GRAF STARTS ON FLIGHT TO CUBA TODAY

ZEPPELIN ON FLIGHT TO U. S.; EXPECTS TO LAND SUNDAY

(By Associated Press) PERAMBUCO, Brazil, May 28.—The Graf Zeppelin left for Havana at 11:13 a. m. today (9:13 a. m. E. S. T.).

The Graf's start had been delayed several hours by rain which made her too heavy to lift.

Flight to Be 4,500 Miles.

The present flight is a leg of approximately 4,500 miles, mostly along the north coast of South America.

This will be the most populous stretch of country over which the Graf has passed since leaving Spain goodbye.

The Graf is expected to include the West Indies in the present stage of the voyage.

To Be At Lakehurst Sunday.

Dr. E. B. Ekerer expressed the hope of reaching Lakehurst, N. J., by Sunday night and Frederickshafen by June 9.

The Graf Zeppelin, which now is headed on the North American stretch of her flight, circled over the city of Pernambuco and then pointed toward the north.

The thirteen passengers on the Graf, among them three women, went aboard the ship at 9:30 a. m. and an hour and a half later the Graf cast off from the stub mast and started for Havana.

BOBBY JONES BESTS TOLLEY ONE UP TODAY

AMERICAN CHAMP WINS FROM BRITISH STAR ON 19TH HOLE

(By Associated Press) ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 28.—Bobby Jones eliminated Cyril Tolley, defending champion, in the fourth round of the British Amateur Golf championship, one up, 19 holes.

The battle of the open champion of the United States against the amateur champion of Great Britain was a ding dong match. Square at the end of the nine holes, Jones went one up at the 1st, but Tolley squared the match again at the 16th, and the 17th was halved with birds. The home hole, too, was a half and the extra hole was necessary.

Others Join Him Jones, by his victory eliminating the title holder, advanced to the fifth round, joining his Walker teammate, George Voight, who won his fourth round match before Jones finished his titanic struggle with the gigantic Tolley.

Francis Quimet shared the glory of the day with Jones, winning a thrilling 21 hole morning match in the third round, again being four down. The former open and amateur champion of the United States

TURNER SETS NEW RECORD

FLIER MAKES FLIGHT ACROSS NATION IN 18 HOURS

(By Associated Press) GLENDALE, Calif., May 28.—Rocoe Turner, Los Angeles aviator today held the record of the fastest east-to-west transcontinental flight on record.

Crowding his motor with a wide open throttle, Turner yesterday crossed the United States in eighteen hours, forty-two minutes, fifty-four seconds, making one stop for fuel at Wichita, Kas. The record was lowered by twenty-seven minutes, thirty-eight seconds, the non-stop mark of nineteen hours, ten minutes, thirty-two seconds, set by Frank Hawks of Los Angeles, on June 7, 1929.

Daybreak in New York saw Turner away at 4:03:40 a. m. (E. S. T.) speeding over the same course he followed two weeks ago, when he failed by an hour and thirteen minutes to break the west-to-east record of fourteen hours, fifty-two minutes, set on Easter Sunday, by Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh.

A lion cub, the pilot's partner on both trips, slept through most of the flight.

LEVEES BEND UNDER WATERS

SIX THOUSAND DRIVEN FROM HOMES IN LOW LOUISIANA AREAS

NEW ORLEANS, May 28.—Having claimed their first life, Louisiana's up state flood waters gnawed today at levees and emergency dykes and threatened to widen the area covered by the overflow.

Driven from their homes, approximately six thousand lowland dwellers continued to receive aid from the Red Cross and other agencies in concentration camps.

The territory lying between the dividing line of Bossier and Red river parishes, to Coushatta, thus far has received the brunt of the Red river overflow, with structures inundated for 15 miles on both sides of the river. In Red River and Natchitoches parishes alone, more than 100,000 acres have been covered by water with another 100,000 acres lying under receding muddy water in Bossier, Cadeo and De Soto parishes.

The first fatality of the flood occurred yesterday when William E. Laffoon, 17, was drowned in Grant parish.

Amherst Paving Is Given Local Firm

The Paulsland Construction company of Lubbock was awarded a contract for paving of about 10,000 square yards of brick and concrete pavement in the business district of Amherst at a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Amherst City Commission.

Amherst voted \$25,000 bonds for the project recently.

H. N. Roberts, mayor of Lubbock, were engineers for the paving program.

MOVE IS ON FOR HOUSTON MAN IN RACE

CHECK TO COVER FEES OF ENTERING RACE SENT SECRETARY

(By The Associated Press) GREENVILLE, May 28.—A petition signed by Hunt county citizens requesting that the name of Lynch Davidson of Houston be filed as a candidate for governor was sent Albert Sidney Johnson of Dallas, secretary of the democratic executive committee, today by L. J. Taggart, prominent Hunt county farmer.

Taggart sent along with the petition a check to cover the fees for registering the Houstonian's name.

In a letter to the secretary, Taggart said he hoped that the democratic voters everywhere who desire a safe and sound business administration will join "we petitioners in urging Davidson to make the fight."

Davidson was endorsed for the office at a mass meeting, composed mostly of farmers, here more than a month ago. Three-fourths of the petition signers were farmers.

Man Surrenders For Desertion Here

The man said that he deserted three years ago. At that time, he said, he was in the 3rd Squadron at Kelly Field, San Antonio.

The police authorities are in communication today with army officials at San Antonio, while Mallock is being held in the city jail. No confirmation had been received from San Antonio early this afternoon.

GAS OFFICES MOVED HERE

DISTRICT OFFICES TO BE IN CITY; R. F. HINCHEY COMING

Office equipment of the West Texas Gas company is being moved from Amarillo to Lubbock today in preparation for moving of district headquarters of the organization in the new building erected by M. O. Owens, local real estate operator, at Tenth street and Avenue K.

R. F. Hinchey, vice-president of the company, who has charge of district operations, will be in Lubbock tomorrow, accompanied by an office personnel of 12.

Divisional offices will be on the second floor of the \$45,000 structure. Local office of the company will be on the main floor, as will the operations office, which is Lubbock tomorrow, accompanied by an office personnel of 12.

Plans For Airport To Be Ready June 6

Plans for the Lubbock municipal airport will be ready probably for initial action of the City Commission June 3 or 4, it was announced this morning, following a conference of the city engineers and architects yesterday afternoon.

The Butler company, of this city, is shaping plans and specifications for the field's equipment.

The City Commission hopes to have the plans ready for acceptance and make disposition of the \$15,000 worth of bonds within the next 30 days.

HOUSTON, May 28.—(AP)—James T. O'Connell of San Antonio, Republican national committee member for Texas declared here today that unless the democratic party comes forward with some gubernatorial candidate "better than any we have announced" this year will offer an excellent opportunity for Texas to elect a republican governor.

SUIT FILED ON DISPUTED TEXAS LANDS

WORTHAM HEIR ASKING FOR TITLE OF AREA ON BOUNDARY

AUSTIN, May 28.—(Special)—Litigation over possession of the strip of land comprising 28,500 acres along the eastern boundary of the Panhandle of Texas, claimed by Oklahoma for many years, is on now since Gus S. Wortham, one of the heirs of John L. Wortham of Houston, filed a petition in Supreme Court in an effort to show ownership of the area.

It was claimed that John L. Wortham in 1910 filed on the land, believing at the time it was Texas area, and his heirs now ask a writ of mandamus to compel J. H. Walker, commissioner of the general land office, to classify the acreage as grazing land and give title to the Wortham heirs.

The land was shifted from Oklahoma into Texas when the United States Supreme Court recently entered a final decree in a suit over the disputed area fixing the 100th meridian as located by a special commission as the boundary line between the states.

BRUMMETT OUT FOR JUDGESHIP

SPUR, May 28.—H. A. C. Brummett of Dickens, announced his candidacy Thursday for the office of district judge of the 110th Judicial District of Texas. Mr. Brummett was a candidate for county attorney of Dickens but withdrew from that race. This makes two in the race to date. Kenneth Bain of Floydada, the present judge of the district, is a candidate for re-election.

Mr. Brummett was county judge of Dickens county for six years prior to 1929. He is at present practicing law.

Snyder Guard Unit Gets Good Rating

SNYDER, May 28.—(Special)—Company G, 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guard, stationed here, not only has been given the "V. S." rating for its work but also an additional Texas honor, Captain John E. Sentell, commander, announced. Captain Robert J. Kirk, U. S. A., a regular army officer who inspected the local company in April, reported in a letter to Captain Sentell that he had also recommended a set of steel lockers offered by the adjutant general of the Texas National Guard be given the local company. There will be 80 lockers in the set.

The regiment has 18 units, including the local company. Last year the company was voted out of first place by company A of Brownwood.

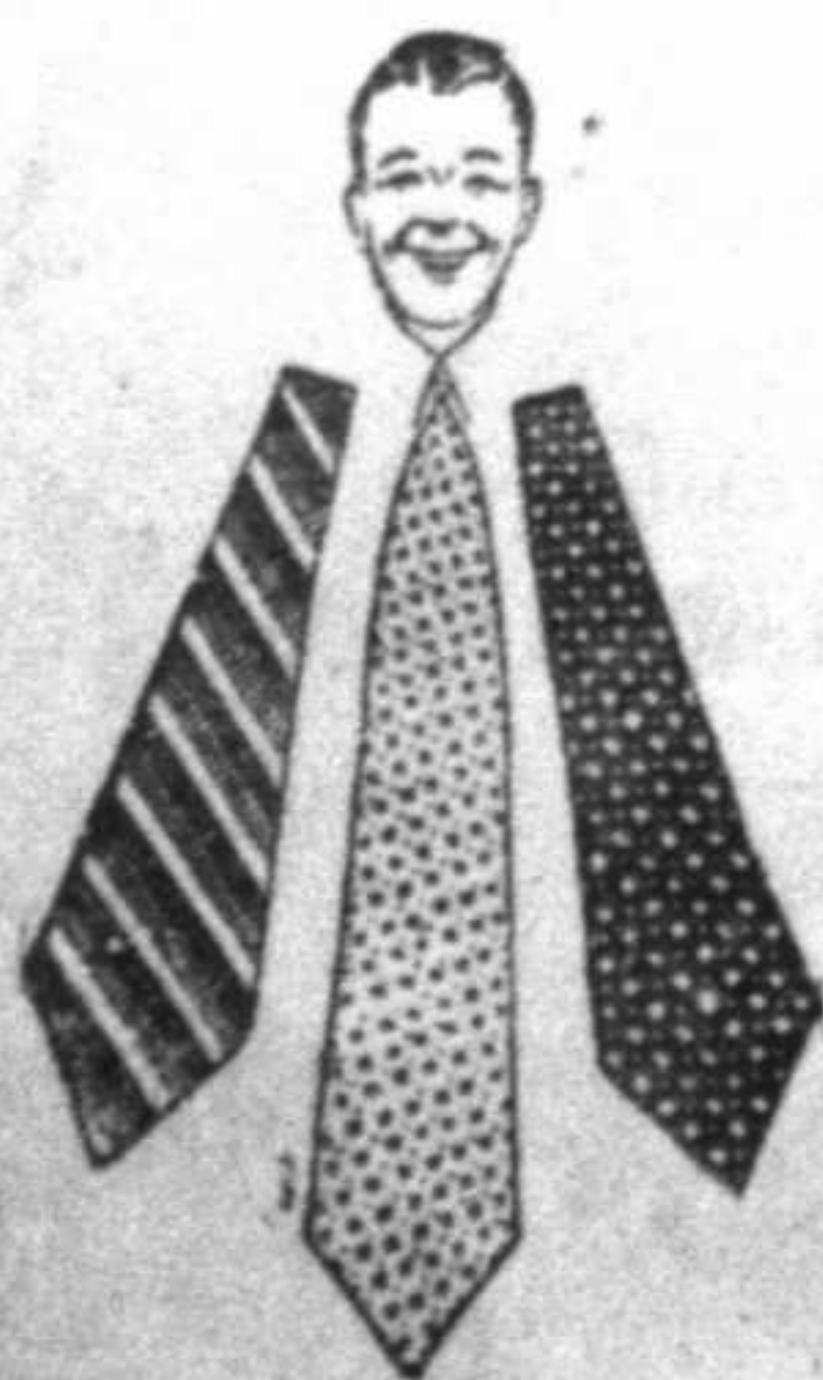

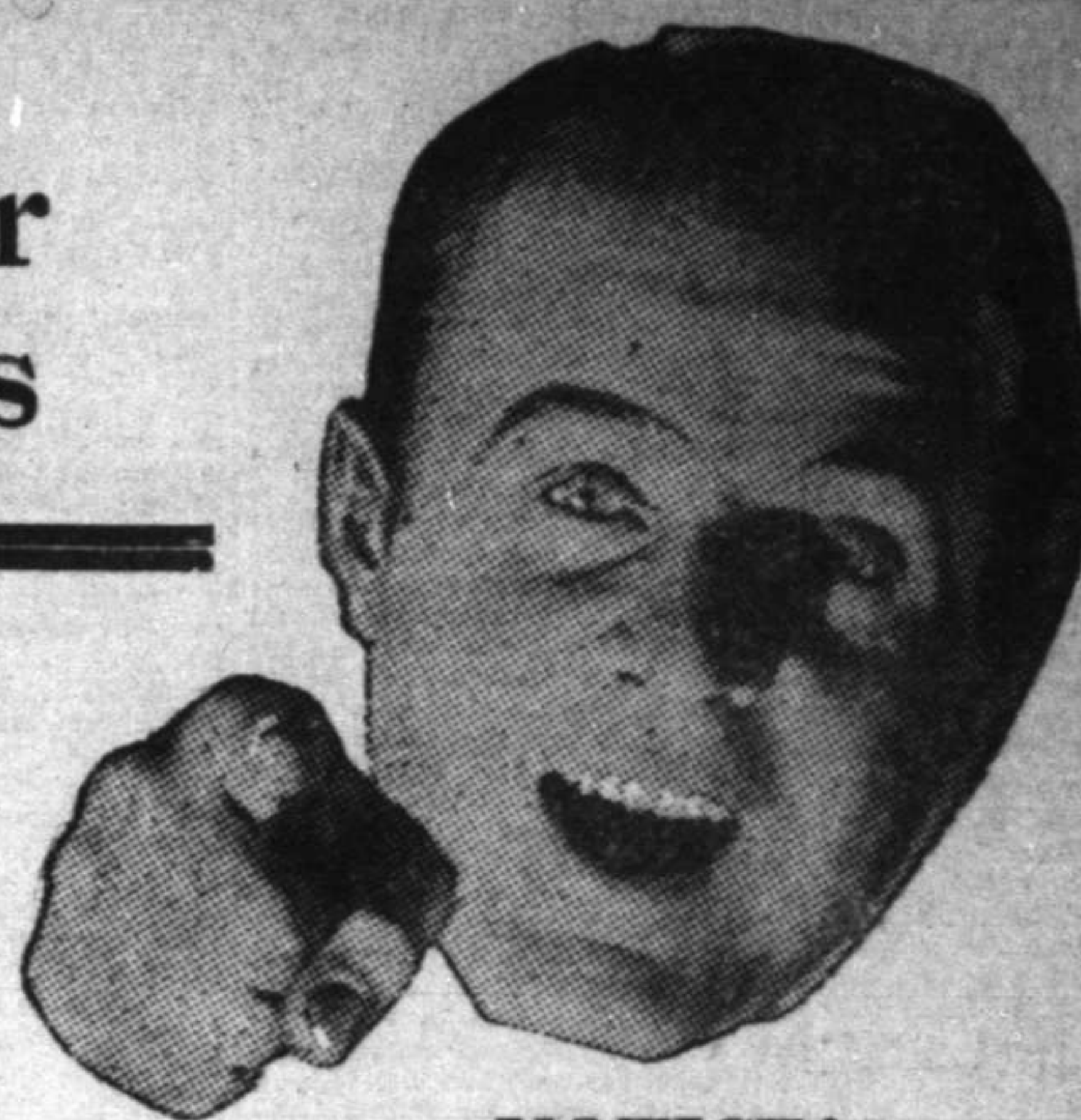

TESTIMONY IN BUS SQUABBLE GIVEN BOARD

HEARING ON LOCATION
OF STATION HERE
ENDS TUESDAY

Testimony of two factions regarding location of the Lubbock Union Bus Terminal will be submitted to the State Railroad commission for hearing, Mark Marshall, director of the motor transportation division, announced late Tuesday at the close of a two-day session in this city.

The hearing was marked by agreement of counsel for the two groups to admit points of testimony on which both were agreed.

End Direct Testimony
Two witnesses, Arch Tyler, owner of the North Plains Coaches, and Garnett Abbott, owner of the Pioneer Motor lines, testified yesterday afternoon to end direct testimony of bus operators.

Those opposed to the removal of the bus terminal from 1009 Texas avenue to 1206 Broadway used six witnesses on direct testimony and then several witnesses were used in rebuttal.

In his testimony Mr. Tyler told of the reasons for the change of location and also of the fact that the old station was not suitable to growing business of the lines.

He stated that he had attempted to back some of his big motor buses into the station for loading passengers and found the process both costly and impractical. "I scratched the sides of the buses several times in backing in and out of the rear room because of the narrow space," he declared.

Garnett Abbott stated the old station was "unsatisfactory" and that "unloading and loading in the street was a hazard." It will not be necessary to use Broadway, he stated, in operating from the new station.

Any Route O. K.
Under cross examination he states that bus operators were "willing to use any route entering or leaving the city that the commission or the city of Lubbock might order."

Inspector Marshall ruled that in order to shorten the record he would ask both sides to concede facts as to the old and new locations and to the willingness of operators to obey regulations.

In closing their statement the petitioners introduced a copy of the contract between the bus operators and the Hotel Lubbock. It was the subject of several clashes between counsel.

Carnahan Testifies.
Arthur L. Carnahan, director of public relations for the Hotel Lubbock, was first witness for the opposition. Mr. Carnahan in his testimony reported a check of traffic on Broadway which he had made the night before. Between 7:30 and 8:30 o'clock Monday night he checked 394 motor vehicles east-bound passing Broadway in front of the temporary bus station and 386 west bound.

On Broadway at the same location, Tuesday between 8 and 10:30 a. m., 730 motor vehicles went east and 650 west, and on Texas avenue, at the old bus terminal.

370 motor vehicles went north and 385 south, during the same hours, he said.

Under cross examination Mr. Carnahan stated he was employed by the Hilton Hotel as a "fact finder" in the case and had no other interest in it.

He testified also that Broadway was 72 feet from curb to curb, or 36 feet from center to curb. A North Plains coach, he testified, parked at the curb, extended 19 feet, five inches into the street, leaving 18 feet, seven inches for passage. Other cars extended into the street 10 feet, six inches and seven feet, 10 inches, he testified.

Contract Protested.
W. D. Benson, who formerly leased to the bus operators, testified as to the contract he had with them. It was for five years and began late in 1925. The lot, he stated, was 26 feet wide and 125 feet long.

Mr. Benson stated that he had prepared a "contract to enlarge the building" but that "the bus operators never signed it." The contract, offered as an exhibit, was protested.

Cross examination brought out the fact that there had at one time been partitions in the waiting room making rest rooms, eight feet wide, for men and for women.

Other witnesses for the protesters testified as to their knowledge of traffic and the hazards which they said existed in the location of the terminal on Broadway.

They all declared their belief in the necessity of the station being located near its former place.

These witnesses included, E. McElroy, P. M. Bowen, Cliff C. Lindsey and Joe Garrison.

Joe Bowman, banker and stated that Arch Tyler had stored his buses at the Hilton storage at night because it was hard to get them into the old location.

W. O. Stephens, banker and Clyde C. Elkins were rebuttal witnesses.

Sub-rebuttal witness for the protesters was L. C. Ellis, a banker.

Mr. Marshall took occasion several times during the hearing to thank the bus operators and counsel for their cooperation and also to pay many compliments to Lubbock and this section of the state.

At the morning session only two witnesses for the operators took the stand. One was Joe Bowman, owner of the South Plains coaches and the other James E. Marlow, ticket agent in the bus terminal.

Mr. Bowman gave reasons of the operators for their seeking another location and also detailed their activities in seeking a new place.

Litigation over the ownership of the building, between W. D. Benson and S. L. Harris, which included a suit that involved the operators and made then a party to the action, was a factor in the decision to change, he testified.

The operators opened negotiations with the Hilton hotel and with several property owners. The Hotel Lubbock was the last one to be seen.

Rent for the old location was \$230 a month with expenses for light, water and heat averaging \$125 a month, he stated. The new location will cost "\$150 a month and utilities furnished free."

At the morning session Jess C. Levens and Charles C. Triplett were attorneys for the bus operators and George C. Lockhart and Tom Garrard for the protesters.

In the afternoon H. B. Brown of the Lockhart firm joined in place of Mr. Garrard, called out of the city.

There was a large crowd both

morning and afternoon. Many Lubbock people were present in addition to bus line owners and motor truck owners.

After the hearing of one application by the West Texas Transportation company to operate a bus line with a permanent permit from Dallas to Big Spring and San Angelo via Abilene, Eastland and Roscoe, the application of the same company to operate from Sweetwater to Lubbock was postponed until a later date by Mark Marshall, motor transportation department director of the state railroad commission, at the night session of the two-day hearing here. Session closed after 9 o'clock in the ball room of the Hotel Lubbock.

The protest heard last night was made by the Abilene Transportation company, the McCrummick Transportation company, the Lone Star Truck line and the Montgomery Truck line.

Enlivened Hearing
W. E. Benson, Lubbock attorney, enlivened the hearing by charging at the close of the taking of testimony that the West Texas people were "operating into Lubbock without a permit."

"They have a truck right here in Lubbock tonight, unless they moved it out after dark," he added.

"This is the first thing we have heard of this," George C. Edwards, Dallas attorney and representative of the company, said. "If they want to make such a charge, let them do it in writing."

This, according to Benson, would be done. Meantime, Edwards refused to discuss the matter further before the commission other than to state that if his company was operating, the complaining parties had plenty of opportunities to file charges with proper state authorities.

Protest Filed
South Plains Motor lines through C. R. Buchanan, of Snyder, filed notice of appeal to the case.

Other cases disposed of at the night session included: Application of Ira E. Martin, Southland to Post, continued.

Application of Ben H. Winningham, Amarillo to Muleshoe via Canyon, Dimmitt, Hereford, Olton to Muleshoe, submitted with agreement not to operate into Olton.

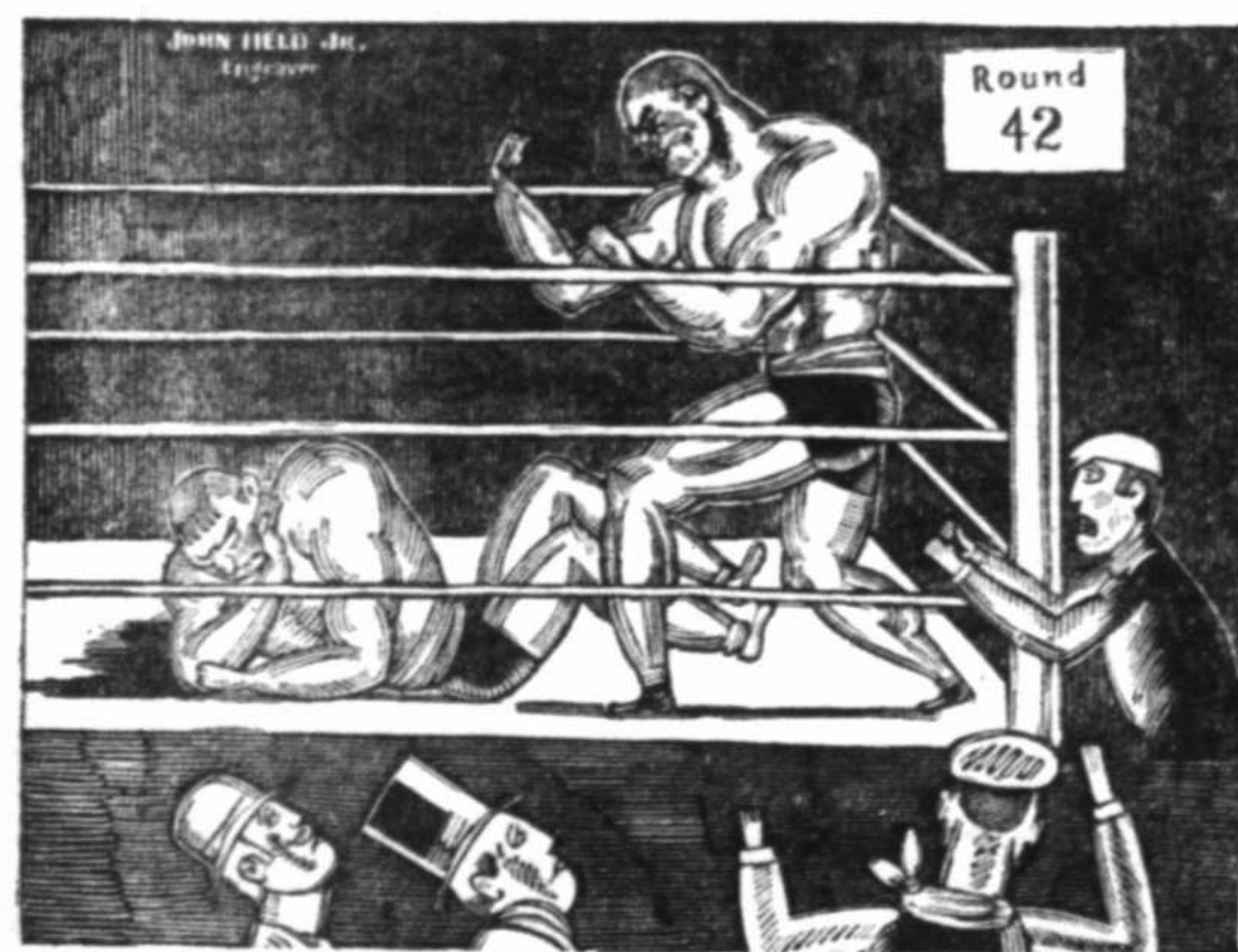

AWSON STOCK GOES TO FARM IN LOUISIANA

WARRINER FARMS WILL HAVE STOCK FROM DAWSON RANCH

LAMARCA, May 28.—R. A. Warriner of the Warriner Farms, Inc., located in the Lower Mississippi Valley near New Orleans, contracted a week with John Henry Dean, owner of the Indian Canyon ranch in Dawson county, for 200 head of Hereford steers and 50 head of yearling Hereford heifers.

The cattle will be finished for market in the Delta valley, where Warriner and his associates own several thousand acres of rich lands used for cotton and sugar cane but are now being converted into livestock pastures on which alfalfa and soy beans will be the principal cultivated crops.

The Agricultural Department of the T. & P. railway is working with Warriner to establish, if possible, a profitable feeding operation. John Simpson, assistant agricultural agent for the T. & P. with headquarters in Dallas, accompanied the Warriner to Lamara to select the cattle.

The purchase of cattle from Dean is the second shipment from pastures in this county. Warriner stated that there has been installed on his plantation a complete dehydrating plant for the purpose of converting the highly nutritious alfalfa and soy bean crops to dried, ground meal which forms a base for a fattening ration to be finished here.

Our soils produce a heavy tonnage of these crops and we overcome the heavy rainfall by the drying process which insures us against loss in the fields from damage or mold incident to our excessive rainfall.

These cattle will be fed in bays

on concrete floors and finished for market within a feeding period of 110 to 130 days," Warriner states. "We prefer to buy well bred Hereford steers that will finish for prime beef at from 700 to 800 pounds. We have forty fractions leveling down old sugar cane beds in order to convert a considerable quantity of our plantation to grasses with an additional acreage of alfalfa and soy beans."

Warriner thinks soy beans under the process of drying is equivalent in beef making to alfalfa. He states tonnage is about the same; approximately 3 1/2 tons of dried feed per acre.

"Beef making in our section of Louisiana is a comparatively new venture but we believe that with our productive soils and abundant rainfall we can overcome the many obstacles of cattle production with mechanical processes and diligence in formulating rations with feeds we grow," Warriner said. "We hope to expand our operations in accordance with favorable results obtained."

Soils to Grasses
Mr. Warriner continued, saying that many of the soils cultivated during the last century came back ready to grasses contiguous to their section. The grasses consist of a variety such as Carpet, Leptodes, White Dutch Clover, Rescue, Bermuda and Italian Rye which affords excellent pasture practically all of the year.

When asked concerning the production of their own calves for beef making he said his farm is making a test to determine if they may go so profitably.

"On one small field of thirteen acres we maintained 28 head of cattle for months last year without additional feed and besides we cut some hay on the same field. We are also testing out the use of mineral matter both in feeding and the production of calves to supplement our pastures which may be too succulent for animals to obtain the bone and muscle making material unless additional mineral matter is supplied artificially."

In discussing Warriner's statements, W. W. Evans, county agricultural agent for Dawson county, stated that while this is primarily an agricultural county it is fringed on all sides by ranches of considerable size that produce beef cattle with quality.

"As an assistance to ranchmen the A. & M. college extension service is continuously on the lookout for additional markets for our

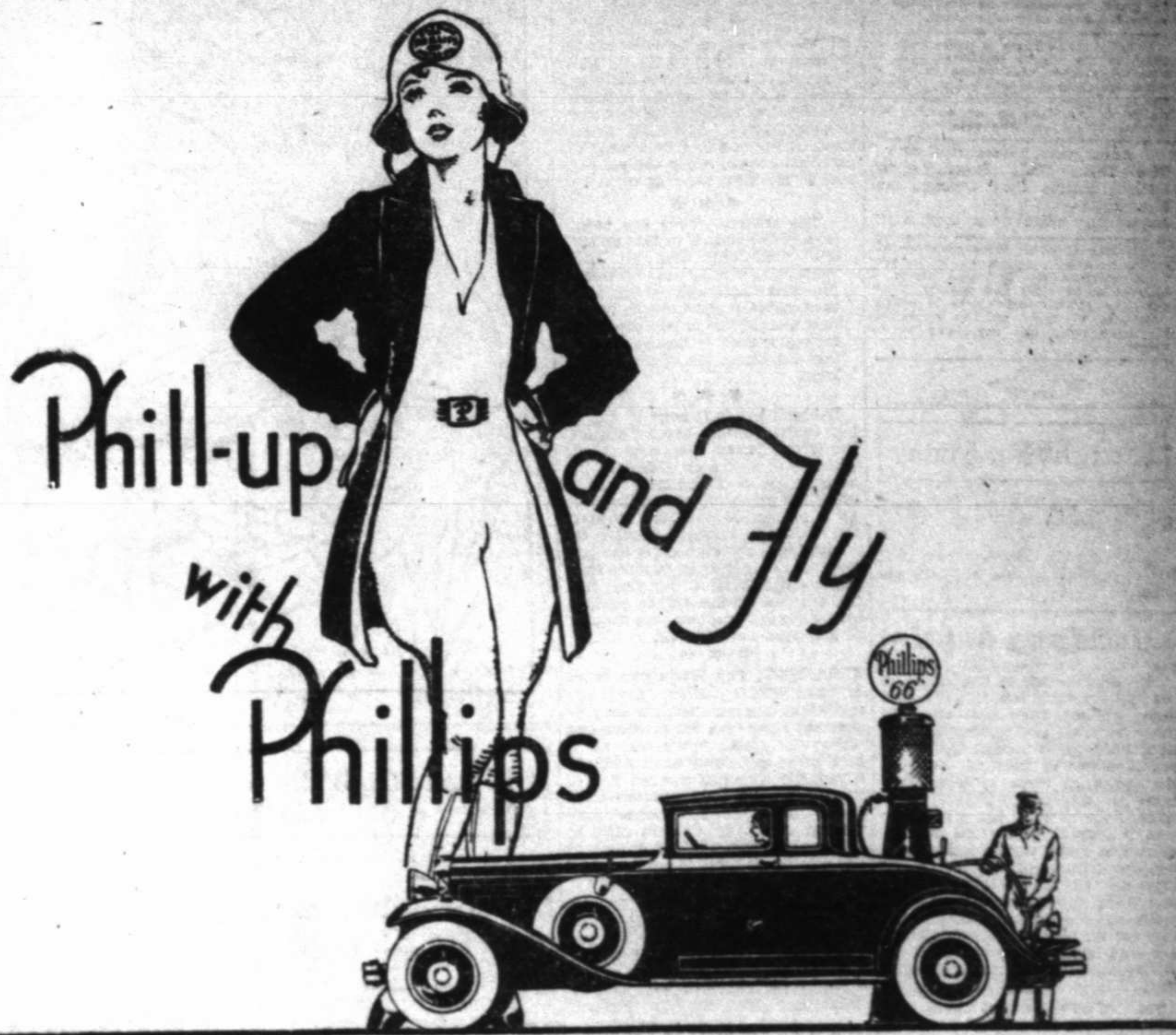

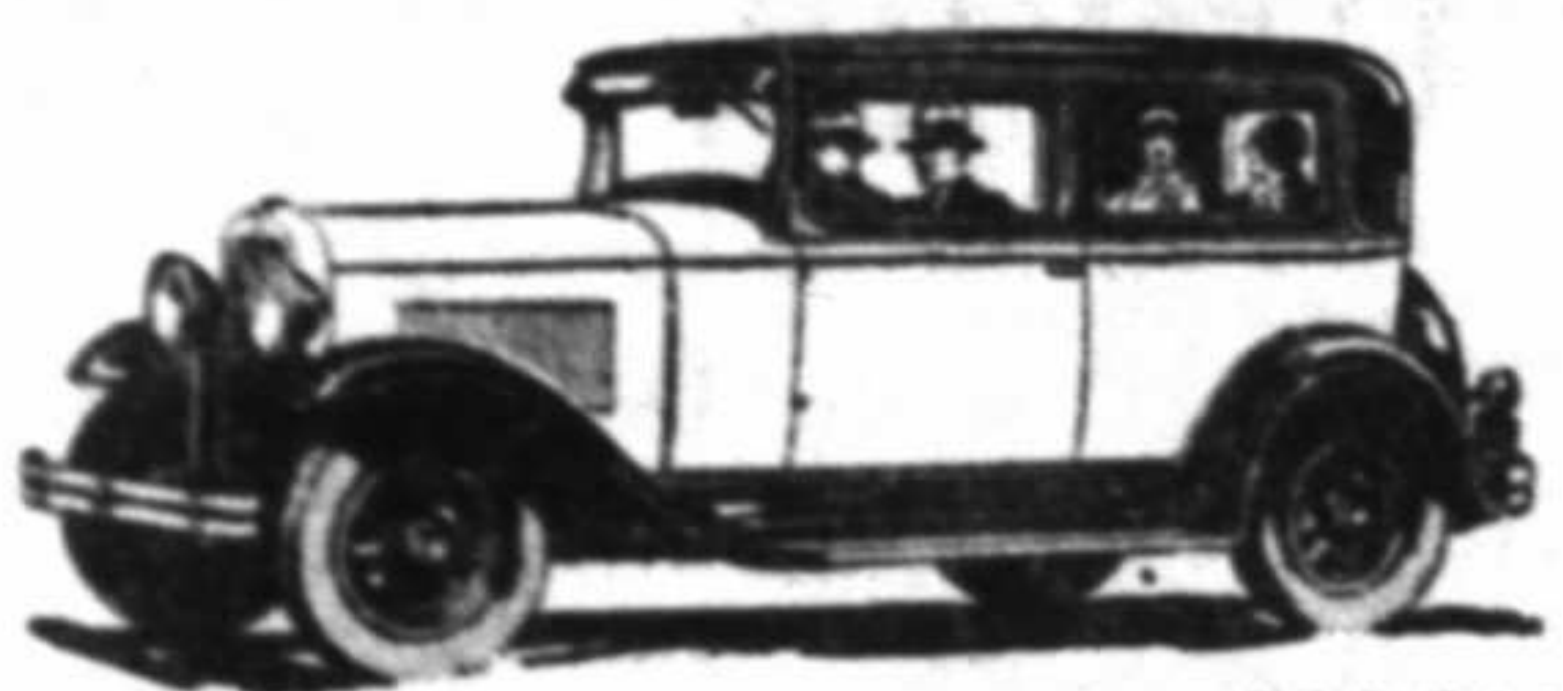

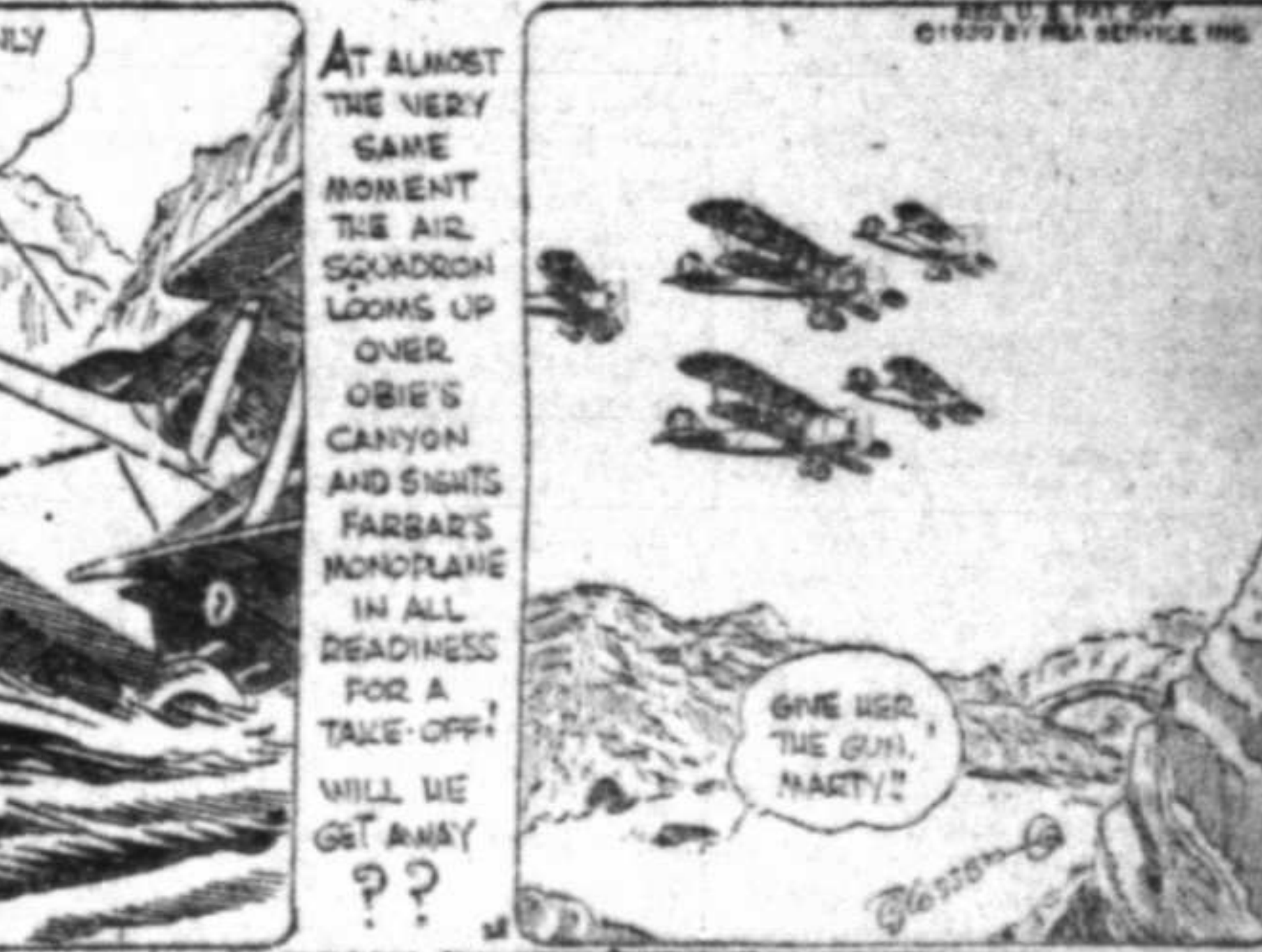
