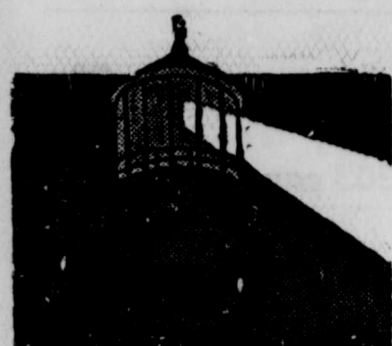

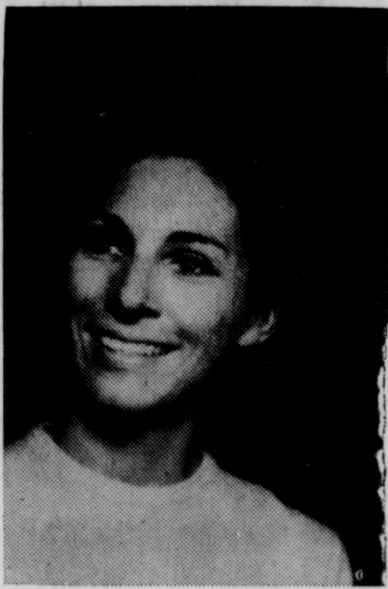
Miss Donna Lee Krizek To Wed Terry Wayne Davis on November 29

Mrs. Reddin Brought To Johnson Hospital

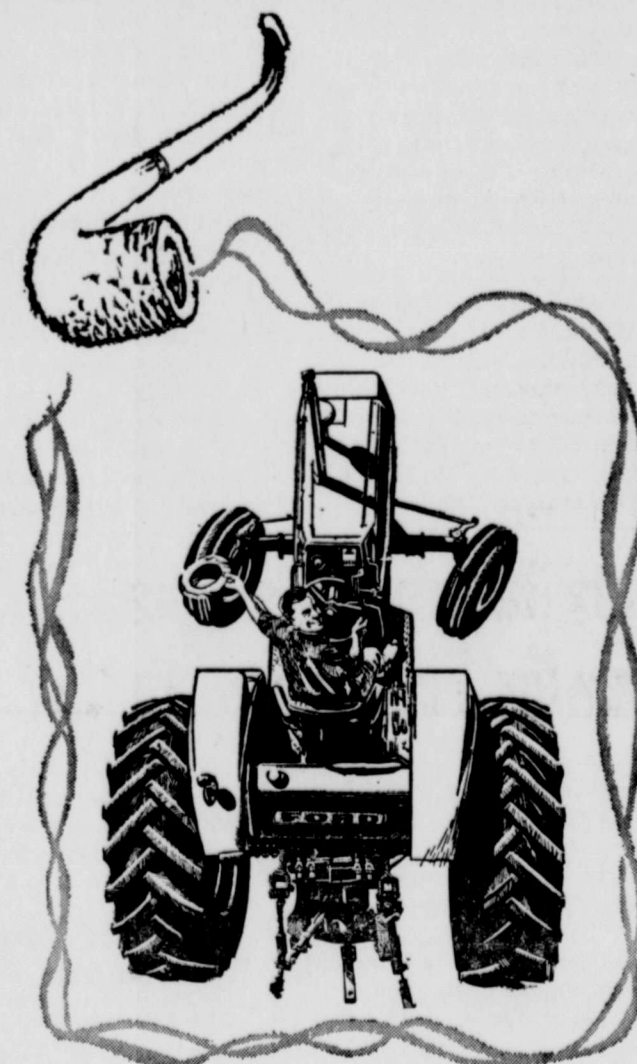

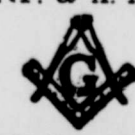

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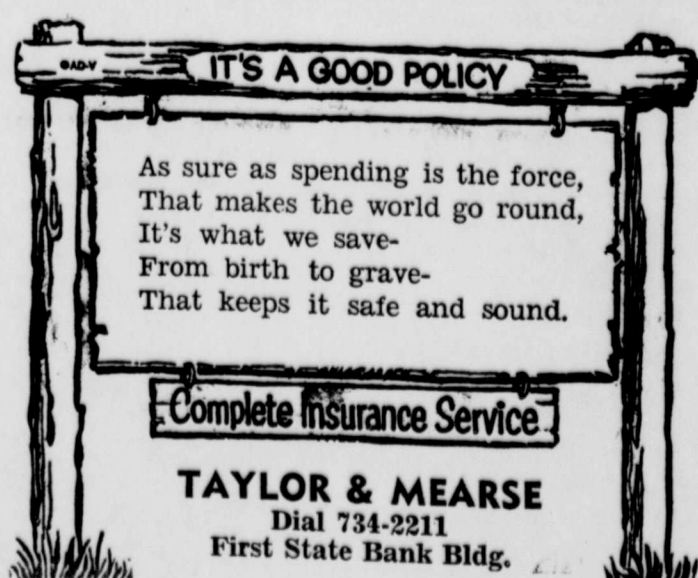

SPECIAL AWARDS

An award of Rosette for 1st place will be given to the exhibitor who accumulates the most points from their exhibits in each of the departments of the Fair. The points will be totaled from exhibits in each department. The point system used will be 3 points for 1st; 2 points for 2nd; and 1 point for 3rd. There must be at least three entries in each class for points in awards. Entries in any department that does not have a class or lot number will not be counted towards special awards. Rosette will also be given for best overall exhibit in the Fair.

SPECIAL RULES

AGRICULTURE AND HORTICULTURE

1. All entries in this department must be the products of 1969 and must be grown or raised by the exhibitor.
2. This department will be open to receive entries Thursday, October 9, 1969, from 2:00 to 6:00 P. M. and Friday, October 10, from 8:00 to 10:00 A. M.
3. After the entry of the exhibits, same shall be under control of the Superintendent.
4. Judges shall, without bias, consider merit only in making awards.
5. Exhibitors who desire to claim their exhibit at end of Fair may do so after 5:00 P. M. Saturday, October 11, 1969, and no earlier to be eligible for prizes and ribbons.
6. Prizes offered in each class shall be ribbons for 1st, 2nd and 3rd.

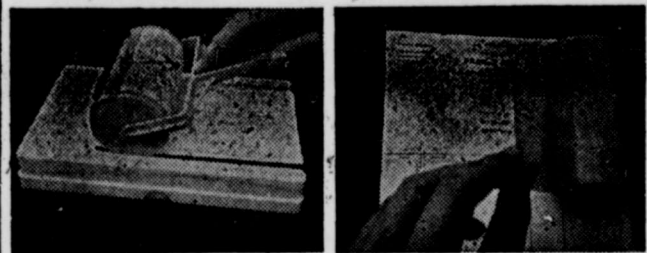

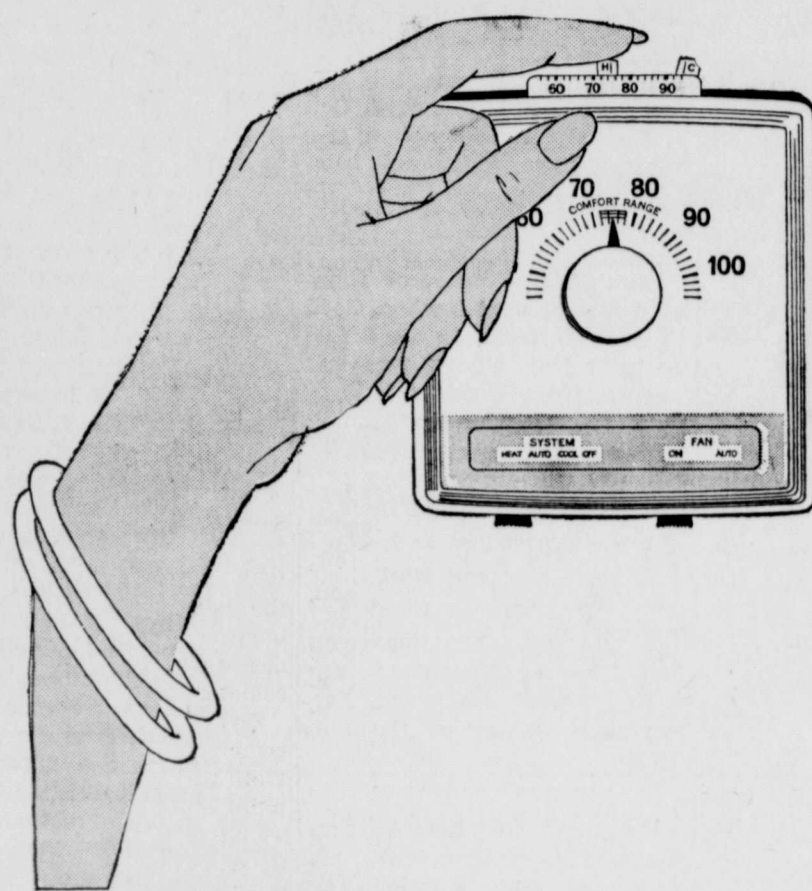

History of Lone Wolf Community

Though the Lone Wolf community was short lived that makes it of no less importance to the descendants of their relatives who were a part of the history being made.

Much credit is due Doyle Wemken of Rt. 2, Hermleigh and Walter Stirl of Rt. 1, Lorraine, who have delved into old records and have written letters - even to the Post Office Department to secure facts and dates. The community settlement of a store, post office, school and a church was located where Lone Wolf Cemetery now is, on farm road 644, seven miles south from Hermleigh, with a gin two miles northwest. It is in the southwest corner of what is known to most old timers as the John Mahoney section. He purchased the land for \$1,000.00, or less than \$2.00 per acre in 1900. Mahoney gave the initial plat of ground for the Lone Wolf Cemetery. The oldest marked grave is that of Samuel Edward Williams, born July 14, 1891, died March 12, 1892. Since about the turn of the century, it has been the burying place for many families and is one of the best kept cemeteries in the county.

Five miles southwest of the cemetery is the famous Lone Wolf Mountain, visible for many miles in all directions, from which the little community got its name. This mountain served in the early days as a lookout point for the fierce war tribe of the Kiowa Indians and their chief, Lone Wolf. One half mile west of the Cemetery is the head of Lone Wolf Creek which winds its way through the valley to the Colorado River in the east Colorado City limits.

The rich black land farms in this vicinity are now dotted with modern farm homes, and there are good farm roads, conducive to good rural mail delivery. The first and only post office in the Lone Wolf community was Winston, established June 26, 1901, located about one mile south in Mitchell County. First postmaster was Grace E. Holden. Next were James H. T. Johnson, then Lula McCauley. In 1906 David C. Hazelwood purchased three acres of land from John Wemken, grandfather of Doyle Wemken.

ken) across the road south and built a general store. It served the community for two or three years. According to Ed Mahoney, a former resident of that community and now of Big Spring, (Josie Northcutt was the last owner.

On May 2, 1906, the Winston Post Office was located in Scurry County, in the Hazelwood store, with David C. Hazelwood as Postmaster. Three other postmasters followed: Isaac N. Anderson, Hawkins Northcutt and Thomas H. Bills, making a total of seven postmasters in the history of the Winston Post Office. The office was served by Star Route carriers from Colorado City twice weekly. First carrier was Bill Campbell, then Wiley Morris, assisted by Ernest Brock, now of Hermleigh.

They served both Winston and Pyron post offices, making two trips weekly to Colorado City. They also served people along the route. Winston post office was discontinued April 30, 1909. In those days hardly anyone took a daily newspaper. The Dallas Semi-Weekly Farm News was the most popular.

There were not many telephones in those days, so when a Doctor was needed this meant a long ride on horse-back to a telephone or into town for a Doctor. Hospitals were few and far between. Doctors made house-calls and sometimes did surgery in the home.

The Lone Wolf School was established in 1901 with W. F. Knowlton the first teacher. Enrollment (preserved by Doyle Wemken) was 35 pupils. The school was discontinued at this location April 30, 1909. In 1910-11, the school was taught in the Winston Methodist Church building, two miles northwest, with Miss Annie Gregg, teacher.

First bond issue for the Lone Wolf School District was voted in the Fall of 1915 for \$900.00, and sold to Scurry County Feb. 14, 1916. The school house was built one mile Northwest of the cemetery and Miss Eupha Stacy was first teacher. Trustees were J. M. Pagan, J. E. Fargason, and John Mahoney, grandfather of Doyle Wemken.

The school later consolidated with Pyron, and Pyron with Hermleigh. According to E. M. (Ed) Mahoney, revival church services were held under a cat-claw and sorghum arbor, with such preachers as Joe Lockhart, Rev. Barnett and Rev. McGaha bringing old-time gospel messages that warmed the hearts of the audience. This was back

in the days when everybody went to church, and enjoyed their religion. Men were not ashamed to say AMEN and shouting was frequent.

An organized singing class met Sunday afternoons, led by J. M. Pagan, Sam Corbell and others, furnished good wholesome entertainment, and often singing-songs were held in homes Sunday evenings. The leader

and the young people stood around the organ to sing. Old-timers like to recall these pleasantries, but they wouldn't care to return to those good old days.

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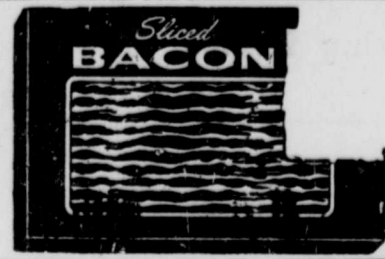
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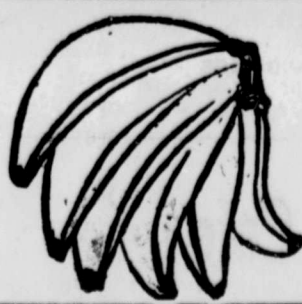
