MUST REGISTER CARS APRIL 1ST

TWENTY PER CENT PENALTY IF DRIVEN ON HIGHWAYS WITHOUT PAYING LICENSE

April 1 is the deadline for the payment of car and truck license fees and if driven on the highways after that date, unregistered, a penalty of twenty per cent will be assessed and the driver is subject to arrest.

However, if the car or truck is placed in storage on that date and not used, the owner may avoid the payment of this penalty when registration is made.

Sheriff J. S. Talley urges all motorists and farmers who are using their cars and trucks on the highway to register them before the final day or not use them until they are licensed.

DISCUSS PRESENT DAY PROBLEMS IN EDUCATION AT CANYON MEETING THIS WEEK

"An opportunity for a heart to heart discussion of present day problems in the educational world of today" is the theme of the giant rally of the Northwest Texas educational conference which is to be held on the campus of the West Texas State Teachers college at Canyon March 23-24.

Hundreds of representatives of lay and professional educational organizations plan to take advantage of this rally which offers them a chance to hear talks by some of the outstanding educators of the south and southwest. Dr. W. B. Bizzell, president of the Oklahoma State university, will address the conference, as will Dr. J. A. Hill, president of the West Texas State Teachers college; Dr. Dock Campbell, of the George Peabody College for Teachers at Nashville, Tennessee; Dr. Fred C. Ayres, of the University of Texas; State Superintendent L. A. Woods, and J. O. Loftin, president of the Texas State Teachers association.

Short talks by city and county superintendents, members of men's and women's clubs, school board members, leaders of P. T. A. work, ministers, and newspaper men will be features of the meeting which opens at 9:30 Friday morning and closes at noon the following day.

C. T. Jackson Buried

Aged Pioneer Laid to Rest in Ochiltree Cemetery After Services Sunday

The Methodist church was filled to overflowing last Sunday afternoon with old friends and acquaintances as a last tribute to that rugged old pioneer citizen, Charles T. Jackson, who answered the Grim Reaper's call on March 14, 1934 while visiting in the home of his son at Vanderpool, Texas.

Charles T. Jackson was born April 6, 1863 in Indiana and at the time of death was almost 71 years of age. In 1885, he was married to Miss Annie Morgan, who preceded him in death on April 28, 1931. Three children survive, Mrs. Jess Cudd and Mearl Jackson of this county, and Rev. J. C. Jackson of Vanderpool, Texas. In 1899, he moved to Ochiltree county and settled on a ranch southwest of Perryton, where he lived until about five years ago when he built a nice home in this city. He had been in failing health for a number of years.

The Wilson Funeral Home was in charge of the burial with Mrs. E. A. Greever and Rev. W. B. Hicks officiating as ministers. The pall bearers were S. P. Whippo, C. E. Whippo, W. E. McMillen, Allan Dennison, G. B. Mears, and Carl Ellis. The music was under the direction of Mrs. C. E. Whippo.

The remains were laid to rest beside the wife in the Ochiltree cemetery.

DON'T FEED COPPER SALTS TO YOUR SHEEP

Dr. I. B. Boughton, veterinarian at the Ranch Experiment Station located near Sonora, Texas, announces that nine cases of chronic copper poisoning in sheep have been

produced experimentally by feeding salt to which copper sulphate has been added. Chemical analyses for the copper content of the livers from these animals showed unusually high amounts of copper, further verifying the cause of the trouble.

Animals affected with chronic copper poisoning in advanced stages show a marked depression and a dirty, yellowish color of the mucous membranes of the eyes and of the skin. At this stage the urine is darker than normal, having taken on a reddish to dark red color. There is no marked change in the body temperature but the respiration and pulse rate come very much, accelerated in the late stages of the disease. Examination of affected animals show that the blood to be of a dark chocolate color, slow to coagulate, and the blood serum a dark chocolate color instead of straw colored. Tissues of the body exhibit a jaundiced condition; the liver is yellowish in color and usually very friable; the spleen is swollen and the contents softened and dark in color; and the kidneys are swollen and very dark, almost black, in color.

Following an outbreak of the trouble on the Ranch Experiment Station Sonora and on a nearby ranch some three years ago, Dr. H. Schmidt, Acting Chief of the Division of Veterinary Science, began a systematic observation of affected animals and recorded the symptoms. He published in February, 1931, an article pointing out the close resemblance of the trouble to the icterohemoglobinuria disease known in Europe and caused by protozoan blood parasites. He pointed out certain differences, however, that entirely removed the blood parasite from consideration as a cause, having failed through repeated experiments to transmit the trouble either by inoculation or by contact. Doctor Schmidt and his associates, Doctor Boughton and Dr. W. T. Hardy, continued their studies bearing in mind that the trouble or a similar one was reported from New York state and from Colorado. Reports by German scientists in the meeting described an acute copper poisoning that somewhat resembled the cases found in Texas. Investigations showed that a practice has been prevalent on some Texas ranches of feeding copper sulphate in some commercial mixture over long periods control of stomach worms and it was found that the trouble was occurring on the very ranges where these mixtures were being fed. Suitable tests were immediately begun which showed the trouble is really copper poisoning but of a chronic nature which accounts for

the distinction between this trouble and the acute copper poisoning reported from Germany.

In view of the fact that it has been established that a small amount of copper sulphate fed continuously in salt to sheep will reduce this trouble, ranchmen should not copper sulphate with salt and place it before sheep, nor should they continuously use medicated salt that contains copper sulphate.

Copper sulphate, commonly known as bluestone, is a useful medicinal substance for the treatment of somach worms in sheep, when administered in therapeutic doses as recommended by this Station in Bulletin No. 448, but the continuous feeding of it to sheep will result in chronic copper poisoning and death of the animal.

It is not wise to feed medicine to well animals. If they are well they do not need medicine, while if they are sick they should receive the medicine or treatment for the particular ailment from which they are suffering.

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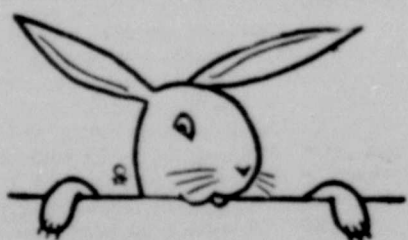

Examine Food Handlers

Texas Laws Require That All Persons Handling Food Be Examined Semi-Annually

Austin, Texas, March 15, 1934.—For the protection of the public a law was passed in 1921 making it mandatory for every person who is employed in any public eating place, bakery, meat market, dairy or candy factory to secure a health certificate from a reputable physician. This law is intended to eliminate all persons having any communicable disease from handling any food-stuff. These certificates must be renewed every six months.

Typhoid fever, diphtheria, and amoebic dysentery carriers have been found numbers of times working in dairies, cafes, and other places where food is prepared or offered for sale. It is not too much for the enocousmgni ETAONBxtv... dools the consuming public to demand that those who sell them food shall free from communicable diseases. If the examinations for food handlers are properly carried out much good will be accomplished in protecting the health of the buyer as well as giving the applicant for a certificate accurate information as to his physical condition.

The Texas State Department of Health has repeatedly advocated periodic physical examinations for the general public, as it is during these examinations that many incipient diseases may be discovered and treatment begun in time to stop its developing to such a degree that treatment will not be helpful. Many deaths and much suffering would be eliminated if every one would have this periodic check. In the case of food handlers, only the disease that are communicable will withhold the issuance of a certificate. The cost is money well invested and the consuming public should demand that those they buy from have this evidence of good health.

WHAT DOES YOUR NEIGHBOR THINK OF YOUR YARD?

The warm days of spring will soon be here and we urge everyone to see that their property is cleaned of the winter's accumulation of trash. It is only through individual responsibility and effort that one can have a clean and neat appearing city.

In planning your spring cleaning start with the house itself in the attic and work down, not forgetting the basement. Attics and basements are the greatest collectors of refuse and therefore of dust and dirt that the house possesses, and their neglect often constitutes a serious fire hazard. Do not forget to screen against flies and mosquitoes. The better the job of cleaning, and with a garbage pail kept tightly covered, the fewer flies there will be, because flies love dirt

and filth and breed in garbage and other filth.

Under the C. W. A. sanitary project pit privies and septic tanks may be installed at no cost for labor, also private water supplies may be sanitized. This will be a great improvement in rural sections that do not have a city water supply or sewer system.

We are prone to judge people in no small measure by the kind of yard keepers we think they are. Many times you have heard some one say, "No, I don't know the people next door but they cannot amount to much because their yard is cluttered with tin cans and papers and their garbage can is always open." Do not let your neighbors be able to pass judgment on you on such grounds.

ON TEXAS FARMS

By W. H. Darrow, Extension Service Editor

A 15-acre orchard just planted by Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Dodson of Ellis county cost \$3.50 which is less than what they paid for peaches to can last summer. Mrs. Dodson is a home demonstration club member who has decided that it is cheaper and better to raise your own fruit on the farm.

"Twice as much corn on terraced as on unterraced land" is the comment which Armin Bendele of Devine in Medina county on the value of terracing. Increases in yield on terraced land are mostly due to the contoured rows between the terraces, experts say. The terraces stop erosion, the contoured rows hold the rainfall.

Expect Code to Cut Baby Chick Surplus

Farmers and others who expect to buy baby chicks this season should file their orders early to be sure of receiving the number and breed of chicks wanted, according to representatives of the coordinating committee of the Hatchery Code which became effective in January.

The unusual production of surplus supplies of chicks is not expected this year, because provisions in the Hatchery Code make inadvisable for hatcherymen to have large surpluses.

In recent years, competition in the hatchery business is said to have been so keen that many hatcheries have made it a practice to set more eggs than were necessary to produce the number of chicks for which they had orders. The result has been heavy overproduction, with very low prices, especially late in the season.

Chicks can no longer be placed on the market below the individual seller's cost of production by those who come under the Hatchery Code. This provision is expected to prevent the production of heavy sur-

pluses, because the chicks cannot be "dumped" on the market at bargain prices. Farmers who have been in the habit of waiting for these late season bargains are advised to consider the possibility that such cheap supplies may not be available this year.

Improvement in the quality of baby chicks is expected to follow the code ban on below cost sales. Buyers benefit from such improvement in breeding stock, it is pointed out. In the past, "bargain price" surplus stock has frequently been of low grade.

Sweet Clover Seeding Permitted By Contract

New seedlings of sweet clover may be made on acres retired from corn production under the terms of the corn and hog adjustment contracts now being signed by farmers, according to an announcement by the corn-hog section of the Agricultural Administration.

These seedlings may not be used for pasturing during the period of the contracts, but may be used without restriction after December 1, 1934, when the contracted acres are released from the terms of the contract.

Confusion as to possible seeding and use of sweet clover has been reported from a number of States following an administrative ruling by the corn-hog section removing sweet clover from the list of crops which would be seeded on retired acres for pasturing during the term of the contract. Officials point out, however, that the ruling does not prevent the establishment of new seedlings of the crop this year, for use after the December 1 release date.

Sweet clover was removed from the "pasture" list because of the fact that Hubam or common sweet clover planted early under favorable conditions would produce a large volume of feed for hogs and cattle. The use of this large feed supply from retired acres during the contract period would be contrary to the purpose of the reduction program.

"Most farmers will be satisfied to use the contracted corn acreage in establishing new seedlings of sweet clover, alfalfa, and adapted grasses for future pasture and hay purposes," said J. F. Cox, chief of the replacement crops section of the Adjustment Administration. "As a general rule, it is not advisable to pasture new seedlings, and if used at all they should not be pastured until late in the fall."

GRAHAM—A record of 219 eggs per hen for a year from a flock of 300 white leghorn hens has been made by A. J. Bryan, Young county poultry demonstrator working in cooperation with B. F. Vance, county agent. Total income was \$828.60 not counting eggs and fliers used at home. The cost of feed, much of which was grown at home, was \$450.

COLUMBUS—Hairy Peruvian alfalfa seed was ordered from Yuma, Arizona, to seed four demonstrations in Colorado county this season reports W. H. Young, Colorado county farm demonstration agent. These demonstration fields have a perfect stand and the growth is very satisfactory at the present time. The Everett farms have been growing alfalfa for the past two years and another field was seeded there this fall. The hairy Peruvian variety has proven to be very satisfactory for the bottom lands along the Colorado River.

SPUR—"That is what I have been wanting to learn," answered Joe Hale, farmer in the Prairie Chapel community in Dickens county when asked if he would make concrete hollow tile to subirrigate the garden and thus cooperate with his wife in being the farm food supply demonstrator for the Prairie Chapel Home Demonstration Club. "I would like to subirrigate at least half the garden this spring. The strawberries and berries should be subirrigated too. We have good gardens because we irrigate but I can see the advantage of subirrigation and am glad to make the tile for it."

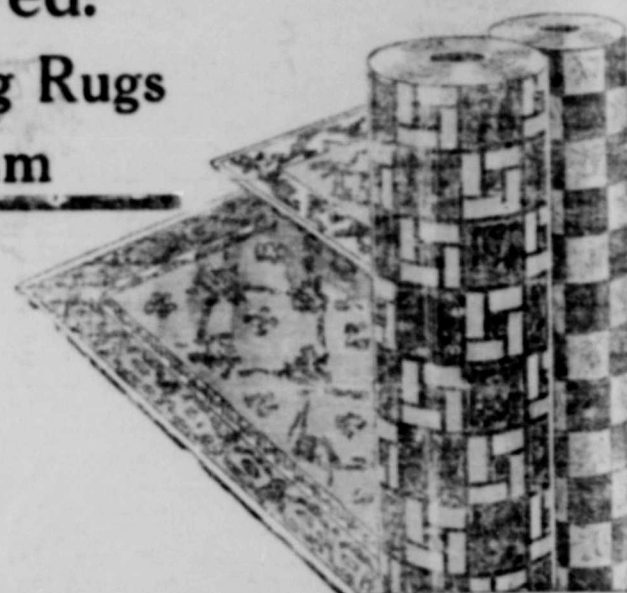

ways to be built by the State highway departments supervised by the Bureau of Public Roads, modified to some extent the older Federal-aid procedure. Federal grants under this act do not have to be matched with State funds. Appropriations of the new appropriation are available for building roads on the Federal-aid highway system (not more than 50 percent of the funds), for extensions of Federal-aid system roads through municipalities (not less than 25 percent of the funds), and for the construction of secondary or feeder roads (generally not more than 25 percent of the funds). State appropriations are made seven-eighths in accordance with the Federal Highway Act of 1921 and one-eighth according to population. Appropriated funds may be used to match regular Federal-aid appropriations, and are available until expended. Maintenance of public works highways included in the Federal-aid system is an obligation of the States; in the case of municipal extensions of the system and secondary or feeder roads, the maintenance responsibility by agreement may be transferred to appropriate municipal or county authority.

Public works highways authorized under the act must be built in such a way as to relieve unemployment as much as possible. In general, a 30-hour week is required, minimum wages are prescribed in all contracts, and labor is obtained through agencies designated by the United States Employment Service. To get projects under way as quickly as possible, with due regard to safety of public funds and economical work, the Bureau of Public Roads has modified its requirements by shortening the time of advertisement for bids on work to two weeks, permitted the approval of projects in the field, allowed abbreviated plans in certain cases, and provided other expedients to hasten construction. Funds are advanced to States that experience difficulty in paying the cost of work done pending reimbursement by the Federal Government.

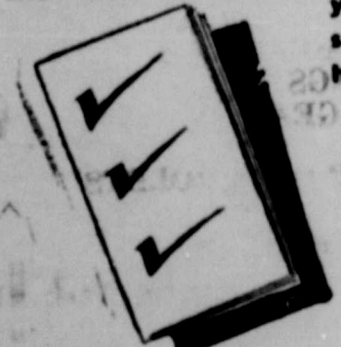

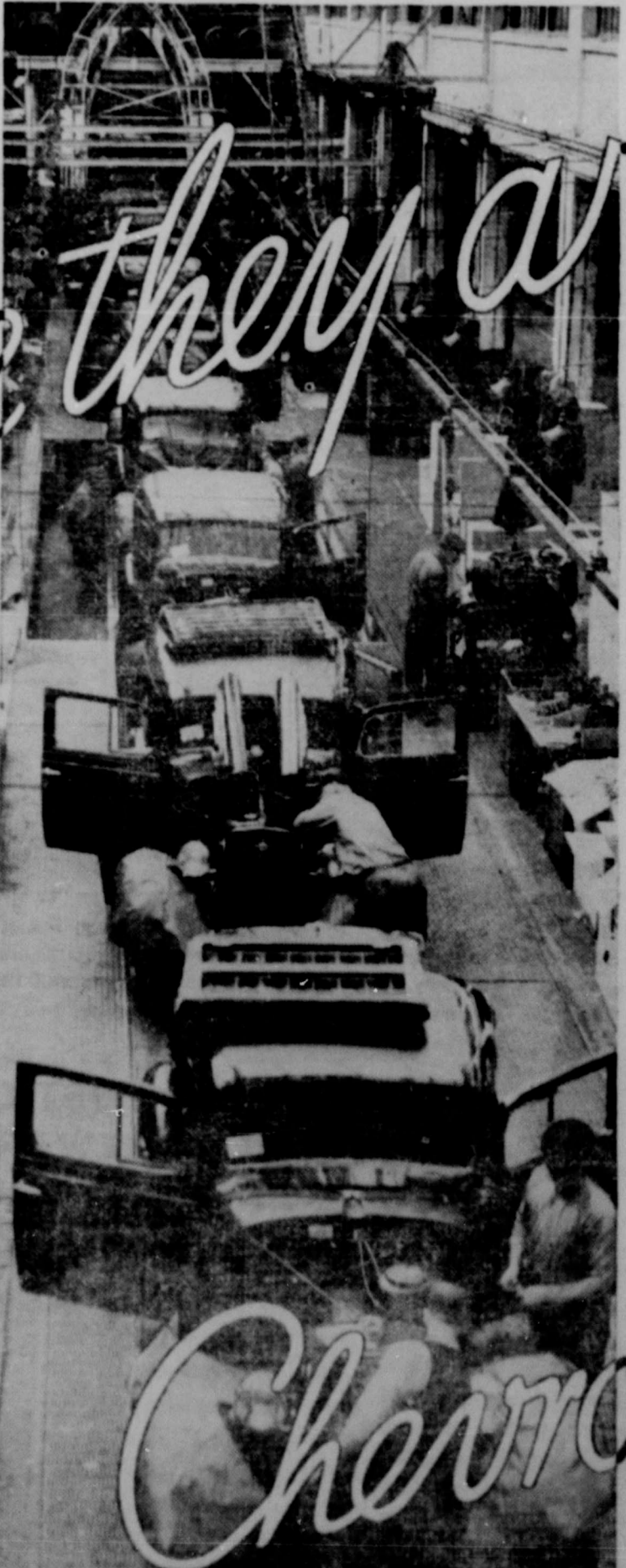

BAILEY FAVORS BONUS PAYMENT

CANDIDATE FOR TEXAS UNITED STATES SENATOR IS FOR PAYMENT OF BON-
US TO VETERANS

Washington, D. C. March 14—Ex-claiming that while he believed the payment of the Bonus would be both just and beneficial to the Recovery Program, Jos. W. Bailey, Jr., Representative-at-large from Texas, said he would be unable to vote for it at this time because of the President's attitude and the refusal of the Democratic Convention to adopt it. Bailey will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate in next summer's Primaries. His statement follows:

"I have felt that because the Democratic convention at Chicago refused to adopt a plank calling for payment of the bonus and, further, because the great leader of our party Mr. Roosevelt, has taken an attitude contrary to its passage, that I was bound not to vote for that bill. That seems to me to have been the promise which the Democratic party made to the people and as I heartily indorse that platform, and that leadership that promise binds me.

Expanding Large Sums
"Since that time, however, the administration has undertaken an enormous program of expenditures to restore property; \$5,000,000,000 to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation; \$3,000,000,000 to the public works administration; \$2,000,000,000 to the Federal relief; \$2,000,000,000 to the home owners; \$2,000,000,000 for farm mortgages. Additional demands are continually being made and all of this has been done in accordance with the theory that these expenditures contribute to the general prosperity of all.

"If we are going to be just, how can we deny to do for every one what we have done for any one? How can we give to anyone and not give to everyone? We must stop all aid, or we must aid all our people.

Favors Paying Bonus
"I have, therefore, after mature study, reached the conclusion that the payment of the adjusted service certificates would not only be just to the soldiers, but would do more than all else to restore prosperity. Many soldiers are in need; many would be removed from the relief rolls; and in addition many debts would be paid, many necessities bought, and much needed currency would be put in circulation for the benefit of merchants and all lines of business. Despite these considerations, however, I can not break my election promise at this time.

"I am now a candidate before the people of the State of Texas this summer for the nomination of the Senator representing that great State. My opponent has consistently refused to favor the payment of these certificates. In the election this summer I shall discuss this question fully and the people can choose between the arguments presented. Accordingly, I shall thereafter feel free to vote my convictions on that subject after that election.

Emergency Crop Loans

Applicants for Crop Loans Must Show Proof of Cooperation With Crop Reductions

Farmers seeking loans from the \$40,000,000 emergency crop loan fund will be directed in the near future to apply in their respective communities, stated Wm. I. Myers, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration. Rules and regulations covering such loans will soon be announced. Application forms are now being prepared.

It is required by the law that borrowers, as a condition to receiving an emergency loan, must furnish proof of cooperation with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. The nature of proof of cooperation will be similar to that recently announced as applicable to other borrowers who apply for loans under the Farm Credit Administration.

Each applicant must obtain clearance through or furnish a certificate of cooperation with the Agricultural Administration. The production control associations will make available lists of those who have signed acreage control contracts. Farmers who are on this list, if otherwise eligible to borrow,

will be able to obtain loans. County councils of the production control association will certify to representatives of the Farm Credit Administration the names of any farmers who, while not signing acreage contracts, are cooperating by not increasing their production contracts to the acreage control program.

Where county councils have not been set up. Farm Credit Administration representatives will be instructed to make no loans to farmers who are planning to increase production.

For the time being, according to Governor Myers, the various regional crop loan offices will handle the applications for the loans from the \$40,000,000 fund, and these offices will be under the immediate direction of the Emergency Crop Loan division, which is placed under the supervision of the Production Credit Commissioner, S. M. Garwood, and the Governor.

HEADS SOUTH- WESTERN LIFE

CHARLES F. O'DONNELL, DALLAS ATTORNEY, SUCCEEDS TO PRESIDENCY AFTER VARDILL'S DEATH

Dallas, Texas, March 6: At a special called meeting of the board of directors held at the Company's offices this morning, Charles F. O'Donnell was elected president of the Southwestern Life Insurance Company. He succeeds the late T. W. Vardell, who was president from March, 1911.

He was recently elected a director of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, and is chairman of the committee which has submitted a plan for the reorganization of the County government.

It is now in its thirty-first year, and its assets amount to more than \$41,000,000. 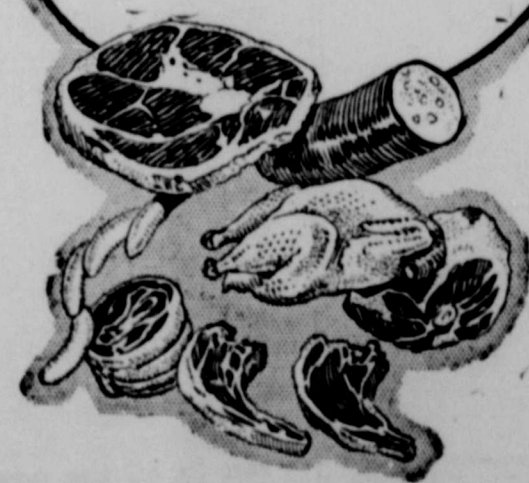

Avoid Typhoid Fever

County Sanitary Supervisor In Statement as to Expense of Typhoid Fever

Herbert W. Dodson, County Sanitary Supervisor, in speaking of typhoid fever, stated that each year about five thousand people in Texas are ill with this disease and over five hundred die of it. The average duration of this illness is eight weeks and so over a quarter million days are lost; if each person earned two dollars per day a total loss of a half million dollars would be the result, not counting the money spent for doctors, medicines, and funeral expenses.

Typhoid fever can be controlled by the use of pure water, pasteurized milk or clean milk, clean foods, proper disposal of sewage, screening against the fly and destroying breeding places, by search for and care of human carriers and by the general practice of vaccination.

Typhoid vaccine is a harmless solution. This is injected under the skin in the upper part of the arm, in three doses, usually at weekly intervals. It ordinarily protects against the disease two to three years or longer, although one who is definitely exposed to infection should be revaccinated more frequently.

Certain people, apparently healthy carry the germs of typhoid in their intestines or urinary tract and cause many cases of typhoid fever each year through handling of foods with unwashed hands. They are called typhoid carriers.

Flies not only help spread typhoid fever but also dysentery, diarrhea, anthrax and cholera. They breed, live, and feed in filth. To prevent their increase all refuse should be disposed of at once, garbage kept in covered containers, privies made sanitary and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies so that their number is an excellent index to the sanitary condition.

ON TEXAS FARMS

SHERMAN—The canning of 892 containers of vegetables, fruits and meats reduced our 1933 food purchases to sugar, coffee, teas, spices and fresh fruits," says Mrs. V. P. Gilliam, 4-H pantry demonstrator of Hebron Home Demonstration Club. Included in the canned products are snap beans, English peas, kraut, green pepper, corn, lima beans, tomatoes, squash, carrots, relishes, fried chicken, boned chicken, barbecued chicken, roast, steak, stew, chili, pork roast, ribs, and sausage, as well as a variety of preserves, jellies, fruits and fruit juices, according to the report of Miss Mattie Wilroy, home demonstration agent of Grayson county. The canned products are valued at \$204.10. In addition Mrs. Gilliam has 750 pounds of cured meat, lamb, Irish potatoes and pumpkins stored. She built in her cellar 60 feet of shelving on which to store her products. During the year she has assisted, or passed on information to 7 women in cooperation with the Grayson County Home Demonstration Council Extension Program. The Hebron Club was organized in the spring of 1932 and ten steam pressure cookers and four sealers have been bought in that vicinity since then.

AMARILLO—According to Mrs. E. G. Atkinson's sales tickets from the home demonstration club market, which is open two and one-half hours at the City Auditorium at Amarillo every Saturday morning, she has sold \$29.72 worth of her products during the past three months. Mrs. Atkinson is a member of the River Road Demonstration Club in Potter county and has become vitally interested in the club market. One day she remarked that she had worked for a salary all of her life and she missed that salary check coming in every month, and that she was going to do her best to build up a market trade. She received \$13.75 from cakes, \$7.45 from yeast rolls, \$1.15 from cinnamon rolls and 6.67 from eggs. Since Mrs. Atkinson started selling her products on the market, she has received standardization papers from the A and M College Extension Service on plum preserves and yeast rolls ready for baking.

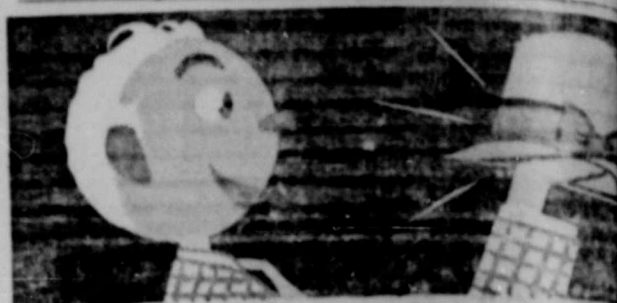

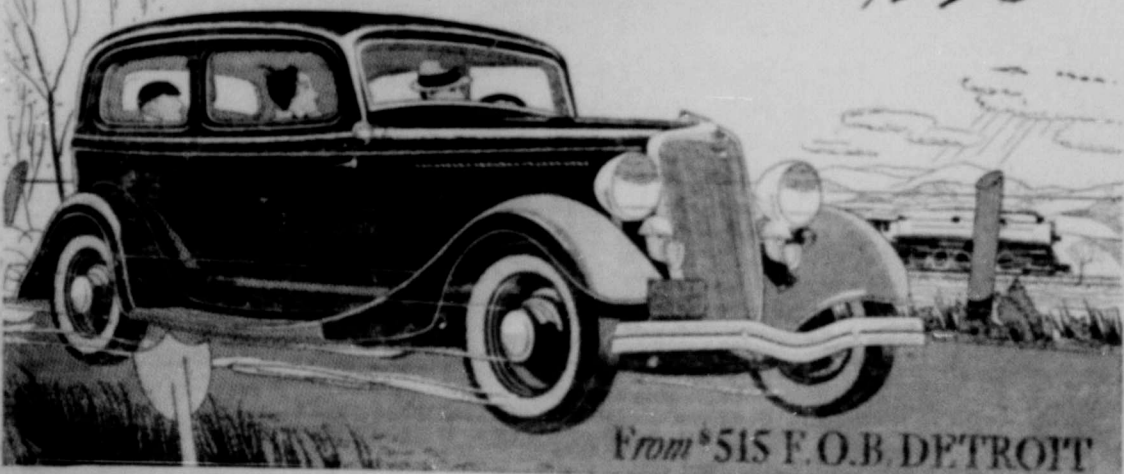
