

# Rotan City Taxes Being Hiked By 7.99% To Compensate For Loss of \$75,000 In Values, Water Rates Also Rise By 20 Cents

Taxes for residents of the City of Rotan will be going up 7.99% as a result of action taken by the members of the Rotan City Council last week.

The City Council went to the very limit on an increase, without actually going up to the 8% which calls for a roll-back.

In 1987, the City of Rotan had a tax rate of .5394 on a certified roll of \$19,620,797.00. That generated \$105,834.58 in spendable tax dollars.

This year, the City of Rotan is operating with a certified tax roll of \$19,545,699.00. That roll, based on the new tax rate (after the 7.99% increase) of .5810 will yield the City of Rotan \$113,560.51 in spendable tax dollars.

By increasing the tax rate from

1987's .5394 per \$100 valuation to .5810, the City of Rotan, will realize an additional \$5,184.25 in spendable tax dollars even though they lost approximately \$75,000 on the tax roll.

In addition to an increase in taxes the Rotan City Council also approved a hike in the water rates. The minimum Rotan City water bill will increase from \$7.50 to \$8.10 a month. This is an increase of 20¢ per 1,000 gallons or 60¢ for the minimum bill of 3,000 gallons of water.

The City of Rotan has absorbed the last two increases from the Ci-

ty of Snyder. In the past two years the rates to the City of Rotan have increased by .09¢ per gallon.

According to projections from Rotan Mayor Jerry Marshall, the increase in water rates will put an additional \$24,000 into the water fund each year.

In other action Jerry Dycus and Archie Neeley, representing the Rotan Volunteer Fire Depart-

ment, appeared before the council requesting action on replacing the ceiling at the Fire Hall. The council unanimously approved hiring D. Ward and Company of Brownwood at a bid of \$1,200 to do the work. A lower bid had been received from a local contractor. The Rotan Firemen are preparing to host the 100th semi-annual meeting of the Mid-West Texas Firemen and Fire Marshals' Association on October 8th.

In addition to asking for a decision on the ceiling, Neeley and Dycus requested that a tank on one of the fire trucks be repaired so the truck could be put back in to service. Councilmen are to further discuss the tank repair at a future meeting.

In final action the council agreed to participate in the community development application

program for 1988; they listened to reports on the various city departments and agreed to pay a Rotan Community Center deficit of \$314.71.

The final discussion centered around employee insurance. No decision was reached. City Secretary Kenneth Vann was to check with employees and report back to the council on insurance desires.

## Tommie Jack Stuart Files As Write-In Candidate On Ballot

Tommie Jack Stuart, after failing in the democratic primary to muster enough votes to defeat Charles Meek for the position of Commissioner of Precinct -3, has filed for a write-in spot on the November 8th general election ballot.

Stuart, running first in a four man race for the Democratic nod on March 8th, was defeated in a head-to-head runoff race by Meek on April 12th.

In the Democratic primary of March 8th, Stuart received a total of 193 votes; Charles Meek had 150; Donald Coker had 137 and Ronald Henry had 55. The totals threw Stuart and Meek into a runoff on April 12th.

In the April 12th runoff, Charles Meek garnered 281 votes to 219 for Stuart. That gave Meek the right to represent the Democratic party on the general election ballot of November 8th.

Stuart officially filed with Fisher County Clerk Bettie Rivers on September 8th to have his name on the ballot as a write-in candidate. He executed a "Declaration of Intent to Run As A Write-In Candidate" form.

Stuart's name will not be on the ballot, but any votes he receives as a write-in candidate will be counted, according to Bettie Rivers, Fisher County Clerk.

## County Gets Soaking Rain, 4 To 6 Inches Recorded Locally

The rain reports from around Fisher County ranged from a high of 6 inches at the J.H. McHaney home 2½ miles south of Roby to a low of 4 inches at the Frances Weatherman home 10 miles northeast of Rotan.

Other locations were 4½ inches reported at the Hobbs Gin - 15 miles west of Rotan and 4½ inches at the Ed Wilfong home, 14 miles northeast of Rotan.

William Cleveland reported 4.10 at his home in Rotan while Jimmy Price reported 5.75 inches in Roby.

As a real live person, real live tax paying resident of Fisher County, I would rather you drop us from your list.

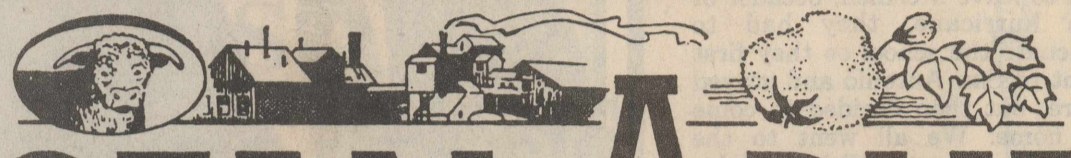

## Commissioners Vote Tax Hike And Raises

Fisher County Commissioners met last Monday morning and approved the 1989 budget and set the tax rate, but it wasn't without a small amount of controversy.

There was a split vote on both issues. Commissioners Jimmy Wright, Jay Hendon and Billy Henderson voted in favor of approving the 1989 budget. Com-

missioner Tommie Jack Stuart voted against the budget. Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett went on record as voting for the motion.

The budget passed by a vote of 4-1. The budget for 1988 was \$1,706,371.55. The budget passed by commissioners for 1989 is \$1,767,816.56. The 1989 budget

represents an increase of \$61,000.00 over the 1988 budget. A total of \$40,000 of the increase is earmarked for salary increases. This includes the social security and retirement. The remaining portion, with the exception of \$1,000 that will be diverted to the library fund, is for anticipated increases in health insurance

premiums. In order to fund the approved budget, commissioners voted to set the tax rate at 53.5¢ per \$100 valuation. That rate, according to Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett, was needed to make up for the approximate 10 million

## Toxic Site Is OK With Railroad Commission

Dr. Ernie Atkins, chairman of the sub committee on toxic waste of the Fisher County Economic Development Commission - Health Care Task Force, was informed last week that the Texas Railroad Commission had already approved the Fisher County loca-

tion for toxic waste disposal. The Railroad Commission, in a letter sent to Sweetwater Resources, Inc., dates May 6, 1988, informed that within 2.5 miles of the proposed site no predictable threat to gas and oil production was evident. The

Texas Water Commission, Tom Roth, informed Dr. Atkins that the letter was received by the Texas Water Commission on September 12th. Dr. Atkins and his committee and others continuing to gather evidence in opposition to the site.

He said last Tuesday that he is gathering geological evidence showing that the Texas Railroad Commission, did not in his opinion act, responsibly in granting approval with respect to no threat to oil and gas production within 2.5 miles of the site.

## Fisher County Hospital Board Votes Tax Increase, Banking On Higher Occupancy

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board, after reviewing the proposed budget and re-evaluating the certified tax roll, voted unanimously last Mon-

day night to increase local taxes by 2.9%. The 1987 tax base was \$228,779,885.00 with a rate of .2806¢ per \$100 valuation. Board members were notified that they lost approximately \$10 million in valuation down to \$218,247,315.00.

The board members could have gone to a rate of .30249¢ per \$100 valuation without triggering the publishing of newspaper notices and public hearings. They said just shy by going to a 1988 rate of .30240¢ per \$100 valuation.

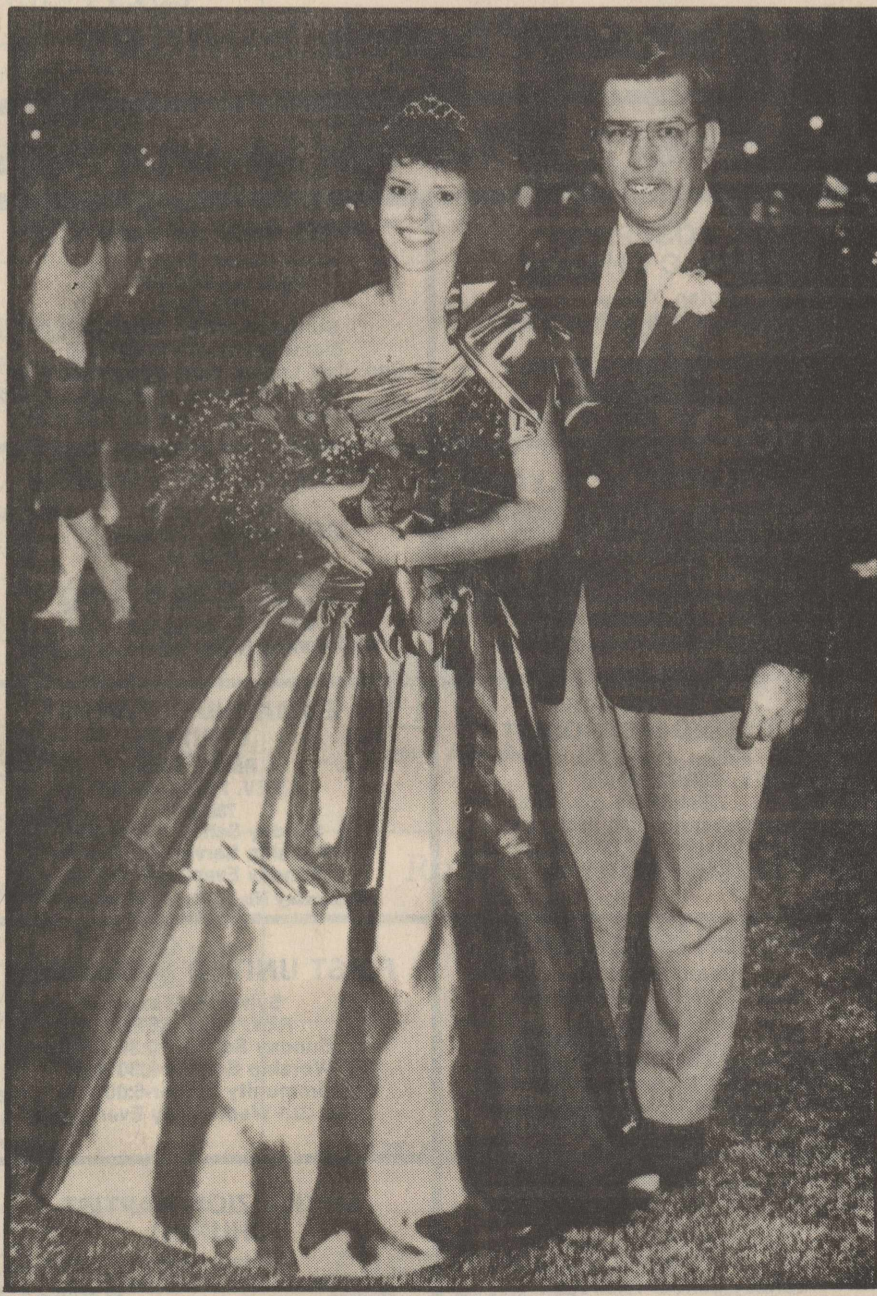
The hospital took in \$641,956 in taxes last year and with the increase this year will take in \$659,979.

The hospital needs total funding of \$2,102,568 in order to meet operating costs, clinic operating costs, debt service and to pay capital equipment and leases and appraisal district fees.

The \$2,102,568 is projected to be raised by a hospital occupancy rate of 30% (9 ADC - average daily patients), plus taxes and pass-through payments and less bad debts and contractual adjustments. The complete proposed budget is available for inspection by the public at the office of

The Medicare survey team, charged with the task of inspecting area hospitals and certifying them as being in or out of compliance, just finished their annual inspection at the Fisher County Hospital. The team overall, found that the hospital was doing an excellent job. The lab was the only area of concern according to the survey team report. The deficiencies noted in the lab have already been corrected and the lab should be in full compliance whenever it is re-inspected in 30 days, according to Fisher County Hospital Administrator, Pete Hohon.

Donnie Carl and the boys all returned to McAllen early Sunday morning and they made it just fine, not much rain going that way.

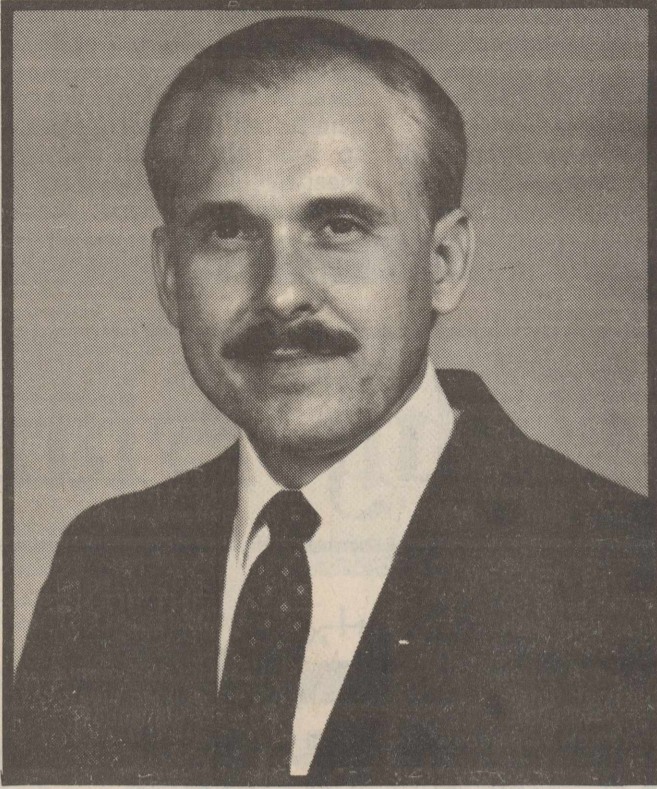
### Beatrice Tackacs To Speak At Rotan Library Meeting

### BATTLES

Vicki Huffman has written a book entitled, 'The Best of Times'. In her book she mentions a time for fighting battles. She writes: "The army base was planning war games but didn't want to use live ammunition with raw recruits. The commanding officer issued the orders: "Instead of a hand grenade, go "Lob, lob." As the games progressed a soldier saw one of the opposing team. He went, "Band, band," but nothing happened. He ran forward and went "Stab, stab." No response. He ran back and went "Lob, lob," but the enemy stood fast. Finally he walked up to his opponent and said, "You're not playing fair. I went, "Bang, bang, stab, stab, and lob, lob" and you haven't fallen dead yet!" To which the opponent responded, "Rumble, rumble. I'm a tank!"

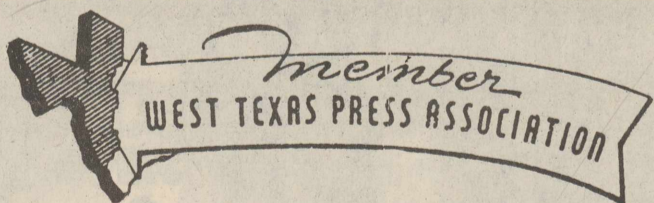

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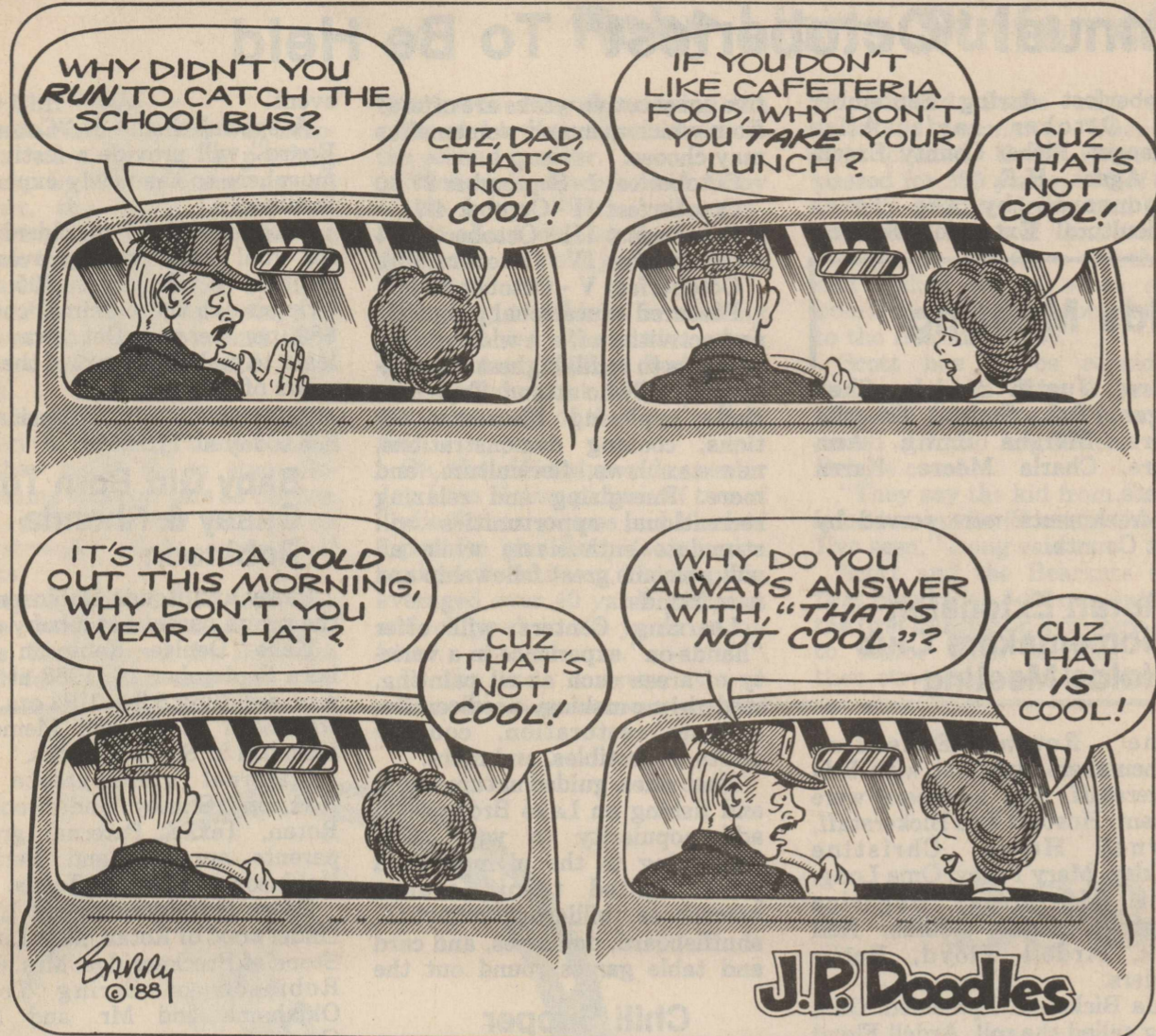

loss in values and take care of the salary adjustment for employees.

Commissioners voting in favor of the tax rate were Jay Hendon and Billy Henderson. Commissioners voting against the increase were: Jimmy Wright and Tommie Jack Stuart. Judge Marshal Bennett broke the tie by voting in favor of the 53.5¢ tax

rate. The next motion was setting the tax levy. Commissioners had to determine how the 53.5¢ tax would be levied. A motion to allocate .3649 cents to the general fund and .1701 cents to the road and bridge fund was made and unanimously approved by all commissioners.

In other action the commissioners set the salary for election judges and clerks at \$5.00 per

hour for clerks and \$20.00 additional to judges to begin with the November election.

Commissioners approved supporting a proposition on the November ballot and they accepted a resolution opposing the hazardous waste facility in South Fisher County.

In final action the commissioners approved paying \$179.90 to the social security administration on Buster Palmer.

### Write-In Votes Will Determine Winners In County Race

Whoever musters the most write-in votes on November 8th gets the job. The job of Fisher County Constable of Precinct -3, Marvin Kersh, received the elected post a few years ago, after filing for the job as a write-in candidate.

This year however, he is going to go head-to-head with Jerry "Cotton" Clawson for the job.

The Fisher County Constable

position is one which pays a total of \$1.00 a month in salary. It does entitle the one elected to a paid county insurance benefit. That, at today's rates, amounts of \$111.90 a month or \$1,342.80 a year.

Neither Kersh nor Clawson will have their name on the ballot on November 8th. Any write-in votes for either one will be tallied and the winner have the \$1.00 a month job.

Kersh is a certified peace officer and is called upon by Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts to fill-in for deputies on occasion. Whenever Kersh works, he receives \$5.00 an hour for services rendered. This new rate recently went into effect.

Clawson is not a certified officer at this time.

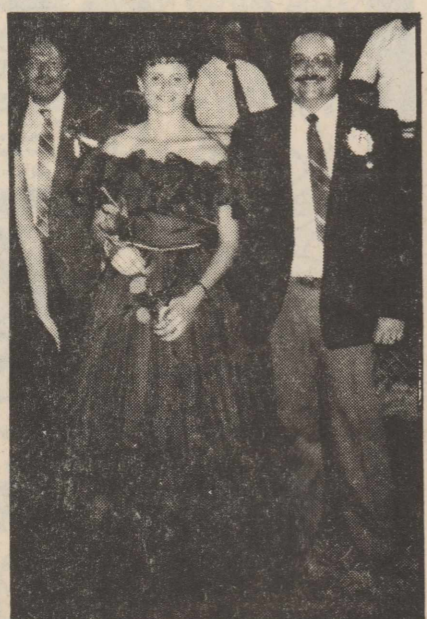

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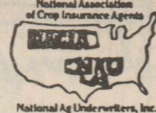

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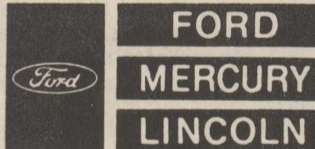

- Medical doctor, M.D.: a trained physician who has completed four years of medical school. Some M.D.'s have an additional two to six years of training in a medical specialty. Licensed to prescribe drugs and, if specially trained, perform surgery.

- Don't go to the Yellow Pages if you're looking for a medical specialist. Some doctors list themselves there as "specialist" without having specific training in their advertised field. Follow these guidelines to ensure you choose someone who's really qualified:
- \*Ask your local medical society to recommend a doctor who meets your needs for specialty, office location, sex, and age.
- \*Find out if the doctor is "board certified" by seeing if he or she is listed in the current *Directory of Medical Specialists*, found in libraries. Board certification indicates that a doctor has had two or more years of training in a specialty after medical school and has passed a national examination in that specialty.
- \*As about the doctor's office hours, fees, and if he or she belongs to a group health organization.
- \*Find out to which hospital the doctor sends his or her patients.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

### BUY-SELL AGREEMENTS

What happens to your business or your share of the business if you die, retire, or become disabled? What you want to happen and what actually happens may be quite different.

If you are the sole owner and operator of a small business, you need to provide a vehicle for the transfer of that business in the event of your absence. Do you have a family member, an employee or a competitor who would be interested in purchasing it in the event you no longer could run it? If you have no written plan or agreement, your heirs may have a financial and administrative nightmare.

If you cannot think of an apparent successor, perhaps your local business or professional association has a committee to assist you. Some associations will see that a member's business is run until it can be sold under the best circumstances.

If you own a portion of a business as a partner or a shareholder, you may have built-in buyers for your interest. Your buy-sell agreement with the remaining owners could work in different ways. For example -

1. The remaining owners could have the right of first refusal to buy your interest, or they could be required to match a valid offer by an outsider.

2. The remaining owners could be given an option to buy, based on a some predetermined formula. If the owners decide to buy, the estate must sell.

3. The estate or retiring partner could negotiate with a buyer from within or outside the company based on a fair value determined at the date of transfer.

If a buy-sell agreement is arranged with the other interest-holders, how should it be financed? The possibilities for financing are as varied as the parties involved. Any arrangement must provide for the financial well-being of the company and for a fair payout to the person leaving.

## Roby Lions Suffer 48-7 Loss To Garden City

While most of Texas was keeping a wary eye on a pending assault by a hurricane named Gilbert, the Roby Lions were preparing for another kind of assault last week.

Warnings were posted by Lion coach Steve Long concerning the Garden City Bearkats and their talented twins, Codie and Jodie Scott.

Although the young Lions heeded the warning, there was little they could do to stem the onrushing Bearkat tide as Garden City rolled to a 48-7 triumph on the strength of 34 second-half points.

Despite the lopsided loss, the Lions were not without bright spots. They played the Bearkats tough for one half and were only

four yards away from tying the score at 14 when time ran out in the second quarter.

"Nobody's down," said Roby coach Long. "We're all right. We're about an inch from being real good, if we'll just get down, and play."

Leading the Lions in rushing for the third consecutive week was senior Ronnie Rodriguez, who pounded out 112 yards on the ground, 96 of that in the first half.

On the defensive side, senior Jay Linn Helms picked off two of Codie Scott's passes and blocked a punt to give Roby fans reason to cheer. In addition, Helms again averaged over 40 yards per punt and chipped in 35 yards of offense.

In the end, however, it was

Codie and Jodie and their talented teammates. When the dust cleared, Codie Scott had passed for 235 yards, 175 of that to twin brother Jodie, and three touchdowns. As if that weren't enough, he ran for a fourth TD and kicked six of seven extra points for a 30-point contribution to the Bearkat cause.

Scott has to be considered among the top Class A quarterbacks in the state, an idea that would get no argument from Roby's coach.

"They say the kid from Rankin is better, but he (Scott) is the best I've seen," Long said.

Scott and the Bearkats drew first blood with 5:34 remaining in the first quarter on a 50-yard pass to senior Juan Morales. They then stretched their lead to 14-0

when Scott hit his twin for a 47-yard strike with 8:53 left in the half.

The determined Lions were not ready to give up yet, though, cutting the deficit to 7 with just under four minutes left in the half.

Roby's first score was the direct result of Helm's first interception which set the Lions up with first down on the Garden City 20. Runs of 14 and six yards by Rodriguez and a David Shipp extra point boot put Roby right back in the game.

The fired-up Lions then looked as if they might tie it up as they stopped the Bearkats on four plays and put together a drive that ended on the Garden City four. The drive ended when the clock ran out before the Lions

could line up to run one final play.

The half ended with the crowd buzzing about an outstanding half of football by both teams. Only one penalty was called in the first 24 entertaining minutes.

Unfortunately for the Roby faithful, the Bearkat offense that showed the potential for fireworks in the first half exploded in all its glory in the second half.

The two teams held each other off in a virtual standoff for most of the third quarter until the Scott to Scott combination again connected in the form of a 33-yard touchdown pass, making it 21-7 with 2:20 left in the quarter.

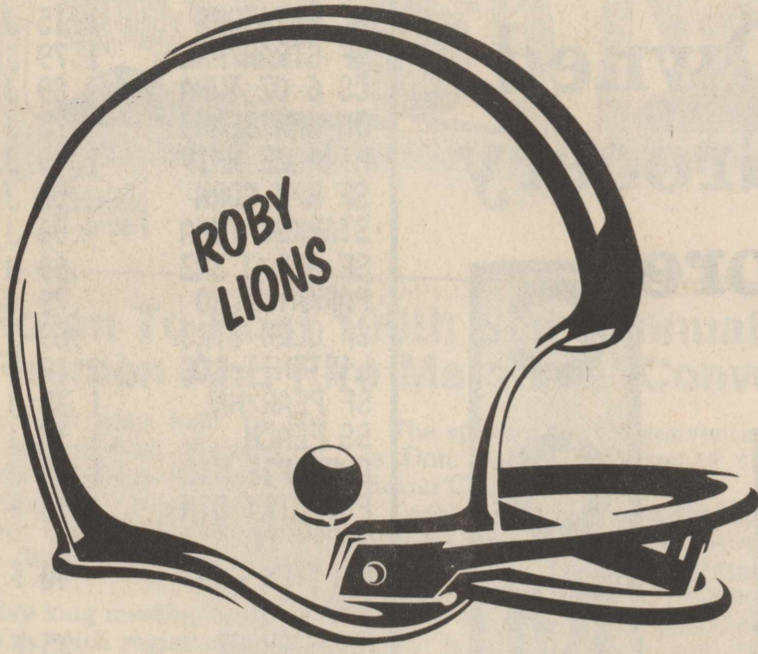
That touchdown seemed to take the wind out of the Lions' sails as Garden City scored the next four times it had the ball.

With the Lions now concentrating on stopping the pass, the Bearkats switched to a ground attack, scoring on their next two offensive plays, a 62-yard romp by Tony Ramirez and a 48-yard run by Weldon Hillger. Ramirez ended the night as the game's leading rusher scooting for 166 yards on 18 carries and two touchdowns.

The Bearkats ran their total to 42 on a 63 yard drive that took only three plays with the Scott-to-Scott connection accounting for 42 yards. Ramirez carried it the final 29.

The scoring was ended appropriately by Codie Scott on a one-yard quarterback sneak after the scrambling Lions had turned the ball over on a fumble on their own 24.

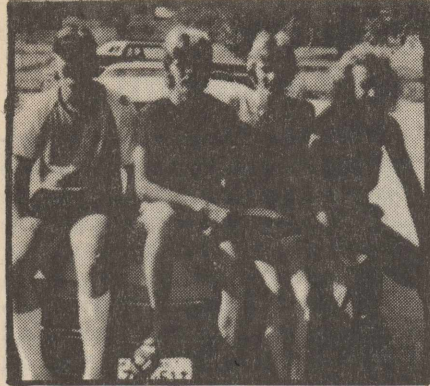


