Lone Wolf Co-op Adjusts '65 Rate

Rate adjustment for Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, Inc., member-owner power users will go into effect Jan. 1, 1965, according to James Hull, manager.

Adjustment in retail electric rates will mean an actual lowering of monthly electric bills of 90 percent of Lone Wolf's membership. Hull's statement noted.

"All rates, including residential, commercial and irrigation rates, will be affected," said Hull.

"Combination of all these rate changes will cause a lowering of annual revenue to the cooperative of \$10,760," he added.

While about one meter out of ten will not be helped financially by this change, we were looking to future growth of the Cooperative and KWH consumption on the farm in making this adjustment, the manager of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, Inc., announced Wednesday.

Use of electricity doubles every seven to ten years on the national average, he went on to say.

"Here at Lone Wolf Electric Co-op the average KWH use has doubled every eight years since our beginning 25 years ago in 1939. We found this adjustment economically feasible because the Cooperative is a non-profit corporation and because of untiring effort of its member-owners," he said.

"It was primarily Co-op members who made this adjustment possible and credit should be given to them," Hull stated.

Patrons Capital Credit refund for the last half of 1956 credits is also planned by Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Last year, the first half of the Patrons credits was returned to Cooperative members and totaled \$28,270. This year, the last half of the 1956 Capital Credits will be returned to Co-op members to total another \$28,270.

"Return of Patrons Capital Credits is necessary to assure us a non-profit operation," Hull pointed out in the second part of his announcement.

"Since we are chartered as a non-profit corporation we must comply with necessary actions to maintain that status, such as returning the Patrons' margins," the manager said.

Cooperative members have been notified of their Capital Credits, credited to them for the years 1956-1963, and will have the cash returned to them as soon as it can be economically justified," Hull said.

Checks for the 1956 return will be in Lone Wolf Co-op member-owner mailboxes before Christmas, he concluded.

REFERENDUM VOTE

Farmers Approve Quotas & Allotment

Mitchell County cotton farmers voted for marketing quotas by a margin of 185 votes for and 10 votes against, in the national cotton referendum staged Tuesday, the ASCS office reported.

Approving the marketing quotas and acreage allotments for 1965 were 94.9 percent of 188 county's cotton producers. The trend here was in keeping with the national average which saw marketing quotas win by a safe number of votes totaling more than 94 percent of farmers voting.

A vote of two-thirds majority (75 percent) is required for any referendum staged under law by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mitchell County vote figures were about like those in

neighboring counties. Howard County and Taylor County and others reported an average of 94 percent approval.

Colorado City area farmers, voting at the ASCS office, supported the marketing quota by 90 for, 4 against. Loraine area farmers voted 65 for, 6 against. Westbrook farmers approved the quota by 100 percent vote of 30 for, no votes against.

United Fund Appeals For One Final Effort

Still awaiting final reports from several divisions, the United Fund Campaign has reached 83 percent of its goal of \$18,930 with \$15,766.92 received to date.

"We are in the process of winding up our United Fund efforts," reported Judge Elmer Martin, campaign chairman, and Bill F. Carter, president of United Fund.

"Our campaign was one staged along with 2,100 communities in the United States with the idea of providing many essential services for many people in one appeal," said Carter Wednesday.

"United Fund raising has helped make a philanthropist out of every wage earner, every executive and every place of business, large or small. United Fund has involved countless numbers of citizens in health and welfare programs—citizens who would not be reached any other way. And only through United Fund are we able to secure sufficient funds to finance strong voluntary services," Carter said.

United Fund in Mitchell County this year was manned entirely by Mitchell Countyans. Approximately 140 workers took part as voluntary solo-factors. Volunteers set the goal. Volunteers headed the divisions. Volunteers chose the 13 agencies named to participate in the distribution of funds. Working as volunteers striving toward the \$18,930 goal were professional people of this county, industrial workers, public utility people, public employees, members of the clergy, organized labor, farmers, ranchers, homemakers, retired citizens, financial, commercial people, merchants and "just plain people."

"To them we owe credit for whatever success was attained," said Judge Martin. "We still are hopeful of attaining our goal. Unless that goal is reached our welfare programs, health and character building programs of the agencies we want to help will be seriously curtailed."

"I urge every volunteer workers, solicitor and contributor to make a last, concerted effort to complete the campaign and to bring it to a successful close. It is worthy of our best efforts," the campaign chairman said.

Figures of the latest report show Branch House division topped all others with 124 percent of their goal reached and \$1,740. The city of Loraine was second with 104 percent and \$882.60. General solicitation division with women workers attained 90 percent of the goal with \$721. Farm & Ranch reached 78 percent and \$705. Employees came up with 77 percent and \$1,930. Public employees (city and county office workers, etc.) brought in 83 percent of their goal and \$1,374.60. Advance division accounted for 79 percent of their goal and \$7,051.

Engineer Testimony Wednesday

Hearing before Texas Water Commission in Austin was still in session Wednesday and was to reconvene after a noon recess.

Chief issue in that hearing is the Colorado River Municipal Water District's application for an amended permit moving plans for a giant Colorado River dam from an approved site in Mitchell County to a site 19 miles downstream in Coke County.

Wednesday morning session heard testimony of Ed Reed, hydrologist of Midland.

Charles Griggs, Sweetwater attorney representing Mitchell County Water steering committee's fight against granting of that amended permit, gave a summary of Reed's testimony to the Colorado City Record by telephone.

"Gist of Reed's testimony," Griggs said, "is that large salt concentrations will be present in either reservoir—if the dam is built in Coke or in Mitchell County."

Salt concentration in the Mitchell site (approved in June 1960 for the dam and lake) has been one of the key points for delay in impounding of the lake. Salt water pollution from oilfield operations has been under study by the CRMWDC since 1956 and has been an open subject since 1960 when TWC urged the water district to seek a solution for salt content of the river waters.

Second man to testify before TWC in Austin, Wednesday, was Sie Freese who faced cross-examination by Griggs and Frank Ginzler, Mitchell County attorney, in the Wednesday afternoon session.

Freese testified Wednesday before noon to technical details in the Freese-Nichols lengthy report which recommended the Coke County site, rather than the original Mitchell County choice. Freese is partner in the consulting engineering firm of Ft. Worth, employed by CRMWDC to make the comparative study.

Testimony of Freese, said Griggs via long distance, "Boiled down to the fact that foundation problems encountered in Mitchell County plans could be corrected for about \$300,000—a figure which didn't seem to bother Freese too much."

Basis of the Freese-Nichols recommendation favoring the Coke County site was, first and last, the "larger dependable yield at the Coke County site; the lower evaporation factor because of the smaller surface exposure," Griggs said Freese testified.

"Still in Austin to testify for the opposition to issuing of the CRMWDC amended permit favoring Mitchell County, are Dr. John H. Chion, mayor of Colorado City, Ford Merritt, city manager, County Judge Elmer Martin and Ginzler county attorney."

Griggs said it was unlikely that any Mitchell County witnesses could be examined before Thursday or possibly Friday.

A delegation from Colorado City and Loraine attended the opening session to the TWA hearing, Monday. First day's hearing brought lengthy testimony from E. V. Spence of Big Spring, manager of CRMWDC who was cross-examined for two hours by attorneys opposing the new permit.

The water district won the first skirmish, Monday, when the commission voted down a motion to dismiss the CRMWDC

This year's referendum vote was even stronger for marketing quotas and acreage allotments than was the cotton referendum vote in 1963. Last year, farmers of this county voted 170 for and 21 against marketing quotas and allotments on upland cotton.

Approval of the marketing quota means that quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect in 1965; that excess cotton on a farm where

the allotment is exceeded will be subject to penalty; that price support at a level within range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to growers who do not exceed their effective farm allotments.

Effective allotment is the farm allotment after any release or reapportionment. Price support payments, in addition to basic cotton loans, will be available to growers who voluntarily plant within their domestic allotment.

Payment will be based on the normal yield of cotton acreage planted for harvest and will help compensate farmers for reducing production by taking part in the program.
