### Josh Lee Is Winner

Nominated by Democrats of Oklahoma for United States Senate Over Marland

Josh Lee, now serving his first term in the United States Congress as the representative from the Norman, Okla. district, was the winner in the Tuesday run-off primary over Governor E. W. Marland.

Will Rogers, congressman-at-large of the Texas hero, late reports show that Phil Ferguson, Woodward, Oklahoma, was holding a slight lead over former Governor Henry S. Johnson, his opponent for renomination as Congressman.

### SMALL DEFEATS CURTIS DOUGLASS

FINAL RESULTS OF SATURDAY PRIMARY GIVE SMALL VICTORY BY MAJORITY OF OVER 1,800 VOTES

Senator Clint Small's majority over Curtis Douglass was not changed over the Sunday night figure of 1,835 by reports Monday from scattered returns from incomplete counties.

The total count Monday afternoon stood at 49,057 votes, divided as follows:

Small 25,446; Douglass, 23,611. Small had a majority of 1,835, the slight increase coming in some additional returns reported from Parmer, Swisher, Hutchinson and Gray counties.

It was estimated that no more than 1,000 votes remained to be tallied in the five counties which had not made complete returns.

Counties giving Small a majority were Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Collingsworth, Castro, and Childress.

Douglass lead in Ochiltree, Hutchinson, Carson, Gray, Donley, Parmer, Swisher, Brisco and Hall counties.

MRS. JIM DODSON IS ELECTED STATE HEAD OF 4-H SPONSORS IN MEETING AT COLLEGE STATION

A singular honor came to Mrs. Jim Dodson last week when she was elected state chairman of the 4-H Club sponsors at the annual Short Course, held at A. & M. College, Station. The course this year was July 20-25. Ochiltree County is justly proud of this honor. It is a fitting tribute to Mrs. Dodson's untiring effort among the 4-H club members. She is sponsor of Ochiltree County 4-H clubs.

At a large banquet during the Short Course, as winners in the Centennial Farm and Home Improvement contest, sponsored by the Semi-Weekly Farm and Dallas News, were awarded their prizes. Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Conner, Farmers, who won second in the 21 counties in District One, were presented a \$50.00 check for second place. Mr. and Mrs. Conner ranked very high in this contest. There were only a few points difference between them and the district winner, which placed fourth in the entire state.

A summary of outstanding work by Ochiltree Home Demonstration clubs, since last Short Course, was given at Short Course. This outlines the major achievements and activities of the clubs throughout the county and will be printed in the special birthday edition of the Herald, August 13th.

### PEACOCK FARM DEMONSTRATION

PEACOCK MACHINE FOR CON-SERVING MOISTURE WILL BE SHOWN AT LIBERAL SATURDAY

LIBERAL, Kans., July 29.—Farm and civic leaders from every section of the southwest are invited to attend the demonstration of the Peacock farming method to be held here Saturday, August 1, starting promptly at 10:00 o'clock in the morning.

Actual field tests and demonstrations will be held during the morning hours, using a machine that was constructed especially for this purpose by E. R. Kinner, engineer for the Soil Conservation Service, Colorado Springs, Colo., under the direction of its inventor, C. T. Peacock, Arriba, Colo.

The afternoon program will consist of a lecture by Mr. Peacock who will explain the wheat farming method he has perfected that enables him to produce eighteen to twenty bushels every year, under drought conditions exactly like those in this particular section and on farm land very similar.

Plans will also be discussed during the meeting for a proposed, inexpensive auto caravan trip to the Peacock farm near Arriba, where farmers can get first hand information concerning the method that promises to revolutionize dry land wheat farming methods.

### START DRIVE ON SMALL TOWN BUSINESS HOUSES

Chicago, Ill.—As the first step in the distribution of ten million mail-order catalogues by Sears, Roebuck & Co., 120 freight cars and 91 motor trucks left this city laden with heavy books from which millions of Americans make their Autumn purchases. A thousand freight cars will be required before the edition is distributed. Another big mail-order house, Montgomery Ward & Co., will increase its catalogue edition this year from six million to seven million, employing 550 year-round workers in its preparation.

The above news item was taken from the Herald's regular "News of the Week" service. In plain words, it is the start of a drive for business by the big mail-order houses that the small town merchant should and would get if he advertised and went after the business like the bigger houses. Business reports show that the big mail-order houses are doing the biggest business in their history. They are entitled to the business for they are going after it. While the average small town business man is running one advertisement a month and sometimes none at all, the mail-order houses are keeping up a constant bid for business. ### POINTS ABOUT FARM PROGRAM

COUNTY AGENT STOVALL OBTAINS INFORMATION ABOUT NEW FARM PROGRAM AND BENEFITS

As time goes on all of us are interested to a greater or lesser degree in the Agricultural Conservation Program. What can we do? What should be done and when the job should be completed.

First: To participate in the new program we must have left 15 percent of our land idle or had no harvest on this amount in 1936.

Second: This 15 percent must have been through a soil conserving practice. Any soil building practice is now considered soil conserving. (This is a slight change from former rulings) and in addition we might include in the conserving group, contouring, wide row planting, strip cropping and solid planting where the crop is left on the land or plowed under as a green manure crop.

Any crop plowed under must have been turned before the grain reached maturity or gone through the dough stage.

Any planting done which is to be considered a soil conserving practice must have been done before August 1, 1936. If contouring is to be used as a soil conserving practice to qualify your land this must be done at your earliest convenience or the next time the land is worked.

1. Stake off the land you have taken out of production and qualified for payment in 1936. (Be sure to maintain these stakes.)

2. Turn in to the county agent's office any statement your neighbors have signed as to the turning under of wheat, oats, barley, or other green manure crops.

3. Don't listen to the flock of rumors of what your neighbors are going to do: what they are doing in adjoining states and counties, and what dame rumor reports for it will probably be wrong.

4. Remember that in the new program the man who tries to help himself is the one who will receive the greatest good and payment from this new program.

### MAX W. BOYER DEFEATS ROGERS FOR LEGISLATURE

While a complete vote is not available it is a settled fact that County Attorney Max W. Boyer has defeated Representative B. L. Rogers for the state legislature by an overwhelming vote. Boyer's majority will run at least 1750 votes. He carried all of the 10 counties in the district with the exception of Sherman. Dallam county went for Boyer, 1,227 to 732. He carried Moore county by about 145 votes, Hemphill by a two to one count and Lipscomb by about the same ratio. Boyer's vote in Roberts was about three to one and he carried Hartley by a majority of one and one-half to one. Rogers lost Hutchinson by a vote of 1,306 to 1,803 and Hansford county by 75 votes. Ochiltree went for Boyer 601 to 420.

### APPLY FOR WPA JOBS AUGUST 4

TEXAS RELIEF COMMISSION TO ACCEPT APPLICATIONS FOR EMPLOYMENT ON WPA LABOR ROLLS

Intake offices for referral to WPA will be opened in Ochiltree County August 4, according to A. W. Long, District Relief Administrator of Districts 16 and 17 which consists of thirty-five counties in the Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo, and Pampa territories. Intake offices in other towns in the two districts will be opened as soon thereafter as possible. Mr. Long states that all offices will be opened before August 10th.

The act creating the 1936-37 WPA Program requires that referrals to WPA be made by some public welfare organization. The Texas Relief Commission has agreed to accept this responsibility. Eligibility for referral is based upon one thing only, that basis is need. The only restriction other than need is in the case of an illegal alien who is not eligible. This new ruling eliminates the requirements calling for former relief status.

Mr. Long emphasizes the fact that the Texas Relief Commission does not make the actual certification or the placement. The procedure that will be followed is that when a person in need makes application at the intake office all facts necessary to determine the applicant's actual needs are developed. The information required is in detail. Following this a case worker makes a home visit to the home of the applicant obtaining such other information possible. Collateral visits to references given are also made. After completing this information an adequate budget is developed for the particular family in question. No two families, even of the same size and apparent conditions, have the same requirements. For this reason trained workers are necessary for the handling of these applications. After the budget is developed, income and resources are considered. From this information the need is determined. Applications are then either rejected or referred to the WPA. Whether the referral is accepted or rejected, the Texas Relief Commission has absolutely nothing to do with the actual placing of the applicant on a WPA job.

Texas quota on WPA at present is 81,000 persons, while there are 135,000 now certified. It is anticipated that an additional 50,000 will be accepted under the modified ruling. This makes a total of 185,000 eligible with only 81,000 available jobs. As there is practically no possibility of applicants obtaining jobs immediately and as some little time is required between the date of application and actual referral is completed, the Relief Office are requesting that people do not rush to the Intake Offices, located in the Donley building in this city.

### DOUGLASS AND BOYER GET A BIG MAJORITY

Senator Sheppard, James V. Allred, Ernest Thompson and George H. Sheppard Win Here

### Day Gets Many Votes

William H. McDonald, Charley Lockhart, L. A. Woods Lead in Ochiltree County Primary

Due to the fact that there were no contested offices in Ochiltree county, the vote in the Democratic primary last Saturday was lighter than it has been for several years, a little over a thousand votes being polled.

Congressman Marvin Jones led the ticket in the list of contested offices, getting 718 votes to 265 for John R. Miller. Senator Morris Sheppard received 690 votes, while his nearest opponent, Bush, got 190, and the third man in the United States Senate race, Fisher, received 102. The other three men in this race got a total of less than 50 votes.

In the Governor's contest, Jimmie Allred got 500 votes, a majority over all his opponents. Fischer ran second with 313 votes and Hunter was in third place with 155 tallies. Sanderford and Brooks also ran.

Ernest O. Thompson, running for re-election as Railroad Commissioner, received 586 votes. Hardin was second with 241 votes, with slightly over a total of 100 votes for the other three candidates in this race.

George H. Sheppard, running for re-election as State Comptroller, ran away from his opponents, getting 703 votes to 190 for the two running against him. For Land Commissioner, MacDonald, with 436 votes, led Hawkins, who received 389.

Charley Lockhart, State Treasurer, led the ticket in this county with 420 votes. Hopkins, with 225, and Adair, with 202 votes, ran a close race for second place.

Cliff Day, Plainview candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture, led in this county with 390 votes. McDonald for re-election, was second with 283; and George B. Terrell, third with 283 votes. Segrist also ran.

Curtis Douglass, running against Clint Small, carried the county with 547 votes to Small's 453. In the State Representative's race, with two Ochiltree county men in the race, Max W. Boyer, present County Attorney, carried the county with 601 votes, while the present incumbent, B. L. Rogers, received 420. L. A. Woods, present State Superintendent of Public Education, carried the county with 466 votes against Bullock's 360.

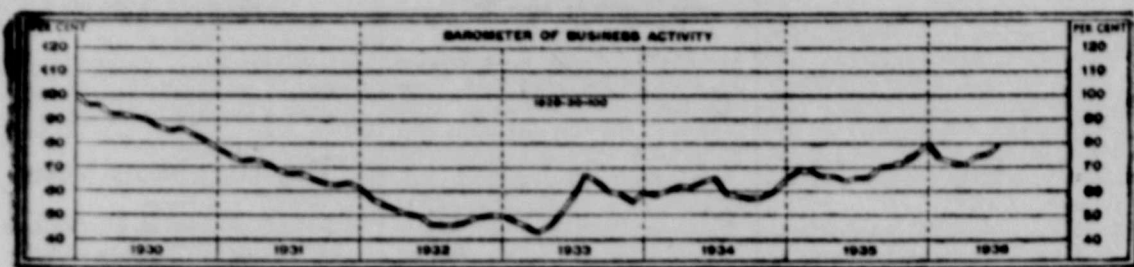

## Upsurge in Nation's Trade and Industry

### BUSINESS CONDITIONS JULY 1936

June saw an upsurge in trade and industry as a whole, but widespread drought retarded most crops. Losses in the northwest spring wheat crop were reported following a long spell of dry weather. Pastures suffered widely. Preparations were reported to ship cattle out of affected areas. Cotton suffered in the southeast. These happenings plus the poor fruit crop reports of May cloud the agricultural outlook as a whole.

Electric power output made new all-time records in June. Steel production, aided by active buying of automobiles, machine tools and railroad locomotives, cars and rails, showed a contra-seasonal increase and almost doubled the output of 1935. Carloadings for June were the heaviest of the year to date. Orders for aircraft were heavy.

Commodity prices, led by grains, rose following the May decline. Chain and mail order sales increased. Cotton consumption and exports surpassed 1935. Railroad fares were reduced. Cigarette and electric refrigerator production broke all records.

Stock market prices advanced for the thirteenth month out of fourteen. Dividend resumptions and new dividend announcements were numerous. Bank debts for the half year were a sixth larger than a year ago. Failures are well below recent years with liabilities about equal to 1935 but far below earlier years.

#### THE MAP

The striking change in the June Map is the darkening in spring wheat areas because of prospective losses of yield from 1935 due to drought damage.

#### THE BAROMETER

The Business Activity Barometer for June rose for the third month this year, thereby tying that of December 1935 and almost equalling that of November, 1936.

## International Sunday School Lesson

Sunday School Lesson August 2, 1936

PHILIP'S MISSIONARY LABORS  
Acts 8:26-40

The Acts of the Apostles is preeminently a book of conversions. Therein are the conditions of pardon revealed and exemplified. Concrete cases are set forth in plain language so that all of us may understand the will of Christ on the matter. In this book we see the great commission executed. Preaching, bearing, faith, repentance, confession, and baptism as conditions upon which the blood of Christ is applied to the sin-sick and wounded hearts of men are set forth with due emphasis in this missionary volume.

#### I. The Angel and His Instructions

The Angel did not appear to the sinner in this case. He appeared to the preacher, the evangelist, Philip. While we may wonder why the heavenly visitor did not go direct to the Ethiopian eunuch with the message of salvation, let us remember that it pleased heaven to commit the gospel message to "earthen vessels" (2 Cor. 4:7; 2 Tim. 2:21; Acts 9:15); that through the preaching of the gospel men might know the will of God (Mat. 28:18-20; Luke 24:46-47; 1 Cor. 1:21). So the angel instructs Philip to go toward Gaza. Another man is journeying from Jerusalem back toward Ethiopia, and whose path will intersect that of Philip. Thus by divine arrangement the sinner and the evangelist are to be brought together.

#### II. The Ethiopian and His Reading

In the distance Philip sighted the eunuch in a chariot. The traveler was reading from Isaiah, chapter fifty-three, a prophecy of Jesus' sacrifice as a Lamb. The reader wondered about whom the prophet spoke, not knowing that Jesus was the subject of the prophecy. The scripture described Jesus as being led to the slaughter. This referred

to the sin that required the blood of the Son of Man to wash them out.

#### III. Philip and His Sermon

Upon receiving instructions from the spirit to join company with the charioteer, Philip accosted the eunuch with the question, "Understandest thou what thou readest?" Then the evangelist began at the same scripture and preached Christ. Of course this included the person, name and commands of Jesus. Learning that Jesus was the Lamb, and that there were certain specific commands to obey in order to come into contact with the shed blood, the Ethiopian nobleman confessed his faith in the master, and was promptly baptized with his Lord in baptism. Rising from the water's grave, he resumed his journey with great rejoicing in his new-found pardon.

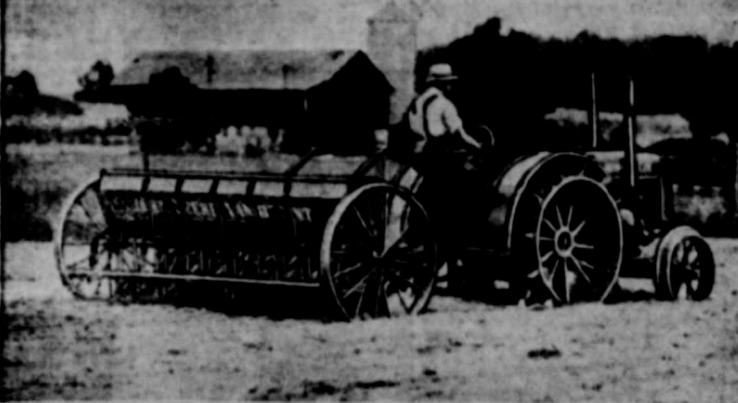

## BEAUTIFUL NEW INTERIORS IN NEW FORD V-8 FOR 1936

Important improvements in the interior treatment of Ford V-8 de luxe and standard body types including refinements in design of interior trim art now in production, it was announced today at the Ford Motor Company offices.

In addition to the interior changes two new and attractive body finish colors are made available—armory green and light-fast maroon—which are standard in de luxe types.

The new treatment makes the Ford V-8 interiors substantially more attractive in the view of buyers who have inspected the new cars, and reflects a continuance of the Ford policy of adding such improvements whenever they become available, without waiting for yearly model changes.

Important among the improvements is the addition of new accessories in the de luxe types. These include a new sport-type steering wheel with smart spring steel flexible spokes, a pull-wind 30-hour clock recessed in the rear vision mirror and a glove compartment lock. Chrome bands also have been added to the wheels.

The theme of the new interior trim of the de luxe body types is derived from a new walnut-grain finish for instrument panel and garnish moldings. The central section of the instrument panel is set off with chromium stripes. Knobs for the throttle, choke and instrument panel light switch and the handle of the cigar lighter as well as the window lift and door handle escutcheon are finished to harmonize with the new finish, while the glove compartment and the window motor handles are in chromium.

The interior upholstery has been newly designed to give a pillow effect, the fabric is monotonizing with the new trim, style sidewall and door upholstery treatment also is used.

Improvements in the standard interiors include a new machine grain finish on instrument panel and window moldings, and chrome-finish fittings, new new upholstery design, new seat and back cushions and a new of broadcloth or mohair upholstery.

Less creamery butter and cheese and ice cream were marketed in 1934 than in 1935, according to the Department of Agriculture. This is due to two factors.

Butter substitutes cut demand for butter. When a new ice cream there is no substitute in ice cream. In addition, the use of ice cream is rapidly, due to the enterprising cream manufacturers who have developed a multitude of enticing flavors, vanilla and lemon. In the ice cream was made money and little sales effort was made to promote its sale. The back of the ice cream cone today promises to develop greater markets for ice cream.

## UNFAIR POLITICAL MEANS

Just what effect did the distribution of a slate for state and district officers endorsed by a certain organization have on the voters who cast their ballots at the voting places in Precincts No. 1 and 12, the courthouse and schoolhouse in Perryton? The way we have doped out the matter is that candidates whose names appeared on this slate received from a 5 to 23 percent advantage. Here is how we figured the advantage. We figured their percentage of combined vote in these two boxes involved against their total vote in the other ten precincts. These percentages ranged from 72 to 90 percent. A comparison of the total high vote in No. 1 and 12, on uncontested races, shows that 67 per cent of the total vote in the county was cast in No. 1 and 12 boxes.

Then for the information of the general public in regard to such a practice as was indulged in at these two boxes last Saturday, we want to quote from the Texas Election Laws, Art. 242, "Using Dummy Ballot. Any judge or citizen may require a citizen to answer under oath before he secures an official ballot whether he has been furnished with any paper or ballot on which is marked the names of anyone for whom he has agreed to vote, or for whom he has been requested to vote, or has such paper or marked ballot in his possession, and he shall not be furnished with an official ballot until he has delivered to the judge such marked paper or ballot, if he has one. Any person who gives, receives or secures or is interested in giving or receiving an official ballot on which is marked, written or printed the name of any person for whom he has agreed to vote, or for whom he has been requested to vote, or has such paper marked, written or printed in his possession as a guide by which he could make out his ticket, shall be fined not less than one hundred nor more than five hundred dollars, and be confined in jail thirty days. (Sec. 70, p. 536, Acts 1905.)"

## OCHILTREE AGAINST SMALL

Senator Clint C. Small was returned to the Texas State Senate from the 31st Senatorial District by a small majority; so read the news lines following the Democratic primary Saturday. 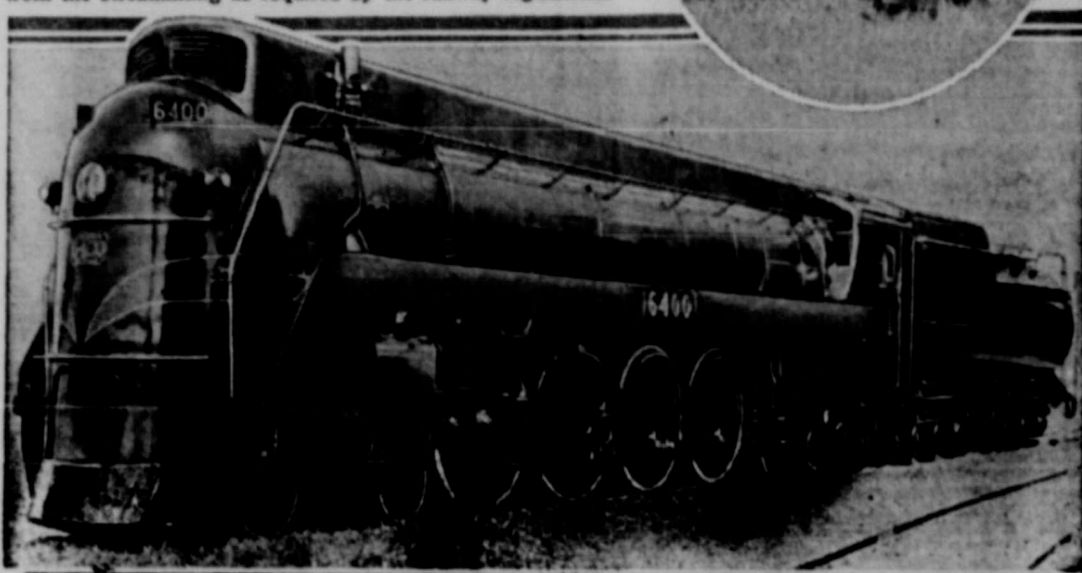

## World's Largest Streamlined Engine

THE world's largest streamlined locomotive has just been put into service by the Canadian National Railways, the largest railway system in North America. Absence of smokestack, bell and cowcatcher are features of this giant of the wheels built to plans designed by the National Research Council of Canada and engineers of the company after exhaustive wind-tunnel tests with models. The engine, one of four, to haul passenger trains between Montreal and Chicago, has an all-over length of 94 feet 7 3/4 inches, weighs in excess of 650,000 pounds and can develop a speed exceeding 100 miles per hour. The driving wheels have a diameter of 77 inches and an idea of their size is gained by comparing them with the men shown looking at them in the inset. The smokestack and bell are concealed by the streamlining and a stream of air, drawn through a louver at the top of the engine front, lifts the smoke into the air and carries it clear of the train. The automatic coupler on the front of the locomotive disappears behind a door when not in use. The whistle emerges from the streamlining as required by the railway regulations.

### S. J. R. No. 26

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present; and so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall have the power on the recommendation and advice of the majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons and to remit fines and forfeitures, and, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason; and to provide that the Governor shall have power to grant one reprieve in any capital case not to exceed thirty (30) days, and shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons; and to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the Board and to enact parole laws; and to provide for an election for such proposed constitutional amendment, and to make an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 11. There is hereby created a Board of Pardons and Paroles, to be composed of three members, who shall have been resident citizens of the State of Texas for a period of not less than two years immediately preceding such appointment, each of whom shall hold office for a term of six years: provided that of the members of the first board appointed, one shall serve for two years, one for one year and one for six years from the first day of February, 1937, and they shall cast lots for their respective terms. One member of said Board shall be appointed by the Governor, one member by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one member by

the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals; the appointments of all members of said Board shall be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present. Each vacancy shall be filled by the respective appointing power that theretofore made the appointment to such position and the appointive powers shall have the authority to make recess appointments until the convening of the Senate.

In all criminal cases, except treason and impeachment, the Governor shall have power, after conviction, on the written signed recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, or a majority thereof, to grant reprieves and commutations of punishment and pardons; and under such rules as the Legislature may prescribe, and upon the written recommendation and advice of a majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, he shall have the power to remit fines and forfeitures.

The Governor shall have the power to grant one reprieve in any capital case for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days; and he shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons. With the advice and consent of the Legislature, he may grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason.

The Legislature shall have power to regulate procedure before the Board of Pardons and Paroles and shall require it to keep record of its actions and the reasons therefor, and shall have authority to enact parole laws.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed constitutional amendments at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1936, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

For the amendment of Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, and to make the Governor's pardoning power subject to recommendation of said Board, except in cases of treason the Governor may grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature.

above proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand and (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### S. J. R. No. 18

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as follows:

Section 48a. In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State, provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and no school districts, and shall in no one year exceed Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid into the fund.

All funds provided for the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such

retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution Authorizing Retirement and the Creation of a Retirement Fund for persons Employed in Public Schools and Colleges and Universities Supported Wholly or Partly by the State."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution Authorizing Retirement and the Creation of a Retirement Fund for persons Employed in Public Schools and in Colleges and Universities Supported Wholly or Partly by the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand and (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

## NEWS of the WEEK

### SPAIN IN REVOLT

Madrid—While loyal troops are battling rebel armies converging on the capital from both North and South, United States Ambassador Claude G. Bowers has succeeded in removing to a Coast Guard Cutter all American residents along the Northern coast. He has moved the Summer Embassy from San Sebastian to a point near the French border, but 161 Americans are still refugees in the Madrid Embassy. Americans in the South of Spain have been rescued by a United States merchant steamer.

### KING UNVEILS MEMORIAL

Vimy, France—Paying high tribute to the heroism of the Canadian forces in the World War, King Edward VIII unveiled Canada's National Memorial to her 60,000 war dead buried on Vimy Ridge, scene of four terrific assaults in 1917.

### MIKADO SLOWS WAR SPIRIT

Tokyo, Japan—Breaking more than 2,000 years of tradition, Hirohito, Emperor of Japan, invoked his 122 divine ancestors, the world's longest unbroken dynasty, in consecration of his injunction against excessive military zeal. His solemn warning made a deep impression on the nation's militaristic firebrands.

### GIRL OLYMPIC SWIMMER DROPPED

Berlin, Germany—Chief topic of conversation among 333 Olympic contestants upon their arrival was the cancellation of Mrs. Eleanor Holm Jarrett's entry by the American Committee, who charged the young backstroke champion with excess conviviality on the voyage over. Mrs. Jarrett declared, "At least 100 others offended in the same way," but the committee refused to reconsider its action.

### FORD HAS BIRTHDAY

Detroit, Michigan—Henry Ford will celebrate his 73rd birthday on Thursday. During the recent 100-degree heat wave he bicycled morning and evening. "It's good exercise," he said, "stirs up a breeze. It does you good to sweat."

### PRESIDENT ON WAY HOME

Seal Harbor, N. B.—President Roosevelt's vacation voyage on the schooner Sewanna came to an end at his summer home on Campobello Island. After a few days rest he will enter upon a strenuous campaign for reelection in November.

### WEEK AT THE CAPITOL

Washington, D. C.—Farmers, according to the Department of Agriculture, enjoyed a cash income of \$3,291,000,000 for the first six months of the year, an increase of 11 per cent over the same period last year. The Labor Department announced June gains in employment and payrolls for the fourth consecutive month.

### TRUANT YOUNGSTER

Springfield, Mo.—Storming into a local police station, an 84-year-old resident demanded, "I want you to find my runaway boy. The scamp has been disappearing since he was able to walk." Asked for a description, the angry father said the runaway was 52 years old.

### CONTROL OF INFLUENZA

Boston, Mass.—Ever since the "flu" epidemic of 1918-19 took 15,000,000 lives, half again as many as perished in the World War, scientists have endeavored to penetrate the mysteries of the dread scourge. Two Harvard professors, Drs. Wm. F. Wells and H. W. Brown, have demonstrated the efficacy of ultraviolet rays in providing immunity for animals, and believe their experiments open the way to control the germ in schools, theatres and other public places.

### PORCINE CRITICS

Ithaca, N. Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capitol of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 5. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at twelve thousand (\$12,000.00) dollars per annum; the salary of the Attorney General at ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars per annum, and the salary of the Secretary of State at six thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum.

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or

have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Attorney General at Ten thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum, and the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said

Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 7. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salaries of certain constitutional officers by amending Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars per annum; by amending Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars per annum; by amending Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum; and by amending Section 24 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum.

Sec. 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or warlike not authorized by law. He shall whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 23. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

## WORLD'S DEEPEST OIL WELL

**CONTINENTAL OIL COMPANY'S WELL IN LOUISIANA IS EXPECTED TO BE DEEPEST YET**

Augustville, La., July 29—Eyes of oil men and geologists were focused on the Gulf Coast town today as drillers prepared to push to completion what is expected to be the world's deepest oil well and the maximum penetration to date of the earth's crust, reaching to a depth of almost 13,000 feet.

The well, Continental Oil Company's Alvin Herbert 1, has already been drilled to 10,956 feet, with a record "string" of 7-inch casing, or pipe, cemented at that depth. Its objective is a virgin petroleum pool that geologists believe is in the Permian formation, a depth of almost 13,000 feet.

The final push toward completion, beginning this week, will coincide with the 75th anniversary of oil operations on the Drake well in Titusville, Pa., first ever drilled, which was brought in as a producer in August, 1859, at the then record depth of 69 one-half feet.

Company spokesmen said the Alvin Herbert 1, as it stands, uncomplicated, is the deepest well ever drilled along the Gulf Coast, the fourth deepest in the United States and the 10th deepest in the world. The deepest well ever drilled was McElroy 301, in West Texas, which was abandoned at 12,786 feet. A 12,000-foot well was said to be in Kern County, Calif., 11,377 feet. A 10,000-foot well in Caddo County, Texas, 11,204 feet, and Chitani 1, in Oklahoma, which was abandoned at 11,892 feet. The world's deepest gold mine, on the South African Rand, is 9,000 feet in depth.
