## West Texas C. of C. Responds To Appeal

With reference to the second mortgage requirement on this year's production loan and in response to an appeal from several of our counties the Chamber of Commerce has wired the United States West Texas Congressmen and Senators as follows.

"Production Loan Administration is demanding second mortgage on the 1932 crop for the entire 1931 loan if any part of same was collateralized on the basis of eight cent cotton. Farmers believe their 1931 loan satisfied when collateralized to Government requirements. For the Government to repudiate its pledge to farmers to accept payment of 1931 loans on basis of eight cotton is unbelievable. This will result in making it impossible for most distressed farmers in the drought area to get this year's loan because the landlords, bankers, and other creditors are unable and cannot waive and the insistence upon this second mortgage will add to distress of the farmer, junior lien holder and the entire community. In addition such regulation discriminates against those who suffered from the drought, and wholly defeats the good purpose of Congress in passing the Production Loan Act. Sixty-seven West Texas counties having paid or collateralized 90 percent of their 1931 loans and desiring to fully discharge all of their obligations most vigorously protest this ruling and respectfully urge you to demand the Secretary of Agriculture to immediately revoke the second mortgage requirement on the 1932 crop for the 1931 loan."

## WHOLE PROJECT OF T. & P. NORTHERN REFUSED BY INTERSTATE COMMISSION

The interstate commerce commission denied the application of the Texas and Pacific Northern railway company, for permission to build 330 miles of line in Texas. The commission said that existing railroads in the territory which would have been served provide convenient access to the most important markets and that their service is supplemented by an extensive system of truck transport.

It is also asserted that the large amount of unutilized land with in 15 miles of existing roads indicates "the lack of urgent necessity for further transportation facilities."

The Texas and Pacific Northern is a subsidiary of the Texas and Pacific railroad. It had been planned to build a road from Big Spring northwest about 232 miles from a point 66 miles north of Big Spring to Lubbock, approximately 46 miles.

An examiner several months ago recommended that the commission approve construction of a portion of the line. This decision, however turns down the entire plan.

### Dr. Paul W. Horn, President Of Tech College Dies

Dr. Paul Whitfield Horn, 62, first and only president of Texas Tech College, Lubbock, died suddenly at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning. A heart attack climaxed three months of ill health during which he submitted to an operation for appendicitis and later spent four weeks in Lubbock Sanitarium, victim of a kidney disorder.

Dr. Horn was stricken as he emerged from his morning bath. He called members of his family after he had reached his bed and told them he felt faint. A Dr. was summoned but the president died soon after his arrival. Death came within five to seven minutes after he suffered the stroke.

Mrs. Horn and his only daughter Ruth were with him when the end came.

Funeral services will be held at five o'clock P. M. Thursday on the college campus, where burial will follow.

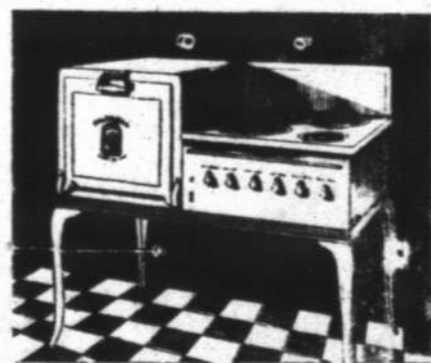

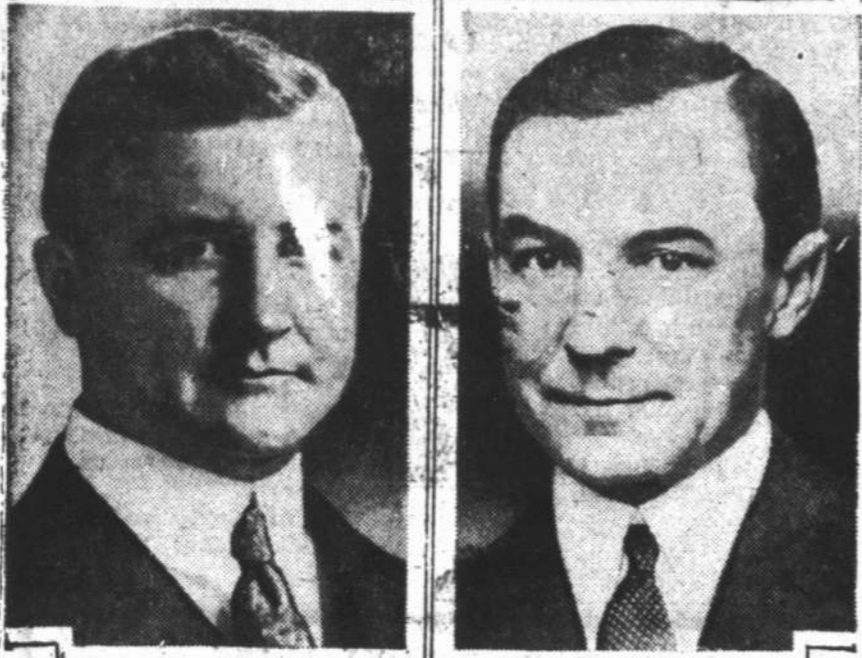

## IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL Lesson

### Lesson for April 17 THE CALL OF ABRAM

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 12:1-9.  
GOLDEN TEXT—And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—Abram Leaving Home.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—God Calls Abram to a Great Adventure.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Making Life an Adventure.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Conquering Power of Faith.

**I. His Separation (v. 1).**  
The new era inaugurated with Noah as head ended in a colossal failure in the impious attempt of man on the plains of Shinar to set himself free from God's government. In view of this failure, God turned aside from the race as such and called Abram and placed him at the head of a new nation which he would train for himself. This call involved:

1. A great sacrifice. It meant the severance of three ties:
  - a. His country in the widest range of his affections.
  - b. His place of birth and kindred which comes still closer to his heart.
  - c. His father's house as the inmost circle of all tender emotions. All these must be cast off before the Lord could get him into the place of blessing. This is a call that is much needed today. The Lord is continually saying, "Come ye out from among them" (II Cor. 6:16-18).
2. The performance of heroic tasks. For Abram to go into a strange land and take possession of it, for God called for heroism. The life of separation from the world costs much, but it is the only way to have God's favor.
3. God's Promise to Abram (v. 2, 3).  
The demand for separation was followed by a seven-fold promise—a gracious engagement on God's part to communicate unmerited favors and confer blessings upon him.
  1. "I will make of thee a great nation" (v. 2). This was fulfilled in a natural way in the Jewish nation and in Ishmael (Gen. 17:20); also in a spiritual sense embracing both Jews and Gentiles (Gal. 3:7, 8).
  2. "I will bless thee" (v. 2). This was fulfilled:
    - a. Temporally (Gen. 13:14-17; 24:35). Abram was enriched with lands, cattle, silver and gold.
    - b. Spiritually (Gen. 15:6; John 8:56). He was freely justified on the grounds of his faith. The righteousness of Christ was imputed unto him, also he had the exalted privilege of talking face to face with the Lord.
  3. "And make thy name great" (v. 2). Going out from his father's house, he himself was to have a great name. He was to be the head of a new house which would be venerated far and wide. He is known as the "friend of God" (James 2:23).
  4. "Thou shalt be a blessing" (v. 2). We now pass from the lower to the higher phase of the promise. It was a great thing to be thus honored and blessed by God, but to be the medium of blessing to others was greater still.
  5. "I will bless them that bless thee" (v. 3). Abram and the nation which came forth from his loins became the very touchstone of God. Since he is God's friend, he regards acts performed toward him as toward himself. This has been strikingly exemplified in all ages since. The nations that have used the Jews well have been blessed.
  6. "And curse him that curseth thee" (v. 3). The nations which have turned against Abram and the nation of which he was head have never prospered. While God at times used the surrounding nations as scourges for his people, he in turn punished them for it.
  7. "And in thee shall all the families of the earth be blessed" (v. 3). This has been fulfilled in:
    - a. The Jewish nation being made the repository of the oracles of God. Through them the Bible has been given to the world.
    - b. The bringing of the Redeemer into the world. Thus they became the channel through which God's richest Gift came into the world.
    - c. A future time when Jews shall be God's missionaries in carrying the good tidings to the ends of the earth.

III. Abram's Obedience to God (v. 4-8).  
Abram at once departed out of his own land. He proved his faith by his obedience. He went out not knowing whither he went. He was a typical believer. He renounced indulgence and idolatry. He separated himself for a testimony by his altars of witness. He entered into Canaan and accepted a pilgrim life.

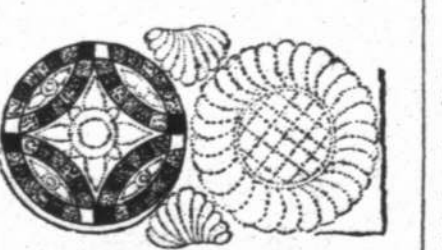

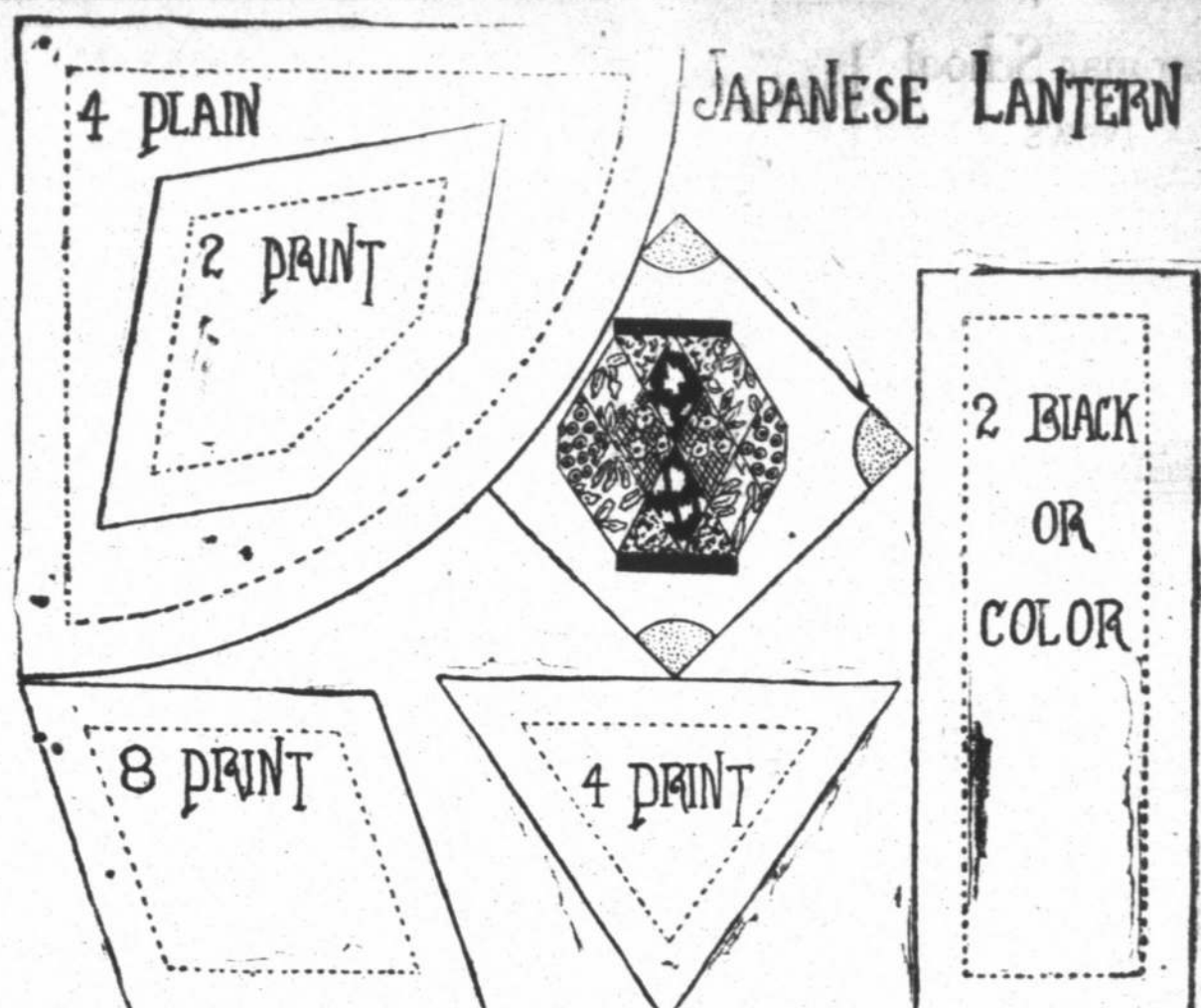

For a quilt about 74x91, 20 pieced blocks and 12 plain are required, using 14 half blocks or triangles and 4 corners to finish the edges. You will need about 5 1/2 yards of white, 1 1/2 yards plain color for corners and border, 1/4 yard black for ends of lantern, if you have no scraps for the lantern, about 1/4 yard of eight different prints.

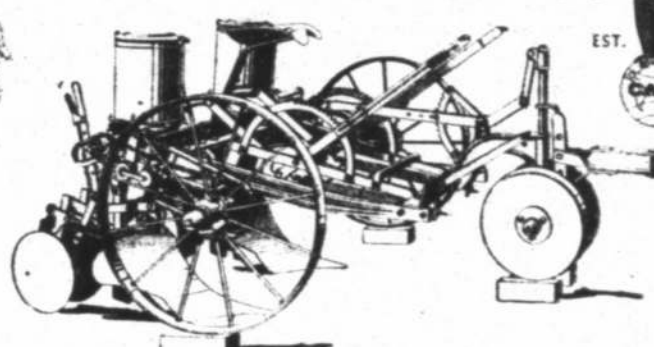

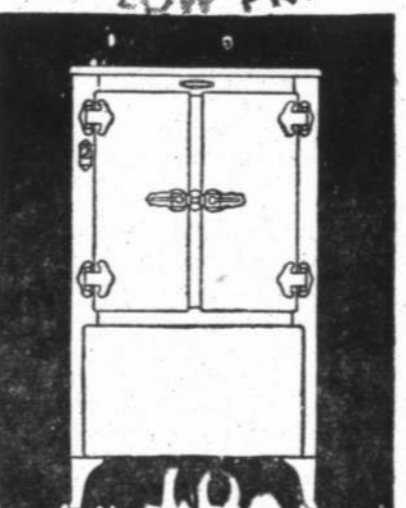

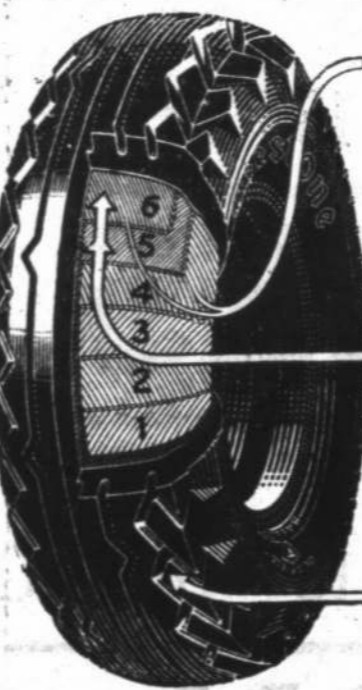

Quaint Russian folk songs, but typical of Russia and other European Countries, are included in the glorious program that is to be given here, in addition to several songs in English and Italian. 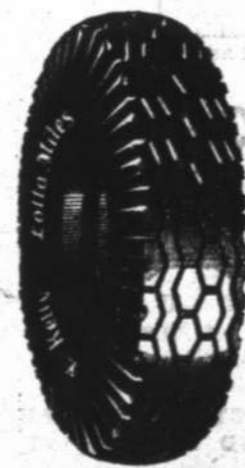
