IDAHOAN WAS 'DUMB' AS AN OYSTER DURING RACE, CHARGE

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Senator Robinson of Arkansas, democratic vice-presidential nominee in the last election, today assailed Senator Borah of Idaho for making a plea for religious liberty in the senate a few days ago after he declared the Idahoan had "remained as dumb as an oyster" during the campaign when the religious issue was the "overshadowing question."

Robinson said that Borah, who jumped the country for Herbert Hoover, never made such an eloquent appeal for religious liberty during the campaign.

ABILENE MAN TELLS ABOUT ANCIENT CITY

M'MURRY PROFESSOR DESCRIBES 'FIND' ON CANADIAN

ABILENE, April 26.—Dr. W. C. Holden, head of the history department, McMurry college here, in an address sketched the progress of a people which he said began as root diggers, perhaps a thousands years before Christ and now is represented by a few scattered pueblos in New Mexico and Arizona inhabited by Indians.

Speaking before the Abilene Kiwanis club, Dr. Holden detailed recent excavations conducted by himself and McMurry college students in the Canadian valley above Pecos, Texas, where he said was found one ancient house of fifteen rooms, no two alike in that they followed various geometrical designs—round, oblong, rectangular and square.

"We make no claim to having discovered these ruins," he said. "They have been known to exist for the last 40 years, but very little excavation has been done. It is a rich mine of prehistoric lore, waiting for the searchers' pick and shovel. There are at least eight of these ancient villages, extending along 150 miles of the Canadian river and its tributaries. The oil business has ruined many promising sites."

"Investigations have led me to believe this particular culture extending over a much wider area than has been supposed. We are now making investigation of ruins within 50 miles of Abilene which

HOOVER ASKS STONE TO BE ON LAW BOARD

SUPREME COURT JUDGE SOUGHT FOR PLACE ON COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP).—President Hoover is understood to be asking the services of Associate Justice Harlan Fiske Stone of the United States supreme court as chairman of his national law enforcement commission.

Information in some quarters is the former attorney general is reluctant to retire from the highest court to undertake the task which the chief executive has announced will be entrusted to the commission—that of exhaustively studying the whole federal judicial and enforcement machinery and submitting recommendations for its reorganization.

Fist Fight Enlivens Impeachment

LEGISLATORS PASS STORMY TIME FRIDAY

INCOMPETENCY ADDED TO CHARGES MADE AGAINST LONG

BATON ROUGE, April 26.—After a riotous session, the house of representatives today adopted a resolution charging Governor Huey P. Long with "general incompetency" and prepared to send it to the senate as count number eight in the impeachment charges on which the executive will be tried.

The vote was 59 to 39. After the machine had recorded the vote, Representative Hoffpauir, of Arcadia, changed his vote to nay, making the total 59 yeas to 39 nays.

In the session, fist fights were narrowly averted. Representative McClanahan, of Caldwell, was subjected to boos when he said "this case smells to the high heavens," and he would demand that troops be stationed in Baton Rouge to preserve order for the next three years if any attempt is made to have Governor Long thrown out of office by court procedure. He said he had heard this move would be made if "the impeachment efforts failed."

"If this is done thousands of citizens will descend on Baton Rouge and demand martial law," he shouted.

Representative Peques of Desoto declared that if the charges in the resolution are grouped "you have a stretch of incompetency that floats to the high heavens."

COUSIN OF LATE CZAR DIES TODAY

LONDON, April 26 (AP).—Grand Duke Michael of Russia, cousin of the late czar, died here this morning.

Grand Duke Michael suffered an attack of influenza late in the winter which left him weak, and his family had given up hope some days past he might live.

The grand duke was for some years an important figure in London society and smart Anglo-American circles on the Riviera where he spent a part of his time. Although his fortunes were badly depleted by the Russian revolution he still was able to maintain a fine London residence and a beautiful villa at Cannes.

SIX ARRESTED WHEN MEXICAN SHACK IS RAIDED

Proof that Sheriff Wade Hardy's recent threat that he was going to make it hard on the beer peddlers cannot be taken for a bluff was given last night when members of the sheriff's department conducted a raid on a small shack in Little Juarez, Lubbock's Mexican section.

One young Mexican and an aged Mexican woman were arrested on liquor charges, four white men were arrested on vagrancy charges, and more than two cases of home brew and beer-making apparatus was confiscated.

The Mexicans are still in the county jail, and the whites will be arraigned on the vagrancy counts sometime today.

TOLL FROM TWISTER THAT HIT TWO SOUTHERN STATES RISES TO 71; HUNDREDS ARE HURT

(By The Associated Press.)

ATLANTA, Ga., April 26.—The total known dead in the tornado-stricken sections of Georgia and South Carolina reached 71 today. Several hundred persons were injured.

The greatest destruction was wrought in South Georgia sixty-five of the reported dead being in that section. The other six in the death list were in South Carolina.

Statesboro, Ga., county seat of Bullock county, near Savannah, was the heaviest hit. The hospital there reported that more than thirty persons were dead and many others injured. A call came from Statesboro to the Georgia Board of Health for anti-tetanus serum and for nurses.

Metter reported 19 dead from two tornadoes which were accompanied by hail and a downpour of rain. One struck at 8:10 last night and the second at 11 o'clock.

Cochran, approximately sixty miles south of Macon, reported five dead and injuries to approximately fifty.

Covered Wide Area
The tornado spread destruction over a wide area in a half dozen counties. In some cases, several members of families were killed.

Mrs. C. O. Newton, living in the Hagin district of Bulloch county was awakened by rain beating in her face. Her home had been blown down while she slept, and scattered about her were the bodies of her four children, Emma, 28; Lillie May, 25; Edward, 16; and Grady, 18.

Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Coleman and their three children were killed in the destruction of their farm home in Candler county.

Crops Ruined
Rain and hail accompanied the tornadoes in most instances, beating down crops which were wholly ruined in many places.

All doctors and nurses in the vicinity of the stricken areas were making their way into the wrecked

HOUSE PASSES FARM AID BILL

SENATE VOTE ON BIG ISSUE EXPECTED IN FEW DAYS

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 26.—The problem of general farm relief was exclusively up to the senate today, the house having completed the major phase of its work on the subject yesterday by passing its bill and ordering it forwarded to the other chamber.

The vote in the house—officially recorded at 367 to 34—was regarded as a clear indication that President Hoover's opposition to the export debenture plan, receiving vigorous support in the senate, will be heeded in the final action of congress on the subject.

Senate leaders plan to allot only two or three more days to the general discussion of the bill before the vote.

STAGE IS SET FOR "ANNIHILATION" OF WEST COAST REBELS,—CALLES

MEXICO CITY, April 26 (AP).—General Plutarco Calles notified President Porfirio Gil today that the stage was set for "annihilation" of the rebel west coast army with its retreat northward cut off by a burned bridge 18 miles north of Navojia, Sonora.

Federal light horse, under General Joaquin Espinosa, undertook a forced march last night expected to place it in position for a flank attack on the rebels today as the main federal army attacked them at their front.

Escape Cut Off

Artillery was brought up during the night, with the prospect that airplanes would inflict heavy casualties with a new supply of 75 pound demolition bombs. No escape was believed possible.

The shaping up of the federal trap—with its possibilities of bloodshed even exceeding the action at La Reforma three weeks ago which General Calles described as a "veritable butchery"—came late yesterday and last night after a complete turn of the tables in southern Sonora.

For some undetermined reason the rebels, believed to number 5,000 or more, fled precipitately from Masiaca, where they were strongly entrenched yesterday. Navojia, a former stronghold to the north, was later evacuated. Federal troops were in hot pursuit and were believed last night to have occupied Navojia.

A dispatch from Gen. Juan Al-

dreu Almazan, who is forcing Pulido Pass in eastern Sonora with 1,000 troops, told of sitting at a table at his field headquarters and listening as he wrote to rebels dynamiting the canyon ahead of him. He said he was proceeding cautiously. His dispatch said reports to him were that rebels were driving 3,000 head of cattle from American ranches at the head of their column.

Things were not going so well, for the federalists in Jalisco where 1,000 Cristeros, or so-called religious rebels, under General Enrique Gorostieta held out for a fourth day at Tepetitlan against General Saturnino Cadillo and much larger federal force. Their position was said to be exceptionally strong as a consequence of recent seizure of a federal ammunition train.

MOSCOW.—Government figures give Moscow a population of 2,285,300 as of January 1, 1929. The increase in 1928 was 6.1 per cent births accounting for one per cent.

Pioneer Surveyor At Snyder Injured

SNYDER, Texas, April 26.—Uncle Billy Gross, 84, Scurry county surveyor since 1900 was severely injured here yesterday while surveying. He was thrown forcibly to the ground and sustained torn ligaments in his back. Although advanced in years he led a vigorous and active life and previous to the accident walked from six to ten miles a day and was able to survey more land now than two men can measure.

Wholesale Forgery Immigration Papers

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP).—Wholesale forgery of documents to secure admission of aliens into the

United States has been brought to the attention of the state department.

The forged documents against which the department is building a vigilance system include American passports, passport visas, birth certifications and papers to be presented by aliens for permission to enter the United States.

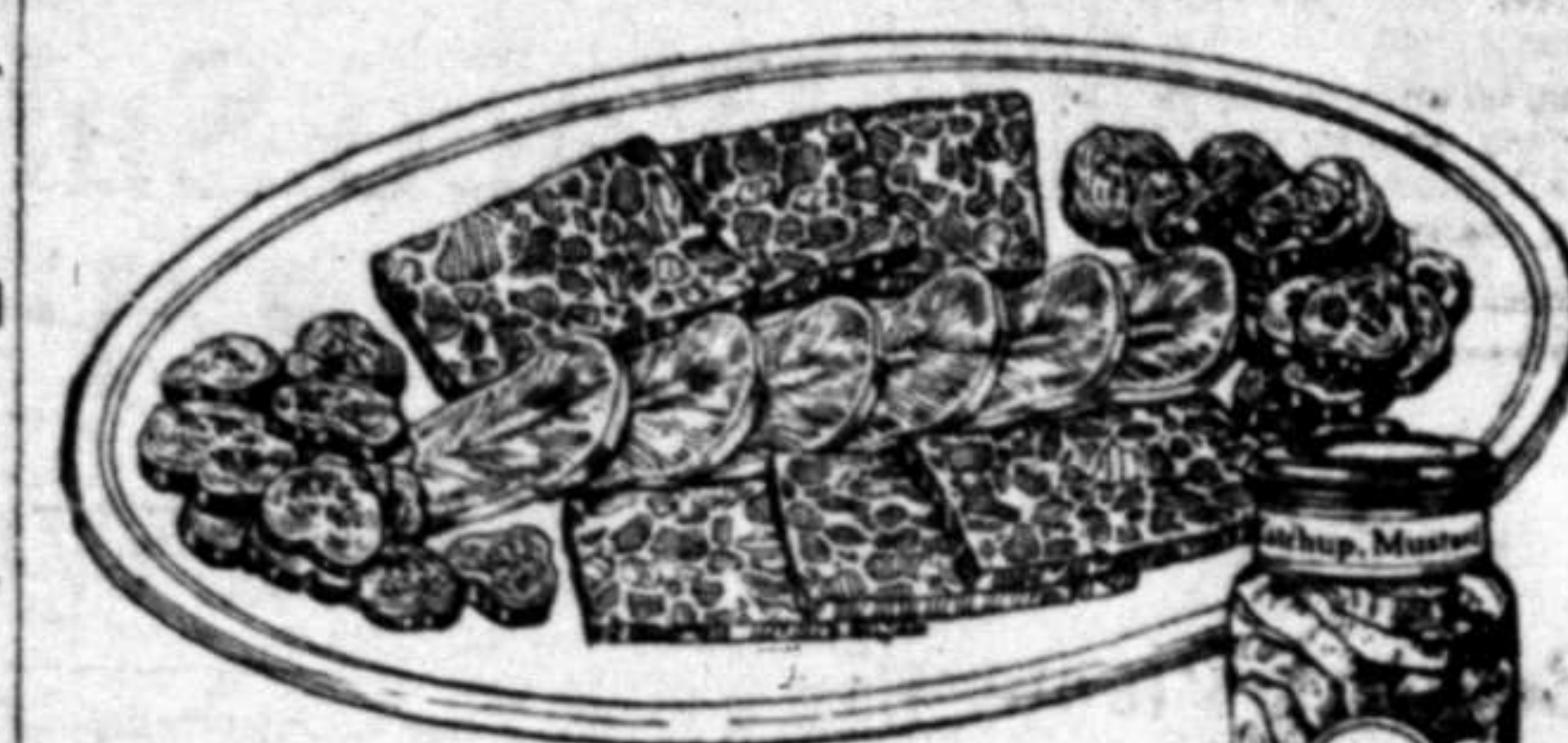

NEW WELL IS OKEHED HERE

CITY COMMISSION IS GIVEN REPORT ON STREET SIGNS

Lubbock is to have a new water well. This was authorized by the Lubbock city commission in regular session at the city hall yesterday afternoon when a contract was awarded to the Well Works Manufacturing company of Garden City, Kansas, for the digging of the well.

The well will begin as soon as proper tests have been made about the city. The company was represented here by L. J. Doty.

Unofficial returns of the \$75,000 bond issue election Tuesday, which gave the vote 496 to 207 in favor of the bonds was found to be correct when the commission officially canvassed the returns. The commission, however, took no action concerning advertising for bids.

The commission heard a detailed report of the street sign committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce although no action was taken. The report gave the number of signs needed, the places, cost, and the kind of material to be used. The Chamber of Commerce is offering to pay for the markers. Final action on the project will be taken in the near future when the committee and the commission hold a joint session.

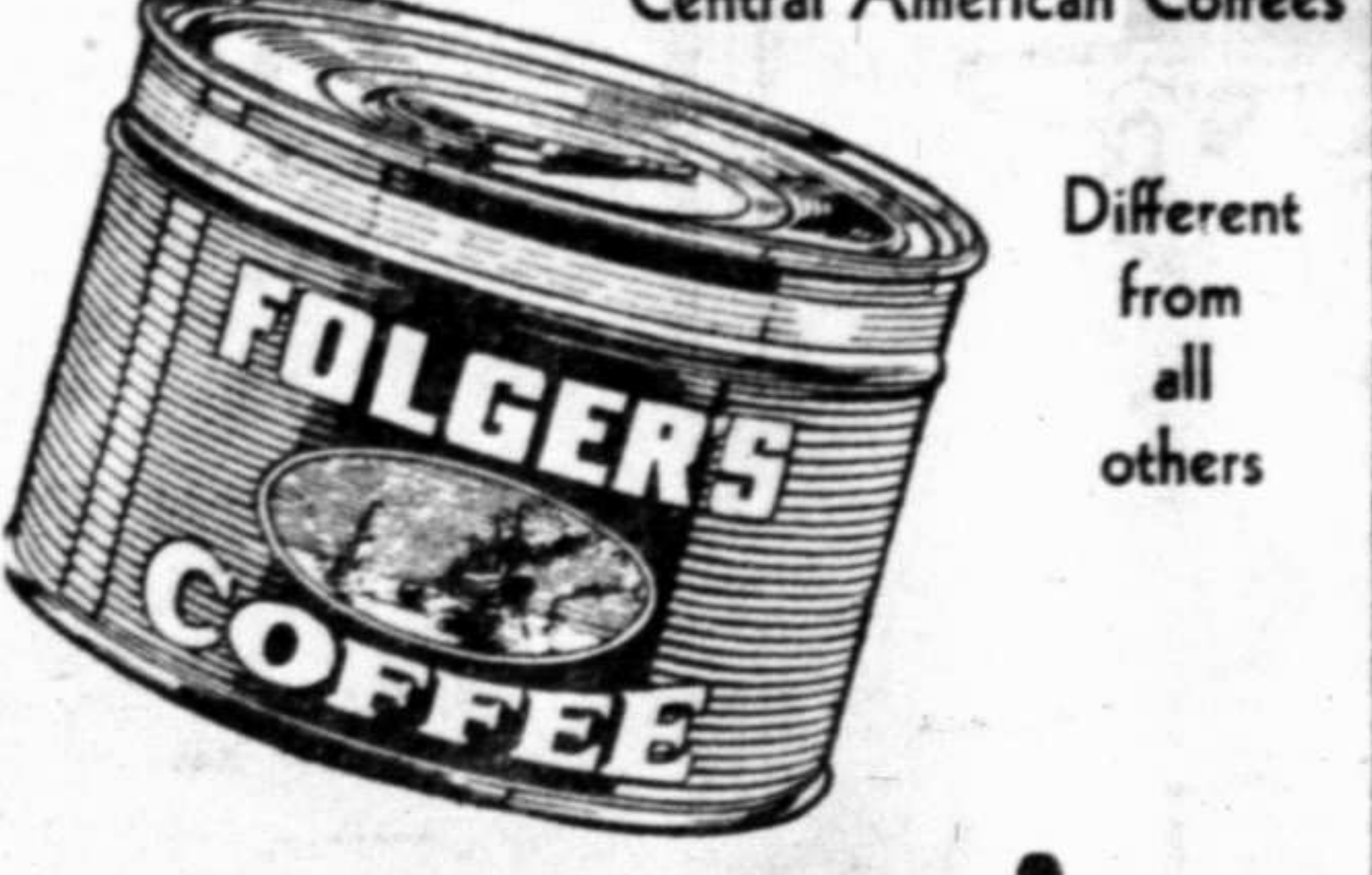

We discovered innumerable artifacts, but not a single arrowhead; there were many spearheads, awls and stone spades."

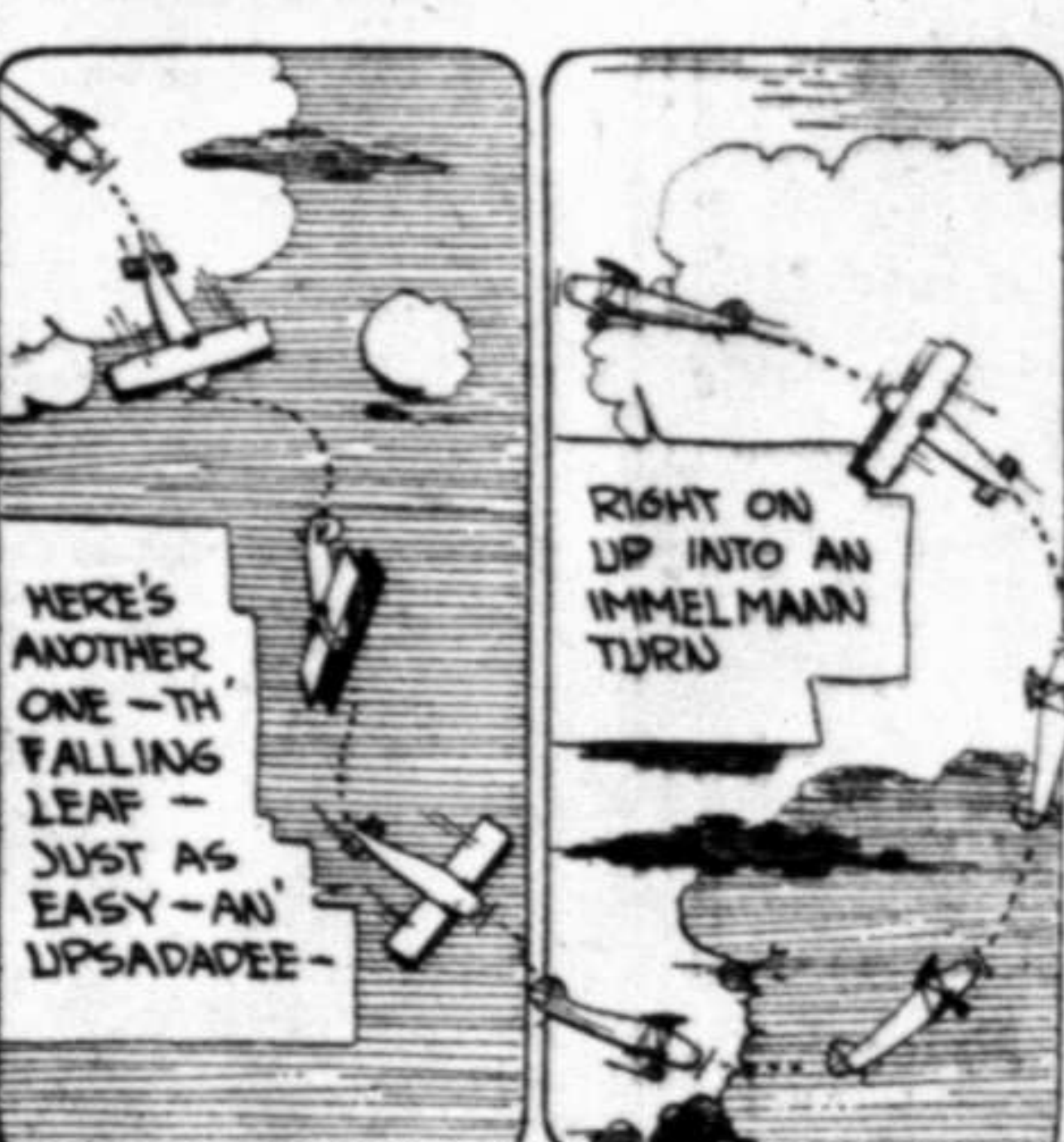
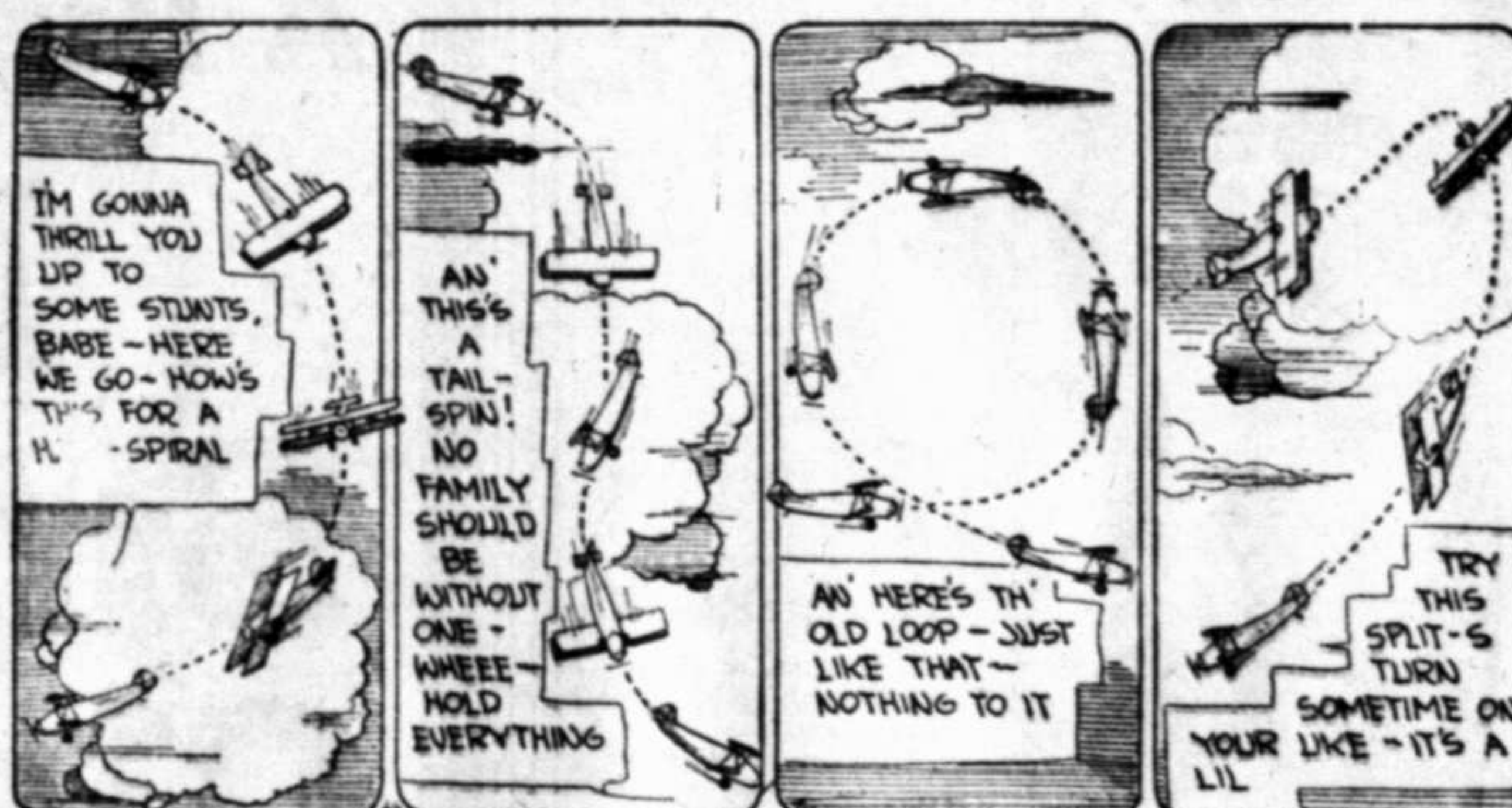

LIGHT GAINS SHOWN TODAY

STOCK MARKET OPENS IN FLOURISH OF STRENGTH

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—The stock market opened with a display of strength today. The first sale of Columbia Graphophone was a block of 10,000 shares at \$11-1/2, up 1 point. Initial gains of a point or more also were recorded by Radio, Kollster, General Railway Signal, Briggs and American and Foreign Power. Bethlehem Steel yielded fractionally on the announcement of a new stock offering.

Wall Street's relief over the fact that no change had been made was reflected in the brisk buying movement which developed in the early trading.

General Motors was heavy on selling by speculators disappointed that the first quarter earnings failed to measure up to those in the corresponding period last year.

American Machine & Foundry sank to a new low level for the year. Although Bethlehem earned the full year's dividend in the first quarter, some selling came into the stock overnight on announcement of plans to offer a share of additional stock at \$85 a share for each three shares now held, the proceeds to be used for expansion.

Woolworth crossed 228 to a new high record in the early trading. American Rolling Mills, which dropped from 119 7/8 to 112 5/8 after its admittance to trading yesterday quickly snapped back today to 118. Columbia Graphophone, Atchafson, United Aircraft, American Railway Express all sold 3 or more points above last night's final quotations in the early trading.

Matheson Alkali, which closed yesterday at 202 1/2, selling today "ex 300 per cent stock dividend" opened at 52 3/8. Corn products moved into new high ground. Foreign exchanges opened easier with cables off 1-1/2 of a cent to \$4.83 5/16.

Publishers Table Motion On Purchase

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—After a long discussion during which some delegates declared the matter was one for the federal government to investigate, the American Newspaper Publishers Association in convention today tabled without a vote a resolution opposing purchase by the International Paper Company of stock in newspapers.

The resolution had been offered by Colonel Robert Ewing of the New Orleans States, and before it was tabled had been amended to include condemnation of entrance into the newspaper field of interests other than strictly journalistic enterprises.

COTTON OPENS STEADY, DOWN

RENEWAL OF THURSDAY SELLING MOVEMENT TAKES PLACE

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 7 to 13 points under a renewal of yesterday's selling movement, encouraged by further declines in Liverpool, favorable weather and favorable crop advices. Selling was active. The decline soon extended to 18 1/2 for July and 18 3/8 for December, or about 13 to 15 points net lower.

Selling grew less active after absorption of offerings on the early decline. The market was steadier later on trade buying of near months and covering, probably combined with some commission house buying of later deliveries on expectations of an end-week rally. At midday, prices were within a point or two either way of yesterday's closing quotations, with July selling around 18.91 and December 18.11.

that chamber. They expect to be able to bring the debenture provision, voted into their bill by the agriculture committee, to a vote by Tuesday night, and to obtain a vote quickly on the entire measure.

Conceding the vote on the debenture provision will be close, senate leaders are convinced it will be defeated. Their latest estimate is that seven or eight democrats will vote against the plan and that ten to 14 republicans will vote for it.

The bill sent to the senate by the house is regarded by administration leaders in both chambers as having the approval of President Hoover. Like the senate bill, its principal clauses provide for establishment of a federal farm board with a \$500,000,000 revolving fund at its disposal to be employed largely through co-operative agencies and commodity stabilization corporations in an effort to enable the farmer to help himself toward prosperity and economic equality with workers in other industries.

FINTY, DALLAS EDITOR, DIES

PIONEER JOURNALIST
OF NORTH TEXAS
BURIED TODAY

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 26.—Thousands of newspaper readers throughout Texas and the southwest felt a personal loss today at the death of Tom Finty, Jr., 61, member of the staff of the A. H. Belo corporation for 31 years, at his home here last night. He had been seriously ill for many months.

Although his articles in the Dallas News, Dallas Journal and Galveston News had been widely read and reprinted for many years, Mr. Finty was perhaps most affectionately known as the originator of Col. Bill S. Crooge, "The well known Nelson county cowboy." Through this medium he delighted readers of the state with his whimsical disquisitions on politics and community life. His intimate acquaintance over the years enabled him to write with rare insight.

Rose from Correspondent
During the 31 years with the Belo corporation Mr. Finty rose from a correspondent in a small Texas town to an executive of the corporation and at the time of his death was editor of the Dallas Journal. He had been a director of the Belo corporation since 1918. He gave largely of his time to the constructive endeavors of the three papers owned by the corporation. Many of his articles were reprinted in book or pamphlet form. One of his best known was "The Farmer and the Mule," a treatise on agricultural conditions in Texas. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday from a funeral home here, where the body was resting today. Burial will be here. Pallbearers will be G. B. Dealey, J. P. Lubben, E. B. Doran, E. H. Cargill of Houston, W. M. Thornton of Austin, J. W. Green, W. A. Dealey, E. M. Dealey, Clarence Cusley and George Waverly Briggs. Surviving Mr. Finty are his widow and a daughter, Miss Evelyn Finty.
