Honor Festival Recognizes Students

City Keeps Insurance Policy, Accepts Revenue Sharing Report

During their regular business meeting Thursday night, Littlefield City Councilmen voted to keep the current group hospitalization insurance policy with Banker's Life Ins. Co.; discussed but took no action on a proposed fire service contract to be presented to the County Commissioners; and accepted the Revenue Sharing Planned Use report.

Although Banker's Life Insurance will raise the rates for the group policy as of June 1, councilmen felt the company has the best benefits for city employees and their families.

Total current costs to the city annually for the insurance is \$20,202, and the proposed cost which will go into effect June 1 will be \$21,926, an 8.6 percent increase of \$1,724. Costs of inflation were credited with the causes of the increase.

All councilmen were present for the meeting, and voted unanimously to keep the present policy.

be submitted to the proper governmental agencies by the end of June. The report expresses the city's plans for the use of Revenue Sharing monies.

Total projected entitlement for the upcoming year is \$97,277—a figure which is up approximately \$7,000 from last year.

Planned for Operation-Maintenance Expenditures are (1) Public transportation (seal coating), \$10,000; and (2) Recreation, (summer recreation program) \$2,500, making a grand total of \$12,500 for operation and maintenance.

Listed under capital expenditures are:

(1) Public Safety, a fire engine pumper, \$20,000; b. police vehicle, \$5,000; and c. radar, \$1,500.

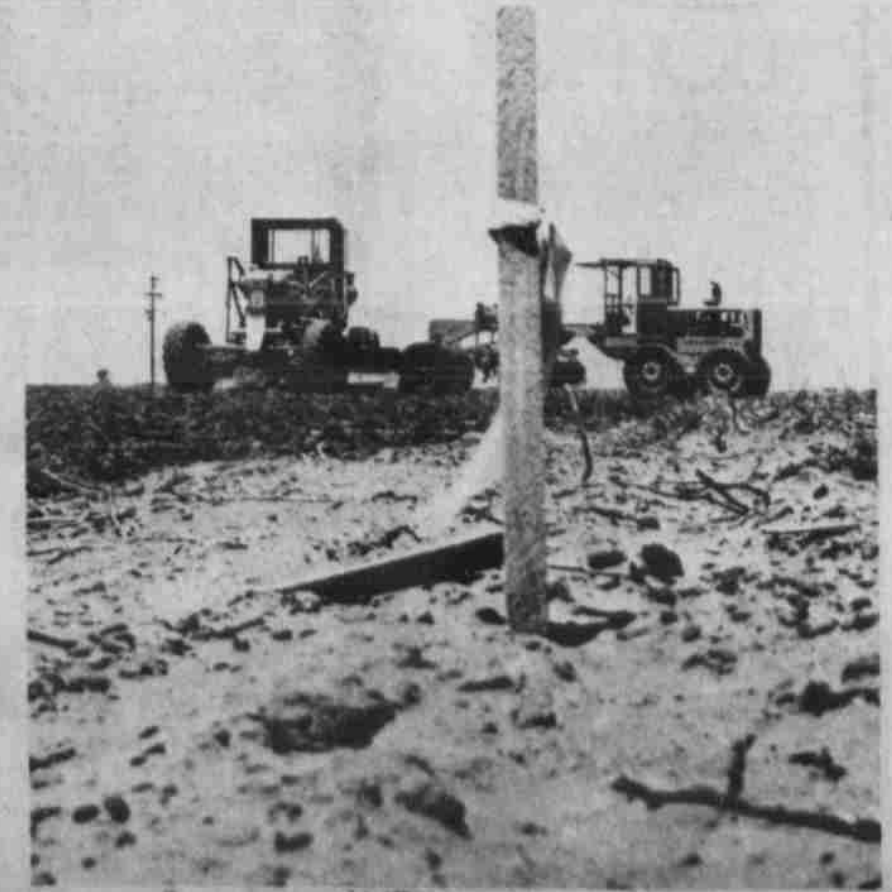
(2) Environmental Protection, sanitation collection system, \$41,428.

(3) Multi-purpose and general government, additions of municipal garage, \$16,849—a grand total on capital expenses of \$84,777.

Totalling the two, the total Revenue Sharing Expenditures would be \$97,277—or the total projected entitlement.

City Manager Jim C. Blagg presented a report of administrative activities for the month of April.

"Much of this month has been spent in preparing the necessary information for the Departments in order to begin budget preparations for the Fiscal Year 1975-76. A budget meeting was held with all of the department heads on the last day of the month, when budget workpapers, instructions, and other information were presented to the staff. Preparation of the budget will continue through the summer," Blagg advised.

"One of the items which has been sought by the city and the administrative staff finally came to completion this month. The consolidation of the city and school tax offices, I believe, will be one of the greatest services we will have rendered to our citizens. This consolidated office will provide a more efficient, more effective, and more equitable tax service for both agencies," he emphasized.

"About the middle of this month we

revived our dilapidated housing program. Through the use of Title VI Emergency Employment funds we were able to hire four men to work exclusively on this project. Our approach has been to first get individuals to voluntarily allow us to demolish their buildings. To date the response has been very good. When we feel that the response is lagging, we will begin to work through the condemnation procedures. To date we have demolished four structures.

"Preparations are now underway for the summer recreation program. The program will once again be coordinated by Jerry Blakely. Early planning and publicity will help make the program more effective. We also anticipate that we will make a few job opportunities available to our youth through the summer employment programs offered under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act," Blagg concluded.

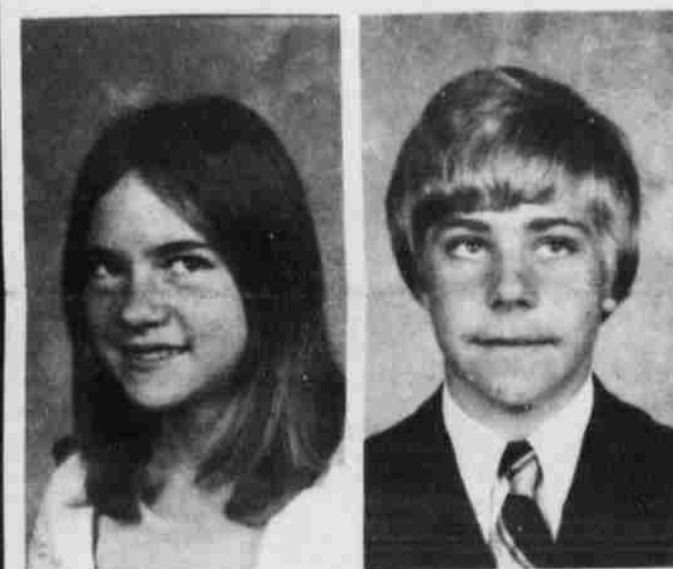

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Delinquent Tax Interest Rate To Be Increased

The interest rate for taxpayers who are delinquent in paying Federal tax bills, or have been granted extensions of time to file, will jump to 9 percent per year beginning July 1, 1975, according to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A. W. McCanness, district director of IRS operations in North Texas, said today that the higher interest rate will be charged on all overdue taxes as a result of legislation enacted on January 1, 1975. The present rate is 6 percent per year on most taxes.

The government, which now pays 6 percent per year on overpayments by taxpayers, will also pay 9 percent interest starting July 1. Interest becomes payable if the overpayment is refunded to a taxpayer more than 45 days from the due date of the tax return, or from the date the return is received by the IRS, whichever is later, McCanness said.

Workers Receive Fatter Paychecks

At least until the end of the year, working Texans and Americans will be finding their paychecks a little fatter than they've been before.

The reason: employers across the country are now implementing the lower tax withholding tables that were set out in the tax bill approved by Congress and signed into law by the President last month. The result is that everybody holding a job will have a few extra dollars to spend over the next several months.

And our farmers and businessmen will find their taxes lower at the end of the year, too.

For the average head of a family of four making \$15,000 a year, the monthly increase will be \$20.49. This means an extra \$245.96 for that family to spend throughout the year. A childless couple with both of them working and earning \$20,000 annually will be taking home an extra \$12.74 a month, or \$152.88 for the year.

Nationwide, the overall effect of this tax cut will be to put an extra \$7.8 billion into the hands of working Americans. Combined with another \$8.1 billion now going out to taxpayers in the form of rebates of between \$100 and \$200, and another \$1.7 billion worth of \$50 checks for those on Social Security, the result is a pretty healthy chunk of additional buying power.

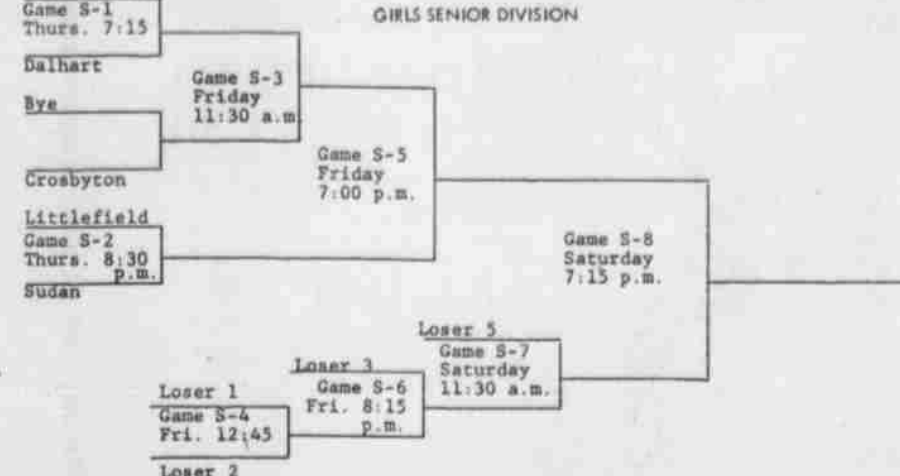
In fact, the total amounts to over two percent of the \$276.7 billion that Americans spent on personal consumption needs last year.

This is precisely what Congress and the President had in mind when we worked out the final version of the tax bill.
