Rebels Zap James Bowie 56-0

The Rivercrest Rebels scored five times in the first quarter Friday night against James Bowie before the second team offense took to

the field to gain experience, and after a long ballgame, defeated the Pirates 56-0. The Rebels literally scored at will against James Bowie,

allowing the Pirates only one first down in the entire first half of play, and four in the second half. The game was obviously a

heyday for the Rivercrest offensive unit, with almost everyone in the backfield scoring more than one touchdown. Leading the scoring

was sophomore running back Billy Froelich, who carried eight times for 121 yards and four touchdowns.

Senior halfback Jimmy Via scored two times, kicked six extra points and passed for two more. Via completed the pass for two extra points when a high snap sent the ball above the hands of quarterback Dale Jean, who was holding for Via. Jean went downfield when Via picked up the football, but he was too late. Brian Harville was already open in the end zone and waiting for Via's pass. Some nights you just can't do anything wrong.

Sophomore fullback Jerry Merchant made two touchdowns Friday night, and carried 12 times for 80 yards. Jean carried two times for 11 yards, and passed to Harville in the fourth quarter for 28 yards and a first down.

Longest runs were made by Via, who scored one touchdown on a 60 yard effort, and Froelich, who ran 55 yards for one of his touchdowns.

The second team offense was well exposed to the James Bowie Pirates, and scored once late in the fourth quarter.

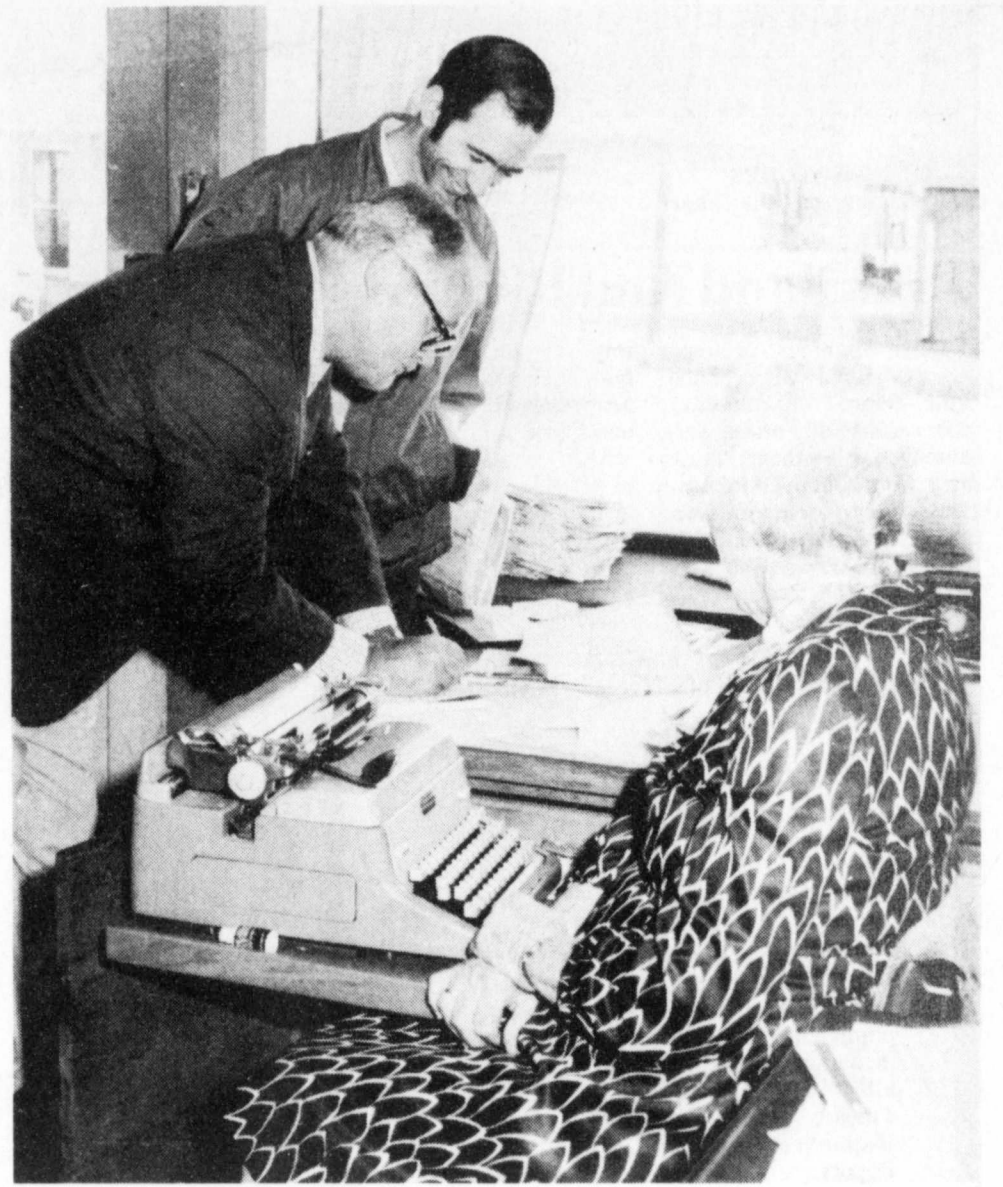
With James Strickland at quarterback, the Rebels moved the ball to the James Bowie nine yard line on the running of Jerry Merchant and Roger Edge and David Birchfield. Another drive died at the James Bowie four yard line just as the halftime whistle blew.

The Rebels will play at Maud Friday night with kickoff set for 7:30 p.m.

Shot Clinic Set For Thursday

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announces plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall, Bogata, Texas Thursday, Nov. 8, 1979, from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m.

Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two (2) months of age. Immunizations to be

offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr., announced today that the Community Services Administration has approved a grant in the amount of \$292,826 to the Community Action Resource Services, Inc. (CARS) of Texarkana, Texas, for administration and the local initiative program. These funds will be used to provide an administrative capability for the agency which will include financial accountability, planning, program development and coordination as well as mobilization of resources (federal, state and local); also for implementation of specific programs to stimulate a better focusing of all resources on the goal of enabling low-income persons to become fully self-sufficient.

The Community Action Resource Services, Inc. serves both Bowie and Red River Counties.

During the past few months the ambulance controversy has kept the attention of most Bogata area residents, but we still have an ambulance stationed in Bogata. How much longer-one week, or one year?

That question will have to be answered by just one person, you. This decision can't be put off any longer or sluffed off on your neighbor. Either you and I support the service now or it is gone.

The men attempting to set up a non-profit Red River Ambulance Service are out of money. Contributions to keep the service here in the Bogata area will run out within the week.

Sponsors of this non-profit Ambulance Service need enough subscriptions to run the service for a full year, thus guaranteeing you a full year's service. In the event there are not enough subscriptions, all subscribers will have their money returned, and we lose the ambulance.

The thought of having to call an emergency vehicle from Mt. Pleasant or Paris should send cold chills up and down everyone's spine. Heart attack victims need trained help within minutes, not the thirty or forty minutes that it will take to get to Bogata from a neighboring community.

During the past few weeks I haven't talked to anyone who didn't agree that there is a need for ambulance service in Bogata, but to put off a decision until tomorrow about joining may cost too much. Tomorrow is today, and time has run out. The excuse that I am just too busy, may be the factor that costs you the services of an ambulance that we have lost.

It is your choice whether we keep this vitally needed service. Businesses in Bogata are taking applications for you now.

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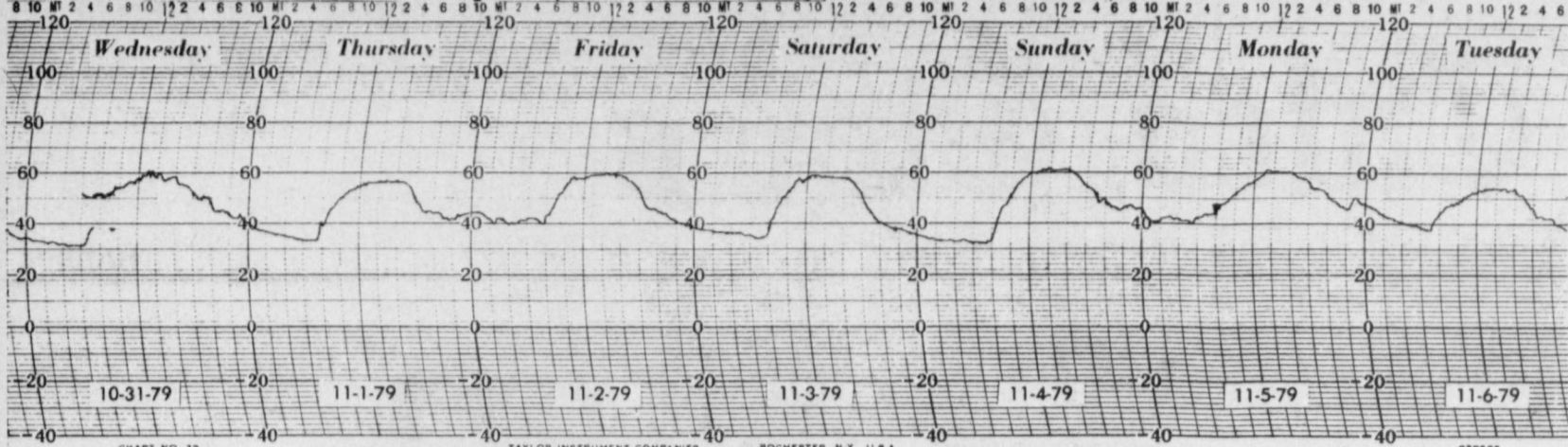

Cost Of Living Increase Approved

Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. announced today that the House of Representatives has approved a 9.9-percent cost-of-living increase in compensation payments to approximately 3,108,000 service-connected disabled veterans and the widows and children of those who have died as a result of service-connected causes. If approved by the Senate and signed into law, all payments will be retroactive to October 1.

The House action amended previous legislation passed by the House in July which had called for an 8.3-percent increase, according to Hall. Representative Hall, a member of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs, said that passage of the amended compensation increase had been delayed

for six weeks while the Congress awaited settlement of the Second Concurrent Budget Resolution now in a House-Senate Conference. "Members of our Committee felt that further delay was intolerable. Disabled veterans and their survivors have a right to know what their increase will be and when they are going to get it," Hall said. He indicated that the 9.9-percent figure should fall within spending limits already accepted within the Second Concurrent Budget Resolution. He also stated there should be sufficient funds left over to carry on important VA medical and other worthy veterans assistance programs.

"Our original increase projection for FY 1980 was based on Congressional Budget Office estimates for

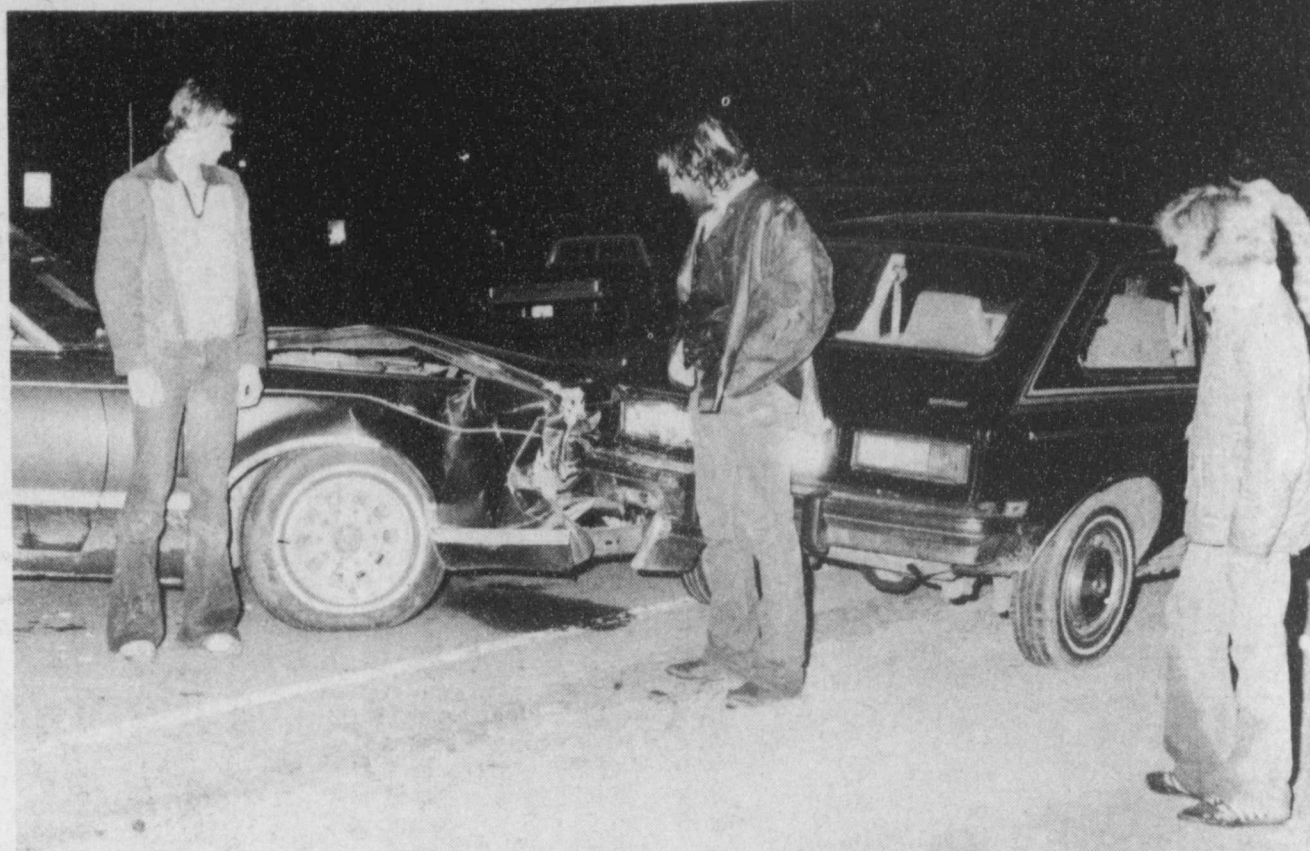

Four-H'ers Earn Scholarships

Davison is also a 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, the parent organization of 4-H.

"The Texas 4-H Foundation, a non-profit organization, is the private sector support component of the statewide 4-H program," explains Davison. "Directors of this foundation arrange and award scholarships to some 67 4-H members each year. These scholarships vary in value from \$200 to \$6,000."

Scholarship sponsors include the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Texas Grain and Feed Association, C.J. Davidson Memorial Scholarship Fund, Texas Farm Bureau, Raymond Dixon Foundation, Morrison Milling Co., Cloth World, American Sportsman Club, and Game Conservation International.

Scholarship programs are only a part of the overall mission of the Texas 4-H Foundation, according to the 4-H official. The organization

also assists with funding and support of many leadership and skills development programs for 4-H members and adult volunteers. In addition the Foundation operates the Texas 4-H Center near Brownwood, which serves as a camping and training center for the 180,000-member program. "Although this seems to be a sizable investment," says Davison, "it is only a part of the total private sector support for 4-H in Texas. Numerous scholarships are funded and awarded from other sources at the local county level throughout the state."

More information regarding scholarships and other aspects of the 4-H program are available from every county Extension office, adds Davison.

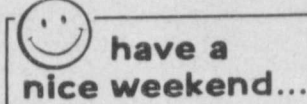

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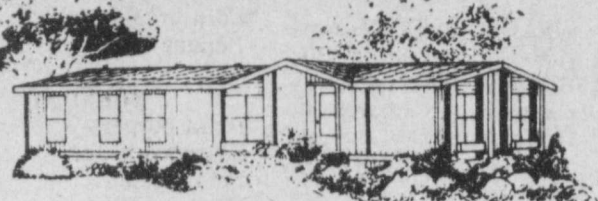

Gardening Made Easy

By Barrie L. Kridler
Near freezing nights and falling leaves signal the end of the gardening season for most people, but true gardeners know that work done now will be the most important of the year. It's rather like the proverbial "Chicken or the egg" controversy on which season really begins the growing year. Old Ma Nature seems to prefer fall and I'm all with her for several reasons. Nearly all seeds, nuts and fruits ripen late summer into fall and usually start to sprout with the first fall rains. With this head start, they are off and growing at the earliest hint of spring. Bluebonnets, pecans, acorns and all spring bulbs are

starting to prepare growth for spring. This is the finest season of the year for soil conditions - moisture in abundance, gentle warm sun and falling leaves to mulch, feed and protect the seeds or plants through winter. Roots have two more months of good growing season to store food and prepare for the burst of growth that spring will bring. If a good mulch of shredded leaves or pine bark mulch is applied, this can be extended into a whole winter of root growth. Such plants will be nearly twice the size of spring planted trees and shrubs at the end of the growing season next fall. In a week or two, the first pecan and fruit trees will be dug -

Selections are excellent early in the season, however, by spring many will be picked over. If you have a particular want, an order placed now will guarantee the variety of fruit or nut tree for your yard. Pecan trees respond to fall planting better than almost any other tree. While savoring those delicious pecans this fall (and it is a bumper crop year!) look to the yard and see if there is room for one or two. It takes two trees for good pollination, however, if there is another close in a nearby yard, it will very likely serve. Pec

Reports Needed Crop And Livestock

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information

gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield, and production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the date provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions. Accurate estimates are also essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning, and enacting wise legislation and are used in establishing acreages and payment levels to producers under the various commodity programs.

The collection and publication of agricultural statistics are a cooperative effort between the Texas Department of Agriculture and USDA. This cooperation avoids duplication of effort, promotes economies, and increases the effectiveness of statistical reports. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

County estimates for 1978 and January 1, 1979, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, or by writing Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.
