WACO QUIET AFTER BURNING NEGRO

STORM CARRIES LETTER 24 MILES

A page from a letter written to Raby Padgett at Austin by his father, W. T. Padgett, of Ballinger, was picked up in a corn field near Bales, Texas, forty-two miles from Austin, this week.

L. A. Guin, a farmer, picked up the written page, which did not bear the address of the writer, further than that the letter was written on stationery of W. L. Brown, tax collector, of Runnels county, and Mr. Guin having a curiosity to know how the letter reached his corn field, wrote Mr. Brown, enclosing the sheet. Mr. Guin stated that he found the letter while plowing in his corn field.

It developed that the letter was blown from the home of Raby Padgett when the storm destroyed his home at Austin a short time ago, and was carried forty-two miles by the wind, and dropped in the field near Bales.

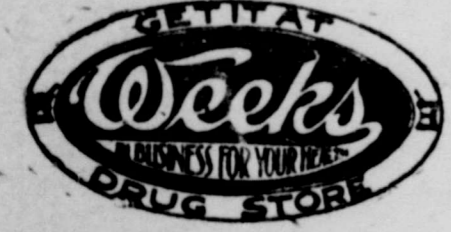

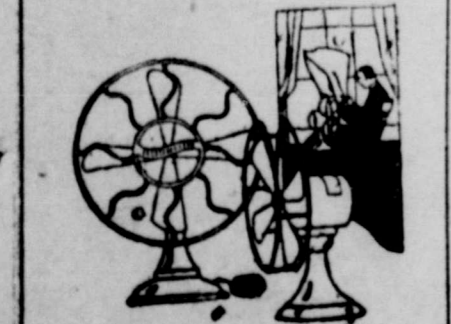

SODERMAN GET 5 YEARS IN PEN

DALLAS, May 27.—David E. Soderman was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury last night and sentenced to five years in the pen, following a trial for the fatal shooting of Jay Clay Powers in a local hotel on April 18th of this year. Attorneys for Soderman announced that a motion for a new trial would be filed shortly.

Soderman plead the unwritten law, claiming that Powers won Soderman's wife's affections, while the state offered testimony to show that the killing was the outgrowth of a business transaction. Powers and Soderman were formerly in the hotel business together.

FINAL WORDS ON REPARATION

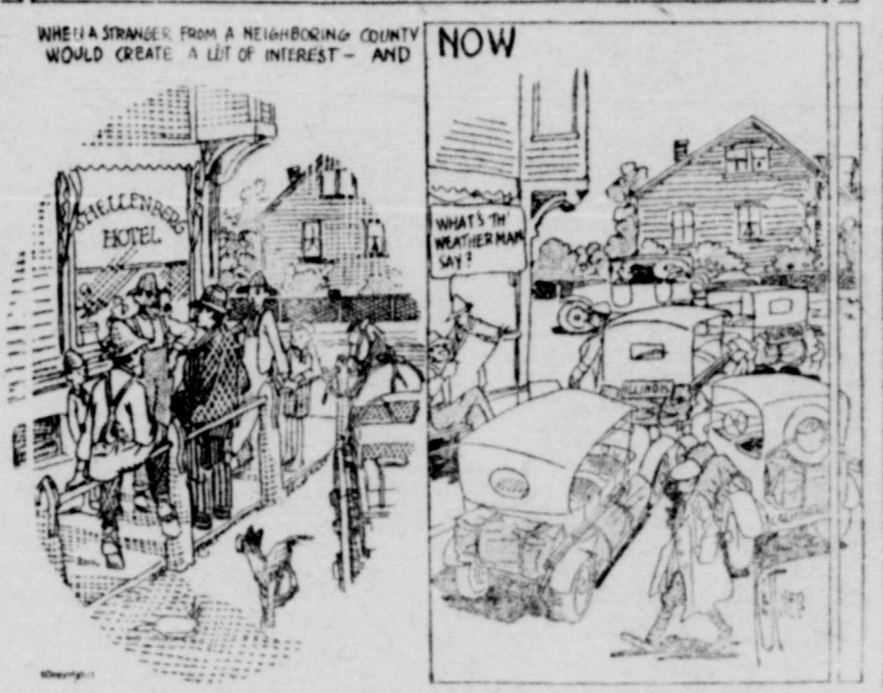

ENCAMPMENT OF NATL. GUARD SET

AUSTIN, May 27.—Adjutant General Barton has announced the dates of this year's annual encampment of the Texas National Guard, to be held at Camp Mabry, near Austin.

PROGRAM FOR MEMORIAL DAY

Flowers will be placed on the graves of all war dead at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon, and at eight o'clock the various churches of the city will join in a memorial service at the Methodist church.

People who wish to assist the decorating committee are requested to meet in the cemetery at 2-45, and those who can supply flowers are requested to have them in the hands of the committee by that hour, delivering them at the cemetery where the committee will be present to receive them.

A brief program will be carried out at Evergreen Cemetery, and the crowd will not be held together long. Twenty-five graves have been marked for decoration, and those who know of any others which might have been overlooked should notify the American Legion and have the graves marked with a flag.

Rev. Jesse Mitchell will deliver the memorial sermon, and he has announced as his subject, "The Most Excellent Sacrifice." The program for the evening hour will be as follows, with perhaps a minor change or two:

SAYS ELECTION IS A LEGAL ONE

City Attorney Doss today rendered an informal decision on the question raised in regard to the holding of the street paving election on May 30th, which happens to fall on a holiday. Several advocates of the plan of paving which the election order provides for feared that May 30 being Decoration Day would make an election held on that day invalid, but as the law is silent on that point it was decided that it would not invalidate the result of the election.

At this time no opposition is being expressed against the proposition, and to all outward appearances the voters will decide for the co-operative paving plan. Nothing now remains but for every citizen to exercise his inalienable franchise, go to the polls and vote his preference.

Those who favor the co-operative plan point out that it will give the city over twice as much paving yardage as could be secured otherwise; that it will not burden any property owner, as the payment may be stretched out over a period of years, and it will enable the citizens on any particular street to go ahead with the paving of their section of the city without reference to other parts of the city. It is doubtful if this could be done with bond issues, especially in the residence district for the conflicting interests of property owners on various streets would defeat an issue to pave one street to the exclusion of others.

The final and clinching argument advanced is that this plan is in vogue in practically every Texas city which is paving on a large scale, and which is planning for future paving.

QUEER QUESTION PUT TO SALVATION ARMY MAN

"I am writing to ask you how much it would cost to insure the contents of my two grand children during their voyage from England."

With the risk of a rough voyage, Staff Captain Marburg doubts if any insurance company would care to even consider issuing a policy.

WACO, May 27.—Sam Harris, father of the young woman who was assaulted by a negro, and who shot Jesse Thomas to death yesterday after his daughter had identified the negro as the one who assaulted her, appeared at the office of Constable Stegall this morning and offered to surrender to the officer. No complaint has been filed against him, but the constable took him to the office of the county attorney, who said there was no complaint against him and he was released.

WACO, May 27.—Hank Johnson, the negro who was arrested yesterday in connection with the killing of Harrel Bolton and assaulting of Mrs. Maggie Hayes is still in jail under guard, and the officers will investigate his possible connection with the shooting of William Cottrell and Mrs. Marjorie Sheffield in the Cameron Park about ten days ago.

The relatives of Thomas have presented strong evidence that he was at home on the date of the shooting and could not have been the guilty man. Constable Stegall and Chief of Police Jenkins express the conviction that Johnson is the guilty one and Stegall declared that he would not release him until his innocence was established.

ALBRIGHT MAKES SHORT SPEECH

Despite the fact that the court house lawn was not lighted up Friday evening for the speaking of Ernest G. Albright, candidate for congress, about one hundred people gathered on the lawn and listened to a brief talk by Mr. Albright.

It was announced that the speaking would be on the court house lawn, and the seats were arranged, but at the last minute it developed that the band stand, which is used for the speaker's rostrum, had not been wired since the city put in its light plant and there was no "juice" to make lights, and it was too late to have the wiring done.

Mr. Albright announced to the crowd that he would not impose on them by asking them to repair to the court room, and he made a brief talk, stating that he would return here at a later date and address the people when they were not so busy.

In his brief talk Mr. Albright outlined some of the planks in his platform declaring that he favored restriction of immigration tax on imported oils, and among commodities to be taxed he included pecans, stating that imported nuts were shipped into Texas in competition to the Texas pecan, the best in the world.

The speaker said that he favored the immediate passage of adjusted compensation for ex-service men. He pointed to the advantage of the Federal bank, that it had done in saving the country from bankruptcy. He opposes the anti-lynching bill, saying that if we wish to stop racial prejudices congress must cease discussing such legislation as this bill.

Mr. Albright declared that he was making a clean campaign and would not discuss the records of his opponents, saying that he was not running on the demerits of any opponent.

YAQUI INDIANS TUAN ROBBERS

TOMBSTONE, Ariz., May 27.—Wholesale murders and robberies by the Yaqui Indians in Sonora were reported today by additional American refugees arriving here from the Yakui Valley. So far no Americans have been reported killed by the band of Indians who are looting the homes and murdering other people. The Americans have escaped.

WACO, May 27.—Waco is quiet this morning after one of the wildest days and nights in its history. Excitement and disorder incident to the killing and burning of Jesse Thomas, negro, age 23, here late yesterday, virtually had ceased early today, giving the distracted populace an opportunity to reflect on the events of the wildest days ever witnessed in the city.

Sam Harris, father of the woman whom the negro assaulted, killed the negro late yesterday, after which a mob seized his body and dragged it through the streets of Waco, and it was charred to a cinder in a fire lighted by the angry mob.

The entire police force, county officers and rangers were called out to guard the McLennan county jail and protect five negroes who are in jail charged with murder.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., May 27.—

Newton Lagrand, of Tahquah, who was being brought to Muskogee by a Deputy Sheriff for safe keeping after he had been arraigned in the Tahquah court on a charge of brutally whipping his six year old step-daughter, was seized by a mob at Hultbert, twenty miles east of here late last night and severely whipped. The mob was not masked and went about the thrashing in an orderly manner.

BUMS WAY TO TRACK MEET

CHICAGO, May 27.—Jim Draper, of Georgetown, Texas, a high school lad, who bummed his way here on freight trains to take part in the National Inter-scholastic track meet at the University of Chicago, entered the contest today.

The lad qualified for the contest in his home state, but had no funds to make the trip here. He selected what change he had to pay for his "cats," and boarded a freight train and started on the trip to Chicago.

He succeeded in getting here without much trouble, and if he is the first to break the tape in the hundred yard dash he will not have to bum his way back home. A group of local sportsmen told him if he won they would see that he returned home in a Pullman.

PARTY SPLIT ON CLOTURE RULE

The disagreement was so broad that it was stated that no progress was made at the conference, and the meeting adjourned until next Wednesday.

UNIVERSITY LOAN FUND JUSTIFIES EXISTENCE

AUSTIN, May 27.—During the ten years of its existence the loan fund operated by the engineering department of the University of Texas has never had a debit and has never lost a cent on a loan.

This fund is maintained by donations of the students engineers and any surplus funds of the department. No outsider is allowed to contribute to the fund; it is strictly an engineer proposition.

Its purpose is to help engineering students through the University. All loans are limited to \$200 to one student and there is no time limit. In the past, however, all loans have been repaid within two years. The student's signature is all the security required.

The loan fund is operated by a board of trustees of engineering students and faculty members.

MEANING OF WORD "APOCALYPSE" BASED ON A BIBLE STORY

What is the significance of the word "Apocalypse?"

The question has been propounded so often in connection with the Rex Ingram production for Metro of the world-famous novel, "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," by Vicente Blasco Ibanez, coming to the Maeroy Theatre Monday and Tuesday, that Webster must be called upon for an answer.

Webster's definition of the word is "a revelation; a disclosure." In the early Greek version of the Bible, the last book of the New Testament was called "The Apocalypse of St. John." In the later versions of the Bible the book became the "Revelations."

Pronunciations of the word, which also is shown by numerous correspondents of Metro's as an all but unsurmountable stumbling block, has been solved by Webster by placing the emphasis on the second syllable.

Visualizing the symbolic figures of "The Four Horsemen" had its foundation in Albrecht Durer's original set of wood etchings, done in the year 1511. The original wood-cuts form but a small feature of a collection of art treasures that are seen in the production. The total value set by insurance appraisers upon the tapestries, paintings and other borrowed art works is \$450,000.

The actual production of the picture, including salaries, etc., is said to have slightly exceeded \$1,000,000, using 2,500 extras, and over a dozen high-salaried motion picture stars, technical and research experts, a battery of camera men, etc.

SPECIALIZE ON CHINCH BUGS

Particular Reason Why Farmers Should Act to Protect the Bobwhite Quail From Hunters.

Every shot fired this season at the bobwhites that are wintering in your fields is a shot at your pocketbook, says Farm and Ranch. Quails destroy millions of hibernating bugs that would otherwise awake in the spring to fall hungrily upon the product of field and garden.

"While you fight the chinch bug, redouble your efforts to increase bobwhite quails," says A. C. Burill of the Missouri College of Agriculture. "They are said to eat from 500 to 1,000 chinch bugs at a meal, and their stomachs crave another meal every two hours. At least, this is the usual rate of digestion in most insect-eating birds. Quails are the only wild birds which specialize on chinch bugs in the winter season."

To protect the bobwhite the most effective plan is for several farmers cooperatively to publish a notice in the county papers forbidding hunters to shoot quails on their premises. This has been done successfully in several Missouri communities. Many county papers are running such notices properly drawn up by a lawyer and kept standing in the paper throughout the hunting season. In such cases the publishers will add the name of any farmer in the county and keep it there for, say, 50 cents for the season.

TO USE ARMORED TRUCKS TO FOIL PAYROLL ROBBERS

ST. LOUIS, May 27.—Armored motor trucks with placements for riot guns are to be used in transporting money from bank to bank or to factories for payrolls as a result of the numerous payroll and bank messenger robberies here.

Armored guards will ride inside the trucks, which also will carry safes as an added precaution to insure the safety of the money. The armor on the trucks will be one quarter of an inch thick.

"Army" Tests for Collegians.

That the results of regular academic tests do not clash with the results of psychological tests, but accord with them, is shown by comparison of the grades made by Penn state college students in both kinds of examinations. For the last two years freshmen have been given the army, Thurstone and Binet-Simon tests and these results compared later with their academic ratings. Invariably those students who made low averages in the psychological tests were low in their college work. Of 67 students, based on an account of poor scholarship, last year the average for the "alpha" test was 118, while the general average of the students is 131. Of the three types of psychological tests tried the results of the army test have proved to be the best indication of the grade of work a student will do in college.

Brazilian Air Lines.

Brazilian senators have reported favorably upon a bill proposing the establishment of two aviation lines between Rio de Janeiro and Porto Alegre, which are to be started before September of 1922. According to the United States naval attaché in Rio de Janeiro, one of the routes will be laid along the coast, carried out by hydroplanes and maintained and directed by the ministry of marine; the other will traverse the interior of the country to the west of the coast range of mountains and will be continued by airplanes under the direction of the ministry of war. The routes will pass through the most important political, industrial and commercial centers, wherever possible.

Retrieved That Gold Piece.

While in the station in Brussels in Belgium, my friend was intent upon getting tickets for the Waterloo battlefield. Not being able to talk much French and trying to speak her best, she in her excitement dropped a \$5 gold piece without noticing it. It slipped quietly down her dress. A Frenchman stood within reach of the window, and at once planted his foot upon it. As my friend turned from the window I was nonplussed what to do to recover the coin. I yielded to the impulse of this moment, as I had to act quickly. Stopping I took the man by the trouser leg, gave the leg a quick lift, and so reclaimed our coin. All looked surprised, not a word was spoken, my friend and I were in possession of the coin, and the Frenchman was outwitted.—Chicago Journal.

PRESBYTERIANS TO JOIN COUNCIL

T. S. Lankford, who is attending the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church at Des Moines, Iowa, writes that he and Mrs. Lankford are having a pleasant sojourn at the big convention, notwithstanding that it is raining most of the time. He writes that the Assembly is a great meeting and many important matters have come before the Presbyterian leaders, one being that of the union of a union of all Presbyterian churches, and he sends the following account of this part of the proceedings of the assembly as published by the Capital, Des Moines leading daily newspaper.

"Commissioners to the Presbyterian general assembly in session at the Coliseum were treated to a surprise today which took them off their feet figuratively speaking, when a telegram was read from the Presbyterian church (South) in session at Charleston, W. Va., accepting the verdict of the churchmen here, and expressing a willingness to join the general council of the Presbyterian and Reformed churches of America.

"It was declared that this is the first concession toward a closer union of Presbyterian churches ever made by the Southern branch. The Southerners, up to today, were the only Presbyterians which had steadily refused to join the general council and just a few days ago had submitted a counter proposition of another organization to be known as the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America.

"This was rejected by the commissioners here as being a less desirable body than the general council. While the general council is only a federation of the various branches, the concession made by the Southern Presbyterians, it is felt, will pave the way for ultimate organic union.

"So great was the enthusiasm when the proposition of the Southern church was read, that the commissioners sprang to their feet, and sang, 'Blest Be the Tie That Binds.'"
