THIRD PARTY MOVEMENT BALKED

POLAR RESCUE CREW STRANDED

TRIO FOUND BY FLIERS PICKED UP BY KRASSIN

ONE OF PARTY DEAD FROM PRIVATIONS IN BLEAK WASTE

(By Associated Press)
MOSCOW, July 12.—Another ironic twist was given to the noble rescue efforts today with news that the Russian pilot Chukhovsky and four companions were stranded near Northeast Land after having discovered the walking party of the Italia and given directions for its rescue.

Prof. Samoilovich, head of the Russian expedition aboard the ice-breaker Krassin, sent a report on the discovery of the Malmgren group Tuesday, July 10. The report follows:

"A plane piloted by Chukhovsky with Sviridov, Shilagin, Alkseev and the movie operator Blashstein aboard took off to search for the Guller group at 4:30 p. m. July 10.

Plane Disappears
"Circled twice, the plane disappeared in the direction of Karl Island. At 5:30 p. m. the plane reached the island without seeing the faintest sign of the Guller camp. Proceeding farther and flying low, Chukhovsky at 5:45 suddenly discovered the Malmgren group of three huddled together on a small sharp edged iceberg. Two of the men stood waving flags while the third lay prone.

"Circled five times, Chukhovsky returned, but due to heavy fog did not succeed in reaching the Krasin. Radio contact with Chukhovsky ceased at 7:10 p. m. and it was not until 10:30 a. m. on July 11 that Chukhovsky's radioed he had been forced to land a mile or two southwest of Cape Flaten, being unable to give the precise location on account of fog.

"The crew has two weeks supplies."

JONES TO AID SHORT COURSE

LOCAL MAN WILL TAKE PART IN COLLEGE STATION SCHOOL

Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station here, will take part in the five-day program of the 1928 annual Farmers' Short Course which will be held at College Station from July 30 to August 4, according to a program of the course received here today.

Mr. Jones will lead a discussion on the first day on "The Present Status of Cotton Harvesting Machines" while on the third day of the course he will lecture on "Grain Storage and Sweet Improvement Work."

R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the station at Spur, is also to be on the program of the short course.

Between 150 and 200 farmers and 4-H club members from the South Plains are to attend the short course, according to information received here by County Agent D. F. Eaton. They are to go to College Station on a "South Plains Special" train. Approximately 30 will go from Lubbock county, Mr. Eaton said.

J. D. Tinsley, of Amarillo, agricultural agent of the Santa Fe, will be in Lubbock tomorrow and Saturday to make arrangements for the train. He will also attend a club rally at Brownfield where a special car is to be chartered for the train. It was said today.

Girl, 17, Slays High School Co-ed In Wrangle Over Affections Of Man

MISSOULA, Mont., July 12.—Because two girls, quarreling over the divided attentions of a young man, stepped out of an automobile on a lonely road to "settle it" with their fists, one of them is dead and the other is being held in jail here on a charge of first degree murder.

The prisoner is Mrs. Sylvia Thurston, 17. The dead girl is Doris Wentworth, 16 year old high school girl.

The strange fight between them took place a few days ago, after midnight on a road near Missoula. And Missoula, case hardened to years of brawling and shooting between miners and cattlemen, is deeply stirred by this affray which involved two young girls.

Mrs. Thurston, who eloped with William Thurston when she was but 15, was at her home in Milltown, near here, at midnight when a party of friends stopped for her in an auto. In the car were Doris Wentworth, another girl and three boys, among them George Klopp, 18. Doris and Sylvia are said to have been at odds for weeks over Klopp.

Probe Promised In Charges Of Graft

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 12 (AP)—Charges of the association of commerce that gambling houses and book makers flourished in New Orleans and adjoining parishes under "protection of constituted authorities" today brought announcement from Thomas A. Healy, superintendent of police, that a thorough investigation would be made immediately. While Healy denied that police protection existed, he stated that if evidence of bribes was found, the connection with any member of the police force, the officer would be prosecuted "to the fullest extent of the law."

Seven Held After Canadian Robbery

TORONTO, Ont., July 12 (AP)—Two women and five men were held by police today in connection with the \$125,000 robbery of a Canadian National railway mail car at the union station here the night of June 30. About \$7,000, approximately one-third of the stolen currency, was recovered. The balance of the loot consisted of securities, the major part of which was found in an abandoned automobile two days after the robbery.

Residence Permit Issued Here Today

A building permit, the 24th for July, was issued from the city office today to A. W. May, contractor for a \$2500 five room brick veneer residence for R. C. Walker at 2108 2nd Street. The permit sets the July building total at \$119,250. Work was started on the construction of the large warehouse for the Wooten Grocery company today. The warehouse is to cost \$10,000.

INJURIES FROM RUNAWAY TEAM FATAL TO MAN

James T. Roberts, 70, of Idaho, died shortly before 11 o'clock in the Lubbock Sanitarium of injuries received Monday when a wagon was overturned on him near Idaho.

His death came as a result of internal injuries received in the accident. He suffered four broken ribs, a fractured shoulder blade, a punctured left lung and other internal injuries. He has been under the constant care of physicians since the accident, but efforts to prolong his life were futile, his condition growing worse during the past two days.

Mr. Roberts had been a resident near Idaho for more than ten years. He was a farmer.

Funeral services will be held at the Church of Christ in Idaho tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Interment will follow in the Idaho cemetery with the Rix funeral directors in charge.

Absentee Voting In County Is Opened

Voters of Lubbock county who expect to be out of the county on election day have the chance of casting their votes now by the absentee voting plan, according to a statement issued today by P. E. Wheeler, Democratic county chairman.

The absentee votes may be cast in two ways. The voter may go before a notary public not more than 30 and not less than 10 days before the election and fill out his ballot by presenting a poll tax receipt or by presenting identification by two reputable citizens. He may also appear before the county clerk not more than ten days nor less than three days before the election and vote in a like manner.

According to these regulations, the votes may be cast now and mailed to the county clerk or the voter can wait until the 18th and deliver his ballot to the county clerk. Amos Howard.

NEGRO LEADER BRINGS PROBE IN MISSISSIPPI

APPOINTMENT TO U. S. OFFICES IS CALLED TO ATTENTION OF JURY

(By Associated Press)
BLOXI, Miss., July 12.—Activities of Perry W. Howard, negro assistant United States attorney general and national committeeman from Mississippi in securing the appointment of persons to federal offices in the state will be investigated by a federal grand jury empaneled here today it was learned from minute books in the district attorney's office.

The books disclosed that the appointment of A. P. Russell as United States marshal for the southern district of Mississippi was one instance to be investigated. Witnesses summoned, including three Magee bank officials, were directed to bring all records and documents in their possession showing bank accounts of Russell, his wife, Sid Russell, his brother, and Scott Russell, a deputy marshal on duty, covering the period from January, 1927, to July 1, 1928. Russell was appointed to the marshal's office in the summer of 1927 and served until last October when he was succeeded by J. O. Buchanan, incumbent. He now is postmaster at Magee.

Over 300 bankers of the eleventh federal reserve district were present to discuss ways and means of bettering relations between the federal reserve bank and member banks.

NORRIS REFUSES NOMINATION OF FARMER-LABOR GROUP AND PLATFORM PUZZLE TO OTHERS

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, July 12.—The struggle for and against indorsement of the republican presidential candidate, Herbert Hoover, continued at the prohibition party's convention today.

A few squares away, the farmer-labor party executive committee pondered a dilemma, created by Senator Norris' refusal to head a third party. The farmer-labor convention nominated the Nebraska republican.

A resolution indorsing Hoover presented by H. Ros Garber, Pittsburgh, brought on the prohibition debate. Action on the resolution was delayed until after a platform is adopted.

W. A. P. Gay of Birmingham, Ala., a Baptist minister, mentioned the name of Senator Thomas Heflin of Alabama, a foe of Governor Smith, Democratic presidential candidate, during a plea for "a union of dry forces."

Pioneer "Dry" State
Gay declared that Alabama was a pioneer prohibition state and that it had given to "the cause" Senator Heflin and Senator Hugo Black.

"God bless Heflin," a delegate interjected.

"Hugo Black heads 15,000 men in Montgomery, and they are doing some good," said Gay. "I'm not a Ku Klux either but I'm against Al Smith and so is every other Baptist and one in every three men in Alabama are Baptists. I've swallowed by democracy—and that means something to a man whose grandmother was Jefferson Davis' cousin."

Norris Asked To Lead Movement

CHICAGO, July 12.—United States Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska today had become an unwilling candidate for presidency of the United States on the farmer-labor ticket.

Despite his reported refusal to head any third party slate, the Nebraska senator was forced to nomination at last night's session of the convention. He was chosen on the third ballot, receiving 16 votes to 14 for Norman Thomas, the socialist nominee for president.

For vice president the farmer-laborites named Will Vesper of Moultrie, Okla., a cotton mill owner. While the farmer-labor party was going ahead with selection of standard bearers, the prohibition party, also in session here, centered discussion on platform problems. With adoption of the platform today, nominations for the president and vice president were next in order.

Possibility of a merger of the prohibition party and the farmer-labor group ended last night when both voted the platform.

SEVEN TO PAY FOR MURDERS

FOUR WHITE MEN AND THREE NEGROES TO DIE IN KENTUCKY

(By Associated Press)
EDDYVILLE, Ky., July 12.—Seven men in death cells at the penitentiary here entered today what they expect to be their last 24 hours of life.

All have been sentenced to die for murder. Barring reprieve, a remote consideration, they will be electrocuted between midnight and one o'clock tomorrow morning.

Three are negroes, but all are white. The four white men, three of them little more than boys, will go to the chair first.

Two of the white men, Charles Paul Miller, 23, St. Louis, and Orlando "Red" Royburn, 21, Louisville, blamed "evil company." Each was convicted of murder in connection with robberies at Louisville. The third, Hanson Dockery, 21, Harlan, Ky., did not deny the murder of the two women and a man for which he was convicted two years ago in one of the mountain-haunt counties. The fourth, killed "Red" Lawson, 35, Corbin, Ky., denied the murder for which he is to die.

Of the three negroes, two refused to talk even to the chaplain in solitary confinement. They were in prison in silent mood. The third, asked about the electric chair,

WHITE SCORES HOME ENEMIES

BAPTIST PASTOR WILL PREACH ON MARRIAGE FAD TONIGHT

Dr. W. R. White preached to an overflowing crowd last night at the Baptist tabernacle on "Some Enemies of the Home," and he announced that he would tell the people of Lubbock tonight what he thought of companionate marriage. Renewed interest and larger crowds feature each service. It was announced that next week services will be held both morning and night.

There is to be a special service for old people Friday at 10:45 a. m. the pastor announcing his subject as "Heaven." Dinner will be served at the church for all who attend.

He Scores Murder

Dr. White mentioned murder first as one of the enemies of the home, stating that there was not in this country the respect for human life that there ought to be. Next as an enemy of the home he mentioned adultery which, he said, strikes at the purity and very existence of the home. A man is so low as to invade the sanctity of another's home is so black, the preacher said, that his life would make a mark on a piece of charcoal. And he added that any who would take advantage of youth and innocence is fit only to dwell in hell.

Referring to world pleasures, the speaker said he was against any social pleasures which made it harder for young men and women to go right or easier for them to go wrong.

Evils, Far Future

Dr. White said that at the present time in this country there is a wave of immorality that is comparable to the most degenerate days of ancient Rome and that it was high time something was being done to curb it. Making an eloquent appeal for nobility of manhood and character, the speaker quoted effectively part of the "Cowboy's Prayer" as follows:

"O God teach me that sixty minutes make an hour and that sixty seconds make a minute. Teach me that 12 and 16 ounces make a pound and that 100 cents make a dollar."

"Help me not to place the gaff where it does not belong. Help me to do unto others what I would that they do unto me. Help me to look on every woman as my own mother or sister."

"O Lord grant that when the day is done and I sit around the table with my family, I may have nothing in my heart that I would blush for them to know."

"O Lord I pray that when there comes the smell of flowers and the crush of the horse wheels, I may be able to say: 'Here lies a man.'"

The goals of human endeavor

shove worries of leadership, dilemmas
of hope and pangs of rivalry
behind him and devote himself to
quiet idling in a canoe on a wood-
land river, with a fishing pole, jil-
ling lazily out on the side, has
little more to ask of fortune.

To fight for your goal is fine, and
to attain the power and the glory are
satisfying; but to turn your back
on them—to say, "I have had enough
and henceforth I will take the
minor joys of life"—that is really to
live.

Few men can ever do it. Ameri-
can life is geared to a fast pace,
and offers the successful little time
for retrospective leisure. Too often
the man who reaches the top finds
that he has to work just as hard to
stay there as he did to get there.

He fights and struggles and toils,
always looking forward to some
time when he can retire and con-
sume with himself, and presently
before his chance comes, he dies,
and his life has been only half
lived.

For the things that give life a
rich, meaty flavor are not always
the things that come from the real-
ization of soaring ambition. They
are the little things. The signifi-
cance and beauty of life are sel-
dom realized in the heat of the
arena.

They come home to one in time

drowse, meditate and examine his
place in the world. An afternoon

driven forth with defective brakes
and trusting to Providence to have
them fixed? Have you ever spec-
ied by an intersection, or turned his
loose to see what they do? Do you
ever become so engrossed in a con-
versation of a scene that you forget
for a moment that you are at the
wheel? Then you are guilty of
criminal negligence. The time may
come when you will find out of
your own death this year that has been
caused by an automobile, and that ap-
parently was not due to the negli-
gence of the driver. But there have
been multiplied thousands of op-
portunities for fatalities on the
streets of this city, and many un-
disputed evidences of criminal care-
lessness in the handling of automo-
biles. A man or woman or child
killed by an automobile is just as
dead as if killed by a shotgun or
automatic pistol, and the person
responsible for it is guilty of man-
slaughter if the killing is a result
of carelessness. It is something
that automobile drivers ought to
be thinking about who know that
they may not be the next to be
plunged into a hell on earth by
the scuttling memory of a child's
deaths beneath the wheels of his
own automobile, or a mother's an-
guished cry as she picks up the
broken body of a baby crushed to
death by the tires of his car?"

WOMEN VOTERS GIVEN LEADER IN GOP PLANS

MRS. HART IS NAMED VICE CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL BOARD

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Not forgetting women voters in planning Secretary Hoover's campaign for the presidency, leaders of the early have assigned a prominent role to Mrs. Alvin T. Hart, as vice chairman of the national committee.

She has been called upon to organize activities of women campaign workers, a post which she filled in 1924, and turning at once to the eastern section of the country where an intensive drive for votes is planned. Mrs. Hart intends to call at an early date a meeting of national committee women from the Atlantic states for the purpose of mapping out a program.

Mrs. Hart represents Kentucky as the national committee and her home is at Louisville. In addition to her political work, she maintains an active connection with several business enterprises, with which her husband, who also was prominent politically, was identified.

Although finding time for a few callers, Secretary Hoover is busy this week clearing his desk and the committee department and settling the campaign affairs in order for his scheduled departure for the west Saturday night.

He is making no pronouncements on campaign issues and plans to make nine until he delivers on August 11 his speech accepting the nomination. This policy was revealed when a request for a statement of personal views on the subject of farm relief reached Mr. Hoover's headquarters from W. H. Little, president of the Indiana Bureau Federation.

Accepting the nomination, however, Mr. Hoover intends to speak at length on most of the problems of the campaign. Preparation for the eastern campaign are going steadily forward. Representative Tilson of Connecticut has been named to head an eastern speakers bureau. He will make his headquarters in New York and will work in co-operation with the main speakers bureau at Chicago.

The meeting of eastern political leaders, scheduled for Monday at New York was postponed yesterday until July 23, with the explanation that a conference on the earlier date seemed unnecessary.

At the same time, it was announced that Senator Curtis would formally notified of his nomination last week later than than than for the vice presidency on August 11, one week later than Secretary Hoover's official appeal of election by the Kansas City convention.

Realty, after advancing fractionally to 165-3/4, dropped to 162-1/8 before the end of the first half hour. General Motors slipped from an early high of 191 to 182-1/8. Wright Aeronautical extended its loss to 41-1/2 points and Kelly-Springfield 6 per cent preferred, Adams Express and Texas Pacific each dropped about 5 points. Foreign exchanges opened steady, with sterling cables, quoted unchanged at \$4.86-3/8.

Georgia Inquiry Goes To Capital

ATLANTA, July 12 (AP)—The senate's inquiry into republican patronage in Georgia was taken to Washington today where the sub-

DYING VETERAN OF WAR PINES FOR DOG, BUDDY

WANDERER TREATED AT HOUSTON BUT SLOWLY GIVING UP FIGHT

By CLARENCE M. WRIGHT (Associated Press Staff Writer)
HOUSTON, July 12.—Another chapter is being written here in the age old saga of friendship between man and dog.

The characters in this incident are Buddy, a friendly collie dog, and William R. Reid of Gulfport, Miss.

Reid served through the world war, and came home, his body racked by pains and his lungs ravaged by chlorine gas. Buddy came with him.

Found on Fire Escape
A free lance poet, and a sort of wandering philosopher who went from hospital to hospital in an endeavor to keep a little ahead of death, Reid came to Houston un-

announced. He was found one morning huddled up on a fire escape at the Jefferson Davis hospital. In his hand was a dog's collar with the name "Buddy" on it.

Reid refused to talk about himself, but he asked physicians and hospital attendants to find his Buddy. So far they have been unsuccessful, and physicians say the soldier's injuries are aggravated by disappointment.

Although Reid refuses to talk, the following about Buddy was found among his notes:

"Born in Edinburg, Scotland. Served two years in English army. Peculiar way about him. Couldn't be petted. Given to U. S. army with 14 other dogs, Buddy being sent to Hill 71 or 72. I, the undersigned, sergeant at the time.

"I took a liking to Buddy. He was allowed to return to the states with me by special permission of the colonel of my regiment. I took him to Texas with me and he turned out to be a watch dog.

Several habits acquired
"Buddy got several habits during the war, one of which is to prick up his ears when he hears a loud noise. I grab him at such times. He has turned out to be a real pal, and he and I have traveled together at all times. He will stand for a lot of foolishness about him. When he walks away, don't follow him.

"He is about 14 years old, can listen to the conversation of anyone and apparently understand it.

"He won several prizes in different states. From January 6 until April 3 he walked nearly 6,000 miles, stopping at intervals for food and rest.

"We have been so attached at times that Buddy would carry on and worry about me until we met again. At that time he was full of life and would growl if anyone came near me for fear I would leave him again.

The soldier says nothing, and doctors shake their heads as he sits, fingering Buddy's worn collar.

CIVIL WAR VETS PLAN BIG TIME AT CHRISTOVAL

SAN ANGELO, July 12.—Plans for the entertainment of some seventy civil war veterans, members of the Mountain Remnant Brigade, who will meet in reunion at Christoval, July 18, 19 and 20, are being completed by Frank C. Van Horn, of Christoval, chairman of the executive committee.

July 20 has been designated San Angelo day at the reunion, when members of the United Daughters of the Confederacy of this city will serve a chicken dinner for the veterans and have charge of the program for the day.

Christoval, Brady, San Angelo and Eldorado citizens are co-operating in making plans for the reunion.

Lon A. Smith, member of the Texas railroad commission, will speak to the reunion gathering on Wednesday, the opening day of the reunion. Ed S. McKarver, commander of the Sons of Confederate Veterans will attend the convention on Friday, the last day, and will take part on the program.

Mr. Van Horn, who is commander of the Tom Green Camp of Southern Confederate Veterans, has appointed Miss Elsie Hill as sponsor. Miss Nadell Welch and Miss Viola Harris as maids-of-honor, to serve on the official retinue at the reunion.

Seven men have been indicted for murder in the case. They are A. B. Wheeler, Charles Oldham, T. J. Reese, Howard Munton, T. T. Shuck, John Kent and Allen M. Kent. Wheeler, shortly after he was arrested, made a statement describing the lynching.

Powell, Wheeler said, was taken from the Jefferson Davis hospital by seven men, who sped out into the country with their victim. When they reached a bridge on the highway they tied a rope around Powell's neck and pushed him off the bridge. The statement declared the rope was too long and Powell, instead of hanging, was sitting on the bed of the dry creek underneath the bridge.

When his captors discovered that Powell had not been hanged, they pulled him back on to the bridge by the rope around his neck, shortened it and then kicked him off again, Wheeler said.

Then the band sped away in two automobiles.

The six men who now are to face trial were under arrest less than 48 hours after the lynching. The seventh man, Allen M. Kent, still is at liberty.

Second Lynched Recently
Powell's lynching was the second in as many months in Texas. Less than two months before, Buddy Evans, negro, was lynched by a mob of about 200 men at Center, where he had been taken from San Augustine following his capture by the son of the man he was charged with having shot. Evans was taken from officers at the door of the same jail and hanged from the same limb of an oak tree in the court house. Following his capture, Evans had been hanged several years before for an alleged attack upon a white woman.

The indictments against the seven Houston men charge first, that they killed Powell by hanging him, and second, that they killed him by beating him over the head with a blunt instrument. Powell's neck was not broken by the fall from the bridge and there were several wounds on his head.

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Had Given Up Hope
Captains Mariano and Zappi said that they had given up hope in what seemed to them their last agonizing moments in the icebound world that had become theirs in the Arctic.

The position of the party when the Krassin reached the men was 90.39 north latitude and 26.7 east longitude, a point some miles north of Prince Oscar Land and about 20 miles from Foyt Island.

SIX MEN TO GO TO TRIAL SOON FOR LYNCHING

HOUSTON CASE IS FIRST IN HALF CENTURY OF TEXAS LIFE

HOUSTON, July 12.—For the first time in half a century, six men are to go to trial here on July 18 for a lynching in Harris county.

The six men have been charged with murder in the lynching of Robert Powell, 24, negro, who was taken from a hospital on June 20 and hanged from a bridge eight miles from the business district of Houston.

Powell was suffering from a bullet wound in the stomach, said to have been inflicted in a gun fight in which City Detective A. W. Davis was wounded fatally. Davis was shot through the head. Powell was charged first with assault to murder and then with murder when Davis died.

Witnesses at the hospital, from which Powell was taken by the raiders, said there were eight men in the group. One of the witnesses, a negro orderly, in a statement to officers said that one of the lynchers wore what "seemed to be a uniform."

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NEW NORTH AND SOUTH HIGHWAY IN SCURRY SEEN

had operated a non-union plant, and had never been a farmer or laboring man.

The platform of the farmer-labor party adopted before nominations were made, did not make a specific declaration on the prohibition question, but declared for "an enforcement of all laws."

Norris' nomination was made after a report had been received from a correspondent, who has been directed to ascertain if the senator would accept. The reply read: "Negative absolute. Reconsideration impossible."

Planks in Platform
Other planks in the farmer-labor platform declared for farm relief with equalization fee, abolition of injunctions in labor disputes, public ownership of Boulder dam and Muscle Shoals, scrapping of all armaments, and a policy of non-interference in Latin-American disputes. A deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic was also approved.

While the prohibitionists took no action toward naming a candidate for president, the sentiment of leaders was that the party probably would endorse the candidacy of Herbert Hoover, either by direct section or by failure to nominate at all, thus leaving members of the party free to vote for the republican nominee.

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Announcement was made at the office of Senator Norris of Nebraska today that he would head no third party movement. The statement was made in connection with his nomination for the presidency at Chicago by the farmer-labor party.

In the absence of Senator Norris, his secretary stated that the senator had been approached by convention leaders in Chicago within the last few days regarding whether he would head a third tier.

The secretary asserted that the senator had definitely stated at the time that he would not accept such a nomination.

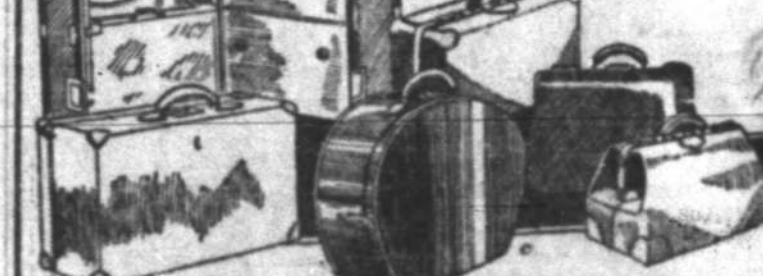

MOSES SAYS ADDRESS IS THREAT COMING EARLY IN RACE
