It was the Bulldogs final game before Christmas and their last preceding the four-team blind tourney of Artesia, Hope, Eunice and Tatum to be played here Thursday, Dec. 28.

The blue and gold uniformed Irish and the white and black uniformed Bulldogs were even at 10-all as the first quarter ended.

Mid-Game Offensive
Then the visitors steamed ahead for 17 points while limiting the Orange and Black to a lone half dozen. In the third quarter the Irish duplicated the score, making another 17 points.

Only in the final period did the Bulldogs lead for a single stanza of the game, getting seven points to the Irish pair.

Mustangs Eighth On Rush Offense

Statistics released this week by the National Collegiate Athletic association show New Mexico Western college's 1950 football team attaining national rankings in three divisions, one being attributed to Ralph Craig all conference back from Western.

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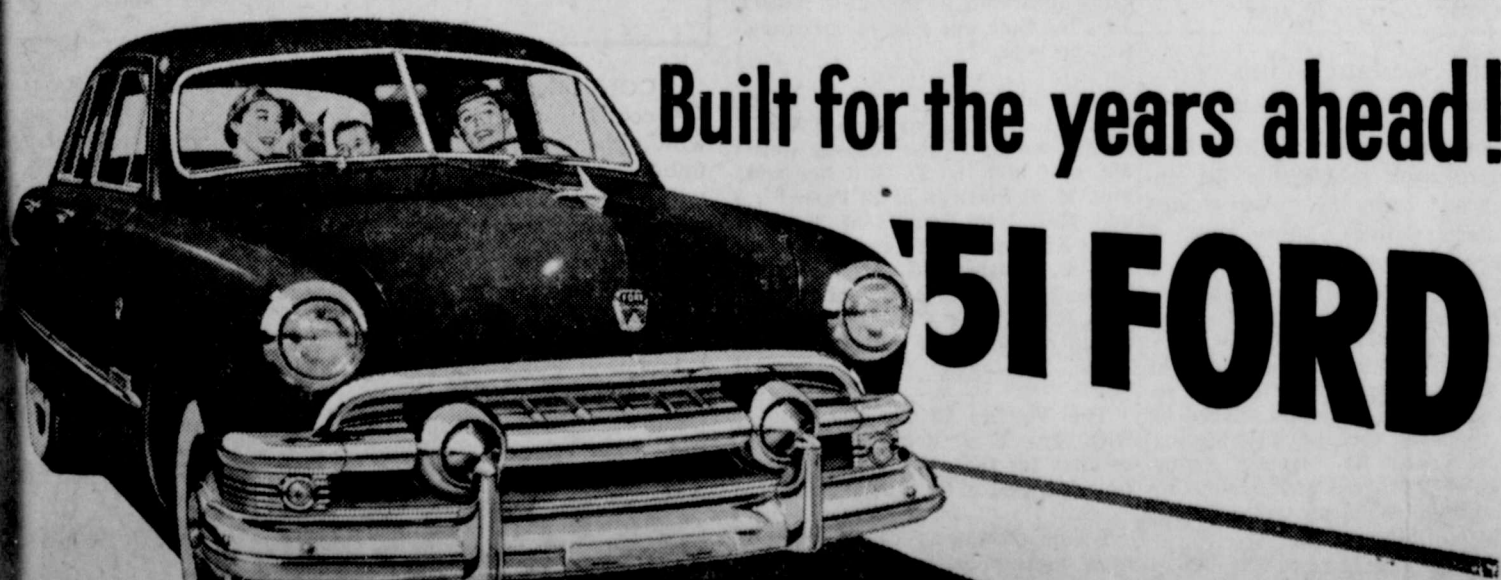

Cut-Off Date for Education Under GI Bill Is Only Seven Months Away

Veterans of World War II planning GI Bill education and training were reminded by Veterans Administration that the July 25, 1951, cut-off date for starting courses is only seven months away.

This coming spring school term will be the final such term most veterans may enter or re-enter before the deadline, VA said, so if they plan to enroll it's not too early to start making arrangements now.

The 1951 deadline applies to most World War II veterans—those discharged from service before July 25, 1947. Those discharged after that date have four years from their discharge date in which to begin.

Veterans actually must have commenced their training by the cut-off date if they want to continue afterwards, VA said. A veteran must be in training on that date unless he has temporarily interrupted his course for summer vacation or for other reasons beyond his control.

Once he completes or discontinues his course of GI Bill training after the deadline, he may not start another course. Also, he must meet the following two post-deadline requirements:

He will be expected to pursue his training "continuously until completion, except for conditions which normally would cause interruption by any student."

And he may change his educational objective "only while in training and then for reasons satisfactory to the administrator." Public Law 610, which permits a veteran to make a first change of general fields of study merely by applying for it, will not be in effect after the cut-off date, VA said.

Special consideration will be given to four categories of veteran-trainees who, for reasons beyond their control, either may not be in a position to remain in continuous training afterwards.

The categories are: Veterans who have started GI Bill studies and interrupt them to go back into active military or naval service; veterans who completed pre-medical and pre-dental GI Bill schooling and can't get into a medical or dental school by deadline time; teachers who spend their summers taking training leading to a degree; and those who complete GI Bill undergraduate courses and intend to go ahead with graduate training which would start after the deadline date.

Those who had to stop training in order to return to active duty will be permitted to resume their training within a "reasonable period" after their release from service even though they get out after the deadline date.

They must meet these two requirements: The conduct and progress of their GI Bill course must have been satisfactory; and the period of training obtainable after they get out of uniform will be limited to their remaining GI Bill entitlement.

Veterans who have taken GI Bill pre-medical or pre-dental courses but have not yet gained admittance

to medical or dental schools, will be permitted to start medical or dental training whenever an accredited school has room for them—even if it's after the cut-off date.

They must, however, establish the fact that they applied for admission each year after completing their GI Bill preliminary training. The special provision applies regardless of whether a veteran's pre-medical or pre-dental studies end before or after July 25, 1951.

Former servicemen and women in the third category—those who take GI Bill graduate courses during succeeding summer vacations—may continue to do so after the 1951 cut-off date.

A teacher will have to meet certain qualifications. His study must lead toward a degree; he must be continuously employed as a school teacher the remainder of the year, and he may not skip any GI Bill summer sessions.

Summer training by teachers for the purpose of getting a degree is a "long recognized practice" of the profession, VA pointed out. Because of the veteran-teacher's "unique" position, VA said it will consider him to be in "continuous pursuit of his course" within the meaning of the governing law and regulations, so long as he takes courses each summer with the objective of receiving a degree.

The final category consists of veterans who finish GI Bill undergraduate courses and intend to go ahead with graduate training which would start after the deadline date.

VA regulations provide they may do so, as long as they file an application for their advanced training sometime before they complete their undergraduate work. They must start the additional training at the end of their summer vacation period, and the graduate course must be a "normal progression" of previous studies.

A veteran who receives his A.B. degree in business administration in June, 1951, for example, could start work on his master's degree—also in business administration—that September, if he applied to VA in time.

This ruling also pertains to those who finished undergraduate studies after the 1951 date, and wish to

continue advanced studies at the end of their vacation period.

VA emphasized that most veterans may not receive training after July 25, 1956, the wind-up date of the program.

The only exception consists of those who enlisted or re-enlisted between Oct. 6, 1945, and Oct. 5, 1946, under the Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act. Those veterans have four years from the end of their enlistment or re-enlistment period in which to begin GI Bill training and nine years from the end of that period in which to finish.

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Your State Government

In closing my administration and turning this, next to my last, week's article for the state press, I would like to point to some of the achievements of my administration during my two terms as governor.

Our state has made considerable progress in economic development and population growth in the last four years. I see nothing to hinder slow down our continued growth, and expansion in the direction of improved public facilities and services which make for even happier and more prosperous people, unless it be another war. And that, a united people here and in all America are making every honorable effort to avoid. I believe it can be avoided.

But to recount some of the special accomplishments under my administration:

1. We have built approximately 100 miles of highways and have maintained our highways at an average cost of \$382 per mile, which is a much lower maintenance cost than that of any adjacent state, keep: one.
2. Let contracts for phase 1 and phase 2 of the capitol office building and remodeling program. Payment for the building is being made out of accumulated savings. No bond issue or other financing was necessary.
3. Established the Economic Development Commission, which is bringing new industry and equalizing freight rates in the state.
4. Increased the Tourist Bureau budget from an average \$75,000 at prewar years to \$271,000 annually. Number of non-resident cars entering the state increased approximately 400,000 annually above the prewar record year.
5. Inaugurated an experimental

control test in artificial rain making, the first state to undertake such a project.

6. Increased the monthly payments of old age recipients by 10 per cent, making it 100 per cent of the need, in spite of an increase of nearly 100 per cent in the number on the rolls.
7. Increased the state appropriation for the Department of Public Health by nearly 300 per cent.
8. Built a home at Las Vegas for the needy aged who are chronically ill.
9. Built a new addition to the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Socorro to care for indigent children afflicted with tuberculosis.
10. Increased the state appropriations for educational institutions by more than three million dollars annually in order to provide proper facilities for veterans and the general enrollment increase.
11. Increased teachers' salaries from an average of \$2300 to \$3400 annually.
12. Put the Highway Department on a pay-as-you-go plan.
13. We consummated the Pecos River Compact, the Upper Colorado River Basin Compact and the Canadian River Compact. These compact all protect New Mexico's interest and guarantee us our full share of the waters of these rivers.

All of these things were accomplished with splendid support from the people, from the various departments of state government and with whole-hearted co-operation of the two state legislatures with whom I worked.

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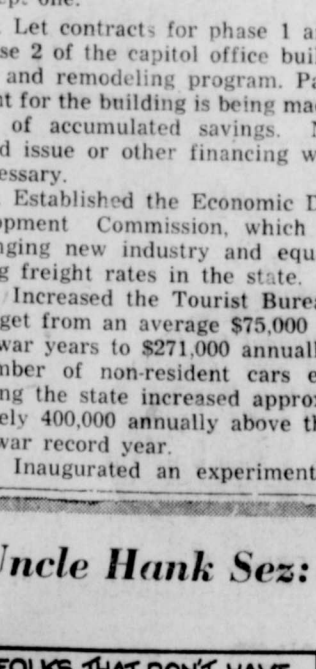


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Are Chickens Free of Lice?

Lice, chicken mites, and other external parasites are a constant threat to poultry flocks. Most raisers recognize this threat, but many fail to protect their birds properly. As a result, far too many flocks are forced to go through a laying season suffering from heavy lice infestation.

Infestation with destructive, blood-sucking, biting-mouth parasites can be extremely harmful to poultry. Lower egg production, anemia, and refusal to lay in nests are some of the typical symptoms of lousy birds. Growing birds also may be troubled with poultry pests. Weak, anemic birds that grow at a slow rate frequently show up as carriers of lice and mites.

The Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association testifies to the damage lice cause birds. In one of the association's recent bulletins, Drs. King and Edgar of the Alabama Experiment Station revealed how the body louse affected laying hens over an 11-month laying period. Louse-free hens in this experiment averaged 11.17 percent greater production than "lousy" hens. The louse-free hens also averaged heavier body weights after five or six months of the first laying year—and the mortality rate was lower.

Such findings as these typically describe conditions found in louse-infected flocks throughout the country.

One of the first precautions in pest control is the enforcement of strict sanitary measures. But perhaps the most effective way to combat poultry house pests is through regular delousing.

Of course, the ideal time to delouse birds is when you place pullets in the laying house. However, now is not too late. You can still do an effective job of delousing by treating your layers this month with a good commercial lice killer.

For complete control, take specific action against the most damaging kinds of poultry pests. To rid your poultry house of red mites, pests that hide in cracks and crevices of the poultry house in the daytime and prey on birds at night, spray all quarters with an effective pest spray. To control lice and feather mites, parasites that spend their entire life cycles on birds, paint the roosts with a good commercial roost application.

Proper use of the methods and treatments mentioned above will give you a sound pest-control program.

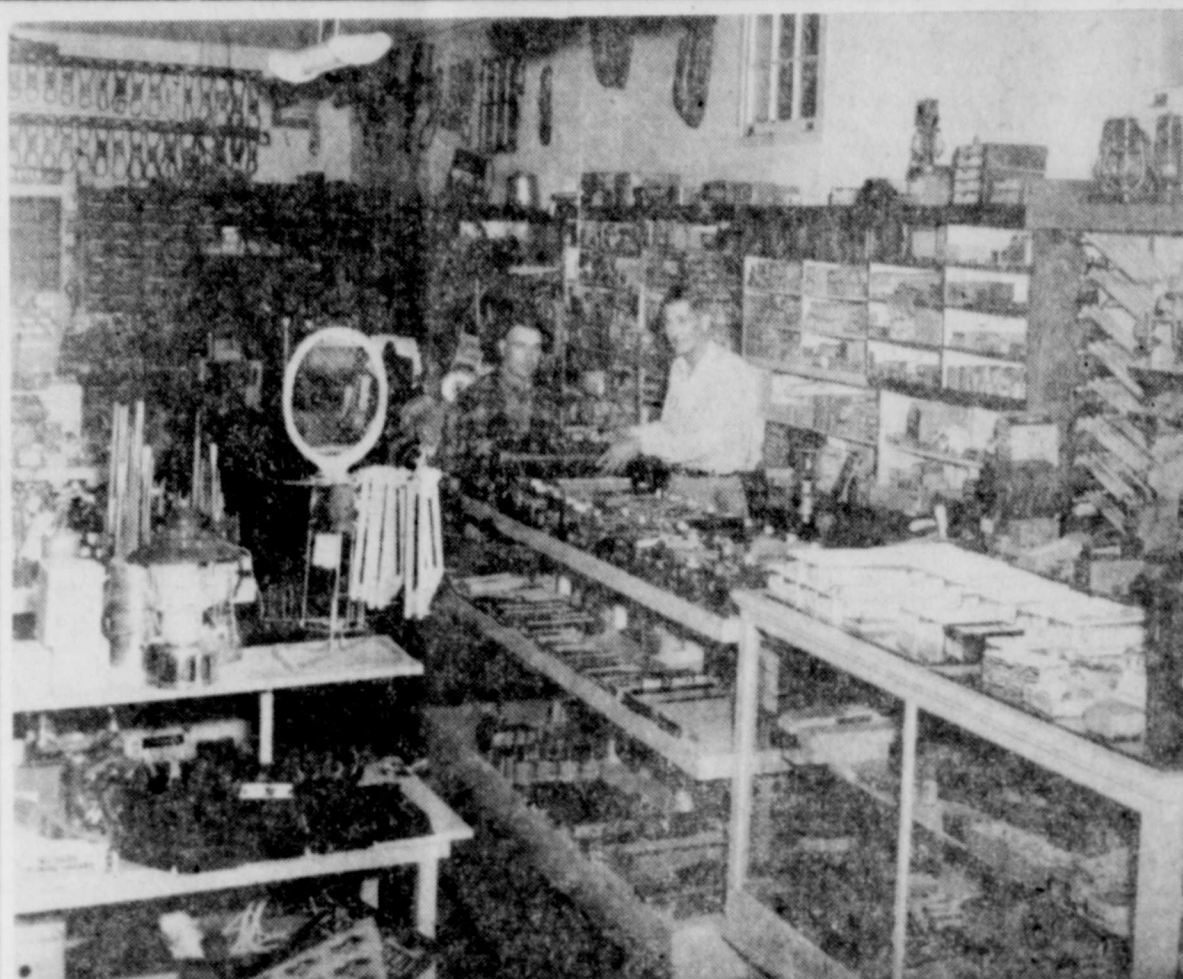

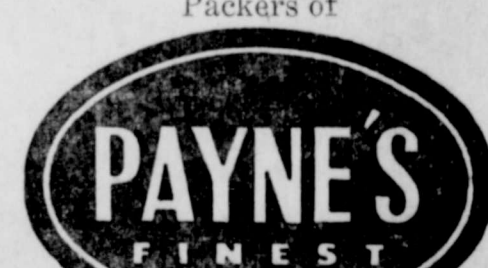

Bulletins on Verticillium Wilt Are Released

Two publications on verticillium wilt of cotton in New Mexico were recently released by the New Mexico Agricultural Experiment Station. In one, Bulletin 356, "Effects of Certain Cultural Practices on Verticillium Wilt of Cotton in New Mexico," P. J. Leyendecker, Jr., associate plant pathologist with the

station, reports his findings from four years of research on verticillium.

The 28-page bulletin is fully illustrated to show how the fungus attacks cotton plants at all stages of their development, and how it lowers the yield and quality of cotton lint. Charts and tables in the bulletin show results from various tests with cultural practices in verticillium infested fields, and indicate that the severity of the fungus can be lessened with certain of the practices.

In Press Bulletin 1044, "Spread of Verticillium Wilt to Disease-Free Soils by Infected Cotton Stalks," Leyendecker and Lester Mank,

senior plant pathologist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, present their results from a one-year experiment with dead diseased cotton stalks. They found that pieces of the stalks can definitely spread the disease from one part of a field to another, or from one field to another.

Copies of these publications may be obtained from the Experiment Station, State College, or from county extension agents.

The dairy calf should be born in a pen or stall that is free of soiled material and has plenty of clean bedding.

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Methodists to Join Mid-Century Prayer for Peace

Local Methodists will join Sunday, Dec. 31, with the denomination's nearly nine million members in a national mid-century prayer for peace. It was announced by the Rev. R. L. Willingham, pastor of First Methodist Church.

He said the call to special prayer was sounded by the Methodist Council of Bishops and the church's General Board of Evangelism in view of the "exceptionally grave condition of the world today."

In a letter to pastors of 42,000 Methodist Churches, the board urged every congregation to unite in "a chain of prayer on 'Mid-Century Sunday,' beseeching God's guidance in converting a world crisis to a just and lasting peace."

Declaring that "mankind's hope for freedom is in desperate jeopardy," the plea for prayer coincided with a similar request by the president of the new National Council of Churches, Episcopal Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, of New York. He urged all Protestants to offer prayers on Dec. 31 for "a peace which is the fruit of righteousness."

The letter to pastors, stressing individual and group participation, stemmed from the following call by Methodist bishops:

"With a sense of deep urgency we call our fellow Methodists and all others who will to join us in special prayer."

"Let us pray daily for the leaders of our country and of the United Nations, that God will give them wisdom and courage to seek and to do His will."

"Let us pray for all who are under the shadow of war; for those who do battle for us... the homeless, the hungry, the children. Let us pray for our enemies that God may lead them in the way of righteousness and peace."

Side Streets— (Continued from page one) year it will again be bladed and thoroughly wet down and rolled with a pneumatic roller.

The city supervisor said the caliche is being spread to a depth of about three and a half inches. This will pack to two to two and a half inches.

A number of the side streets receiving the improvement are in the south part of the city adjacent to Washington Avenue. Others are in the north end in the Negro and Spanish-American neighborhoods.

Included in the work is the improving of North East Street to the east side of Artesia Municipal Park. Josey said he hopes it will be possible to apply a seal coat to the caliche streets next summer.

Jess told us verbally that it gets him how some people who wouldn't think of stealing a pair of socks or accepting more change than they have coming will attempt to cheat the government out of a penny by writing messages on greeting cards which are mailed in unsealed envelopes and carry only 2-cent stamps.

But here's one which Jess doesn't know about and which was unintentional, we are sure. At any

rate, a Christmas card was delivered, without postage, but with no breach of postal regulations.

The card was sent by one of the fellows in The Advocate shop to another member of the staff and his wife. It was one of a stack which he mailed.

It happened we picked up the mail one day last week, and when we sorted it at the office, there was one card stamped, "Returned for postage," and in the upper corner was the name of the sender, indicating a postal employee had opened the envelope to discover the name of the sender, and it was tossed in The Advocate box.

So, instead of returning the card to the sender—who, like Jess, knows nothing about this—we handed it to the fellow to whom addressed.

Thus through a quirk of circumstance, mail was delivered as intended, without postage, but with no breach of postal regulations.

Now we have a letter from Bob Koonce, manager of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce, who read what we wrote about someone on the Angel ranch killing 13 quail more than the limit and leaving them to rot. He wrote:

"I support your anti-gamehog campaign by also becoming fighting mad. Furthermore, my opinion is that an aroused public opinion, spearheaded by a crusading press, is our chief hope in wildlife conservation. Keep laying it on, and maybe other editors will take up the cudgel."

"Having located a nice covey of blues during dove season on land where I had obtained permission, I was on the spot at noon on opening day accompanied by Bill Siegenthaler. No quail; just tire tracks all over the pasture. Not satisfied, I checked the spot three more times, but never did I see a single one of the 50 or so birds. Some skunk—and I don't mean the variety with four legs and a stink bag—had cleaned them out. My neighbor, Paul Chipman, found his favorite covey so badly scattered, reduced in numbers and wary that he was convinced someone had been hunting them long before open season."

"In common with many sportsmen, I think there are superfluous technicalities and unfair regulations in our game laws, such as the fields, or the illegality of maybe potting a bird for a less fortunate hunting companion."

"However, these are petty items just when they start winging in to shooting deadline half an hour before sundown on prairie chickens, indeed when compared to the crime of exterminating even the seed for future crops, or the unfairness to fellow men in hunting out of season. Even this business of wearing a pasture out by frequent driving around might result in a loss of subsequent hunting rights. It is my outraged opinion that, regardless of charity donations, love of country, or fear of God, the deliberate gamehog is a thief and a man wanting in moral principles."

"Your item on the John Fanning swan has me wondering whether a fowl so large could have been a trumpeter swan. They are making a big comeback, you know, from the verge of extinction, and there must be all of 300 of them on the face of the earth, mostly in a game refuge in Wyoming, where wardens are on duty around the clock to keep the gamehogs out."

"These warped characters should ponder that a moment, and also the heath hen, the passenger pigeon, the flamingo, and even the buffalo. If, in the face of a growing population, they do not come to the obvious conclusion and mend their ways, then they are also the betrayers of posterity."

Just one more letter, this one from Kay Booker, president of the

Student Council of Artesia School, to J. Lloyd Walker, ruler of the Elks Lodge:
