THIRTY-TWO PUPILS TO ATTEND PERRYTON SCHOOL FOR THE SESSION OF 1938-39

School patrons of the Fairview, Oklahoma, school district have this year realized an objective sought for the past two or three years.

Contending that their children should have as good opportunities for an education as those of larger school districts, parents in that district petitioned the State of Oklahoma to allow them to transfer their children to the public schools of Perryton.

This year 32 children, eight of whom will be in high school, will attend the local schools, being transported to and from Perryton by bus.

Oklahoma allows the transfer of high school pupils from their state to another, but does not include grade children. Members of the Fairview school board, with a dispensation from the State of Oklahoma, entered into a transfer by contract with the Perryton school board for transportation and tuition for their pupils for the 1938-39 session.

Three Hundred Will Attend Perryton Schools Via Buss

Thirteen buses will transport school students from rural communities into the Perryton public schools during the 1938-39 session. These buses will accommodate some three hundred students each day.

One bus has been discontinued by the school board to affect a saving of about \$700.00. And one bus has been added (for which Oklahoma pays) to bring all school children from the Fairview, Oklahoma school. This entire school transferred to the Perryton schools by contract with the local school board.

The Waka bus will be driven again by Mr. Gurley, while Mr. Mountcastle will drive the one from Huntoon. Mr. McCarter will drive the bus from the Fairview school (the booster station, west of Gray) to Perryton.

The Lone Tree community will be served by three buses driven by Harvey Pletcher, Paul Pletcher, and Brooks Pletcher. Milton Sweigart will transport the children from the Twichell neighborhood, and from Ochiltree and McMillen the children will be brought in by Thurman Trew.

Dean Conner will drive the south Farnsworth route. The territory north and west of Perryton will be served by the following drivers: C. R. Cudd, H. C. Brown, F. D. Koehn, and E. W. Hearn.

All those having bus contracts with the local school board are having their trucks and bus bodies repaired and put in first class condition, and will be ready to start transportation the morning of Tuesday, September 6.

START BLACK TOPPING ON HIGHWAY 83

First Coat of Road Oil Is Complete; Asphalt on South Part

To Be Completed Soon

It is now just a matter of a few more weeks until Federal Highway No. 83 will be completely paved through Ochiltree county. The base course is complete, practically all shoulders have been worked down to a finished grade, the entire road has received the first coat of road oil and the applying of the two-course rock asphalt topping was started Tuesday.

Cocke & Braden, general contractors for this paving running from Perryton southeast to the Lipscomb county line, started the topping at the extreme southeast end of the route and will work toward Perryton. It will not take over a month to complete the highway and have it ready for traffic.

DEVERS ELECTED AS COUNTY COMMISSIONER

Only Two of Lee O'Daniel's Slate Lead in Ochiltree County

Critz Leads the Field

With only one precinct office at stake, interest was slight in the runoff primary in Ochiltree county Saturday. In a closely contested race in Precinct No. 1, A. E. Devers was elected as county commissioner over G. I. Horne by a count of 157 to 143. The vote in this race by voting precincts was as follows: Precinct No. 1, Perryton courthouse, Devers 69; Horne, 139. Precinct No. 2, Huntoon, Devers, 56; Horne, 8. Precinct No. 3, Lone Tree, Devers, 37; Horne, 5.

While Lee O'Daniel carried Ochiltree county by a majority over all of his opponents, his endorsed slate of state candidates did not fare so well in this county, only two of the six for the supreme court, an O'Daniel six O'Daniel favorites winning. Critz, anointee, lead the ticket, but his popularity was due to the direct-by-mail campaigning of Mrs. Bessie Parker, a former Ochiltree county girl now employed in Judge Critz's office at Austin. Coke Stevenson, also endorsed by O'Daniel, won in Ochiltree by a vote of 157 to 143.

WHEAT LOANS RATE IS 50.6

APPLICATIONS BEING PREPARED IN OFFICE OF COUNTY AGENT E. W. THOMAS THIS WEEK

Applications for loans on stored wheat are being prepared in the County Agent's office this week with a few preliminary applications being sent to the Commodity Credit Corporation at Dallas and to a cooperative wheat marketing agency at Enid, Oklahoma. As soon as these applications have been approved local banks may handle the loans without the necessity of waiting to send the forms to Enid or Dallas.

Schedule of loan rates has been received showing a net rate for Ochiltree county of 50.6 cents per bushel basis No. 2 wheat and No. 3, the loan value is 3 cents less than No. 2 and for No. 4 the value is 5 cents less than for number 3.

Notes are payable seven months after date at the rate of 4 per cent interest at maturity and the Commodity Credit Corporation will recognize storage charges on wheat stored since July 1 as a valid lien.

RECEIVE BIDS ON ROAD WORK

TO RECEIVE BIDS FOR PAVING HIGHWAY 83 NORTH FROM CANADIAN TO HORSE CREEK, SEPT. 7

Bids for grading, drainage structures, concrete paving and three large bridges, for a distance of 6.322 miles on U. S. Highway 83, between Canadian and Horse Creek will be received by the Texas Highway Department on September 7, according to information released last week.

This contract will complete the only unpaved strip of U. S. Highway 83, in 232 miles of that road. At the present time, the gap northwest of Canadian is the only unpaved gap between the Texas-Oklahoma line on the north and King County on the south.

As expected the picnic will be well attended with the members of the committee and the members of the party at the dam in the State Park, Monday, September 5, to complete arrangements to be present.

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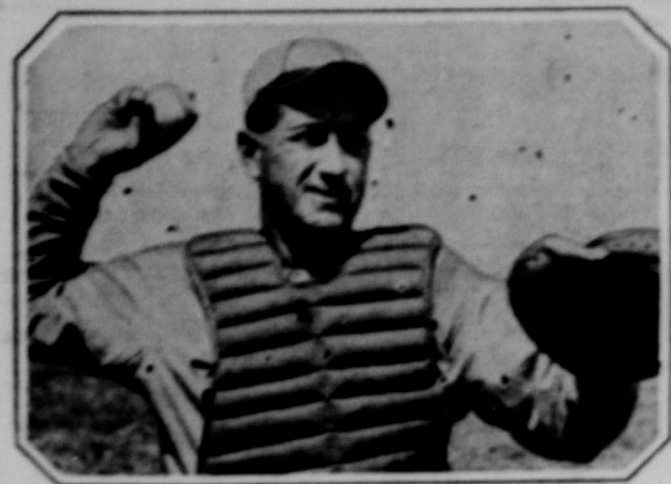
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DeLancey Dons Mask Again to Win Battle With Ill Health

PAMPA PLANS ENTERTAINMENT AND MANY PRIZES IN THE FOUR DAY TOURNAMENT SEPTEMBER 2-5

PAMPA, Aug. 31.—(Special)—Seven hundred dollars in merchandise will be given winners in the first four flights of the Top O' Texas Golf Tournament to be played over the Pampa Country club course September 2, 3, 4, and 5. Additional prizes for winners of lower flights will also be merchandise.

A reduction of 10 per cent in the charge for the first 25 kilowatt-hours of residential use also goes into effect with billing for the month of September. This reduction, together with reductions made in February, 1931 and January, 1936, has resulted in a substantial reduction in the cost of residential electric service. A customer using 40 KWH per month (this is approximately the average) now pays only \$3.15 per month for his service compared to \$5.70 in 1930—a saving of approximately 45 per cent in eight years.

Ideas About Traffic Safety Jolted by Experts

ANN ARBOR, Mich.—A good many pet theories about traffic safety were given a severe jolt at the two-week session of the National Institute for Traffic Safety Training held on the University of Michigan campus here in Ann Arbor.

Most of the 125 persons who signed up for the course and whose business is traffic safety learned one or more things that clashed with popular notions about who is a safe driver and who isn't.

For example, you can expect a "high grade moron" to be a better and safer driver than an intelligent person because intelligent people are likely to be thinking of other things while at the wheel.

About the time the traffic experts had finished swallowing hard on that one they were told that people who have poor eyesight and are slightly deaf drive better than people who hear well and get nervous about every quiver noise the car develops, and who can't keep their eyes from

wandering to every pretty girl they pass.

But the biggest surprise to most of the 125 was a demonstration to refute the popular belief that governors on autos would take the hazard out of driving by limiting speed.

Three demonstration cars almost crashed when a governor-equipped car, overtaking another, did not have sufficient emergency speed to pass as another auto came in the opposite direction.

Less novel was the information that it is dangerous to apply the brakes after a blowout, just as after a skid, until the car has slowed and is under control.

A variety of tests were made by those taking the safety course and conditions under which a person with poor eyesight or dirty car windows drives were simulated. A double control car was used with the driver wearing glasses that caused faulty vision and in another instance a driver was equipped with blinders to simulate dirty car windows.

LARGE WORKERS KEEP RECORD

EMPLOYERS SHOULD KEEP AN ACCURATE WAGE RECORD FOR THEIR PERSONAL PROTECTION

Amarillo.—The desirability of keeping an accurate and permanent record of all wages received on covered employment is suggested by Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Board.

It was pointed out by Mr. Reed that while the keeping of a wage record is not mandatory on the part of workers, such a record is considered advisable. The wage record kept by the worker should include the name of each employer for whom he receives services as an employee; dates of beginning and termination of such services; his own name and address as well as that of the employer for whom he worked, Reed said.

It was further explained that a record should also show the worker's occupation, total amount of wages received, including any sums deducted for taxes or other purposes, together with the date of each payment and the period of service covered by such payment.

Many employees, Reed said, keep personal pocket ledgers in which they record all wages received and deductions for taxes and other purposes. The time required for keeping such a record, he said, is small compared to its possible value to the worker in the future in the event he needs to check up on his old insurance credits, which are added to his account from returns filed by his employers.

There were many interesting baseball games, including the season of Flett, Perryton and Beaver participated in the polo game between Perryton and Beaver, which Perryton won a real treat to the big crowd. There were pony races and a horse show by fine race horses.

The grand stand was completely full for the events,

which was a source of comfort for those who attended. The large crowd was very orderly, and the city of Perryton is to be congratulated upon her very successful observance of her 19th birthday anniversary as a municipality.—The Panhandle Herald, Guymon Oklahoma.

From all appearances the Perryton and Ochiltree County law force failed to cooperate in every way Saturday night with some Beaver county people when one of their "citizens" took the liberty of using a knife too handy. The excuse offered by the officers was that they "couldn't catch the young man because he had a faster car." The young man, Homer Johnson, drew a knife on Herman Altman, a Beaver county young man of good standing and known to everyone as peaceful and friendly, and cut him several times through the abdomen.

Witnesses to the encounter said that Herman, his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Lin Baggerly and Mrs. La Vera Henson were crossing a Perryton street, Johnson came along in his car with a woman companion and kept honking at them even after they had cleared the street for him to pass. Herman made the remark to Johnson that he had a clear way through the street whereupon Johnson jumped from the car and started cursing and abusing Altman. Herman tried to soothe the young man (not wishing to have trouble in Perryton) but Johnson evidently didn't wish to be friendly. Herman made the remark to the young man that they should be friends and thinking that everything was settled, turned to go on his way when Johnson pulled a knife and stabbed Altman in the back. "It all happened before we knew it," Mrs. Henson said, "and we tried to get the knife away from Johnson, but we couldn't until he had cut

Herman several times." The top of Herman's trousers were slashed to shreds as was his shirt. Eight stitches were taken in one gash, three in another and three on his arm.

He was taken to the Perryton hospital where his wounds were dressed and the cuts sewn up.

When citizens from here went to Perryton the next day (Sunday) the law force had still done nothing toward capturing Johnson. And Monday afternoon, Johnson was still at large. Being a citizen of Ochiltree county, it does seem that the law force would know where Johnson lived and could at least give him a hearing on the matter with the Beaver county residents also attending.

From the widespread reports over Beaver, the Perryton birthday celebration suffered by many Beaver people staying home due to the affair. We have nothing to say against the town of Perryton itself because they have always been the best of neighbors to Beaver and have cooperated in every way possible that a neighboring town could, but it does seem that they would stress upon their law force to give protection to visitors when one of their young men is in the affair. We feel that something should be done to bring this young man to justice whether he be in the wrong or not and have a hearing on the matter. The witnesses and citizens here are wanting justice dealt and we ask that the town of Perryton see into this matter and bring Johnson to a hearing.—Herald-Democrat, Beaver, Oklahoma.

OKLAHOMA AAA ANNOUNCES FARM PROGRAM FOR STATE FOR 1939

STILLWATER, Ok.—(Special)—A 1939 Farm Program has been announced here for Oklahoma farmers, following a three-day conference in Washington of representatives of the state AAA committee.

The principal changes related to acreage allotments and rates of payment, according to H. P. Moffitt, state AAA administrator.

In line with the 1938 program, the general soil-depleting crop goal and the special soil-depleting crop goals for wheat and cotton will be divided among states, counties and individual farms. The national wheat acreage allotment of 55,000,000 acres now being apportioned to counties and farms compares with the 10-year average of about 69 million acres and an acreage seeded for 1938 of more than 80,000,000 acres.

Wheat growers who comply with 1939 acreage allotments will qualify for advantages that other phases of the program offer, including conservation payments, price adjustment payments, eligibility for wheat loans—in case the loan program is in effect next year—and renewal of crop insurance program policies.

Wheat compliance will be checked late this fall on the basis of wheat seeded for all purposes, including wheat seeded for hay or pasture, green manure and cover crops.

The probable rates of payment on the 1939 allotments are as follows: Wheat, 16 to 18 cents per bushel, plus a price-adjustment payment of 10 to 12 cents per bushel—a total of 26 to 30 cents per bushel on the farm's normal yield per acre for each acre in the wheat allotment. (The 1938 wheat payment under the conservation program was 12 cents per bushel.)

The 1939 payment for general depleting acreage in Class A areas, approximately \$1 per acre, adjusted for productivity, as compared with \$1.25 per acre in 1938; non-depleting acreage in A areas, 50 to 60 cents per acre. Home vegetable gardens will be excluded from the soil-depleting classification.

The principal changes with respect to crop classifications are: Land planted to oats, barley, rye, or mixture of these crops, will not be classified as soil-depleting when used as nurse crops for legumes or perennial grasses of which a good stand is established in 1939, and the nurse crop is cut green for hay, and is not harvested for grain. Land planted to these crops grown in a mixture with winter legumes will not be classified as soil-depleting.

In recommending this change, producers point out that the use of a nurse crop for legumes or perennial grasses, the nurse crop to be cut for so they say.

Maybe so, but if that's the way of it then we fear we wouldn't make a very good king. Especially when the best that the management can do in the way of a program is to stage four races in the space of two hours.

Of course, it's much easier to criticize than it is to co-ordinate a rodeo or racing program—but unless promoters find a method of entertaining the paying public more continuously at such affairs, the cash receipts are going to dwindle.

Another type of entertainment that is more or less familiar to residents of this region, polo, was included as a part of the Perryton celebration. The fact that the stands were far distant from the players and that observers were not familiar with rules of play caused many to lose interest in the game.

Beautiful horses, good riding, some speedy action, and a good game—polo, but it needs a good selling to the public before it will be an outstanding sport in this region.—Texas County News, Guymon, Okla.

hay, is a sound conservation practice. These crops can be used for pasture and cover crop purposes the same as in 1938.

The restoration land program in western Oklahoma will be continued in 1939 on approximately the same basis as in 1938. In 1939, however, a deduction at the rate of \$3 per acre will be made for each acre designated in 1938 or 1939 as restoration land which is plowed or tilled in 1939 for any purpose other than to protect the land from wind erosion or in preparation for the seeding of perennial grasses. Deductions for plowing up native sod and failure to prevent wind and water erosion will be essentially the same as in 1938.

The administration of the Agricultural Conservation Program in the state and in the counties, as in 1938, will be through the state agricultural conservation committee, and the county and community committees of the county agricultural conservation associations, the Oklahoma Extension Service of the A. and M. College being represented on the state and county committees, Moffitt explained.

Attending the Washington meeting were Moffitt, C. D. Walker, Altus farmer, chairman of the state agricultural conservation committee; and Shawnee Brown, assistant director of the Oklahoma Extension Service.

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To Save Oil and Gas

New Engineering Methods Effect Savings of Country's Oil And Gas Fields

The remarkable achievement of the Continental Oil Company in developing new engineering methods which promise to effect vast savings of oil and gas in the country's oil fields is the subject of an article in the Reader's Digest for September.

Using the Continental Oil Company's new Tepetate field in the State of Louisiana as an outstanding example of the new procedure, the writer describes how natural gas, at one time regarded as a nuisance by oil men, and later treated as a by-product of oil recovery, is now harnessed by Continental Oil Company engineers to maintain pressure in the oil sands and force the crude oil to the surface. Oil recovery by the new method, according to the writer, is almost twice as efficient as heretofore.

In conjunction with this development, the article tells that Continental engineers have developed a process for capturing and conserving the volatile elements or "light ends" in the crude, the combined process constituting a "development in engineering, which can save untold quantities in oil and gas." Continental's president, Dan Moran, is credited with being the chief factor in bringing about this advance in petroleum conservation.

ELECTION NOTICE

STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF OCHILTREE
CITY OF PERRYTON
TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS:

TAKE NOTICE, that an election shall be held in the City of Perryton, Texas, on the 20th day of September, 1938, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the election order adopted by the City Council on the 23rd day of August, 1938, which is as follows:

RESOLUTION
BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000.00 MUNICIPAL LIGHTING AND POWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING A MUNICIPAL LIGHTING AND POWER SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is to the best interest of the City to acquire a municipally owned lighting and power system, capable of generating and supplying electric current for its own use and for sale to its citizens; and WHEREAS, it is considered to be to the best interest of the City that such construction be financed by the issuance of revenue bonds payable solely from the net revenues of said system and further secured by a lien upon the physical properties constituting such system and by the pledge of an operating franchise in event of foreclosure, all in accordance with the provisions of Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the 1925 Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, and in no wise supported by an ad valorem, or other tax on the property in the City; and WHEREAS, all of said revenue bonds when issued will contain substantially the following provision:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation," and WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is to the best interest of the City and its citizens that an election be held in said City on the date and for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held on the 20th day of September, 1938, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council be authorized to issue revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of acquiring a municipal lighting and power system for generating and distributing electric current for use by and for sale by the City in an amount not to exceed Eighty-eight Thousand (\$88,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate to be fixed by the City Council not to exceed Four (4%) per cent per annum, maturing serially in installments to be determined by the City Council, the maximum maturity date being not more than twenty years from their date, with option of prior payment at any time after ten years from their date, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended each bond to be conditioned that the holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said system, the mortgage of said system and the pledge of a franchise to operate said system for a term of not exceeding twenty years in event of foreclosure is necessary."

2. That said election shall be held in the City Hall in said City and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers, to-wit: J. W. Richardson, Presiding Judge; J. N. Conley, Judge; Mrs. Ernest Allen, Clerk; Clarence Neufeld, Clerk.

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1 of Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, effective October 11, 1925, and in accordance with Chapter 163, Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty Second Legislature, as further modified by the

provisions of Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended. Only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote, and all such electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the said revenue bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF LIGHTING AND POWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS"

and those opposed to the proposition shall have written or printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF LIGHTING AND POWER SYSTEM BONDS"

4. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with provisions of Article 704 Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, supra.

MOTHER DEATH HIGH IN TEXAS

INFANT AND MATERNAL DEATH RATE IS APPALLING WITH 600 MOTHERS LOST DURING YEAR

Austin, Texas.—In Texas during 1937, 600 mothers lost their lives through childbirth and associated conditions. Fatality struck 8618 babies under one year of age and 293 infants were stillborn. These figures are particularly distressing when it is realized that at least 75 per cent of this motherhood mortality could have been avoided.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Commissioner, said that in 1937, 69 total deaths, of which 40 were infants, 33 of the infants were male and 7 female. Physicians attended 149 and all of them were born at home; 1 child was stillborn, giving a county rate of 1.4 per 100 live births; 9 children died under one year of age, a rate of 43.5 per 1000 live births and one mother died in childbirth, a rate of 144.9 per cent.

The State Health Department is calling attention to the fact that Texas is at last approaching a national average of infant and maternal mortality. In 1933 the national rate was 1.4 per 100 live births; in 1934 the U. S. had a rate of 1.4 per 100 live births; in 1935 the national rate came down to .83 and Texas to .83. The national average for 1937 is .83 per 100 live births.

Advancing public health practices, better pre-natal and post-natal care, and better medical care, contribute to a steadily diminishing percentage of Texas mothers and children lost during the year.

AMARILLO TO GET HOSPITAL IS DECISION

Veterans from Five States Will Be Benefited By Panhandle Locale

\$800,000 Appropriated

The dream of a veterans hospital in this area, which has been the light of all American Legion Posts in the Panhandle for the past five years, is about to be realized. Federal authorities announced an appropriation of \$800,000 to go to the Amarillo area and \$1,200,000 to the Dallas-Fort Worth locality.

The Panhandle hospital which will be constructed on Highway 66 just west of the Amarillo Country Club, will serve veterans over a wide area, taking in western Oklahoma, southwestern Colorado, Eastern New Mexico, Southern Kansas and the Plains sections of Texas.

Two veterans hospitals are already located in Texas, one at Leighton, 72 miles northwest of San Antonio, and the other at Waco.

DALHART AREA ALLOTTED DAM

RAE AUTHORIZES FUNDS FOR DAM AND RECREATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS IN TWO MORE COUNTIES

Amarillo, Tex.—The first step toward realization of a comprehensive plan of water utilization for the Rita Blanca Creek drainage basin has been announced by James C. Foster, Regional Director of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at Amarillo when he made public the authorization of a \$584,500 water conservation project, involving a dam and recreational development in Hartley and Dallam counties 2 miles southeast of Dalhart, Texas.

The dam included in the authorization would be an earth-fill structure 70 feet high and 2,475 feet long, including wings. It is designed to impound a lake with a 524-acre surface and a maximum storage capacity of 12,100 acre-feet. An appropriate recreational development, regarded as gravely needed in the area, is included in the authorization.

Through cooperation of the Works Progress Administration, relief labor will be employed in constructing the dam and other improvements. A portion of the funds used in the development have been allocated by the Public Works Administration.

Regulations for 1939 Farm Program are Received Here

Important information regarding the 1939 Farm Program has been received at the County Agent's office as follows: 1. The wheat allotment, which is practically uniform for all wheat farms, amounts to between 59 and 60 per cent of the cultivated land. Wheat farms must leave out, in order to comply, 40 or 41 per cent of their cultivated land. 2. Approximately 25 per cent must not be planted to soil depleting crops, while apparently about 15 per cent can be planted to barley, oats or grain sorghums. 3. Compliance will be checked on the basis of seeded acreage with the wheat acreage to be checked this fall. Volunteer wheat will be considered as wheat planted unless pastured out or worked into the soil prior to April 15, 1939. 4. A
