Hart Man Wins Second In Contest

Treasury Secy. Announces Rates

Secretary of the Treasury David M. Kennedy today announced an increase in the interest rate on United States Savings Bonds from 4.25 per cent to 5 per cent.

The new 5-per-cent rate applies to all outstanding Series E and H Bonds sold on or after June 1, 1969, if held to maturity. The higher rate also applies to older Bonds. Beginning with the first semiannual interest period starting on or after June 1, 1969, rates on outstanding E and H Bonds will be increased to yield 5 per cent, when held to maturity or extended maturity. The original maturity of the Series E Bond has been shortened from 7 years to 5 years, 10 months; H Bonds will continue to mature in 10 years.

"Freedom Shares" (U.S. Savings Notes) -- sold in combination with E Bonds, since May 1, 1967 -- will be removed from sale effective June 30, 1970.

November sales in Castro County totaled \$9,239, according to Judge R.E. Wilson, chairman of the Castro County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the eleven-month period were \$51,395 and this is 86 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$60,000.

Jess Willard of 1012 W. Grant Street in Dimmitt has been named top winner in the Rowland-Gordon 1968 corn growers contest, it was announced last Friday.

Second place winner is C. C. Hanes of Hart and third place went to Larry Sturgis of Tulia.

Willard farms about half way between Hart and Dimmitt and about one-half mile south of the Hart-Dimmitt highway. From 25 acres, the required acreage for entry in the

contest, Willard produced a yield of 173 bushels per acre. He received a check in the amount of \$300.

Hanes, who farms about five miles northwest of Hart, received a check in the amount of \$200 for a yield of 137 bushels per acre.

Sturgis, who farms near Tulia, received a check for \$100 for his yield of 122 bushels per acre.

The contest was open to all area farmers who wished to enter, and who produced at least 25 acres of corn.

Cotton Crop Below Average

Approximately 1,830 bales have been ginned by the three gins.

SENSING THE NEWS

Parental rights and the cause of quality public education in the United States suffered a severe new blow recently when the Congress voted against the Whitten Amendment which would have prevented the Department of Health, Education and Welfare from cutting off funds to school districts that didn't go along with its plans.

HEW Secretary Robert H. Finch's opposition to the Whitten Amendment -- indeed his all-out fight against the freedom of choice principle -- also represents a breaking of faith with the millions of voters who heard and believed presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon promise support for freedom of choice school plans. It is deeply dismaying that President Nixon didn't abide by his campaign promise.

Nothing could be more American than the concept of freedom of choice in education. As worked out in practice, this concept means that a child attends the school his parents desire him to attend. It is the embodiment of individual freedom. Yet this freedom doesn't satisfy the ideologues in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. They apparently don't believe parents have any rights when it comes to school attendance. And they aren't satisfied with any school attendance plan that doesn't achieve strict racial balance.

Emotion, not reason, lies behind HEW's position. Certainly, there isn't any measure of justice in HEW's opposition to freedom of choice. As a matter of fact, HEW can't point to any standard of logic in espousing its school plans. If it is unjust to bar a student from a particular school because of his race, how can it be just to compel a student to attend a particular school in order to meet a fixed racial formula decreed by HEW? Obviously, HEW's approach isn't grounded in rationality or justice. Instead, it is grounded in politics and fanaticism -- the notion that there must be carefully calculated mix of students of different racial groups in order for the ends of democracy to be served.

This is an absurd position, for precise racial balancing won't be in effect in other areas of a child's life or in his existence as an adult. His parents are free to establish his home environment and to regulate a child's friendships. An adult cannot be coerced into making friends on the basis of a sociological formula. Or maybe HEW aspires to do just that -- take over the home

and plan adult relationships. That's the type of thing George Orwell wrote about in his book "1984," in which he described the horrors of totalitarian society that controls every moment of people's lives.

The American people certainly don't want a "Big Brother" society, but HEW is doing its best to achieve just that with its school plans. It is tragic but true that Congress is permitting HEW to engage in government by edict, to practice coercion against parents.

Congress has lost sight of the fact that children belong to their parents, not to Big Government agencies. The final say-so on a child's education should belong to parents, not to some bureaucrat whose mind is full of socialist notions regarding the way people's lives should be managed.

The United States has come a long way down the road to serfdom -- to totalitarian government -- in the last 20 years. As the 1950s opened, public education was strictly a state and local responsibility. And both states and counties were making progress on upgrading the school systems. The neighborhood was a central feature of the American scene and contributed greatly to community solidarity.

Today the situation is utterly changed. Big Brother in Washington has taken over all the key functions of local school boards and state boards of education. School officials have to spend much of their time checking as to whether they are obeying Washington's latest edicts or answering to the demands of the federal courts.

Parents see the public schools as centers of hurtful sociological experiments, in which the best interests of their children are sacrificed to the demands of politics or the peculiar ideas of extremists.

More and more these days, public schools are ceasing to serve in an educational sense -- and are becoming mere custodial institutions. Parents who can afford to do so are enrolling their children in private and church schools where standards are higher and politics don't control.

HEW's latest victory will accelerate the process of ruination of the public schools. Secretary Robert H. Finch of HEW seems destined to preside over the destruction of the traditional system of locally controlled public schools. Big Brother's gain is the nation's loss.

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has asked the assistance of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in its effort to establish an advisory committee in the 29 county High Plains area.

The committee was proposed by the TGSPB immediately after the Board members were elected in early October in order to give the Board broader representation and to develop a closer working relationship between the Board and local producers.

Extension Service District Agricultural Agents Billy C. Gunter of Lubbock and W. W. Grisham, Jr. of Amarillo pointed out that they would encourage all county agricultural agents in the 29 counties to consult with their County Program Building Committees on the appointment of advisors to the TGSPB.

We would also encourage the Crops Subcommittee to invite a representative of the Board to present an annual report and discuss other matters involving the TGSPB."

K. B. Parish of Springlake, chairman of the Board, in explaining the advisory committee pointed out, "This program is for farmers, directed by farmers, and we feel this committee will play an active and important role in our administration of research and market development. We want to assure each grain farmer that his investment will work to give the best possible return."

The TGSPB was formed following the passage of a referendum for assessing five cents per ton on grain sorghum produced in the area. These funds will be used in programs of research, disease and insect control, education and promotion designed to encourage efficient production, marketing and use of grain sorghum. This program is designed to ultimately improve the net income position of grain farmers.

The Board is made up of area producers elected to the responsibility of administering these funds for programs which it believes most vital to grain sorghum producers on the High Plains.

Counties governed by the Board include Armstrong, Carson, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hansford, Hartley, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman, Bailey, Briscoe, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum.

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Moments OF Meditation

C. T. Cunningham, Pastor of The First Baptist Church

Jesus Christ, as His appearance was foreseen by the Old Testament writers, was not, of course, visualized as the person we see walking through the pages of the Gospels.

THE FORERUNNER: There is no doubt that the prophesy of Isaiah (Isaiah 40:2-5) refers to John the Baptist, who proclaimed the coming of the Christ. The prophet Malachi (3:1; 4:5) also foretold this event: "Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me; and the Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to his temple."

THE VIRGIN BIRTH: Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name, Emmanuel." Isaiah 7:14.

THE BIRTH IN BETHLEHEM: The prophet Micah proclaimed: "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel, whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting." This passage is referred to by Matthew (2:6) and John (7:42).

THE MASSACRE OF THE CHILDREN: Matthew quotes the prophet Jeremiah as a prophetic utterance fulfilled when Herod ordered the massacre of all Jewish males of two years of age and under, in an attempt to stamp out the life of Jesus, (Matt. 2:18; Jer. 31:15).

THE JOURNEY TO EGYPT: Matthew (2:15) also refers to the prophesy of Hosea (11:1) when he writes: "He took the young child and his mother by night and departed into Egypt; and was there until the death of Herod; that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying, Out of Egypt have I called my son."

THE MINISTRY OF JESUS: It would be a mission of healing (Isa. 53:4); He would teach by parables (Isa. 6:9-10). It would be a ministry of enlight-

enment. (Isa. 58:5-12).

THE REJECTION OF JESUS: Jesus would be disbelieved, hated and rejected. "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief...he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities. We have turned every one to his own way." (Isa. 53:1-7).

THE TRIUMPHAL ENTRY: "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem; behold, thy king cometh unto thee; he is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass, and upon a colt, the foal of an ass." (Zech. 9:9).

THE BETRAYAL: "If you think good, give me my price; and if not, forbear. So they weighed for my price thirty pieces of silver." (Zech. 11:12).

THE DEATH OF OUR LORD: "He is brought as a lamb to the slaughter and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he opened not his mouth (Isa. 53:7-9). Even some of our Lord's dying words were foretold. (Pas. 22:1; 31:5).

THE RESURRECTION: A reading of Acts 2:25-32; Psa. 16:10-11; Luke 24:46; Hos. 6:2; Jonah 1:17, will show how even this culminating event was foreseen in the Old Testament.

With the coming of Christ, the whole world was offered a new and better life. Old things had passed away, and all things had become new. No longer need the world live in darkness, for a new day had dawned—the brightest day in the history of man.

For us, also, these better things, this better way of life, are available. As we approach the Christmas season, we are reminded, above all, of the new day that was ushered in with the birth of the Christ-child, a new day that was foreseen, though not participated in, by the prophets of old.

I came uneasy to my country. My birth was shrouded by the clouds of war.

I was far too young to have had a hand in it — — but I was, after all, born in one of the Axis nations. After living a year under Russian occupation, I had a chance of meeting the fighting men of America. And I knew that instead of bringing revenge they brought gum.

And they talked about home. They talked eternally about home.

They were strange men on a strange ground and while we, as children, looked up to them, they still scared us a little. But as the years passed, and the talk became deeds, the fear was replaced by respect. America put away bitterness, not to be forgotten, but so it wouldn't interfere with the main job of helping people.

Because of my experiences, the opportunity of living in the United States gives the words, "Peace on Earth Toward All Men of Good Will", a deeper meaning to me.

Now, as another Christmas approaches, it's my strange fighting men on another strange ground.

Now, as then, it's hard to be away from home at Christmas.

Now, as then, there's a reason it has to be done.

Occupation by Chairman Mao is no different from occupation by the Russians. Czechoslovakia wants freedom as much as America but doesn't have the means to pursue and retain it. Whereas freedom is the right, at birth, of all men, we find it our duty to answer the call and come to the assistance of freedom seeking men.

We struggle for this principle in the session halls of the United Nations.

We struggle for this principle in the emerging nations.

We struggle for this principle in our own country.

And we struggle hardest for this principle in the unhappy swamps of Viet Nam.

So it can be the happy Christmas it should be. Our young men are standing in another part of the world. Their seats at the dinner table are empty. Their graduation suits hang empty in our closets. Their cars sit empty in the sheds. But there's no emptiness in our hearts.

We haven't asked that he stand for liberty, only to take away our support in his struggle. We haven't joined with his enemy to defeat his aim. And we won't let him down by misinforming him about our feelings.

This Christmas it's time for a moratorium. A moratorium against doubt. A moratorium against failure to speak up. A moratorium to reassure our brothers and sons that we know why they can't be with us and that we're sharing the pain of their absence.

It didn't make headlines because it was done thoughtfully and quietly, but just a few weeks ago, in thousands of smaller communities across the nation, Americans stood in chill winds in parks and on court house lawns. They heard amateur speakers give voice on Veteran's Day to the real feelings in the land. Feelings which tend to be smothered by shouting antics in Chicago court rooms. The deeper feelings which must be conveyed to the Americans who stand for us in the defense of freedom.

Some people think I should be proud that

my son has given his life for his country. But that would be very hard indeed for a country that is rotting from within.

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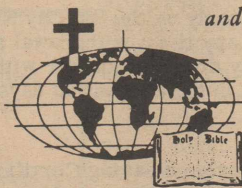
