Cattle Slightly Off For Weekly Sale Monday

Most cattle were slightly off at the regular weekly sale at the Ranger Livestock Commission Exchange Monday.

With most prices nearly \$1 lower, stocker steer calves and hogs the only group to hold their own prices during the sale.

One of the largest supply of cattle were on hand for this week's sale, as 640 cattle and 65 hogs were processed during the day.

Prices included: fat calves, \$16.50-\$22; common to medium calves, \$13-\$15.50; fat cows, \$11-\$12; canners and cutters, \$7-\$10.50; stocker calves, \$16-\$19.50; cows and calves, \$9-\$14.00 a pair; bulls \$11-\$13; hogs, tops at \$17.50; and sows \$14-\$14.50.

Army Investigation Pictures Criticized

"There can be no letup in preparing our defenses," W. H. "Bill" Huffman told Legionnaires and Auxiliary delegates here Sunday during a convention of the American Legion 17th District.

Quoting excerpts from Ernest Hemingway's "For Whom The Bell Tolls," Huffman said that the bells were again tolling and the question before us today is "how to stop the bell."

"Any man's death diminishes me," he stated, "It diminishes me for what he might have done for society and civilization." He asked, "what advancement in welfare and education would have been contributed by those who died in Spain, France, two Jims or on any other battlefield of the world."

"Part of each of us died there," the guest speaker surmised.

To stop the bell's toll we must maintain our defense and continue testing our arms he insisted. Taking a poke at the McCarthy army investigation, he injected, "Don't wreck our military strength by arguing whether or not a man was in a certain picture."

Huffman delivered his speech to nearly 100 visiting delegates who had gathered in the Legion Hall Sunday morning during memorial services. He was preceded by a welcome address from Dr. Calvin W. Harris, Mayor of Ranger, and

Regulations Of Cisco Calf Show Are Explained

Calves to be shown at the annual registered beef calf show to be held at Cisco on Saturday, May 21 must have been dropped on or after last September to be eligible for competition according to T. G. Caudle, of that city, general show superintendent.

All calves entered in the show will be prebred and eligible for registration. They will be shown in pens of three calves of the same sex to compete with others for competition he said.

The Cisco Livestock Show Association is sponsoring the one day show. Only a few of the 35 breeders of registered beef cattle in Eastland County have entered animals. The animals will be in their places by 9 a.m. They can be released and taken home by 4 p.m. of the same day.

According to Ed Huettner, Cisco, grounds superintendent, each breeder is responsible for his own panels for his pens of calves. It is suggested that the panels be brought in the day before the show and set up.

Breeders are eligible to exhibit individual animals of either sex for show purposes only it was explained. They will not compete against each other and will not be judged. Only pens of calves will be shown in competition. No cash prizes are being offered. Only ribbons will be given.

Only calves of the Hereford and Angus breeds will be shown at the one day affair.

Condition Of Native Grass Brings Worry

Stockmen of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District who have been receiving and are still receiving a large share of their income from the use of native grassland are greatly concerned about the poor condition and in some instances even the loss of their higher producing native grasses. It is generally agreed that the prolonged drought combined with heavy grazing are responsible for this serious problem. Since about 65 per cent of Eastland County is grassland or a total of 425,000 acres we can readily recognize the magnitude of this problem. It is highly important that people, especially livestock men, understand

two natural laws of nature which on the surface appear to be very simple but in reality control our very destiny if we are to keep our grasses.

The first law or fact is that all common animals, including man are parasites. Our whole civilization is dependent upon plants for its very existence because man or animal has never found a way to make food. With all of his industrial development and scientific research man has not been able to duplicate in the laboratory what plants do as a matter of course.

The second basic law that probably most of us have known is the method by which plants make food. We know that plants do literally eat the soil and that water does not contain all of the compounds found in plants. We know the plants manufacture food by taking through their roots the water, minerals, and nitrates from the soil and combining them with the carbon taken from the air to produce food. This important fact simply means that the leaves of the plant are the food factories of the world; and without the exposure of green leaves to the sun we would all perish. It also shows that a fertile soil, the correct temperature, and plenty of water and sunshine does not mean food production unless a leaf is present to change these various elements into food. The

a response from Dr. Cyrus Cathey, commander of the 17th District from Hamilton.

Following Huffman's address, Captain Jasper Massee, army Chaplain, in delivering the sermon for the Memorial Service agreed that America was a great nation but "failed in seeking easy solutions to world problems." above laws should indicate the management needed on our ranges if we are to stay in the livestock business.

Early day ranchers tell of an abundance of grasses in this area when they settled here. They usually state that the grass reached their stirrups on the hills and would hide a man on a horse in the bottoms. This combination of grasses included little blue stem, side oats grama, indian grass, big blue stem and others are capable of producing about 7,000 pounds of air-dried forage per acre per year. The root systems of these plants have been checked to go eight feet, the ground cover on the land will absorb rainfall at the rate of two and one half inches per hour. This condition will maintain a more uniform soil temperature.

Two few of our ranges approach the above condition today. Much of our grassland has a poor cover of inferior, early maturing, low producing plants: such as needle grass, Texas grama, hairy trioda, weeds and traces of the above good grasses. This type of grass cover will usually yield less than 1000 pounds of air dried forage per acre, roots are very shallow and the water intake on this area will be less than one half inch per hour. Most of us realize that this change in vegetation from good grass to poor grass was brought about by literally starving to death our good grasses by constantly removing their leaves through grazing. As mentioned earlier the leaf is the food factory of the world.

Some suggested way of getting our better grasses back include 1. deferments or complete rest from June to frost. 2. provide supplemental grazing from cropland. 3. regulate grazing to allow enough top growth to keep plants vigorous and to permit natural re-seeding. 4. control brush where feasible. 5. provide adequate feed reserve.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

Bathrooms are going glamorous, noting a trend to the use of twin basins set side by side in a vanity-type counter top. Try this delicious dressing for summer fruit salads: mix together one pint of thick sour cream and one 6-ounce can of frozen lemonade concentrate. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve cold.

If you've inherited a gas range which has been neglected, it might be worth trying a commercial degreaser in conjunction with fine steel wool to remove the coating of grease from top burners. "Elbow grease" helps too — and patience.

Try adding a teaspoon of frozen lemonade to each glass of iced tea.

Serving your crowd with cake and coffee? How about this strawberry jam cake for an easily made treat? Prepare one package of angel food cake mix as directed on package and bake in two 8 by 4 by 3 pans in moderate oven of your gas range (350 degrees F) about 30 minutes. When cool, split each cake into three layers. Spread strawberry jam between the layers and on top, then spread sides generously with whipped cream. No strawberry jam on hand? Make a batch on the top burner of your gas range with the quick and easy help of liquid or powdered fruit pectin and frozen strawberries.

When kitchen clean-up time comes, the most overlooked area is often the wall right behind the gas range. This should be wiped clean every day; an excellent idea is to install a splashback of stain-proof ceramic tile which can be Gorman Monday.

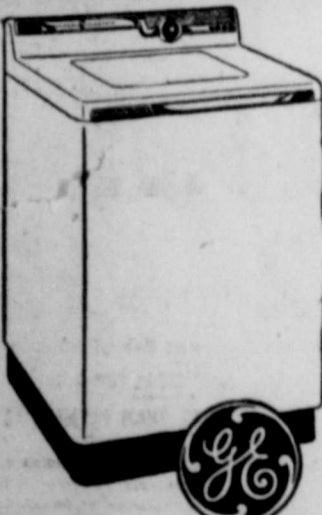

Burleson And Poage Present Farm Measure

Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson and Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco have introduced bills that would provide additional acreage for the six basic crops in areas of general crop failure, to be effective for 1955 and subsequent years.

The bill provides for temporary additional acreage in areas where the Secretary of Agriculture finds that a natural disaster has reduced the average yield for the immediately preceding two years to less

than 50 per cent of the highest average yield for such areas for any three consecutive years of the preceding ten years.

In the case of cotton, wheat and corn the Secretary shall allot to each eligible farm such additional acreage as may be requested.

In the case of peanuts, rice and tobacco, he shall allot to each eligible farm an allotment equal to the greater of 150 per cent of the established allotment for the farm for the current crop year or 100 per cent of the highest acreage planted to such crop in the preceding five crop years.

It is provided that no acreage shall be allotted which would result in a total acreage allotment of all crops on any farm in excess of 75 per cent of the crop-land on such farm.

The Congressmen feel that legislation of this type is necessary due to the extreme drought that has existed throughout the nation for the past several years, and to alleviate the hardship that has been suffered by the farmers. They feel that with declining farm prices, some measures must be taken to permit farmers to plant increased crops from which they can obtain some greatly needed relief. They feel that this bill would go a long way toward solving one of the problems facing the farmer.

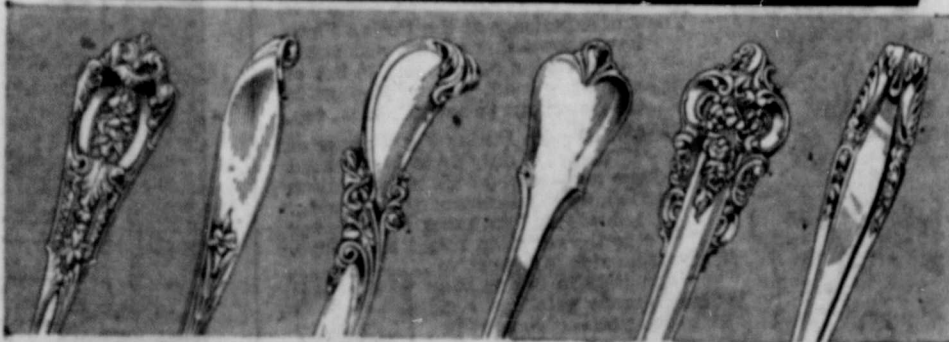
