DISTRICT GOVERNOR WILL VISIT LOCAL ROTARY CLUB THURSDAY

The Rotary Club of Cisco on Thursday, August 6, will be host to Grady Halbert, Governor of the 186th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the thirty-one Rotary Clubs in the District. He will confer with President William H. McAnnally, Secretary William W. Fewell and other local officers on Rotary administration and service activities, at a Club Assembly Wednesday night, August 5.

Mr. Halbert is a farmer in Ford County and is a member of the Rotary Club of Crowell. He was elected District Governor of Rotary International for the 1953-54 fiscal year at the annual Rotary Convention in Paris, France, last May. He is one of the 212 District Governors supervising the activities of some 8,000 Rotary Clubs which have a membership of 372,000 business and professional executives in 86 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Cisco because they are based on the same general objectives — developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year this world-wide service organization has continued to grow in numbers and in strength. During the past fiscal year, for example, 217 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 42 countries of North, South and Central America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and the Islands of the Pacific.

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Less Texas Crop Land Is Planted, Survey Reveals

Total acreage of Texas crops is estimated by the Crop Reporting Board of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at 24.8 million acres, or 3 percent below 1952, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. A sharply reduced acreage of cotton and wheat and a moderately lower corn acreage more than offset increased sorghum and oats acreages.

Critically droughty conditions over the western two-thirds of the State caused growers to make some decided changes from earlier intentions. The major shift has been from cotton to sorghum. Much sorghum acreage in the northwest remained to be planted after July 1 and acreage reported for this crop included a substantial amount of "hopeful intentions," realization of which is dependent upon receiving moisture in time to carry them out. Also, included in the cotton estimate is considerable acreage in the northwest not yet up to a stand.

Most dryland wheat in the important northwest area was seeded in the "dust" — did not emerge until mid-January and was barely maintained during the winter by light snows and showers. Prospects faded fast during the dry April and May as the already scant subsoil moisture was exhausted. The final outturn exceeded the estimate of a month ago. In the northwest, much low-yielding acreage was combined that would have been abandoned and seeded to sorghum if moisture conditions had permitted.

In north Texas, yields were even higher than the bumper yields indicated a month ago. Yields of oats and barley in the important Blacklands were excellent. Corn prospects were reduced by hot, dry weather in June which caught much corn in the critical tasseling period.

Peanuts in the eastern half of the State were materially helped by late June rains, but much of the crop needs moisture. On the more favorable side, a record-large rice crop is indicated. This large production reflects the largest acreage of record and favorable yield prospects. The severe drought in the western part of the State, while causing heavy acreage losses, is causing greatest concern at present in connection with pastures and livestock. Pasture condition at 43 percent of normal is 1 point above the record low of July 1 condition reported in 1934. All range feed condition was reported at the lowest July 1 condition of record.

Cotton in cultivation July 1, estimated at 9,600,000 acres, is 18 percent less than the 11,756,000 acres in cultivation a year ago but 15 percent above the 1942-1951 average of 8,376,000 acres. Acreage was reduced sharply in the northwest, particularly in the southern high plains and the northern low rolling plains as dry weather prevented growers from planting acreage originally intended.

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Over 600 Sign In PMA Feed Project

Eastland County farmers have been assigned an allotment of 6,448 acres for wheat next year under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's new program for this crop, Administrator Emmett Powell of the County PMA Office reported today.

The allotment of 6,448 acres represents 78 percent of the acreage planted in wheat during the past two years, Mr. Powell said. Eastland County's 78 per cent of the two-year average was regarded as good compared with a 76 percent average for the state. The PMA committee met last week to divide the county's acreage allotment among the farmers who had applied for an allotment. Those who have planted wheat the past two years were given preference in quota assignments, with a small amount going to farmers as new grower allotments.

The individual farmers were mailed notices this week of their acreage allotments, Mr. Powell said.

The PMA is still busy with the peanut acreage measuring program, Mr. Powell reported. He estimated that two-thirds of the county's 30,000 acres of peanuts have been measured. The measuring work is behind schedule due to the fact that a large number of farmers did not plant their peanuts until after July 1, Mr. Powell said.

The PMA office still is busy with the drought relief feed program. Mr. Powell reported that some 600 Eastland County cattlemen have signed applications for the feed offered by the government at about half the retail price in the program.

Orders for more than 1,250,000 pounds of cotton seed pellets have been placed with the Surplus Commodity Corporation, a USDA agency, to fill the requests of Eastland County cattlemen. Mr. Powell said. Some 300 tons of pellets have already been delivered, along with one car of corn and one car of oats.

The PMA office has ordered about 250,000 pounds of corn and 350,000 pounds of oats to fill applications of county stockmen. No order has been placed for wheat as there has not been sufficient demand for a full carload.

Mr. Powell reported that the PMA has completed arrangements in all cities of the county for feed dealers to handle the distribution of the feed to the stockmen. Cars of the relief feed sent to Cisco will be unloaded by Thornton Feed Mill.

New Egg Program To Be Discussed At Thursday Meet

The cage hen egg factory program will be discussed by Bob Payne of Fort Worth, assistant regional sales manager for the Putnam Company, at a meeting at Henry's Feed Store here at 8 p. m. Thursday.

Anyone interested in egg production was invited to attend the meeting. Mr. Payne has had a prominent part in the development of the new egg program and will discuss all phases of egg production, Mr. Henry said. The cage hen egg factory program has been introduced in Texas during the past year.

New Booklet Gives Oil Formation Data

AUSTIN, Aug. 5.—New facts about the Ellenberger formations — geological strata which play important parts in Texas petroleum production — are available in a University of Texas publication.

The Bureau of Economic Geology bulletin gives many details about the relations of surface and subsurface sections of the formations, which extend through major portions of more than 100 Texas counties, Bureau Director John T. Lonsdale announced.

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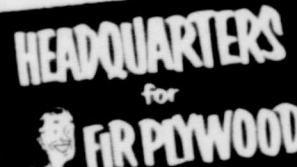

Soil Tests Reduce Risk in Field Crop Production

Good seed and adequate fertilizer are two important controllable factors in crop production. The cost of growing, harvesting, storing and marketing a farm crop may range from a few dollars to two or three hundred dollars per acre. Whether little or much, it is foolish to make the required investment for seed, fertilizer, labor, etc., without having all the information that can be obtained readily about the soil on which the crop is to be grown. How foolish to neglect it—and yet how small a per cent of our farmers go to this effort? And how little it costs?

Testing soils is no panacea for all plant ills, but it helps in diagnosing nutritional disorders and in preventing deficiencies or overdoses of fertilizer.

There are a number of different methods of soil testing. Experimental stations have their own ways of arriving at results, but in the end they tell the grower what he should do to maintain fertility in his soil.

Soils are usually tested for available nitrates, phosphoric acid, potassium and calcium as well as soluble salts and pH. In specific cases tests are made for trace elements — magnesium, manganese, iron, copper, etc.

As an example of wide variations in plant nutrients, in 567 soil tests made in one county in North Carolina, 29% were low to very low in phosphorus, and 74% low to very low in potash. In another county, 35% tests showed 39% low to very low in phosphorus, and 24% low to very low in potash.

The soils or agronomy departments of many experiment stations have facilities available for soil testing. Many seedsmen today provide this service for their customers. In most cases the experiment stations, seed dealers, and commercial laboratories make a nominal charge for service. The correct interpretation placed on the tests and the recommendations for fertilizing or otherwise correcting a soil condition are most important. Although soil testing is not an exact science, it serves as a pretty sound indicator of nutrients in the soil. And that's a long step toward success in crop production.

How to Get Maximum Profits From Good Seed and Fertilizer

1. Have your soil tested. You need to know what your soil has and what it lacks. You may be surprised how much your soil needs and how little you have given it.
2. Don't be sparing of fertilizer. Fertilize for the good years. Find out the maximum from which profitable returns can be obtained and use it even if the amount is much greater than you have ever used before.
3. If the crop is to be an adapted high-yielding hybrid corn and your soil is a good corn soil, it may be profitable to spend \$25 to \$40 or even more per acre for fertilizer including some extra nitrogen. And don't stint on seed. With maximum fertilization you may require 15,000 to 18,000 plants per acre for maximum yield. Louis Abbott of Illinois has averaged 129 bushels yield and \$129 profit an acre for all corn grown on his 210 acre farm for 12 years, but he used the best hybrids, spent from \$30 to \$70 an acre for fertilizer and made his greatest profit the year when he spent \$70 an acre for fertilizer.
4. Use the right fertilizer when and where it will do the most good. Take report of your soil test and your cropping history to your county agent and get his advice about hybrids and fertilizers to use.

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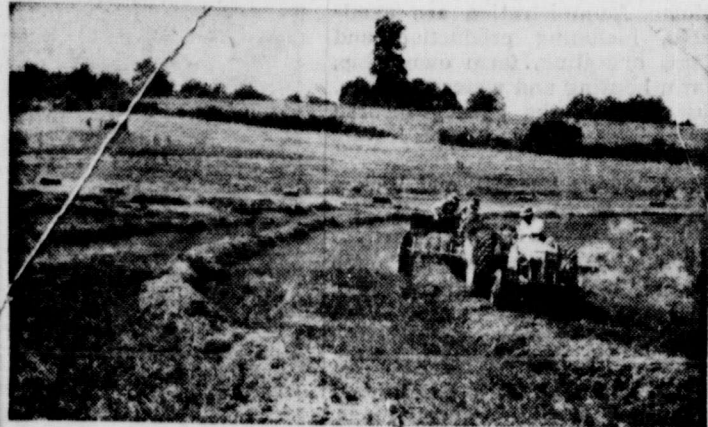

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Baling high quality lespedeza hay from windrow with pick-up baler. This Arkansas farmer baled more than 6,000 bales of alfalfa, lespedeza and red clover hay with this baler in one season.

Making top-quality hay can be one of the most profitable farm jobs. Hay having the highest feed value can be produced only on fertile soils containing those elements necessary for both plant growth and for livestock feed.

High quality hay cannot be produced unless the meadows are kept clean of weeds and other trash, the hay plants are cut at the proper stage of maturity, and the crop is properly handled, cured, and stored as quickly as possible.

Legume hays should be raked as soon as they are well wilted and the curing completed in small, loose windrows as quickly as possible to avoid loss of leaves and color.

The preservation of the leaves in alfalfa, clover and other legume hays is most important since the leaves contain most of the protein, minerals and vitamins in the hay.

A University of Wisconsin report shows that you lose feed value equal to 1,100 pounds of linseed meal and 700 pounds of corn and cob meal when you make hay with only 30 per cent leaves instead of with 57 per cent. Where weather conditions at

haymaking time are usually unfavorable or uncertain for the drying of hay, artificial drying or barn-finishing should be considered. This increases the cost of hay, but the greater value of the product usually compensates for the extra cost.

In judging 900 samples of hay during 32 county legume-grass shows, three University of Illinois Extension Service judges found that four out of five entries were allowed to get too dry in the field before the hay was put into the barn. This shatters the leaves and causes the hay to lose feed value.

Here are four tips on making top-quality hay:

1. Check long-range weather forecasts.
2. Cut only what you can cure and store quickly.
3. Do a limited amount of wilting and curing in the windrow to leave leaves and green color.
4. Dry to safe moisture content to avoid moldy hay and barn fires. Safe moisture without mow-curing is 15 per cent for chopped hay, 20 per cent for loose hay and 25 per cent for baled hay.

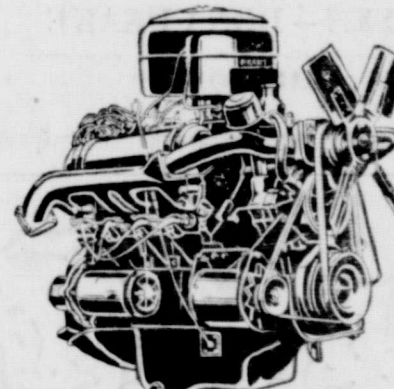
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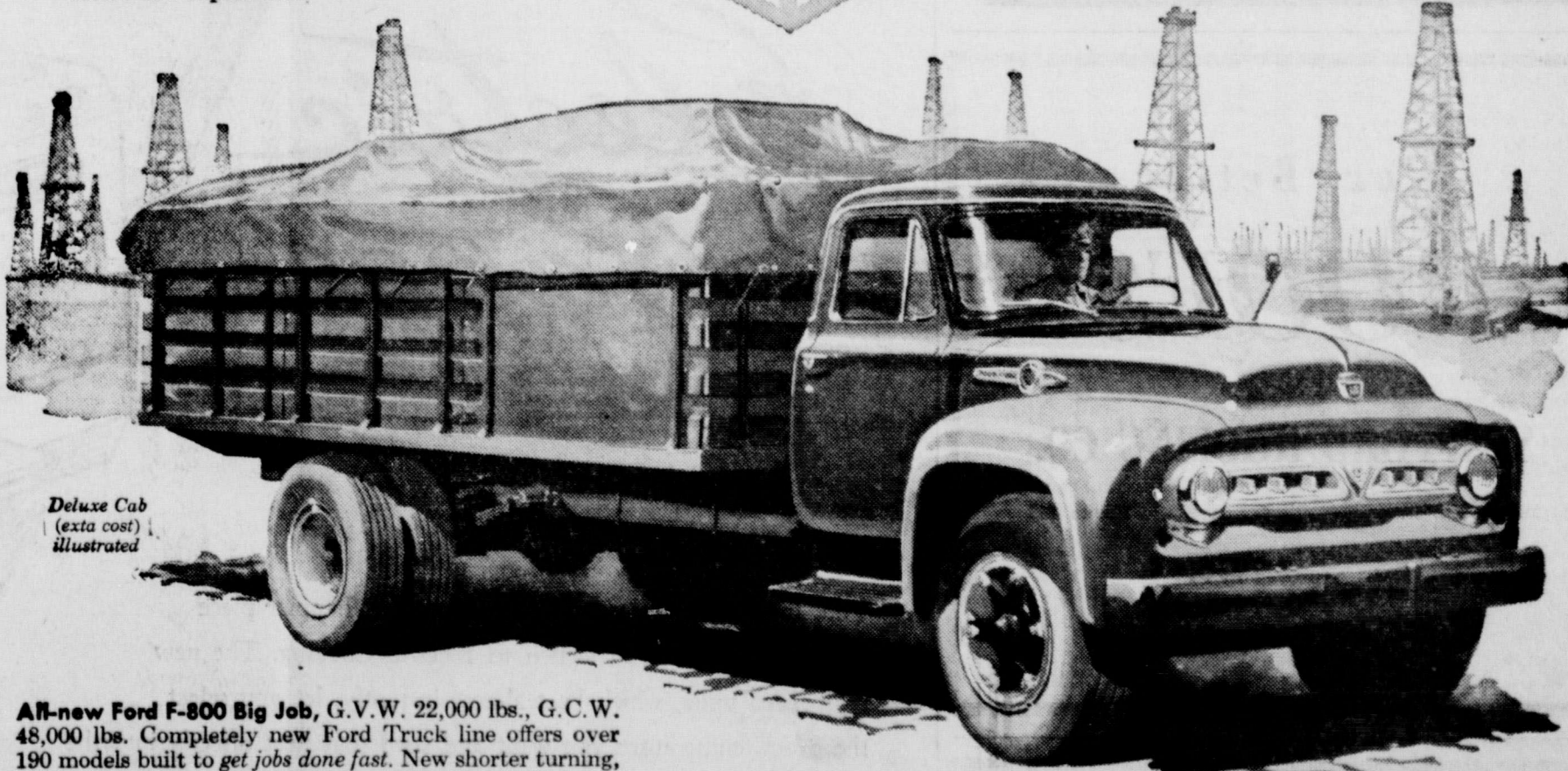

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN — Business has been booming in Texas the past six months, despite the farmer's plight. A report from the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas reveals that the first six months of 1953 were "the best in Texas' business history."

Heaviest activity was in the industrial growth of the state.

Scattered showers continued to fall over Texas, putting a dent in the drought situation.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported that much of the state was benefited, except for dry southern counties. More rain is needed everywhere, the USDA said, especially in the south and the southern high plains.

Reportedly good was the outlook for a cotton crop.

Texas potentially has an ample water supply. But at present about 85 per cent of the flow of Texas' rivers goes into the Gulf of Mexico.

That circumstance was reported to the Senate by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, who based his remarks on a study made by the Austin office of the U. S. Reclamation Bureau.

Johnson recommended that the federal government and the state work together for the conservation and use of this water so as to provide food, clothing, and industrial opportunities to an ever-increasing population in the Southwest.

Federal-state cooperation was a principal subject as the National Governors' Conference met in Seattle, Washington.

Governor Shivers, chairman of the conference this year, opened the sessions with a keynote address.

Scheduled to appear during the conference are President Eisenhower and some members of his cabinet, including Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, and Attorney General Herbert Brownell.

When Shivers left Texas for Seattle, Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey took over as the state's chief executive and immediately went to work as presiding officer of the Legislative Budget Board.

The Board instructed its staff to tackle the problem of a separate appropriations item to augment the salaries of topnotch professors so that they might be attracted to the state's colleges and universities.

Being studied too were plans for subsistence allowances for state hospital workers, the financing of a long-range land-use, drought-combat program. Much time also was devoted to budgeting plans for all buildings and capital investments so the Legislature can study the state's building needs as a whole rather than acting upon separate requests from different agencies.

Vernon A. McGee, budget director, was re-elected for a one-year term.

Members of the Texas Legislative Council, meeting in a two-day session here, have given top priority to studies on six different and unrelated subjects.

Four of them were asked by the recent Legislature. They include:

1. Protection of livestock from disastrous disease and the control of such diseases; methods of financing control; means of paying livestock owners for losses incurred under control and eradication measures.

2. Comparison study of game and fish laws of other states and their conservation programs.

3. Study of proposals for reorganization of court system.

4. Inventory of public lands.

Other matters set for study include general reclassification of Texas laws, last done in 1925; laws relating to annexations by cities; and a study of codification of the juvenile delinquency laws.

Director John D. Mosely was given authority to move the commission's headquarters from the Capitol to 105 West 14th Street.

Testimony will be heard here, beginning August 17, in removal proceedings against District Judge C. Woodrow Laughlin of Alice.

District Judge D. B. Wood of Georgetown, commissioner for the state supreme court in the case, set the date.

After the testimony is received, the record will go to the supreme court for decision as to whether Judge Laughlin shall be ousted from his office.

Ouster proceedings against Judge Laughlin were brought by 11 South Texas lawyers, who charge that irregularities have occurred in the judicial district which is politically dominated by George Parr.

Federal drought relief legislation, passed by Congress, provides \$30 million for economic disaster loans, \$60 million for special livestock loans, \$40 million to subsidize shipments of feed and seed to disaster areas, and \$20 million for production and subsistence loans under the Farmers Home Administration.

Farmers and ranchers, not only in Texas but also in other parts of the Southwest, will be eligible for assistance under the program.

Prior to the passage of this bill, \$16 million already was available for drought relief from Agriculture Department funds.

Chancellor Gibb Gilchrist of Texas A&M said the school's board of directors will determine how the institution will participate in a hay and feed distribution program.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd had ruled that the college has full legal authority to furnish hay and feed to drought areas.

William L. McGill, state defense and disaster relief co-ordinator announced that the college would be asked to set up a \$500,000 revolving fund to administer

volume purchases and distribution of hay.

Most of the relief livestock feed will have to come from other states, in the opinion of Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, who completed an inventory showing that only about 10 per cent of the needed amount is available in Texas.

McGill said the state disaster committee was awaiting word from Southwestern railroads as to whether they would grant a 50 per cent freight reduction on shipment of livestock from drought areas to pastures elsewhere.

Granted by the rails were half rates on shipment of feed into the parched areas.

Cattlemen will get help from

state banks, said State Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner.

Falkner reported to Governor Shivers that he had talked with most of the state bankers in the drought disaster area, and "It is their thought that where they are financing cattlemen who have a home and are not hopelessly in debt, they are willing to ride out the depression with them."

Help will be coming for the dairymen as well as farmers and ranchmen, Secretary Benson said in response to a telegram from C. O. Norton, representing the North Texas Milk Producers Association.

Benson stated: "It always has been the intent of the instructions by the Department of Agriculture regarding delivery of feed that dairy men should be

included on the same basis as beef cattlemen."

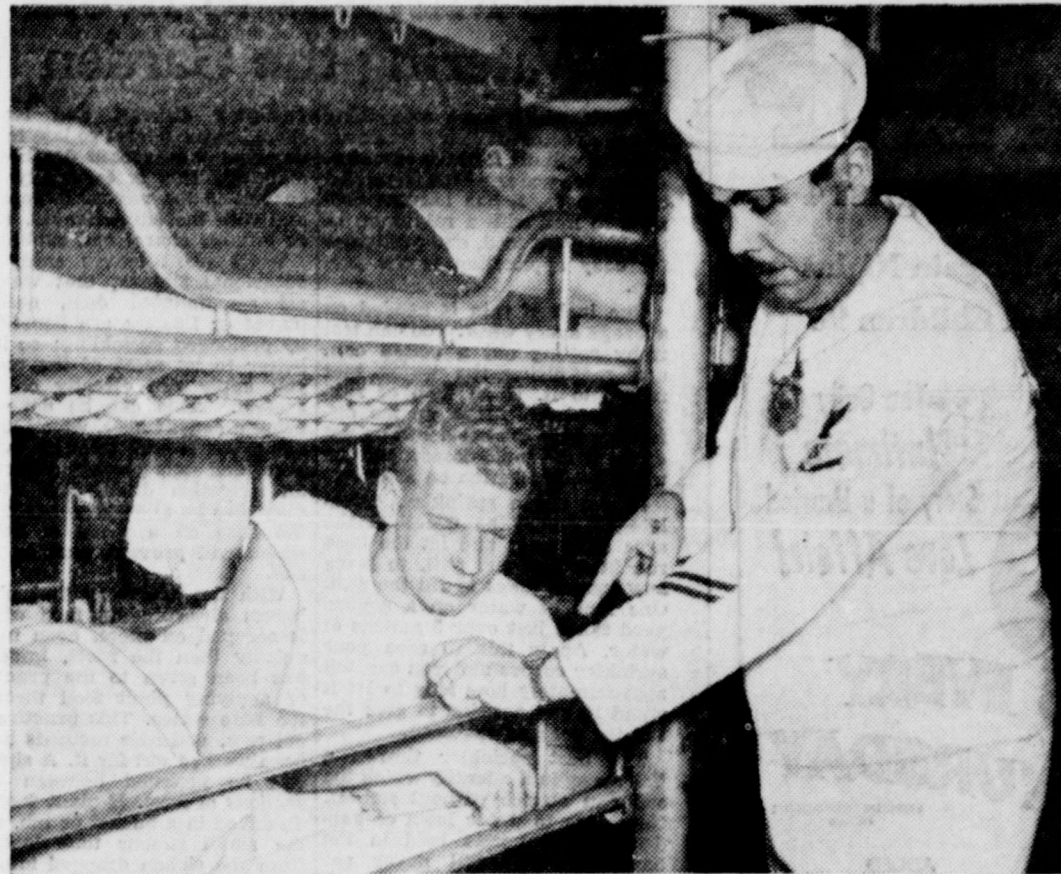

Americans have cause to be proud — to have faith in themselves.

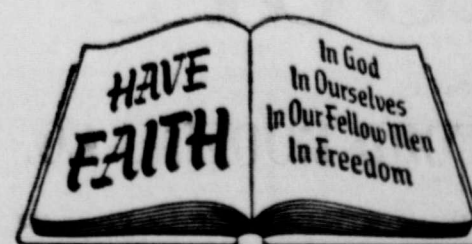

Some Mistakes to Avoid in Watering the Garden

Plants which have everything else required for vigorous growth, will die for lack of water. And in the water which is carried by the hose, it has become possible to mix with a minimum of trouble, plant food, and pesticides for easy application to the garden.

One inch of rain is needed on average every week. You can test it by setting out a coffee can, and measuring the water that falls into it. If an inch of rain fails to come, make up the difference with the hose. But do not apply it in small doses; put the whole week's ration on at once.

If you use a sprinkler, calculate as nearly as practical the area it covers; and let the hose run in a 10 quart pail, to learn how long it takes to fill the pail. One inch of water on a square yard takes just over 5 gallons of water. Apply this to area your sprinkler covers and you can tell approximately how long to let it stand in one position to give the soil the soaking required.

The best sprinkler throws a fine spray in a quantity which the soil can absorb without run-off. Never try to water lawn or garden with a nozzle held in the hand, for you will never get enough on. The success of artificial watering is entirely dependent on the quantity applied; it does not depend on the temperature of the water. Cold water is just as good as warm; it will all be the same by the time it reaches the plant roots.

The idea that gardens should not be watered in the sunshine is obsolete. That is really the best time to water, if a sprinkler is used; because the leaves dry quickly, and do not go into the night wet. Dampness and darkness encourage the spread of

fungus disease, and leaves should never be wet so late in the day that they cannot dry before nightfall. This is especially important in the vegetable garden, and with the edible leaves, such as lettuce, chard, and cabbages.

While plant leaves enjoy an occasional shower, that washes off accumulated dust, neither leaves or flowers are benefited by prolonged sprinkling; so it is better to let most of the water you apply run directly on the ground. This can be done by using a canvas hose, which leaks along its length through every pore, and thus plays the part of an irrigation ditch. The water may also be allowed to run from the hose on a piece of board which will prevent washing the soil.

With the discovery that plant leaves absorb plant food which is sprayed on them, even more quickly than the roots, impetus has been given to the practice of applying plant food through the hose water. This practice is not new, and safe methods have been worked out for it. A siphon can be fastened between two sections of hose. If plant food is dissolved in a bucket or tub, and the small rubber tube leading from the siphon dropped into it, the fertilizer solution will be lifted up and mixed with the hose water.

If dry plant food is used, mix it in the tub with one pound to 2 gallons of water. If soluble plant foods are used, prepare a solution which the direction says is safe for applying to plants in the garden. When these solutions are further diluted by the hose water there will be no danger of burning the plant leaves. Most gardens will benefit from a food application once a month during the summer.

Once in awhile, out of a clear sky a person may have an attack of acute cystitis, an inflammation of the bladder that stores urine. He notices a desire to pass urine more frequently; may have pain before, during, or after urination; and possibly may see blood or pus in the urine or it may appear cloudy. Fever may be present.

Any number of conditions, either within the urinary tract or elsewhere in the body, may cause acute cystitis, and any one of a number of germs may be responsible. The bladder, which under normal circumstances is quite resistant to disease, becomes infected by several routes.
