Grady Students Get Bus Ride Into Stanton

STANTON — The high school pupils who attend school here from Grady are now getting their transportation furnished.

At a meeting of the Martin County School Board, a bus route was approved from Grady to Stanton, with Grady agreeing to furnish a bus.

At present there are 18 pupils riding the bus to Stanton, according to County Judge Jim McCoy, while the rest of the pupils attend school at Flower Grove. There is no clear-cut division between the Flower Grove and Stanton boundaries, McCoy said, because the schools may be sent to whichever school the parents prefer.

The problem arose a few months ago when the Stanton School Board voted to charge a \$110 fee for each pupil being transferred from another district. The figure was based upon a study made by the board to determine the actual cost of educating a child for the nine months term. The board members say the \$110 plus the per capita money is required to reach the break-even point.

Principals Will Go To P-TA Convention

All elementary school principals in Big Spring are due to attend the state Parent-Teacher Association state convention in Fort Worth on Nov. 16-18, Mrs. Neil Norred, city council president, said Thursday.

Dr. L. V. Norman, director of elementary education, said that he also plans to attend the meeting, and Thomas Earnest, principal at Junior high is planning to go. W. C. Blankenship, superintendent, said that principals had been cleared for attendance.

In addition, most of the local units of the P-TA will send official delegates to the state meet, said Mrs. Norred.

AT MEETING HERE

Regional Farm Leaders To Talk Cotton Acreage Allotment Plan

Farm leaders from 24 West Texas counties will gather at Howard County Junior College at 10:30 a.m. Friday to discuss the recent proposal by the State Agricultural Stabilization Committee and, in effect, transfers about 260,000 allotment acres from West Texas to Central and East Texas. Jimmie Greene, manager of the local Chamber of Commerce, said the acreage cuts would affect approximately 835 farms in Howard County. The loss to this county would be about 5,500 acres, he said, valued at about \$400,000.

The meeting Friday was called by Fred Husbands, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Loyal H. Walker, manager of the regional Chamber's agricultural and livestock department, will conduct the meeting. It is the third of three meetings planned by the WTCC to discuss the proposals. The other two meetings were held earlier in the week at Plainview and Haskell.

Runway Resurfacing Work Under Way At Webb AFB

The Jarbet Company has started an \$87,500 runway resurfacing project at Webb Air Force Base. The base's east (jet) runway is getting a 1 1/2-inch coating of asphalt for its entire 10,000-foot length. Contract for this is \$79,500. In addition, Jarbet has an \$8,000 contract for resurfacing approaches.

The project is under the supervision of Maj. John T. Gaffey, air engineering officer for Webb. It is expected to be completed by Nov. 10.

Webb jets are conducting most of their daily operations from the auxiliary strip near Colorado City while the resurfacing is under way. The planes leave Webb each morning, operate off the Mitchell strip during the day, and return to the home base at night. No interruption of flying is expected to result from the runway work.

Cotton farmers, ginners and oil mill operators, county ASC committees, Farm Bureau representatives, and other interested persons have been invited to the meeting.

Under marketing quotas established for 1956, as required by law, the Texas cotton acreage allotment is to be cut four per cent below the 1955 allotment. Because of the State committee's proposed method of allocating a 700,000 acre reserve, West Texas acreage will be reduced about seven per cent while other parts of the state will receive an actual increase, according to Walker.

Greene said that all interested persons in the area had been invited to the meeting. George Mahon, congressman from this district, had been invited also, but had a previous commitment and will be unable to attend. Mahon was one of the first to call the acreage decrease to the attention of local leaders.

Chambers of Commerce throughout the area have been encouraging interested persons to write letters in protest of the acreage cuts. These letters have been sent to all the State ASC committees.

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Stanton Bank Asks Judgment In Eberley Case

The First National Bank of Stanton is asking 118th District Judge Charlie Sullivan to disregard the jury's answers to special issues in the trial of a suit against Mr. and Mrs. Charles Eberley of Big Spring and to enter an \$81,000 judgment for the bank.

In event that motion is not granted, however, the bank requests a judgment based upon the jury's answers.

The plaintiff contends that Eberley's acknowledgement of a note and deed of trust constituted an adoption of the act of the person who signed the note and deed, even though he didn't sign the instruments. Consequently, it is argued, both instruments are binding on Eberley "as a matter of law," and not as a fact question for the jury to decide.

The jury found Sept. 24 that Eberley did not sign the \$81,000 note and deed of trust on which the judgment is asked. The panel found, however, that Mrs. Eberley represented to Jim Tom, Stanton bank president, that Charles Eberley had signed other instruments and that Tom had relied on the representations in providing Mrs. Eberley various sums totaling \$47,000.

It is for the \$47,000 sum that the alternative judgment is asked.

Naturally I would think that the British have a weird sense of humor. Occasionally, their films do show remarkable tendencies toward real honest humor, but generally, they miss the boat as far as I am concerned.

I can also agree with them when they offer criticism about our humor. Many things that they criticize, (Ma and Pa Kettle for one), appears to have a certain amount of merit. Our television shows and movies receive the greatest amount of adverse criticism from over the water.

James F. King rounds up some comments here:

An invasion of American TV is enlivening Britain's battle between sponsored and noncommercial television—but really, when should one laugh and when should one just titter?

Some Englishmen, while appreciating the slickness of the Yankee shows, don't appreciate raucous laughter dubbed in—they think in the wrong places.

American comedy films are presented here with the original sound effects, including laughs, intact. Ramsden Greig, Evening Standard critic says:

"This is often aggravating—these American bellylaughs over a gag that would bring to a Briton only a titter. It's just a difference in sense of humor."

Both the government-subsidized British Broadcasting Corp. and the independent TV network, which lives on advertising, are making their biggest bids for audiences through American programs.

BBC, omitting commercials, pre-

sents Amos and Andy, The Burns and Allen Show and I Married Joan.

Independent TV has countered with the pianist Liberace, who appears on a choice Sunday afternoon spot, and "Dragnet" and "I Love Lucy."

English versions of American shows like People Are Funny have brought sharp criticism.

Kendall McDonald, London Evening News critic, commented:

"A gentleman from the audience mounted the platform in full knowledge that someone might either cover him with whitewash or set fire to his trousers."

"What they did was to pour over him a sort of Irish stew . . . to the accompaniment of squeals of joy . . . in the audience. This did not seem to prove to me in any way the contention that people are funny but just that they are rather sad. Or perhaps, that we laugh at vastly different things."

Liberace has created a wide difference of opinion, just as he has at home.

Daily Sketch critic Leslie Watkins summed up his review giving both sides:

"We met him (Liberace) in many moods . . . He paused, choked with emotion. 'Isn't that beautiful?' he asked. Not beautiful, Mr. Liberace. It was murder."

Ike May Discuss Political Scene With Top Advisor, Brownell

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Brownell is flying out to Denver tomorrow and the trip raises speculation that President Eisenhower may now want to discuss the political situation with his top adviser in that field.

It is generally recognized that the 51-year-old attorney general is "the wizard" in political matters for this administration, and that the President frequently turns to him for advice in such matters. In announcing the other day that Brownell had been invited to the President's bedside, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said that Justice Department business would be discussed. This might well concern two presidential nominations — from Justice Department ranks — to two judgeships, both of which were sidetracked in the last Congress.

The men involved are Solicitor General Simon E. Sobeloff of Baltimore, nominated for the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals at Richmond, Va., and Asst. Atty. Gen. Warren E. Burger of Minneapolis, proposed for a place on the U.S. Court of Appeals here.

Both nominations evoked opposition and never got out of committee before the session ended. The

question of resubmission in the January session now has to be settled.

Discussion of this business of course would not preclude some further talk about politics, perhaps including the President's heart attack and its implications for 1956. The meeting of the two will be the first since Eisenhower was stricken.

Brownell's reputation for skillfully masterminding difficult political situations stems from his close 25-year association with Thomas E. Dewey, two years of service as chairman of the Republican National Committee, the management of two Dewey bids for the presidency, and finally his major role in the successful Eisenhower campaign of 1952.

There are politicians in both parties who believe that if the President is not to run for a second term, he will have to make that fact known before the end of

the year in order to give other Republican aspirants time to build up their forces for the August convention in San Francisco.

Or, some Republicans say, the President might publicly put some one on the shoulder, indicating "This is my choice," and thus settle the San Francisco dust before it has arisen from an intra-party fight over the nomination.

Brownell goes to New York today to attend the Al Smith Dinner there tonight. He will fly direct from there to Denver.

Ike's Improvement Keeps Pace With Medic Forecasts

DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower's improvement kept pace today with advance calculations of his physicians as he turned to one of his favorite hobbies—painting—in another step toward recovery.

He divided part of a day of relaxation between viewing the majestic Rockies from the sundeck outside his hospital room and painting another view of the same mountains from a colored print taken from a magazine.

The fact that it has been nearly four weeks since he was stricken with a heart attack Sept. 24, and there have been no complications, encouraged speculation that a date soon will be set for his flight back East to begin a period of convalescence.

The painting started yesterday, not long after the 65-year-old President concluded a 25-minute foreign policy review with Secretary of State Dulles, and just before he conferred on other government affairs with his chief deputy Sherman Adams.

Adams leaves today for Washington to attend tomorrow's meeting of the Cabinet. And the President won't have another conference until tomorrow when Atty. Gen. Brownell arrives by plane to talk over Justice Department problems.

This is part of the pattern this week of keeping the President abreast of developments by Cabinet-level conferences a day apart.



In Lubbock last Sunday the motorists were having a hard time getting down the streets in the east side of the business section. I got caught in a stream of slow traffic and had to wait while the traffic light changed four times before I could move on.

There must have been between two and three thousand cotton pickers in a three block radius. Many of them were native workers, I'm sure, because they had their families with them. For some reason Lubbock has always been the mecca for cotton pickers.

The Lubbock merchants have no opening or closing time. As long as a dozen workers are on the streets, the stores stay open. Sunday there were clothing stores, groceries, variety and hardware stores open, with all of them doing a brisk business. A few years ago I knew a barber up there who opened his shop for braceros and natives and made more money in two months than he had made the previous ten.

Between Big Spring and Lubbock one can see a lot of late maize and hegar that may not be combined. Some of it is still so green that only an exceptionally late frost date will save it. Most of the early grain sorghums in that area are a good deal better than they are in Howard County.

One farmer from Littlefield said that his irrigated maize would make about 3,500 pounds. This wasn't much money, he said, because he watered it four times and was out some other expense. He figures that cotton will make three dollars profit for every one that he gets from his maize.

Several Hereford sales are coming up the next few months. There is one at Abilene next month and one at Amarillo in December. There are no local consignors for the first show, but Leland Wallace has two females and Charlie Creighton has a bull for the Amarillo sale, which will be an Anxiety 4th Sale.

The regular Howard County-South Plains Hereford Association Sale will be held the first week in January. This attracts animals from several surrounding counties. There will be about 45 bulls and 25 females for sale, according to Charlie Creighton, president of the association.

The demand for cotton pickers has stepped up considerably the last few days, said Leon Kinney of the Texas Employment Commission. His office has received nearly 40 orders for laborers and each farmer wants from 5 to 30 hands.

Kinney said not many more native workers will be available, though some farmers prefer them to the braceros. The natives do not often require housing and cooking facilities. While many of the bigger farmers have such facilities, a lot of small farmers have no place to put the braceros. With the small acreage they have, they are hesitant about building such houses. Kinney said they recently got one large crew from Ohio. These were natives of Texas but were up

in Ohio working in the bean crop or something else. They wrote back asking about jobs, were told to come on down here, and are now working in the Ackerly community.

Max Holder, the postmaster and grocery store man at St. Lawrence, is now in the irrigated farming business. For several years Max had his dryland farm rented out and got almost no rent. Neither did anyone else, because dryland just doesn't produce at St. Lawrence except during the wet years. A few weeks ago Max got a 250-gallon well, and is ready to start irrigating. He planned to put in a winter oat crop, but said he might not have time. He has come up with an idea that a half dozen irrigation farmers have thought of, and some of them are already trying it. That is the growing of two crops a year.

"Why keep a well idle six months a year?" Max asked. "I believe we can grow cover crops for grazing during the winter. It will bring in a little money and build up the soil at the same time. A proper rotation with small grain and legumes would probably do the just as good if not better than using so much commercial fertilizer."

Eggs are getting scarce at Stanton, says Mrs. John Shanks, who helps her husband operate a hatchery and feed store. There are few local producers, but the ones who did raise hens are beginning to show a good profit. They are getting 55 cents a dozen already, which is a nickel more than they ever got last year.

The biggest producer in that area is Charlie Blaylock, who has 1,200 caged hens on his ranch about 12 miles south of Stanton. There is also another large chicken house scheduled for Leonora. Mrs. Shanks said some of the caged producers were getting 65 cents for eggs, and the stores which buy them got 75 cents from customers.

Ackerly is busier now than it has been in several years. All the merchants report a good business, and two or three new places have been opened recently. Lonnie Kemp said he had had nearly all he could handle the last few weeks, and even set up another checking out counter to speed up things.

A lot of the boll pullers in the Ackerly area are native workers, Kemp said. Some of them went up to Lubbock to hunt cotton picking but came back south when they found out the prevailing wage was not as high as it is down here.

One Latin-American family went to Lubbock last week and was offered only \$1.25 for pulling. The farmer told them he intended to harvest it with a machine in a few weeks, anyway, and wouldn't pay any more for boll pulling.

Some day mechanical pickers will be perfected to where no hand labor will be needed in the cotton fields. When that happens a big segment of the population in Texas that will have no place to work in the fall of the year. Such an event would probably hurt the laboring class of field workers, but it would be a boon to the cotton grower.

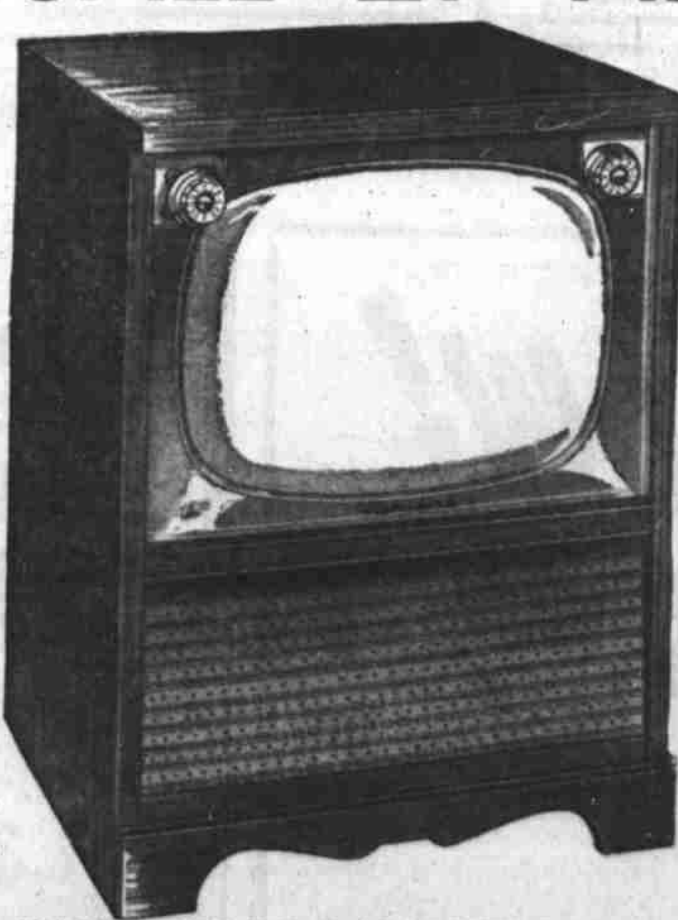
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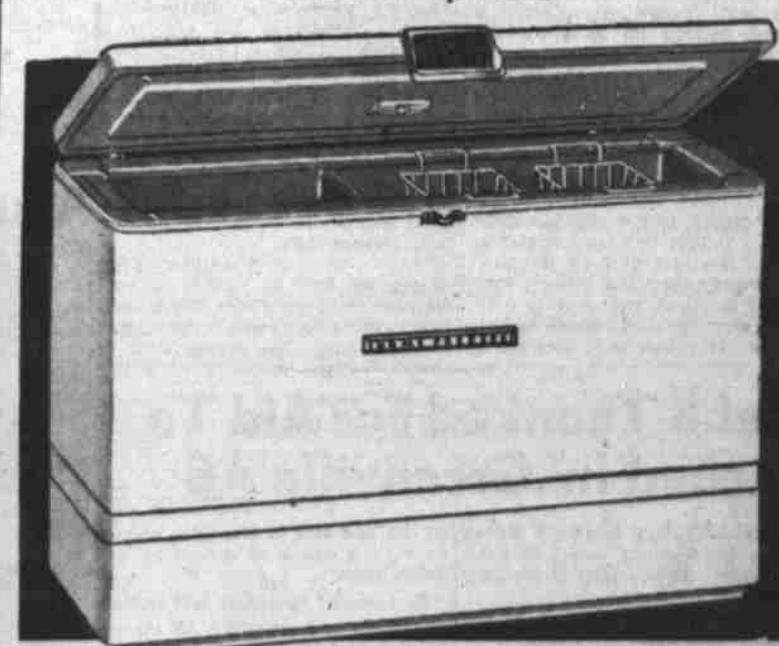

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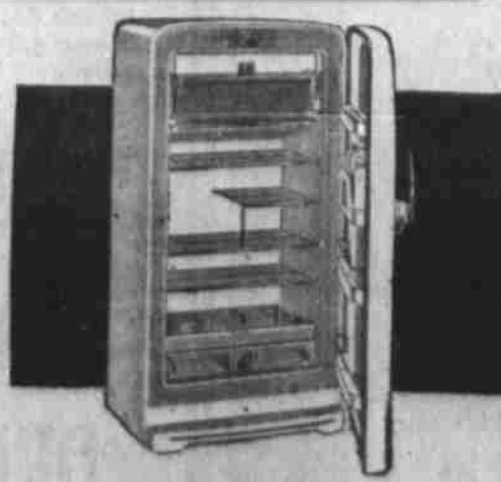

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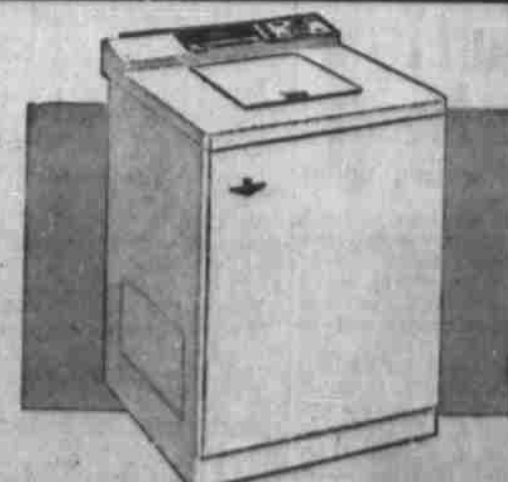
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'Flying Leafworm'

Tarzan Farmers Picking Their Best Cotton Crop

TARZAN — This Martin County village was named after the king of the apes, but it shows very little resemblance to the jungles where Tarzan roamed. Rather it is becoming known as the hub of West Texas cotton production. Perhaps nowhere on the Plains have cotton yields climbed as fast as in the irrigated belt lying a few miles southwest of here.

This year's crop is the best of them all. From an average of a bale per acre a few years ago, the yields have climbed past the two-bale mark and are heading higher. There is a possibility that some farmer may produce three bales to the acre this year, as each year someone adds a hundred or so pounds to his previous year's record.

According to Coy Welch of the Tarzan Marketing Association, there doesn't seem to be any limit on how much an acre will produce if it has plenty of water and fertilizer. But as the yields go up, so do the expenses. He says that several farmers have spent a hundred dollars an acre by the time cotton picking begins.

The best cotton seems to be concentrated in a flat, tightland belt on the west side of Mustang Draw. Here is found the most water, with wells averaging from 500 to 1,000 gallons. The extra water which farmers can use is one factor in yields being heavier here. Another is that the land is flat as a table top and can be irrigated more evenly than the rolling, sand land to the east and south.

This strip of land, which is only a couple of miles wide and six or

seven long, starts near the Andrews Highway and ends on the south near the site of the old Badgett School. Several dozen wells are located in this area. Most of them are old wells, as the section has been drilled out and few new wells are being put down.

An extra well sandwiched in between two existing wells usually lowers the output of the others, so farmers have found it best to use the ones they have.

One big factor in rising yields has been the use of fertilizer. Welch said most growers are now side-dressing the fertilizer while the crop is growing instead of putting all of it in the ground before planting time. There has also been an increase in the use of liquid nitrogen fertilizer. The average farmer uses about 400 pounds of dry fertilizer and from 50 to 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia, Welch said.

Another reason for high production is more frequent dusting for cotton insects. Several growers dusted their cotton from five to eight times this year. Also heavier water applications are used. Most of the cotton grown in this belt is the long-staple 1517C Acala. It doesn't produce any more than short staple cotton, some farmers say, but there is a difference of six to 10 cents a pound in the price. One disadvantage thus far has been that angular leaf spot seems to be worse on the tall, leafy cotton.

This year's crop will average nearly six feet in height. Several farmers think they will make from two to three bales per acre. Homer Howard has 280 acres and is

counting on 600 bales. Edward Smith a mile south of him made almost three bales per acre last year, and has a crop equally as good if not better this season. Troy Pierce and the Glendening brothers have been knocking on the three-bales-per-acre yield for the last year or so, and several other farmers have done just as well.

Several fields are so nearly alike that no one knows who has the best cotton this year. There may even be isolated fields in other places which will out-produce the local crops. But it is a safe guess that no entire community or area will have as high an acre yield as the flatland farms southwest of Tarzan.

Arts and Sciences is the largest of Tech's six academic divisions, with 2,545 students. Next are engineering, with 1,910; business administration, with 1,310; graduate school, 384; and home economics, 371.

Women are outnumbered almost three to one by men in this year's student body but the girls are enrolled in all of the College's divisions except one.

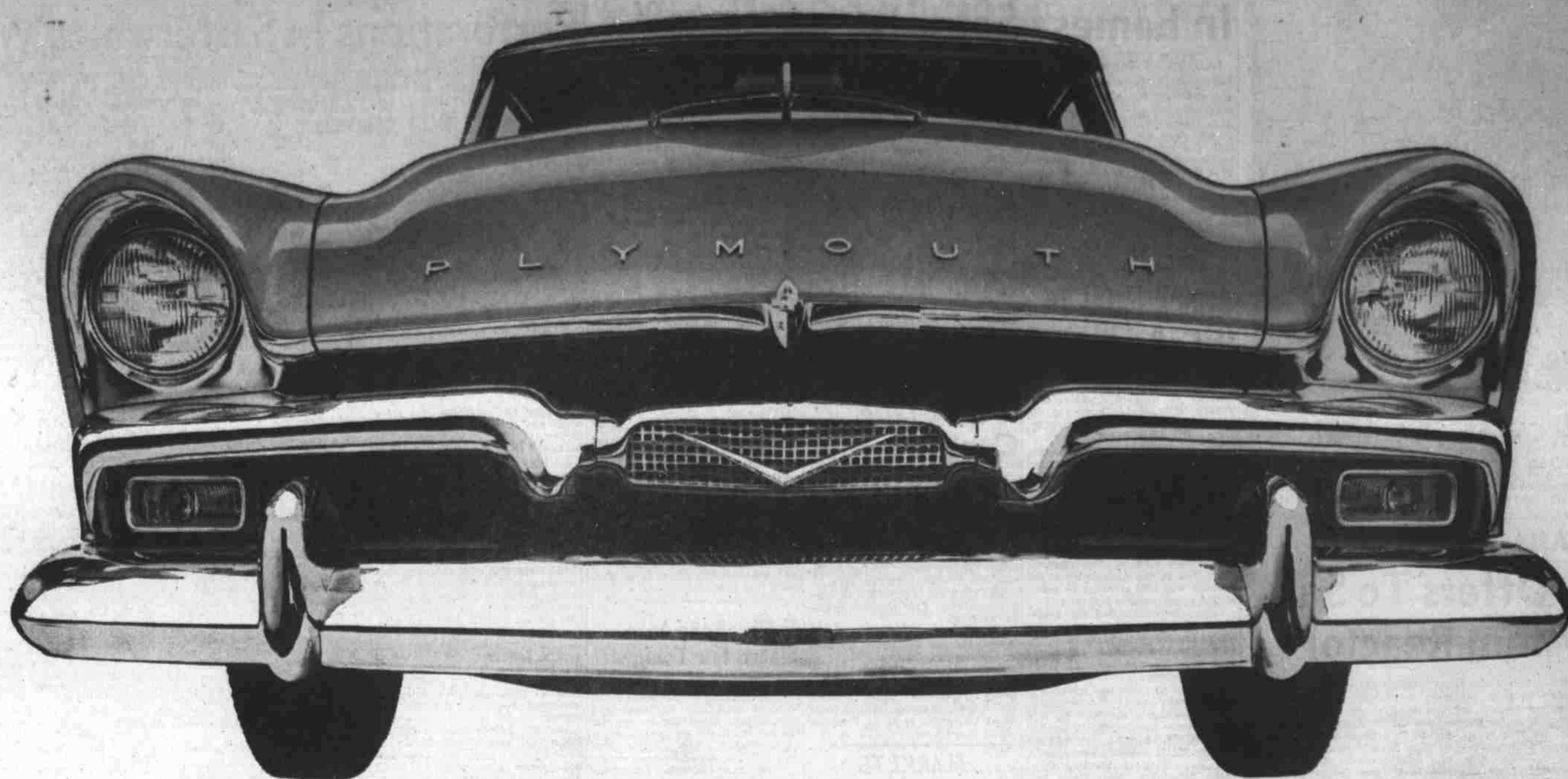

AID TO ASIA

U.S. Offers To Set Up Atom Reactor

SINGAPORE (U) — The United States offered today to help set up an atomic reactor center in south and southeast Asia for nuclear research and training under President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace program.

Canada also announced at the ministerial conference of the Colombo Plan nations now under way here that it had agreed in principle to help India build an atomic reactor which will be "available for use of scientists from other countries."

The U.S. proposal, put forward by John B. Hollister, administrator of the U.S. foreign economic aid program, did not suggest any location for the reactor. But he said

its "guiding purpose must be complete availability to all Colombo Plan countries on an equal basis."

Organized in late 1950 by the British Commonwealth, the Colombo Plan is dedicated to the economic development of south and southeast Asia. Countries benefiting from it include Burma, Ceylon, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, British Borneo, Nepal, Pakistan, Viet Nam, Cambodia and Laos. The Philippines, Japan and Thailand also are Asian members.

Hollister said the United States would contribute funds for training the Asians, laboratory facilities and equipment, and particularly a "reactor suitable for research and training."

Andrews Can't Get Away From Taxes

WASHINGTON (U) — Outgoing Commissioner of Internal Revenue T. Coleman Andrews has informed Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey that the insurance firm he will head when he leaves the government is in tax trouble.

Andrews' office said today Andrews told Humphrey in a letter dated Oct. 19 that he thought the secretary should know of this "aspect of my leaving." That was five days before Andrews announced his resignation. He leaves at the end of this month.

The tax claim, against American Fidelity & Casualty Co., Inc. and its wholly owned subsidiary, American Fidelity Fire Insurance Co., Inc., amounts to approximately \$4 million dollars, including deficiencies, interest and possible penalties.

The company has been fighting the case in U. S. Tax Court since April, 1952. That was about a year before Andrews became chief tax collector in February, 1953.

Attorneys for the insurance concern contend that actually the company has overpaid rather than underpaid, its taxes. A lawyer in the case said technical interpretations of insurance company accounting are involved.

Existence of the tax case against American Fidelity was reported in today's edition of the Washington Post & Times Herald.

525,000 Casualties Were Expected In Invasion Of Japan

WASHINGTON (U) — American military planners girding for a World War II invasion of Japan reckoned their probable casualties as high as 35 per cent of 1½ million men to be committed. Other estimates were lower.

The estimates were contained in a Pentagon survey, published yesterday, of documents bearing on Russia's entry into the war against Japan. One reason Russia's aid was sought was to hold down the numbers of killed, wounded and missing.

The estimates were never tested. The invasion attempt was not necessary after Japan gave up on Aug. 14, 1945, following the atomic bomb attacks on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Nationalist Chinese Stage Big Airdrop

TAIPEI, Formosa (U) — Nationalist Chinese planes last night staged what appeared to be one of its biggest airdrops on Red China.

Air force headquarters said they flew over Kiangsu, Chekiang, Kiangsi and Fukien, unloading 25 tons of rice, several tons of socks, towels, underwear and other useful articles.

Widow Freed On Charge Of Attacking Mate

ELIZABETH, N.J. (U) — A well-to-do widow who beat her husband with a riding crop the day before he died an apparent suicide was freed today of atrocious assault and battery charges.

It took a Union County jury less than an hour yesterday to find Mrs. Lucille Schroeder, 52, of Summit, innocent.

The grey-haired widow, a former dancer, burst into sobs upon hearing the verdict.

Her husband George, 50, died last Jan. 18 from an overdose of barbiturates. During the three-day trial, Mrs. Schroeder described him as a man who couldn't leave liquor alone.

On the night of Jan. 17, she related, he came home drunk, knocked his dinner plate to the floor and started staying at her with a cane.

Mrs. Schroeder told the seven-member, five-woman jury she seized her son's riding crop and struck Schroeder because she feared the cane being swung by her husband.

Then, she said, she hit Schroeder several times to force him to eat another dinner she prepared to sober him.

Schroeder was a former member of the legal staff for the Prudential Insurance Co. of America and was associated with a New York law firm.

Differences Over Red China Conference Are Patched Up

WASHINGTON (U) — The Eisenhower administration and Sen. George (D-Ga.) appeared today to have patched up their differences over how to meet Red China's demand for a high-level conference with the United States.

George called yesterday for Red China publicly to renounce the use of force before Secretary of State Dulles would agree to meet with Chinese Premier-Foreign Minister Chou En-lai.

This brought the Georgia senator, who is chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, almost squarely in line with the State Department's attitude toward any such meeting.

It marked a decided shift in George's previous position, because earlier he had said nothing about the need for any such declaration of peaceful intent. Last July 24, he urged a Dulles-Chou meeting within six months as the best way of easing dangerous tensions in the Far East.

State Department officials are known to have been somewhat upset by his views although they publicly declined to comment on them.

Some regarded his proposals as pressure on the Eisenhower administration to agree prematurely to a meeting with the Chinese Communists.

Without specifically rejecting George's proposals, Dulles has said this country would never agree to negotiate with Red China as long as the Communists aimed a pistol at its head.

The State Department declined today to say whether George's revised views matched Dulles' present attitude toward a high-level meeting. Top officials, however, read published accounts of George's comments carefully and did not appear upset by them.

WASHINGTON (U) — The Air Force said today its severe weather warning center at Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma City, is to be moved to Kansas City and be operated jointly with the Weather Bureau.

5 Children Die In Fire

NOBELSVILLE, Ind. (U) — Five children died today in a fire that swept through a four-room frame house and seriously burned their parents.

In less than an hour, the house burned to the ground, leaving the five bodies identifiable only by size.

The eldest of the victims, Leonard Maloney, 5, was found near the back door, and the youngest, Elaine, 6 months, was in the charred remains of the parents' bed.

Katherine, 2, and 3-year-old twins, Paul and Paulette, were found near the center of the house. The mother, Mrs. Mattie Maloney, 37, suffered second and third degree burns trying to rescue the children.

The father, Tom, 43, was burned seriously. Both parents were taken to Riverview Hospital.

The Maloneys' eldest child, Ray, 7, awakened by smoke, roused his parents. He escaped.

Firemen believed the fire started from an overheated coal stove.

SECRET PAPERS SHOW

Russians Refused To Attend Planning Talks In Jap Conflict

WASHINGTON (AP)—Although the Russians agreed in 1943 to go to war against Japan after Germany's defeat, they persistently dodged American efforts to work out plans for such military operations.

This picture emerges from a newly published account of behind-the-scenes events leading up to Russia's entry into the Far Eastern war—only a few days before the Japanese surrendered in August 1945. The Defense Department yesterday made public the 35,000-word report.

The Pentagon document said that "to coordinate United States operations in the Pacific with prospective Soviet action, the military planners in Washington needed detailed information on Soviet capabilities and intentions in the Far East."

Maj. Gen. John R. Deane, a member of the U.S. mission in Moscow, tried to get his information, but the report said his efforts had "produced no return" by the beginning of 1944. Then, during the first months of that year, Deane submitted lists of questions to Soviet officials. "The Soviet response continued to be disappointing," the report said.

"During the first half of 1944," it added, "it appeared impossible to arrange for any systematic Soviet-United States discussion of Far Eastern matters."

Early in February 1944, the documents related, Soviet Marshal Joseph Stalin told U.S. Ambassador Averell Harriman the United States would be allowed to operate aircraft from Siberia after the Russians declared war on Japan.

"No opportunity was offered . . . for consultation with Soviet Air officers about the details of such an undertaking," the report said. "In April the Soviet government requested delivery of 500 heavy bombers . . . but negotiations on this matter also failed to make progress."

The Pentagon study tells of a more "encouraging attitude" encountered by Harriman in an interview with Stalin June 10, 1944. Then, in preparation for expected

conferences, the Joint Chiefs of Staff forwarded additional instructions to Deane. They told Deane: "To facilitate planning for early operation of U.S. heavy bombers and long-range fighters from Siberian and other bases, we need detailed information on the location, condition, capacity, and probable availability of airfields, pro-

Monday a sub-group at Turners Cap Rock room advanced the tentative amount of \$1,000 for more decorative material. Last year merchants contributed an additional \$500 to extend decorations beyond the main downtown section. This year it is hoped that overhead street decorations may be erected on highway approaches and main tourist thoroughfares.

Texas Politics Breaks Out Like Rash Of Measles

Texas politics broke out Thursday like a rash of measles from Point Clear, Ala., to Fort Worth and from Washington to Whitesboro.

The politicians, it appeared, realized 1956 and Election Day were not too far off.

In Fort Worth, Reuben Senterfitt said that "Senterfitt will be on the ballot."

The San Saba resident, twice speaker of the Texas House, was a "candidate" for governor two years ago but withdrew without a campaign. This year he insists he's in the race to win.

John White, state agriculture commissioner who is expected to seek the governorship, said the campaign must produce a farm platform constructed of action, not promises, to halt a growing farm depression.

White told the North and East Texas County Judges and Commissioners Assn. he had been warning Texans of falling farm prices for more than two years.

At Point Clear, where Southern governors are meeting, Gov. Shivers disagreed sharply with Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) that Adlai Stevenson was the South's and West's leading prospect for the party's presidential nomination.

Saying Stevenson was an extremist, Shivers declined to disclose his presidential choice. He said, "The Democratic Party has a world of fine men."

Shivers said he believed there is a lessening influence of labor and Eastern liberal forces in the Democratic Party. He said Walter Reuther, president of the CIO United Automobile Workers "must be kept from making the Democratic Party a labor party."

Shivers said "neither party has solved the farm problem." He said the Democrats "probably created the farm problem through legislation."

While White pointed to the possibilities of a depression, Rep. Wright Patman, Texas' Democratic congressman, said the Republicans were courting an "inflationary effect" on the nation's economy.

In San Antonio, Sen. Lyndon Johnson, denied New York reports that he was attempting a Democratic coalition to stop "automatic" nomination of Adlai Stevenson. He did say the moderates will try to have influence on the platform on which the Democratic nominee seeks the presidency.

Johnson said he was not "anti-anybody" and would support the man chosen by the convention. At Houston, still smarting under charges of "job selling" in Texas, Republican Committeeman Jack Porter said no Democratic politician was going to tell him from whom he could solicit GOP contributions.

Democratic faithful gathered in Grayson County at Whitesboro to honor Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham. Oklahoma's Democratic Gov. Raymond Gary was the speaker.

Southern Governors Push For Industries

POINT CLEAR, Ala. (AP)—Southern governors were ready today to make the first move toward a cooperative Southwide program designed to promote a vast new scientific and industrial development in Dixie.

Southern hopes are for 30 per cent of the nation's manufacturing facilities in another 10 years—and a program aimed in that direction is being pushed by the Southern Governors Conference under the direction of the Southern Assn. of Science and Industry, Inc.

Gov. Orval E. Faubus of Arkansas urged his colleagues near the close of the conference to make the first unified effort toward regional cooperation by initiating:

1. Uniform reports on new plant locations.
2. A study of industries which have grown rapidly in the South since World War II.
3. A regional conference on market research.

"It is believed that the successful attainment of these limited objectives during the coming year will serve as a starting point for a more extensive cooperative program in the years ahead," Faubus said.

Dr. Frank J. Sodary, president of the Southern Assn. of Science and Industry, Inc., told the governors at their windup session that the South's industrial output since 1939 has increased from 11 billions to nearly 60 billion dollars.

"To illustrate the rapidity with which the South is building its manufacturing potential," he said, "the Gulf South area, which includes Texas, Louisiana, Missis-

Demo Chief Takes Swipe At GOP Prosperity Claim

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—Chairman Paul M. Butler of the Democratic National Committee derided Republican claims of "peace and prosperity" last night. Addressing a party rally, he asked:

"How can the Republicans claim to have restored prosperity when farmers are suffering a 24-billion dollar decline in farm income, when small businesses are suffering on main streets and when 38 per cent of the automobile retailers are losing money?"

"When 13 per cent of our population is being pinched by a drop in farm prices, prosperity isn't sound."

Butler said President Eisenhower had promised to balance the budget and declared: "If this administration can't balance the budget in an era of what it claims to be peace and prosperity, we Democrats wonder when, if ever, they can."

DALLAS (AP)—Sen. Price Daniel's televised dope hearings continued today after a 6-time loser threw the session into an uproar.

Daniel moves the Senate Judiciary subcommittee to Fort Worth tomorrow for more hearings.

The purpose of the investigation is to determine how Congress can improve narcotics laws.

Police and addicts were witnesses yesterday although some of Dallas' most notorious gangsters were in the courtroom.

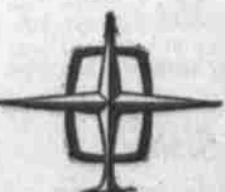
Daniel opened yesterday's hearing by saying narcotics addicts were involved in "brutal, unsolved murders" in Dallas and Fort Worth.

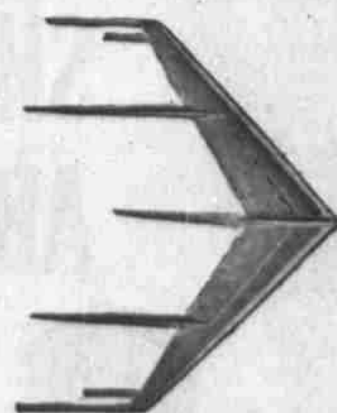

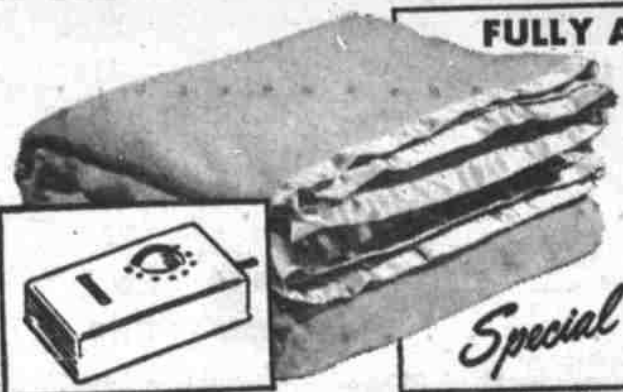

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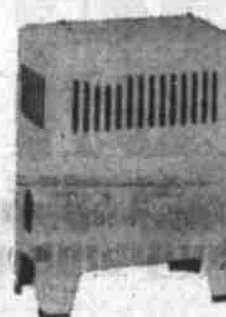

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NEGRO MINISTER

Shooting Suspect Reveals Hideaway

NEW YORK (AP)—A Negro minister, who had been missing from Lake City, S. C., since a shooting incident Oct. 10, disclosed today he is staying with friends in New York City.

The clergyman, the Rev. Joseph A. DeLaine, a leading figure in the fight against school segregation, readily admitted he fired two shots in reply to alleged gunfire from an automobile passing his home.

He is the object of a South Carolina warrant charging him with a shooting assault. He also confirmed that he was the author of a letter, bearing his name and describing the incident, that were mailed from Trenton, N.J., Oct. 13 to three newspapers and a radio station.

He had stopped with friends in Trenton while en route to New York.

The minister said he fled by automobile from South Carolina after his church had burned, his personage had been attacked and his life threatened.

"I shot back," he said in an interview with the New York Post, "because I wanted to mark that car."

"I believed the people in that car were the ones who sent me a threatening letter, who threw bricks through my window, and who burned my church."

"I thought if I marked that car the police would have the honor to break open the case."

In a letter to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, the minister said he did not flee "to dodge justice, but to evade injustice."

"The only thing needed to condemn me," he wrote, "is to find some white woman who will swear falsely that she was there and the culprits did not shoot."

He intends to review his case in a speech tonight at the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Harlem.

Bishop D. Ward Nichols of the African Methodist Episcopal Church described the Rev. Mr. DeLaine as under the protective custody of the church.

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Desegregation Postponed At Florida College

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—The Florida Supreme Court, in a 5-2 decision, today delayed desegregation at the University of Florida until it can be determined that the all-white school is ready to accept Negro students without harmful effects.

The court in an opinion by Justice B. K. Roberts ordered a court commissioner appointed to take testimony to determine when it will be possible for Negroes to be admitted to the university without creating "public mischief."

The court's decision, although applying specifically only to a case in which a Daytona Beach Negro, Virgil Hawkins, sought admission to the University of Florida law school, undoubtedly will have the effect of delaying integration of the races in any Florida public school for a period of from six months to a year or more.

Justice Roberts held that the U. S. Supreme Court, in banning segregation in its May 1954 decision, had instructed the states to proceed with caution and common sense in bringing about the end of separate facilities for the races.

The majority opinion recognized that segregation no longer is legal in Florida as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court antidesegregation decision last year. The Florida justices, however, held that it the province of the state's court to permit integration only after it can be shown that no harm to the public will result.

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IN FLORIDA

School Board To Appeal Race Case

TAVARES, Fla. (AP)—The Lake County School Board plans to appeal a circuit judge's ruling that Allen Platt wins by default his suit to have his five children admitted to Florida white schools.

Judge Truman G. Futch yesterday upheld a Platt motion for summary judgment after the board refused to comply with an order to produce a list of witnesses it would call in a trial of the suit.

P. B. Howell Jr. of Leesburg, School Board attorney, told Judge Futch at a pretrial conference the court had exceeded its authority and he would appeal to the Florida Supreme Court.

Futch had called the conference to determine the issues in the case. When the board refused to give a list of prospective witnesses and outline their probable testimony, Platt's attorney H. W. Hunter of Tavares moved that Futch:

1. Strike the board's answer to the suit, which states the Platts

have Negro blood; (2) enter a degree of pro confesso—meaning default for not answering properly; (3) grant a summary judgment, meaning Platt's contentions are upheld.

The entire motion was granted. Howell said, "We object to coming in and tipping off our defense." He charged that Futch "attempted to turn it (the pretrial conference) into a device by which the plaintiffs could make use of our preparations for trial."

The Platt children were dropped from the rolls of the Mount Dora white schools upon McCall's complaint. McCall said he was going to enforce the Florida law requiring segregation of the races in public schools.

The Platts say they are of Irish and Cherokee Indian ancestry and that before the family moved to Florida a year ago the children attended a South Carolina school classified as white.



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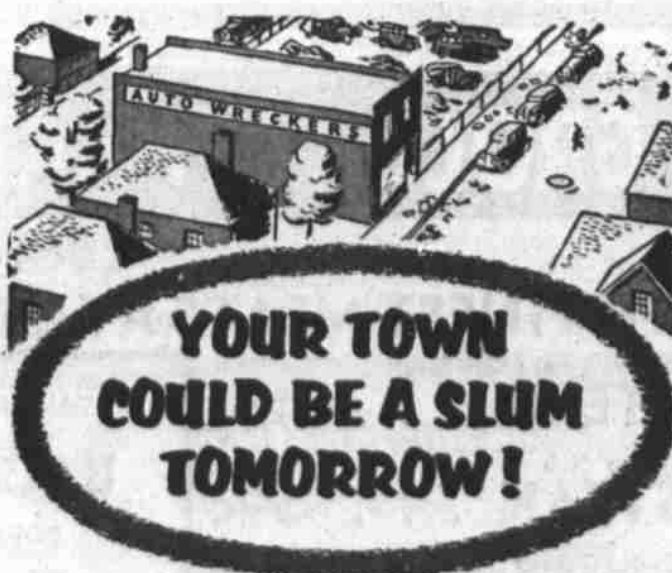

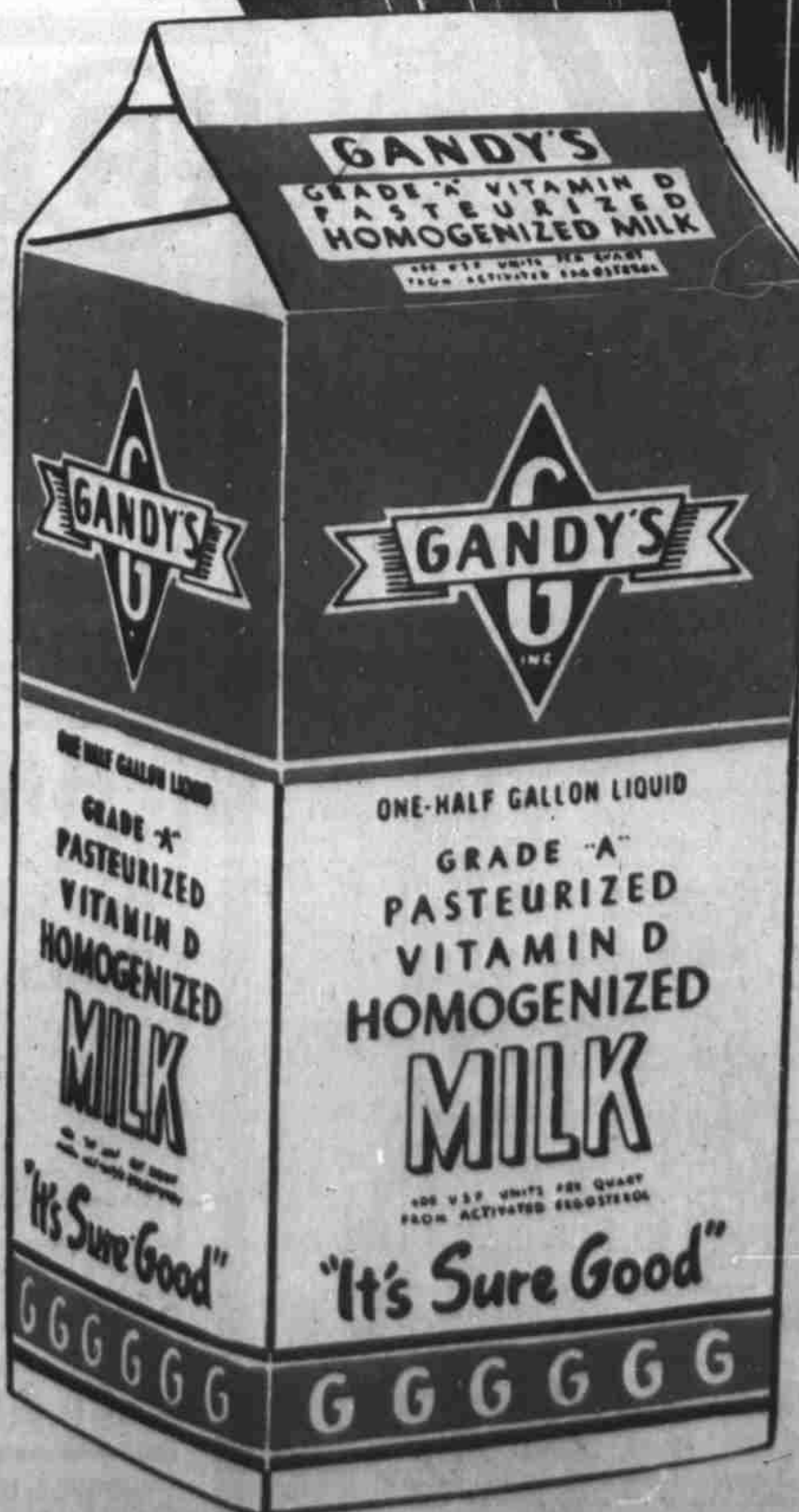

SCRANTON, Pa. (U)—This city without mass public transportation for nearly 200 days because of a strike, and its residents say the effects can be summed up in one word—bad.

When the operating employees of the Scranton Transit Co. walked out April 5 in a dispute over wages

and fringe benefits under a proposed new contract, Scranton reacted mildly. It had had transit strikes before. But they had all been settled quickly.

This one is different. The housewife, the laborer, the driver, the store owner—all have suffered.

A survey of downtown merchants revealed almost unanimous agreement that business had been hurt, particularly at night.

Drivers face a daily battle for parking space. The morning and evening rush hours bring traffic jams.

Members of the AFL Transit Workers Union operate "courtesy"

cars to aid the former bus users. At home they are living on reduced family budgets. They want to return to work badly.

But they hold out against company offers, now unknown, to increase their average hourly pay, which was \$1.65 before the strike. The union originally sought a 35-cent increase. The company asked the men to take a cut. Both sides are known to have modified their demands.

With winter approaching, the demand for rides will increase until it reaches a peak in the Christmas season that one merchant says he expects to be "one of the worst."

MODELS TO BE SHOWN FRIDAY

New Transmission Among Top Features Of Pontiac For '56

A General Motors "first" — a completely new Hydra-Matic transmission — is among the developments incorporated in the 1956 Pontiac models which go on display Friday. The new line will be shown here by Marvin Wood Pontiac, 504 E. 3rd.

Pontiac's engine is larger this year with horsepower upped to 227 in the Star Chief and 203 in the 870 and 860 series. There are 15 new body styles, longer by 2.4 inches, with a choice of 57 new colors.

The new transmission is dubbed "Strato-Flight" Hydra-Matic, and is designed to provide smoother and quieter shifting of gears. It has had over 2 million test miles.

Most luxurious of the three series, the Star Chief line consists of the custom Catalina two and four-door "hardtops," four-door sedan, and convertible, on a 124-inch wheelbase and the Safari Station Wagon on 122-inch wheelbase.

In Pontiac's middle-priced 870 series with 122-inch wheelbase are the Catalina two and four-door "hardtops," a four-door sedan, a two-door two-seat station wagon and four-door three-seat station wagon.

Comprising the low priced 860 series are the Catalina coupes and sedans, two and four-door sedans, two-door two-seat station wagons and four-door three-seat station wagons.

Newly designed for cargo space, the Pontiac two-seat station wagons have a folding seat with the back-rest and the cushion folding into the floor. In the three-seat wagons, both the back seat and center seat fold into the floor with a split seat arrangement on the middle seat so that one-third or two-thirds of the seat can remain in place for passengers.

Front-end styling is similar on all three series. A brilliant wrap-around bumper of sturdy, chrome-plated steel protects the entire front end of the car.

Continuing its trend in modern colors, Pontiac introduces a completely new array of exterior finishes, and the wide varieties of interior trim materials on the new models are most colorful and more luxurious than ever offered by Pontiac. They range from bizarre red and black to soft combinations of greens or greys. The custom model Pontiacs are upholstered in top-grain leather and patterned nylon ornamented with metallic threads.

The front seats of all 1956 body styles have been redesigned for more comfort and more leg and head room. A new optional elec-

tric powered adjustable seat which can be moved in six different ways, offers almost unlimited variations in front seat positions. A mechanical 360-position seat is also available.

The new panoramic instrument panel controls on the 1956 Pontiacs are lighter and more legible.

Displacement of the 1956 Strato-Streak V-8 engine is 316.6 cubic inches. The extra volume from larger cylinder bore and pistons,

gives more reserve power, not only at low, but at all driving speeds.

Completely new power steering, power brakes and electric window lifts are available as optional equipment.

Front mounted air conditioning, the system entirely located under the hood which was pioneered by Pontiac in 1954, will be continued with a number of new features in 1956.

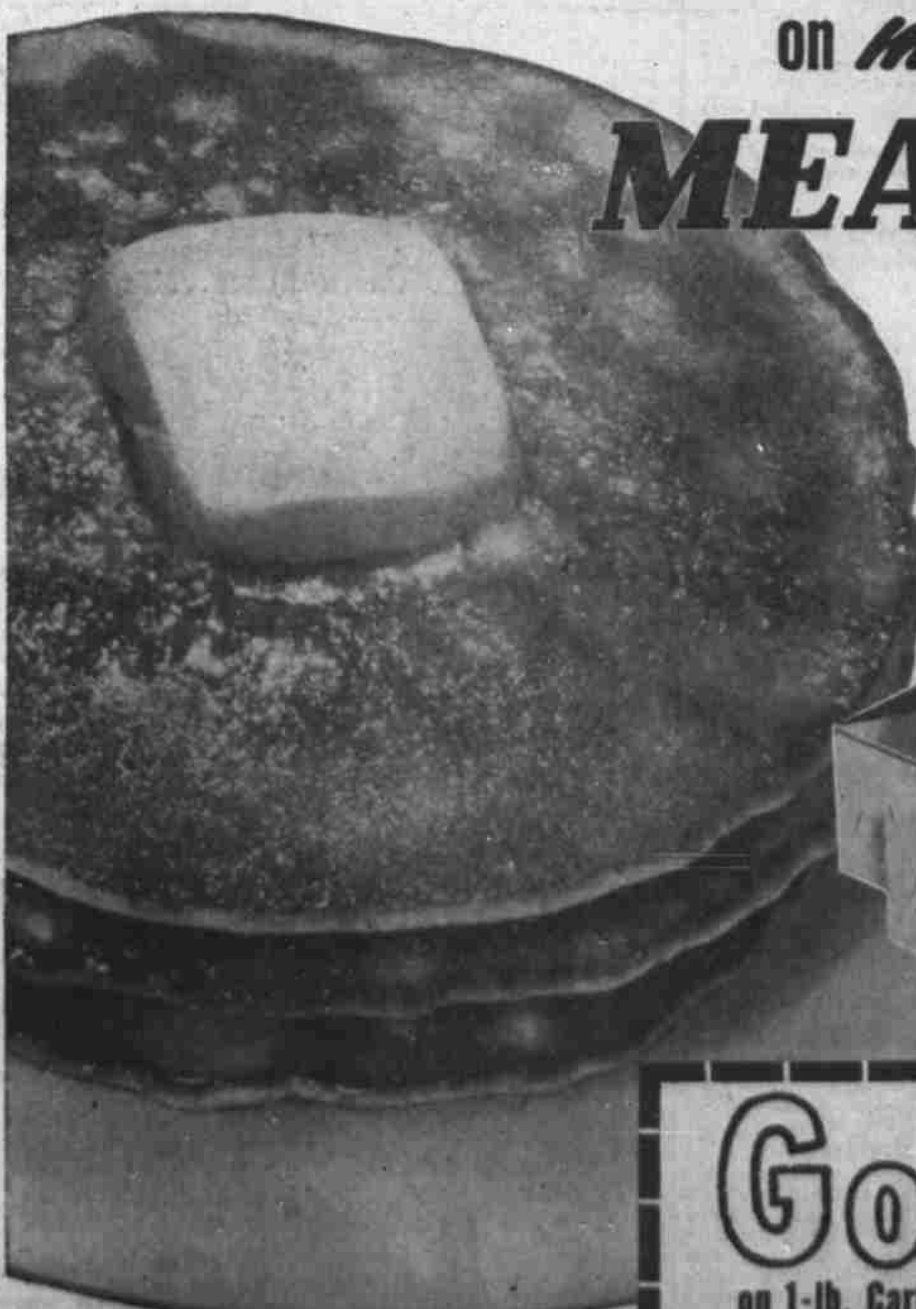

These tempting cheese hors d'oeuvres—one hot, one cold—will tease and please the most discriminating of palates. The hot variety is a tiny puff of delicate melt-in-your-mouth goodness flavored with grated Parmesan and Romano

Corn Covered Frankfurters Made Easy

Remember the fair days and a piping hot dog on a stick. You can make them right at home without any trouble.

CORN COVERED FRANKFURTERS
Two-thirds cup cornmeal
1 cup plain flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons fat
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup sweet milk
1 pound hot dogs
Deep fat
If self-rising cornmeal and flour are used, omit baking powder and salt. Combine first five ingredients. Cut in fat to resemble flint crumbs. Combine egg and milk; add to first mixture and stir well until mixed. Insert wooden skewers into frank; spread frank with cornmeal mixture and fry until brown in deep fat which has been heated to 325 degrees F. Serve with chili sauce.

HOT PARMESAN AND ROMANO CHEESE PUFFS
(Makes about 30 puffs)
3 egg whites
Pinch of cayenne
1 (3-oz.) canister Grated Parmesan and Romano Cheese
In heavy saucepan, melt fat to depth of 3-inches. Heat fat to 350 degrees F. on deep fat thermometer or until a cube of day-old bread browns in 60 seconds. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; fold in cayenne and cheese (mixture will decrease in volume when cheese is added). Drop by teaspoons into fat. Cook until delicately browned on all sides, about 3 to 4 minutes. Remove from fat with a slotted spoon; drain on absorbent paper. Dust with paprika. Serve hot.

BEF POTATO PINWHEELS
1 pound ground beef
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 egg
2 tablespoons melted fat
6 tablespoons bread crumbs
2 tablespoons milk
1 1/2 cups seasoned mashed potatoes
1 1/2 cups seasoned mashed peas
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
Mix together all the ingredients except potatoes, peas and butter. Place between 2 sheets waxed paper and press out or roll out with a rolling pin into a rectangular sheet about 1/2 inch thick. Remove the top waxed paper and spread half of the surface with mashed potatoes. Spread the other half with peas. Roll the meat firmly, jelly-roll fashion, starting at the potato end. Wrap in waxed paper and chill well. When ready to cook, cut with a sharp knife into 1-inch slices. Place on the broiler rack 3 to 4 inches below heat source. Brush with melted butter. Broil slowly about 10 minutes. Turn, brush again and finish broiling.

Leftover Problem? Try These Recipes

Featured here are recipes for leftovers and canned meats.
PORK LOAF WITH CURRANT JELLY SAUCE
1 12-oz. can pork loaf
1/2 cup currant jelly
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup orange juice
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon horseradish
1 teaspoon grated orange peel
Cut pork loaf into 8 slices and pan brown. Combine other ingredients in a saucepan. Stir and boil about 10 minutes. Pour over the browned slices of loaf. Heat 5 to 10 minutes. Serve hot.
BROILED PORK LOAF, BLUE CHEESE TOPPING
1 12-oz. can pork loaf
1 5-oz. jar blue cheese spread
2 tablespoons prepared mustard
Cut pork loaf into 4 slices. Place on pan and broil 3 inches from heat source. Turn. Cover top with blue cheese whipped with the mustard. Continue to broil until cheese bubbles and browns.
PORK LOAF CUTLETS
1 12-oz. can pork loaf
Prepared mustard
Fine cracker crumbs
1 egg
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
Cut pork loaf into 6 slices. Spread slices with mustard, dip into crumbs, then into egg beaten with milk. Roll in crumbs. Pan fry in butter in a heavy skillet until browned on both sides. Serve hot.

Frankfurters Make Inexpensive Roast

A frankfurter roast is made by holding the frankfurters upright to form a meat crown and filling the center with heated kraut. The crown is made by running a string through the center of the frankfurters to hold them intact. The crown is lowered into a hot water covering to heat through. After the crown is placed on a platter, the heated kraut is arranged in the center. Alternate fillings suggested are mashed potatoes, rice or a baked dressing. Buttered noodles or most macaroni or spaghetti dishes would be other variations.

Cheese Bread

A suggested accompaniment to any meal is cheese bread. To prepare it, spread a loaf of sliced bread with butter and then reassemble the loaf, inserting a slice of American cheese between each bread slice. Hold the loaf in shape by forming foil around it in "basket" style. Before serving, heat in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 15 minutes or until the bread is heated and the cheese partially melted. Serve hot, on a cutting board or in a napkin-lined basket, leaving the whole loaf in the foil in which it was heated.

You can say what you want to for diets, for low calorie desserts, for watching the waistline. But the fact is, everyone is overcome with a desire to break all the rules and satisfy that sweet-tooth of his once in a while.

Treat Old Favorite In A Different Way

A new look for meat loaf is Pimiento-stuffed olives sliced and arranged on the bottom of a greased loaf pan. Put them in straight rows if you cherish a neat look; or let your fancy dictate the design.

When the loaf comes out of the oven and is turned out of the pan, the green-olive slices garnish your meat. They are pretty as can be with their pimiento-red centers, for the time in the oven doesn't dim their bright color one bit. We used the largest size of olives for our loaf and the big meaty slices looked and tasted elegant.

This meat loaf uses packaged quick-cooking rice cereal as a "filler." Try the recipe if you like a compact loaf that slices beautifully. We served the loaf with creamed green peas, a salad and rolls. But it is equally good with creamed potatoes and snap beans. If you like, you can bake potatoes in their skins along with the meat loaf, then peel and dice the potatoes and join them with a cream sauce.

If any of the loaf is leftover, slice it into serving-size pieces and arrange them on a piece of aluminum foil, then layer them lightly with soft butter or margarine. Heat the slices under the broiler, turning once, until they are thoroughly hot. We think this loaf tastes best hot—but suit yourself!

The recipe for the loaf calls for

dry mustard and marjoram; but chili powder and oregano may be substituted. A half cup of medium-fine grated carrots may also be added to the meat mixture.

Be sure to observe recipe directions about packing the meat mixture down well in the pan in which it is baked so there will be no air holes when you slice and serve it.

OLIVE MEAT LOAF

Ingredients: Stuffed green olives, 1 pound chopped beef, 1/4 pound chopped pork, 1-3 cup quick-cooking granulated rice cereal, 1 egg, 1/4 cup minced onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon dried crushed marjoram, 1/2 cup tomato juice.

Grease bottom and sides of medium-sized loaf pan—about 8 by 4 by 3 inches. Slice olives and arrange over bottom in even rows or in any desired pattern; number of olives needed will depend on their size. Put beef, pork, granulated rice cereal, egg, onion, salt, pepper, mustard, marjoram and tomato juice in a mixing bowl; mix thoroughly with hands. Carefully pack meat mixture over sliced olives, taking care not to upset pattern and avoiding air spaces. Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven 1 1/2 hours; loaf will be browned on top. Loosen sides with knife and turn out on platter. Makes 6 servings.

Bake Lima Beans With Cheese Sauce

Lima beans are delicious baked with cheese. Here is the way to cook them.
BAKED LIMAS WITH CHEESE
1 1/2 cups grated cheese
1 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon celery salt
1 teaspoon allspice
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons chopped onion
3 cups cooked dry limas
Melt cheese in milk over hot water. Add seasonings and spices. Worcestershire sauce, chopped onion and cooked lima beans. Pour into six greased ramekin dishes. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes or until top of beans are brown.

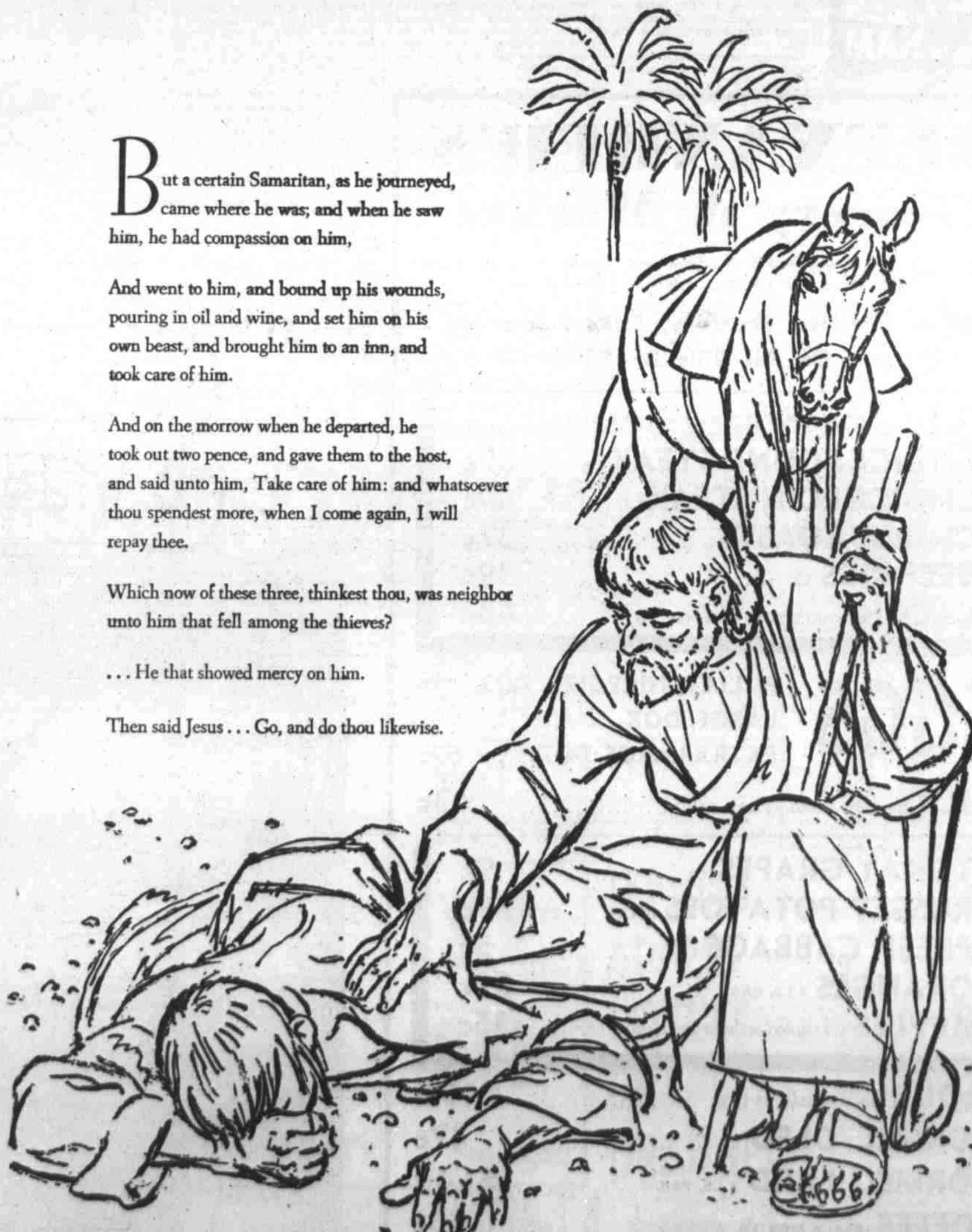

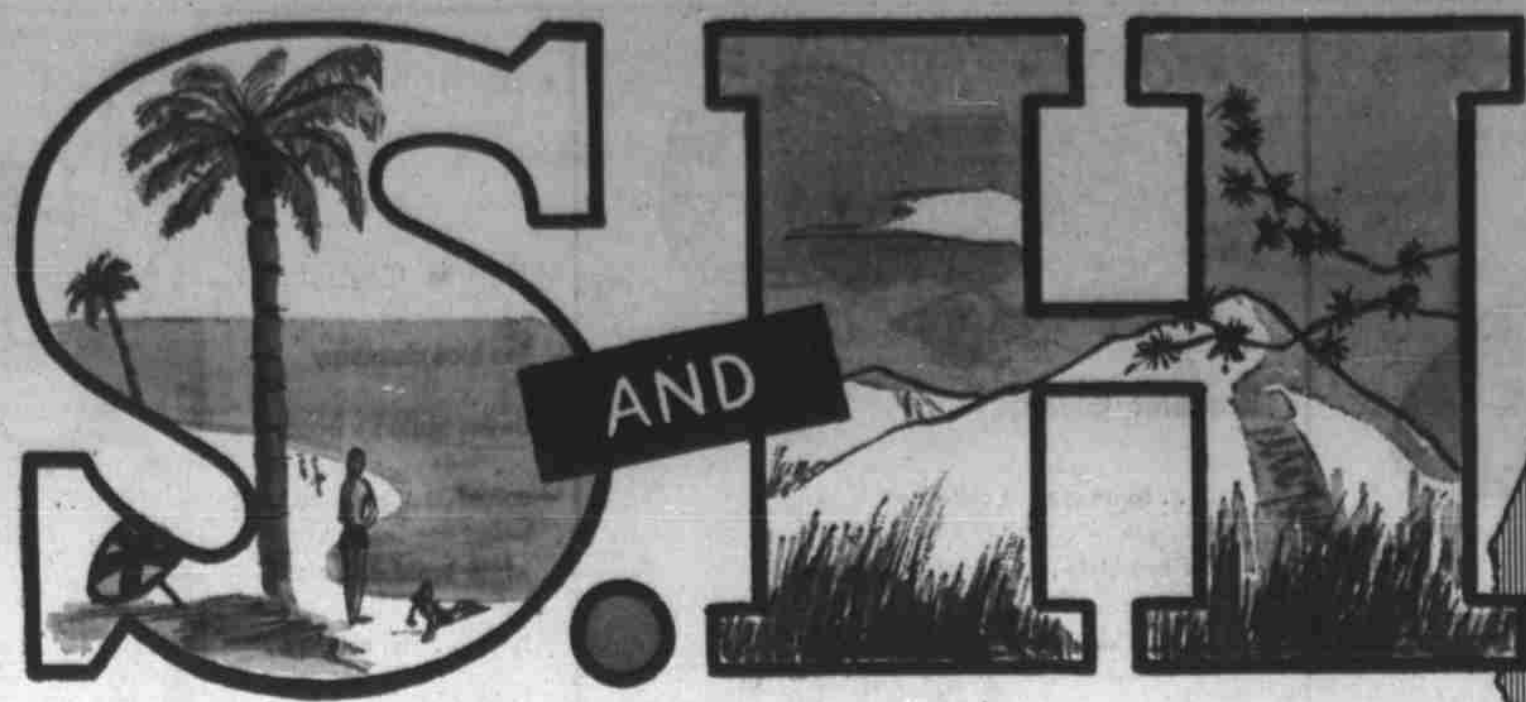

Picketing Ruled Unlawful In Organizing Fuss

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., (U-P)—The Florida Supreme Court ruled today that picketing of hotels in the Miami area is unlawful because the AFL Hotel Employees union represents only "an insignificant number" of the workers.

Bert Ross, the union's international vice president, announced immediately in Miami that an appeal would be taken to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Despite "the astounding series of legal setbacks" in Florida, Ross said the union has not wavered in its campaign to organize the hundreds of luxury hotels in the Miami resort area.

The union has, at one time or another, picketed 22 of the hotels since the organizing drive was launched six months ago. Last week, it claimed a major victory when the Monte Carlo and Vanderbilt hotels signed contracts.

Justice T. Frank Hobson, who wrote the Florida court's unanimous opinion, said the picketing was started by the union without giving the hotel owners proof that it represented a substantial number of the workers.

The Miami strike is not a case of employees exercising their right to self-organization, Justice Hobson wrote, but is an effort by the union to coerce the hotel owners into recognizing the union and thus forcing the workers to join.

The union claims to represent more than 30 per cent of the 6,000 employees in 164 Miami area hotels, an amount they say is sufficient for collective bargaining.

Ross called the Florida court action a "legal farce." He said the hotel workers are being penalized because Florida has no law setting forth the procedure by which they can express their preference of a bargaining agent.

Ross said the Florida court had delayed its decision since last June.

"Last week, the ranks of the Miami Beach Hotel Assn. were broken and two hotels signed union contracts. Immediately, the Florida Supreme Court renders its decision—unfavorable to the worker and offering hope to the wavering hotel association members."

Radio Program To Star Meg Truman

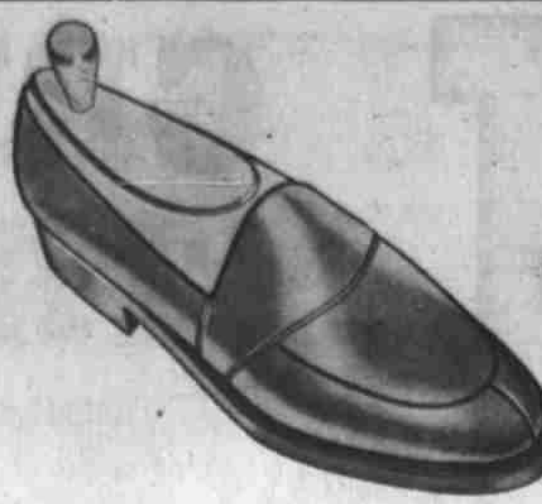
NEW YORK (U-P)—Margaret Truman, often a guest performer on radio and television, will have the first regular program of her own starting next month.

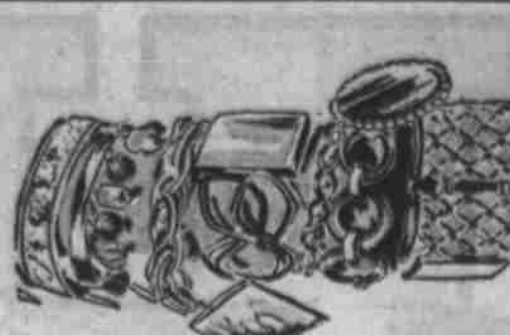


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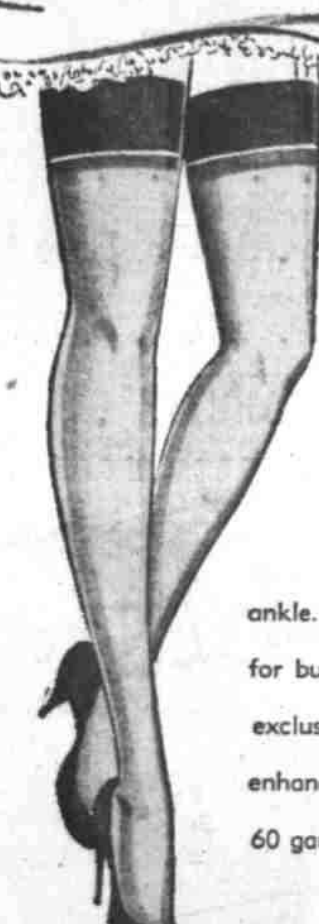

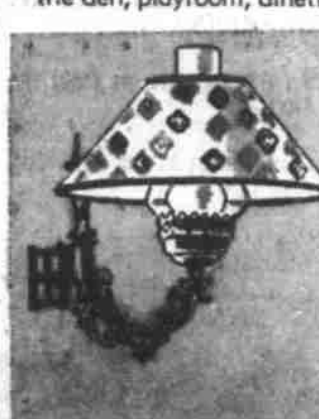

Uncle Ray:
Incas Fasted Before Holding Big Festival

A religion was developed by the Incas of long ago. Their chief god was the ruler of the sun. The priests said that the sun-god's name was Viracocha.

Q. What were the other Inca gods?

A. One of them was the fish-god and another was the puma-god. The puma-god represented large, fierce members of the cat family which are found in wild parts of South America, also in a few sections of North America.

The bird-god, the weather-god and the sea-god were among the other deities of the Inca people. All of these were supposed to have less power than the sun-god.

Q. Did the Inca Indians have holidays or feast days?

A. Yes, they had several of these each year. One feast day was marked by the bringing of statues of the leading deities to the capital city. The people were allowed to ask questions, such as:

"Will the crops grow well this year?"

"Will there be warfare in the early future?"

Answers were given by the priests, but the priests were supposed to be mouthpieces for the gods.

Another important festival took place at the start of the warm season in the Inca Empire. For three days in advance, the people were supposed to fast. They were allowed to drink water, but if they ate food they were falling to follow their religion. The people also were forbidden to kindle fires inside their homes during those three days.

When the big day came, the people arose before dawn. The emperor led a procession to a place where a good view of the rising sun could be enjoyed. As the light of day appeared, shouts of joy arose from the crowd. From a golden cup the emperor drank a liquor which had been prepared from Indian corn. Then, through the day, there was general feasting.
