Plans 'On Move' For Annual Stock Show

Adult leaders for Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Stock Show wasted no time this week moving ahead with plans for the 1970 event.

Show dates will be Dec. 31, Jan. 1 and 2 with judging scheduled the first two days of the New Year.

At a meeting Monday night, the 4-H & FFA Livestock Association elected Jimmy Moody, partner in M&T Food Service,

as president for the ensuing year.

Named to other key offices of the association were Harry Dockrey of Spade, vice president; J. D. Hill Jr. of China Grove, secretary; County Judge Elmer Martin, treasurer.

Dink Rees, Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative executive, will be general superintendent for the 1971 show.

Serving as superintendents will be Kenneth Merket of Lorraine and Leon Light of Colorado City, cattle; Charles Northcutt of Colorado City, sheep; Bob McClure of Colorado City, swine; A. M. Belights of Lorraine, weights and tags.

J. W. Boyd of Lorraine will be assistant superintendent for sheep and R. B. Golden of Colorado City, assistant superintendent for swine.

Judges will be selected by a committee composed of County Agent Bobby Lemons and the county's three vocational agriculture instructors -- Frank Brownfield, Colorado High; Eddie Puckett of Lorraine High and Pete Hines of Westbrook High.

Minimum entry weight for the swine division will be back up to 170 pounds for the upcoming '71 show. When dates for the last show were re-scheduled

to avoid conflict with area shows, the weight regulation was changed to 155 pounds.

Another change will affect the lambs. Any class with more than 20 lambs will be divided into light and heavyweights for judging.

To produce and pay for the 1971 4-H & FFA Livestock Show, the association has set a goal of \$3,500 through a campaign drive.

Chairman for the drive will be Henry Hoyle of China Grove with Bill Harris of Payne Community, co-chairman.

Kickoff for the \$3,500--the amount required to meet expenses, provided for ribbons and prizes and maintain show materials and facilities--will come at a breakfast Sept. 21.

Teams of fund raisers will fan out from the kickoff breakfast contacting citizens and

firms throughout the county. This contact effort for funds will continue through the week of Sept. 21.

The stock show attracts boys and girls from all communities of the county. Except for the Mitchell County Hereford Breeders Association annual sale and judging, it is the only countywide program promoting

Blackard 1st for County, Compress

Mitchell County's first bale of cotton in 1970, harvested by Joe L. Blackard, was also the first to be processed at Rolling Plains Co-Op Compress at Sweetwater.

The 460-pound bale won two extra checks for Blackard -- a \$100 from local merchants

and \$50 cash from Rolling Plains Co-Op.

The bale was ginned from 2,200 pounds of cotton, pulled on the Willis Tilley farm south of Colorado City. The cotton of Lankart variety was planted April 20 and ginned at Buford Co-Op Gin.

Lunch will be served in Fellowship Hall of the church after morning worship.

Goal for Sunday School attendance is 200, said Rev. Charles Jones, current church pastor, as he extended an invitation to

all who have been connected with the church to attend.

Training union at 6 p.m. and 7 p.m. worship will conclude the day's activities.

Calvary Church was organized Aug. 10, 1958, by 48 charter members who met for their first meetings in Kelley Elementary School.

Eighteen days after organization, the church purchased property at corner of Eastover and 15th Streets and within nine months the congregation had completely paid for the land, selected a master building plan and were meeting in a newly constructed unit, now utilized as Fellowship Hall.

1,661 First Day Students

Kindergarten Keeps Enrollment On Level

Colorado City public schools counted 1,661 pupils Wednesday, first day of classes for 1970-71 school year.

The total is only four less than first-day enrollment of 1,665 last year. However, the decline is actually more than 60 below last year's opening enrollment for grades 1 through 12.

Deficit in the regular 12

grades is made up with kindergarten, which is being inaugurated for the first time this fall in Colorado City's public school system.

Supt. Lloyd McKee said Wednesday opening enrollment of 1,661 was divided between the two grade levels almost evenly with 856 in elementary grades and 805 in secondary grades.

Here is the report by schools and grades compiled by McKee:

Kelley Elementary--454 total with 129 in first grade, 66 in kindergarten, 127 in second and 132 in third.

Hutchinson Elementary--282 total with 129 in fourth grade, 146 in fifth and 7 in special education.

Wallace Elementary--120 total with 116 in sixth grade and 4 in special education.

Junior High--285 total with 142 in seventh grade, 143 in eighth grade.

High School--520 total with 141 in ninth grade, 121 in 10th grade, 146 in 11th and 112 in 12th grade.

Enrollment is expected to increase after the Labor Day holiday weekend. High School's student count is expected to go above 550 next week.

A vital position in the Colorado City faculty was filled Wednesday with the employment of Mrs. Pamela Gudmundson of Big Spring as speech therapist.

Mrs. Gudmundson, wife of an Air Force student pilot at Big Spring's Webb Air Force Base, has a bachelor of science degree in speech pathology and audiology from Morehead State College, Morehead, Minn.

She has more than 96 hours in speech therapy courses to her credit.

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Lake Outing Claims Life Of Youth

What began as a weekend of recreation turned into tragedy for five Seminole young people Sunday morning when Santos Jamie Gueterrez drowned in Lake Colorado City.

His step brother, Steven Delacruz, almost lost his life trying to save the 19-year-old youth.

The step-brothers and step-sisters -- Gueterrez, Delacruz, Juquin Cascis Valdez, Teresa Valdez and Lenora Delacruz -- arrived at the newly dedicated state park Saturday and camped overnight.

They were wading Sunday when Gueterrez, who was unable to swim, stepped into deep water.

Delacruz grabbed his step-brother, but was almost drowned as Gueterrez struggled for life.

The accident was reported to officials at 11:52 a.m. and the body was recovered at 12:30 p.m. by Curtis Thomason, local game warden, Earl Taylor and Larry Neill, park superintendent.

Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson pronounced him dead at 12:40 p.m. ruling accidental drowning.

Gueterrez, second drowning victim in Lake Colorado City in the past year, was born Aug. 4, 1951.

His father, Miguel Gueterrez, lived in Floydada where funeral services were conducted.

WEDNESDAY, August 26, 1970, was a big day here in C-City. It was the day set by NOW (National Organization of Women) and the more aggressive backers of the Feminist movement for all women everywhere to strike.

It was the day when women were supposed to march. So most C-City women marched the kids to school for the first full day of classes. Now anybody who has ever been a mother knows that school is a liberation of sorts for mothers—unless the mothers happen also to be school teachers!

Then after the parade to our town's various school buildings, most women marched themselves home to clean up the clutter and get ready for the annual book-covering ordeal.

THIS MAY be a very backward community. None of the women known personally saw fit to strike. Course most of them were too tired from the shopping spree for school shoes, school supplies, new jeans and new dresses.

Gentlemen of the Press have been having great fun with Wednesday's strike for equality. Leaders in the women's liberation thing had long been urging women to express themselves by not going to work—or if they did go to work Wednesday, just not to work and to take extra time off for lunch.

DEMONSTRATIONS from cities included rallies, confrontations at city halls, and leaving the kids with the men at their offices and stores.

There are sure to be lots of sick little youngsters right now.

If they belong to men who work where there is candy for sale, a handy Coke machine, popcorn, and a hot-dog stand nearby.

Cincinnati, Ohio, women seemed a bit more conservative than women in New York, Boston, Detroit and Milwaukee. Cincinnati women were celebrating by phoning politicians, writing letters to companies whose ads they find offensive, or by just doing whatever else they have been wanting to do.

Now there's an idea!

WRITING to companies with offensive television ads could not be done in one day. It would take at least one month.

Phoning politicians could get to be pretty expensive with long distance calls to Austin and Washington, D. C. Most women had rather spend that money calling sons, daughters, mothers and such who live in distant cities.

But suppose, just for the fun of it, all women everywhere should decide to spend one day doing whatever it is they've been wanting to do?

That might or might not shock the men into conceding whatever it is they are supposed to concede. Is it equality or superiority we're after, gals?

DOING whatever it is you've been wanting to do sounds fine.

Fine, that is, until a woman takes inventory of what it is she is been wanting to do and then she's stuck.

Sitting down all day might be nice but did you ever try doing dishes for two days after a sit-down strike?

A woman could spend the day taking fall clothes home on approval, getting a fresh shampoo and manicure-plus-a-pedicure for full measure but suppose

pose all the salesladies and beauticians took the day to strike?

WHEN it comes right down to it, most of the things this woman has been wanting to do include some work and no end of trouble.

Have been wanting to take down and launder the dining-room curtains, for instance.

Been wanting to straighten up a bit on the service porch... make a strawberry angel cake like Mary (Mrs. Matt) Graham makes... move the furniture in the front bedroom... clean the oven.

Been wanting to write a book but had rather want than do it.

This could be a very backward woman. She forgot to strike. And the fact that she also forgot to send out the laundry and left the defrosting for Saturday has nothing whatever to do with the liberation movement.

Like most women, this woman has been doing what she wants to do and not doing what she doesn't want to do since the day she was born.

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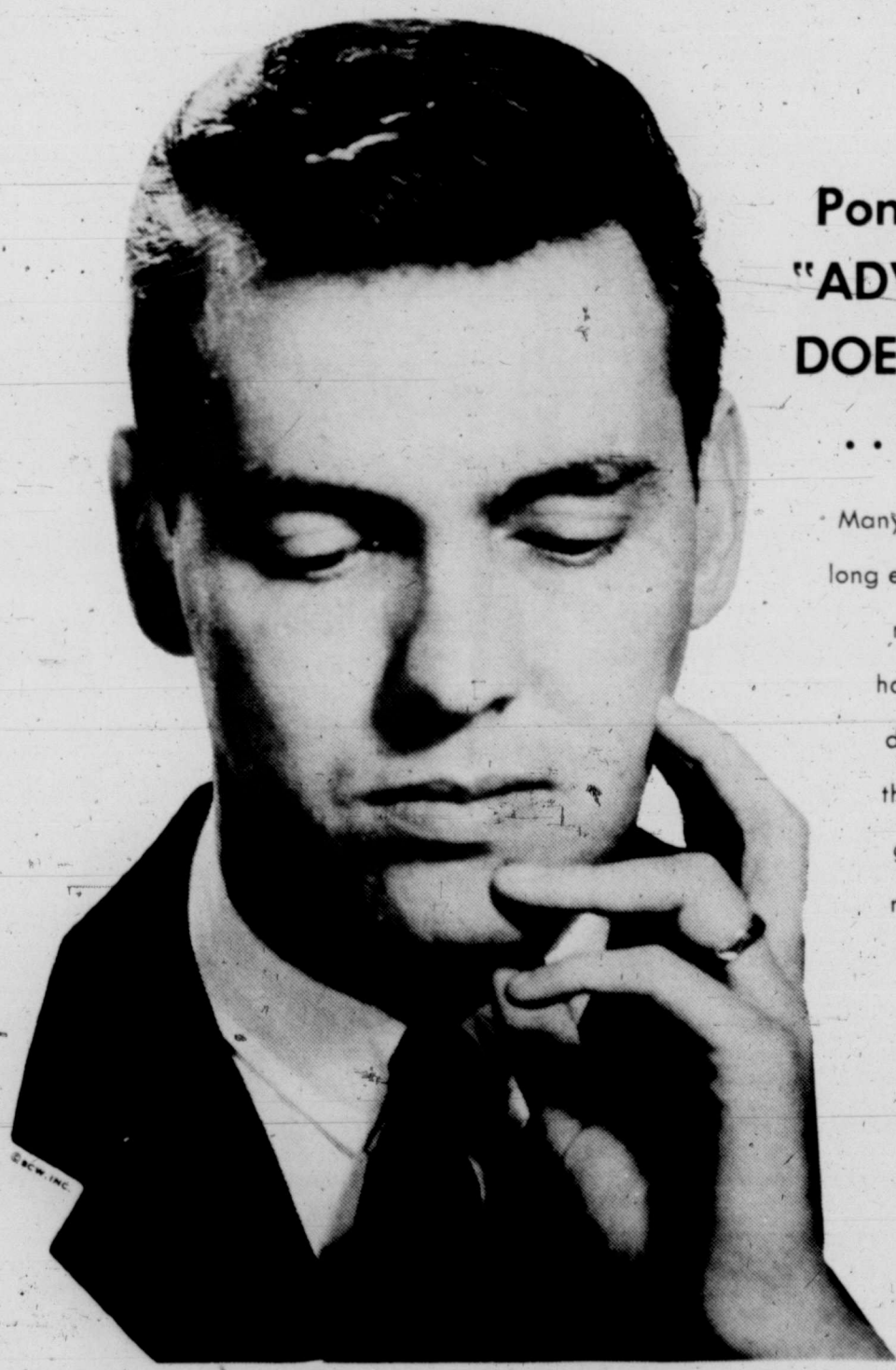
