## Rains Benefited Some Parts of County; Eratic Condition Brings Loss

The age-old expression "It's an ill wind that blows nobody good," has not run true to form in Dawson and adjoining counties within recent weeks, according to reports reaching the Courier from virtually every part of the county.

Spotted rains, hail, sand and wind, have played havoc with early crops, but in most communities there has been sufficient moisture to re-plant, and conditions are reported favorable despite the recent set-back.

Lamesa apparently has been the center for the heaviest rains, and these have proven more or less damaging in many parts of the twenty-mile radius north and south, more or less. Some washouts, within the area, were caused with excessive rains. The strip extends within bordering territory of the R. E. Echols farm, 14 miles northeast of town to a point one mile beyond Cotton Center, south of Lamesa.

Punkin Center, Welch and Munger, northwest of the city are said to be those most badly affected. In the latter community the severe wind and sand of Monday, May 30, did a great damage. The other communities are reporting scarcity of rain. Higginbotham, Klondike, Patricia, Sparenberg and Shumake, also report very little moisture since June 1, and earlier.

From Shumake comes reports to the effect that about half of the crops are up, they have a little moisture, but need rain. Young crops were badly damaged there and elsewhere last Friday night by high wind, sand and hail. A strip extending across the south portion of the county from Shumake to Higginbotham has caused some uneasiness to farmers affected. In the latter case this community received a little over half inch of rain on June 2.

Soil Conservation Service reports for June on gauges at four directions are as follows: L. B. Stuart, 10 miles southeast, 1.15 inches on June 3; R. E. Echols northeast of Lamesa, .82 on June 2; .45 8th; John Webster, Higginbotham, southwest, .55 inches, 2nd; Jess McWhirter farm, eight miles northwest, .30 on 3rd, and .05 on Sunday, 5th. The camp gauge recorded 45 inches June 7 and .05 inches on Wednesday, on this occasion the city received some hail, which fell for about five minutes. No damage was reported, however.

## School Board Asks For Big WPA Grant

**\$148,000 Is Sought For New Buildings And Improvements**

Lamesa school officials have made application for loans and grants of approximately \$148,000 to complete their building program. W. T. Strange of Haynes and Strange, architects for the school board, reported.

The program includes two primary grade buildings, a physical education building, a negro school and repairs and improvements to present buildings.

Enrollment in the Lamesa high school the past year was large enough to automatically place it in Class "A." Enrollment in the grade school kept pace with the high school.

Officials are hopeful, Strange said, of favorable action on their application as soon as funds for the work are made available.

## AVIATION SHOW BEING PLANNED ON JULY FOURTH

Lamesans, who are probably wondering where they will spend their holiday on July 4th, are advised a movement is under way for a big aerial show to be staged at the new Lamesa Airport site. The plans for this event are still in the beginning, but Chamber of Commerce executives are working on the details and citizens are assured that it will materialize.

Likewise, details are being investigated to lease approximately 100 acres of the Mac W. Hancock property for erection of the Lamesa Airport. The tract under consideration joins 100 acres that was recently leased to the local golf club, which is a newly formed beginners' club known as the Airport club.

The golf course will beckon members and others on this occasion also.

## BLAINE WIGGINS NAMED HEAD OF NEW GOLF CLUB

Twenty-two members of the newly organized Airport Golf club met Monday night at the Dawson County Cotton Oil Mill office lawn and further perfected the association by electing Blaine Wiggins, city secretary, as their president. Morris Beavers was elected vice president. Leonard Scott was named secretary at the initial meeting. The rules committee elected on Monday night were Dr. V. L. Lawson, chairman, Travis Tarter and E. F. Mangum.

It was announced the course will be ready for play Sunday and it is expected that it will see many amateur golfers in action. The club now has thirty-eight charter members and the membership will be limited to only forty-five.

There are 3,124 yards in the nine-hole course. Par for the course is 36 for men and 45 for women. It was decided that each member is entitled to one town guest each month, out-of-town will be permitted to play free. Likewise the wives of members will be entitled to play without cost, but a small fee will be in effect for non-members who care to play.

The course, as previously announced, is located on approximately 100 acres of the Mac W. Hancock property five miles north of Lamesa. It was named Airport Course due to the fact that plans are being worked out to establish the Lamesa Airport on the adjoining 100-acre tract within the near future.

## New Projects In City Keep Workers Busy

**City Paving And Other Progressive Steps Being Made**

New civic development is noticeable in all parts of Lamesa. This is particularly true in the business district and in close-by areas that apparently are soon to be included. Paving projects which will naturally through more traffic over on North Second Street, and on South Second, are to be considered as a progressive step in extending the business section north and south.

Curb and gutter has been finished on the two blocks of North Second designated to receive topping similar to the North Houston Street improvement, which is proving it's benefit by the heavy influx of traffic since completion. Caliche is being graded on the block running east of Houston Street, and trucks are bringing the base to the other block, which will connect a thoroughfare from Highway 9.

Notice of paving is pending on one block of South Second which is the only unpaved block on the street. Work is due to start on this improvement as soon as details can be worked out. Together the two streets will relieve

Reports from various parts of the county this week were to effect that hail, sand and lightning did considerable damage during Friday night's storm. At Sparenberg lightning struck the school house and caused a damage amounting to about \$300.

Serious damage occurred to growing cotton crops throughout the county. It was estimated that approximately 75 per cent of the crop was destroyed by wind and sand.

Additional rains of the past week have been beneficial to this county, and enabled farmers to have sufficient moisture to re-plant. It is not considered likely that every section of the county has received worthwhile rains.

## Many Can Use Money To Good Advantage Right Now

More compliance money was received and distributed to farmers this week. Last Friday, \$2,397.59 arrived at the county agent's office, and on Thursday morning, \$3,718.81 was received, according to the agent's force. Together they total \$6,116.40 in payments to 77 farmers. This augments the sum received and distributed the preceding week of better than \$81,000 and brings the total slightly under \$90,000 distributed in this county.

As previously stated the checks are due at regular intervals until 1900 have received their payments for co-operation with the federal farm program in 1937. Notices are mailed out as soon as the checks arrive and farmers call at the office for them.

With unfavorable conditions in getting crops up this spring the money is being well received.

Local cowboys and cowgirls from some of the larger ranches were in majority and proved their ability to ride and rope as well as those who were considered the best in their profession.

### MIDWAY H. D. CLUB REPORT

The school for the Deaf and Dumb was established in 1856 at Austin, Texas," said Mrs. Harvey Weir when the Midway Home Demonstration club met in the home of Mrs. Weir, June 2.

In January 1856 the school opened with three pupils. They were under charge of Matthews Clark. The trustee's rented land, three-quarters of a mile from the city of Austin. They began school at 8 o'clock and closed at 3:30. The first four grades do not have industrial training, but spend the day in school. For those above the fourth the school for deaf and dumb are free except transportation and clothing. Parents that place their children in school will have to fill out a blank and file with the superintendent before the child can be considered. The pupils can write as often as they desire. But are requested to write once a month. They do not furnish stamps. After the child is placed in school they can not be taken out unless sickness. The school publishes a monthly paper, "The Lone Star." It is edited by the principal and printed by the pupils. All parents should take it, as they would like to know what their children are doing in the school.—Reporter.

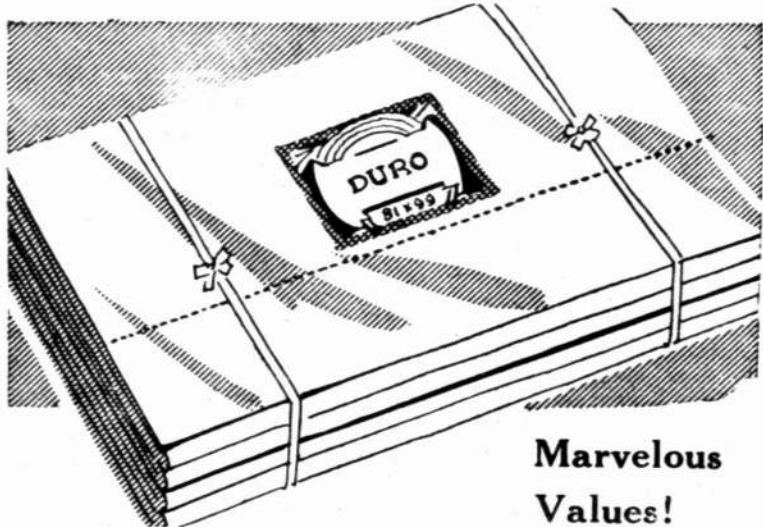

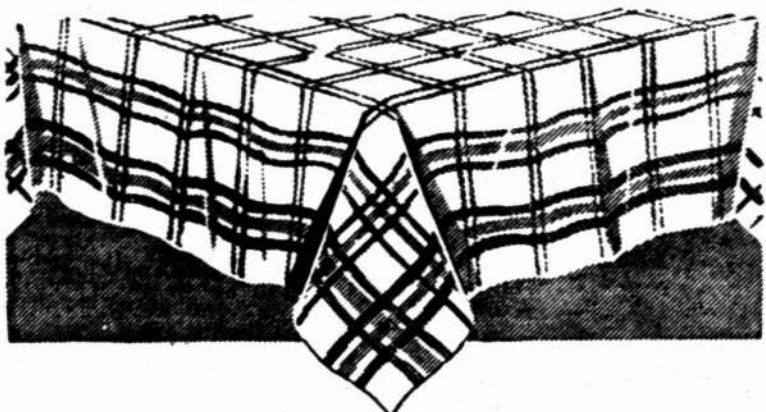

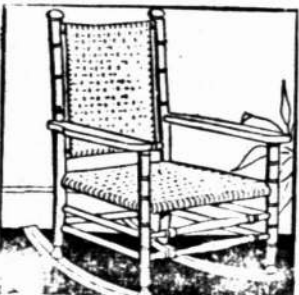

## No Wheat Marketing Quotas Effective For Current Year

College Station, June 2.—The wheat crop will not be subject to the marketing quota plan in 1938, according to Geo. Slaughter, Wharton, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation committee.

The new farm act set May 15 as the latest date for establishing a national wheat marketing quota, subject to a referendum by wheat growers, and also provides that no wheat quotas can be in effect during the marketing year beginning July 1, 1938, unless provisions for parity payments have been made.

The Texas committee received word at its headquarters at Texas A. and M. College from AAA officials at Washington that the wheat marketing quota would have been proclaimed if parity payments had been provided for within the required time. Slaughter said.

The farm act provides that the wheat quota shall be proclaimed when the total supply of wheat will exceed

the normal year's domestic consumption and exports by more than 35 per cent.

The Division of Crop Estimates has indicated that the probable production of winter wheat will be 754 million bushels and spring wheat around 200 million bushels, and there is a carry over of about 200 million bushels.

The total supply of wheat is expected to be approximately 1,154,000,000 bushels. This amount would be 400 to 450 million bushels in excess of the normal year's domestic consumption and exports and about 200 million bushels in excess of the marketing quota level.

Wheat is the only crop for which marketing quotas this year depended upon provisions for parity payments. Slaughter pointed out. Marketing quotas are already in effect for cotton and for flue-cured burley and the dark tobacco. The act provides that there shall be no marketing quota for rice this year.

Mr. Lackey is in the city making a survey of juvenile delinquency and spoke to the club members relative to the system that is practiced by the department in such matters as to face Dawson county.

It was pointed out that since the county was organized there were only sixteen juvenile cases heard in county court in about a year and a half ago, and within the short period there has been so many new cases filed.

He said juvenile delinquency is not a new problem, and that such matters are common occurrences that must be brought under control.

While here Mr. Lackey is making a survey of the city and visiting in the homes. He plans to speak again at the Rotary club again Friday and was the speaker Wednesday at the Lion club.

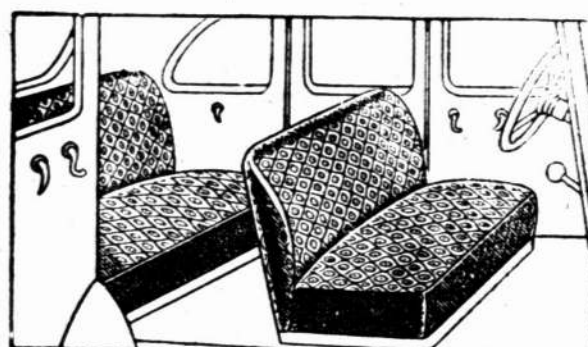

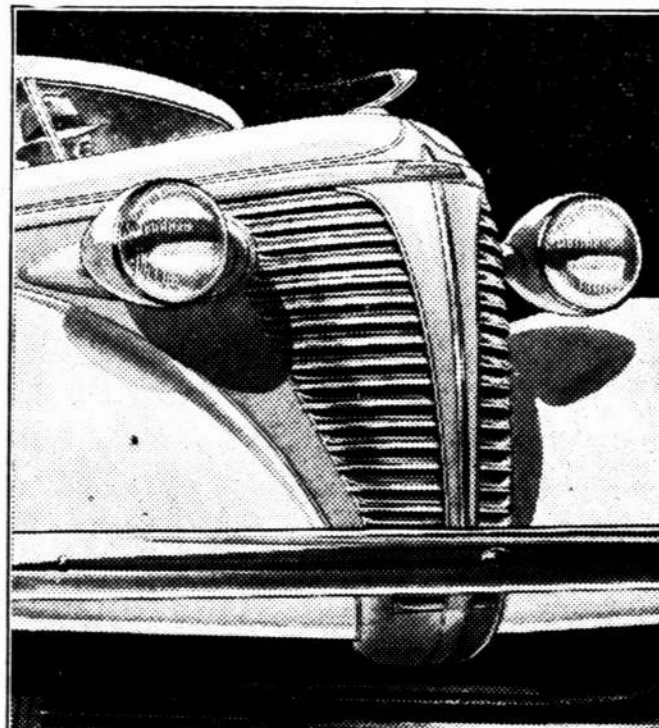

## Stockmen Warned To Watch Stock During Screwworm Season

Corfage Station, June 9.—"Prepare for the screwworm in great numbers," R. R. Rupert, entomologist of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College, has warned Texas ranchmen. The Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has forecast a severe infestation probably worse than that of 1935 in many parts of the Southwest, especially Texas and Arizona.

The screwworm fly has started earlier than ever before. The infestation in extreme Southwest Texas has been held down by dry weather during the first part of the season, but the weather in other parts of the state has favored the rapid development of the insect.

The best way to protect livestock from screwworm, Reppert points out is to examine frequently so that wounds may be treated before they are seriously infested. Many ranchmen report that they have found it advisable to hold wounded or infested animals in small hospital traps, located on a high, open part of the range where flies are less abundant.

Reppert endorses the bureau's recommendation for killing the maggots. The procedure is to treat the infested wound with 90 percent commercial benzol. The wound is then plugged with clean cotton saturated with benzol. Reinfestation is prevented by lightly covering the area around the wound with dehydrated pine-tar oil of 1.065 specific gravity.

The advantage of the benzol over most patented medicines lies in its low cost and in the fact that it does not cause shock to animal tissue. It does not deteriorate with age but is highly inflammable and will evaporate readily. It is this last property which makes it valuable in screwworm control, for the maggots are killed not by the liquid but by the fumes.

Reppert also emphasized that the common pine-tar oil will often burn the animal while the dehydrated form will not.

## S. C. S. Notes-

Rotated grazing is one of the best means of improving the range in this area stated the range engineer of the S. C. S.

Dividing the range into two or more pastures allows the grass to grow uninterrupted on one while livestock are grazing another.

Overgrazed and drouth-stricken pastures, which are common in the wind erosion region of the Southern Great Plains, are in a weak condition and need periodic rest intervals so the vegetation may revive itself by new growth reseeded and foliage. Trampling and grazing pastures in this condition have

a tendency to keep them unproductive. Rest is important to grass that is weak from the effects of overgrazing and drouth. In areas where rotated grazing has been practiced, the come back of the grass has been remarkable.

Because of the need of feed many pastures are grazed too early in the spring, it is pointed out. This can be over come to a certain degree when the grazed area is divided into two or more pastures. Spring grazing can be alternated from year to year, and the owner will be well repaid by the increased stand of vigorous grass that will result from the spring rest.

Vigorous grass furnishes one of the best erosion control covers for land. Each blade of grass serves as a miniature dam in checking the flow of water,

and causes it to seep into the ground to aid further growth. Where the grass cover is poor, water runs off the pasture and not only takes valuable soil with it, but also is lost as moisture for the land upon which it fell.

Rotated grazing will allow the grass to become better established and this in turn, will prevent loss of both soil and moisture. This has been demonstrated by improvement of cooperator pastures in Soil Conservation Service near Lamesa, Texas.

## Rigid Inspection Promised Against Filthy Rest Rooms

Austin Tex. June 9.—The State Health Department's three month old campaign against filthy rest rooms over the state has been marked by splendid cooperation from the retail business establishments involved, the public at large, and the press. Our department is so firmly convinced that filthy rest rooms are a major public health hazard that the department's sanitary inspectors are checking rest rooms as carefully as they do other violations of sanitary regulations, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

"We have served notice on all retail establishments in Texas that they must clean up their rest rooms and continue to keep them clean under penalty of violating the State Food and Drug Law, Article 695, which carries a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars."

"Our sanitary inspectors have been notified to assess this fine whenever they find rest rooms maintained without adequate sanitation. The public and business establishments have been adequately warned. Any subsequent violations will be dealt with through legal channels."

"We want the public to cooperate with us in this campaign. Such filthy conditions as heretofore have been prevalent over the state will never again be tolerated. When the public finds a rest room that is unsanitary, whether it be in a cafe, tavern, filling station, retail establishment or bus station, they will be doing their community a favor if they transmit this information directly to the State Health Department, Austin, so that necessary steps can be taken."

"Disease breeds in unsanitary rest rooms and is spread from one person to another, indiscriminately, under such conditions. Facilities should be available for washing the hands; toilets must be sanitary and kept that way. The rest room that does not meet these minimum requirements is a reflection on the establishment it serves and should be so interpreted."

## CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for the position of Printer's Assistant in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Treasury Department. Competitors will be rated upon the results of a mental test. For this position the Treasury Department wishes women. The entrance salary is 66 cents an hour, less 3 1-2 per cent retirement deduction.

In addition to a general physical examination, applicants will be required to undergo a special test in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing to determine susceptibility to dermatitis which sometimes develops from handling printed work.

The closing dates for receipt of applications from States east of Colorado is June 20, and from Colorado and states westward, June 23, 1938.

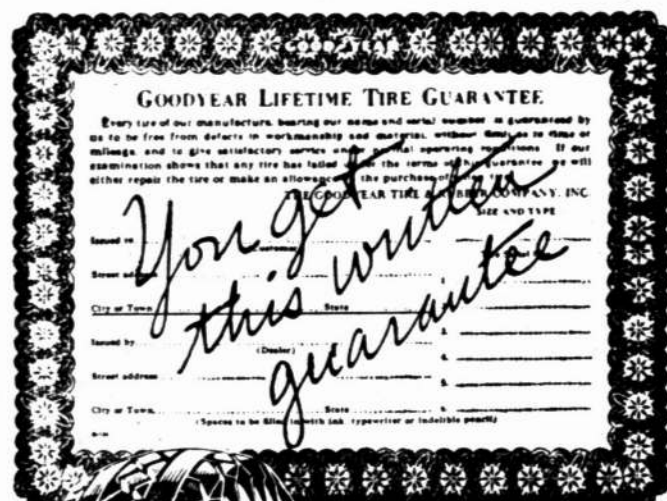

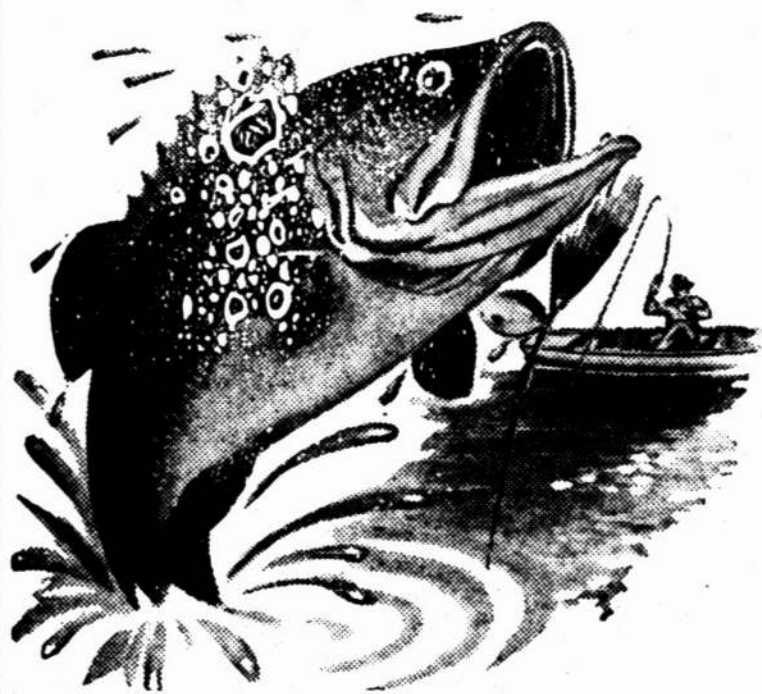

## Local Citizens Are Planning Trip Soon To Fort Worth Meet

Lamesa leaders and others throughout the state are being invited to attend the Governor's Traffic Safety Convention and conference at Fort Worth, June 15. Mayor Marr, who has received information from Harry Hines, member of the Highway Commission, reports that plans are being made locally to carry at least one car of Lamesans. The statewide safety conference will deal with problems existing in every town and community in the state and it is considered likely that a uniform city traffic system will be introduced.

"Present indications point conclusively to the fact that this meeting called for the purpose of mapping a far flung attack on the grim hitch-hiker of the highways, will prove to be the largest assembly of safety advocates ever held in the Southwest." George Clark secretary said after checking over the rapidly growing list of cities, towns and communities naming delegations to the conference.

"A comprehensive and definitely defined program with specific objectives appropriately and concisely outlined, highlighted by tried and proven methods, will be placed before the convention," Carl Rutland, chairman pointed out.

While a majority of the time of the delegates will necessarily be devoted to consideration of the greatest problems confronting this state today, including talks by some of the nation's foremost leaders in traffic safety work, there will be other features on the program as well, including one of the largest safety parades ever held in this state scheduled for high noon. Five hundred motorcycle officers will compose one unit alone of the parade. Numerous bands representing every section of the state will take part.

Governor George Earle of Pennsylvania has received an invitation from Governor James V. Alfred to address the conference as its principal speaker. Several other outstanding safety leaders are also on the program.

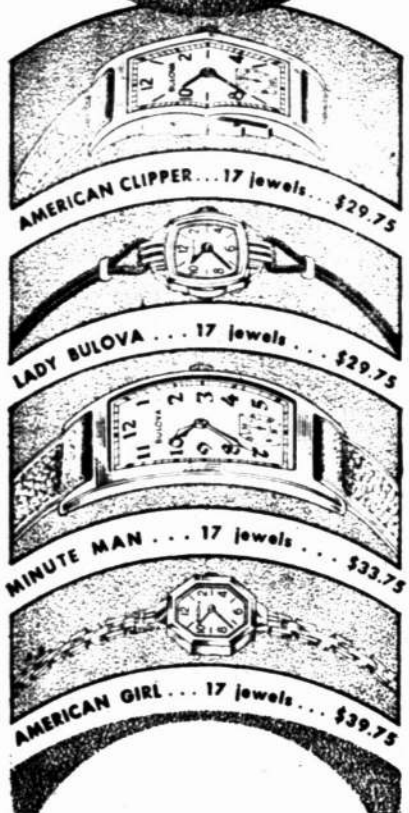

**FARM NOTES**

**1938 Farm Program Suggestions:**

Cotton acreage allotments were mailed out to all whose work sheets were in order on Friday of last week. Since that time there has been a number of producers in the office wanting to know the way their farms would be affected by not planting all the acreages allowed to cotton. Such farms have their acreage allotment and are not able to hold the acreage planted due to wind, hail and water damage would like to plant a part of the cotton acreage to feed. Under the regulations any producer may get his full payment due without penalty by planting only eighty per cent of his cotton allotment and the acreage between eighty per cent of his total allotment of cotton may be planted to feed. In other words a producer with his average acreage allotment of fifty-five acres to cotton and the other eleven acres may be added to his feed acreage and this will not draw a penalty provided the producer meets all other requirements of the program.

**Fallow Land**

We do not recommend that any producer leave his retired land fallow unless such land is contoured as a protection against wind and water erosion on account of the possible penalties that may be applied. We suggest that the retired land or soil conserving acres be planted to one of the permitted crops, such as can, sudan, peas, soy beans and millet, which may be harvested for hay and offered for sale, provided the normal number of dairy cows is not increased by over two cows per farm or over ten per cent increase in the number in the entire county.

Most producers seem to think that it is okay to not plant in excess of their cotton acreage allotment and be sure that their twenty-five per cent of the crop land is planted to soil conserving crops and the balance to feed.

There has been cases in the past where the total cultivated land actually measured out more than the producer thought he had, and in that way had too much feed crops planted and of course, were penalized for having too many acres of feed under the program in 1937.

Deductions and penalties as well as payments will be made on the basis of cotton and feed acreage allotments and plantings in 1938.

Penalties will, of course, be applied in case the producer plants more than his allotted acres in either feed or cotton.

As stated above in case a producer under plants his cotton acreage allotment by only twenty per cent, he may add the twenty per cent of cotton acreage allotment that he failed to plant to his feed acreage without penalty. Crops Destroyed by Sand and Hail or Water

We have wired the state office for a ruling in regard to planting such destroyed crops to other crops for protection against wind erosion, but so far have been unable to get a direct answer from the state office other than the fact that they in turn wired Washington office for a ruling on that feature. To date there is no information available for those who have lost their crops.

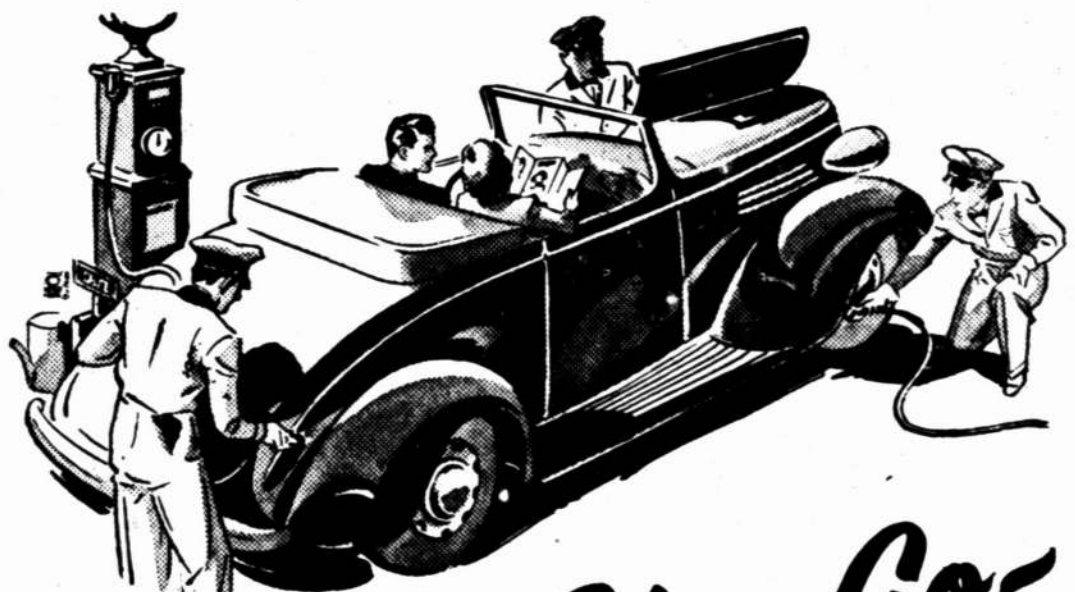

The County Agent received additional checks totaling \$23,000 during the past week and more are expected from time to time. This amount carried the total sum received through Friday, June 3, to \$85,000 and is being distributed at an opportune time when weather disturbances of the weekend left heavy damage to growing cotton crops throughout this county and adjoining sections. It would be difficult to estimate the cotton crop damage. Personal contact with hundreds of farmers in this city on Saturday leads to an estimated 75 per cent damage throughout the county. Friday night's damage apparently affected every community to a certain extent. Those sections which have not received sufficient planting moisture are still as fortunate

as those neighbors they have envied. This was the topic of discussion when farmers and stockmen met and discussed their problems here Saturday.

Despite blowouts, the residents of Dawson county still have much to be thankful for. Reports from other points in West Texas were to effect hail and tornado winds brought destruction to property and loss of life. In the Wichita Falls area, an estimated \$90,000 damage occurred when 20 persons were injured and property loss was heavy. In this immediate section hail was reported in many adjoining communities. Hail and sand accounted for property loss in the Wilson area, between Tahoka and Slaton.

The Old West lived again in Lamesa during the past weekend when the rodeo brought memories of days of a few decades ago. The show was financially a huge success. A large portion of the rodeo contestants were from ranches near this county seat, although there were some from Brownfield, Seagraves, O'Donnell and other points. In the parade the majority

of the riders were from Lamesa and it was surprising to learn that as many horses could be found within the city limits.

Miss Ann Woodward copped the spotlight in the cowgirl contest and was followed closely by Miss Joan Phinizy, a clever little rider. For the honors they were rivaled by some fifteen other ladies who demonstrated their ability in horsemanship.

The old time square dance on Saturday night was the highlight and climaxed the features. High wind and sand prevented this affair on Friday night. C. E. Martin, Sinclair oil and gas distributor, proved his ability to call the dance when he was requested to "pinch-hit" for Andy Anderson.

Ruben Parker, a local boy, who has been employed in the Government's Soil Conservation Service project in the Hart's Creek area of Titus county, arrived last Friday for a short visit with his mother here before leaving Monday for A. and M. College where he will take a three months course before returning to East Texas to continue with the project that is fighting water erosion on the sandy soil there. Ruben kinda fell for the rolling slopes, hill land and piney woods of that area and will embark upon his chosen profession, after finishing the special course on one of the State's largest erosion demonstrations.

Over at the City Hall the chief executive and others who are conducting the affairs of the city are making arrangements to build a small 8x8-foot house over the pump, which was only recently attached to one of the City Hall wells. The rock or brick structure will be erected for decoration as well as to keep the youngsters away from the pump. Bids have been received for both rock and brick, but according to early accounts this week contract had been let.

Of special interest to the kiddies is the announcement to effect that water will be turned into the city park wading pool. Likewise water will be turned into the municipal swimming pool, south of the city, probably this week. Already the City Park is attracting much attention and several families each Sunday are taking lunches down to the park where it is nice and cool. The shady courthouse lawn, too, has proven a haven for many who bring their reading material along to pass leisure hours away.

Throughout the country vacations are being planned. Lamesa will receive considerable benefit from tourists' traffic within the future as thousands

Contoured Fences  
And Farm Roads Are  
Becoming Popular

Farmers of the Texas Panhandle are learning the value of doing things on the contour. Soil Conservation Service technicians report. More and more during recent years farmers are planting their principal crops around the curve of the slope on the level.

Conservation of soil and moisture by farming on the contour has brought such satisfactory results in increase crop yields that many Panhandle farmers now are using the same principal for other farming operations. They're building new fences and roads on the contour, and in many instances old fences and roads are being rearranged to follow the true level of the land.

Contour fences have many advantages, the Soil Conservation Service points out. Contour farming in a square-fenced field usually makes a number of short rows or point rows in the corners. Farmers usually consider such rows a nuisance and in many instances are rebuilding fences to parallel the curvature of the contour.

One farmer, who had a permanent pasture adjoining a cultivated field, added the point rows to the pasture and added some of the pasture at the upper swing of the contour to the cultivated portion of the farm. In the end he had about the same acreage

of pasture and cultivated land as before. He protected the point rows newly seeded to pasture grass by not mowing the fence until the grass was firmly established. When land next to a cultivated field has a soil that is rocky, thin, or unproductive, it should not be added to the cultivated portion of the field, the Service says.

Contour fence also serve as permanent guide for farming on the level. In some cases they help to keep livestock from walking straight up and down slopes and starting gullies. They also make it possible to get field divi-

sion roads on the contour. Although fruit growing in the Southern Great Plains usually is a sideline, the Soil Conservation Service reports that several farmers are planting fruit trees and vine yards on the contour.

Every phase of contour farming serves to hold the water on the land where it falls, thereby aiding in growing vegetation which furnishes protection against erosion, the service points out.
