian thing to do is to live out these elements. It does not have to do with the establishing of our rights over others, but in submission to others as Christ submitted himself even to death on a cross for the love of others.

It is then in a spirit of Christian brotherhood that I say the following to both parties:

The Vietnamese will show their belief if they strongly consider a self-imposed moratorium on new boat construction; in a spirit of cooperation learn and speak English; clear their own of any semblance of welfare fraud; and learn and cooperate as much as possible with local shrimping customs.

The Americans in the spirit of our great nation should allow the free enterprise system to work and cease trying to move the newcomers out of the business. Also, cloaked and open threats of violence are not the Christian way of solving problems; those should cease. All complaints should be carried through the proper channels for resolution.

American shrimpers should open their arms to these newcomers to our community in love and brotherhood. They should take the first step in gestures of peace, reconciliation and friendship.

This issue will not be solved by committees or laws or regulations or the government but by each person in this community reaching deep into his heart and finding the strength and resolution to act the way he should. Christ calls upon us to act as he acted - in submission to the other.

For a little variation, the meal will be an international style dinner. Members and guests are invited to bring a dish from another country to carryout the theme.

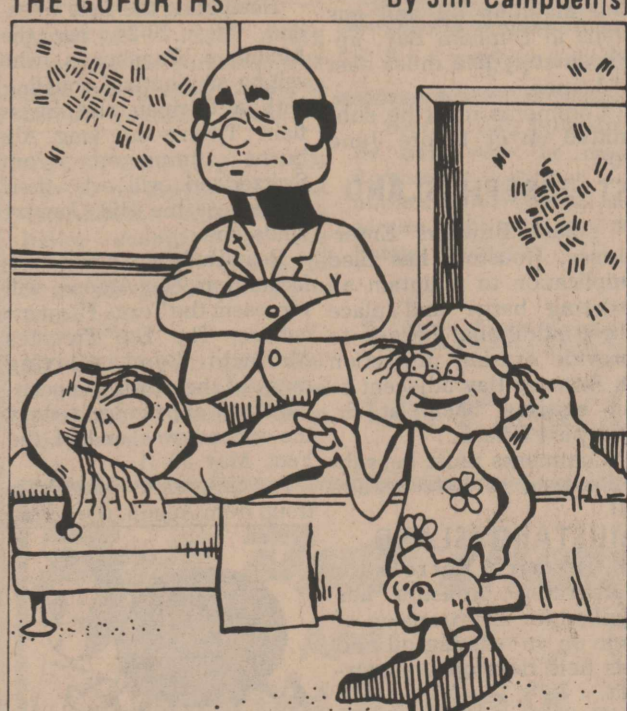

## Strawberry Season Brings Delicious Ideas

**SUGAR LAND** — Surely no one could suggest a fruit more delicious and totally refreshing than a plump, juicy, red-ripe strawberry. We've all been beguiled by its appeal just as the New World Colonists were who called it the "wonder of all fruits".

Not only are strawberries scrumptious, but they're also an excellent nutritional source. One cup of strawberries supplies about 150% of the U.S. recommended daily allowance of Vitamin C for the average adult. Surprisingly, the strawberry also adds a significant portion of iron to your diet. But, one of the strawberry's nicest attractions is its low-calorie content. One cup contains only 60 calories. What a delicious way to diet.

Strawberries don't ripen further after they've been picked, so when making your selection, look for strawberries that are bright, fresh, plump, well-shaped and solid in color. And the caps should be attached.

It's a good idea to use strawberries as soon as possible after purchase to ensure the utmost flavor and nutritional value. Unused berries should be stored in the refrigerator.

Be sure you don't wash or remove caps of strawberries until just before serving. Wash gently as washing tends to remove the natural protective outer layer. Never allow strawberries to soak in water. Leaving caps on until serving aids in preserving the flavor, texture and nutrients of strawberries.

Strawberries are normally available in pint

baskets. So, to help you determine what quantity to buy, you may wish to refer to this measurement chart:

1 pint basket = about 3-1/4 cups whole berries  
 1 pint basket = about 2-1/4 cups sliced berries  
 1 pint basket = about 1-3/4 cups pureed berries

Taste these two beloved classics of the strawberry season. The shortcake and the recipe for Strawberries Imperial are sure to become your standard strawberry favorites. They're absolutely delicious and wonderful now, as the supply of fresh, plump strawberries are in plentiful supply.

**Strawberry Shortcake**  
 3/4 cup shortening  
 1-1/2 cups Imperial Granulated Sugar

# Rover Doesn't Lead Dog's Life

The sign on the fence says BEWARE OF JAVELINA.

Beware of what? Meet Rover, a bottle-raised javelina who likes dry dogfood, an occasional pork chop, corn chips and (some) people.

"We got him last March (1980)," says Linda Stubbs who runs the S&S Grocery on Park Road 13 in Lamar. "Some people shot his mother, caught him and brought him to me."

At that time, she estimates, Rover was only about two weeks old and Linda had to bottle feed him until he was old enough to be weaned.

Since then he's been raised on a diet of dry dogfood which he shares with the Stubb's other pet, an Irish Setter named

"Balogna," padded with an occasional pork chop and corn chips.

Although Linda refers to Rover as a pet, she adds that he could get out of the fenced-in back yard behind her store anytime he wants to. "With that nose, he could dig out anytime he wanted to," she says.

So far, he seems to just not want to. He's sort of a member of the family, eating corn chips out of the hands of Linda and her 14-year-old son, Toss, and apparently enjoying Balogna's company.

"He loves the dog," says Linda's father, Allen DuBose, and Linda adds, "He and the dog eat together, sleep together. They had a 'fight' this morning — Rover could win if he wanted to, but the dog

won."

"He likes to be scratched," DuBose said, and Toss added, "He likes having his nose scratched best. He gets nervous if he can't see your hand."

That's part of the "wildness" that DuBose says "never goes out of 'em. He's very nervous." In the wild, javelinas roam in packs and have a reputation for being vicious.

It's a reputation that's deserved, and many a deer-hunter can attest to being treed by this animal.

"They can be real vicious if they decide they want to be that way," DuBose said.

The only sign of viciousness Rover has displayed to Linda and her family was a tendency to bite when he was a baby. For that reason, his tusks were cut off "but they're growing out

now," Linda said.

Besides the de-tusking — which proved temporary — Rover has also been neutered and his musk gland removed. And he's had his rabies shot. When he came to the Stubbs', he was suffering from an injury to one leg but that's healed although, Linda added, "he still limps a little."

In the wild, according to DuBose, javelinas live about 12 years and reach top weight of around 65 pounds, so Rover's still got some growing to do — and a few more years to do it in.

"Javelinas are wonderful watchdogs," DuBose adds.

As for future plans, Linda says, "We'll just keep him as a pet." As her father says, "He's a pretty good kid."

### Backtracking The Cabaniss Home

Shades of the Oklahoma Community and the first white child born in Rockport were evoked by last week's column on the old Cabaniss (misspelled Cabines) House on Live Oak Street.

The house was recently purchased by Della and Turner Roberts, a couple whose hobby is restoring old homes. Della asked for information about the old house — and for pictures of the house if anyone has any.

Well, so far no pictures have been forthcoming, but we did get in touch with Weldon Cabaniss who used to own the place.

Cabaniss said he and his wife bought the house in about 1947 — from the Scrivner Estate. "He (Scrivner) was a longtime county official here — county treasurer," Cabaniss said.

That would have made the owner of the home David Rockport Scrivner, who served as treasurer of Aransas County for 47 years. Scrivner, born in 1868, was the first white child born in Rockport.

"He (Scrivner) died first," Cabaniss said, "then she (Mrs. Scrivner) died around 1945."

Much of Cabaniss' knowledge of the house's history comes from "hear say," he said, but according to that, the structure was built "around 1890 or before, at that triangle south of town."

The house was apparently built in what was called the Oklahoma Community — which was established sometime in the 1880s by a man named F.C. Finney. The community was officially registered as the F. C. Finney Addition but was more commonly known as Oklahoma.

The community didn't last long, no more than a couple of years before it was abandoned. Most of the houses were moved into Rockport.

About the building of the house, Cabaniss said, "My wife said she was told it was built by a man named Terry." Cabaniss thinks the man was related to the Baileys — "not Travis" but another branch of the same family.

The house was built in an L-shape, Cabaniss said, and was cut into two pieces when it was moved to its present location at 509 Live Oak. The division was between kitchen and dining room and "you could see where the house was rejoined," Cabaniss added.

Some of the features he remembers most vividly about the house were the bay window in the front, the panelling in the dining room and "yellow pine floors which were beautiful but only a single thickness — not reinforced."

"The ceilings were high," Cabaniss recalled, "and the roof was much peaked. The front porch had bannisters around it and filigree work." The

house originally had only one bathroom — the Cabanisses added another. There was an outhouse too, behind the place ...

Cabaniss also recalled the latticed back porch and that the "best heat" came from a wood stove.

# Hearing Set On County Sanitary Sewer Project

A public hearing on proposed sanitary sewer system that would serve parts of Aransas County has been called for Monday, June 8. The meeting will get underway at 7:30 p.m. in the District Courtroom, Aransas County Courthouse. Purpose of the hearing is for public discussion of a proposal to construct a central wastewater treatment plant, collection lines, lift stations and transmission lines. Mick Ladner, public par-

ticipation coordinator for the feasibility study of the project, said Phase I would provide sanitary sewer service to Fulton, Oak Terrace, West Terrace, Peninsula Oaks, Lazy Acres and Hills Village. The project would allow for future expansion to serve other areas of the county. Cost to the county of this phase of the project is estimated at \$3 million and would be funded through a benefit tax collected from all sewer lots. Based on 10 per cent bonds, the

annual tax per sewer lot will be \$243, Ladner said, and the operation and maintenance will run between \$8 and \$13 per month for the average residential users. Ladner said information describing the proposed project and alternatives — which will also be discussed at the June 8 hearing — is on display in Aransas County Public Library. Alternatives to the plan, Ladner added, include use of several smaller treatment plants, on-site systems and land application techniques. He added that another purpose of the June 8 meeting is to discuss the potential environmental impact of the project and alternatives. The June 8 hearing will climax a feasibility study of plans for a county-wide sanitary system that began more than a year ago. The study was authorized by the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District and is being funded in part by a grant through the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

# Redistricting Plan Penalizes Counties

AUSTIN (Spl.) — A redistricting plan proposed by a Texas House of Representatives subcommittee "seriously penalizes every county" in District 14, U.S. Congressman Bill Patman charged Monday.

Patman, who was in Austin Monday to meet with State House and Senate redistricting subcommittees, said he is "extremely displeased" with the House plan which "shows no evidence of any consultation with the local leaders" in the counties to be affected.

Patman was more favorable toward the redistricting plan proposed by the Senate subcommittee which would drop only three counties — not including Aransas — from District 14 and add a portion of the coastal half of Brazoria County.

The House subcommittee held hearings on its proposal Monday and Tuesday in Austin.

The Senate subcommittee is scheduled to hold hearings on its proposed plan at 9 a.m. Saturday, May 16, also in Austin. Meetings are also tentatively set for Monday afternoon, May 18, but no time has been announced for these yet.

The House redistricting plan would divide the present District 14 into two districts the first of which would include Aransas County with about 150,000 out of eastern Nueces

County (about half of Corpus Christi), all of San Patricio, Refugio, Calhoun, Victoria and Matagorda counties, most of Brazoria County and part of Harris County.

The portion of Brazoria County that would be included in this district includes the home of incumbent Republican Congressman Ron Paul.

The second district that would be carved out of present District 14 under the Texas House plan would include Jackson (Patman's home county), Wharton, Lavaca, DeWitt, Goliad, Karnes, Guadalupe and Comal counties plus 240,000 people in Bexar County (San Antonio).

The western half of Nueces County, Patman added, would be included in a district whose other counties are primarily south of Nueces.

Under the Senate redistricting proposal, Patman said, District 14 — which presently includes Aransas County — would remain relatively intact. The Senate plan would drop Wharton, Lavaca and Colorado counties from the district and would add 40,000 of the Coastal half of Brazoria County.

Patman added this plan would not take in Congressman Paul's portion of Brazoria County.

Patman urged interested area residents to attend the

Senate hearing Saturday to express their views on both the Senate and the House proposals for redistricting.

He added that residents can also make their feelings known by mailgrams and phone calls to their representatives and Governor Bill Clements.

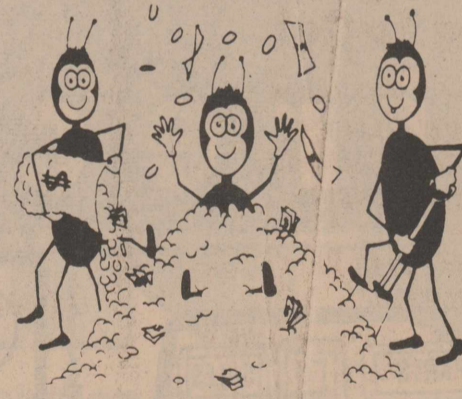

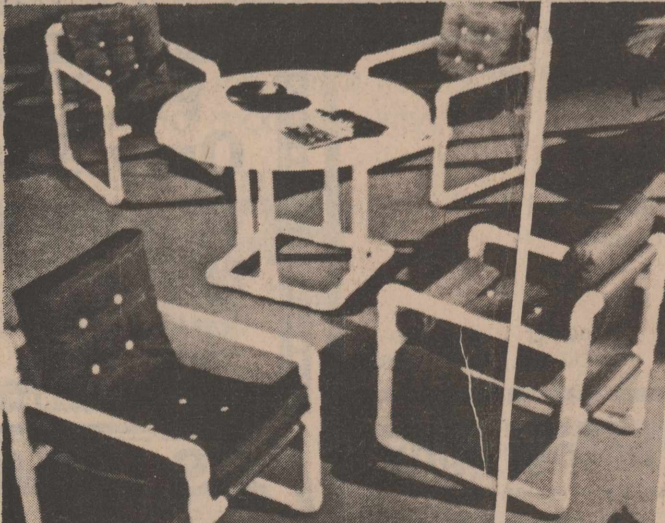

**Woman Fights Support Laws**

INGLESIDE - An Ingleside woman, aided by Coastal Bend Legal Services, is going before the U.S. Supreme Court in a case challenging Texas child support laws.

Lois May Mills is challenging section 13.01 of the Texas Family Code charging that it is unconstitutional because it prevents her from seeking child support from the asserted father of her illegitimate child. Coastal Bend Legal Services attorney Michael Mankins said, "Illegitimate children are being denied the same parental support rights as legitimate children by a state code which is unconstitutional and repugnant to the Fourteenth Amendment. This case will put the burden on the State of Texas to show why this is so."

The U.S. Supreme Court announced last week that it will decide in the suit in which Ms. Mills charges that the constitutional rights of her child are being violated. Mankins added that if the state law should be struck down, Texas stands to save a possible several million dollars in welfare payments to children whose fathers could not be made to help support them.

Section 13.01 of the state code requires that a paternity suit aimed at collecting child support in the case of an illegitimate child must be filed before the child's first birthday.

After the child's first year, under current state code, paternity suits aimed at collecting child support can be dismissed based on the time restriction.

Mankins, the attorney of record in the suit, says this time restriction is unconstitutional because it restricts a child's Fourteenth Amendment rights to equal protection of the law.

"The issue is simple," said Mankins. "Illegitimate children are restricted in their ability to get access to the court and to collect child support in a way that legitimate children are not. The child who is conceived or born in a marriage has until he is 18 years old to secure child support through the courts. We are seeking free, complete and equal access."

Mankins feels the case is strengthened by the fact that in all other civil matters state law reserves a minor's right to file a lawsuit or have one filed in his behalf until the 18th birthday, after which the normal adult statute of limitation would apply.

The paternity law is an exception. "Obviously, a one-year-old child can't do anything on his own," he said referring to the one year paternity suit limitation.

"Children have been left with no support, he said "because the mother is ignorant of the law or the natural father is paying her money - we've seen it happen - and then the child hits one year old and the father cuts the money off. The parent's relationship breaks down and he says, 'Okay, I'm not supporting the kid anymore.' The mother walks in our office (Legal Services) to see what she can do. There is nothing we can do."

Texas, as late as 1973, flatly denied any paternal support to illegitimate chil-

dren. That year the U.S. Supreme Court decided in another Texas suit, Gomez vs. Perez, that such a denial - when not also applied to legitimate children - was a violation of the Fourteenth Amendment.

Mankins credits that case, also handled by legal aid attorneys, as a ground-breaker in the rights of children born out of wedlock. Many unwed mothers, Mankins said, have little or no income. Without the support of the father and unable to work or collect child support, a high percentage of their children depend on welfare. In 1973, he said, 13.3 percent of all children born in the U.S. were illegitimate. One out of three children on welfare was illegitimate.

Unless an unwed father voluntarily agrees to child support in court, a woman's legal options are bleak once the paternity suit filing deadline passes.

The Mills suit marks the first time Coastal Bend Legal Services - which provides legal aid to the poor - has taken a case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Coastal Bend Legal Services is chiefly funded by the Legal Services Corporation which has been earmarked for massive proposed federal budget cuts.

The Supreme Court's decision to hear the Mills case represents the first victory the Mills case has had.

The paternity suit was originally filed with the San Patricio District Court in April 1979 when the Mills child was 13 months old, one month past the time allowed by the Family Code for the action to result in child support. The case was dismissed.

An appeal on constitutional grounds was lost in the Court of Civil Appeals in Corpus Christi. The Texas Supreme Court twice refused to hear the case.

Mankins views the interest of the Supreme Court justices in hearing the case as a positive sign.

"They may believe there is something there. Chances are better than not that this (the paternity suit time limit) will be overturned," he said.

The possibility of such a forthcoming decision could, Mankins thinks, prompt action at home. The Texas Supreme Court has a new similar case before it in which no decision has yet been made.

The Family Code could also be corrected if the Texas Legislature acted to amend the law and remove the restriction.

Initial briefs in the Mills suit will be filed this summer. The Supreme Court's August vacation and current caseload will likely postpone the hearing until October.

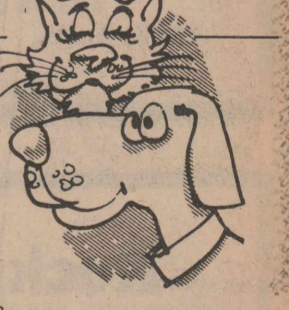
Although Ms. Mills' opposition in the case is the asserted father of the child, a decision in favor of Ms. Mills will not establish paternity. It will simply allow her to go back to the San Patricio District Court to try to prove paternity and to collect child support for her three year old son.

Should the law be found unconstitutional, it will affect any remaining similar laws in other states.

**Heartworms All-Year Threat**

**Teleservice Saves Time, Money**

People living in the Corpus Christi area can save time and money by taking advantage of social security teleservice, David Tutt, social security district manager in Corpus Christi, has announced.

Using teleservice, people can conduct most of their social security business by telephone. In this area, the teleservice number is 1-800-392-1603.

Tutt said teleservice can be used to: apply for Medicare; report a name or address change; report a change in marital status;

report that a person has stopped or started work or to report other events that may affect receipt of checks.

It can also be used to report a lost or stolen check or delayed payment; report a lost or missing social security or Medicare card; get help completing Medicare claims forms; request a copy of social security earnings record; or get the answer to any question about social security.

Unless a person's business is urgent, it is best to wait until after the middle of the month to call, Tutt added.

This is because the first part of the month is the busiest time in the social security office, he said.
