Sterling Stock Show Here Monday

Judging to Start at 9

The 1974 Sterling County Livestock Show will be held Monday, January 21 in the show barn in Sterling City. This year's show will include classes for finewool lambs, finewool crossbred lambs, medium wool lambs, registered Rambouillets, registered Delaines, Hereford steers, crossbred steers, and market pigs.

The show is sponsored by the Sterling County Livestock Show Association. Officers of the Association are president, Danny Stewart; vice president, Marvin Foster; treasurer, Dan Glass; past president, Charles Probandt. Secretaries of the Association are Fred Igo and Arthur Barlemann, Jr.

Judge for the 1974 show is Jerry Swift, County Extension at Eldorado. Judging will start at 9:00 A.M. because of Daylight Saving Time. Sale time will be at 3:00 P.M.

Show superintendent this year is Raymond Thomas Foster. Assistant superintendent is Pat Foster. Auctioneer this year will be Chesley McDonald. Sales clerks again are Worth Durham, Charles Probandt, James Thompson, and Hugh Lackey.

Trophies for the show are being provided by a number of individuals and firms. The rotating Finewool Champion plaque is sponsored by Lee Reed with Ross Foster providing a permanent trophy for the champion finewool lamb. Charlie Davis is providing the trophy for champion crossbred lamb. The champion medium wool lamb exhibitor receives the Ralph Davis trophy. The NORATADATA gives the trophy for the champion Rambouillet ewe and the Epsilon Zeta sponsors the trophy for the champion Rambouillet ram. Betty Jo Barrett is giving a trophy to the exhibitor of the champion Rambouillet flock. A trophy for the champion Delaine ewe is being given by Riley King while Igo Rambouillets are giving one for the champion Delaine ram. Brooks Dry Goods is giving a trophy to the exhibitor of the champion pig and the trophy for the champion steer is being given by Paisano Trucking Company.

Two silver belt buckles are being given for showmanship by Holland Jewelers of San Angelo. One will be given to the market lamb showman and one to the breeding sheep showman.

A concession stand will be operated in the show barn by the 4-H Club and FFA mothers. The United Methodist Women of the local Methodist church will have the dinner in the Community Center on show day.

The sale will be held at 3 p.m. There are sixteen 4-H Club exhibitors and twenty-two FFA exhibitors. A Chinese auction will be held during the sale at which time a barbecued lamb will be sold. Sterling Independent School District Reynolds W. Foster, at a called meeting here Wednesday, January 16, called a \$275,000 bond election for February 9, 1974.

If the bond issue carries, the board has plans to enlarge the elementary classrooms and the cafeteria and the shop building. To remodel the junior high hallway and classrooms.

Office space will be added and heating will be improved with mounted ceiling units.

6 WAYS TO CONSERVE AND SAVE

ON WINTER HEATING

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
2. A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

Highway Projects for Sterling County Set

Projects in Sterling County are included in a \$40.7 million program to increase safety and improve sections of non-Interstate highways in Texas.

District Engineer J.A. Snell of San Angelo said work to be performed under the annual program includes such things as widening of pavements and structures, reconditioning, resurfacing, providing additional surfacing, sodding, and improvement of shoulders and other miscellaneous work.

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of US and State-numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the State.

Fifty-seven percent of the work statewide will be on US and State-numbered highways and 41 percent on Farm to Market Roads with two percent reserved for later assignment.

Projects in Sterling County are—U.S. Hwy. 87, from 1.3 miles south of Glasscock County line to 7.0 miles west of Sterling City—Seal Coat.

State Hwy. 158, from U. S. Hwy. 87 to Glasscock County Line—Seal Coat.

NEW TEXAS ALMANAC AVAILABLE

THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS, a study of the many nationalities and ethnic groups that have combined to make up the state's population, is one of many new features in the 704 pages of the 1974-75 Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

The article is by R. Henderson Shuffler, executive director of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Texans have always come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors, with a wide variety of mother tongues and hereditary customs and traditions, Shuffler writes. He has capsuled this variety of cultures in the special Almanac feature.

The new edition also contains a comprehensive history of the livestock feeding industry in Texas, which now leads the nation in numbers of cattle fattened in feedlots. The article was written by Sam A. Thomas Jr., manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Two reports are of special interest to ecologists. One is a list of endangered plants and animals in the state, prepared by the Texas Organization for Endangered Species. The other is a list of state agencies responsible for pollution control.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for offices, schools, public agencies and homes.

A new Texas map, in color, with major highways, distances and other information supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department.

The county maps are published with information about each Texas county supplied by chambers of commerce, county agricultural agents and others.

Tourism and recreation are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

NEWS OF ECOLOGY

ALUMINUM STRETCHES ENERGY RESOURCES

Now that pollution clean-up is underway, environmental concern seems to be shifting to energy supply. Some ecologists worry about America's accelerating use of fuels — coal, oil, gas and uranium.

These basic sources of energy, burned directly or transformed into electricity, propel all vehicles, heat and cool our homes, run appliances, cook and refrigerate foods and power our industries.

The use of aluminum, an environmentally thrifty metal, stretches fuels and energy, the people at Reynolds Aluminum point out.

"Aluminum does not deteriorate and is easily recycled with little expenditure of energy," said Dr. Robert F. Testin, director of environmental planning for Reynolds. "That makes it an energy bank that can be drawn upon again and again. When long-lasting aluminum products are finally discarded, melting them down for refashioning into new products takes less than 5 per cent of the energy used to make the aluminum originally."

Because it is so light — only one-third the weight of steel, copper or brass — aluminum provides a greater quantity of material per ton. "This phenomenon stretches the energy used in making aluminum products, as a ton of aluminum yields two to three times more items than are obtained from a ton of other materials," according to Dr. Earl E. Patterson, who heads up Reynolds metallurgical research.

An example of Dr. Patterson's point is beer and soft drink containers. A ton of steel produces 15,400 steel cans, and a ton of glass makes 5,000 bottles, but a ton of aluminum results in 32,680 all-aluminum cans.

An article in the Reynolds magazine reveals many other

ways aluminum conserves energy.

Transportation of all kinds consumes 30 per cent of America's energy supply. The light metal cuts fuel consumption in all kinds of vehicles — aluminum highway trucks, automobiles with their aluminum parts, aluminum railroad cars, aluminum boats and ships with aluminum superstructures. The 1973 autos average about 78 pounds of aluminum per car.



In heating and air conditioning, which take 27 per cent of the energy supply, aluminum insulation and ducts, because of their high heat reflectivity, cut fuel consumption.

Durable aluminum siding, windows and other construction items greatly reduce use of resources and energy in maintenance, repair and replacement. The article points out that aluminum will not rot or warp, and is immune to red rust, mildew and termites.

In cooking, the rapid heat conductivity of aluminum pots and pans — six times faster than steel, for example — conserves electricity and gas. In the refrigerator, foods in aluminum foil chill or freeze quicker than when wrapped in paper or plastic film, saving electricity.

The public depends on aluminum electrical cable for low-cost delivery of electricity to the home. Replacing expensive copper, aluminum cable has lowered everybody's electrical bills.
