OLD CLOTHES AND RAGS WANTED IN WAR PROGRAM

A two weeks' drive for salvage of old clothes and rags begins Monday in Hale county, C. B. Martin, county agent, states. The Agriculture building in Plainview will be collecting center for the campaign.

The clothing is for use in foreign and domestic relief and for war purposes. It is needed for rehabilitation of peoples in countries that have been, and will be liberated. Such articles as coats, sweaters, pants, slacks, skirts, pajamas, night gowns, robes, men's shirts, overalls, coveralls, work jackets, woolen gloves, mittens and scarfs are needed for men, women, girls, boys and infants. Leather goods are not desired by the government for these uses. Any clothing not fit for wear can be used as rags.

Rural communities and towns over the county may see fit to establish their own central collecting places in the drive, but all salvage material of this type is to be turned over to the county collection center in Plainview for shipment to needed points.

Clothing as well as rags should be clean on delivery to the collection centers.

Andy Reid and Mrs. Flake Paschal, as members of the local council of the Hale County Agriculture Victory committee, are asked by Martin to be in charge of the program here.

FARM RESIDENCE DESTROYED BY FIRE

The seven-room and bath two-story residence of G. G. Flinn, farmer, three miles north and three west of Monroe, burned to the ground early Wednesday night.

A small house nearby, a garage and windmill were also lost, and only the persistent efforts of neighbors prevented the loss of Flinn's barn, 50,000 pounds of grain, 300 bushels of cotton seed and 10,000 bundles of sorghum. Also lost were irreplaceable parts for a tractor and other farm machinery. The loss was roughly estimated at between \$8,500 and \$10,000. Flinn had only \$3,000 insurance. His place had been remodeled less than three years ago.

MAJOR THOMPSON RECEIVES ANOTHER OAK LEAF CLUSTER

(Press release from General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific Area.)

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA—Lieut. Gen. Geo. C. Kenney, Commander of Allied Forces in the Southwest Pacific, has awarded a second oak leaf cluster "for meritorious achievement" while participating in 25 operational flights in the Southwest Pacific area during which hostile contact was probable, and expected, to Major Fred E. Thompson, Abernathy.

The cluster is in addition to a previous award of the Air Medal and an oak leaf cluster and is equivalent to having won that decoration a third time.

These flight missions included escorting bombers and transport planes, interception and attack missions, and patrol and reconnaissance flights as part of the co-ordinated air, land and sea offensive General MacArthur is making against the Japanese in the South and Southwest Pacific. In the course of operations, strafing and bombing attacks were made from dangerously low altitudes, destroying and damaging enemy installations and equipment.

He is with a fighter squadron of the Fifth Air Force.

Major Thompson also has the Silver Star and Distinguished Flying Cross medals with an oak leaf cluster for each.

Abernathy Asked To Buy Bonds For Thanksgiving

Sgt. McCoy Is Prisoner of War



Previously reported "missing in action" since May 7, 1942, Sgt. Hugh B. McCoy, above, is now a Prisoner of War of the Japanese Government in the Philippines, according to word received here Thursday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. McCoy, from the Adjutant General, the War Department, Washington, D. C.

Sgt. McCoy was in the ground crew of the Air Corps and was stationed at Nichols Field, Rizal, in the Philippines, when hostilities opened between the United States and Japan in December of 1941.

He enlisted in the service in 1933 and re-enlisted in 1939 for overseas duty, going from California to the Philippines.

"In whatever other appropriate manner we observe Thanksgiving this year, let's express our thanks in 1943 in the traditional spirit of a righteous, determined America, both humble and grateful for the rights and the privileges that are ours, and pledge anew our determination to uphold the traditional glory of American arms, when our rights are threatened." — This is the appeal of H. S. Hilburn, Hale County War Finance Committee chairman, to citizens of Hale county.

"We can do this best by buying bonds to back our fighters who are expressing our determination in the only language the Axis seems to understand."

"Quick buying response is needed on the November quota. The Treasury gave us a breathing spell in October, following the 3rd War Loan drive and assigned no quota. The November quota was not promptly released. Buying has been light in the first weeks of November."

"Let's all step out and buy before Thanksgiving Day, or not later than Nov. 27, so that our purchases may count on our November quota of \$38,500. This is 7% of our 3rd War loan quota and will be met only by very prompt and generous response."

Suggested quotas for south Hale county communities, are: Abernathy, \$9,596.25; Lakeview, \$1,706; and Iowa Avenue, \$639.75.

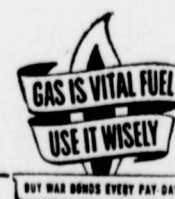

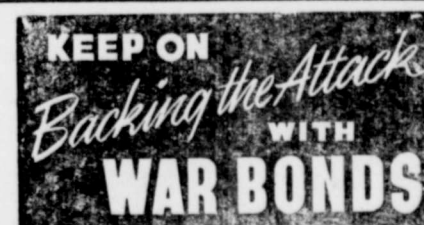

RATION TOKENS IN FEBRUARY

Ration tokens are expected to be ready for use by February. They will be red and blue and each will have a value of one point. They will be used by consumers as change for processed foods and meat-fats ration stamps. The blue tokens will be used with blue ration stamps for buying processed foods; the red tokens with red stamps for buying foods rationed under the meat-fats program. The ration coins, made of layers of vulcanized fiber, will be slightly larger than a nickel and smaller than a 25c piece.
