Lamb County Cannery To Re-open Monday, July 17

The Lamb County Cannery located here will re-open Monday, July 17, as announced by Mrs. J. T. Newton, supervisor.

Mrs. Newton asks that all those wishing canning done to make appointments.

Canning will be done on the same basis as formerly. The producer receives 42 1/2 per cent of the canned goods if the cannery does the work, but if the producer does the canning, they get 85 per cent. Anyone needing canned goods, may go to the cannery and do the work, and receive 42 1/2 per cent of goods canned.

Bonds In Amount Of \$822,169 Are Sold; Quota Was \$755,000

All Cities, Communities In County Work Hard And Secure Their Quotas

Officials reported Monday that Lamb County had gone over the top in the Fifth War Loan Drive; that, as against the quota of \$755,000, bonds in the approximate amount of \$822,169 had been sold.

Pat Boone, county chairman, and C. O. Stone, Fifth War Loan chairman for the county, however, announced that the county was short on "E" bond purchases; that the county's quota was \$302,000, whereas "E" bonds in the amount of \$235,000 only were sold. They urge that Lamb county residents continue the purchase of "E" bonds, so as to bring the total in these smaller individual bond sales up.

Officials also announced that sales of E, F, G and Tax Series C Securities will count in the drive until July 31.

A breakdown as to the various towns and communities in the county was not available, but officials stated that all cities and communities in the county had made their quota.

J. O. Garlington, chairman of the Fifth War Loan Drive for Littlefield, said this city had a nice margin over and above her quota, but that a breakdown was not available.

These officials all expressed their appreciation for the splendid job done by all chairmen and their committees; stating they had received the fullest cooperation all over the county, and were grateful for the valued assistance extended them in the work.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau announced Sunday that America had smashed over the top in the 16 billion dollar fifth war loan, stating that subscriptions had reached \$16,650,000,000 and would soar higher when all returns were in.

Work Started On Boy Scout Hut

Work got underway Monday on the erection of a Boy Scout hut for Littlefield, which is in charge of Joe Wells, local contractor.

Local Boy Scouts arrived on the scene Monday morning with shovels, and did the excavation work necessary for the foundation.

The tile for the building arrived Tuesday, and the construction is now underway.

The structure is being built in the City Park, and will be a 30x30 foot stucco building with cement floor, for the accommodation of Boy Scouts of Littlefield and area.

The members of the building committee are: Dr. Wm. N. Orr, Buster Owens, J. O. Garlington and C. O. Stone.

The building is estimated to cost \$3,000, and according to the committee in charge, about \$1,320 has been donated to date.

The committee reports that splendid cooperation and response to their appeal for funds with which to build this hut have been received from the residents of this city, and they ask all those who have not been solicited and who wish to contribute to this worthy cause, to get in touch with one of the members of the committee, or send their donations to one of those in charge.

Milkweed—A "War Plant"

The Government wants 1,500,000 pounds of
milkweed floss this year for life jackets. All of
this floss must come from the wild stands, inas-
much as milkweed has been considered a weed,
and it takes three years to develop the plant as a
cultivated crop.

After years of being considered a pest, milk-
weed finds itself suddenly on the nation's priority
list as a "war plant" because the floss its pods
contain can be used to replace war-scarce kopak.

Because of the need for milkweed floss the
Department of Agriculture is asking that milkweed
not be destroyed until the pods are harvested.

Milkweed pods will be collected in 38 states
this year in order to provide milkweed floss for
life jackets and aviators' suits with a view to re-
placing the kopak formerly used. Kopak is now
controlled by the Japanese.

Schools, 4-H Clubs, boys' and girls' organiza-
tions, educational groups and State and County
War Boards are cooperating in the collection of
milkweed pods.

Enough milkweed floss for 50 life jackets was
turned in last year by students in an Indian train-
ing school in northwest Utah.

Enough milkweed floss to supply a life jacket
for every man and woman from the community
who had entered the armed forces was the goal of
one Michigan school last year. The children sur-
passed their goal.

The Government hopes to get a peak milkweed
pod harvest from milkweed along the roads and
highways. The Public Roads Administration is
asking State and County highway commissioners
to let milkweed grow until the pods are picked
in order to get floss for needed life jackets.

It takes at least 800 pounds of milkweed pods

New Red Cross Overseas Kit

American Red Cross girls at an Air Transport
Command Base on the African Gold Coast decid-
ed that transient plane crews and ground crews at
lonely bushland outposts needed recreation and
comfort kits to make their tedious flights and
stations more comfortable.

From unused American Red Cross Christmas
boxes these enterprising girls took playing cards,
razor blades, stationery, cigarettes, matches. To
this they added magazines and even moth-eaten
editions of hometown Sunday newspapers. They
descended upon the Quartermaster Corps and
Special Service branch of the army for additional
supplies. Result? The Bushtown Flight Kit.

Each kit, packed in a number 16 paper bag,
contains six magazines, five packages of cigar-
ettes, gum, hard candy, Red Cross post cards, pen-
cils, 20 pieces of V-mail, comb, razor blades, and
other items.

Says Sara Smerud, American Red Cross worker
from New Albin, Iowa, "We give the kit to a
crew member, who places it aboard his ship with
the understanding that if they do not need it
themselves they will drop it off at some bush sta-
tion where supplies are difficult to get."

Hundreds of Bushtown Flight Kits are distrib-
uted each month to ferry pilots, and are accepted
as part of the equipment of each combat plane.
One pilot enthusiastically remarked, "This is a
swell kind of Red Cross service, and we sure ap-
preciate it."

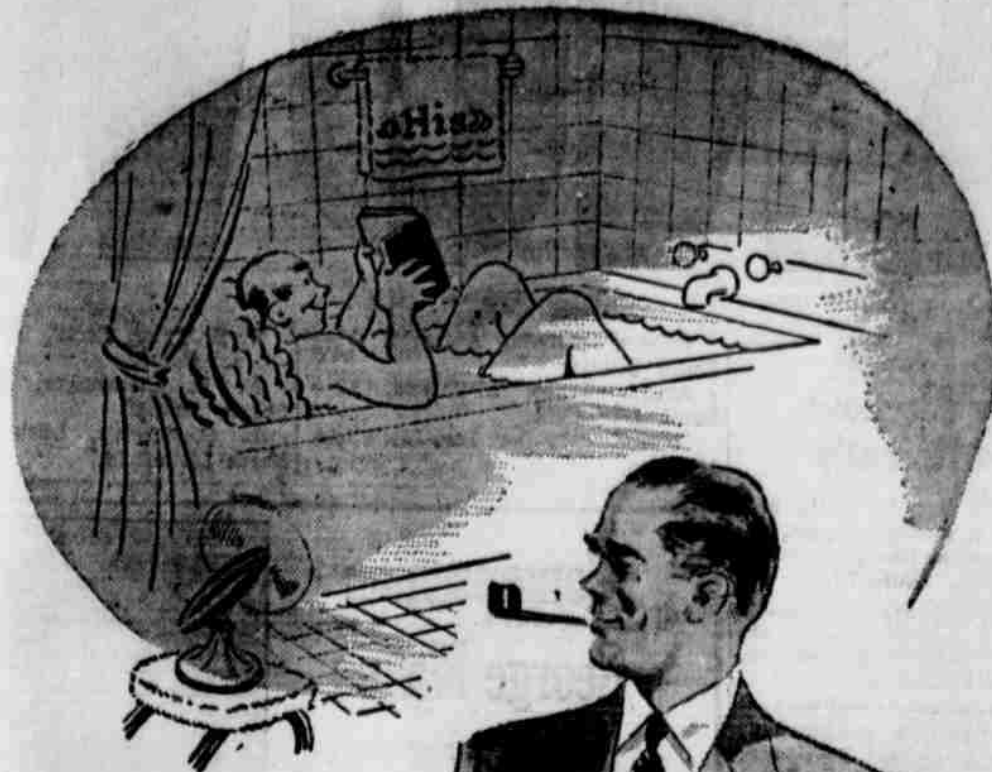
Cadet McQuatters, who enlisted in the Air Forces in 1941, is a 1941 graduate of Texas Tech, Lubock.

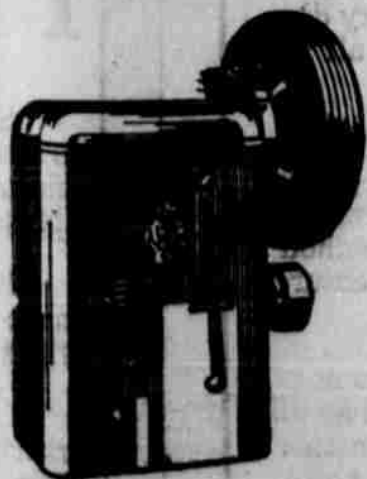

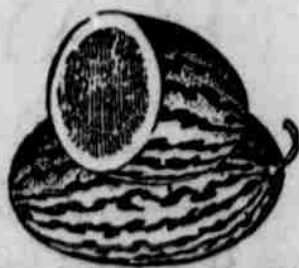

AN EIGHTH AAF FIGHTING STATION, England.—Helping support the huge air umbrella that protects the Allied invasion from attack by the Luftwaffe is M-Sgt. Richard D. Beisel of Littlefield, Texas.

As a ground crew man at this P-38 Lightning fighter base he helped prepare the twin-engine, twin-boomed planes for their invasion support assignments.

The planes had to be painted with special black and white identification stripes. Engines, guns, radio, instruments and oxygen system had to be in perfect condition for the big job. The landing forces and their naval escort had to have every possible protection against attack by the Luftwaffe.

Crews worked late into the night getting the aircraft ready, and this base was one of the first prepared for the invasion job.

At dusk on June 5 pilots from this field took off on a patrol over the armada massing in the English channel. They came back after dark and the crews readied the planes for their next flight.

Before dawn on D-Day crews who had only a few hours sleep were called out again. While it was still dark, they watched the planes take off and they kept the Lightnings in the air from before dawn until after dark, day after day.

Richard D. Beisel is an Aircraft Instrument specialist at this field commanded by Lieut. Col. George T. Crowell, of Chicago, Ill.

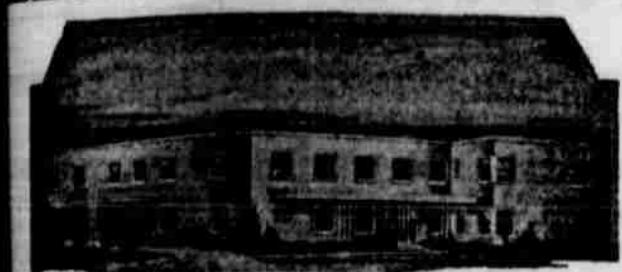

In The Armed Forces**

likes England fine, but is wanting to get his job done, so as to get home. He says there is no place in the world like home. The people are real nice to the boys over there. One thing he said he noticed was that the women dress their hair so differently over there to the American people.

The Signal Corps men operate, maintain and supply the communications network. Storage and issue of signal supply and operation of a communications school is also the work of these signalmen.

At one of the largest supply headquarters in the Mediterranean theatre, with its multitude of incoming and outgoing messages, many of them dealing with the movements of vast quantities of material or large numbers of troops, these signal corps soldiers are performing one of the outstanding tasks of the war.

These men also conduct a Signal Corps school—several thousand miles from New Jersey—that's familiarly known by its students as "Little Fort Monmouth." Not because the palm trees or cactus plants around it are reminiscent of the New Jersey landscape, but because of the job this school is doing in training.

Woodland is scarce in the Mediterranean, but in the middle of this enormous Signal Supply Depot—is a "horizontal forest" of telephone poles, 40,000 or more of them, piled up like so many matchsticks and awaiting the pleasure of the ever-active signal corps.

Real Yankee ingenuity is displayed by the men of this depot. One man had an invention for fighter planes, while another devised and developed an electrically-operated surgical aid, a miniature mine-detector, for locating shrapnel in bodies of wounded men.

Couriers, traveling by motorcycle, jeep, truck and even aircraft, deliver many of the messages on a 24-hour-a-day basis, the same schedule that is followed by all of the vital communications branch. Only those who have seen this part of the world can realize the difficulties that constantly face these drivers.

A-C H. F. Beyer, who suffered injuries to the extent that he was obliged to have his right arm amputated at the McCloskey Hospital, Temple, and who is still a patient at this hospital, underwent a recent operation for the grafting of skin. He is getting along fine, and was granted a pass and enjoyed a week
