

'Give-And-Take' Plan Suggested On Buffer

MUNSAN, Korea, Oct. 25. (AP) — The United Nations today proposed a give-and-take compromise to set a buffer zone across the war-torn Korean peninsula.

The U.N. proposal called for the Allies to yield about 200 square miles of North Korea in the East, and for the Reds to give up a similar area in the West.

The buffer zone would be about 2½ miles wide and follow generally present battle lines.

The proposal was introduced in a subcommittee meeting in Panmunjom shortly after cease-fire negotiations were resumed by the main Red and Allied teams, ending a 64-day breakdown in the parleys.

There was no immediate indication of Communist reaction. The Reds previously demanded a buffer zone along Parallel 38, old political boundary between North and South Korea.

UN Planes Hit Red Rail Setup

EIGHTH ARMY, Korea, Oct. 25. (AP) — UN Planes pounded the crippled North Korean rail system today in one of the war's most concentrated attacks.

Wave after wave of fighter bombers roared down on Red rolling stock. Fifth Air Force officers said the Reds were surprised and had no time to get their trains into tunnels.

Nine locomotives and 99 rail cars were destroyed. Nineteen locomotives and 129 cars were damaged.

Three brief jet battles were recorded during the day. One Russian MIG-15 was damaged. There were no reports of Allied losses.

One F-4U Corsair crashed and burned in Red territory after being hit by ground fire. The pilot died.

Prominent Stanton Druggist Is Dead

STANTON, Oct. 25. — Last rites were to be held here at 8 p.m. Thursday for J. L. (Joe) Hall, 70, who had operated a drug store in Stanton for more than four decades.

Services were to be held at the First Baptist church, with the Rev. Fred McPherson, Lubbock, former pastor, officiating, and burial was to be in the Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Hall was found at the rear of his drug store at about 11 a.m. Wednesday by his son, Jiggs Hall, pharmacist, who heard a shot. Mr. Hall had a wound in his head and a .38 calibre pistol lay at his side. Death came at 2 p.m. in the Martin County Memorial hospital.

An inquest was being conducted but no verdict had been returned.

A community leader as well as a long-time druggist, Mr. Hall had been unable to carry on actively for several months because of failing health. His death occurred on or near the anniversary of the death of a son, Dr. Leslie Hall, who gave his life in action in the Pacific theatre during World War II.

Mr. Hall was a native of Malden, Mo., where he was born Nov. 3, 1880. He operated a drug store in Loraine for several years before coming to Stanton in 1907. In 1907, in partnership with a brother-in-law, he opened a drug business here. Until ill health intervened, he was regularly at his post for the next 43 years. In that period he earned a host of friends, and his business became a West Texas legend and institution.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Jiggs Hall; one daughter, Mrs. Maxine Gooch, Humble; two brothers, Morgan Hall, Stanton, and Harry Hall, Lubbock; three sisters, Mrs. Ollie Vivian, Asherton, Mrs. Minnie McDaniel, and Mrs. Bert DeVaun, San Antonio. Arrangements here were in charge of the Arrington Funeral home.

Acheson Leaves For Paris UN Meetings

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson and most of an 81 member American delegation leave today for the United Nations General Assembly session opening in Paris, Nov. 6.

Most of the U. S. delegation is due to sail from New York at 3 p.m. (CST) on the liner America. Despite the longshoremen's strike, the U. S. Lines told the State Department the America would sail as scheduled (Pier 17, Staten Island). Acheson himself planned to go to New York by train at 10 a.m.

Included in the group of advisers and aides announced Wednesday night by the State Department was R. Gordon Arneson, special adviser to Acheson on atomic affairs. His presence reflects the expectations of U. S. officials that Russia will renew pressure at Paris for acceptance of Moscow's plan for international atomic control. The U. N. has overwhelming turned down this plan in the past.

Beginning with the acknowledgment

of the proposal, accompanied by detailed maps, was made to the Communists, the subcommittees adjourned until 11 a.m. Friday (8 a.m., CST, Thursday).

Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, U.N. command spokesman, said the Communists would be obliged to give up Kaesong, former site of cease-fire talks. It is just below Parallel 38 in Western Korea.

The proposed buffer zone would run from the mouth of the Yesong River in West Korea to 11½ miles southeast of Kaesong on the Korean East Coast. The Allies are about 50 miles north of Parallel 38 in that area.

The line would run about four miles south of P'yongyang, apex of the old Iron Triangle buildup area of the Communists. It would bend south to about 6½ miles south of Kumsong, the blasted Red headquarters and supply center on the central front, now virtually in Allied hands.

From that point it would twist northeastward and through a point about 15 miles north of the Hwachon Reservoir on the East Central Front and then generally northeast to the East Coast.

Allied forces would keep hard-won, blood-soaked Heartbreak Ridge on the East Central Front. Nuckols said the main delegations session was "very amicable."

After half an hour Gen. Nam Il, chief Red envoy, proposed that the cease-fire problem be handed back to the subcommittees. The Allies agreed.

The subcommittees were deadlocked on the issue when the Reds called off the talks at Kaesong Aug. 23.

Thursday night was the first time since negotiations opened July 10 that the United Nations command has publicly announced exactly where it wanted the cease-fire line.

Previously the Allies insisted on current battle lines.

In earlier talks debate had centered around a 20 kilometer (about 12 miles) zone.

Nuckols said the proposed zone incorporates "in general" the gains won by Allied forces in recent weeks.

Some sharp action came south-east of Kumsong on the Central Front. Tank-supported infantry seized a Communist-held hill despite strong Red resistance.

Troops stormed the high ground as American tanks hit the Chinese entrenched in their bunkers.

South of this peak, other Allied foot soldiers maintained pressure against Chinese forces clinging to the tip of a high ridge line mostly occupied by the Allies.

Southwest of Kumsong a tank-infantry force probed almost a mile deep into Red defenses before turning back.

Elsewhere, patrols probed Red positions. All met small arms and mortar fire.

Two MIG-15s made one firing pass at F-44 Thunderjets during the afternoon. They fled to their Manchurian base before any damage was inflicted to either side.

Remington Is Indicted Anew For Perjury

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP) — William W. Remington, former government economist whose perjury conviction was reversed on appeal, was indicted today by a federal grand jury on new perjury charges.

The new five-count indictment alleged he had five times at his trial earlier this year.

United States Attorney Myles J. Lane said a grand jury held that Remington perjured himself under oath on the witness stand when he testified that:

He did not pass government secrets to an admitted Soviet spy courier.

He never knowingly attended Communist Party meetings.

He never paid party dues.

He never tried to recruit anyone into the party.

He did not know until last year that a Young Communist League existed at Dartmouth College which he attended in the late '30s.

Lane said Remington will be arraigned Tuesday before Federal Judge Vincent L. Leibel.

Remington's previous trial lasted seven weeks. It ended with a jury of seven men and five women finding him guilty of perjury for calling a grand jury that he never had been a Communist.

Federal Judge Gregory F. Noonan imposed the maximum penalty of a five-year prison sentence and a \$2,000 fine.

Remington, 34, has been free in \$7,000 bail since his conviction in February. The conviction was reversed in February.

Under the new indictment, Remington, if convicted on each of the five counts, could be sentenced to 25 years in prison and fined \$10,000.

SNOW, COLD HIT IN NORTHWEST

CHICAGO, Oct. 25. (AP) — Snow and cold hit Northwest States today but warmer weather was on the way for the North Central States.

Snow fell in Montana, Western North Dakota and Northern Wyoming. Lewistown, Mont., reported three inches of snow and a reading of 24 above.

The wet area extended into Northern Nevada and Southern Texas, which reported rain. Rain also fell in Northern New England States. It was generally fair in other parts of the country.

The meeting will take the place of a regular session postponed from last Tuesday. Up for discussion will be the prospect of disposing of some 30 acres of airport land as a site for a housing project being sponsored by the chamber of commerce.

Tentative agreement on deletion of the land from the airport area was reached by city and Air Force officials at a meeting last Thursday. If the agreement is approved in Washington, the land will probably be sold to a private firm for development as a housing area.

Other points tentatively agreed on at the city-Air Force meeting will probably be discussed today.

ATLANTA, Oct. 25. (AP) — A former convict was arrested on a manslaughter charge today in the deaths of 33 persons who drank a deadly moonshine mixture of wood alcohol and water.

Prosecutor Paul Webb said John R. Hardy, a 39-year-old Atlanta whose FBI record shows several convictions of liquor law violations, was taken into custody at an Atlanta hospital Wednesday night.

Hardy went to the hospital for treatment of car accident injuries. Five persons died in hospitals in and around Atlanta during the night to bring the death toll to 33. Most were Negroes.

Police charge that Hardy brought the illegal liquor into Atlanta and pressed a hunt for another white man accused of mixing the deadly brew.

Heavy Vote Turns Out In Britain As Estimates Lower For Tory Seats

NEARLY 35 MILLION BRITONS GO TO POLLS IN CRUCIAL ELECTION

To be elected—Members to fill 620 seats in a 624-member House of Commons. Four seats have been won by Ulster Unionists.

Conservatives unopposed. The vote for one seat was postponed by the death of a candidate. The party winning most seats in Commons chooses the prime minister and runs the government.

Total candidates—1,369. Labor and allied party candidates, 619; Conservative and allied candidates, 612; Liberals, 108; Independents, 11; Communists, 10; Scottish Nationalists, 4; Irish Nationalists, 3.

Who can vote—34,915,112 Britons over 21; peers and felons are barred. Women voters exceed men by three per cent.

Main contenders—Clement R. Attlee's Labor Party, in control since 1945, and Winston Churchill's Conservatives. At the end of the last Parliament, Labor held 313 seats, Conservatives and their allies, 295. The Liberals, who often vote with the Conservatives, had nine. Labor carried 46 per cent of the popular vote last election; Conservatives and allies 43 per cent.

Issues—On the home front, austerity, nationalization of industries and heavy taxation. In the international scene, problems of rearmament, relations with the United States, setbacks Britain suffered in the Middle East.

Polls close—9 p.m. (4 p.m. CST).

Results—First returns expected around 11 p.m. (6 p.m. CST). Results in 319 districts expected before overnight counting ends at 4 a.m. Friday (10 p.m. CST Thursday). Votes for 297 other seats will be from three isolated Scottish constituencies expected Saturday, one seat Monday.

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Labor Party Gets Out The Workers

LONDON, Oct. 25. (AP) — An unprecedented surge of voting in the British general election today cooled some of the pre-election optimism in the Conservative Party, one of its officials said.

Estimates of the expected Tory majority "have been scaled down," he added.

A Conservative official said the number of people who cast ballots between 7 and 9 a.m. was "much greater than last time." The majority of these early voters would be Socialist government supporters, balloting before they went to factories and industrial plants.

"Every indication is that they (the Socialists) have succeeded in getting out a big vote," the official said.

Between 9 a.m. and noon, the source said, the polling appeared to be running two per cent greater than in the 1950 election. Conservatives said they were confident that these ballots were "at least evenly divided, if not favorable to us."

The source, who asked not to be identified, said "estimates of the majority have been scaled down now. They are talking about 35 to 45 seats."

This estimate, in fact, was the one held by independent analysts during the past four days. Conservative supporters had talked of majorities from 70 to 100 seats.

Winston Churchill said he has filed suit for libel against the London Daily Mirror. The Conservative Party central office said the statement came from Churchill's London home. It read:

"A writ has been issued on behalf of Mr. Winston Churchill for alleged libel contained on page one of today's issue of the Daily Mirror."

The exact nature of the libel was not stated.

Soviet Envoy Meets Egyptian Officials

CAIRO, Oct. 25. (AP) — Russia's envoy to Egypt met for 90 minutes Wednesday night with Egyptian Foreign Minister Salah El Din and Cairo newspaper editors, today with banner headlines on the news.

Salah El Din told reporters after the meeting that he and Soviet Minister Semen Pavlovich Koryev had discussed "Egypt's support of Russia's demand for appointment of a Russian judge at The Hague international court and other questions concerning Egypt."

The independent newspaper Al-Ahram said Salah El Din, asked by reporters whether Russia had offered Egypt arms, replied that armament affairs were not discussed.

Britain, already maintaining a tight military and naval control of the Suez Canal Zone, reiterated her determination also not to be forced out of the vast cotton-growing Sudan to the South.

In the Sudan's capital, Khartoum, British Civil Secretary Sir James Robertson told the legislative assembly today Egypt's cancellation of the 1950 condominium agreement was invalid.

The foreign minister said "we must use the arms the British always have used against us," adding, "our fight will require all our energies and perhaps blood. We are not against a weak enemy, but a strong one."

Underlining the foreign minister's words, Egyptian Royal Air Force jet planes were seen flying low over Cairo today. It was not immediately apparent what their mission was.

Al-Ahram reported — without confirmation — that U. S. Ambassador Jefferson Caffery was acting as mediator between the Egyptians and British in an effort to help settle their dispute over the Suez area.

Caffery was received in audience Wednesday by King Farouk at the Montazah Palace in Alexandria.

Caffery conferred later with British Minister M. J. Cresswell in Cairo.

SURVIVAL TEST

Air Force Orders Men To Get Lost

HIGH SIERRA, Calif. (U.S.)—The Air Force is telling its bomber crews to get lost in the wilds so they'll learn how to survive.

That's why I'm supposedly lost and trying to survive with a B-29 crew from Travis Air Force Base.

Of course, we know that help isn't far off. It isn't as though we are stranded in, say, Alaska or the Arctic Tundra. But we get the idea.

Every crew in the Strategic Air Command is required to take a course in survival in rugged terrain.

Each week, a half dozen bomber crew from Travis, halfway between San Francisco and Sacramento, are driven up into a wilderness area in the Sierra, given a couple days of instruction and left on their own.

Since early this morning, we've been grubbing for food—deer, rabbits, fish or anything else in nature's pantry.

When dawn cracked over the pine-covered mountains, our plane commander, Capt. Mes Lubischer, flushed us out of sleeping bags with:

"Okay, men, no canned rations today. You're a bunch of Daniel Boone. You got to scrounge for your food."

We have hunting knives, a 22-caliber Hornet rifle that comes in a bomber escape kit, and a parachute.

An instructor showed us how to make more than 35 survival aids from a parachute—things like a tepee, rabbit snares, showshoes, a fish net and sling shot.

Our bombardier, Capt. Norman

Hart, is trying to net some trout with a gill-net he wove with parachute shroud lines. No luck so far. We're growing hungry.

Generally, downed crews will have more equipment than we have on this trip. Each plane carries an escape kit for each man. Besides the .22 rifle, it contains a sleeping bag, food rations and a skillset. The radio man is supposed to bail out with a hand-powered radio, with a range of 2,000 miles.

"But we like to teach the men to get along on the barest of equipment," Burnett explained.

Lt. Gen. Curtis Lemay, boss of the Strategic Air Command, is credited with inaugurating survival training. Officers say that if he notes a plane commander can't lead his men in the wilderness, he is rated down in proficiency reports.

Well, so far, all we have to eat is a squirrel shot by Sgt. Kenneth Olson.

"That won't feed 12 men," says Capt. Lubischer. "I think I'll go out and check on the other men."

This may have been happy hunting grounds once. But too many bomber crews have been here before us. Game is scarce. Fishing is poor.

Finally Lubischer says "okay" and we build a fire, break open the in-flight rations and eat. The rations, carried by Air Force planes, are rich—everything from canned beef steaks and ham to eggs to dessert and soluble coffee. Napkins, too.

The captain points to the mountain ahead of us. Tomorrow we'll climb out of here. Seven miles away trucks are waiting to take us home.

Wonder if we really survived?

Joshua Blocher Fortune Found Under A Floor

LUBBOCK, Oct. 25. (U.S.)—The fortune of Joshua Blocher, self-styled "Old Devil of Bailey County," was found Wednesday three inches beneath the dirt floor of his Progress, Texas, shack.

An estimated \$10,000 in \$100, \$50, and \$20 bills, some mildewed and stuck together, was found.

Blocher 85, was found brutally beaten to death in a cotton field near Muleshoe, Aug. 13. Charges of murder with malice were filed, Oct. 4, against Lester Douglas Stevens, 50, and Thomas Livesey, 29, both of Amarillo.

Blocher founded Progress, but was never able to build it into his dream city. It is still a tiny town on the South Plains.

Stevens and Livesey have accused each other of killing the old man. They admitted they got only 13 cents off Blocher.

Bailey County Sheriff Hugh Freeman said search for the money started Monday. The first jar containing \$6,000 was found Wednesday afternoon about in the center of the shack. He said the money in the other jars was almost welded together by deterioration and an accurate count was not possible.

Blocher's heirs include two sisters in Kansas.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (U)—A Senate Armed Services Subcommittee reported today it had found dissatisfaction and low morale among Marines—particularly recently recalled reservists—at three bases.

"This was discouraging in view of the long history of high morale and esprit de corps of the Marines," the group said. There was no immediate comment from the Marine Corps.

The three bases are El Toro and Camp Pendleton in California and Camp Lejeune in North Carolina.

The subcommittee criticized the Navy and Marine Corps for what it called lavish use of men and money. In a report, which also covered conditions at the Marine Corps Air Station, Quantico, Va., the Navy's amphibious base at Little Creek near Norfolk, Va., and the Navy's submarine base, New London, Conn.

The Preparedness Subcommittee, headed by Senator Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) was set up shortly after fighting broke out in Korea to keep an eye on the mobilization program. This was its 31st report; others have dealt with a wide variety of mobilization problems.

In general, the latest report praised the food, clothing supplies, instruction, medical care, housing and recreation facilities at the six training centers.

But in addition to reporting low morale at the three Marine bases, the subcommittee was critical of what it called a "lack of cost consciousness" among officers at the six centers.

This factor "involves waste—waste in manpower and waste in money—and at this critical juncture the nation can afford neither," the subcommittee said.

As an example of low morale and waste of manpower, the report cited a staff sergeant, an inactive reservist recalled to duty, whose full time job at El Toro is to issue equipment at a golf course.

"It would be impossible to convince this man that he was really needed and that there was sufficient cause to recall him to active duty," the report said.

OTHER STRIKES HIT

Shipping Tieup Is Spreading In East

Shipping — A wildcat strike of AFL longshoremen, now 11 days old, paralyzed the Port of New York, and made idle some 30,000 of the East Coast's 65,000 dock workers. The strike already has hit piers in New Jersey, Boston and Albany, and threatened to spread

to Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Chester, Pa. A new appeal was made to President Truman to "stop the strike," as cargo valued at \$250 million piled up awaiting shipment. Some 122 ships were idle, 114 of them in New York. Federal mediators are in New York. Bank-and-file strikers stood firm in their demand that the new contract be junked and another one negotiated.

Milk — A strike of 15,000 AFL drivers and dairy plant workers cut off nearly all milk supplies from 12 million consumers in the three-state metropolitan area of New York. The strike was called by five locals of the AFL Teamsters which demanded a 20 per cent wage hike. It affected some 200 companies serving New York City and vicinity.

Mediators attempted to settle the dispute.

Breweries — An agreement was reached today to end the 24-day dispute that made 5,000 CIO workers idle and disrupted production at the huge Anheuser-Busch Brewery in St. Louis. Three other St. Louis breweries also have been shut down, but there was no immediate indication of how the agreement will affect those plants.

Atomic energy — Strikes slowed operations at Atomic Energy Commission plants in Oak Ridge, Tenn., Hanford, Wash., and Paducah, Ky. At Oak Ridge, 120 AFL painters struck Wednesday after dismissal of a worker for excessive absenteeism. On Tuesday, 370 electricians and 160 plumbers struck over unrelated union jurisdictional disputes.

Railroads — The 75,000 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers were told by union officials to plan for a possible nationwide strike. No date was set. The brotherhood has been campaigning for a 40-hour work week and higher wages for two years.

Rubber — Strikes of CIO United Rubber Workers halted operations in plants of the Goodyear Rubber Co. in Wiloughby, O., and Pennsylvania. The strikes were over a new contract.

Electrical — Nearly 4,000 employees in two of the three plants of the General Electric Corporation in Fort Wayne, Ind., have quit work in protest over a change in methods on the job of one man.

KOREAN ACTION MAKES WAR A COSTLY THING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (U)—Secretary of State Acheson says United Nations action like that in Korea has made aggression so costly as to "put off perhaps forever the terrible catastrophes of another world war."

Acheson made this statement Tuesday at a United Nations Day ceremony. Forty-eight Korean veterans from 19 nations were guests of honor.

The veterans also were honored at a U. N. party Tuesday night. Diplomatic representatives from Communist Russia, Poland and Yugoslavia showed up but did not mingle with the servicemen.

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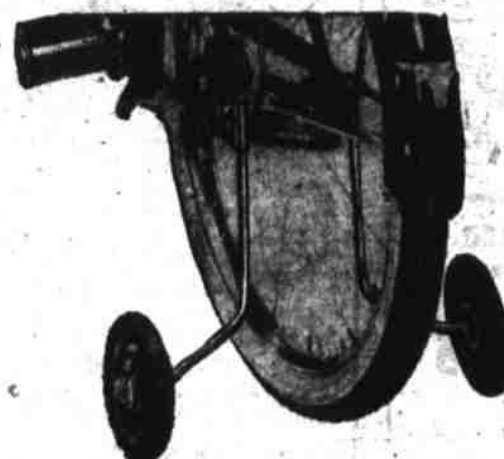

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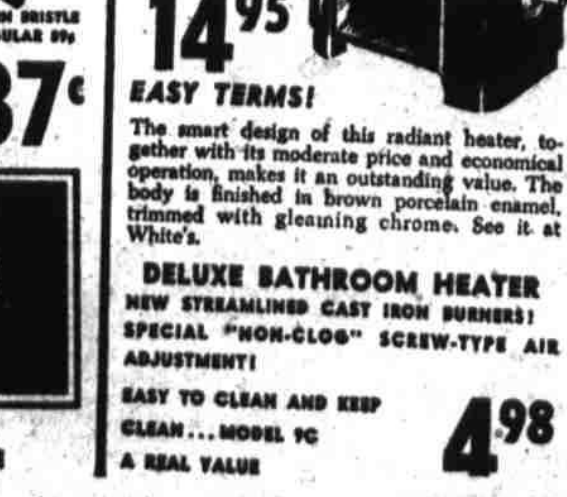

The prophet paints a picture of power and prosperity for Israel in the distant future, the rebuilding of Jerusalem as a great power, though the immediate prospect was ruin and destruction. The latter state is emerging now. "Thy gates shall be open continually, they shall not be closed day or night." — Isa. 60:11.

With all its faults, the 82nd Congress managed to do some pretty important things, in the view of Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, who addressed the Independent Petroleum Association of America convention at Houston Wednesday.

He called this year's session "one of the most significant in the history of the Republic." He said he spoke without regard to partisan interests. The 82nd was—almost exclusively—a "Preparedness Congress."

"The major debates, the major legislation has been related to preparedness—building the nation's strength to meet the clear challenge of a grim struggle for survival," the senator declared.

Calling its record of accomplishment good, Johnson went on to say that the 82nd had "legislated for the future." He cited the forward step toward universal military training, which "guarantees that we will have a constant and continuing reservoir of trained manpower to rally to our defense whenever danger arises." The 82nd also provided legislation "for the most extensive program of military rearmament ever undertaken by the United States." It provided legislation authorizing our defense forces to construct necessary airfields and bases all around the globe.

"Ten years ago that legislation would have been impossible," the Texas senator told the oil people. "The passage of such legislation now further emphasizes that we have acquired a hard-headed, bluntly practical sense of responsibility for the defense of freedom throughout the world."

In all these measures, "there is a great and profound change from past American policies. This Congress has begun preparation for the future, not just for today. This Congress has looked far beyond the end of its nose and mapped out a course which, if pursued with equal diligence in the future, will make strength a permanent factor in American policy." It has taken us a long time, he added, to learn the lesson of preparedness, and the instruction has been costly, but "this Congress has provided indelible proof that we have learned."

Just how business could hold up as well as it has in the face of one of the worst droughts on record may appear as somewhat of a mystery. However, the statements of our banks as of close of business Oct. 10 offer an evidence of how trade managers "keep going" on a reasonably level keel.

Deposits were up by \$2,880,000 over a year ago when entering one of the lushest harvest seasons on record. They were nearly three-quarters of a million up from the June 30 figure. The \$26,328,000 banked was one of the near peaks for the banks. Call it \$26,000,000, or more than half a million over at the end of June, a million more than at the end of June.

Loans and discounts stood at \$7,377,000, which was about a half million dollars more than last year and more than three-

quarters more than in June. One might have expected the deposits to drop way off and the loans to rocket, but this has not been the case.

There are perhaps two factors. One is that the agricultural situation has retained some semblance of financial stability through the miraculous production of a far better crop than any would have imagined, and through the liquidation of herds in the face of dwindling range reserves.

The other is the remarkable diversification of our economy. Industrially we have continued an upward trend. Oil tempo has continued brisk and stimulating. The Air Base construction has furnished sources of jobs.

That we have so far been able to slide over the crisis in crops is at once a stroke of good fortune and a tribute to an evenly spread economy.

WASHINGTON: — When British Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Galskell was in Washington recently, he held a private and doleful conference with high U. S. officials which presaged the chief problem facing England after the elections.

The chancellor didn't put it that way, but the problem will be just the same, no matter who wins in today's voting.

What he told Secretary of the Treasury Snyder, Undersecretary of State Webb, Defense Mobilizer Wilson, Eric Johnston and others was that England was losing its sterling reserves at an alarming rate.

The pound sterling, he said, was being drained out of England so rapidly that it was now at the lowest point in history — at that time only 1,600,000,000 pounds. Since then it has become worse.

Galskell didn't ask for a loan. In fact, he didn't ask anything except the advance of 800,000,000 pounds to be paid back later. He attributed the drain of sterling reserves to the competition of German and Japanese trade. Goods from these two countries have come into the international market in the last year or so and cut down British markets.

Following today's elections, it is certain that the new government will have to take some drastic monetary steps, and U. S. experts figure that one of them may be a loan from us of around \$2,000,000,000; another could be further devaluation of the pound, which in 1949 was cut from \$4.03 to \$2.86. A third alternative could be curtailment of British rearmament.

up such religious fervor that some senators even refused to say "no comment." Senators Maybank of South Carolina and Hayden of Arizona pleaded with newsmen that "no comment" might be misinterpreted. They begged reporters to forget they had asked them about the Vatican appointment.

Here is another chapter in the long history of income-tax developments which ought to be investigated. This one pertains to Western Massachusetts where a Clifford Akey recently resigned as deputy collector. Previously, Denis Delaney was indicted as collector of internal revenue for Massachusetts.

This column has unearthed information that Akey, who has now switched from income taxes to acting postmaster at Greenfield, Mass., has been operating a tax-counseling business at the very same time he was collecting people's taxes. Akey also operated an insurance business on the side and some clients who received tax advice seemed to have followed the natural impulse to take out insurance policies with the tax collector's company.

Queried on the telephone, Mr. Akey told this story: He had helped his neighbors with their tax returns when he first joined Internal Revenue in 1941, he said, but when it took too much of his time, he had turned his tax-counseling business over to his secretary, Miss Elizabeth Vitro.

Significantly, Miss Vitro continued to help Akey's clients.

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His Greatest Ally

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (UP)—One of the hurdles that has to be cleared before television is unfrozen is educational TV.

This matter is tied up tightly with the national channel allocation plan on which the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) is now working preparatory to lifting the freeze early in 1952.

Thus, when the channels are definitely assigned, by either FCC must say finally what education is to get, and on what terms.

The commission tentatively ruled last March that about 10 per cent of all televising space should be specifically reserved for schools.

This plan would give educational institutions 209 of the approximately 2,000 local outlets envisioned for the nation.

Of the total school stations pro-

posed, 82 could get channels in the very high frequency (VHF) band now in use and 127 would have channels in the proposed new ultra high frequency (UHF) range, still to be opened up.

The school world generally protested this wasn't nearly enough, and especially not enough VHF. FCC Commissioner Freida B. Hennock said education should have 25 per cent of all channel space.

Commercial television generally thinks it is more than a m.p.e. Everyone in this group thinks educational television is a fine thing but —

Some say there should be none set-aside at all, that the schools should compete on even terms with industry.

Some say the schools should project education to the public through established commercial outlets.

Some say the educators will never get around to using all the channels proposed for them and that any perpetual set-aside for school applicants would waste precious spectrum space.

Just how long the proposed reservation will run the commission has yet to decide.

The schools say it should be permanent, or at the very least over a great many years.

Only one instance has actually applied for educational TV since this new branch of video was proposed. This is the Lindsay Hopkins vocational school of Miami, Fla.

However, about 10 other schools or school agencies have given notice of firm plans to build stations promptly. These include the University of Houston, Texas, and the Houston Independent School District.

The first Texas State Fair opened its doors on this day in 1887, thus beating its rival in the east about half of town, the Dallas State Fair, by only one day.

Agitation for the creation of a Texas State Fair of Texas had begun in Dallas two years before. Soon after the formation of a fair association to promote the project, a disagreement arose over the location of the fair, and the association split into two factions. The result was two separate fairs, each trying to outdo the other.

Former Governor O. M. Roberts, with great impartiality, came to Dallas to open both fairs. In his capacity as mediator, he ignored local prejudices and instead talked about the deep water port at Galveston. The North Dallas show featured Roman chariot races with a troop of Comanche Indians and the Presidential Band from Mexico City formed the stellar attractions in east Dallas. Both fairs were great financial successes, and attendance in the third day soared to 38,000.

Flush with success, the two groups found it easier to get along and combined the next year to form the Texas State Fair and Exposition Association. New grounds were purchased, and the Dallas State Fair of Texas has now grown to be one of the three largest annual expositions on the continent.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (U. P.)—Americans are a strange nation of people united by a red cement called ketchup.

It is doubtful which has done more to hold them together.

Long debates have been held on what is the great American dish. Apple pie? Pumpkin pie? Fried chicken? Turkey with cranberry sauce? The hamburger? The hot dog?

All these have their passionate defenders. But to any one who regularly travels these United States, there can be but one answer. The great American dish isn't a dish at all. It's a bottle, a bottle containing the flavor in widest favor—ketchup.

Ketchup, also known as catsup and catsup, is no more native to these shores than folks named Smith, Jones, Johnson or O'Houlihan. It is an immigrant. It originated in Malay. It was made usually of mushrooms, unripe walnuts and ripe tomatoes, and was used to flavor soups, meat and fish.

Only after migrating to America, however, did ketchup come into its own. Here its ingredients are tomato puree, vinegar, spices and sugar.

And the scarlet, gooey semi-fluid graduated from a flavoring substance into an all-purpose food. Your true ketchup fan today will eat it through a straw. He will douse it on everything from chicken-a-la-king to ice cream, and only an iron tradition keeps some enthusiasts from using it to cool their coffee.

In times of prosperity the poor man uses it to anoint everything on his full plate. In times of hardship ketchup is the poor man's surest fodder. He can go up to a cafeteria counter, ask for a cup of hot water, take the steaming cup to the nearest table, pump some ketchup in it — and he has a bowl of tomato soup for nothing.

"During the last depression," a Florida cafeteria owner told me, "that ketchup soup trick almost caused me to go broke. I think it started with a dam Yankee visitor, but he sure did spread the custom fast through the South."

What explains the overwhelming popularity of ketchup? Many restaurant owners have a cynical answer.

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 25. (UP)—A screen writer who a month ago refused to say whether he had ever been a Communist surprised Hollywood today by setting up his own film company with the backing of some top movie names — including Gary Cooper.

He is Carl Foreman, 37. Foreman, at a House Un-American Activities Subcommittee hearing here Sept. 25, declined to say whether he had ever been a Communist, but said he is not one now.

Newspaper coverage of major events the world over is taken for granted today. But did you ever wonder how stories were had in 70 odd days, say about 100 years ago?

Most of it was gotten by the simple expedient of using old's scotches and glue pot. When exchange papers came, editors clipped out dispatches and would paste them up for their own use.

Along about 1841, when Horace Greeley and other editors began to challenge the old Gordon Bennett's powerful New York Herald, editors let loose, concocted what appeared to be methods in securing a news beat from the shrewd Bennett.

The Herald had the money to operate extensively, but Greeley and others did not. However, there were occasions when the vaunted Bennett was scooped.

On one occasion rival papers sent reporters to Boston to cover a speech by Daniel Webster. As the story goes, newspapers sent two of their top short-hand operators to work against Horace Greeley's ace, Henry J. Raymond, later to become even more famous as founder of the New York Times.

After the speech was delivered, all reporters climbed on board the night boat from Boston for the return to New York. All, except Raymond, figured the evening could be well spent having some fun. Raymond, however, started out the evening writing furiously. Then, because he secretly had a small printing office on board, his manuscript was set up in type immediately. Upon the arrival of the boat in New York, the columns were ready to be put in forms and on the press promptly one hour after docking.

Historians consider Raymond's feat one of the greatest on record at that time. It completely astonished rivals of Greeley's Tribune—so much so that other papers didn't publish the speech.

On another occasion, Greeley's Tribune managed to bring Gov. Seward's annual legislative

York in 22 hours. The "speedy" delivery was accomplished by means of three riders and 10 relays of horses. The Tribune loudly proclaimed this feat "almost—if not quite—unparalleled in this country."

Still another method of acquiring news was via "pigeon express." However, this, I assume, didn't seem too practical since rival editors hired marksmen to shoot the pigeons down.

Competition was fierce in those days. Several newspapers once chartered a pilot boat to rush European news across the ocean and thus beat the boat carrying Bennett's news. Bennett heard about this and bribed the Cunard line's skipper to lay on more steam and beat the pilot boat.

There were other attempts to beat Bennett, but gradually all became costly ventures. In order to do so, the Tribune had to pool resources with other papers.

Thus, because of these costly "races" against Bennett's Herald, the pooling system eventually gave birth to the present day's Associated Press. Greeley and the New York Sun were the principal movers in its formation.

Today, AP news coverage is tremendous and its facilities unsurpassed. Nevertheless, it must have been fun to watch the antics carried on a century ago.

Imagine, if you will, this incident:

A reporter was carrying Connecticut election returns from New Haven to New York. He travelled by light sulky. It began snowing at Stamford and it was so dark he could not travel without much risk. Keeping on, he reached New Rochelle, some 18 miles from New York. Just after leaving there, he accidentally ran upon a horse, apparently standing still in the road. As a result, a wheel of the sulky was broken. The night was so dark nothing could be seen. So, the reporter took the harness from his horse, mounted him without a saddle, and finished his trip.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 25. —The fear that admitting Turkey and Greece into the Atlantic Pact will over-extend that treaty organization by guaranteeing the defense of still another frontier, is apparently not widely shared by the American public.

A national survey finds that most voters approve of the admission of Turkey and Greece. Voters who are the best informed about the situation are even more in favor of this step, voting 4-to-1 in favor of admitting the two countries.

When the subject came up last month at a meeting of the Atlantic powers, several smaller nations felt that if Greece and Turkey were admitted, too great a strain would be put on the military resources of the other members because they would then have to help guarantee the defense of two more countries.

At the same place, a year after the arrival of the press, a newspaper started publication. Although not a daily, this paper, "The Halifax Gazette," is described

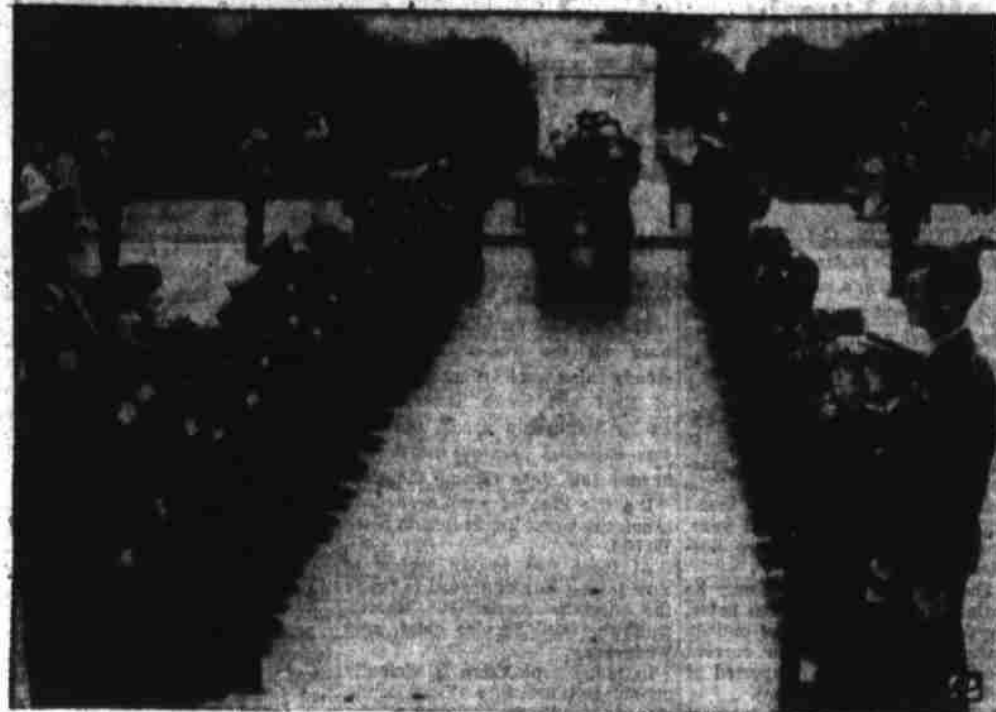

State Cautious Over Oil Talk Resumption

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (U.S.)—State Department officials appeared cautiously optimistic today about chances for the resumption of talks between Britain and Iran in their bitter tug-of-war over Iran's oil nationalization.

American officials were reported to be exploring intensively with Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh various proposals for a formula which might provide a basis for negotiations. The British government was being kept informed of developments.

If an understanding can be reached it will provide one of the first great international tasks for the British government to be seated following today's national election in Britain. A previous American effort to help work out a settlement of the oil dispute broke down last August.

American officials appeared to be most hopeful today of working out some formula which would meet Iran's adamant insistence on control of its rich oil industry, but still permit Britain to continue marketing the oil at a substantial profit.

The British so far have been determined that an agreement on internal management of the industry must be reached along with any agreement on external marketing of oil. It is their view, to which American officials also subscribe, that Iran has neither the experience nor the experts to manage the British-developed industry.

Some chance is seen of working out this problem by placing actual operational management of the industry under a competent "neutral" oil man — neither Iranian nor British — without prejudicing Iran's claim to overall control.

Rain Threat Puts Damper On AEC Test

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Oct. 25. (U.S.)—Threatening rain, moving down from the Northwest, put a damper today on the preliminary phase of Exercise Desert Rock, the joint Army-Atomic Energy Commission maneuvers.

The initial rehearsal for the atomic battlefield test was held at dawn Wednesday with B-29 bombers making what appeared to be a conventional bomb run.

About 1,000 troops, including units from Camp Roberts, Calif.; Fort Lewis, Wash., and the 11th Airborne Division from Camp Campbell, Ky., were believed to have been in forward positions for the TNT type blast.

The AEC did not say how many such dry runs will be made before the atomic drops start. But it was considered significant that the AEC called Wednesday's run "an initial rehearsal" indicating more warm-ups to follow.

No test was scheduled today; any decision about Friday probably depends on the weather.

The commission's test chiefs returned to Las Vegas from the site Wednesday night as the weather bureau forecast rain in the Yucca Flat area, 75 miles northwest.

They declined comment on the dry run, which was held primarily to test communications, sound blast waves, etc.

Planes from the Air Force Strategic Weapons Command flew from Kirtland Air Force Base, Albuquerque, N.M., to take part in the tests. Several B-29s from Indian Springs Air Base, near the test site, also were said to have participated.

TO GET BEEF

Seek To Allow Army Pay Premium Price

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (U.S.)—A proposal that the Army be allowed to offer a premium price to get essential supplies of beef was being discussed in government circles today.

The proposal found considerable support at the Agriculture Department, where there has been a reluctance to join the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) on some other proposals which some OPS officials say would not only get supplies for the military but help to enforce price ceilings.

The armed services have been unable to buy all the beef they need recently. Relatively few slaughterers have bid on Army purchase offers. Some have said they have been unable to buy enough beef cattle to supply their normal civilian customers. Others have said that government price ceilings are such as to make it more profitable to sell to civilian outlets.

The OPS has submitted a plan under which the government would regulate beef production of individual eligible slaughterers under certain conditions.

The plan would attempt to limit beef production by individual slaughterers for civilian markets to 100 per cent of the quantity produced in the like period last year.

The OPS contends that such a limitation would tend to reduce cattle buying by some plants which have greatly expanded operations. This expansion has resulted in sharp competition for cattle and much overpayment.

The Agriculture Department is willing to go along with the OPS on a regulation program to get supplies for the military, and operate it.

Such a system was used during the last war. But department officials believe the job of getting military supplies could be done more simply merely by allowing the Army to offer a price premium.

The department is reluctant to be drawn into a program which would attempt to limit slaughter operations by individual packers. Officials say Congress banned such a program when it specifically prohibited the use of slaughter quotas.

Officials emphasized, however, that the department was not unwilling to help with a price control program if it did not conflict with the intent of Congress.

Just what will come of the OPS proposal may be determined after Secretary of Agriculture Brannan returns to his office today from a speaking engagement in the Midwest.

FORT WORTH, Oct. 25. (U.S.)—A reported \$2,500 extortion plot against a wealthy Fort Worth executive brought charges of threat to extort money Wednesday against Leslie E. Sapp, 33, butcher.

Sapp was arrested after Lay Wattenbarger, head of a Fort Worth wholesale gasoline firm, told police of an extortion plot against him.

Wattenbarger said he had received a threat Monday. He said he was told that if he did not leave \$2,500 cash in an envelope in his office by noon his home would be "blown up" 30 minutes later.

Billy Graham Talks At Baptist Meeting

HOUSTON, Oct. 25. (U.S.)—Evangelist Billy Graham speaks today to the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The Baptists attacked "moral degeneracy in our government" Wednesday and said it threatened the existence and security of the nation.

Delegates adopted a strongly worded statement to that effect.

The convention will vote today whether to increase the 150-man executive board to 180 members. The 30 new members would be laymen. Officers also will be elected.

A building and loan association was established for loans on church construction and repairs. This was a major recommendation by the executive board. Headquarters will be at Dallas. Plans are to set up a central fund of \$250,000 to start the loan fund.

Dr. J. Howard Williams estimated a need for 1,000 more churches in Texas. He said churches are in

drastic need of repair. Dr. Williams said many of the churches could not obtain commercial loans.

The commission report urged support of the United Drys campaign against liquor in Texas and commended the seminaries and some of our colleges in admitting to their classes qualified students without racial discrimination.

Wayland College at Plainview recently opened its doors to qualified Negro students.

The Christian Life report was presented by Rev. A. C. Miller of Dallas, director of the ministry to minorities.

Dr. J. W. Bruner, executive secretary, reported total receipts for Baptist schools and hospitals were up \$1 million over last year — to \$7,592,366.95.

Miller said the property value of the schools increased to \$25,636,928.91 over last year, a gain of \$93,410.91; that the property value of hospitals increased to \$19,029,285.72 — a gain of \$5,390,364.12.

Dr. Williams said in the first 11 months gifts of \$12,195,434.55 had been received for permanent improvements and endowments.

He reported Texas Baptist gifts to foreign missions this year total \$1,511,314.46.

Miss Gladys Allen of Waco and Carlos Morris of Houston were named Baylor trustees. They replace J. Sayles Leach of Houston and Wiley Atkins of Fort Worth. The number of Baylor trustees will rise from 36 to 48 next year. The board will include 11 members each from Waco, Dallas and Houston, where Baylor branches are located, and 15 members from the state-at-large.

The \$10 million budget for the general convention was approved.

Brief Scuffle Hits Gotham Waterfront

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (U-P) — A brief but spirited scuffle erupted on New York's strike-becalmed waterfront today when some 100 longshoremen drove through the strikers' picket lines.
The scuffle, led by a supporter of President Joe Ryan of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association broke through and around a picket line of 250 men at a Hudson River pier where the liner Corona had just docked.
Fist fights broke out. There was shoving, yelling and gouging. No one was seriously hurt, police said.
Virtually all piers in the big Port of New York, including New Jersey docks, and in Boston already have been shut down by the strike.
A total of 122 ships have been immobilized, some of them with perishable cargoes rotting in the holds. Tons of other freight was piling up on docks at the rate of \$25 million worth a day.
John J. (Gene) Sampson, who heads the insurgent pier workers, said pickets already had left New York for the three cities in an effort to idle piers there.
Sampson's assertion came after a three-hour heated session between the split factions of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association which broke up at midnight (CST) today.
Federal Mediator Clyde M. Mills, who presided at the meeting, when asked about the progress of negotiations to end the 11-day old rebel strike, said only: "They got things off their chests."
Mills added that he would call another meeting later in the day.
Meanwhile, Joseph P. Ryan, IILA president, said he would meet with his executive board today to cope with the new developments.
Besides the New York and New Jersey piers, Boston and Albany, N. Y., docks are idle as a result of the strike.
Last night, a plan to end the crippling strike collapsed when rebel dock workers refused to follow Sampson's suggestion that a new vote be taken on a recently approved contract.
The contract, which upped hourly pay from \$2 to \$2.10 is the main contention in the intra-union fight. The insurgents want to scrap the agreement and get a 25-cent hourly wage raise.
Ryan's contention that the new contract was approved by a two-to-one vote among 65,000 longshoremen from Maine to Virginia is disputed by the dissident group.

Tri-State Area Is Hit By Milk Strike

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (U-P) — Almost all milk supplies were cut off from 12 million consumers in the three-state metropolitan area today by a strike of 15,000 drivers and dairy plant workers.
Hope for settlement rested largely on the imminent probability of an Office of Price Stabilization order raising retail milk prices. This might place the employers in a position to satisfy the strikers' pay demands.
Marathon negotiations, which started Wednesday noon, continued almost continuously through the night and early today in an effort to settle the dispute.
Mediators representing the federal government, New York State, New Jersey, Connecticut, and New York City guided the talks.
Latest word on the course of the negotiations was a mediator's statement Wednesday night that "definite progress" was being made.
The strike, which began at 3 p.m. (CST) Wednesday, was called by five locals of the AFL International Brotherhood of Teamsters in a move to enforce a demand for a 20 per cent wage increase.
The walkout hit some 300 companies serving New York City, Long Island, suburban Westchester County, N. Y.; eight counties in Northern New Jersey and parts of two more, and the southwestern corner of Connecticut.
Deliveries to plants from New York's milkshed started to halt as soon as the strike started upon expiration of a company-union contract.
Many of the milkshed farmers, who normally ship \$500,000 worth of milk daily into the New York market were expected to send their milk to local plants for conversion into cheese, ice cream and other products.
The strike's impact on consumers was felt starting at 1 a.m. (CST) today when milk trucks failed to roll.
The union continued deliveries to hospitals, schools, military installations, convents and certain other institutions.

Shaver submitted his resignation Wednesday as counsel for the Senate Small Business Committee. Chairman Sparkman (D-Ala.) accepted it promptly.
Shaver has said that Mrs. Bratten, secretary to Vice President Barkley, joined him in making visits to officials of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) to ask about more than a million dollars in federal loans.
Both of them denied they exerted influence in connection with the loans.
Both already have been questioned in a preliminary inquiry by the Senate Investigations Subcommittee, but Nixon told reporters that only "a thorough public investigation will clear up the situation."
Nixon is a member of the committee.

VANDENBERG TELLS REPORTERS

Radar Warning System Nearly Set

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP) — The \$295 million radar system for warning of possible aerial attack against the United States is nearly completed, Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg said.

The Air Force Chief of Staff told reporters the complex and far-flung detection system should be in full operation soon.

But, he indicated, it will take longer before all the units of new jet interceptor planes needed as a vital second part of the air defense system are ready. The first

planes provided for under appropriations made two years ago are only now beginning to be delivered.

The Air Force, with substantial appropriations by Congress and by diverting funds from other projects of lower priority, has been able to rush the radar net near to completion in a little over two years.

The warning and interceptor forces of the United States work in close liaison with those of Canada in the protection of the Northern Hemisphere against a surprise aerial strike by Russian bombers or

paratroops across the Polar areas or the high altitudes of the Pacific or Atlantic Oceans.

In answer to another question, Vandenberg made it plain that the chance of using any of the super-long range B-36 Consolidated Vultee bombers in the Korean War, even for no more than a combat test of the big plane, is remote.

The B-36, the general said, "is our atom carrier and there is no reason for trying it out in Korea

where the strategic situation is entirely different from that for which it was designed.

Moreover, appearance of a B-36 in Korean action would provide the enemy with a chance to learn the combat techniques used for the bomber.

The Air Chief also made it plain that the bomb line in Korea remains on the Yalu River boundary of Manchuria. He said, when asked if there had been any change, that "the sanctuary is still the sanctuary."

Law Library Due To Act Of 52nd

A statute enacted by the 52nd legislature will provide the means for Howard county to assemble and maintain its own law library.

The statute provides that counties may assess an extra dollar for court costs in each civil case filed in the district and county courts to support such a library.

Following a conference with a committee from the local bar association, Howard county commissioners placed their approval on such a project for Howard county.

The courts and members of the bar have endorsed the plan enthusiastically. An up-to-date law library in the courthouse will not only be a convenience to the attorneys, but also will fill a need of the courts themselves, they explain. In addition, the whole thing is expected to result in a saving of time in many law suits.

Heretofore, it has been necessary

on many occasions to recess during trials to enable attorneys to consult libraries in their own offices when points of law were raised.

At the outset, the county law library will be located in the district attorney's office in the courthouse. Commissioners have delegated supervision to the bar association, under the commissioners court's direction.

Space for a law library is included in plans for a new county courthouse.

Local attorneys have predicted that the library will grow rapidly, once it is established. Several law firms already have indicated that they will contribute some basic volumes. Such gifts would provide a starting point to which the county can add as funds are received.

Closing Terraces To Curtail Runoff

Winston Kilpatrick, cooperator of the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District, who lives one mile east of the old Richland school, will close his terraces by building a block completely around the field. Kilpatrick says, "Level terraces let too much water run off the land when they are not closed."

O. D. O'Daniel, who lives four miles south and two miles east of Coahoma, will construct a stock pond to insure a more even distribution of grazing on his range land. This will enable the livestock to get water without traveling any great distance and prevent the pasture from being overgrazed in places and undergrazed in other locations.

R. E. Martin, a rancher at Coahoma, has completed a stock pond to insure a yearlong supply of water and enable him to secure a more even distribution of grazing.

Smith Brothers Ranch at Luther

have completed a large stock tank 29 feet deep that will insure him a year round supply of water. Soil Conservation Service technicians planned the pond to provide an even distribution of grazing over the entire range.

The Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors elected officers for another year. The following officers were elected Morris Patterson, Sterling City Route, Big Spring—Chairman; B. O. Brown, Vincent Route, Coahoma—Vice Chairman; Edgar Phillips, Big Spring—Secretary-Treasurer; Ocie Smith, Taran—Member; and Warren Skaggs, Midland—Member.

Brown replaces Frank Lovelace, who served out one unexpired term of one year and was elected for one full term of five years.

1/4 pound dried apricots or other fruit
4 cups sugar
1 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon soda
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup buttermilk
8 tablespoons cold lard

COOK SLOWLY dried fruit until tender. Drain, add sugar and mash to pulp. Mix together dry ingredients for dough and cut in one-half of lard. Moisten with milk until biscuit dough consistency and turn on floured board. Cut in rest of lard and knead firm. Slice into 4-inch rounds and add tablespoon of filling to each piece. Fold over and moisten edges with little warm water. Press edges and fry in deep hot fat until golden brown. Makes about 15 pies.

Popcorn Variations Will Offer Thrill To Trick-Or-Treat Crowd

The second annual National Popcorn Week having opened last Sunday, Oct. 21, a few suggestions for interesting variations of this treat are in order.

There is probably no food used by the people of the United States which is as universally liked and used as popcorn. It is the traditional American food—wholesome, nutritious and healthful. It is high in food energy value and in protein content. Few people know that a pound of popcorn contains approximately twice as many food energy units as a pound of round steak, 2 1/2 times as many as a pound of eggs and 6 times as many units as a pound of milk.

Glazed Popcorn

2 cups sugar
1/4 cup water
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
drop of vegetable coloring
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
2 quarts popped corn
Combine sugar, water and cream of tartar. Add enough of any vegetable coloring to please. Cook to hard crack stage (300 degrees F.). Add butter and flavoring and pour over corn, stirring well and quickly. Let it cool a second and then begin to separate kernels, placing each one apart on a baking sheet. They will harden almost at once and may be dropped into a bowl. Work quickly. Approximate yield: 2 quarts glazed corn.

Light Corn Balls

1 cup sugar
1 cup corn syrup
1/4 cup water
1 tablespoon butter
3 quarts popped corn
salt
nutmeats
Combine sugar, corn syrup and water. Cook to hard ball stage (280 degrees F.). Add butter and pour over salted corn in a large deep bowl. Stir constantly with wooden spoon so that each kernel is coated. Let cool just a moment and then shape the balls, putting a nutmeat at the center. Approximate yield: 12 medium-sized balls. A

Marinate canned asparagus tips in a spicy French dressing, then drain and place on a bed of shredded lettuce; garnish with strips of canned pimiento. Serve with finger rolls that have been hollowed out and filled with egg salad, as a main course for luncheon or for Sunday night supper.

To freshen rolls that have gotten dry, sprinkle them lightly with a little water and put them in the top of a double boiler. Cover and set over boiling water until the rolls are hot.

Crisp, Delicious Ham Will Touch Up Meal

HAM MOUSSE
(Makes six 2-3 cup servings)
1/4 cup evaporated milk
2 tablespoons plain unflavored gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/4 cups hot water
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 cups ground ham
1/4 cup finely chopped celery
1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper

Pour evaporated milk into refrigerator-tray and place in freezing section of refrigerator until ice crystals form around the sides. Meanwhile soften gelatine in cold water, about 5 minutes, in bowl. Pour hot water over softened gelatine; stir until dissolved. Stir in paprika, pepper, lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce. Chill in refrigerator until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in ground ham, celery and green pepper. Beat evaporated milk until chilled bowl and beat with chilled rotary beater until it stands in peaks. Fold into gelatine mixture. Pour into 1-quart mold. Chill in refrigerator until firm. Unmold on bed of salad greens and serve with salad dressing.

Let Youngsters Bake Own Holiday Cookies

Roll out the cookie dough. Then let the small fry take over the cutting and decorating. If you lack cookie cutters, snip your own patterns for pumpkins and other shapes from cardboard. You can usually find patterns for these in most women's magazines. It is easy to cut around these with a small dull knife. Or use a medium-sized glass as a cutter. These circles become whimsical faces when eyes, nose and mouth are made from tiny candies, walnut bits or raisins. While you're preparing the cookie dough, small fry can be making their own table decorations. For festive candlestick holders, simply core out bright red apples and set the candles in the apples. You can make perky-apple place cards by pressing into the apples after dinner mints for eyes, jelly beans for mouth, and corn candy for noses. The gay hat can be made by cutting out strips of orange paper and rolling it into a cone.

Two Way Cookie Cut-Ups
1/4 cup shortening (part butter for flavor)
1 cup C and H Pure Cane sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk

2 teaspoons lemon extract
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 ounce square unsweetened chocolate, melted
Gradually add sugar to shortening, creaming well. Mix in whole egg. Then add milk and flavoring and beat well. Stir in flour sifted with baking powder and salt. Divide dough in 2 equal parts. Blend melted chocolate into 1 part. Chill dough for ease in handling. Roll 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured board. Cut into desired shapes and decorate as desired, or sprinkle with sugar. Bake on lightly greased baking sheet in moderately hot oven (375 F.) about 15 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes about 5 dozen assorted cookies.

Leftover Chicken Makes Good Dishes

Ham is such a popular item in family menus that leftover ham recipes always are in demand. Here's a good way to serve ham the second time so that it will taste entirely different. In a little fat, cook until soft 1 chopped onion and 1/4 green pepper, chopped. Add a No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes, drained, and season with salt, pepper and tabasco sauce or chili powder to taste. Add 2 cups ground or finely chopped ham and simmer slowly for

Besides being actively interested in local civic and community affairs, Mrs. McGann likes to play bridge and canasta with her friends. She suggests that in preparing the brownies, the oven not be more than 325 degrees hot. The dough will burn before it can cook prop-

erly otherwise.

Marble Brownies

Ingredients:
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
2 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups chopped walnuts
2 squares unsweetened chocolate

Method:
Cream together the shortening and sugar and add, one at a time, the four eggs, beating well after each addition. Sift together flour and salt and add to mixture. Then add vanilla and walnuts and divide the batter in half. Melt choco-

late squares over hot water and add to one-half of the batter. Add chocolate batter by alternate spoonfuls with plain to a greased pan, 8x8x2 inches and bake in moderate oven (325 F.) for 1 hour. Frost with creamy fudge icing or serve plain.

Mendoza Report On Trip To State Fair

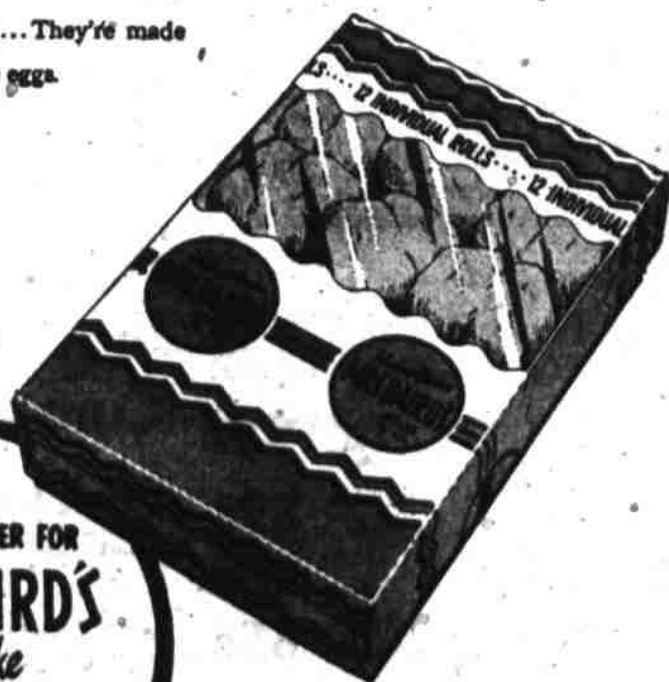
Jessie Mendoza, teacher in the Kate Morrison school, reported on the recent trip to the State Fair at the P-TA meeting Tuesday evening at the school.

Hamburgers, Cakes Are Holiday Treat

"Goblin" parties, so mysterious, are coming up. And pan-toothed "punkins," gaunt ghosts and sleeky black cats the party may be brought down-to-earth with just plain good food.

To the youngsters, that means big plump hamburgers (and plenty of them) served with potato chips and all the trimmings.

Perhaps the ground beef patties may be in variation. For a subtle new flavor grate a tart raw apple into the ground meat mixture, suggests Reba Stagg, home economist. Add this in addition to 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper and 1 tablespoon grated onion for each pound of ground meat.

Or for more changes, sprinkle grated American cheese on top of half of the buns, heat them until the cheese is bubbly and serve topped with the ground meat patties. Remember to broil or panbroil ground meat patties slowly for the

finest results. In panbroiling, pour off the fat that accumulates on the frying-pan so the meat will not cook in the meat drippings.

Gingerbread Cup Cakes
1/4 cup melted lard
2 1/4 cups sifted enriched flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/4 teaspoons soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup molasses
1 cup boiling water
Sift flour, sugar, soda, salt, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg together. Combine melted lard, molasses and boiling water, stirring until they are thoroughly mixed. Add liquid to dry ingredients and mix thoroughly.

Fill greased muffin tins 2-3 full. Bake in a moderate oven (375 F.) for 20 to 25 minutes. Yield 12 medium cup cakes.

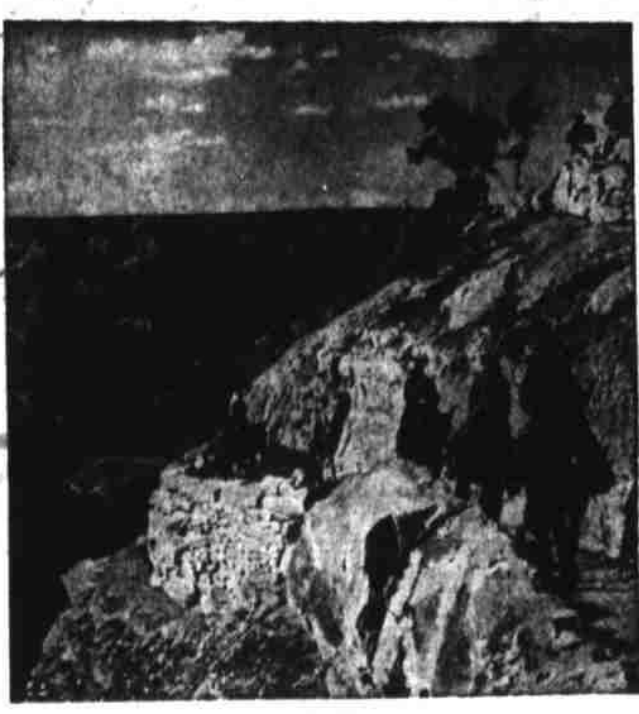

Record Number Of Visitors View Beauty Of Grand Canyon

By JACK STEVENSON
GRAND CANYON, Ariz., Oct. 25. (U.P.)—The vast beauty of the Grand Canyon first seen by white men more than 400 years ago, this season drew a record number of visitors to this national park.

In 1540, Don Lopez de Cardenas and his party first viewed the mile-deep chasm, dug by the Colorado river in its search for the sea. The 1950-51 travel year, which started on Oct. 1, 1950, was the greatest in history, with 688,673 persons entering the park. This was an increase of 24,325 over the previous year.



BRIGHT ANGEL TRAIL on the south rim of Grand Canyon.

Facilities on the South Rim of the canyon are open, the year around but heavy snows force the winter closing of those on the North Rim.

Entirely within the state of Arizona, the Grand Canyon National Park was established by Act of Congress, Feb. 26, 1909. It contains an area of 1,009 square miles. One hundred and five miles of the Grand Canyon's rim are within the national park limits. The average width is 10 miles but varies from four to 18.

Little change has been made in the canyon itself since Cardenas first arrived. Most geologists estimate it took from 7,000,000 to 9,000,000 years to cut the gorge to its present size and depth—the greatest example of erosion and one of the greatest spectacles in the world.

Giving the Grand Canyon its name often has been credited to Maj. John Wesley Powell, a one-armed veteran of the Civil War who led the first boat expedition through the gorge in 1896.

Powell began what has now become a regular summer sport but one which has cost more than 10 lives. This year several parties made the trip from Lees Ferry through the canyon to Lake Mead behind Hoover Dam—a distance of about 200 miles.

There have been 180 species of bird life recorded at the park, 60 species of mammals and 25 of reptiles. Deer roam the surrounding forests and many are tame enough to be petted.

The helicopter has gone into competition with the time established burros as means of viewing the canyon and going into its depths but the sure-footed animals remain the favorite.

Facilities include modern lodges in addition to public camp grounds. Occasionally there's an unexpected thrill for visitors. This summer an Indian girl, distraught because her boy friend dated another, jumped over the edge of the canyon in front of a main lodge. Fortunately she chose one of the few

places where she could dive and live. A ledge about 100 feet below stopped her rolling descent before she reached a sheer drop.

Earlier in the year three burglars attempted to rob the safe of the Fred Harvey Co., which operates the South Rim facilities. An alert guard shot and killed one and the two others were caught before the night was over.

Those who take pictures discover in the Grand Canyon a challenge found nowhere else. The bright colors in the walls of the canyon, caused by stains from various minerals, are given variations as the sun's rays change their direction.

Indians in the Grand Canyon region represent four distinct nations. In addition to the little known Havasupai, tribesmen from the Navajo, Hopi and Pinalutes often work in the area while others display and sell handicrafts.

Approximately 500 ruins of the ancient Pueblo dwellings of prehistoric people have been found in the National Park, and the oldest rocks known to man, those of the Archean age, are exposed in the area.

Excellent roads, foot trails and bridle paths present view after view of the canyon's colorful panorama. To familiarize visitors with

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (U.P.)—As wife of the vice president, Mrs. Alben Barkley has met with ease and grace the demanding pressures of the role in the Capital's busy official and social life.

Mrs. Barkley said that when she stepped into the vice president's homes here and in Kentucky, she thought, "How perfectly lovely, but this is not the type of furniture or decoration which I ever would have chosen." Then it dawned on her, she said, that the oriental rugs, the antiques, the good crystal and china and silver found in both homes reflected so completely her husband's personality that "I would have felt like an intruder to change one ash tray."

"As time went on, his great interest in all things which are beautiful communicated itself to me," she said. "And I now find I am just as keen about lovely old things as he is." However, she says she feels she has many years of reading and "antiquing" ahead to catch up with him.

Though she felt she did not deserve it, Mrs. Barkley said the award meant very much to her because of her old-fashioned ideas about the art of homemaking. "I consider it to be an art—an art which does NOT come easily to most of us but which grows through the years."

1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Melt shortening and chocolate together over hot water. Beat eggs; add sugar gradually while beating. Stir chocolate mixture into egg mixture; beat hard one minute. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt; add with vanilla to chocolate-egg mixture.

Cheese Mixture
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 cup dry cottage cheese
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream sugar and butter; blend in cornstarch. Add remaining ingredients; mix well.

two mixtures will "marble" slightly and this can be accentuated with a spoon, if desired). Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees F., 40 to 45 minutes; cool. Cut in squares or bars.

For the post-game snack, a recipe for penuche bars may be tossed in for good measure. The fudge-like mixture will pass for candy or cookies as well.

Penuche Bars
1 1/4 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 package penuche quick fudge mix
2 eggs (well beaten)
1 teaspoon vanilla
3/4 cup butter (melted)
3 tablespoons water
1 cup chopped nuts
Sift and measure flour. Add

baking powder and salt and sift again. To flour mixture, add contents of package of penuche quick fudge mix, eggs (well beaten), butter (melted), water, vanilla and finely chopped nuts. Blend thoroughly. Pour into buttered pan 9 by 13 inches and bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Makes 2 1/2 dozen penuche bars.

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Energy Filled Cookies Are Favorite Treat

The cookie jar is a year 'round attraction, and keeping it filled isn't easy. But the cook who has been steering clear of the kitchen during the hot summer months can make a hit with the whole family by sending tantalizing odors through the house to announce that something wonderful is a "bakin'."

Now that bristler weather is pecking up appetites, high energy snacks are in constant demand for an after-school pick-up, snack for the touchdown squad, or Coed Susan's first box from home. Any Mom who can meet the above prerequisites will be popular, not only with her own family, but with other members of the younger set as well.

To keep that cookie jar well filled, it will help to choose recipes that require no rolling or cutting and are penny savers too. And even snacks for late afternoon or evening deserve the careful consideration of an extra bonus in food value.

Double Peanut Cookies
1 cup pancake ready-mix
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup shortening, soft
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 egg, unbeaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups quick rolled oats, uncooked

Chopped Peanuts
Place ready-mix, brown sugar, shortening, peanut butter, egg and vanilla in a medium-sized bowl. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Fold in rolled oats. Shape dough into small balls and place on an ungreased baking sheet. Flatten with the bottom of a glass covered with waxed paper. Sprinkle with chopped peanuts if desired. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 10 to 12 minutes. The recipe makes 2 1/2 dozen cookies.

Old-fashioned oatmeal rocks gone modern are news for the cookie maker. The time-tried combination of rolled oats, raisins and nutmeats is made new by a one-bowl method for blending ingredients which cuts mixing time to two minutes.

Oatmeal Rocks
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
2 tablespoons milk
2 1/2 cups rolled oats, uncooked
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped nutmeats

Sift together flour, soda, spices and sugar into bowl. Add shortening, egg and milk. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Fold in rolled oats, raisins and nutmeats. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in a slow oven (325 degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes. The recipe is for four dozen cookies.

The kitchen is the first place the children head for when school is out for the day. Their young appetites have been increased by the excitement of the day, and they crave good, nourishing food. It is a good idea to have milk and fresh fruit on hand for them and, for a special treat, a batch of cookies. Fudge squares are wonderful accompaniment for late-afternoon milk and fruit.

Fudge Squares
2 squares unsweetened chocolate (3 ounces)
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 eggs
1 cup sugar
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup ready-to-eat bran
1/2 cup chopped nutmeats
1 teaspoon vanilla
Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Beat eggs well, add sugar and continue beating until light and fluffy. Add chocolate

mixture. Stir in flour, bran, nutmeats and flavoring. Pour into greased baking pan, making layer about one-third inch thick. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 25 to 30 minutes. The yield is sixteen 2-inch squares.

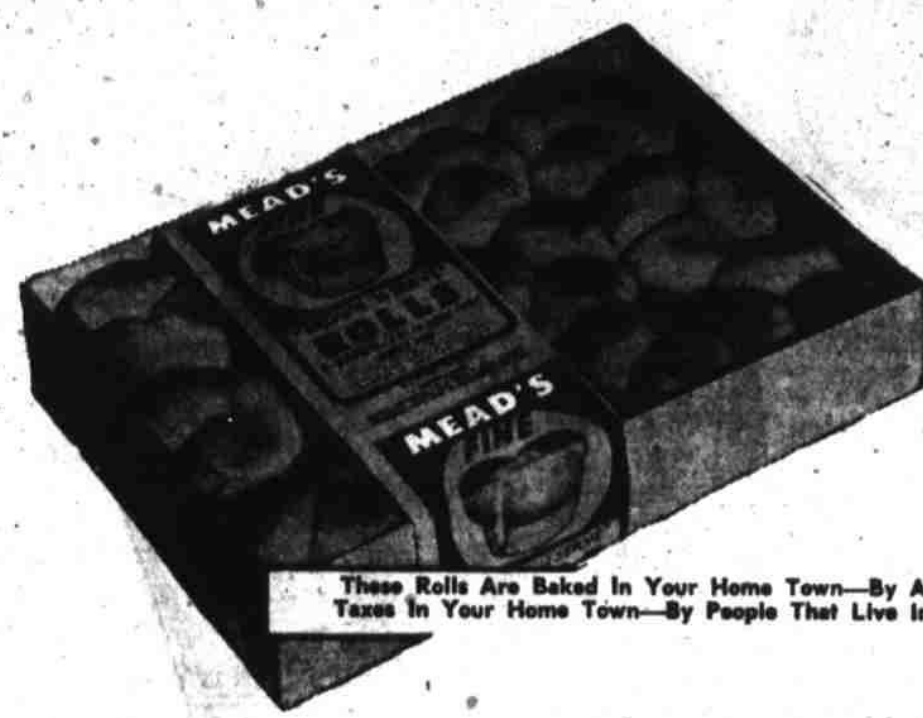
It's nice to be able to ask guests in after an afternoon of outdoor sport and be prepared to serve them hot chocolate with rich, good cookies. Orange Raisin Squares are perfect for an occasion such as this. They can be mixed and baked in the morning and be fresh and tasty for late afternoon guests.

Orange Raisin Squares
2 1/2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons shortening
2 eggs
2 1/2 cups orange marmalade
2 1/2 cups bran
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups, chopped, salted almonds
1/2 cup seedless raisins
Blend shortening and sugar; add eggs and beat well. Stir in marmalade and bran. Sift flour with baking powder and salt; add to first mixture with nutmeats and raisins; mix well. Bake in square pan with waxed paper in the bottom, in moderate oven (375 de-

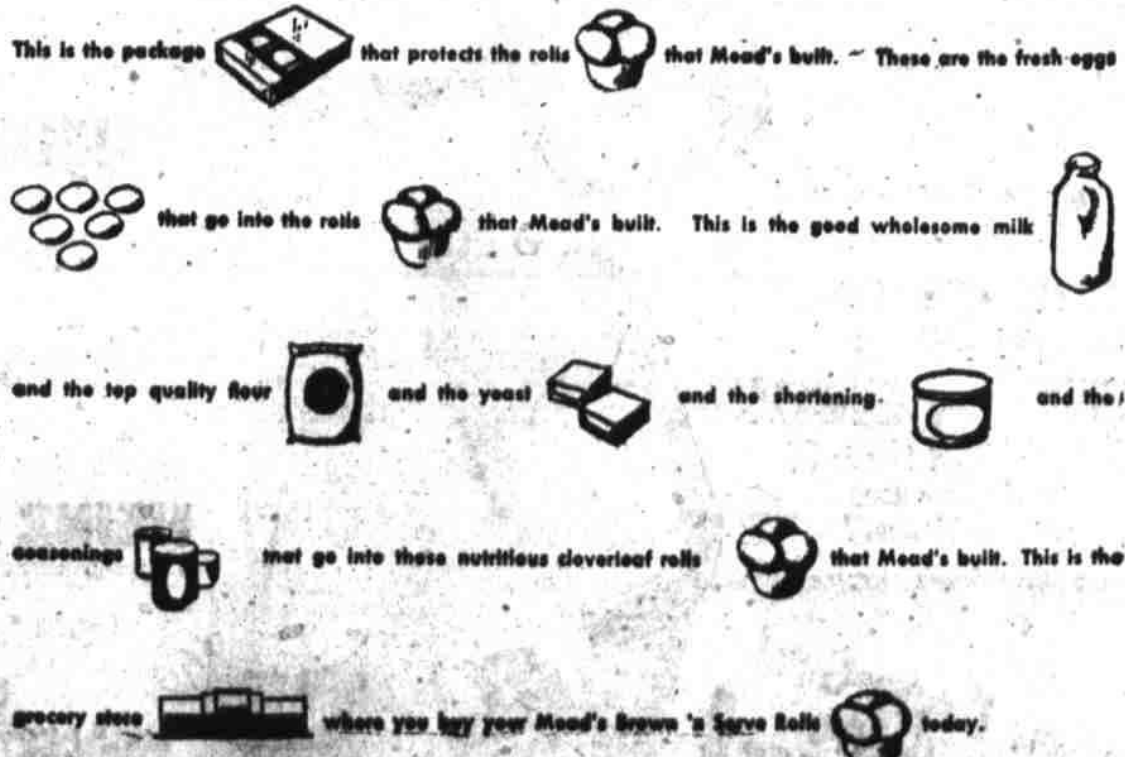
grees F.) about 25 minutes. Remove from pan. While warm, cut into squares and roll in powdered sugar, if desired. The yield is two dozen 1 1/2 inch squares.

Mom will have no "gang" trouble around the house if there is plenty of good cold milk and plenty of coconut flake cookies in the cookie jar. If she's lucky, she may have a few left over, after the "gang" has dispersed, to serve with coffee or a cool drink to her own crowd after an evening of Canasta, or bridge if she pleases.

Coconut Flake Cookies
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups corn flakes
1/2 cup butter or other shortening
1/2 cup granulated sugar or brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs, unbeaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups coconut
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again; add cereal flakes. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, creaming thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Add flour and cereal flakes mixture, a small amount at a time, beating

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Lock One Of Oldest Of World Inventions

CHICAGO, Oct. 10. (U. S. — Did you know the lock on your door is one of the world's oldest inventions?

It's more than 4,000 years old. A forgotten Egyptian invented it. His solution to the security problem was to house several pins or "tumblers" inside a massive wooden block. When the locking bolt was shot its full length, the tumblers dropped into corresponding holes bored in the bolt. It could only be opened with a key.

The key was a straight piece of wood with pegs on one end. These were located in position opposite the tumblers. When the key was inserted in a slot in the huge lock, the pegs raised the tumblers flush with the top of the bolt. As the key was lifted, the lock was unlocked.

A recent exhibition of antique locks was a feature of the National Builders Hardware Exposition. Among the collections of ancient locks were those owned by Henry R. Towne, the Rothschilds of Austria, and Andreas Dillinger, a European scientist and collector.

The items traced the history of locks and man's attempts to play tricks on thieves. The antique locks were insured for \$100,000.

Among the locks was a wooden model inlaid with mother of pearl. It worked on the principle of the Egyptian lock. It is said to have been used by King Darius III of Persia about 336 B.C. It was found in excavations at Ahydas.

The Romans made wide use of padlocks. This simple device was a favorite lock of all Mediterranean and Eastern peoples, especially the Chinese. But most Roman locks were made of iron and few have survived the rust of time.

The first warded locks seem to have been made by the Etruscans in Northern Italy. They operated on the principle of blocking the turning of the key with obstacles. Only a key with the correct bit would pass the wards and move the bolt. Similar locks are used in homes today.

But the locksmiths have devised all sorts of combinations of keys and locks to make it difficult to open doors, chests, and cabinets. Multiple keyholes and locks were common.

In 1415, Isabelle of Bavaria, it is

said, had a lock made to protect the apartments of her ladies-in-waiting from intruders. The lock required five keys to open it.

Henry VII of France was probably one of the first to employ these locks. He placed three separate locks on the door of his mistress's apartment. None of the locks worked with the wrong key, but all three opened with his master key.

An early chest was booby trapped. Its security didn't depend on its lock, but what lay inside. The thief opening the lid saw an empty tray with several holes. It was figured by its designer that it would only be natural for him to thrust his fingers into the holes in order to lift the tray. As the snooper lifted, a spring snapped shut and his fingers were hopelessly caught.

About 100 years ago several American locksmiths tried new designs. The ambition of every locksmith in that day was to devise an unpickable lock. Contests were held and locksmiths would make a game of picking each other's locks. But the only unpickable locks are time-locks.

The modern cylinder lock employs the principle used in the mechanism of the early Egyptian lock. In Connecticut, Linus Yale, Sr., patented the first cylinder lock in 1844. His son Linus Yale, Jr., improved and perfected it in patents issued in 1861 and 1863. It has become famous as the Yale cylinder lock.

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Cross Leads Third

Panfried Scrapple Is Breakfast Idea

Here's a breakfast find for the cooler days of fall—scrapple. This tasty dish from out of the past presents hearty, thrifty eating for families today.

The basis of scrapple is corn meal which is combined with finely chopped or ground meat, according to Reba Staggs, home economist. In preparing, boil 1 quart of water, then add 1 1/4 cups of corn meal, stirring constantly until thick. Add 2 cups of chopped or ground cooked meat, 1/4 teaspoon of salt and 1/4 teaspoon sage. For additional seasoning, 1 tablespoon of finely chopped celery leaves and 1/4 cup chopped parsley may be added. Pour the mixture into a loaf pan and chill until it is set. Then simply slice and brown in lard or drippings. Or first, dip in beaten egg, then in cracker crumbs or corn meal and brown.

To cut preparation time in the morning, prepare scrapple the night before. Mix, then pour into dish and chill in the refrigerator. For breakfast, slice and pan-fry.

Singapore Police Plan Riot Squad

Police of Singapore are going to have a special riot squad modeled on the lines of the one that operated in Shanghai.

The founder of the Shanghai riot unit, Lt. Col. W. E. Fairbairn, may come to Singapore from Britain for three months to organize and train the squad.

ELITE SECURITY GUARD FOR U.N. TRUCE TALKERS

MUNSAN, Korea, Oct. 25. (U. S. — An elite security guard of two officers and 15 men will accompany United Nations command negotiators to the armistice talks at Panmunjom.

Military police battalions were instructed to select their outstanding men. At this advance U. N. command base they were outfitted with shiny helmet liners bearing the Eighth Army insignia, green scarves, white gloves and large brass belt buckles.

Under terms of the Panmunjom agreement, each side will provide the same number of guards.

The guards will carry small arms, defined in the agreement as pistols, rifles and carbines.
