125 at meeting

Disaster program explained

County farmers had many of their questions answered Wednesday afternoon during a meeting here about the recently approved disaster program.

About 125 people attended the 2:30 p.m.

meeting in the Thompson Room of City National Bank and left with a good feeling about the program, at least no longer puzzled about what it is or how it will operate.

On hand to give out

answers were three representatives of the National Cotton Council: Galon Booker, who presented a slide series about cotton supply and demand and also about prices and loan amounts; Charles Bragg,

who explained the NCC role in asking Secretary of Agriculture John Block to declare an economic disaster; and NCC field representative Fred Johnson.

Also answering questions and getting down

to brass tacks was local ASCS executive director Don Stewart, along with ASCS district director Tolbert James.

For the Farmers Home Administration, District Director Don Perry of Lubbock and FmHA county supervisor David Marion, were on hand.

Ross Hargrove, Producers Coop manager and a member of the NCC area team, made introductions at the start of the meeting and NCC's Booker showed slides indicating target prices for cotton at 71

cents this year and 76 cents for next year, with a deficiency payment on cotton of 12 cents.

Then Bragg, a production representative for NCC and a former resident of Stamford, showed the film presentation which had been shown to Block only a few days after the disaster team's survey of the June 18 storm. A booklet on the cotton crop disaster was put out July 8 which outlined shortcomings of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and also gave See DISASTER, Page 2

Approval of ECP waivers make Mitchell County farmers eligible

Mitchell County has been approved for an Emergency Conservation Practices program which will help farmers reconstruct land damaged by flooding this year.

Don Stewart, ASCS executive director, said that notification came from the state office that the county committee's request has been approved and waivers were granted which will admit all Mitchell County farmers to take advantage of the cost-share program.

Under ECP, a farm

which had received such aid once in the past ten years would be ineligible. But, waiving that requirement opens up the eligibility to admit all Mitchell County farms, not just the few in the northwest section of the county which would have been the only ones eligible under the limitation.

Also, a federal policy that limits such funds to only three times in the past 25 years was also waived.

Members of the ASCS committee are Tommy

Stewart said that \$75,000 from the state ASCS office will be sent to the county initially but that a sign-up period has not yet been designated.

"There'll be a 30-day sign-up but we haven't set that yet. We've got to get through with certification first and take care of things in an orderly fashion," Stewart said.

He added that about 75 percent of such reconstruction to terraces, waterways and diversions will be done and winter

The cost-share basis will be 64-36. A farmer's share would be 36 percent of the cost and the ECP funds would pay 64 percent. Formerly, the cost-share was 80-20.

"We won't take any applications for this now, not until we announce the sign-up at the ASCS," Stewart concluded.

The dirt contractors, ASCS, farmers and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) all work together to meet ECP program requirements.

Polling place to be temporarily reset

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court will have a called meeting today to change the polling place of Precinct 7 from the Oak Street Baptist Church to the Housing Authority building, which is in Precinct only.

According to County Commissioner Paul Hunter, the change is necessary because the election judge and alternate of Precinct 7 will be unavailable on August 14 and no one else will be available to run the election.

Absentee voting in bingo election light

According to the County Clerk's office, absentee voting on the bingo election has been very light.

The bingo election came about because the last session of the Texas Legislature passed the Bingo Enabling Act which allows the legalization of bingo for non-profit, charitable organizations on a local option basis. If a community legalizes bingo games, the State Comptroller can then issue a non-transferrable license and regulate the amounts of the prizes.

James O. Hill, chairman of the Bingo Steering Committee, said that local communities would be able to tax the games but County Commissioner Paul Hunter commented that he would be hesitant to tax a non-profit, charitable organization.

Absentee voting will continue through August 10 and the election will be held August 14.

to discuss business

The Colorado City Chamber of Commerce will meet tonight at 7 p.m. to consider several items of business, including the hiring of a chamber manager, the setting of a time and date for the Christmas Parade and the Mitchell County Fair.

Watlington appointed Precinct 1 JP

Charles Ray Watlington has been appointed to take the office of Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace which has been vacant since the death of Henry Doss. He will begin his duties August

1 and serve until December 31, the expiration date of Doss's term. Watlington, chosen by the Mitchell County Commissioners from a field of nine applicants, was picked because of

"his education and interest in law enforcement," according to Commissioner Paul Hunter. "We had some really good applicants," Hunter said, but Watlington had some experience with law enforcement and a basic knowledge of it.

The law enforcement experience came from Watlington's job as police dispatcher in Alpine while attending Sul Ross University. "I was always interested in law enforcement," Watlington stated, adding that he applied to the highway patrol several years ago and passed the tests, but other factors induced him to come back to Colorado City and get into farming.

"I enjoy farming," Watlington said. "I like

to watch things grow, but the economy is such that I decided to try this."

The job of Justice of Peace carries more duties than seeing to traffic tickets and ruling in accidental deaths, Com-

missioner Hunter explained. The Justice of the Peace office can also serve as a small claims court and aid in evictions. Tickets issued by the Fish and Game department also fall under the jurisdiction of the

Justice of the Peace. Watlington and his wife, Dixie, who works at the driver license division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, have three children, Ty, 15, Heath, 12 and Joe, 3.

House numbers of importance to police

Colorado City Police Chief Ed Wheat has asked that all residents of the city check their house numbers and make sure that they are clearly visible.

"We're new here and we don't know where everyone lives. We have to use the street address to find a place and if the house number is not there, then it's impossi-

ble," the police chief said.

Wheat added that with a recent increase in prowler calls, the police have to be discreet when answering calls, that is, they are trying to come unannounced, but since there are many addresses missing, they can't do this.

ways to improve its application to cotton farms.

Disaster payments to farmers in counties affected by the storm were announced and approved on July 15, as Bragg said. Block authorized the payments but was not required to.

Then on another slide, calculations were shown which will be used to figure disaster and deficiency payments.

-Total disaster, using a sample farm with a 375 pound yield, would be 375 times 75 percent equals 281 times .205 cents, or \$57.61 per acre.

-Deficiency payment, using the same sample farm with a 375 pound yield, would be 375 minus 281 leaves 94 pounds eligible times .12 cents, or \$11.28 per acre.

-Total payment, \$51.61 per acre for disaster plus \$11.28 per acre for deficiency is a total of \$68.89 per acre on this sample farm with a 375 pound yield.

"Any part not paid a disaster on will be eligible for a deficiency payment," Bragg said.

Then Stewart of the local ASCS office was asked to answer specific questions about how the program will affect local farmers.

He cautioned that the farm first had to be signed up in the program, the next step is to certify acres (today is the last day to certify) and also that a landowner and operator both have to sign forms at the ASCS office.

people would put their number over the door where it's clearly visible.

"Also, people could report it to the city if a street sign is missing or needs to be repainted on the curb."

pected was mentioned by Stewart as most of the farmers have been reading the reports in the RECORD which explain the program. Also, Stewart sends newsletters out periodically, keeping farmers informed of events.

The only thing really new is a provision that advance payments may be made in the event of total disaster, but Stewart cautioned about plowing up any cotton in order to earn a payment, complimenting Mitchell County farmers on the way they handle their farming operations in a business-like manner.

"We don't want to get into the business of plowing up cotton and we don't want to make small payments either, but if you choose to take advance payments, let's be sure you don't wind up owing me money because I don't want to have to try to go out here and collect money back," he said.

"Do not destroy any cotton until the acreage has been reported to the ASCS office on a 574 form," he warned. Destroying cotton could lead to a total loss of all benefits, he said.

Some of the questions which followed are given here:

-If you realize you can't pay the ginning cost after you've started stripping can you destroy it then? Yes, if you fill out a 574 form at the ASCS office, Stewart said.

-If you were prevented from planting, what happens then? If a farm meets all the requirements, if it was reported in the fifteen days before July 6 that it was prevented from planting, said, adding that if it wasn't made timely but late filed, then it presents problems and will have to go to the county

committee and a person almost would have had to have been on their deathbed before it can be approved.

-Is there anything a farmer can do that might interfere with his yield, that is which might inadvertently reduce it? By reporting your acres, you'll be keeping tabs on yields, Stewart said.

-If you have six or 8 tracts under one farm number, how will that work? Stewart said that advance payments can be made on one tract which was totally destroyed and the rest can be carried through to harvest.

-Are you eligible for both FCIC insurance and disaster payments? Yes.

-Is there a deadline for the landlord to sign? No.

-If you decide to destroy your disaster crop, can you plant a crop like wheat? Yes, because that will be 1983 wheat here.

-When can you graze Conserving Use Acres? After September 1.

-Can you harvest peas off the CUA? No, you can't harvest anything off the CUA. You can grow a personal garden. You can harvest any other crops from the acres but not off the CUA, Stewart cautioned.

Following the ASCS portion of the meeting, Don Perry, FmHA district director from Lubbock, spoke briefly and also answered questions.

"I think that Mitchell County will be designated for low interest emergency loans, but not until this fall," Perry said, adding that the higher your average could borrow, that is your limit on borrowing would be higher.

Perry said that to answer the question, how

much did you lose in 1982, you would have to wait until after harvest and compare 1982's crop income to a normal year.

"You can't tell, you won't have the figures

until after the ASCS makes payments and your yields are in, in other words, after harvest," Perry said, pointing out that the FmHA will be willing to loan up to 80 percent of the loss.

The meeting ended about 4 p.m. after many complimentary remarks were made about the good information available during the session.

Terraces are built to conserve water and keep water and wind erosion to a minimum. Diversions are larger earthen dams constructed in conjunction with waterways to carry water and get it off the land in order to prevent gully-

Scripture: Acts 1:8; Matthew 28:18-20; 1 Kings 19:1-18.

In the Scripture, James 1:22, it reads: "Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only," and this is related to the meaning of Jesus' call to His followers to "Come, follow me."

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100th birthday

Local citizen celebrates

Thinking about all the changes and progress in a life-time, it's hard to

imagine what it would be like to live through an entire century.

Mary Hooker has had first hand experiences of exactly what it's like, as she celebrated her 100th birthday Saturday.

Mary was born July 31, 1882 in Belton and was the daughter of James and Elvira Longley.

A long-time resident of Mitchell County, she resides at Root Valley Fair Lodge, where she has lived since September 14, 1979.

She said the only relatives she still has alive are a cousin, Mrs. G. D. Foster of Colorado City; a sister, Bess Blackshear of Houston and a niece.

Although she is a bed patient at the lodge and has difficulty hearing, she still manages to crack a smile when reminiscing about her younger days.

With a big smile, she said, "the good ole' days are about the only ones I do remember," when asked about her past.

"I guess I went first one place, then another," referring to her schooling. She said, "I

didn't graduate, but I did teach a little."

With a great deal of modesty, she said, "I even once entered a style show, when I was 21 years-old and did pretty good, or at least I thought I did."

As with any Texan, this little lady shows a great pride for being born and raised in Texas and being a "real Texan." She said, "we're Texans a way down the line. My grandpa Draper and grandpa Longley came to Texas a long time ago."

She recalled living all over Texas, noting one of the happiest times in her life was when she lived in Florence, where she met her first husband, Milton D. Cranfill. She said they spent many happy years together, until he died.

"The Cranfills were good folks," she said, "they lived around Cranfill Gap, but they wasn't as stable as mine, they moved around a bunch...But then again, I've lived in so many places I can't remember them all."

She remarried later, but with a little chuckle, she said, "I just can't

seem to remember his first name. I know his name was Hooker, but that's about all I do remember."

Mary couldn't remember all the jobs she had held, but did recall working as a clerk in a store and also as a bookkeeper in the Indale, Texas Gin. She said, "I've just about done everything you can imagine."

She said some of her most enjoyable times now, was having Lupe Contreras, activity director at the lodge, read letters from her sister, Bess and her husband, Jack Blackshear.

She was so proud of a letter she received from the President of the United States, Ronald Reagan and his wife, Nancy. The letter signed by President Reagan, congratulated her on her 100th birthday and gave Mary their best wishes.

Exhausted from a long visit and trying so hard to recall things of her past, Mary said, "If I'd known I was gonna have an interview...I'd thought up some more things to tell you. And, I'd even fixed up for the picture."

1 box (small) Strawberry Jello
4 eggs
½ cup strawberries

(½ package thawed frozen)
Mix above and add strawberries last. Bake as directed on package.
FROSTING
1 Box powdered sugar
1 stick soft butter or oleo
½ cup strawberries minus 1 tablespoon

Mix and add part of left over tablespoon of strawberries if too dry. Frost cake after it cools.

1 lb. ground beef
1 can ranch style beans
1 can whole kernel corn
1 medium onion

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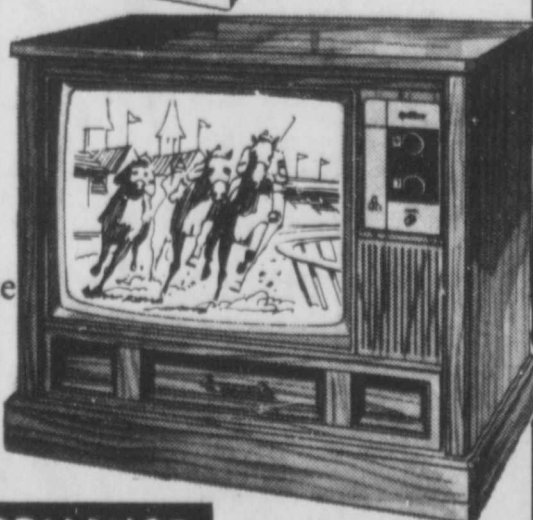

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

The Texas Bingo Enabling Act allows qualified organizations to operate legal bingo games to raise money for charitable, educational, religious and civic causes.

To conduct bingo, an applicant for a license must file with the Comptroller of Public Accounts a written application in a form prescribed by the Comptroller, duly executed and verified.

The law also provides for a local tax on the proceeds of these bingo games. These taxes are collected by the State Comptroller and returned to communities where local voters have legalized bingo and local governments have decided to levy the tax.

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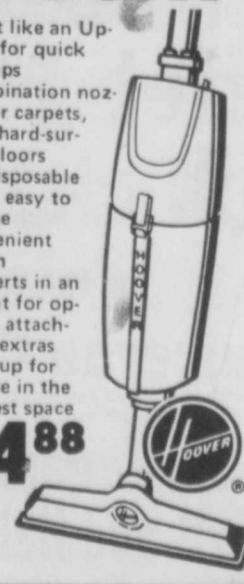
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Canadian trip offers much excitement

After telling about other people and their trips through this paper all these years, I thought it was my turn to make a trip, and I did, to Canada.

I made the trip with Mrs. Lowell Baird of Big Spring and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Echols of Coahoma. We left Midland at 6:30 a.m. Saturday, July 10. A change in Denver and then to Cal-

gary, Alberta, Canada.

From there we went by bus to Banff where we spent three days at the Banff Springs Hotel and did sightseeing tours over that area. This 600 room hotel is a showplace within itself. It is so large they have tours through the building. Three large dining rooms, coffee shops, all kinds of gift shops, etc. The setting of the hotel is in Bow Valley, surrounded by snow-capped mountains. The hotel is open for tourists year round, summer time is the peak season and on one day there were 57 tour buses checked in. We took the Gondola ride to the top of Sulphur Mountain, atop were gift shops, a place to eat, etc., and the scene from there was beautiful.

Leaving there by tour bus for Lake Louise the bus stopped for us to see some of the beauty spots, one The Great

Divide where the water parts, one stream going to the Atlantic and the other to the Pacific Oceans. It was in this area where the two great tunnels were.

Setting of the Lake Louise Hotel is perfect to view Lake Louise from. The glacier centering the lake and flanked by snow covered mountains. Tourists were there in great numbers. We estimated at least one fourth of them were Japanese. We spent three days there and made tours in the area. Traveled by tour bus to the Ice fields located between Lake Louise and Jasper. Stopping along the route if some one saw a moose, deer, etc. Went by the train station used in the movie "Dr. Zhivago," the deep turquoise water of Peto Lake, the highest mountains we had seen were on this drive, kept us in awe. This 185 mile road cut

through the Rockies from Banff to the Columbia Ice fields follows the Bow, Mictaya and N. Saskatchewan Rivers. Arriving there we made the five mile ride "on a field of ice" by snowmobile. The newer ones are equipped with huge rubber tires, some were on tracks. We were carried to a certain plateau and transferred to the snowmobile, then descended down a 40 degree slope a quarter mile, which caused a slight faster heart beat, as the driver said "if you get scared, do as I do, close your eyes." Then the five mile ride on solid ice some places 500 feet deep, at another plateau the driver said 900 feet drop. Stopping at a level area where two other groups were and got off and made pictures and some scrambled over the ice. Snow was beginning to fall quite heavy. The buses traveled single, as

the passing was too narrow and one bus stayed far behind the other as they climbed to the top.

As we returned to our bus to take us back to Lake Louise it was still snowing and the snow continued through the night and next morning, but soon melted, and we were told it about 40 degrees, though they use the metric system and this confused us several times. For instance we saw the gas price as we arrived in Calgary which read 34.7 and we thought that the price, much cheaper than back home.

We found the nights there never did really get dark, though some said there were about three-four hours darkness, we didn't stay awake to see.

Back in Calgary Friday morning for the day. The world publicized "Calgary Rodeo Stampede" was in full production and Echols

declared it one of the highlights of his trip and a great finale for him. We three women stayed at the Calgary Airport Hotel and enjoyed the shops, etc there. Early Saturday, we left

for Denver, and a two hour wait there before boarding Texas International for the flight to Midland, arriving there at 3:32 p.m., July 17, after a wonderful dream like trip.

Rig count drop due to numerous factors

This year, it just had farther to drop, with the excess rigs in use, and has taken a bit longer to shake out, thanks to the continued uncertainty in Washington on taxes, continued high interest rates; the tax dollar change; the continuing Israeli-PLO conflagration; as well as the unknown quantity called OPEC.

Actually, the country has held steady for some three weeks now and, with Congress finally deciding to do something about the budget deficit, besides pointing the finger of blame, it's just possible that we have started the inevitable turn-around. After all, we do still need oil and gas, and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future.

Some folks worry about running out of crude oil and natural gas, or that they'll be replaced by sun fuels, nuclear, thermal or hydra power, or shale oil or coal gasification. Right now that won't happen because none of them can really come on stream for the equivalent of \$50 per barrel oil. Unless the House reverses the proposed Senate Tax Bill, that price is totally out of sight. Certain members have

been making noises that they will defeat the proposition passed by the Senate and if that happens, the consumer would be well advised to let them know their disapproval at the polls. At the same time, let the Administration know that we'd prefer to see less government spending, not more tax increases.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for this week was 277. One year ago it was 475.

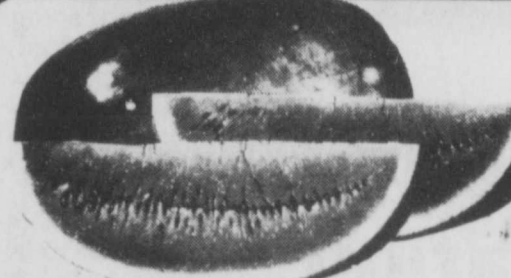

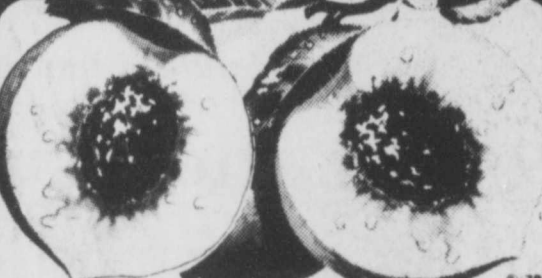

Television can be a family affair

Here is the second of a four-part series presented by the Texas State Teachers Association to help parents control the effect of television on their children.

TV Can Be A Family Affair

Have you asked yourself, "What can I do to keep TV from having a harmful effect on my kids?" Try some of these tips which could help you solve the problem.

Watch television with your children. Help them select the right

programs by checking the TV listings in advance. Look for programs that are fair in their treatment of people or programs that are not violent or too sophisticated in content.

Plan with children what shows they can watch—whether you are home or away. Be aware that public television has special programming and that commercial TV produces many excellent shows especially geared to children.

Insist on a limit to TV

time. Discuss what's "real" and what's "unreal" on TV and in life. Talk about how violence can be harmful—real people hurt when injured.

Provide adequate light in the television area and watch for tiredness, listlessness, glassy eyes, trance-like

states—signs of poor health or too much television.

Discuss ways problems might have been solved other than the way they were presented in the TV story.

Turn off the assaults, attacks, and uproars when they appear on your television set. You

ungsters need a friendly atmosphere at home without a lot of unnecessary noise or violence.

Correct any language errors your child may hear on television. Unfortunately, there are mistakes on TV. Why

not have fun finding them together?

Make meals a family event—don't eat in front of the TV set. Select food carefully—not what a TV character urges kids to eat. Don't let TV turn your child into the family shopper. Parents

should take final responsibility for selecting foods, clothing, toys, etc. When children see things on TV, they may enter a "gimme-get me" stage. Don't give in to demands for junk foods just because children ask for them after

they've seen them on TV.

Use TV to widen your child's horizons and to help the family become closer as you watch programs together.

The checks for second progress payment for members of the American Cotton Growers are at the Producers Co-op Gin.

According to C. L. Boggs, president, the total being distributed at this time averages three cents per pound for the entire pool. Because it reflects market differences, all payments will not average three cents per pound.

With this payment, the American Cotton Growers total average payments over the CCC loan now amount to 6.4 cents per pound in TELCOT terms, considering no first month's deductions were made on the initial advance.

Biggs said that they continue to follow the plan of orderly marketing of cotton that has seen the ACG pool consistently outperform

non-pool sales. I believe this year's final results again will compare favorably with non-pool sales. The members combined pool marketing and denim mill manufacturing continues to make the difference.
