Electing of Eleven Wet Candidates May Bring Light Wine and Beer

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Proposals for legislation modifying the Volstead Act with respect to the sale of beer and light wines were regarded today at the treasury department as being extremely likely as a result of the outcome of elections held throughout the nation Tuesday, in which some states expressed a preference for beer and light wines.

Secretary Mellon was reported as holding that the treasury's policy for a strict enforcement of the prohibition laws would continue until congress changed the laws and made them so as to permit a sale of beer and wine.

Returns yesterday were said to indicate that the sentiment in several states favored a modification of the prohibition laws, with a number of congressional candidates who favor such modification being elected.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Eleven avowedly wet candidates for congress were elected, and nine wets were defeated in the Middle Western states.

The beer and wine proposition was defeated in Ohio, but won in Illinois. California defeated the prohibition enforcement act. Massachusetts voted against harmonizing state laws with the Volstead Act. New Jersey elected a wet

senator, and Missouri elected a wet senator. Both are democrats, former Governor Edwards from New Jersey, and Senator James A. Reed from Missouri was re-elected over Brewster, his republican dry opponent.

DECORATIVE VEILS ADD ALLUREMENTS TO HATS



IT IS the whim of designers often to use the veil on new millinery, for veiling or decorating the hat, instead of the face. They add it as a coquettish allurement to millinery already fascinating. Perhaps they have pondered Shakespeare's "Why veil the rose's bloom?" or perhaps they have determined that veils are more becoming as a background than as a screen for the features of beauty. Anyway, they have found new ways of placing it on all sorts of fall and winter headwear and a few of them are shown in the group of hats pictured here.

The face veil is not left out of the season's reckoning by any means, but it is another story. Women experiment with the new weaves, meshes and colors and buy their face veils at the same time that they buy their street hats—if they wear veils at all. Their choice is all a matter of becomingness. It is the business of the face veil to enhance the becomingness of the hat, to contribute to neatness of appearance and to protect the complexion. This season's face veils are mostly fine-meshed affairs inconspicuous and delicate, many of them without borders. A bordered face veil appears in the group of decorative

veils at the bottom of the picture. It entirely covers a soft, felt street hat and corresponds with its simple trimming—merely a collar of ribbon decorated with a delicate braid.

At the top of the group a pretty hat of dark colored velvet, with brim facing of lighter color, is brightened by circles of iridescent beads on the crown. A heavy, square-meshed silk veil is drawn about the brim, falling in a narrow curtain over the eyes and trailing off at the back. There are several lovely color combinations for this model. To the right, a wide-brimmed dress hat is veiled with Spanish lace that slips through the transparent brim and falls from its edge. A spirited tricorne, at the left, with facing of black batter's plush, and covering of black and silver brocade, is curiously draped with a black silk veil having silver ribbon as a decoration for its edges. There is much artistry in the placing of decorative veils, and no end of ingenuity in their arrangement on the season's wonderful millinery.

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DEMOCRATS GAINING ON G. O. P.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The congressional standing at a late hour today, with the third Kansas district still missing, gives the republicans 224 and the democrats 207.

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Returns from all but three congressional districts where results are still undetermined at noon today show 224 republicans, 205 democrats, 1 socialist, 1 independent, and 1 farm-labor candidate elected. The latest figures show that the next senate will have 52 republicans and 41 democrats, and one farm-laborer.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Continued republican control of congress appeared today as the net result of Tuesday's election throughout the nation, with returns almost complete. However, the republican senate majority appeared cut in two, and the House majority of 160 held by the republicans for the last two years, has been reduced to a mere handful.

The returns from Montana today sent the republicans over the top in the House contest. The roll now stands: republicans 220, democrats 205, farm-labor 1, independent 1.

Democratic senators were elected in Utah, New Mexico, Montana, and late returns showed only two contests remaining doubtful, these being in Washington and North Dakota, where the democrats are slightly leading.

Rev. Vincent S. Klosek is the new priest at Olfen, succeeding Rev. Josef Meiser, who left that parish under unpleasant circumstances some time ago. Rev. Klosek was in the city Thursday making acquaintances. He is a different type of man from his predecessor, and bids fair to make friends with the people here. Rev. Klosek comes from Lockhart to Kunnels county, and he has been in Texas for quite a while, coming to this state from Baltimore. He announced that the new church at Olfen would be dedicated on the 16th of this month.

The lack of information was the result of the cutting of the Mediterranean cable near Chanak by the Turks, who are refusing to allow the cable companies to make repairs.

A large number of small poppies have been secured to sell on Armistice Day. These will also be sold at the American Legion dance Friday night at the Ballinger Club rooms. The small flowers sold at the buyer's own price, all of the funds thus received being used by the local chapter and the state organization for the relief and aid of wounded and disabled soldiers.

LEAGUE APPOINTS A NOMINATING COMMITTEE

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League Monday night, the directors instructed President Guin to appoint a nominating committee to select directors and associate directors for the commercial organization for the ensuing year. CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The soldiers bonus bill will be re-introduced in congress by Congressman Britten, of Illinois, he announced here today. Mr. Britten said that the bill would have additional provision to pay the bonus by levying a tax on light wines and beer.

The representative said that this provision would be drafted to supercede the Volstead Act in defining intoxicating liquor.

FOUR BILLS IN FEDERAL COURT

Four indictments were returned by the federal grand jury at San Angelo this week, and a number of cases disposed of by pleas of guilty and by convictions. Frank Philip, who was arrested near Rowena for possessing equipment for making booze, plead guilty and was fined \$25. Vine Slenarik and Joe Philip, who were charged jointly with Frank Philip, were released. The San Angelo Standard reports the court proceedings as follows:

Four indictments, charging conversion of United States funds, blackmail, violation of the Harrison anti-narcotic law and theft of postoffice moneys at Star, Mills county, were returned by the grand jury and two pleas of guilty to liquor charges were entered Wednesday morning in United States court for the San Angelo division of the Northern district of Texas.

E. R. Hays, of Abilene, plead guilty to the possession of intoxicating liquors and was fined \$200. Hays and Ed Floyd were arrested at Sonora in January 1922, and Hays was charged with having had 153 quarts of tequila at the time. The case against Floyd is pending. Frank Philip, plead guilty to possession in Rannels county of equipment for the illicit manufacture of liquor and was fined \$25. Cases against Vine Slenarik and Joe Philip, who were charged jointly with Frank Philip, were dismissed.

Albert Miller, clerk in the Brownwood postoffice, was indicted for fraudulently obtaining and converting to his own use \$33.95. Roy E. White was billed for attempting to blackmail Cameron Marshal at Brownwood in letters written September 8 and 11, demanding that Marshal produce \$500 in lieu of withholding certain information "of unlawful and immoral acts and crimes" which White pretended to possess and threatened to divulge. White demanded that the money be left in an envelope on the mountain where the reservoir is located in

Brownwood.

Frank Scott and John Kyle were indicted for selling morphine in Brown county without paying the special tax to the collector of internal revenue which is required of licensed dealers in opium or cocoa leaves. The offense is alleged to have been committed June 1, 1921, and involved 120 quarter grain tablets of morphine. Walter Reeves was indicted for the theft of funds totaling \$1,538.68 from the postoffice at Star, Mills county, on December 1, 1920, and on various dates prior to October 7, last year.

DRILL WORKING IN SAFETY FIRST

O. Wilson, driller in charge of Safety First well three miles West of Ballinger, states that operations at the well are again underway and drilling will be carried on with a day shift until the funds are sufficient to justify employing a double crew and operating day and night.

A short time ago Mr. Wilson completed his original contract on this test, the contract calling for a 3100 foot hole. The well is down 3180 and in formation which promises an oil field. The funds played out and Mr. Wilson proposed to drill the well to a depth of 3500 or 4000 feet, if local people would assist in financing the work, and a committee was put out to raise \$6,000, which it was figured would take the well down to 4,000 feet. The committee raised about \$2,000, on acreage which it is believed can be negotiated and made to finance the work to a greater depth. The committee asked for 3,000 acres, and it is believed that there are others who will aid in the work when they realize the importance of putting this well down to a greater depth.

"We will make a report of just what progress we are making every few days," said Mr. Wilson, "and will show the character of formation we are in."

Mr. Wilson is charging only for actual expenses in completing the well, making no charge for his tools and equipment, and his helpers are subscribing to the fund to help complete the well, they are so confident that they will strike oil. Oil or no oil, it would be a bad piece of business to plug the well, and abandon it in its present stage, with a rig and everything ready to complete the test.

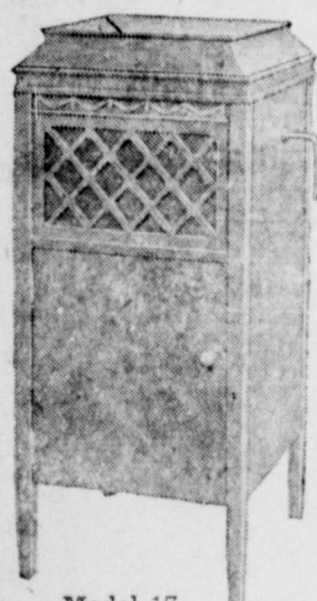

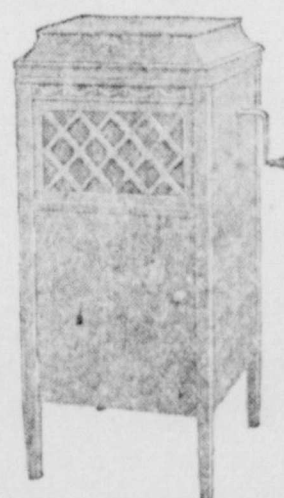

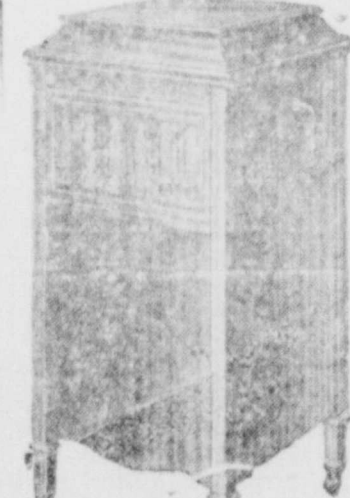

The registration for Dallas county was 36,773; Harris county, 32,573; Bexar county, 29,360; Tarrant county, 22,948.

She seemed slightly embarrassed and said something to the effect that as she did not know the gentleman she could not give a definite answer. Meeting the Chinese minister at an "at home" a few days later, she scolded him for his bluntness, and he excused himself by saying that he was actuated by the best of motives.

A few months afterward Wu received an invitation from the young lady's parents to attend her marriage. The bridegroom was the young man who had figured in the unconventional incident. To Wu's agreeable surprise the mother of the bride informed him that it was he who had first brought the young couple together, and both bride and bridegroom heartily thanked him for his good offices.

EXCITED WRATH OF DICKENS

Great Writer, at His Best, Denounced Public Hangings, Which Were Disgrace to English Law.

Charles Dickens, at the time of the execution of Manning and his wife for the murder of Patrick O'Connor, was at his fullest power as a writer. In a letter to the London Times he wrote: "I believe that a slight so inconceivably awful as the wickedness and levity of the immense crowd collected at the execution this morning could be imagined by no man, and presented by no heathen land under the sun. The horrors of the gibbet and the crime which brought the wretched murderers to it faded in my mind before the atrocious bearing, looks and language of the assembled spectators. When I came upon the scene at midnight the shrillness of the cries and howls that were raised from time to time, denoting that they came from a concourse of boys and girls already assembled in the best places, made my blood run cold. When the two miserable creatures who attracted all this ghastly sight about them were turned quivering into the air, there was no more emotion, no more pity, no more thought that two immortal souls had gone to judgment, no more restraint in any of the previous obscenities, than if the pang of Christ had never been heard in this world, and there were no belief among men but that they perish like the beasts."

Lao-tze Wrote Gospel of Taoism.

Lao-tze wrote the gospel of Taoism, from whose pages an immense religion grew up. Having been librarian of a Chinese king, and having much time for meditation, he came after many years to the conclusion that humility was the supreme virtue. He resigned, and desired to hide in seclusion. While passing through the gate of the palace on his way to solitude the warder besought him: "You are about to withdraw yourself from the world. I pray you write me a book before you go."

Lao-tze thereupon sat down and wrote a book about half the size of St. Mark's gospel. He gave this to the warder, passed through the gate and no man knows where he died. The little book is the gospel of Taoism. The word "Tao" means way—man of destiny. The advice was that men should become like little children and act without reflection.

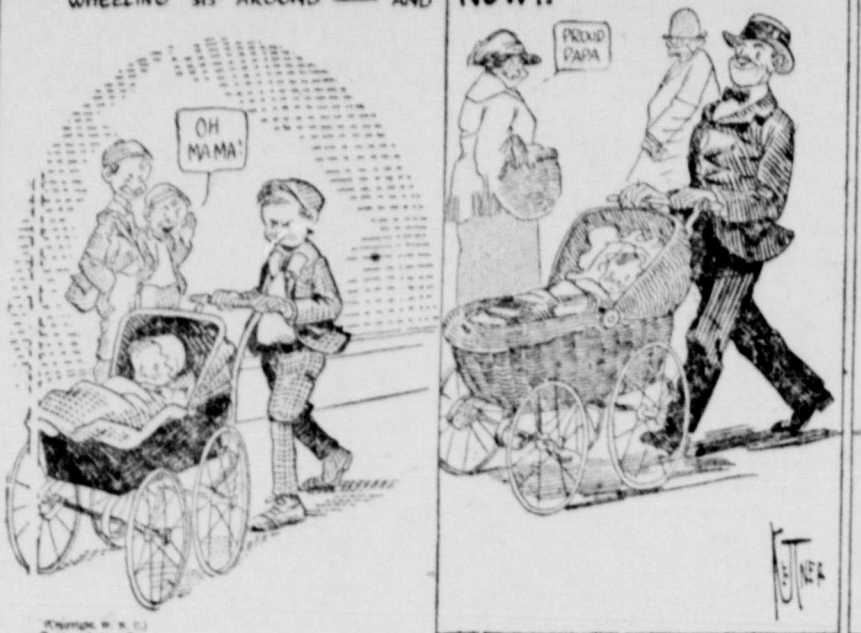

TEXAS LEADS IN FEDERAL AID ON STATE HIGHWAYS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 9.—Texas has the largest federal appropriation for highway construction of any state in the Union, according to the State Highway Commission. Federal appropriation for Texas highways amounts in round numbers to \$31,000,000, and ten per cent of all completed federal aid highways are in this state.

Texas has completed 1,470 miles at a cost of \$17,009,664, as compared with 14,852 miles of completed federal roads for the entire nation.

Annual Report of Y. M. B. L. Being Sent to All Members

In order that each member may have time to review the work of the Young Men's Business League during the last two years, before the banquet Friday night, a copy of the biennial report is being mailed to each member today.

The present month marks the close of over two years organized progressive activity in this city, and the report mailed to each member reviews the work, and makes a good showing for the organization.

Time and space forbid publishing the report in full, but it is presented to each member in such shape that only a short time will be required to read it. The report is given under sub-heads of agricultural activity, trade extension, civic improvement, education, highways and touring, streets, industries and public utilities, conventions and celebrations, retail credits, irrigation, service, publicity and advertising, and it deals with ninety-three items.

Under the head of agriculture the most important items handled, and handled very successfully are the poultry show, county fair, and aid given farmers by the league.

In trade extension work the league reviews its activities in handling propositions, tended to increase trade here, bringing to Ballinger trade from a distance, and arranging special trades days, etc., and special advertising campaigns which resulted most successfully. Nine different items are emphasized under this division of the work.

The league reviews its activities in aiding in civic work of the city, dealing with the movement for white way lighting system, park and street work, clean-up campaigns, support of band, etc.

During the life of the organization the efforts of the league have been devoted to aiding in educational work in connection with summer schools, teachers' institutes, support of increased tax rate for school, support of library and health work in schools.

The league has aided greatly in good roads work, establishing of highways thru Ballinger, marking of highways, printing of maps, providing tourist grounds, and advertising Ballinger as a desirable place for tourists to stop, and distribution of literature adver-

tising the highways passing thru this city.

The Y. M. B. L. has taken the lead and vigorously supported the bond issue for street paving, and carried on a campaign for creating sentiment favoring better streets, better lights.

The organization fostered the municipal light plant, the Citizens Ice Company, water works improvements, and repeatedly made an effort to locate a flour mill here, and encouraged the public to use made-in-Ballinger products.

The Retail Merchants Association has been maintained in connection with the Y. M. B. L. and thru this organization the local merchants have been kept posted on credits, and the association has handled many bad checks in such way as to save the merchants considerable money. More than \$2500 in "cold" checks have been recovered by the association.

The Y. M. B. L. is devoting much time to promoting the Colorado irrigation project, which will mean so much to this city and county. This is one of the big items on the program and most of the members are familiar with what has been done along this line towards completing the surveys, preliminary work, etc.

The last, but by no means least, a publicity program has been carried out which has made Ballinger better known throughout the state and nation. Many daily papers, magazines, and other publications have carried matter about Ballinger which has attracted much attention. Through exhibits at fairs, and through hundreds of columns of reading matter Ballinger and Runnels county have been given the greatest publicity in their history, and at present one thousand extra copies of The Banner-Ledger are going into the homes of people in the Ballinger trade territory, which will be of permanent good and mutual benefit, as many of these readers will become regular subscribers to the weekly paper.

Notwithstanding that the last two years have in many respects been the most trying on the commercial world, the local commercial organization has weathered the storms, and kept sails flying for the betterment of Ballinger, and a review of the work makes a

wonderful showing. Every member should study closely the reports being placed in the mail.

Money Was Used in Relief and Rehabilitation Following Disasters in the District.

During the fiscal year 1921-22, ending June 30th, the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross expended \$730,306.79 in disaster relief. Part of this came from the National Red Cross funds secured from memberships, part from chapters and parts from individual contributions. This money was expended in disasters in various parts of the division, especially in the flood areas along the west bank of the Mississippi, in Missouri and Arkansas, in Texas around Fort Worth, and in the Rio Grande Valley, at Burlington, Kan., and at Pueblo, Colo.

The greatest amount of time and effort in any of these disasters went into the rehabilitation of Pueblo and of the district covered by the Rio Grande Valley flood of last June, according to a report from the Southwestern Division, American Red Cross, in St. Louis. Fifteen hundred and ten families were affected by that flood.

The manner in which the Red Cross undertakes these disasters depends upon the conditions to be met. In some cases the local chapters and citizens' committees take charge and the division office goes in an advisory capacity. In others the situation is reversed, and in still others the work is handled jointly by the Red Cross and the citizens.

Relief work in the Rio Grande Valley flood, which was the last disaster of real importance in the division, has been practically closed and the auditing committee, as well as the advisory committee, with the Red Cross director, Henry M. Baker, are compiling their reports, to be submitted to the citizens and to the division. The wide area affected in this disaster has caused the work to be continued longer than would have been necessary. It is believed, but that it has been thoroughly done and has created friendship for the Red Cross among the citizens of the section is evidenced by the letters received at the division office.
