Clay Doesn't Think War Around Corner

BERLIN, Sept. 14. (U)—General Lucius D. Clay said today: "I don't think war is just around the corner."

The United States military governor made the statement to American newsmen who came to Berlin from the United States to view the British-American air lift operation supplying Soviet-blockaded Western Berlin.

Clay added he doubted the Russians "will make Berlin the final issue on the entire German problem."

The American commander predicted that before any forceful actions were attempted to break the 82-day-old Soviet blockade the U. S. would exhaust "all other means at its disposal" to reach agreement.

Clay declined to discuss whether bringing the Berlin question before a council of foreign ministers would mean "negotiation under duress."

He left the impression, however, that the U. S. at least would not be prepared to discuss any other larger German issues with the Russians at such a conference before the blockade was lifted.

A veteran American military government official declared today Russia and Communism have already lost the political battle for Berlin. As a last resort, he said, they have taken to rioting and force.

Clay said the next step, if the Moscow talks fail, would be to bring the Berlin crisis before the United Nations Security Council as a threat to peace.

Speaking of the Soviet-sponsored drive for withdrawal of all occupation forces from Germany, the American commander said, "This could become very popular in Germany, but not now. Fear of Communist domination is very great. The Germans would be very disturbed at the withdrawal of our army."

The Soviet press referred to the youths as "Fascist provocateurs." Otto Suhr, Socialist speaker of the anti-Communist assembly denounced the verdict as "dreadful injustice" and "revenge action."

The western press raised a chorus of complaint against the severity of the sentences. It charged the Russian refused to permit the defendants a German defense lawyer, rejected appeals by the city government to send an observer to the trial and refused to let in the press.

U. S. Crude Oil Output Soars

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 14. (U)—The Nation's crude oil production continued to soar during the week ended Sept. 11, averaging 5,542,185 barrels daily for another new record, the Oil & Gas Journal reported today.

This was 17,185 barrels daily above the previous high of 5,525,000, counted during the week ended Sept. 4.

Texas contributed a gain of 10,425 barrels in averaging 2,470,900 barrels daily for a new record for the year.

Louisiana was up 600 to 484,750. Oklahoma dropped 250 to 429,900. New Mexico declined 600 to 131,535.

Production was unchanged in Arkansas, 82,450.

Former Costa Rican President Injured

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 14. (U)—Teodoro Picado Michaleki, former president of Costa Rica, is reported in serious condition today of injuries suffered yesterday in a jeep accident.

The jeep in which Picado was riding on the Pan-American highway struck a wall near Esteli. He later was brought here. Picado resigned the presidency of Costa Rica last April during a revolution.

Truman Hits Solon Smear Of Scientists

Spy Probers Are Obviously His Target

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. (AP)—President Truman assailed Congress from a new quarter today with a charge that "some politicians" are endangering the nation's safety by "smear" tactics against scientists.

The house Un-American Activities Committee—which he did not mention by name—was the obvious target of Mr. Truman's assertion that atomic experts are being driven from the government in these "hazardous times" by "totalitarian" and "un-American activities."

The President stoked up his feud with the house committee, headed by Rep. Thomas (R-NJ) in an unexpectedly fiery address last night to the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He termed the talk "non-political."

The chief executive asserted the country's security requires that scientists work "in an atmosphere free from suspicion, personal insult or political motivation."

Their indispensable work, he continued, "may be made impossible by the creation of an atmosphere in which no man feels safe against the public airing of unfounded rumors, gossip and plain vilification."

"Such an atmosphere," he went on, "is un-American—the most un-American we have to contend with today. It is the climate of a totalitarian country in which scientists are expected to change their theories to match changes in the police state's propaganda line."

Clay added he doubted the Russians "will make Berlin the final issue on the entire German problem."

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State Demo Convention Off To Fighting Start

Committee Calls Johnson Winner

FORT WORTH, Sept. 14. (AP)—The State Democratic convention roared off to a fighting start with an effort to remove from its temporary roll the states rights delegation from Harris county.

Earlier, Lyndon Johnson was certified by the executive committee as the Senate race winner by a 87 vote margin over Coke Stevenson. The vote battle will go to the convention floor, however, where action must be taken on the matter.

Byron Skelton of Temple, floor leader of the pro-Truman or loyalist forces, moved to amend the executive committee's report which recommended seating of the anti-Truman delegation headed by Robert W. Milner Jr.

He asked the convention to seat the pro-Truman delegation led by Sam D. W. Low. Skelton charged that many of the Harris County delegation were leaders of the States Rights movement to elect Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina president.

Skelton had great difficulty making his voice heard over a chorus of boos. Much of this heckling seemed to come from the Harris and Dallas County sections.

Milner himself appealed for order. "No one should be allowed to take part in these deliberations who is not a Democrat and who is not willing to take the pledge to support the nominees of the Democratic Party," Skelton shouted.

He plainly told the delegates their vote on the motion would determine whether the anti-Truman or pro-Truman forces would control.

Ralph Lee of Houston came to the microphone to speak against Skelton's motion.

Lee said the Democratic Party of Texas is an entity in itself, not subject to control of Democrats in Philadelphia or New York or Boston or anywhere else. He said the Truman-Thurmond referendum in Harris County which carried for Thurmond by a big majority spoke for the Democrats of that county. It carried in labor boxes, he declared.

"The action of the county convention was sustained by the referendum," Lee said. He was referring to postponement of action on a pledge resolution at the county meeting "before it was organized."

"We maintain that the Democrats of Texas can decide in convention what they want to do," he said. "Sustain our delegation in order that the Democrats of Harris County not be disfranchised."

He declined to comment on probable procedure his supporters would take on the convention floor but added that it probably would be later afternoon or tonight before the convention would receive the committee's certification report.

The anticipated Stevenson-Johnson battle cannot be considered closed by the convention until the executive committee makes its report Stevenson said.

Clint Small, attorney for Coke Stevenson, today indicated appeal of a temporary injunction granted Lyndon Johnson yesterday in Alice would depend on the course of events at today's state democratic convention.

"An appeal after today probably won't mean anything," Small said. Johnson, certified last night as the U. S. senatorial nominee by the state executive committee, yesterday was granted a temporary injunction by District Judge I. Broder in Alice to prevent a re-canvas of Jim Wells County votes.

Stevenson alleges 202 votes in Precinct 13 of Alice were cast illegally.

Small said Johnson's suit was "a political trick" designed as means of delaying action until after today's convention.

"They wanted to delay things a day or two and the injunction now has served its purpose," he commented.

Stevenson, arriving at the auditorium an hour after Small, said he had no comment on appeal except that "Small told you right."

The former governor showed no signs of pessimism following last night's close executive committee vote on certification of Johnson.

He told reporters, "I'm still in there pitching."

Road Program On The Ballot For November

When Howard county voters go to the polls on Nov. 2 to help decide on a national administration, they also will be voting on a proposition affecting their own road program.

The commissioners court Monday afternoon set Nov. 2 as the date for a special election to determine whether or not Howard county shall establish a county road department, to operate under executive guidance of a county road engineer and to unify all road maintenance and construction.

The election was called in response to petitions which bore approximately 190 signatures, well over the 110 required by state statute.

The petition and election call are in conformity with a statute enacted by the state legislature in 1947, giving counties the option of setting up a unitized road department. Ballots, which will be handed to voters separate from general election ticket Nov. 2, will read "For" and "Against" the "Optional County Road Law of 1947."

If the electorate favors this option, the county then would proceed to set up the road department. The commissioners court would continue as the administrative and policy-making body, and a qualified road engineer (meeting state highway department requirements) would be the actual executive head of the department, supervising all construction and maintenance on a county-wide, rather than precinct basis.

The commissioners court was advised Monday in a letter from the state that the county has to its credit \$15,518.32 in the state lateral road fund. Of this amount \$4,717.76 is being applied to sinking funds to retire a viaduct bond series of 1929 and a special road bond series of 1920. The remainder, \$11,800.56, will revert to the county for lateral road construction.

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India Troops Suffer 1,000 Casualties

KARACHI, Pakistan, Sept. 14. (U)—A communique from the Hyderabad defense ministry said today Indian troops suffered 1,000 casualties on the first day of their invasion of the princely state.

An Indian army communique issued in New Delhi this morning said one Indian column, in Western Hyderabad, had lost 100 killed and 150 captured.

On the northern front, the communique said, the forces of the Muzlem Nizam recaptured one village within eight hours after Indian troops took it. An earlier communique said the Indian advance had been stopped on all fronts.

Today's bulletin said the Indian forces opened 10 fronts in their first onslaughts yesterday and that the forces of the Nizam and the Razakars (a private Moslem volunteer group) are evacuating all Moslems from border villages to the interior.

The Hyderabad radio gave the distance of the penetrations by Indian troops thus far as: Southeast—10 miles; West—four and a half miles; northeast—eight miles.

Today's Indian communique said columns spearing in from east and west had reached points within 100 miles of Hyderabad City, the state capital.

Last night's communique gave no details, saying only that Indian troops could make no headway.

Britain Extends Conscription Terms By Three Months

HAMBURG, Germany, Sept. 14. (U)—Britain today extended for three months the term of service of conscripts who were called up for the armed forces on or before Jan. 1, 1947. The step was taken because of the international situation the announcement said.

A government announcement was read to occupation forces in the British zone of Germany. It said: "It was our anticipation at the end of the war that by this time the post-war international difficulties would perhaps have been resolved. Unfortunately this expectation has not been realized. Our armed forces must be in the best possible form to fulfill the demands made upon them and these demands have materially increased during recent months."

"The government has decided that it is necessary for all national service men due for release in the next few months who have not left their units for release by today, to be retained for a period of three months beyond the date when in the normal course they would have been released."

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\$7,000 DEAL

Girl Refuses Father's Plan To Buy Husband

DETROIT, Sept. 14. (U)—Blonde George Martin refused today to have any part of her father's plan to get her a husband who could pay \$7,000.

"I'm ruined," wailed the 19-year-old secretary.

But George Martin, her 33-year-old father, insisted he "just wanted to make sure that George would be well taken care of if anything happened to me."

He told reporters he was in financial difficulties after being forced to quit work a year ago. At that time George, who needed but two years to complete work for a law degree from the University of Detroit, was forced to drop her studies.

Debts were piling up, Martin said, when he began to read newspaper accounts of women who offered themselves in marriage to rich suitors.

Thinking the move might lift some of his own financial burden and help George finish her education, he said he sent letters making the marriage proposal to papers in Wyoming, Idaho and Montana.

George then announced she knew nothing of the matter until it appeared in a local paper. And it's "no sale," she added firmly.

LeMay Refuses New Lie Detector Test On Disappearance Of Wife

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 14. (U. S. —) Edmund LeMay, 52, again faced arraignment on a forgery charge today after refusing last night to take another lie detector test in connection with his wife's disappearance.

LeMay's arraignment originally was scheduled for yesterday afternoon, but he was cajoled with Sheriff George Hanley in a downtown hotel at the time and did not appear. He is charged with forging the signature of his wife, Mrs. Cecilia LeMay, 54, to a \$15 check.

When the sheriff and LeMay left the hotel after a four-hour session, Hanley said, he refuses to take a lie detector test. He also refuses to co-operate.

Coloradoans Will Vote In Primary

DENVER, Sept. 14. (U. S. —) Coloradans vote today to decide two hot primary contests for the U. S. Senate.

Election officials expected about 200,000 persons—nearly half of the registered voters—to cast ballots. The 1,701 polling places open for 12 hours at 7 a. m., m. s. t. Eugene Cervi, former democratic state chairman, opposed U. S. Sen. Edwin C. Johnson's bid for the democratic nomination for a third term.

Cervi, seeking his first elective office, accused Johnson of being an isolationist and bolting the party in his voting.

Johnson pointed to his sponsorship of a 70-group air force and quoted a letter from Sen. Alben Barkley, the party's vice presidential nominee, praising his senate service.

Kaiser-Frazer Files Large Damage Suit

DETROIT, Sept. 14. (U) — A \$38,832.118 damage suit, Kaiser-Frazer corporation's latest move in its legal battle with Otis & Co., was on file in federal court today.

The corporation accused the Otis firm of conspiring with two attorneys, James Masterson of Philadelphia and David V. Martin of Detroit, to upset the issue of \$90,000 shares of K-F stock last February.

The fight began Feb. 9 when Martin filed a federal lawsuit here against Kaiser-Frazer in the name of Masterson. In yesterday's court action, the automobile manufacturing corporation charged Otis & Co. arranged the suit with the two attorneys.

Master's suit asked that the \$10 million stock deal be halted, and Otis & Co. declined to go through with its agreement with K-F, pointing to a contract that stated no lawsuits could be pending against the auto company.

A long hearing on the battle before the Securities and Exchange Commission followed.

The Kaiser-Frazer action claimed the firm suffered general damages of \$3,712,500 and special damages of \$15,553,535. Because of what it called the "punitive" nature of the Masterson suit, it asked double the combined sums.

REPUBLICAN MAVERICK

Maine's New Woman Senator Knows How To Keep Secret

SKOWHEGAN, Me., Sept. 14. (U) — Senator-elect Margaret Chase Smith is woman who knows how to keep a secret.

The Republican victor in yesterday's Maine election has had plenty of experience—on the House Naval Affairs Committee in wartime and its successor, the armed services committee.

The congresswoman since 1940, Mrs. Smith is trim, vivacious and modish at 50. She speaks with a rich Yankee twang.

There was open house until far into last night at the trim white cottage where her 83-year-old mother, Mrs. George E. Chase, joined her in greeting guests.

Republican Presidential Nominee Thomas E. Dewey telephoned to offer congratulations—long before victory was certain.

Becoming the first woman to be elected to the U. S. Senate without a prior appointment is but the latest of Mrs. Smith's many precedents.

She was the first woman Maine sent to the House.

Something of a Republican "maverick," the silver-haired, blue-eyed congresswoman didn't always follow party thought.

In 1947, for example, she favored extension of social security and opposed reduction of President Truman's budget. Generally, she upheld the Truman administration's bipartisan foreign policies. She voted for the

Marshall Plan and "all national defense measures," including the peacetime draft.

After a career as teacher, telephone operator, newspaperwoman and office manager, Mrs. Smith

got into politics as secretary and campaign manager for her late husband, Rep. Clyde H. Smith.

The second Maine district elected her to fill out his term when he died in 1940.

Educator Deplores No Room For Romance In Apartments

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. (U) —

Modern apartments are so small there's no room for romance, a New York educator said today.

"The dwindling size of city apartments," said President Bryn J. Hovde of the new school for social research, "compels young people to conduct their courtships on the streets, in commercial places of amusement, in public parks or in automobiles, rather than in one another's houses."

Though "all the world deplores" that situation, Hovde said, builders still make apartments "so small there is no privacy there."

Hovde told a symposium of the American Association for the Advancement of Science that "housing is one of the most acute problems of our time" and that the natural and social sciences should join in attacking it.

"For the proper planning of good housing," he said, "we should know more than we do about the ways in which families like to use their indoor space and have it arranged."

Houston Detective Mentioned For Post As Brownsville Chief

HOUSTON, Sept. 14. (U) — City Detective George Bell was in Brownsville today, conferring with city officials there about their offer to appoint him Brownsville police chief.

Bell has been on the Houston police force since 1936 and for three years was a detective in charge of the Latin-American squad before it was disbanded.

He was at one time a high school football coach in El Paso and lived in Mexico for years. He speaks Spanish fluently.

STEEL DISPUTE

King To Open Controversial Parliament

LONDON, Sept. 14. (U) — King George VI drives in royal state to Westminster today to open one of the shortest, most controversial parliament sessions in recent history.

The special 10-day sitting, called to clear the decks for steel nationalization by advancing the parliamentary bill one more stage, was taking a severe lashing from the anti-government press, even before the opening ceremonies began.

One paper termed it a "phony session." Another spoke of a cynical party maneuver.

The special session was called partially to speed up the labor government's program to limit the powers of the house of lords, but this was overshadowed by the east-west tension over Germany.

There was speculation the king might refer in his opening speech to government plans for slowing demobilization of troops during the Berlin crisis.

There were also strong indications the conservatives were preparing to undermine the latest demonstration of labor's parliamentary strength with political bobby traps.

Conservative papers indicated a move would be made to put the government on the spot during the session by challenging it to offer mediatory services in the Hyderabad battle. Failure to move the conservative charge that the laborites called the special session solely for party advantage.

Political commentators in London say the conservatives plan to push a vote of censure against the government during the sitting. Basis for the vote would be a charge that the laborites waste time by the parliament bill while the nation wallows in a sea of economic and international problems. Failure of the laborites to defeat such a vote would mean the immediate resignation of the cabinet.

The government wants to cut from two years to one the length of time in which the House of Lords can delay enactment of a bill.

Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin is expected to make a statement later this week on the Berlin negotiations.

WASHINGTON, (U. S. I. SEE BY THE papers Governor Dewey will do a lot of handshaking on his cross-country campaign to get elected President.

It seems his brain trust figures he ought to go in for it in a big way so people can see, close up, what a warm, friendly man he is.

In this way, the stories say, his advisors think he ought to pick up votes from people who never saw him at close range before.

President Truman, who wants to get re-elected, is quite a handshaker himself.

This may disturb people who think a candidate ought to get votes strictly on his record, party or promises and not because his hand is warm or his eyes smile. But, the fact is, lots of people like to shake hands with a political candidate. Why? Probably for reasons like these:

BECAUSE THEY'RE ALREADY ON his side and want to wish him well; or so they can tell their grandchildren about it; or because they get a warm feeling of importance or power from close contact with the importance or power that a big political candidate represents.

So much for the Truman-Dewey handshaking expeditions.

Right here in Washington handshaking is a big enterprise at the countless cocktail parties given by diplomats, private groups or business firms who want to win friends or get a little publicity.

Those parties are the happy merry-go-round for the celebrity hunters and the professional spongers who slide in for the free drinks and sandwiches. Free-loaders, they're called.

I remember one character a few years

ago—he's still around—who wanted all the for-free he could get and, at the same time, being an aspiring young man, wanted to be seen in prominent places, talking to prominent people.

While I had a dizzy spell he talked me into going to a cocktail party at the French embassy for Leon Blum, one-time French premier, who was over here on a special mission.

WHEN WE ARRIVED, WE SAW TWO rooms. One, full of chattering people, was the room with the east and drinks. In the other room Blum was standing up manfully, pumping the paws of the hundreds of people who moved past him in slow, single file.

I told the character, "let's skip Blum and go in here."

General Bradley Helps Make U.S. Brass Hats An Efficient Group

WASHINGTON—If war should come to beleaguered Berlin, the men at the top of the U. S. Army today are among the most competent, human, and civilian-minded that this newsman has seen around the War Department in many a year.

This appraisal, by the way, comes from a long-time and vigorous critic of the brass hats.

Responsible for this new deal around the Pentagon Building are Gen. Eisenhower and his successor, modest Omar Bradley.

It is important for the American public to know that when the dazed boys of the Air Force and the drop-the-bomb-men of the Navy gather at joint chiefs of staff meetings, there is always present one calm conscience who never forgets the 300,000 GI's buried under white crosses from Guadalcanal to Sicily.

Take off his uniform and Omar Bradley looks like a college professor. He is quiet, gracious, generous, good-natured and basically a very plain person. Everybody who ever worked with Bradley remarks on his simplicity. His mess sergeant in France had orders never to use Bradley's name to wangle food for headquarters. Once during the historic landing at Normandy, Bradley, then a 3-star general, took off his fleece-lined jacket and handed it to a shivering corporal.

"Here, son," he said. "It will be easier for me to get another than it will be for you."

BRADLEY STUDIES LIKE GI—Bradley has so monotonously plugged away for the little guy both in war and peace that he is almost taken for granted.

Typical of his quiet manner is the fact that, after being appointed chief of staff, but while waiting to be sworn in, he took two months of refresher courses at the Pentagon side by side with other officers. They report that Bradley was never late for class, took careful notes, shamed many a colonel or one-star general by his promptness and interest, compared with their casual attitude.

It may have been because Omar Bradley was from Moberly, Missouri, that President Truman picked him to be Veterans Administrator, later chief of staff. If so, this geographical coincidence was the good luck of the American people. However, it was not luck which put Bradley at the top.

When a youngster he worked for the Washburn Railroad; being poor yet anxious for a college education he applied to his Congressman for a West Point appointment. To take the examination in St. Louis, he had to promote a bus to the Washburn.

EISENHOWER'S CLASS MATE—Bradley was graduated from West Point in the class of 1915. Another famous member of that class was Dwight Eisenhower of Kansas, ranked 100th. Bradley ranked 44th. Perhaps this rather low rating should not be cited in the month of September, when several millions American youngsters are reluctantly going back to school; so, in passing, it might be noted that Gen. MacArthur graduated No. 1 in his class of 1903.

Bradley's start in the recent war was none too happy. He commanded the 28th Division, officered in part by Republican politicians from Pennsylvania. Sen. Ed Martin was commanding general, later relieved for

age) by Bradley, while Jay Cooke, one of Stassen's hot supporters, was a battalion commander.

After various difficulties with the 26th Division, Bradley stepped up to command a corps under Gen. Patton in Sicily, later became top commander of the European Theatre, entrusted with carrying out the strategy of Gen. Eisenhower and the Allied chiefs of staff. He faced some tough problems.

BATTLE OF THE BULGE—One of them was getting along with the temperamental, grandstanding Field Marshal Montgomery. Bradley had no regard for Monty's lack of nerve and reluctance to advance. But realizing Montgomery was a symbol to the British people, he said no word against him.

Bradley got part of the blame for the Battle of the Bulge, and toward the end of this battle Montgomery, his rival, was given command of part of Bradley's forces. However, the inside fact is that it was Montgomery's stooge, Gen. Strong, who served as Bradley's chief intelligence officer, plus Gen. Eddie Siebert, an American, who claimed the Germans could not possibly attack in the Ardennes.

Only his close friends know it, but Bradley himself was worried before the attack, took a trip down to the Saar to talk it over with "Old Blood and Guts" Patton. His explanation to Patton was that "topside" had ordered him to leave the Ardennes woods exposed, since the Germans could not possibly attack. After it was all over, Bradley, like the soldier that he is, took the blame for the Battle of the Bulge on his own shoulders.

Mr. and Mrs. John Roe request the honor of your presence at the marriage of their daughter, Mary Elizabeth, to Mr. John Jones at the First Church, September 14, Nineteen Hundred Forty-Eight at 8:15 o'clock. It is a facsimile of the usual wedding invitation and has been so for many years.

It has occurred to me often that a great number of women rush out to buy gifts for the intended bride after receiving such invitations, even though she is a bare acquaintance.

I do not know how the custom began to take on such proportions but I have an idea that during the old days, wedding feasts were prepared and everyone came to enjoy the fellowship and celebrations. They, no doubt, began the custom, of bringing gifts to the couple for their new home, which was good and fine.

Today, persons are too busy to have the wedding feasts and long celebrations, so they send out the invitations to a great number of persons, some who could not possibly come; but those invitations serve as a notification that Mary Elizabeth Roe is to marry John Jones. She wants this fact known for she is proud of it, so that is the reason for sending these invitations.

Presumably the other persons are asked because their presence is wanted at the wedding, if they want to come. The compiling of the guest list is a long tedious procedure, because there is always the possibility that if the bride sends Mary Brown one, she must also send Martha Smith one, because they live next door and she knows them almost

equally well. The well-intending bride and her mother go through all sorts of agony trying to figure out who should be invited and they sometimes omit someone who really should have received the invitation.

Sometimes such problems arise, as whether to send an invitation to Mrs. Black, a good friend of the family, who does not have much money and who is apt to think that she must send a gift in response. So the listmakers get themselves into a dither, without realizing that if Mrs. Black wants to send a gift, she will anyway and besides it might do her good to know that she has been invited, while some of the lesser known acquaintances feel that they have been asked for a gift in receiving the invitation.

Emily Post says that it is optional and it might be better to take the old adage, "The gift without the giver is bare" into consideration and send gifts only to good friends.

Another good point to this line of reasoning is that it is better and easier to buy gifts for those persons that you know than it is for those that you do not know.

Miss Post further states that one should send gifts to showers, but I feel that this should be adhered to only if the hostess has invited close friends of the honoree.

There's More Than Money Involved In Teaching Art

NEW YORK, (U. S. I. SEE) — SOME 250,000 SCHOOL teachers have quit since 1940.

And even more would abandon the field—the average teacher gets on \$1,830 a year—except for children like "the beloved guinea pig."

Here is the story of one teacher who didn't quit:

Mrs. Marie Morris Rushing, a former Pasadena, Tex., teacher now living at Fayetteville, Ark., had written out her resignation and had it in her desk. It wasn't the matter of low salary so much in her case. It was just a feeling that she wasn't helping solve problems of the maladjusted children in her overcrowded fourth-grade class.

A query by one student finally convinced her she should toss in the sponge. The query: "Mrs. Rushing, what does Democracy look like?"

Then she was called to her principal's office and asked to admit a crippled girl to her class.

MRS. RUSHING'S FIRST IMPULSE was to say no. But she couldn't refuse the forlorn but proud little figure with twisted limbs who sat there in silence, anxiously waiting.

"So Polly, our beloved guinea pig, took place in room 4B," said Mrs. Rushing. And the classroom immediately became a Democracy in action.

Its focus was the little crippled girl. "Polly began to make us all aware of our possibilities, both physical and mental wrote Mrs. Rushing in "The Texas Outlook," a teacher publication.

"Often she did this by referring to her

own handicap. She said that in a Democracy the strong protect the weak, that everyone has a voice."

Polly had that gift of truly great personalities—the gift of bringing out the best in those around them.

"I found that little by little she was doing away with even my discipline problems," recalled Mrs. Rushing. "She would reproach an offender and cause public opinion to turn against him."

In their turn the children did everything to help Polly. They carried her pack saddle to the cafeteria. They tried to teach her to walk—and she did learn to take a few halting, fearful steps.

We Must Offer Communists No Encouragement In Trade

PAUL G. HOFFMAN, ECONOMIC CO-operation administrator, assures us that Marshall Plan aid will be cut off from any country going Communist—or Fascist for that matter.

That's a timely and encouraging reaffirmation of a policy which must be ironclad if the democracies are to win their life-and-death fight against Communism. There can be no half-way business in combating the Red ism, despite the soppy sentimentality which is being bandied about in favor of appeasing the Bolsheviks.

This American policy regarding Communism (and Fascism, if it should crop up) is, in theory at least, the policy of Britain and the rest of the Marshall Plan nations. It's avowed purpose is to prevent democracies from being forced into Communism.

However, I believe it cuts much deeper and that we are safe in saying it also is designed to whittle down the war potential of Russia and her satellites. This is a purely defensive measure.

NOT ONLY DOES THIS POLICY APPLY to the Marshall Plan but it affects general economic relations with the Red bloc. Most, and perhaps all, of the democracies are continuing limited trade with Russia and her satellites, but transactions broadly speaking are restricted to those things which do not strengthen the Communists militarily.

This paradoxical situation naturally gives rise to the query of why there should be any trade at all.

Appropos of nothing (and just for a smile), back in World War I those of us who were at the front knew there was a tacit understanding between the Germans and the Allies in some sectors that Army and divisional headquarters shouldn't be bombed. The reasons for this were quite understandable—at least to the brass hats, if any airman inadvertently dropped a bomb

on an enemy army headquarters, it was dog-gone certain that retaliation would be exacted in kind.

HOWEVER, TO RETURN TO OUR MUST, eastern Europe has certain commodities that western Europe needs, and vice versa. So there is trade in such things that don't involve the war-potential. Perhaps it isn't an ideal arrangement, but it is a horse-sense one.

Of course there are some items of trade which fall within the gray zone, that is, no matter how carefully trade is screened, some things useful in war will get through. For example, a microscope might be extremely useful under certain circumstances but you certainly couldn't class it with a high-explosive.

Anyway this gray zone isn't a thing we have to worry about too much. Our worry should be lest we forget that Communism must be fought with every ounce of our strength both on the battle-front and at home.

Neither comfort nor encouragement can be offered it.

Republicans Score Maine Grand Slam

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 14. — Rep. Margaret Chase Smith won a Senate seat with two new records—majority and percentage—in yesterday's Maine election—another Republican grand slam.

She and other GOP leaders hailed the results as indicative of a smashing victory for the Dewey-Warren ticket in November.

The 56-year-old senator-elect called her vote "wonderful" and "forerunner of a great Republican national victory."

First Republican woman elected to the Senate, Mrs. Smith also is the first of her sex elected without first having served by appointment. In the seventh straight GOP clean sweep of top offices Republicans also named a governor and three congressmen.

Unofficial tabulations of practically complete returns gave Mrs. Smith 154,697 votes and Dr. Adrian H. Scofield (D) 61,837.

Mrs. Smith's majority—92,860—bettered a 20-year-old record of 82,481, set in the 1928 gubernatorial contest.

Her percentage, 71.4, was 1.1 percent over the previous mark set by Gov. Horace Hildreth four years ago when the total vote was less than in 1928.

Gubernatorial results: Frederick G. Payne (R) 141,718; Louis B. LaSalle, democratic mayor of Biddeford, 73,971.

Rep. Robert Hale won a fourth

term in the first district with a vote of 32,947 to 31,498 for James A. McVicar, former democratic state chairman.

Charles P. Nelson, Mayor of Augusta, won Mrs. Smith's second district house seat beating Benjamin J. Arena, 49,530 to 23,931.

In the third district, Rep. Frank Fellows was returned to his fifth term, polling 35,697 votes to 14,306 for Democratic National Committeeman F. Davis Clark.

Ball, Humphrey Test Strength in Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 14. — Sen. Joseph H. Ball, Republican, and Mayor Hubert Humphrey of Minneapolis, candidate for the democratic-farmer-labor nomination for senator, test their strength in the Minnesota primary election today.

Ball has two opponents and Humphrey one, but even during their pre-primary campaigns, they aimed their shots at each other.

They have banged away principally at stands on the Taft-Hartley Act and rationing and price control.

Ball has defended the Taft-Hartley Act, which he helped write. Humphrey says it should be repealed. Humphrey advocates rationing and price control of scarce items to halt inflation. Ball opposes rationing and price control in peacetime.

Ball's primary opponents are Lenore Irene Busmann, St. Paul housewife, and Earl L. Miller, Aitkin filling station operator. Neither has made a statewide campaign.

Humphrey, who led the fight at the democratic national convention for a strong civil rights plank, heads a slate of candidates endorsed by the Minnesota wing of the party supporting President Truman. His opponent for the senatorial nomination is James M. Shields, of Minneapolis, choice of the fac-

Michigan Vote Draws Little Public Interest

DETROIT, Sept. 14. — Two questions confronted puzzled politicians in Michigan's anticipated small primary election today.

The first was the reason behind the lack of interest in a presidential year and the other was a hot battle for Republican delegates in Metropolitan Wayne (Detroit) and Kent (Grand Rapids) counties — scenes of previous "anti-boss" factional fights.

The politicians did not know whether the lack of public interest resulted from absence of major contests in the state elections or whether it was a portent of a November swing.

The state contests were limited to the Democratic Party's races for governor and lieutenant governor and the congressional and legislative campaigns.

Sen. Homer Ferguson (R-Mich) had no opposition for renomination in the Republican primary, while former Rep. Frank E. Hogk of Ironwood, seeking the Democratic senatorial nomination, likewise was unopposed. Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich) does not seek reelection this year.

With Republican Lt. Gov. Eugene C. Keyes unopposed in the primary, the spotlight centered on three Democratic aspirants for governor and two for lieutenant governor.

The Democrats had a choice for Gov. between Burnett J. Abbott Albion industrialist and one-time power in the party; Victor E. Bucknell, Vicksburg attorney, and G. Mennen Williams, former attorney for several federal agencies and member of a wealthy soap family.

Williams had the endorsement of AFL and CIO groups in Michigan. In the Democratic lieutenant governor race were John W. Connolly of Detroit and Victor Targonski of Wyandotte.

BLACKENED AND DESOLATE

Fire Razes Picturesque Ojai Valley, Noted Resort Section

OJAI, Calif., Sept. 14. — With women and children evacuated from two communities, the picturesque Ojai Valley resort area lay blackened and desolate today from a still burning, 12,000-acre forest fire.

The community of Ojai itself and the population of 2,500 felt the fringe of the flames, but a wind shift enabled the hundreds of fire fighters to gain control last night.

Chief Pete Little of the Ventura Fire Department said some 35 homes, including palatial summer dwellings of wealthy Southern Californians, were destroyed, but the fire was halted two blocks short of the business district. Initial damage estimates ran over \$1 million.

U. S. forestry officials estimated an area of at least 12,000 acres of chaparral and scrub oak was burned over. The area is part of Los Padres National Forest.

The community of Meiners Oaks, population of 1,500, also was threatened by the blaze.

Women and children were evacuated from both Ojai and Meiners Oaks to Ventura, where the Red Cross disaster relief set up eating and sleeping facilities in the civic auditorium.

Red Cross operations were headed by disaster experts, Edwin H.

Carroll and Cecil Davis, San Francisco, and James C. Dancy, Los Angeles. Red Cross chapters of Ventura, Santa Paula and Oxnard were alerted to care for evacuees. Ojai's men stayed behind to fight the blaze, which claimed the life of one volunteer fighter, Louis Franklin Hall, 44, of Ojai. Hall was found dead in a field behind his home, apparently the victim of a heart attack.

There was no report of any other serious injury.

Israel Ordered To Readmit Arabs

RHODES, Sept. 14. (U.P.)—Count Folke Bernadotte ordered Israel today to readmit Arab refugees to three villages and to rebuild their shattered homes. He said 8,000 Arabs were driven out and their homes smashed by the Israeli Army in violation of the truce.

The villages are Ein Ghazel, Ijzim and Jaba, south of Haifa, along the Haifa-Tel Aviv highway. Bernadotte, reported to the Security Council that Jewish forces attacked the three villages July 18 at the beginning of the second truce. The Arabs were forced to evacuate after a seven-day land and air attack. Later, he said, the Jewish forces destroyed the villages of Ein Ghazel and Jaba.

Bernadotte said his investigators found 8,000 former villagers in the Jenin area. They placed the number of killed and missing at about 130. Bernadotte said "Arab allegations concerning the number killed and captured are enormously exaggerated."

AUSTIN, Sept. 13. (AP)—The University of Texas expects to play football before 440,000 fans this season with 255,000 of them at home. It will be a new attendance record both for Texas and the Southwest Conference. And Texas appears to have the team to justify such a turnout.

It boasts speed, experience and versatility. It will have top punting and passing. It will show one of the finest lines in the country. Here they think the forward wall will be greatest in Texas football history.

Cocher, however, adds that Campbell could have been used more. "Layne was the big star and the team had confidence in him," Cocher explains. "The crowd came out to see him. There was no need to use Campbell."

Defensively, Texas should be much stronger, says Cocher, who has shifted Dick Harris, former All-Conference center, last year All-America at tackle, back to the pivot post. In this way he will be able to use the line-backing talents of both Harris and Dick Rowan, the 1947 regular center. He plans to have both in the line-up on defense.

Texas isn't deep in lettermen at some positions but on the roster are 31 players who have lettered or been on the squad. Quite a few of the squadmen would have been regulars had it not been for the presence of so many stars last season. There are 21 lettermen, counting three who earned their numerals in years prior to 1947. There is only one letterman back at left tackle and one at left guard but at all other positions there are two and three.

The lone Bronx threat came in the seventh when Ace Mendes doubled, and advanced to third on a sacrifice by Bert Baez. Mendes was tagged out when he attempted to steal home after Echeverria had popped out.

The historic Polo Grounds is fast gaining a reputation as the graveyard of pennant hopes.

Burt Shotton brought his Brooklyn Dodgers into the air of the New York Giants over the week end for a four-game series and left the cigar box with only one victory.

The high-flying Pittsburgh Pirates showed up last night boasting a seven game winning streak and Lippy Leo Durocher's fence busters cooled them off, 5-2.

By knocking off the pursuers of the front-running Boston Braves, very much in the running for the National League flag.

Last night's triumph boosted the Giants into a fourth place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals, five and one half games behind the Braves. The Giants and Cards are only .0005 of a percentage point behind the third place Dodgers, who also trail the Braves by 5 1/2 games.

Lefty Monte Kennedy stopped the Pirates surge, scattering nine hits for his third triumph.

Brooklyn wrested third place from the Cards by dumping the Chicago Cubs, 6-4 in a night game at Brooklyn.

A four-run seventh inning rally enabled the Dodgers to overcome a 3-2 deficit and win. Two singles, two sacrifices, two errors, and two fly balls accounted for the runs.

Only one game was played in the American League, the St. Louis Browns upsetting the third place Indians, 3-2 at Cleveland. Pinch-hitter Joe Schultz singled in the ninth with the bases full to enable the Browns to break a 2-2 tie and win.

The loss left the Tribe three full games behind the first place Boston Red Sox.

The Indians also lost the services of Pitcher Don Black for the rest of the season. Black is in critical condition in a Cleveland Hospital with a hemorrhage near the brain.

Black apparently twisted his neck when he hit a foul ball in the second inning. He fell at the plate in pain, was helped from the field and later lost consciousness. Team Physician Edward Castle, however, said Black had an excellent chance to recover.

(AP)—Sixty four fair ones set out today in the first round of match play to decide the Women's Amateur Golf Championship of the United States, but one of the fairest and best of the field watched the conflict from the sidelines.

With such strong candidates as Medalist Betty Mims White, Dorothy Kiro, and Polly Riley leading the march toward the throne vacated by the 1947 queen, Louise Suggs, pretty Dorothy Kieley of Long Beach, Calif., the ranking threat, bumped into an unbending rule of the United States Golf Association and found herself bounced out of the tournament.

Winner of the recent Western Amateur crown over this same field of the finest in the nation, and California's reigning state champion, Miss Kieley was disqualified after yesterday's round.

She thought she had an eight on the 18th hole, but discovered, quite some time after her card had been turned in, and accorrdit, that she had shot a nine on the weful, ocean bordering hole for a medal score of 89 instead of 82.

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Stockton Looks For Passing As Steers Prepare For Invasion

Big Spring high school gridders, fresh from their first lesson of the season at Brownwood last Friday, buckled down Monday in an effort to make medicine for the Cisco Lobes here Friday evening.

No one in the Steer camp was disposed to minimize the licking the youngsters took the first time out, and even though the tally might have been even higher but for a penalty, actually the Steers made a better fight of it than the count would indicate.

Coach Mule Stockton sent a bunch of almost utter strangers into the fray. Four had some experi-

ence last year, a handful were up from the B string and the balance of his charges were from last year's junior high team.

Out of it came a few sparkling rays of hope. One was Aubrey Armistead at end. This youngster, new to varsity play, acquitted himself so well that coaches removed him only because they wanted to get a look at some other terminals on the squad. Culin Grigsby is on the other end and the wings may be one of the stronger points of the season.

Lack of passing and consistent kicking cost the Steers heavily on their first time out. Stockton had been depending heavily on Amos Jones for the chore, but this lad is out until at least November with surgery and it is doubtful that he will figure in plans for this season. Stockton was trying to conjure a passer.

Virgil Roundtree showed promise in punting, although his peculiar slicing style at ties was erratic. It caused him to completely undercut one ball and have another blocked, but the fact that the Steers pulled out with a 20 yard kicking average despite this is evidence that the remainder of his

kicks were beauties. One rolled about 45 yards and out on the 10 yard line and another was a booming 40-yard offering that gave ends plenty of time to be down under it.

Arlis Davis stamped himself as the running ace of the secondary although he, too, committed some errors due to inexperience. He got nailed several times for his trouble in abandoning interference, but he also turned in some brilliant scampers which came near throwing him into the clear. Donnie Carter, moved back from center, may stick as the fullback regular since he adds a little power and ramming ability to the attack.

Stockton and other coaches were trying desperately to breathe some life into the passing attack. The air arm was utterly impotent Friday, the Steers having passed 11 times for no completions. It hardly loosened the Brownwood ground defense at all.

Beyond that the menu for the Steers was more of the same — work, hard work, and more work. They like it, however. Stockton says he's never seen a scrappier bunch of lads. They're willing to mix it anytime, anywhere.

Necessary Forms For Sorghum Supports Ready

Necessary forms for grain sorghum supports are available at the county AAA office, M. Weaver, administrative assistant, said Tuesday.

Indications are that the storage problem in Howard county will not be too difficult, he said, because of arrangements made by a principal buyer and simultaneously because drought has reduced yields.

Weaver called attention to four options available to the producer. One is to sell outright on the open market.

If the producer is of a mind to hold the grain, he may hold it on his own initiative, or if he wants to hedge at an exceptionally cheap rate, he may sign a purchase agreement with the Commodity Credit Corporation to sell his grain next June at \$2.25 cwt. for No. 2 grade. The charge is one cent per cwt on what the farmer estimates he has. The government will buy the grain at delivery date in any amount up to that he has covered by his one-cent charge.

If the producer wishes to cash in his chips for the support price, he may take the loan and should the market get above the support, he may sell. Under the loan, he has two options—one to have it stored in approved warehouses or elevators, the other to store it at home. Certain requirements will have to be met in the latter instance. In the case of the purchase agreement, however, the producer, hrs no requirements on how his grain is stored, but he should remember that he can sell it only at the grade it brings and that the contract is not valid on grades as low as No. 5.

Bermuda Cleaning Up After Hurricane That Lashed Area

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 14. (AP) — The honeymoon and vacation resort of Bermuda cleared away debris today in the wake of a severe hurricane that lashed the area with winds of 123 miles an hour.

No loss of life was reported and property damage was not extensive.

The hurricane had winds of 140 miles per hour in a small area near the center and heavy squalls and gales extended outward 200 miles from the center.

It whirled northward at 16 miles an hour and the weather bureau said it probably would make a slow curve to the north-northeast, accelerating in a forward movement.

Chief Storm Forecaster Grady Norton said at Miami the hurricane apparently would pass out to sea without any effects being felt along the U. S. coast.

Dawson Venture Develops Shows

Seaboard No. 2 S. E. Lee, a scheduled 10,000-foot wildcat in the Sprayberry (San Andres) pool of southeastern Dawson county, is drilling below 6,735 feet in lower Permian shales and following shows in the Leonard section.

Open tests reported a steady blow of air for 70 minutes on a two-hour drillstem test from 6,457-6,737 feet. Recovery was 540 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 400 feet of fluid, which was half oil and half mud. Open flowing bottomhole pressure was 475 pounds, and shut-in bottomhole pressure after 15 minutes was 1,475 pounds.

Previously, two other deep wildcat tests in the same zone but failed to develop commercial production after testing. No. 2 Lee is 440 feet out of the northeast corner of section 47-34-3N, T&P.

Seaboard No. 2 Tora Campbell, slated Ellenburger venture in northern Howard's Vernalmoor pool, was below 5,250 feet. It is an east offset to the No. 1 Tora Campbell in Borden county, to the northwest. No. 1 Clinton is at 4,218 feet, and is in section 29-32-3N, T&P.

Credit Trends And Policies Outlined In Course At Settles

Credit trends and credit policies to meet the new trends were outlined for 50 people who were on hand at the Settles hotel Monday evening for the opening class of a five-night course on Retail Credit Procedure.

The lecturer was Sterling C. Speake of the University of Texas Extension Division cooperating with the State Board of Vocational Education. The ten-hour course is being offered here under sponsorship of the Big Spring credit women's club.

In a report on business conditions over Texas in his opening lecture Monday evening, Speake pointed out that credit is on an increase throughout the state. It now represents 61 per cent of all retail business, he said, in contrast to a low of 55 per cent last year. The advance, Speake said, is due to the fact that buyers in some instances are using up their cash, and also to more aggressive merchandising by those businesses which are after volume and feel that credit business is advantageous if accounts are handled properly.

Business generally over Texas, Speake said, is about 11 per cent over the 1947 average, and the Texas volume is four to five per cent over the national average.

In line with the increase in credit volume, Speake discussed various types of credit procedures, including open accounts, installment accounts and revolving accounts. He also gave instructions on handling of repossessions, how to trace "skips," handling of profit and loss accounts and various provisions of the statute of limitations.

This evening's session, to be held from 6 to 8 p. m. in Room 1 on the Settles mezzanine, is again open to all store managers, credit and office managers, and people dealing with merchandising credit.

Enrollment for the class may be made for a \$1.50 fee, which covers cost only of necessary literature. Presentation of certificates will mark completion of the course Friday evening.

Mrs. Roy Carter, president of the Credit Women's club, expressed gratification at the large Monday evening turnout, and extended an invitation to all interested persons to be present at other sessions of the course.

Speake this evening will deal principally with credit applications, their various forms and advantages and how to get information for them; emergency charge slips; and a list of "Don'ts" in opening and approving of accounts.

Collings Takes Pruning Shears To 70th District Court Docket

Judge Cecil C. Collings took the pruning shears to the 70th district court docket Tuesday and cut away a sizeable chunk of deadwood.

Half a dozen cases were removed from the docket on motion of plaintiffs and 87 others, of which 66 were old divorce petitions, were expunged from the docket for want of prosecution by the plaintiff. Some of the cases had cluttered up the docket without action since 1943.

'ATMOSPHERE OF SUSPICION' CHARGED

Spy Probers Are Accused Of Making Scientists Quit

BELMONT, Mass., Sept. 14. (AP)—The House Un-American Activities Committee was accused today by a former director of Brookhaven National Laboratory of creating an "atmosphere of suspicion" toward atomic scientists.

Confirming published reports that he had resigned as head of the atomic research project at Brookhaven, N. Y., Dr. Philip M. Morse said last night that the "non-legal

manner in which the committee has been probing the loyalty of scientists has not contributed to peace and quiet and stability."

Dr. Morse, who has returned to his post as professor of physics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said he quit his Brookhaven post July 17.

He said he resigned partly because of the atmosphere created by the committee and the fact that MIT officials "have been at me to come back."

"The manner in which the committee's charges have been flashed across the front pages of newspapers," he said, "gives a man little chance to get back a rebuttal."

He said he was in full agreement with the necessity of investigating atomic workers, but added he objected to the committee's "man-

ner of investigating."

"If conditions improved," he said, "quite a number of the important people who have resigned from government work—there have been at least 50 of them in the past year—would go back."

Dr. Morse would not say, however, whether he would return. He was originally loaned to the project by MIT in 1940.

He said the atmosphere in general had become "uncongenial" as a result of the investigation and added that "we were always having it over our heads."

For this reason, he explained, "the government is finding it increasingly difficult to get qualified people to work on the projects."

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Iraq Merchant Is Given Death Sentence, Fine

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Sept. 14. (AP)—One of Iraq's wealthiest merchants, Shafiq Ades, a Jew, is under sentence of death today on charges that he helped the Jews in Palestine and organized Zionism in Iraq.

The military court which convicted him yesterday also fined him 5 million dinars (about \$20 million). The fine is to be collected at once. The death sentence is subject to approval of the king.

The court's verdict, reached after two months of investigation and a week of court sessions, said: "The military court of the Basra area sentenced Shafiq Ades to death by hanging, with a fine of 5 million Iraqi dinars, which will be obtained from all his property, mobile and immobile, and paid to the Iraqi ministry of defense to compensate for losses of men and material suffered by the Iraqi army."

Lunch is projected for 11:30 a. m. to 12 noon at the Leland Wallace farm after the visitors inspect animals at the Charlie Wolf place.

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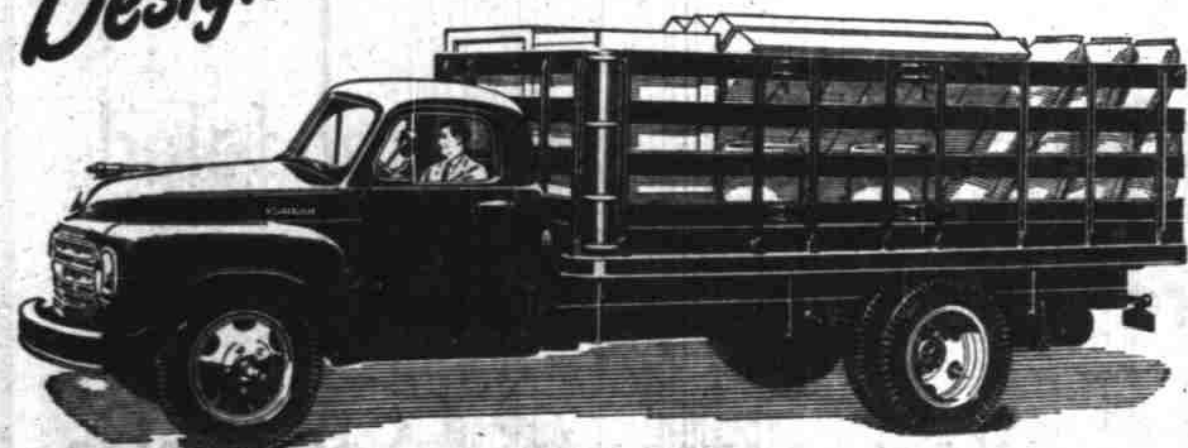
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
