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HOME NOTES

Is your family budget somewhat restricted? Careful planning, shopping, storage, and food preparation can help save you money and nutrients.

Quickly refrigerate fresh foods. Frozen foods should be rushed right into the freezer and held at zero degrees until used. Food preparation methods that limit exposure time of freshly peeled or cut foods to the air, and cooking methods that prevent loss of vitamins and minerals, should be used. Meat should be cooked in a manner that prevents shrinkage. Moderate to

low temperature is usually preferable.

Fryers are the leading feature in most markets this week though a number of excellent values are available on hindquarter beef cuts as well as chuck roasts and steaks, round steak, ground beef and liver.

Weather has controlled the available supply of vegetables for several weeks. Head lettuce has improved in supply and quality though some stores are offering small heads. Cabbage, carrots, dry yellow onions, and turnips are the more economical choices. Fresh asparagus has made an appearance on some produce counters but it is high in price—a luxury choice that is only fair quality.

Bananas are one of the key fruits with many stores featuring them at bargain prices. Oranges continue in heavy supply, while grapefruit supplies are less and slightly higher prices are noted. Temple oranges are just about finished for this season. Apples, grapes and pears are coming from storage. Fresh strawberries are on the market, but supplies are light and prices are high.

Hamburger, that old American tradition, is still popular with the school-age set. Careful planning in the schools help hamburger keep its popularity. The School Lunch Division of the USDA Consumer and Marketing Services safeguards the quality of hamburger served to school children. In 1953, the USDA began buying hamburger for school lunches to reduce a beef surplus and provide lunches for millions of the nation's school children. Hamburger proved so popular that now schools spend 37½ percent of their meat dollar for ground beef. The beef which goes into hamburger is examined by C&MS personnel—usually a Federal grader—for freshness and grade of beef. Only certain parts of the beef may be used and the fat content for each lot must stay within a relatively narrow range. The ground beef must be packaged, frozen and shipped in accord with requirements designed to maintain quality and freshness. Random samples and chemical tests also help keep quality high for school lunch hamburger.

Today's children are fortunate when parents and teachers work together as a team for their best personal development. A teacher, to be really effective, must know something about the student's parents and home. The more she knows about the values, the problems, and interests within that home, the more helpful she can be as a teacher. When parents visit their child's classroom, it serves two purposes. It pleases the child, and enables the parents to see the teacher in action and learn something of what is expected of their child in school. They also learn something about the routine of the school and the other pupils. Much more can be done for the child's welfare when teachers and parents have more understanding of each other and the child. "You and the teacher can reduce pressure when this seems best. You can challenge the child to do his best and help him feel that he is achieving to match his abilities."

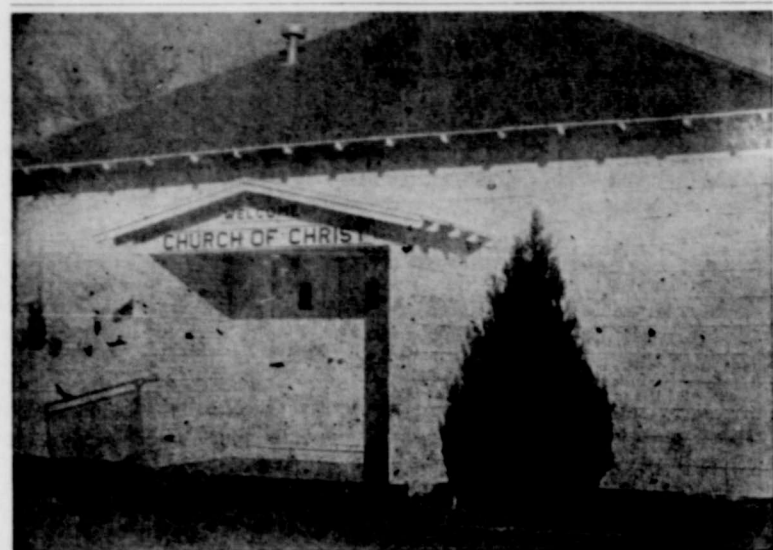

The computer service costs \$30 for each ASCS farm, but trial runs made at Texas A&M's Data Processing Center indicate the fee can be gotten back many times in better returns.

Growers using the tool should receive the computer analysis about one week after the information is received at Texas A&M.

For the analysis to be meaningful, information on such items as production expenses needs to be highly accurate.

Agricultural Meeting Is Planned Here

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has initiated a new electronic computer service which tells the land-use combinations and row-patterns likely to produce the highest net return under the current cotton program, reports Briscoe County Agent Leon Grosdidier.

The decision making tool will be explained in an educational meeting to be held March 10, at 2:00 p.m. in the county courtroom, he said.

At the session, which is open to all interested people, an Extension farm management specialist will be on hand to discuss the new system.

Grosdidier said farmers using the service fill out forms to submit information on such things as land, cotton allotment, other allotments, yields and production costs.

A set of forms, available at the county agent's office, is prepared for each plot of land designated as an "ASCS farm."

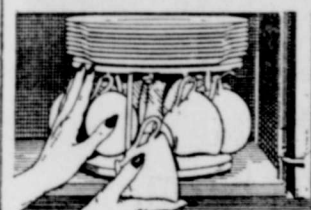

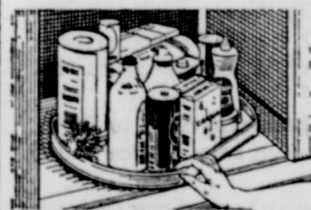

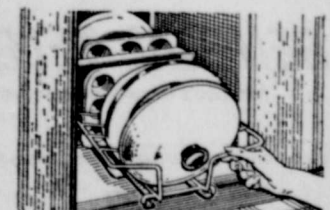

Public Schools Week

This week is Public Schools Week. If you haven't visited school yet, there is still an opportunity to visit today or tonight at open house. Open house will start at 5:30 p.m.

Public Schools Week is designed to give parents and interested members of the community an opportunity to see how the classes are being conducted and what the pupils are being taught.

At open house parents can see

examples of the children's work. It also gives an excellent opportunity to talk to the teachers to find out how the child is progressing. Such a talk can be enlightening and helpful to both the parents and the teachers.

Parents of school children and other interested adults should take advantage of this week. It can help them gain a better understanding of some of the problems that face the school, the teachers, their children and themselves.

Maintenance Tax Election Called

The cost of school operation has increased in proportion to the cost of living in the last few years and the Silverton School Board has now found it necessary, in order to have the proper type of school for the youth of the community, to increase the school maintenance tax.

The Board is interested in the school, and knows that it is necessary to have the proper equipment, the correct number of teachers, and quality teachers in order to have an accredited school.

The Board of Trustees—in order to accomplish this—wants the voters of the district to express their wish in a maintenance tax election on Saturday, April 2, 1966.

School districts, for further maintenance of public free schools, may levy an annual ad valorem tax not to exceed, in districts having a bonded indebtedness of 7 percent or less of its total assessed value of taxable property, \$1.50 on the \$100.00 assessed value of taxable property in the district. This would increase the rate from \$1.00 to \$1.50 for maintenance.

This does not necessarily mean that all of the 50-cent increase would be used. The Board sets the rate at the amount necessary to meet the annual budget. This could be at any point between \$1.00 and \$1.50 maintenance rate.

The needed maintenance would be secured by increasing the assessed value of property.

The Board believes the best way is to first let the voters express their view in the Maintenance Tax Election.

American Heritage Contest Winners Are Named

Winners of the American Heritage essay and poster contests have been chosen.

First place in the essay contest was awarded to Vicki Vaughan, a sophomore, for her paper "Slaves of Green Briar." Second place went to Cleo Ivory, a junior, for her paper "History," and third place went to Jimmy Burson, a junior, for his paper "The Causes of the Spanish-American War."

Twelve entries were submitted and the above papers were selected on the basis of writing style and content.

"Slaves of Green Briar" related the living conditions experienced by slaves on a plantation known as Green Briar. The "History" theme revealed how history is written, and concluded that history is whatever historians wish it to be.

Jimmy's paper was devoted to the causes of a war which has been labeled by many authorities as "unnecessary" and "imperialistic."

Twenty-two posters were entered, and of these the one by Richard McCutchen of the American Declaration of Independence was judged best. Several hours were spent in duplicating the famous document down to the individual signatures.

Second place went to Janie Hooten for her four freedoms poster on which were illustrated the freedoms of religion, press, assembly and speech.

Tina Weaver won third place with her colorful poster of the American flag which was captioned "Our forefathers were willing to die for this—are you?"

The first place winners in both contests will receive \$5.00. Second place winners get \$3.00 and third place winners receive \$2.00. The posters and essays are on display in the history room.
