Titus County Tax Rolls Are Down

The 1962 Titus County Tax Rolls are down slightly from 1961. This was brought about by a drop in oil valuations in the north part of the county. The oil valuations are down more than \$280,000 from 1961 while real estate and other values are up about \$250,000.

The total taxable value for 1962 is \$12,392,365, down from \$12,409,465 for 1961. The value for state tax purposes (the property that is not designated homestead) is \$9,238,155, down from \$9,361,640 for 1961.

Assessed taxes are as follows: State \$38,799.58, down \$519.81; County \$117,741.15, down \$163.17; Road \$27,714.91, down \$370.99; Common Schools \$23,592.11, up \$163.70 and total roll \$207,847.75, down \$890.27 from \$208,738.02 for 1961.

In 1961 we issued 8114 statements, this year 8276, an increase of 162 or 2%. By contrast in 1952 only 6243 statements were issued, a 10 year increase of 2033 or 32%.

In addition this office handles taxes for three independent schools as follows: Chapel Hill Rural High School 1962 roll \$5991.77, up slightly, Cookville \$3746.31, up slightly and Winfield \$4294.78, down slightly.

Collections begin Monday, Oct. 1 and we except (based on past experience) that about 75% or \$167,000.00 will be paid during October, taking advantage of the 3% discount offered. Poll tax receipts are available the same day at \$1.75 each. This is the poll tax receipt needed for voting after Feb. 1, 1963.

Property Owners Get 1962 Tax Statements

Taxpayers have received statements for State, County, School and City taxes for 1962. Notices were in the mail the latter part of last month. In some counties there is a discount for early payment. Discounts include three per cent for October, two per cent for November, one per cent for December, and net for January. Taxes become delinquent in February.

Austin. — Some of the legislators who get elected on Nov. 6 will have office space at the Capitol. But some won't.

For two years now, space formerly occupied by State agencies has been in the process of conversion to offices for the 150 members of the House of Representatives. A few were occupied during the 1961 session.

Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, chairman of the House Rules Committee, had the chore of assigning offices, with not enough to go around.

Finally he hit upon a solution. He has 90 offices ready. So he and the Speaker-to-be, Byron Tunnell of Tyler, agreed to assign the 90 offices to the representatives who will be returning.

There are 92 incumbents, including two Republicans, in the Nov. 6 election. One is Speaker-to-be Tunnell, who not only will have an office, but also an apartment.

If all incumbents but one are elected, there will be just enough offices for each old member to have one.

The 60 or so freshmen members will have to do what all representatives have done in the past—use their desks in the House chamber as their offices.

When the John Reagan State Office Building is completed next year, the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the Department of Agriculture will be moved out of the Capitol, leaving space for the other 60 representatives to have private offices.

COURT PHOTOS—Junior Bar Association directors urged the State Bar judicial section to leave it to individual trial judges whether to allow news photographers to take pictures in their courtrooms.

This is contrary to the views of the American Bar Association, which thinks courtroom photography should be outlawed.

The upcoming Annual Conference of Texas Judges will vote on whether to adopt the American Bar's proposed ban on full news coverage of trials.

SCHOOL PRAYERS—Public schools in Texas are not prohibited from allowing prayers to be said or passages from the Bible to be read (as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court decision in the Engel vs. Vitale case), so long as the State or a political subdivision does not prescribe or approve the prayer or religious activity.

So said Attorney General Will Wilson in a legal opinion requested by J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

CROOKED HOLES—What may be the final session of the House General Investigating Committee's look into the East Texas oil scandal was held in Austin. Mainly, it was to allow production and drilling men for 14 major companies to declare under oath that their companies do not have any illegally deviated wells.

It also gave the East Texas Salt Water Disposal Company a chance to defend itself.

Investigators got detailed lectures on the fluid mechanics of the big East Texas field. Stressed was how daily injection of some 450,000 barrels of salt water—back into the vast water-bearing formation—drives the oil to the surface.

Officials of the company hotly denied that the disposal company, set up in 1942 as a cooperative venture to get rid of salt water which was polluting the Sabine River, is hurting the rights of individual landowners by its operations as had been charged.

The hearing also gave Chairman William J. Murray Jr. of the Railroad Commission a chance to testify that the Department of Public Safety has found no evidence to link Commission employees to the scandal, other than those former employees Murray asked the state police to investigate last March.

Legislators on the committee seem certain to recommend changes in the law as a means of providing surer punishment for those who violate Commission regulations, or who swear to falsehoods.

Also likely to come out of the investigation is a recommendation for revision of the marginal well law. This law makes a well capable of producing only 19 barrels a day a more valuable well than one flowing 1,000 barrels a day. The 19-barrel well is allowed to produce without shut-down days, while the better well can produce only 20 barrels a day for eight days a month. Many agreed this was unfair.

BIGGEST ROAD PROJECT—Largest highway program ever put together in Texas was authorized by the State Highway Commission.

Covering super-highway work only, the program comes to \$287,000,000 worth of construction and right-of-way buying during the coming two years. It will build 1,063 miles of expressway and buy right-of-way for 188 more miles.

When the work is completed about four years from now it

will double the completed mileage of interstate highways in Texas under the 90 per cent Federal-10 per cent State program.

SCREW WORM FUNDS NEEDED—Texas Animal Health Commission will ask the Legislature for \$1,500,000 as an emergency fund to continue the fight against screw worms.

It will request another \$1,500,000 to make up the state's one-fourth of the \$12,000,000 program, with stockmen putting up \$3,000,000 and the Federal government \$6,000,000.

ANTI-AMENDMENT—A statewide group opposing the most controversial of the 14 proposed Constitutional Amendments is mapping its fight in Austin, with the help of Governor Daniel.

Under fire is the amendment which would empower the Legislature to require trial de novo in appeals from decision of administrative agencies and executive department of the state or political subdivisions.

STATE EMPLOYS 58,300—Latest figures compiled by State Officials for the Texas Almanac show fifty-eight thousand persons working for the State or Texas.

Per capita, the State of Texas functions with 65 employees for each 10,000 citizens. That is well below the 79 employee average for all states.

Texas is, in fact, among the lowest states. Some have nearly twice as many employees, per capita, as Texas.

DEAD HUNTERS—Twenty-two hunters died last season in Texas, mostly in gun accidents that could have been prevented through careful handling of weapons, the State Department of Health says.

Department is asking hunters looking to the fall and winter seasons to review safe hunting rules and remember them in the field.

FOR POLIO ACTION—Texas Medical Association has joined with the State Department of Health in urging community-wide oral polio vaccine programs.

Both groups state that Sabin oral vaccine Type I and II are fully licensed and effective for infants and children.

More than 70 per cent of the paralytic cases in Texas through September 15 occurred among persons who had received no Salk polio vaccination, says the Health Department.

However, polio cases are slackening off. Only two of the five cases reported last week were paralytic.

LAST OF POLIO IMMUNIZATION VACCINE TO BE SUNDAY, OCT. 7

Dr. E. L. Miller reports that Type II of the Sabin oral vaccine is available and the vaccine will be given at the Talco High School Sunday, Oct. 7, between the hours of 12 and 3 p. m.

All people who have taken Type I and III are urged to complete the series of vaccine by taking Type II oral vaccine. The complete series, Types I, II and III gives immunization against the crippling disease of poliomyelitis.

Dr. Miller states that the United States Health Department, the Texas State Health Department and the Texas State Medical Association recommend Type II of the Sabin oral vaccine for people of all ages. Over seven million people have taken the vaccine without any ill effect.

Type II will complete the series of vaccine. Type I was given August 12, Type III Sept. 9 and Type II will be given Sunday, October 7.

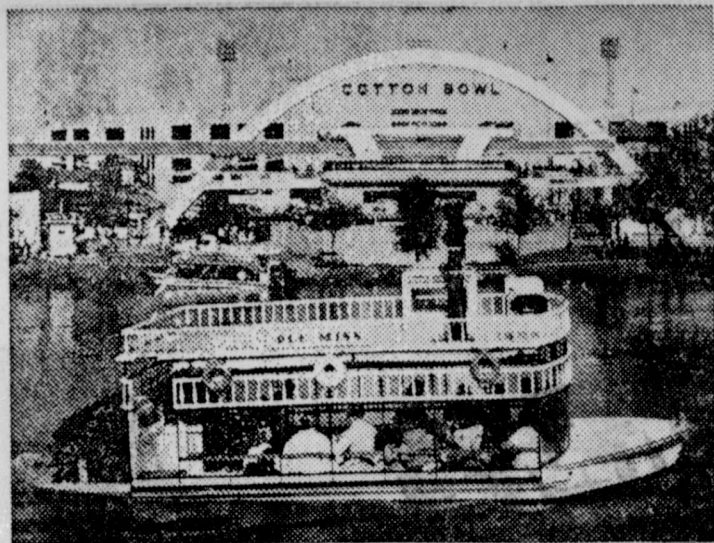

Information On Social Security

Thousands of older men and women across the country are finding that they can receive some social security benefits even though they are still earning more than \$1200 a year. Vernon W. Daniel, Manager of the Paris Social Security District Office, gave these examples of people from 62 to 90 years old who found they could collect some of their benefits.

1. A retired teacher took a part-time teaching position in a private school. His total earnings were \$2400 per year. But he doesn't work at all during June, July, and August. He has worked long enough to qualify for benefits and he is now receiving them for the three vacation months.

2. A woman now 80 years old worked under social security in the early 1940's. When she became 65 in 1946, she did not qualify for benefits because she had not worked long enough. In 1961, the requirements were changed so that her two years of work qualified her. She is now receiving the minimum benefits, \$40 per month. She found that her income from investments would not keep her from receiving benefits.

3. A partially disabled man took a job as night watchman for \$200 per month. He is receiving social security benefits of \$100 a

month. His wife, who was over 65, gets \$50 per month. Their benefits totalled \$1800 per year. His earnings of \$2400 per year caused \$950 of the family benefits to be withheld. But \$850 in benefits were still payable.

4. A man took an extended vacation for four months, for which he did not receive pay. He received benefits for these four months.

Most people age 62 or over can figure out if they qualify for any benefits by sending for leaflet number 23c. It shows how much in benefits, if any are payable when they earn more than \$1200. When family benefits are involved (maximum is \$254 per month), earnings may sometimes be as high as \$4000 with some benefits still payable.

Dear Editor: A lot of people think if something isn't modern it isn't any good, and if you want to run down a farmer, for example, all you have to do is say he hasn't got his farming up on the modern level. That's supposed to bowl him over.

Well, I'll tell you, I haven't got anything against modern farming, it seems to work for some of my neighbors, they can swing as good a loan at the bank as anybody, but I was reading an article last night about farming in backward areas of the world by a university professor who is just back from a long tour and he said primitive farming has its points.

"They're still using the farming methods they've been using for more than 10,000 years," he said, "and while nobody gets rich, it feeds and clothes more than half the people of the world."

Also, there's another point about primitive farming he overlooked. When the United States was farmed by primitive

Or take primitive war. Every nation on earth is now spending all it can get hold of to modernize war, but there's a whole lot to be said for the old-fashioned way. I'll admit a guided missile has more tail fins on it than a bow and arrow, it's speedier, trimmer, employs more people to operate it, drains off more tax dollars, and overall is more stylish and modern, but there's a whole lot to be said for a bow and arrow. If that's all Khrushchev had, it sure would solve the Russian problem, and I doubt if Congress would be passing resolutions against the shipment of tommyhawks to Cuba.

Don't run down the primitive farmer. He may hold the world's future in his hands. Every survival shelter ought to contain a good wooden plow and a strong woman to pull it.

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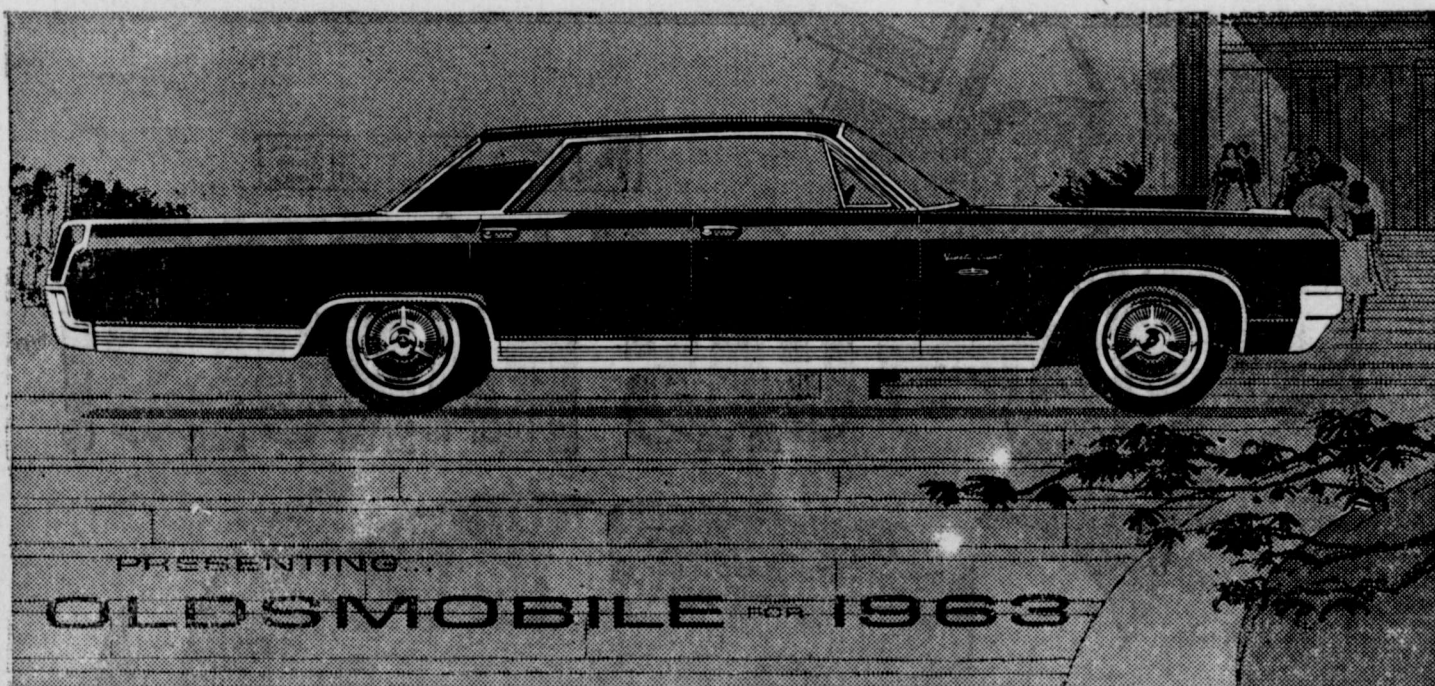
