OLDEST OLD SETTLERS' PICNIC AT JINES SPRINGS ON SEPTEMBER 2-3

EARLY DAY PIONEERS WILL GATHER AT RE-UNION

DAY PROGRAM OF SPEAKING, HORSE RACING, RODEO EVENTS, BASEBALL AND OTHER AMUSEMENTS HAVE BEEN ARRANGED

The first annual Old Settlers' Picnic and Re-union will be held at the Jines Springs Park on Thursday and Friday, September 2-3. Arrangements are being made by the managers for the entertainment of the biggest crowd ever assembled at an affair of this kind in the county. Jines Springs is one of nature's beauty spots. Entrance to the park is ten miles south on the highway.

Some of the big features of this two-day affair will be the rodeo program. Events will be staged each afternoon under the direction of Dave Wilson, who is one of the best rodeo men in the southwest. Mr. Wilson has a herd of genuine Mexican steers to use in these events. There will be bull-dogging, bronc riding, calf roping and other contests. Liberal prizes will be offered. The most popular riders of the day will be on hand to compete.

On Thursday afternoon, September 2, the Spearman and Jines ball teams will play. These teams have met several times and they both play a hard brand of ball. Horse racing will be an added attraction on Friday afternoon. Big purses have been set up for the relay, pony and other races.

Perryton Municipal Band has been secured to play for both days. In the evenings there will be a dance, music to be supplied by the best dance organization in the county. Sibley Jines, manager of the Jines Springs, has made arrangements for several aeroplanes to land on the grounds both days. They will make exhibition and passenger flights.

The picnic should attract thousands of people. There will be no charge at Perryton this year and so it is known at present this will be only celebration of any kind in the county this summer. Make plans now to attend. Go and see the big shade trees in the famous Jines Springs pool.

STRUCTURAL MAP MADE BY DR. W. C. LEONARD TALLIES WITH LOGGING AT WELL

Friends and followers of Dr. W. C. Leonard are hopefully patting him on the back with reference to his work in Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties.

Especially are they congratulating him on the manner in which the Snyder-Barton test, section 504, block 43, Lipscomb is logging with his structural map issued last January. This well reached the top of the salt at 826 feet, five feet higher than Dr. Leonard had estimated.

He is of the opinion after some months of investigation that the gas is migrating from a thick deposit of Pennsylvanian located upon a structure lower than the granite ridge, and it was this which caused him to center his attention upon Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties, on the north flank of the Anadarko syncline. He estimated that several hundred feet of the Pennsylvanian and its black shales, which he considers to be the real source of oil in this vicinity, will be penetrated, and present indications are raising this hope to a feeling of certainty.—Amarillo News

1,027 CARS OF 1926 WHEAT SHIPPED BY PERRYTON ELEVATORS

Perryton elevators have shipped 1,027 cars of wheat up to the close of business on Tuesday, August 3, which greatly exceeds shipments from any town in the entire Panhandle, according to exchanges received at the Herald office.

At that time the various elevators had 288,000 bushels of wheat on hand ready for shipment, either in the elevators or piled on the ground. Railway officials state that the average car load of wheat contains approximately 1,450 bushels, making in the neighborhood of 1,489,150 bushels of wheat that has been shipped by local elevators since the first load of wheat was received on June 21.

With the 288,000 bushels of wheat on hand at the elevators, it makes a grand total of 1,777,150 bushels of wheat handled by the elevators so far this year.

Figures such as these substantiate the Herald's estimate of a 3,000,000 bushel wheat crop in Ochiltree county. With wheat trucks still pouring into Perryton in an unending stream, keeping the elevators full at all times, and constantly calling for grain cars, we wonder if the estimate is not placed a little low. Certainly it is none too high to cover the big wheat crop.

DAN MOODY WINNER BY 1,013 MAJORITY OVER ALL OTHERS

Dallas, Aug. 2.—Dan Moody won the Texas gubernatorial nomination in the recent primary by a majority of 1,013 votes over his five opponents, complete and revised unofficial returns to the Texas Election Bureau showed early tonight.

Returns to the Bureau from 252 out of 252 counties in the State, all complete, showed the following totals for candidates for State offices:

Governor—Moody 411,390; Ferguson 281,938; Davidson, 123,025; Zimmerman, 2,910; Wilman, 1,493; Johnston 1,006.

When returns from Fisher county, the last county reporting, were tabulated tonight the total vote for governor stood at 821,767, raising Moody's majority to the new figure.

NEW ELEVATOR AT FARNSWORTH

GROUND BROKEN LAST SATURDAY, TO BE OPERATED BY PANHANDLE GRAIN CO.

Ground was broken for another elevator at Farnsworth, the hustling little city located down the track, 12 miles southwest of Perryton. This new elevator, which is being built by the Star Engineering Co., of Wichita, Kansas, for the Panhandle Grain Co., makes the third elevator for Farnsworth, the other two being operated by the Perryton Equity and L. O. Street.

According to O. J. Fowler, the representative of the contracting firm, the elevator will be ready for business in about 20 days. The machinery and part of the material is being moved from Supply, Oklahoma. It will be of average capacity.

Farnsworth is shipping thousands of bushels of grain this year. Between 250 and 300 cars have already been shipped and this is not one-half of the entire crop. All lines of business there are doing a record business. B. L. Rogers of the Service Store reports that they have been working day and night to keep up with the rush for machinery and repairs and the demand for regular lines of merchandise. A number of lots, both business and residence, have been sold during the past few days, upon which the new owners expect to build in the immediate future.

TALIAFERRO BLOCK SOUTH-EAST OF PERRYTON FORMED

BLOCK INCLUDES TWENTY-ONE SECTIONS EXTENDING INTO LIPSCOMB COUNTY; WELL TO BE SPUDDED BY SEPTEMBER 10th

Heightened interest in oil activities in Ochiltree county has been evident this week, by the formation of a new block, known as the D. D. Taliaferro block, south and east of Perryton.

Drilling contract on the block has already been signed, Col. George Montgomery taking the contract, and it is understood that he will drill the well himself.

CRAMPS CAUSE WANNER'S DEATH

TRAGEDY AT JINES SPRINGS SUNDAY WHILE BATHER WAS IN DEEP WATER

Perryton was shocked Sunday afternoon to hear of the tragic death of Lewis H. Wanner, 26 years old, Reading, Pennsylvania, who has been in this vicinity for the last eleven months working for his brother, E. H. Wanner, and his uncle, C. R. Hartman.

Accompanied by his two brothers, E. H. Wanner and W. H. Wanner who has been here since harvest, Lewis went in swimming in Jines Springs. Although he was subject to cramps, he ventured into the deep water. An attack of cramps caused him to go down, unnoticed by the other swimmers and he never came to the surface again. He was missed in a very few seconds and divers started at once to try to locate the body. It was found in the mud at the bottom and was brought to the surface by Dave Kettell and I. J. Egleston. A chain was formed by the other swimmers from the bank and the body was pulled to shore.

All methods of artificial respiration was resorted to but no life could be found in the body, although it had only remained in the water about eight minutes. The body was rushed to Perryton, but was pronounced dead by Dr. J. V. Guyton.

Doctor Guyton stated that death had come from cramps and not from drowning as was at first thought. Both Doctor Guyton and Undertaker G. R. Wilson said that the lungs were absolutely free from water.

Lewis leaves a wife and three children, George, age 6, Vivian, age 5, and Lewis, age 3, all living at Reading, Pa.

He was born July 21, 1900, and died August 1, 1926, at the age of 26 years and ten days. He was a member of the Spices Reform Church, and services will be held for him at his church in Reading, Saturday afternoon.

The body was taken to Canadian Monday for shipment back to Reading.

Besides his wife and children, Lewis is survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. A. Wanner, Stoney Creek Mills, Pa., and 12 brothers and sisters, E. H. Wanner, Perryton; W. H. Wanner, Reading, Pa.; Mrs. Jake Mayer, Altoona, Pa.; Miss Leulla Wanner, Bridgeton, N. J.; Jerry Wanner, Reading, Pa.; and Albert, and Misses Edna, Catherine, Laura, Emma, Norma and Irene Wanner, Stoney Creek Mills, Pa.

The block includes twenty-one sections and extends over into Lipscomb county. Its location is approximately six miles south and twelve miles east of Perryton, just north of the Jackson-Montgomery block on which the Moore well is drilling.

Up-to-date no location has been made, but the contract calls for a well, to be spudded by September 10, and they expect to be under way even before that.

Two other new blocks in the county are practically complete and will probably be signed up before the next issue of the Herald. One of them is being formed by Lee Keith, south and west of Perryton.

The Pan-State Oil Corporation, capitalized at \$100,000 has been given the drilling contract on the Hoover-Tandy block in the southern part of the county, extending into Roberts county. This block includes a 5,000 acre tract of and belonging to A. Tandy. The well is to be drilled to a depth of 3,500 feet should it be necessary.

T. G. Shaw, Ft. Worth, president of the Pan-State, has had this locality in mind for six years and is very optimistic over the outcome of the situation. He stated that work would be pushed with all possible speed to complete the well in record time.

C. C. Wilson, Ft. Worth, is representing the company locally and is in charge of the drilling of the well on the Hoover-Tandy block which is located on Sec. 215, Block 43.

The Wolf Creek territory is now undergoing a thorough testing out. For a number of years this particular region has been recognized as having splendid possibilities for oil pools. Practically all the leases around the Moore test on the Jackson-Montgomery block are reported sold, with spreads taken by Marland and independents. It is said to be drilling around 250 feet. The Snyder-Barton well in Lipscomb has passed the 1,000 foot mark. This well is being drilled by P. B. Kinnear. The Strickler well is between six and seven hundred feet. The Boren well broke down Sunday and has not been able to resume drilling up to the present time. The two wells in the Range neighborhood are not drilling yet, but are expected to start at once.

UNLOAD, SET-UP AND DELIVER FOURTEEN CARS

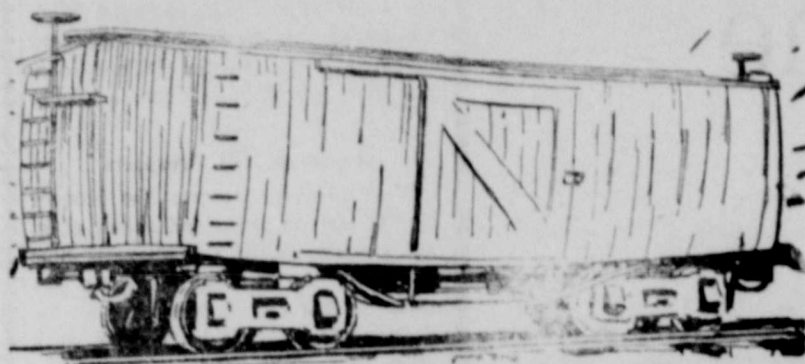

Remodel Beaver Court House

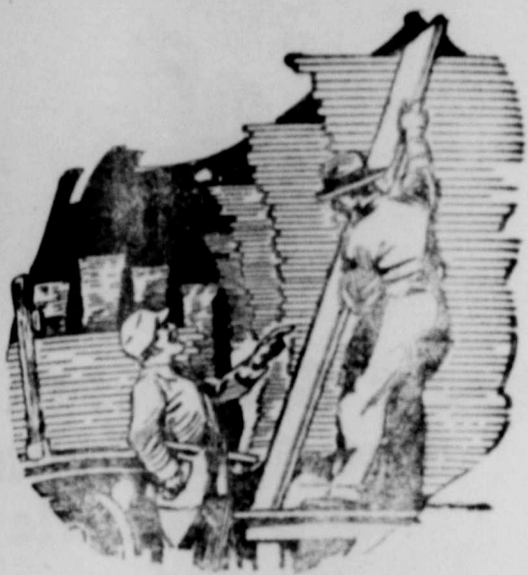

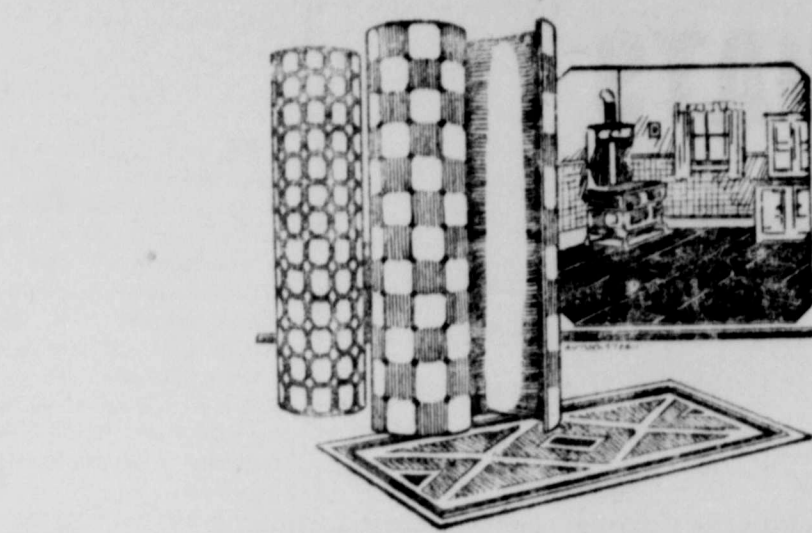

PANHANDLE WILD CAT OIL NEWS

Barton down 900 Feet

The Barton well is now reported down about the 900 foot level, and still going good. The drill is now in the salt beds, and, it is said, that once in a while, water is sprayed all over the derrick, indicating, if the report is true, that there is gas pressure in the well.—Higgins News.

Pile Test Going Nicely

A. W. Son, who is in charge of the well at the Pile test northeast of Liberal, informs the News today that the work is now progressing satisfactorily, the big hole being down about 125 feet and going nicely. Active drilling was tied up several days last week while a water well was being put down.—Liberal News

Hurliman No. 1 A Gasser

On Friday, July 23, a slight showing of gas was found at 2477 feet and on Saturday morning more gas at 2503 feet. By Saturday afternoon the flow had increased to about 1,000,000 cubic feet and caused a temporary shutdown Sunday morning, when the wind changed, making the fire hazard very dangerous.

Monday evening the drilling was resumed and after drilling through a brow shale a heavy flow of gas was struck at 2635 feet which is variously estimated from five to eight million cubic feet. The well has been shut down while the boilers are being moved back.

The quality of the gas has not been ascertained because of the lack of instruments but it is expected that it will be tested soon.—Guymon Tribune.

Oil in Moore County

The Phillips-Landreth well on the Sneed ranch in Moore county undoubtedly has some oil. A Channing man, over there Wednesday morning, reported it standing 150 feet in the black fluid. The Amarillo paper of Tuesday reported that a shot would make at least a 25-barrel of it, but that the company would go deeper.—Hartley County News.

Texas County Wells

The Wilcox Zea No. 1 have drilled out cement and have hold of tools. The Hovey are drilling at about 3,300 feet but are bothered by a cavy hole. The Valerius No. 1 are cleaning out hole at 2,272 feet and the Valerius No. 2 are drilling at 3,250 feet. The Reiter-Foster Kugle No. 1, near Texhoma, are drilling at about 2,260 feet and the Allison well has finished fishing and is drilling at 1,005 feet.—Guymon Tribune.

Gibson Well to Pay Sand

The Gibson well 12 miles northeast of town is to pay sand. Material is on the ground for the drilling of the Gill well, 3 miles southeast of town. On the J. E. George ranch, spudding in.—Miami Chief.

Under Reaming at Lyman Well

It seems that they were not thru the quick sand at the Lyman well, after all. Still having some trouble with caves. Have set the 12 1-2 inch casing and the under-reaming at 780 feet.—Hartley County News.

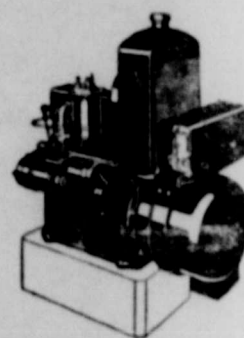
