Exhibits Must Be In By 9:00 A. M. Friday

Plans for the Dawson County Fair are working out as well as expected. Eight communities have reserved space for their exhibits which bid fair to equal or better any ever exhibited in the county, according to those who are planning on entering community booths.

The booths will be completed by the time you read these lines. The exhibits may be placed by Thursday afternoon for those who wish to start early. However, all who are entering exhibits should have them in place before 9:00 o'clock Friday morning. The judging will begin at 1:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

The C. C. C. officials of the local camp will have a very interesting exhibit showing how their work will be carried out. The Erosion feature will be of interest to all farmers and visitors. Pictures will be with the CCC exhibits showing what has been done toward controlling water and wind erosion in the Dalhart area. The camp officials will have some of the staff present to answer any questions that farmers may want to ask about their work that is to be carried out in the Lamesa territory.

Local community committees have assured the fair officials that some of the best feed crops in the history of the county will be on exhibit. Grain sorghum heads weighing over three-quarters pounds per head will be on exhibit, with watermelons, kershaws, peaches, apples, as good as can be grown any where will be there.

Prizes Offered For Educational Exhibits

Four Home Demonstration clubs are working on educational exhibits for the county fair.

These exhibits will present contrasts in the methods of doing the various things which pertain to home management or home making. The Central Club is planning an exhibit which shows the small repairs that any farm family can make. The tiled garden is being prepared by the Midway club. The pantry of yesterday and the pantry of today will be arranged by the Sparenberg club. And, the wardrobe before and after taking (the demonstration) is the exhibit being arranged by the Wilson club.

Cash prizes are being offered for the winning exhibit.

The Lamesa High School Girls' quartet sang selections and were acclaimed with approval by all the men in camp. Mrs. Barnard played popular selections on the piano. Mrs. Joe Whitlow's dancing studio, of Lamesa, also contributed much to the program. The program was concluded by a miniature concert given by the CCC string band.

An informal open-house and reception followed the program that was enjoyed almost as much as the program itself. The enrollees met the guests; and many stayed to listen to the music and singing that followed.

It has been announced that the stunt night program scheduled for this week has been postponed until Friday, September 27, in order that everyone may attend the Fair. These programs are free to the public and the people of Lamesa should feel free to attend.

Tornadoes Play Snyder Friday; Olton Next Week

This week finds the Golden Tornado making feverish preparations for this week's grind tilt, their first of the season. There is a reason, the locals go to Snyder to entertain the Tiger in his own back yard. The last visit of this nature resulted in a good scratching for the Tornadoes, and that 7-0 defeat has not been forgotten. In fact that was the last game in which Coach McColium and Gregg team has tasted defeat. Twenty-four consecutive victories have been chalked up by the roaring Tornado since that time, but the local boys are not satisfied with that game two years ago and will be making a determined effort to pound out a victory on the Snyder field. On the other hand the Snyder Tiger will be endeavoring to halt the winning streak of the Tornado. The results should be an extra good football game.

Snyder will have an advantage in the fact that they have played one game this season, while the Lamesa boys have yet to test their 1935 team. Both teams will have a majority of the positions filled by new men.

The home season will be opened with the strong Olton team Sept. 27. Olton has a powerful team this year. Coach Moore will bring to Lamesa a heavy team composed of veterans from last year. Very likely this team will be the one that will represent the north half of the district this year. However, the results of this game will not count in the flag race. Coach Moore's aggregation will run the tricky double wingback formation while the Tornadoes will use the punt formation with some variations. Local coaches do not plan to make many changes from the sound tactics that carried the Tornadoes through two consecutive regional championships.

Trench Silo Filling Demonstration to be Held September 28

There will be a trench silo filling demonstration on the J. E. Debnam farm, Ballard community, Saturday morning, September 28, beginning at 10:00 o'clock. The Extension Service Specialist in Dairy cattle will have charge of the meeting and the public is invited to see the demonstration. Mr. Debnam plans on using the trench silo as a course of preserving his feed crop to be used in case another drouth should come.

The King Ranch near Kingsville, Texas, kept some silage over 10 years in a trench silo, with only a very small percent of the silage spoiled.

Mr. Eudaly, Extension Specialist, states that work stock as well as cattle can be fed successfully with silage added to the regular feed, the silage to take the place of green feed at a time when no green feed is available.

Soil Erosion Service To Have Fair Exhibit

The Soil Erosion Service division of the local CCC camp will have an interesting exhibit at the Dawson County Fair, according to Mr. Vestal, superintendent of the local soil Erosion Service.

The exhibit is to be a reproduction in miniature of the various methods of soil erosion control. The exhibit will feature the proper and improper ways of contouring, terracing and gully control, and the proposed government plans for doing this work. A Soil Erosion Service man will be stationed with the exhibit to explain to all interested the different details of the plan. Pictures will also be shown so as to give in more conclusive ways the effects of the Soil Erosion Work.

We advise that all who are interested in this work to be sure and see this exhibit as it will be well worth the trouble and time. In fact it shows more clearly than can be explained by hours of talk, just what the government is going to do in this section.

J. D. Worley, assistant county agent will be in charge of all community and individual exhibits and Miss Mattie Phenix, Home Demonstration Agent will have charge of all ladies exhibits.

Wm. A. Wilson, manager of the chamber of commerce, will have general charge of all fair arrangements and details.

A big fair and a big time is expected by all. Officials are expecting pretty weather and lots of people to come to the fair and the big circus and carnival that has been arranged for.

BIG CROWDS EXPECTED AT LUBBOCK FAIR
 Lubbock, Sept. 16.—Two hundred thousand people are expected to click through the turnstiles at the Panhandle South Plains Fair here next week, September 23 to 28, to see shows, exhibits, vaudeville acts, fireworks and other attractions at the 22nd annual exposition.
 Principal new feature is the Harley Sadler 3 ring circus showing the last three days, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.
 Wortham's Western Exposition Shows will play the midway with Captain Jack doing a 80 foot free act dive into flaming water twice daily.
 A big array of vaudeville acts, free acts will be on the program band concerts, and other thrilling twice daily with a spectacular fireworks display each evening.
 Lubbock stores will close Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 24, for Lubbock day and except for drug stores, cafes and filling stations, the entire town will close up and attend the fair.
 Wednesday, when all school children are admitted free, will be the biggest day of them all. Hundreds of

schools over the Plains territory will be closed and a large per cent of them will transport the entire student body to the fair in school buses. A day at the fair is worth more than a day in school, officials say.

SOUTH TEXAS CORN MAKES 100 BUSHELS TO ACRE

Natalia, Texas, Aug. 31.—A corn crop grown this year on the farm of W. E. Sorrell, one-half mile south of Natalia, averaged 99 bushels and 55 pounds per acre. One measured acre yielded 8,205 pounds or 114 bushels, which is no doubt one of the best yields ever obtained in Texas. Former residents of the cornbelt say that the sight of corn like this makes them feel at home in South Texas. This corn is of the Tuxpan variety, crossed with white Horton. Tuxpan corn was brought from Tuxpan, Mexico to Natalia four years ago. The first year it produced only 30 bushels per acre. Those who planted it were disappointed in the yield, and all abandoned it with the exception of J. J. Lee. The next year Lee produced 66

bushels per acre, and other farmers became interested in the Tuxpan variety and secured seed from him. Last year Mr. Sorrell planted seed of this variety and secured a yield of 73 bushels per acre.
 He was rather disappointed to find upon close examination that his Tuxpan corn had crossed with corn of the white Horton variety in a neighboring field. The cross seems to have proved desirable, however, since the new variety represented by the crop of this year retained the good qualities of both of the old varieties. By careful seed selection, germination tests and fertilization, Sorrell hopes to obtain a yield of 150 bushels per acre with this corn next year. Although his land is in the Medina irrigation project, Sorrell obtained this extraordinary yield this year without irrigation or fertilizer.

ON TEXAS FARMS

In the interest of beauty, simplicity and ease of cleaning, 115 home demonstration club women in Calhoun county have removed all the old calendars, artificial flowers and plaster of paris animals from their bedrooms. Two hundred and sixty-one pieces of furniture have been refinished; 34 women have made or started hooked rugs and 20 mats have been made or started.

Also 178 dresses and 28 other garments have been made by the 110 foundation patterns which have been

provided by these Calhoun county home demonstration club women. Fifty-two of these club women have "new deal" clothes closets. That is they have closets with rods allowing dresses to hang clear of the floor, shelf space, hat racks and shoe racks.

And food to the impressive total of 26,439 containers is already stored on their pantry shelves. Fruits, juices, tomatoes, and vegetables have been put up in quantities to insure vitamins and variety in the winter's diet.

With the help of her mother and sister, Miss Thelma Green, farm food supply demonstrator for the Independence home demonstration club in Montgomery county, has filled 2,000 containers of food including 45 varieties for their family of 12. She has

added 100 feet of new shelving to the food storage space. In addition to her home duties she has supervised several thousand cans have been filled with food this year.

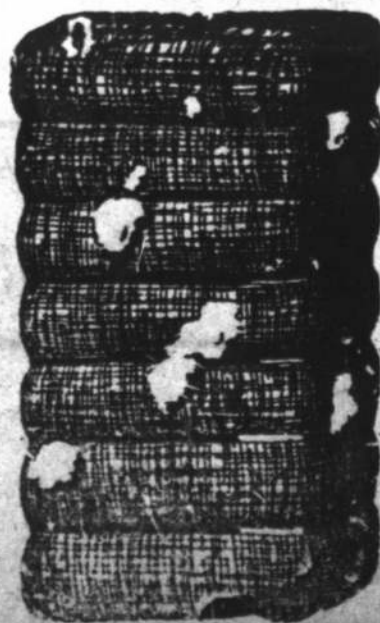

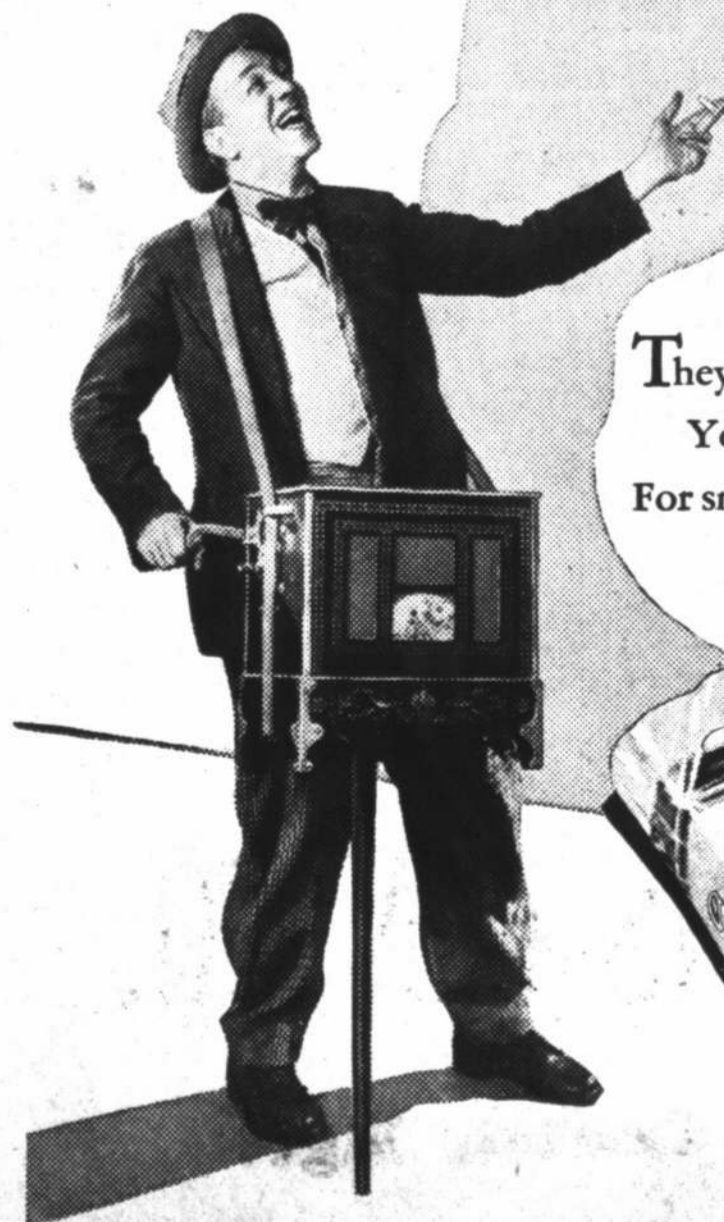

**Old Age Pensions
Cost Runs High**

"Old-age pensions could cost Texas taxpayers as much as \$56,073,402 yearly if each of the 283,199 people 65 years of age and over received the full \$15 monthly allotment provided for in the recent constitutional amendment," State Auditor Orville S. Car-

penster said today. At the request of Governor Allred Carpenter and R. B. Anderson, State Tax Commissioner, prepared the report "Cost and General Plan for Old Age Pensions". Upon the Governor's suggestion it was mailed to members of the legislature September 10th. "Experience of other states has shown that they have attempted at first to take care of only those ac-

tually in need of assistance. Requirements made of applicants have been with a view of eliminating those who, although of eligible age, did not actually need assistance. In this way other states have greatly reduced the costs from the amount necessary to pay if all persons of the required age had been included," Carpenter said. "As there are 41,787 persons 65 years of age and over on the Texas Relief rolls, this apparently is the minimum number able to qualify for old age pensions. At \$15 a month and with 10 per cent administrative costs added, this would be \$8,273,826 per year," Carpenter explained.

Carpenter believed the figure 62,933 more nearly represented the actual number who probably would receive old age pensions in Texas. He determined this figure by considering the experience of other states. If 62,933 people in Texas 65 years of age and over were to receive the full \$15 a month, the yearly cost to the taxpayer would be \$12,460,734, Carpenter calculated. In this he included 10 per cent administrative costs.

"The Federal Government, if the funds are available, will provide an amount equal to that spent by the State plus 5 per cent for expenses. This depends upon approval of the Texas plan by the Social Security Board in Washington. The Texas legislature will formulate a plan for distribution, and it will decide whether or not the full \$15 maximum will be used," Carpenter concluded.

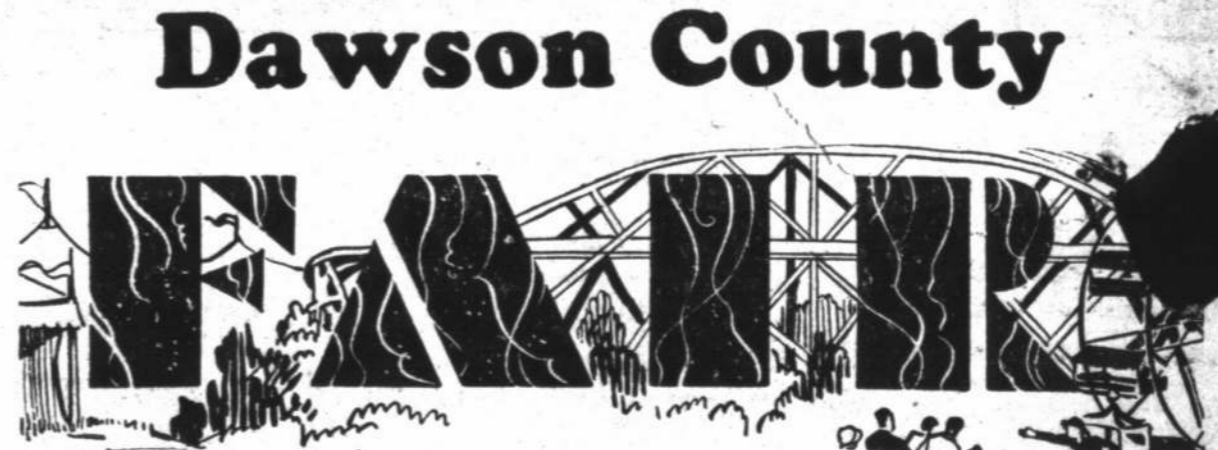

Oats, Barley and Dried Beans: 2 one gallon samples and two bundles of either, or one gallon sample and one bundle of any two, or dried beans may be used, one gallon each, two varieties.

Grain sorghums, threshed, two exhibits of 1 gallon each or either two varieties. Threshed grains included in Division 4, Nos. 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25.

Peanuts and Cowpeas, 2 one gallon samples and two vines of either, or 1 gallon sample and two vines of each.

Annual Forage Crops, 3 bundles of different varieties of kinds of sweet sorghums or other annual crops that are grown for forage. (No grain sorghum shall be considered as a dual crop). Leaves not to be removed.

Fruits or vegetables shall be characteristic of the community, native or cultivated and shall be shown in quart containers, 3 jars each of any variety of fruits and vegetables.

Fresh vegetables, 10 exhibits of different kinds of varieties.

Other crops not displayed, five exhibits only of one each of tame grasses, broom corn, rye, speltz, edible nuts, and any other crop not displayed under above classifications. The relative agricultural value as well as quality of the products shown will be considered in judging this classification. The quantity of each exhibit to be the same as specified in the general exhibit classes.

No poultry or dairy products permitted in this division.

In addition to the above, blue, red and white ribbon will be awarded to the winners of the following exhibits: Ten heads milo, yellow; 10 heads, milo, white; 10 heads hegari; 10 heads kaffir; 10 ears corn, best stalk cotton, short staple; best stalk of cotton, long staple; best stalk of cotton any variety; best 3 inch bundle soy beans; best 3 inch bundle millet; best pumpkin, home grown; best kershaw, home grown; best watermelon, home grown; 10 best sweet potatoes; best stalk broom corn; best vine of peanuts, any variety.

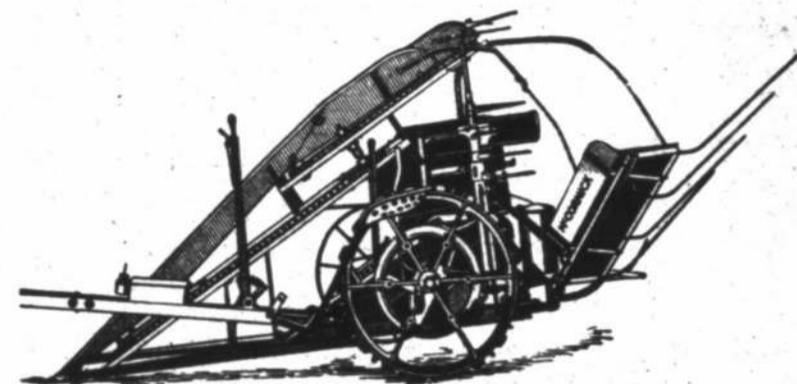
