

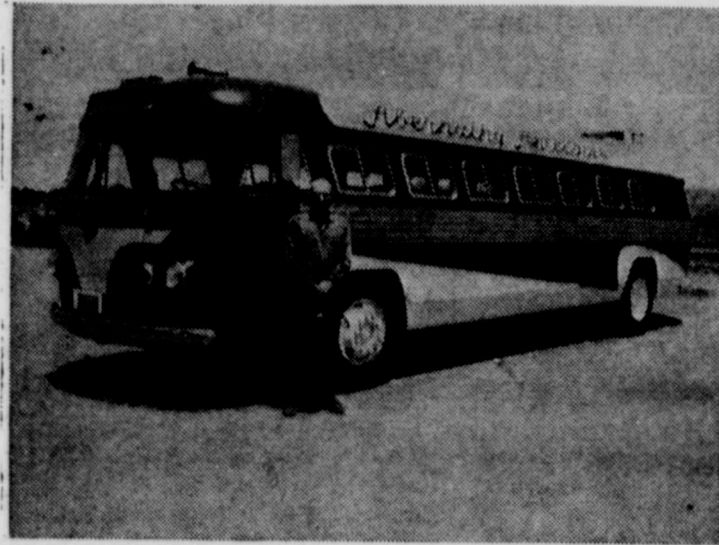

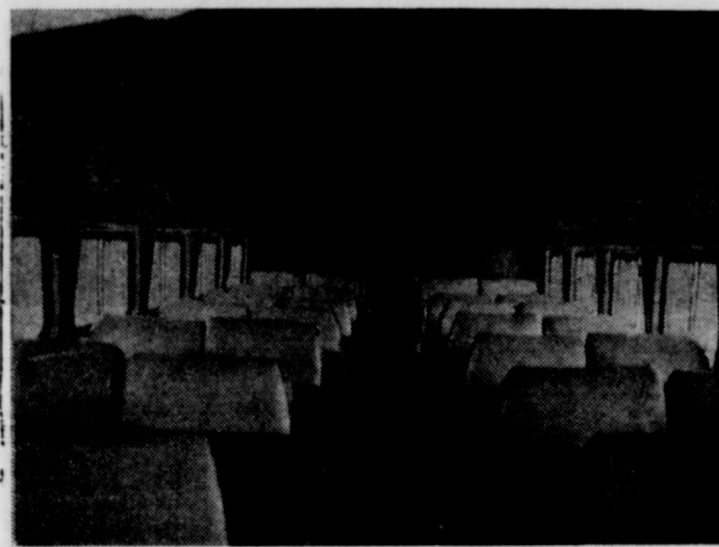

## AHS Integration Voted By Board

In compliance with Public Law 88-352, 88th Congress, H. R. 7152, signed by President Lyndon B. Johnson July 2, 1964, Abernathy School Board of Trustees, in regular session Monday night, voted to integrate Abernathy High School, starting with the 1964-1965 school year.

There will be 14 or more Negro high school students eligible to attend Abernathy High School when classes begin August 31. Most of them will be eligible to play football and basketball.

For the past several years, Abernathy Negro high school students have been attending Dunbar High School in Lubbock.

## Wendell Jones Is Junior Hi Coach Here

Wendell Jones, 23, a native of Lorenzo, has been named boys athletic coach for Abernathy Junior High School. He is a graduate of Texas Tech. Jones played college football while attending Sul Ross College.

In addition to coaching, Jones will have physical education classes, and will teach social science in junior high school.

## Credits Higher For Graduation

Supt. Delwin Webb announced the approval of the school board, in regular session Monday night, of higher credit requirements for graduation from Abernathy High School.

Previously, 17 credits were required for graduation. The new rule will require 19 credits for graduation in May, 1965; 20 credits for May, 1966; 21 credits for May, 1967; 22 credits for May, 1968.

In order for students to obtain the extra credits, the following high school subjects have been added: reading at high school level, choral music, journalism analytics and second year typing. Chemistry and physics will be offered concurrently instead of on alternate years as has been the practice.

In order for students to take more courses, study hall will be eliminated.

Further information will be published later, and will appear in the school's official handbook to be distributed before the term begins.

## TALK — In Print

Someone indulged in sensational journalism Wednesday of last week that will cost Abernathy and its trade territory more than a million dollars as the damage continues to mount over the years.

There is strong evidence that news of Abernathy's city water situation Wednesday of last week was put out on a news wire service, either United Press International or AP, or both.

A family planning to visit relatives in Abernathy heard about Abernathy's water on a radio station in Austin. They debated about making the trip if Abernathy was out of water. They decided to make the visit here and discovered that the problem was not as acute as the radio announcer had indicated. Also, there was a report of the Abernathy water story on an Abilene TV station, according to information here.

The person or persons responsible for giving the story state, and possibly nation-wide, publicity did the million-dollar damage to this community.

The damage is to the farming community as well as to the town of Abernathy. Farms will not sell, homes and businesses in town will not sell, people who had planned to move to Abernathy may change their minds.

Also, the hasty and sensational distribution of the water story cuts the very heart out of Abernathy's need for a chamber of commerce. Prime reason for reactivating the chamber of commerce here was to get a manager who could go out and invite and persuade industry to move to Abernathy. After last week's hasty and wide-spread publicity, you couldn't get a chalk factory to move here. So, do not expect miracles from the chamber of commerce manager, Robert Barnes. He will have an uphill drag in getting anything for Abernathy.

The sensational spreading of the water story was useless. The city employees & others had the situation of informing the people under control. The fire truck with the public address system did an effective job by cruising the streets and asking the people to use water for household purposes only. This, plus the personal telephone calls from the city hall staff to each residence was sufficient.

The wide-spread tale of Abernathy's water situation was too sensationalized. Even with just one well pumping a half pipe of water for a few hours Wednesday of last week, Abernathy's water pressure remained at, or near, normal, Charles Norwood, city manager, reported. This indicated a good supply of water in the storage tanks. The city well on 6th Street was lowered and placed back in production by mid-afternoon Wednesday of last week.

Officials are confident that Abernathy's water supply problem can be solved. There is a water supply on the airport section available for city use.

The Abernathy Weekly Review carried a water story in Thursday's paper, "City Seeks Co-operation in Water Use." It was factually written by The Review's reporter, Mike Skipper, and I sent it through without editing. Mike, a 16-year-old high school junior, stayed with the facts as given him, and did not include sensationalism or anything to panic the people. There was no attempt to magnify the problem out of its true proportion.

## YOUTH DROWNS IN HIWAY LAKE

Billy Ray Wood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Wood, who reside in Southeast Abernathy, drowned in the highway lake on the east side of Highway 87 and north side of FM 597 in South Abernathy Monday afternoon. He was pronounced dead at 3:30 p. m.

The youth, whose age was reported to be 12 or 13, and two or more boys asked to go to the lake to swim. Father of the victim told the boys not to go swimming because the sun was too hot at that time of day. Some time after the boys had left the Wood home, one of the boys ran back there and told the father that Billy Ray had gone down in the deep lake and had not come up. Mr. Wood began a search of the lake and found his son's body in a 4-foot-deep portion of the lake.

He is survived by his parents and several brothers and sisters. At press time, funeral rites were pending with Sedberry Funeral Home in Lubbock.

## City Water Situation Improving

Mr. Charles Norwood, Abernathy City Manager, gave the following information concerning the three city wells which the city will use. The well located at 4th Street on the alley between Avenues M and J was lowered 30 feet during last week's crisis, but it is no better than before it was lowered. It has always been a weak well. The well located on 5th street was test-pumped Monday, but quit soon after it was started.

The city well located at 6th and Avenue H was lowered 20 feet last week and after it was lowered it pumped at its usual rate of 440 gallons per minute. The well at the west end of 12th Street was being lowered 20 feet over the weekend when a drilling bit was lost in the hole. At press time Tuesday, the bit had not been extracted from the hole.

Mr. Norwood said the test hole which was drilled at the southwest corner of the city square showed very good water signs and that the city would not put a pump in this hole unless it became necessary in the near future. The test hole drilled at the corner of the General Telephone Company property on Avenue H was drilled to the depth of over 500 feet. The results of this test hole showed no definite water signs below the redbed. This will possibly eliminate the possibility of finding deep water under the city section.

In a special meeting of the City Council on Thursday, July 30, the Council discussed ways the city could get water. They discussed bringing water in from the airport section 4 miles east of town. This project would cost approximately \$250,000 and would take about 8 months to complete. The Council voted to drill four test holes on the section before making any definite plans on the project.

The Council also voted to investigate the possibility of getting a tap on the line coming from the Canadian Dam. This line will run between the city and the airport section. If permission is received, the tap will be put on the line, but the city can't receive water unless one of the cities sells part of its share.

Councilmen attending the meeting were Dan Ward, W. T. Settle, Royce Henson, and Billy Skipper. Mayor Roy Jones and City Manager Charles Norwood were also present. Councilman Jim Bob Smith was out of town on his vacation.

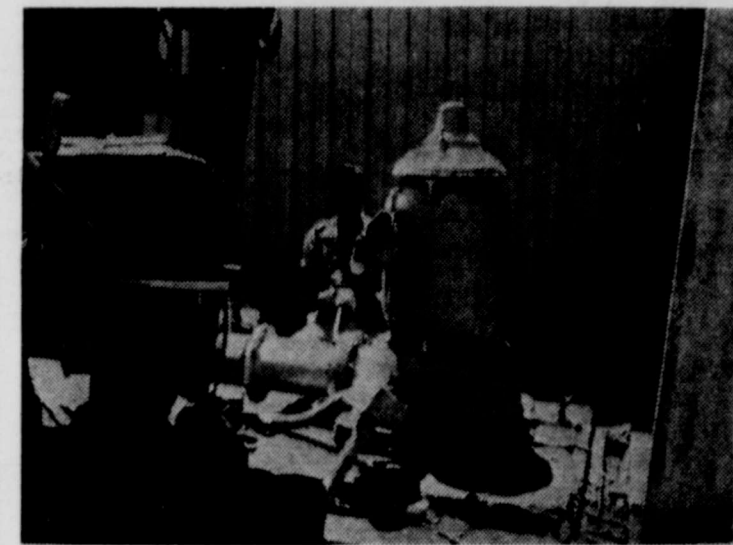
In the regular meeting, the minutes were read by Mr. Robert Barnes and after being read were approved by the Chamber. Mr. Barnes then presented the bills received for the month of July. The Chamber voted to pay these.

In a report from the Industrial Development Committee, Chairman E. L. Kelly stated that he had found at least three sites which are for sale and could possibly be used by an industry. The Chamber manager was given the price of one of the farms by the owner. The other two are not known for sure.

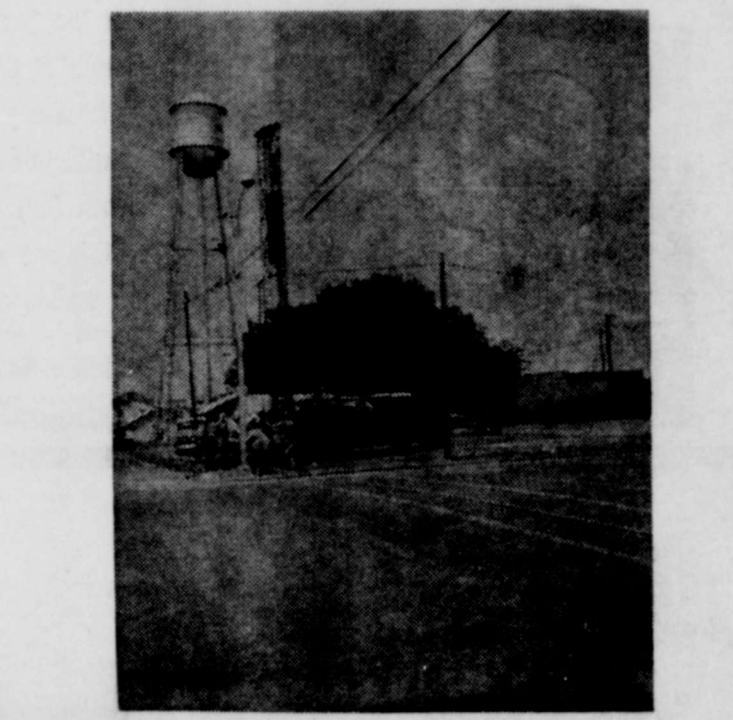
The Chamber then discussed the present water situation in Abernathy. Mr. Charles Norwood, City Manager, gave a report on the city wells and on what action the City Council has taken. After further discussion, the Chamber decided that all it could do at the present time was to back the City Council in whatever decision it made.

Ray Stephens, of the local FM station, KWGN, gave a report on what kind of "Trades Days" he had seen. In doing so, he recommended a frontier day and gave suggestions to the Chamber in how to organize it. The Chamber discussed his ideas, but took no definite action.

The Hale County girls are sponsored at the seminar by the Hale County Farm Bureau. 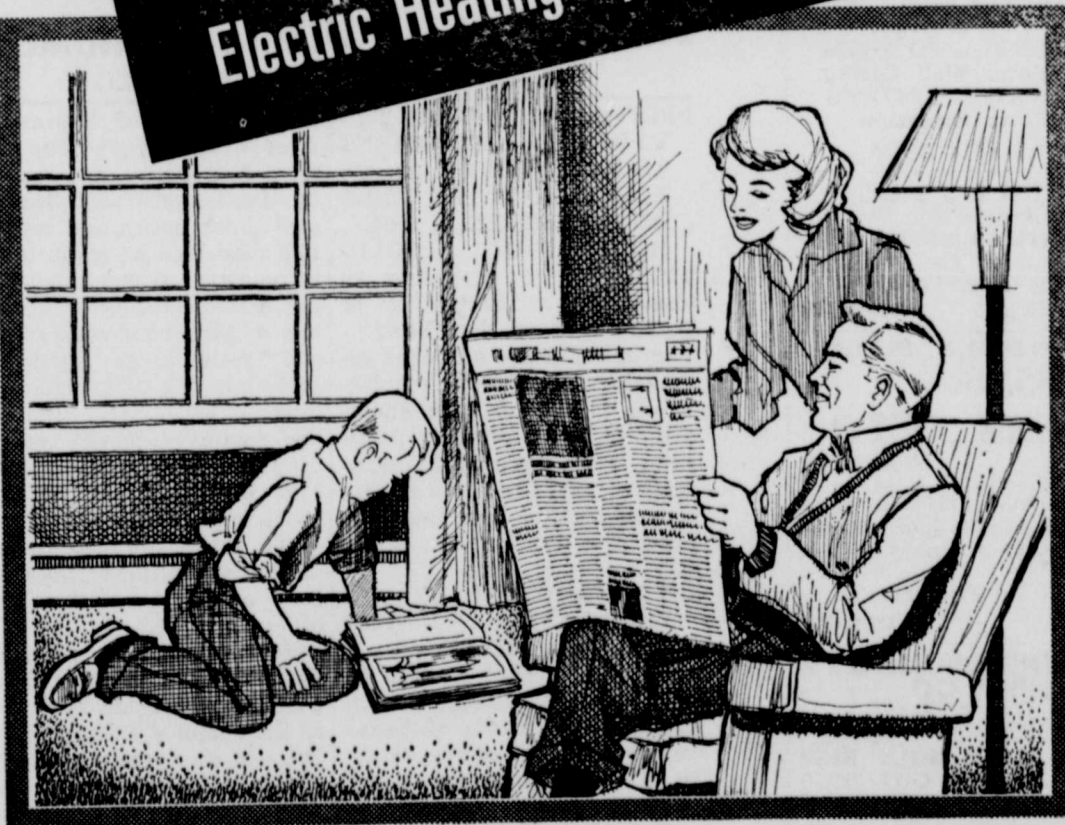

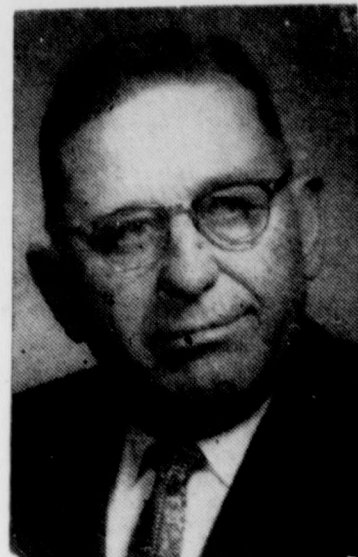

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
