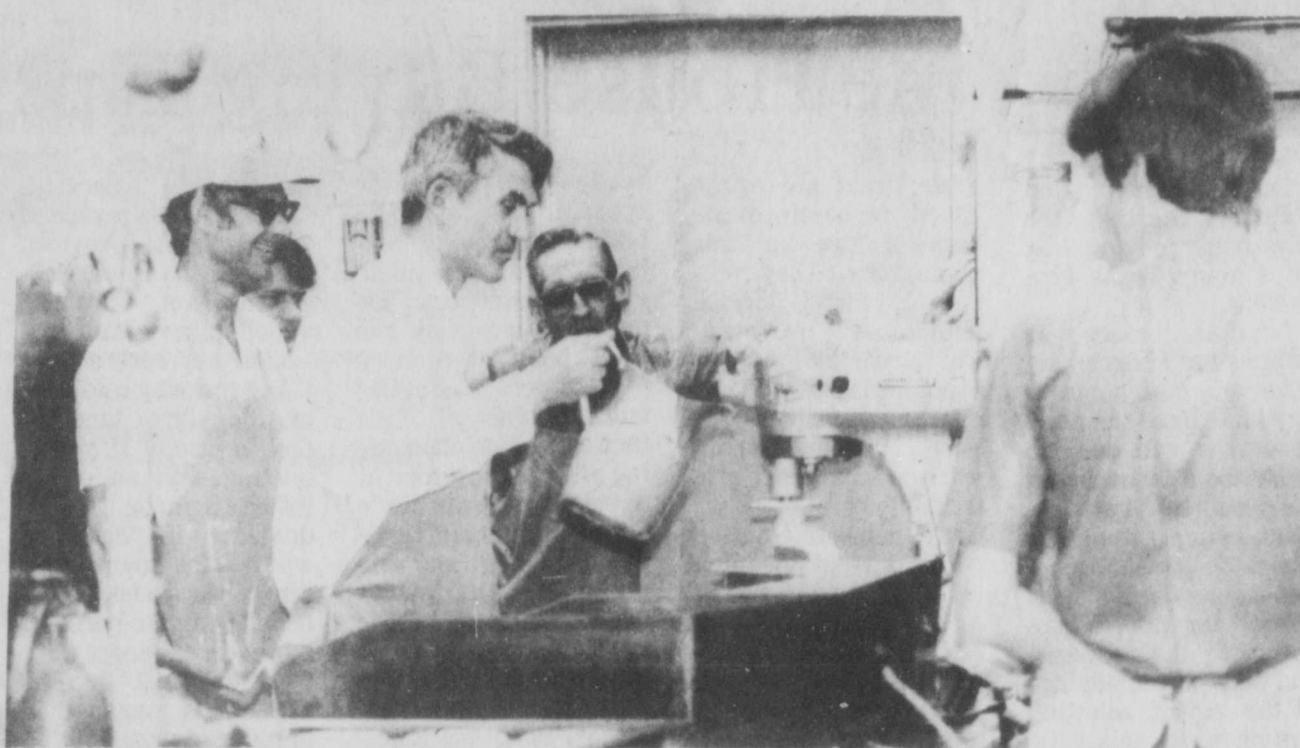

Deadline Set

Sunday is the last day for Texas livestock producers to re-record all brands and marks on their livestock with the Mitchell County clerk's office (if the livestock is raised in the county).

After Sunday, any unrecorded brand becomes available for use on a "first come" basis.

The Texas brand law, passed in 1971, was the subject of a recent ruling by Texas Attorney General Mark White that says owners of marks and brands must re-register them during the same six-month period every 10 years.

In conclusion, Joan Beach, county clerk, stated this was just a reminder of the deadline Sunday.

Pest Management Day Slated

The Third Annual Pest Management Cotton Production Day is scheduled Monday in the Colorado City Civic Center beginning at 10 a.m., according to

Deanna Myers, Mitchell County entomologist.

The Annual Information Day will feature keynote speakers giving presentations on weed control,

planting date, fertilizer usage and cotton economics throughout the day.

The noon luncheon will be catered by Al's Bar-b-q

of Sweetwater, sponsored by chemical companies and they will also have booths available for persons to visit with their representatives all day.

The meeting will begin with an introduction period of the sponsoring chemical companies, pest management steering committee and the speakers at 10 a.m.

Dr. James Supak, area agronomist from Lubbock will give a talk on weed control for cotton in 1982 at 10:20 a.m., and Dr. Thomas Fuchs, area entomologist from San Angelo will follow with a presentation on uniform delayed planting for boll weevil management.

At 11:10 a.m., booth discussions with pesticide company representatives is slated, with the break for lunch scheduled at noon.

At 1 p.m., Ms. Myers will present the 1981 and 1982 pest management programs and at 1:25 p.m., Robert Kensing, area economist of San Angelo will present cotton economics for 1982.

Before the meeting wraps up at 2 p.m., there will be a few minutes open for questions directed to the speakers.

"Everyone is invited and urged to attend this Annual Information Day because I feel it will be very beneficial," concluded Ms. Myers.

Selective Service Registration Date Is Extended Through This Sunday

On January 7th, the President announced his decision to continue the requirement for young men to register with Selective Service. This is welcome news, indeed, because it removes the uncertainty which I believe had an impact on the low registration figures for the 1963 year-of-birth group. Now that it is definite that registration will continue, we expect that the young men who were unsure of the requirement will go to the post offices and register. I am confident that the next few months will see a marked improvement in our registration percentages.

Today, at President Reagan's direction, I announced that young men who were required to have registered with Selective Service before January 8, 1981 and failed to do so will be granted a grace period that will extend through Sunday February 28th. During that time, those young men may register without fear of prosecution for late registration.

All young men born since January 1, 1960 who have attained age 18 are required to register with Selective Service at any U.S. Post Office. Men now register as they reach their eighteenth birthday—30 days before or after it.

After February 28th, the Department of Justice, in cooperation with the Selective Service System, will

undertake the prosecution of persons who have not registered as required by law.

This is only fair: failure to register is not a victimless crime, because it directly affects the chances of another person's being drafted in the event of a mobilization. The man who doesn't register shrinks the size of the pool from which people would be called, and ensures that the man who obeys the law will be called in his place. The person who is sincerely opposed to participation in combat may apply for conscientious objector status in the event of a draft, but he can take advantage of this important legal provision only if he is registered.

In the statement announcing his decision, the President emphasized that the continuation of peacetime registration does not foreshadow a return to the draft. He said: "I remain firm in my

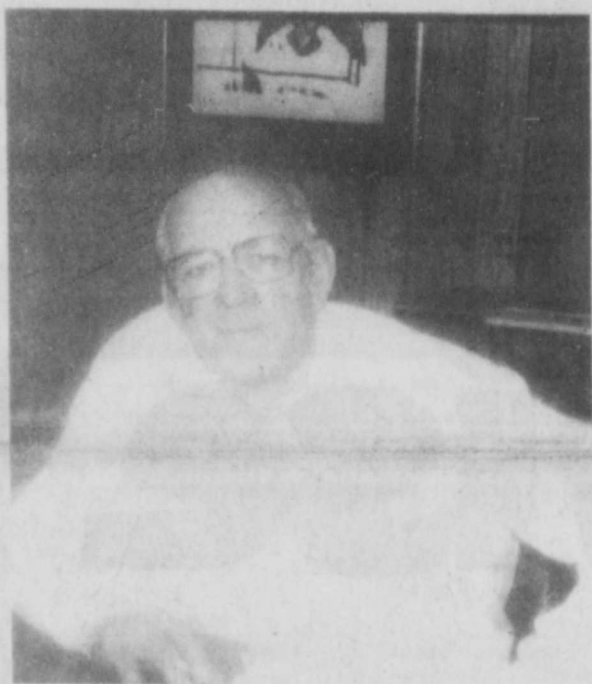

During the spring and summer months, the new home buying bug bites many Texas consumers.

In many cases, as soon as a consumer decides on what home to buy and closes the deal, he or she will need to think about landscaping the property. That's because, while some developers do the landscaping before the house is offered for sale, others eliminate that expense and pass on the savings to the buyer, allowing him or her to select the trees, lawn, and shrubbery. While some new home buyers in the latter category may decide to tackle the job themselves, others decide to hire a landscaping firm. In many cases,

these firms are established, reputable members of the business community. They provide a useful service both to new homeowners and the many subdivision developers. They can be expensive, however. The landscaping work on an average size lot may cost \$1,500 or more, depending on the complexity of the plan and the type and size of plants desired. Of course, as landscaping architects and other experts point out, good landscaping can add value to the property far in excess of its cost.

But attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division warn that not all landscapers are reputable. Some "landscaping specialists" are

really "con-men" who operate on a seasonal basis and prey on new homeowners and subdivision developers. These operators may run their business from a pick-up or a flat-bed truck. Some of their tactics include contracting with a consumer or developer to put in a certain quality of lawn and shrubbery and substituting cheap, low-grade plants instead. The landscaping may look all right initially, but may fail to thrive.

Most of these itinerant solicitors their business door-to-door in new subdivisions. New homeowners and subdivision developers should be very cautious when approached by door-to-door solicitors offering

landscaping services and should be aware of the protection provided them by the Home Solicitation Act. The Act, which allows cancellation of any contract for \$25 or more by midnight of the third business day, is useful if you're dealing with an established firm or individual, or if you have withheld payment. Most itinerants are not established businesspersons, however, and most want their payment "up front." This means they may be impossible to track down if you want to cancel and get a refund.

Our Consumer Protection Division attorneys suggest several ways to protect yourself from such hazards. (1)

Investigate thoroughly before committing yourself to a contract for landscaping work, or to advance payment for such a job. (2) Get at least three estimates from established firms or individuals. (3) Ask friends and relatives for recommendations and check with the Better Business Bureau to see if any complaints are on file about the firm or person you choose. (4) If you hire an itinerant "landscaping specialist," never pay for the work in advance, and always carefully check

the finished job, perhaps waiting a week or so to observe the condition of the plants before paying.

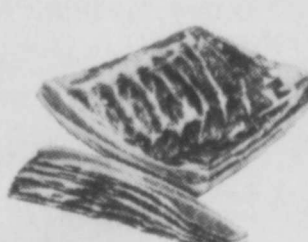

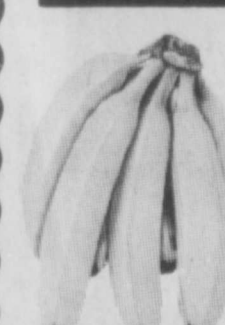

The Mitchell County Council of Texas Extension Homemakers met in the Medallion Room February 18, at 2:30 p.m., for regular session. Mrs. Pauline Griffin, chairperson, presided. All six clubs were present.

The meeting opened with Mrs. Lucille Blassingame leading the group in the club prayer.

Roll call and reports were given following the reading of the minutes.

Mrs. Bea Harlow reported on the officers training meeting conducted at Wall on February 11. Marian Morris, agent, Mrs. Harlow, vice-chairperson of the Mitchell County Council and Mrs. Clydene Kimbrell, T.E.H.A. Chairperson attended this meeting.

Mrs. Belle Compton presented the 1982 budget to be taken back to the clubs for approval. She also gave facts and figures on results of the stock show.

Miss Morris, extension agent, gave a report on progress of 4-H Work within the county. Reporting 4-H winners in the Fort Worth Stock Show, she also stated that May 1st has been set for 4-H Round-Up Day and gave details on other 4-H work in the making. May 4th has been set as the date for the Annual Tea and Book Review at the C. C. Thompson Room.

Mrs. Clydene Kimbrell, T.E.H.A. chairperson, brought details on the upcoming District T.E.H.A. Meeting that will be in Menard April 6th. The theme for the meeting will be "Ea-

ster Parade TEHA." She presided over the election of delegates to this meeting and the

following were elected: Mrs. Geneva Killian, Edna Pace and Clydene Kimbrell.

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National Cotton Council Meets

Steps needed to sell the largest cotton crop in 28 years, thus improving depressed cotton prices, were described by National Cotton Council staff members at a meeting February 25.

Herman Propst, Anson, former Council president and board chairman, presided.

Outlining ways to improve the depressed cotton economy, Macon T. Edwards, Council vice president - Washington operations, said the industry must lend its voice and insistence to efforts to get the nation's "economic house in order."

"Cotton and agriculture simply cannot prosper when the economy is in its current state," he said.

Edwards also stressed the need to "sell our way out of this situation bale-by-bale, garment-by-garment."

He said cotton industry leaders and the Council staff are working in Washington to provide direct credits to foreign customers to allow them to buy U.S. cotton.

"The best way to do this is through funding of the revolving credit fund created by the new farm law," Edwards stated.

Speaking of the 1981 farm act, Edwards said its target price provisions have provided short-term assistance to the depressed cotton economy.

Dr. Dean Ethridge, director of the Council's economic services, told the group the outlook is for world cotton supply and demand to shift into a better balance in the coming season, and restore some degree of prosperity to the industry.

Looking ahead to the 1982-83 season, the economist indicated world cotton production will be in the vicinity of 65.5 million bales or about seven percent below this year. Lower acreage is anticipated in view of current prices, and yields are not expected to equal this season's record levels.

World cotton consumption is expected to post another gain of one million to 1.5 million bales or perhaps more if the global economy improves significantly.

"Most of the increase will occur in the net importing countries and, since the U.S. is again expected to have sufficient supplies, exports of eight million bales or more are generally expected for 1982-83," Ethridge stated.

Domestic demand for cotton could be stimulated by lower interest rates which would remove some of the disincentive for inventory ownership and lead to

some rebuilding of stocks, he pointed out. While stocks have been reduced to bare-bones levels all the way from mills' raw fiber warehouses to retailers' shelves, he said the practice of hand-to-mouth purchasing will probably continue until buyers are convinced that the upside price risk exceeds the carrying cost.

The economist sees

prospects for a U.S. off-take of 14 million bales which would reduce domestic stocks to four million by August, 1983.

Pete Brown, field services director, described activities of Cotton Council International, the Council's overseas arm, and outlined efforts to build export markets for U.S. cotton.

He said overseas activities include: (1) in-

dustrial contacts to bring international buyers and U.S. exporters together; (2) an information service to develop and distribute market data; and (3) an advertising and promotion program to expand industry awareness of U.S. cotton, increase retail sales of products made primarily from U.S. cotton, and improve cotton's image among consumers.

Brown also stressed Council efforts to expand export credit, especially the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit guarantee program.

"It's a most valuable tool in maintaining and expanding foreign markets for U.S. cotton," he said, "because it locks your cotton into the markets that make use of the program."

Brown said the \$335 million in guarantees for cotton exports last year was a record high and that \$300 million has already been announced for this year.

"This is good, but the bottom line remains that there's still a lot of cotton that needs to be exported and we will continue to look for every possible opportunity to utilize more credit guarantees to help in-

crease exports above current commitments of 5.3 million bales," he added.

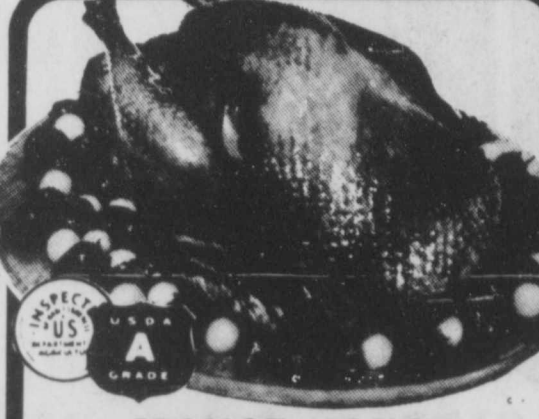

conviction, stated in 1980, that "Only in the most severe national emergency does the Government have a claim to the mandatory service of its young people." No such emergency now exists, and registration is in no way a proxy for conscription. This is a point with which I wholeheartedly agree. Registration will save six or seven weeks time in a mobilization, but such a mobilization is not necessary now and we all hope that it never will be.

The President also re-emphasized his commitment to the all-volunteer force and improvements in the quality of military life which have contributed so much to its success in the past year. He said "...in a healthy, just society, men and women will serve their country freely, when given the proper encouragement, incentives and respect... Just as volunteer warriors won American independence more than two

centuries ago, they stand as proud guardians of our freedom today."

I am convinced that our young men are aware that they have responsibilities as well as rights as citizens. Six point six million of them have already assumed that responsibility by registering. I'm sure that the vast majority of the 800,000 who haven't registered because of lack of knowledge of the requirement, will now act as responsibly as their peers and register.

Let us continue the work we have already begun, renewing our efforts to guarantee that, in an emergency, Selective Service would be able to respond quickly and with equity to make sure that the rights of our young men are upheld.

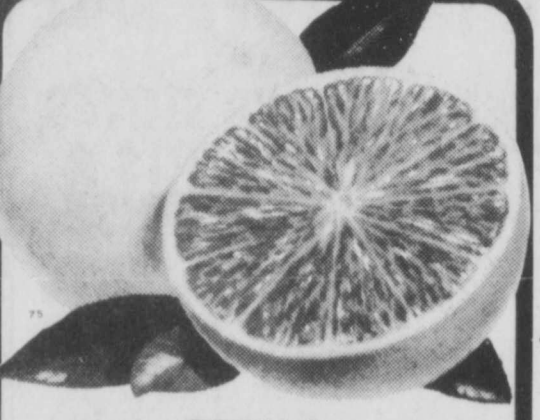
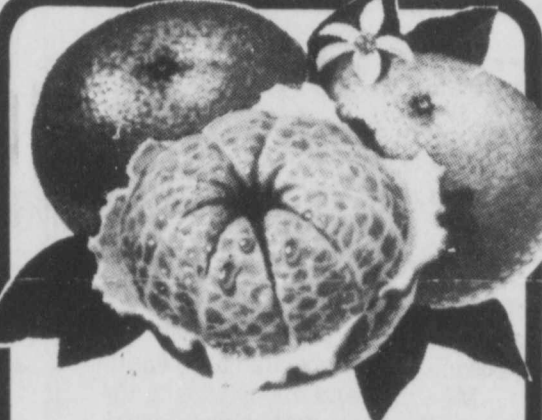
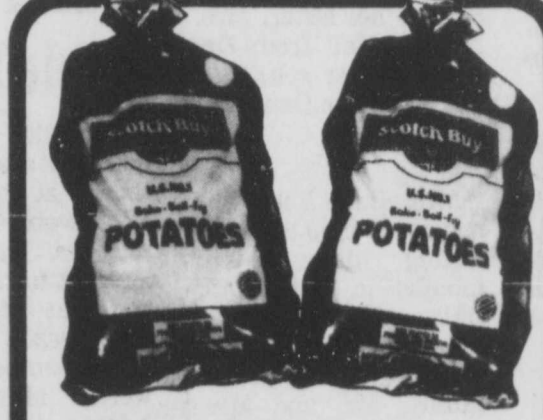
Aline Anderson, 67, a resident of Colorado City, died at 4:30 p.m., Sunday at Breckenridge Hospital in Austin.

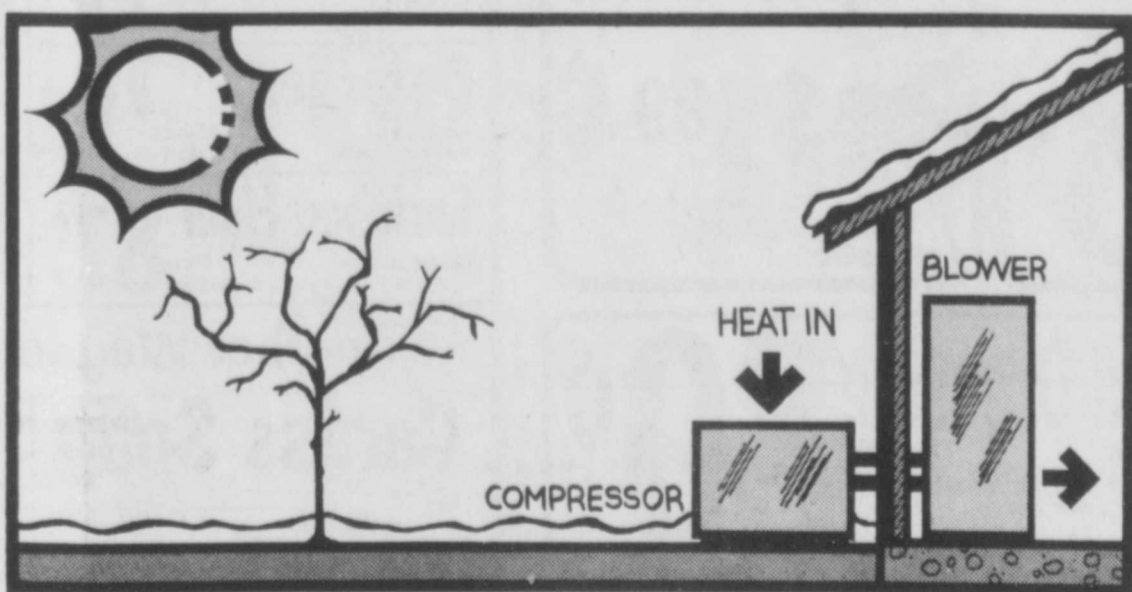

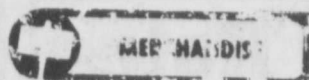

Tax Tip

If you worked for two or more employers during 1981 and received wages totaling more than \$29,700, and more than \$1,975.05 of social security (FICA) tax was withheld, you are entitled to claim the excess social security tax withheld as a credit against your income tax. If you file a joint return, you and your spouse must make separate computations.

However, if you worked for only one employer and more than \$1,975.05 was withheld, you may not claim the excess as a credit against your income tax. Your employer should refund the over-collection to you.
