

Instructed Delegations Predicted For County Peasant Army Marches Toward Capital Of Rumania

Prince Carol, Who Renounced Throne, Ready To Serve

Demand For Change In Government Will Be Made On Bucharest Authorities by Peasants.

CAROL ONLY AWAITS CALL OF COUNTRY

Much Uneasiness Is Felt by Cabinet In Capital And Strict Guard Taken On People's Army.

(By Associated Press.)
SIBIU, Rumania, (By telephone to Vienna), May 7.—With army airplanes hovering over them ready to drop bombs if they attempted to start a revolt in rural Rumania, 5,000 peasants fresh from the Alibula congress reached this town late today in their march toward Bucharest where they will present the Rumanian peasantry with a demand for a change in government.

To reach Sibiu they tramped most of the night preceding and followed by government cavalry. Perfect order prevailed among them and the cavalry escort has instructions not to impede their march unless they try to incite the countryside to insurrection.

Wanted 200,000.
Serious differences terminating almost in open rupture between the two peasants' leaders, Maniu and Mihailci, on the question of the march have been revealed. Mihailci, who is a deputy chief of the party, insisted that the entire Alibula assemblage of 300,000 should march to Bucharest, but Maniu refused his demands, saying he had given the government his pledge that no such march would take place.

Delegation Will Be Instructed, Vote Shows

BALTIMORE, Md., May 7.—Early returns from the apathetic Maryland primary election tonight indicated clearly that the state's delegation to the national convention would go to Kansas City bound by a presidential vote strongly in Herbert Hoover's favor.

HUSBAND A CONVICT, GIRL WIFE SUICIDES

STRONG CITY, Kas., May 7.—Just after her youthful husband, who is serving a life sentence, had visited her, Mrs. B. B. Boren, 16, formerly of Burger, Texas, ended her life last night.

Accompanied by a deputy sheriff, the 21-year-old husband who is under a 90-day sentence in the Chase county jail on a charge of selling liquor, called on his wife. As they were leaving they heard a shot and rushed back to find the woman dying. A revolver bullet had pierced her lungs just above the heart, she died a few minutes later.

Boren and his wife came to Chase county about a year ago from Burger. He was employed on a ranch when he was arrested and convicted on the liquor charge.

Undivided State Urged by Moody At Trade Meeting

Thirty Thousand Visitors Throng Longview For Sessions of East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

GREENVILLE, May 7.—Greenville interrupted its din of merry-making Monday afternoon long enough to hear Gov. Dan Moody in the feature address of the day declare that East Texas and the entire state have potentialities which even the present residents of Texas cannot comprehend.

Governor Moody addressed delegates to the East Texas Chamber of Commerce's second annual convention, which started Sunday and which will be concluded Tuesday. Overnight this peaceful city on the plains of East Texas became a bustling, merry metropolis. It was estimated that at least 30,000 visitors were in town Monday, with even more expected Tuesday.

A sober note was struck by the governor in his address. He told the East Texans that rivalry is a fine thing, but instead of any one section's becoming jealous of its resources and wealth, all Texas should work together as a state, though three distinct chambers of commerce organizations are needed to handle easily the tremendous task.

Eight Presidential Candidates Inform Senate Committee of Expenditures

Mississippi Flood Legislation Made Practically Sure

Conference With Coolidge Relative To Jones Bill Brings Final Settlement Of Difficulties.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 7.—Mississippi flood control legislation was made practically certain today after a conference between President Coolidge and house and senate conferees on the Jones bill.

After spending more than an hour with the president, the conferees amended the measure to meet the objections raised by the chief executive and submitted a new report to both houses.

Chairman Reid of the house managers said he would ask for action tomorrow with every indication that the house would approve the course taken by the conferees at their sessions both before and after they were summoned to the White House.

After the house acts, Senator Jones, republican, Washington, author of the measure and chairman of the senate conferees, will call the report up in the senate. He expects no difficulty in receiving senate approval and believes the bill will be in the hands of the president before the end of the week.

SEVEN MEN HELD

Charged With Raid On Woman's Home

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 7.—Seven men were held today under bonds totaling \$29,000 for preliminary hearings May 16 on charges of conspiring to intimidate a government witness in connection with a mob attack Friday night upon the home of Mrs. Kate Browning at Brownstown settlement, 10 miles south of Shepherdsville in Bullitt county.

Mrs. Browning, 60 year old, was shot to death and five members of her family wounded by a band of between 30 and 50 men, thought by officers to have been moonshiners.

URGES PEACE IDEA

BAST ON TRIAL

Hearing For Bishop Continues Monday

KANSAS CITY, May 7.—Trial of Bishop Anton Dast of Copenhagen on charges of unministerial conduct continued today before the ecclesiastical court with first indication that his accuser, the Rev. John P. Ingwersen, deposed pastor of the Jerusalem Church of Copenhagen, may have his hands on the floor of the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in session here.

Political Pot In Texas Will Bubble Over During Day

County Conventions Will Show Direction In Which Political Weather Vane Is To Point.

VICTORY TO HARMONY FACTION IS LOOMING

Faction That Is To Control State At Beaumont Session Will Be Known After Conventions.

(By Associated Press.)
DALLAS, May 7.—Which faction of the democratic party in Texas will control the state convention at Beaumont May 22, and whether the state's delegation of 40 will be instructed in anyway, probably will be known rather definitely after tomorrow. The county conventions of both the democratic and republican parties will be held in the late afternoon. The more than 800 delegates to the democratic state meeting will be named and each county will decide what, if any, instructions it wishes to impose upon its delegation.

The reports of the precinct conventions, held Saturday, would indicate that the "harmony" faction of the party, which under leadership of Gov. Dan Moody advocated a stand for prohibition planks in the national platform, but stood against what were called negative instructions, that is, instructions to be against any candidate, would have a contest.

About one-third of the precinct conventions were heard from, and showed the entirely uninstructed sentiment to lead, but those without instructions as to presidential

NEW YORK, May 7.—The annual Pulitzer prizes were announced by Columbia University today; awards in medals, scholarships and cash aggregating \$15,000.

The Indianaapolis Times won a \$500 gold medal for the most disinterested and meritorious public service rendered by an American newspaper during 1927. The award was made for the paper's exposition of political corruption in Indiana.

Orator Cleveland Hall of the Montgomery, Ala., advertiser, was awarded \$500 for the best editorial writing because of his articles against flouting and racial and religious intolerance.

No award was made for the best example of reportorial work, the test being accuracy, terseness, and the accomplishment of some public

COTTON MARKET IS UP \$3.50 A BALE

NEW YORK, May 7.—Reports of cold rains in the eastern belt and more favorable interpretation of reports from the goods trade seemed responsible for a reversal of the recent buying on the cotton market today. The general market advanced from \$9.00 to \$3.50 a bale during the day's trading, closing strong at net advances of 58 to 68 points.

18 Missing After Dredge Boat Sinks In Gotham Harbor

Strong Ebb Tide Swung Craft Against Bow Of Freighter At Anchor; Sank In Five Minutes.

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, May 7.—Eighteen members of the crew of the government dredge Navesink which sank today after collision with an anchored freighter, are missing, army officials established tonight.

After hours of confusion, the army officials obtained a roster of the dredge's company showing the craft carried a crew of 58. Of these 28 were accounted for in the marine hospital at Staten Island and one at Hoffman's Island. Three of the crew, including the master, Captain Charles Peterson, were ashore when the crash occurred.

The official figures bore out estimates made by John Sims, second mate of the Navesink, who earlier in the day said he believed 18 were missing and that 47 were on board at the time of the accident. He had to rely on his memory since the dredge's records were carried to the bottom.

The dredge sank within five minutes after a strong ebb tide swung it against the bow of the freighter Swinburne anchored off quarantine.

Two youths paid fines of \$100 each later in the morning on charges of theft of less than \$50 as an aftermath of the "party."

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FIGHT ON ROYALTIES

Efforts Being Made To Exclude State Share

AUSTIN, May 7.—Efforts to have the state declared not entitled to mineral royalties on land which has been yielding toll since 1918 are being made. Land Commissioner J. T. Robinson, said Monday.

Attorneys for Mrs. H. H. Brown, whose late husband in 1918 bought the tract in Hudspeth county, as dry grazing land, contend to Robinson that because the statute in connection does not classify the property as mineral land, the state has no claim to a portion of the royalty produced.

A tract division, upholding such a claim would affect other sales.

PROHIBITION ISSUE INCREASE INTEREST

Representatives from All of County Precincts Are Expected For Convention of Democrats.

Hoover to Be Favored.
Dr. Barr declared that he felt sure that the republican convention would instruct its delegate to the state convention at Dallas to vote for Herbert Hoover. Returns from four of the seven precincts in the county favor instruction for Hoover, Dr. Barr said.

Delegates from practically all of the 31 democratic precincts of the county are expected to participate.

SINCLAIR OPENS FIGHT

Seeks to Avoid 3 Month Jail Sentence

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The second stage of Harry F. Sinclair's fight against a three-month jail sentence for refusing to answer questions of the senate Teapot Dome committee began today with counsel for the oil man and the government presenting arguments on his appeal before the District of Columbia court of appeals.

Sinclair was sentenced and fined \$500 for refusing to answer four questions asked by members of the senate public lands committee on March 22, 1924.

96,000 BARRELL WELL

Pecos Producer Makes A Record Output

SAN ANGELO, May 7.—California Company's No. 15 Yates, lease 1, in Pecos county, was shut in Monday at 1,125 feet after flowing at a rate estimated at 4,000 barrels an hour, or 66,000 barrels a day. From a 50-minute gauge 1,478 barrels was saved, the heavy pressure blowing much oil out of the tanks.

—THE— WOMAN'S DAY By Allene Sumner

Our neighbors put on a little skit the other day that illustrated perfectly the contrasting viewpoints of the older and younger generations on the subject of neighborliness.

Another neighbor, a spinster of some 60 years, living all alone, was ill. She sent out word that if her meals were brought in, she could manage, and very casually suggested that each family on the street take turns bringing in her mealtime plate.

"Just a plate of whatever you are having at your own table," she said. "Nothing extra, no fussing, just bring me what you are having for yourselves."

"SUCH NERVE!"

The family next door consists of an older woman and her married daughter. The daughter was horrified at what she termed the "nerve" of the sick woman's request.

"Why doesn't she get a nurse and housekeeper instead of having the neighbors keep her?" she asked.

Her mother, born into a generation which never heard of organized charities but which fed the widows and orphans as a matter of course, was equally scandalized at what she called her daughter's "inhumanity."

It is hard for us moderns, especially city dwellers who give more or less reluctantly to organized charity, to realize that in some places far from the maddening crowd even today old-fashioned neighborliness is practiced in the same abundant measure as in the days of cabin-building.

IMMAGINE THIS

An aunt of mine lives in northernmost Canada where she with her six small children is "proving up" her claim. She casually writes of the children of other pioneers who are living in her own cabin this winter because it's nearer to a better school. Not a penny will change hands, of course. It merely means that she would feel exactly as free to park any of her offspring with her neighbors if occasion arose.

But imagine any average middle-class family of our cities keeping several children for several months without any talk of "board" money.

MONEY FOR JOBS

A certain woman recently offered a motion picture company \$500 if it would let her write film titles. The offer was accepted and, of course, several dozen girls who needed a plain bread-and-butter job were turned away. Women in every large city are begging for volunteer, unpaid jobs in libraries, social service agencies, stores, newspapers, anywhere. To be sure, no sane employer ever gives the untrained volunteer worker a responsible job merely because her services are free, but when it comes to lesser jobs he thinks that he's foolish not to avail himself of the opportunity.

Here's a phase of the woman-and-career question that we don't often think about!

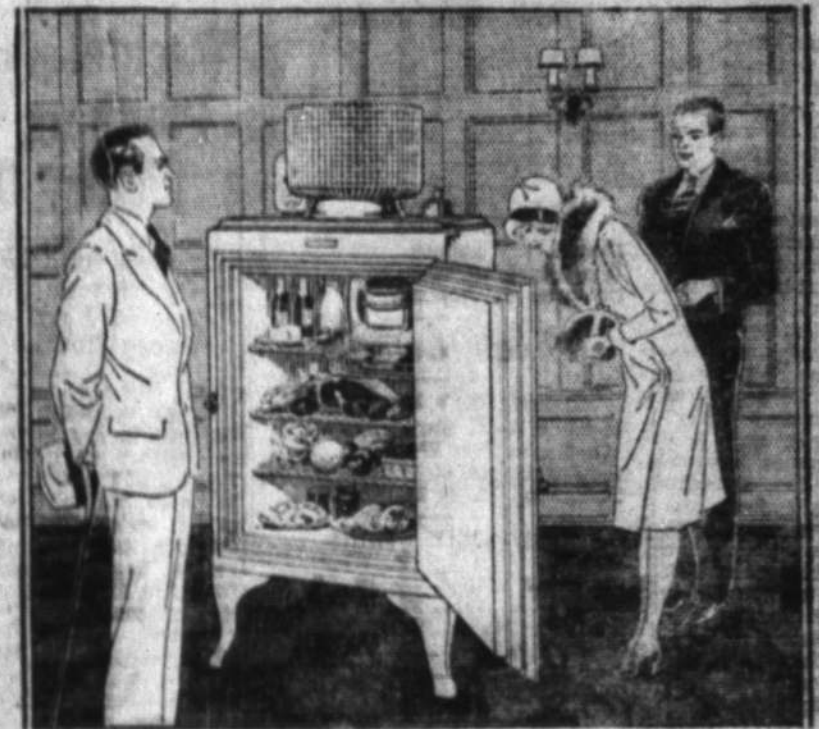

What Is A Station-to-Station Call?

IN telephone parlance, a station is a telephone. A station-to-station long distance call is one where a connection is established between your telephone and a desired telephone in a distant town, and not between you and some particular person in the distant town. Every local call you place is really a station-to-station call—you talk to whoever answers the called telephone.

To use this service, if you know the distant telephone number, give it to the long distance operator; if you do not know the number, give the operator the name and address of the party whose telephone you wish to reach, and let her know that you are willing to talk to anyone who answers at the called telephone.

Station-to-station calls cost about 50 per cent. less than those where you ask to talk to a particular person.

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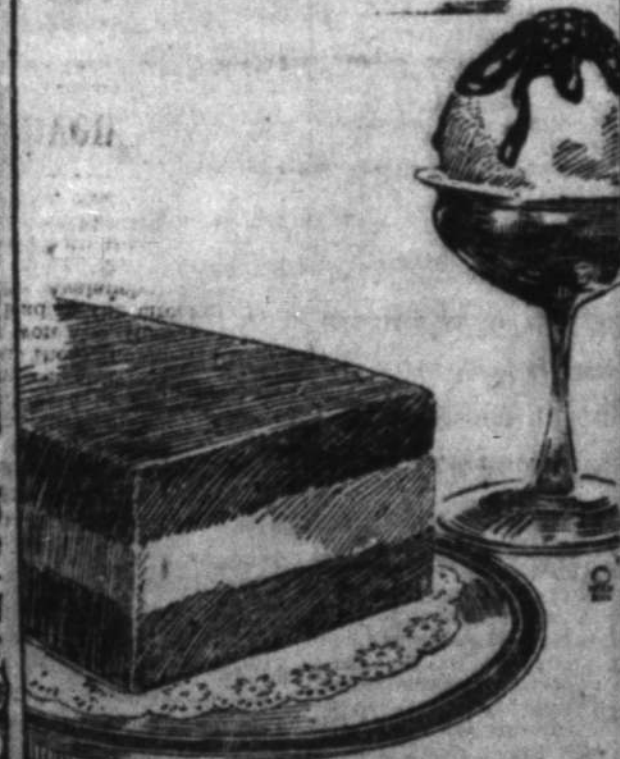
