MILLION TO SOIL EROSION

ALLOTMENT MADE FOR EROSION WORK IN FIVE STATES TO START SOON

Twenty-five million dollars was made the first of the week to the erosion service of the Department of Agriculture for a permanent soil erosion program in five states including the Texas Panhandle. Funds will be made available when President Roosevelt signs the bill which is expected to return to Washington next week.

Panhandle's share of this is approximately \$5,250,000 of which two million will be made available immediately, the balance to be supplied as soon as additional funds are introduced. H. F. Fennell, regional director of soil conservation service, Dallas, will be in charge of the gigantic state emergency drought area, which includes parts of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico and Kansas. The bill authorizing this program was introduced in Congress by Hon. Marvin Jones, passing a large majority in both houses. Phases of the program have been arranged. Men will work on the various projects before July 1. A maximum of 100 acres will be provided for soil conservation project which will include some 100 acres in the Texas Panhandle, which needs a permanent erosion treatment. This project will be in addition to that done by CCC camps located in the Panhandle but will be in close harmony with this project.

Mr. J. S. Talley returned Tuesday morning from an extensive trip through southern Texas. On the trip he attended the state convention of Texas sheriffs, held at Edinburg, Texas. Side trips to points of interest in the lower Rio Grande were made by the peace officer, including two trips into old Mexico at Reynosa and Matamoros. Banquets and special entertainments were provided in honor of the visitors.

Mr. Talley's first visit to the fertile valley and he was impressed by the beautiful view being harvested but Mr. Talley is the oldest sheriff in the state, in point of years, and during his time he has many officers come and go as members of the state association.

TIME EXTENDED IN COMPLIANCE

JULY 1 DEAD LINE FOR COMPLETING 10 PER ACRE FIELD LISTING PROGRAM

Word was received last week-end by County Agent J. T. Stovall, extending the time of compliance for the ten cent an acre soil erosion program to July 1. Parker D. Hanna, district agent of the extension service, College Station, was authority for the time extension.

No new contracts will be granted, it was explained, but the time for complying with the one already signed is being extended. The previous closing date was June 1, but because of unfavorable weather conditions in many instances, the work of listing had not been completed. The extension was granted so that farmers would have an opportunity to complete their work.

FEDERAL LOAN RATES REDUCED

INTEREST RATE LOWERED ON LOANS MADE THROUGH FEDERAL LAND BANKS ON FARM PROPERTY

The interest rate on all Federal Land Bank loans made through National farm loan associations will be reduced to 3 1/2 per cent for all interest payable in the one-year period commencing July 1, 1935 and to 4 per cent for all interest payable in the two-year period commencing July 1, 1936, according to Eton Lawrence, secretary-treasurer of the Ochiltree National Farm Loan Association. This announcement was made June 10th, when Mr. Lawrence was notified of the new loan rate by A. C. Williams, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston and General Agent of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston.

This temporary reduction of interest on Federal Land Bank loans having installments due prior to July 1, 1935 is the result of new legislation, the Farm Credit Act of 1935, which was signed by President Roosevelt June 3. Interest payable on installment dates occurring after July 30, 1935, will be at the original rate, which is 4 1/2 per cent on loans now being made through National farm loan associations and varies from 5 to 6 per cent on loans made prior to April 1, 1935.

The Farm Credit Act of 1935 provides for another important innovation. Under its terms, the Land Bank Commissioner now may make loans to finance the purchase of farms by deserving tenant farmers. Formerly, Commissioner loans could be made only for the purpose of refinancing debts, for repurchasing farms lost through foreclosure and for working capital. The Act extends to January 1, 1940 the time in which the Land Bank Commissioner may make direct loans to farmers on first and second mortgages. The Commissioner loan plus any prior encumbrances on the property may not exceed 75 per cent of the appraised normal value. Cementing on the new provisions Mr. Lawrence said: "The new provision enabling the Land Bank Commissioner to make loans for the purpose of purchasing farms provides a new opportunity for young farmers and deserving tenants to become farm owners and home owners in their own right. We shall be glad to talk things over with worthy tenants who wish to buy farms of their own."

Since May 12, 1933, when the Farm Credit Administration was established, the Federal Land Bank of Houston, acting for itself and as agent for the Land Bank Commissioner has made 42,738 loans aggregating \$129,192,350.00. This is almost as large as the amount of business carried on the books of the bank on May 1, 1933 after 17 years of operation. The interest rate reduction provided by the Act will affect only Federal land bank loans, all of which are first mortgage loans. The interest rate on Land Bank Commissioner loans, which are made on either first or second mortgages on farm property, will remain unchanged at 5 per cent.

MUST WORK OR GET OFF ROLLS

RELIEF ROLL CLIENTS MUST ACCEPT EMPLOYMENT OR BE DROPPED FROM RELIEF ROLLS

AUSTIN, June 6—State relief officials today ordered able-bodied persons who refuse employment as farm laborers in the county of their residence dropped from relief rolls.

"We continue to hear about shortage of farm labor in many sections of the State," said Adam R. Johnson, state director. "In counties where this condition prevails, we expect relief administrators to supply this labor from the relief rolls. The employable relief client who refuses to work on a farm is not worthy of further assistance."

Meanwhile, Johnson instructed all county administrators and directors of transient divisions to register all employable persons receiving emergency relief. Registration was ordered by Harry L. Hopkins, federal administrator, so relief clients would be classified by occupation and fitness for public and private employment.

As another step toward reducing the relief load, the state agent of the United States Department of Labor promised to supply relief officials with reports of labor shortages from the farm placement service.

BIG RESERVOIR IN PANHANDLE

DAM ON BEAVER NEAR OPTIMA WILL CREATE 3,000 ACRE LAKE IN THE OKLA.-PANHANDLE

The Optima reservoir that for two years has been talked about in the flood control program is at last becoming a reality. Walter Burnham, conservation commission engineer, and A. Francis Porta, commissioner attorney, of Oklahoma City are taking options on the site for the dam.

After the right of way is secured by the state, Burnham said, the war department will check up on plans and specifications with the conservation commission and the planning board and the contract will be let.

Labor conditions in connection with the contract will be set by Washington according to rules regarding relief work on flood control projects.

The actual size of the reservoir has not been announced. Burnham said he did not know whether the war department would use the plan and estimates made by the army engineers two or three years ago or not. If so, the reservoir capacity would be approximately 77,500 acre feet as compared to the 17,000 acre feet of Lake Overholser at Oklahoma City.

Building of the Wolf Creek, Optima and El Reno dams will insure control of the North Canadian River, the engineer said. Though the war department is interested primarily in flood control and protection of the lands from flood damage in the river basin, possibilities of development through irrigation and storing of water for power purposes are unlimited.

Burnham envisions the building of dams on the many small tributary streams of the North Canadian to provide irrigation reservoirs that will bring untold benefits to farming communities.

With the Canadian controlled by the big dam, dangers of flood losses is gone. Flood waters held in the reservoirs will be metered into the river in proportion to the channel capacity.

Mr. Burnham says the lake will be five miles long, covering 3,000 acres. The dam site, which is owned by Judge F. Hiner Dale and the L. O. Sassin estate is 4200 feet long, and the dam is to be 65 feet high.

OVER HALF INCH RAIN EARLY FRIDAY MORNING

Another fine rain was received in this section of the Panhandle early Friday morning, measuring .56 of an inch in Perryton and bringing the June total to .90.

According to the official rainfall records kept by Jack Allen, the total moisture received here during May and the first week in June amounted to 5.44 inches.

The May rainfall totaled 4.54 inches, the heaviest fall for the month of May since 1928 when 5.28 inches was received. The rain last month was the heaviest received in any month since August 1933.

TAX PENALTIES UP ON JULY 1ST

EIGHT PERCENT PENALTY AND INTEREST TO BE ADDED ON DELINQUENT TAXES ON JULY 1

Taxpayers must pay their delinquent state and county taxes before July 1, 1935, if they wish to avoid the payment of the additional penalties which will be added on that date. This announcement comes from J. S. Talley, sheriff, tax collector and assessor. On all delinquent taxes not paid before July 1, an eight percent penalty, plus interest from date of becoming delinquent and cost of collection will be added.

May 31 was the last day on which taxes could be paid with no penalty, Talley pointed out. During this month, a penalty of five per cent is being charged. This penalty becomes eight per cent on July 1 and delinquents must also pay the six per cent interest and the costs of collection.

This penalty increase is also effective on the unpaid half of taxes made in two payments. Talley said as he urged citizens who have paid half their taxes to pay the other half prior to July 1.

CCC CAMP SITE WEST OF CITY

LOCATION MADE FRIDAY BY ARMY ENGINEERS; TO BE ON WEST EDGE OF CITY

Final location for the Ochiltree Civilian Conservation Corps camp was made last Friday by visiting Army engineers and soil erosion directors, the county property just west of the City limits being the site chosen.

The property was originally purchased by the county for a fair grounds and was used several years for this purpose, the project being abandoned later. An 80-acre tract is available for the camp, immediately adjacent to the city limits, north of the Santa Fe tracks, just west of the Leatherman addition.

Because of the fact that natural gas, electricity and city water would be available for the camp, this site was given preference by the army engineers.

Work on constructing the barracks will begin July 1, according to the army officers in charge. The work, it was said, will be done by contract and all materials and supplies for the camp will be purchased locally. The camp will contain approximately 200 CCC recruits in addition to the regular officers in charge, with an estimated allotment of \$1,250 per year to be spent on each recruit.

This camp will result in thousands of dollars of business monthly for the merchants and business men of Perryton and will be located here for a two year period with the possibility of being extended beyond that time.

BUILDS MODEL CLOTHES CLOSET AT \$1.00 COST

Two compartment combination dressing room and clothes closet four by six feet has been added to the bedroom of Mrs. O. E. Carter, second year wardrobe cooperator of New Hope home demonstration club.

The upper part of the clothes closet is used for storing bedding while the lower part has ten feet of shelving made of orange crates. The top shelving is low enough for Mrs. Carter to use it for a dressing table. Other additions are: A rod for hanging clothes, a tie rack, four hat racks, a shoe rack and pockets for closet door.

The closet is built to the ceiling at an expense of one dollar for hinges, paper and lock. Scrap lumber and card board boxes were used for walls. Mrs. Carter has used a very light wall paper for lining her new storage space.

PLANS TO FEED FAMILY THE "4-H PANTRY WAY"

To feed her family the "4-H Pantry Way", Mrs. H. B. Urban farm food supply cooperator of "4 in 1" Home Demonstration club, has a well planned garden with twenty-seven varieties of fruits and vegetables growing. Mrs. Urban has 203 feet of leafy vegetables, 2500 feet of starchy vegetables, 1057 feet of other vegetables.

To supply fruit for the family, Mrs. Urban has 250 strawberry plants set out, 132 feet of tomatoes and 150 feet of watermelons and cantaloupes.

Eight hundred feet of tile, a wind break of currant bushes and wild grapes and gunny sacks on her wire fence are some of the things that aid Mrs. Urban in having her garden.

Six Chinese elm and ten cherry trees have been set out. Holes four feet square were dug for the trees. Old pieces of iron were put in the bottom for drainage purposes. A three inch iron pipe was placed in an upright position on the iron pieces and extends one foot above the ground for watering the trees. The trees were then planted by the pipe. By this method Mrs. Urban says that the water gets directly to the roots. To keep foreign particles out of the pipe, Mrs. Urban covers the opening with a number two can.

Mrs. Urban says that the drought and the dust storms cannot defeat her. She has planted part of her garden for the third time, but feels that her energy and money have been well spent.

GETS FOOD SUPPLY FROM EARLY GARDEN PLANTING

Twenty-two varieties of vegetables including two varieties of peas, four varieties of beans, two varieties of tomatoes, radishes, turnips, two varieties of onions, gerkins, squash, beets, Chinese cabbage, tender greens, safford, carrots, koh-rabi, and pop corn make up the garden of Mrs. M. J. Groves, farm food supply demonstrator of Waka home demonstration club.

Mrs. Groves has had peas, lettuce, radishes and onions from her garden this spring.

Two hundred feet of tile has been put down in Mrs. Groves' garden for a wind break fire bush, castor beans and red careless weeds have been planted.

"ALL SEASON WARDROBE" IS AIM OF DEMONSTRATOR

"All season wardrobe" closet is being planned by Mrs. Omar Truax, first year wardrobe demonstrator of Farnsworth women's home demonstration club for storing of winter clothes.

Mrs. Truax's old clothes closet has been remodeled by addition of two rods for hanging clothes, five feet of shelving, hat racks made of coat hangers, pockets for patterns and hose, paper garment bags and a foot tool for reaching top shelf.

Mrs. Truax has altered her foundation pattern and made dress and slip using foundation pattern for wardrobe contest.

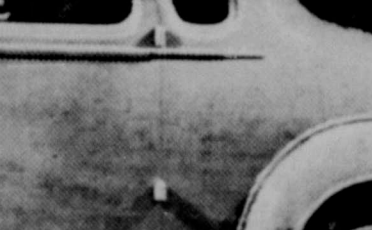
MAKE ATTRACTIVE DRESS AT COST OF TEN CENTS

The relief program is doing a great work, they have helped many a needy and deserving family here in Ochiltree county but we want to see the ruling of the state director strictly enforced and every person that won't accept work promptly and without delay kicked off the relief rolls. It is the duty of every citizen to report any one that refuses to accept employment to the county relief administrator.

TAX PENALTY DEADLINE

June 30 is the tax-penalty deadline covering state and county taxes. On the first day of July, the present statute permitting remission of penalties expires, and on that date an eight percent penalty, plus six percent interest from date of delinquency, and collection costs, will be added. J. S. Talley, tax collector of Ochiltree county, an announcement in this newspaper, urges every person who owes delinquent state and county taxes to make every effort possible to pay and thus save the assessing of these heavy delinquent fees and costs.

If Ochiltree county taxpayers fail to heed Sheriff Talley's warning, they cannot say that their attention was not called to the wisdom of paying their back taxes before July 1, 1935.

WHEAT FARMERS FOR AAA

Practically complete returns on the wheat referendum held May 23 show that 86.6 percent of all farmers voting in the referendum favor continuance of crop adjustment for this basic commodity. The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced. Of the total vote of 458,973 reported up to noon, May 30, by State Extension Directors, 397,840 farmers had voted for continuance and 61,133 had voted against it. Of the total votes cast, 392,383 were by contract signers and 66,596 were by non-contract signers. Contract signers voted 89 percent in favor of continued adjustment, the latest report showing 349,495 for and 42,888 against. Non-signers also favored the program by a large vote, the percentage being 72.5 percent as shown by 48,345 for the program and 18,245 against it. The latest reports show that the 392,383 contract signers voting represent nearly 68 percent of the approximately 579,000 contracts which have been approved. Contract signers under the wheat program control approximately 31 million acres of the total of 66 million acres seeded in the United States during the years 1930-32. The wheat referendum was upon the single question: "Are you in favor of a wheat production adjustment program to follow the present one which expires with the 1935 crop year?" It was taken after discussion meetings had been held in all of the 1,763 counties in which

the program is operative. The balloting in the referendum was in charge of the local community wheat association committees. Other referenda have been held for tobacco, cotton, and corn and hogs. The percentage of farmers voting in the tobacco referendum who favored continuance of adjustment was 97.3 the percentage of voters favoring cotton adjustment was 89.4 and the percentage of voting contracting corn-hog farmers favoring adjustment was 69.9.

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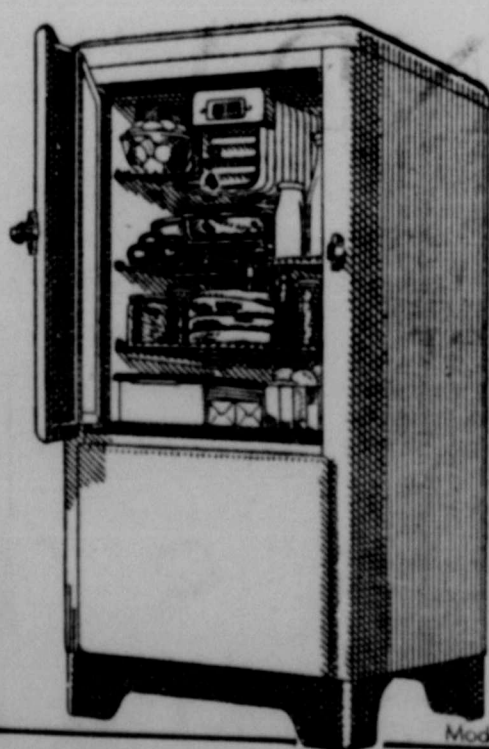

Mr. Allen brought out some very interesting facts in regard to the operations of the Santa Fe railway, the amount of taxes, etc. that they pay into city, school, county and state treasuries. As we think that every citizen in Ochiltree county should know these facts, we are publishing Mr. Allen's address in full.

Mr. Chairman, Friends of the Lions Club:-

"One time there was a married couple getting along apparently happy, but one day the wife said to her husband, 'Now, John, your Uncle Bill has been staying here for several months and you are going to have to make arrangements for him to leave as I do not want him here any longer'. John, rather surprised, said, 'Why, Dearie why do you want Uncle Bill to leave?' He has been with us for some time and I have enjoyed him". The wife said, "Well, you will just have to make arrangements for him to leave". Again John insisted he enjoyed having Uncle Bill and said, "Why do you want him to leave?" The wife replied, "Well, he knows so many dirty songs". The husband in a rather astonished manner said, "Why! Dearie, Uncle Bill doesn't sing dirty songs around you does he?" The wife replied, "No, but he is always whistling 'em".

I suppose we all whistle for our own business and that is a part of the game of life. It is my happy privilege to address you today briefly, concerning the Railroad question and transportation matters. This week, as you gentlemen know, has been designated as Railroad week throughout the area served by what we general term the Western Railroads. We have Americanism week, Fire Prevention week, Clean-up week, Cranberry week, Apple week, Pecan week and other stated periods set aside for certain industries or phases of our social, economic, religious, or educational life and I am glad that the people generally have so nobly responded to this, "Railroad Week". The purpose of Railroad week is to call attention of the public in general to something that probably we have always taken for granted, namely:- That the Railroads which serve our communities will continue to do so in good times and hard times, in fair weather and bad. Think for a moment that if the Railroad transportation system throughout this land and country should completely cease to operate for a twenty-four hour period, there would be stagnation in business, fresh fruits and vegetables and dairy products, poultry products, emergency necessities and necessities of all kinds would be lacking and it would work an irreparable hardship upon each and every community and each individual therein in these great United States.

The Railroads are among our heaviest tax payers and among the largest industries from the standpoint of payrolls. In our own community during the year 1934 the Santa Fe Railway Company paid \$560.00 in taxes to the City of Perryton of the total City of Perryton tax for 1934 amounting to \$24,337.25; it paid \$3,078.33 in taxes to the State and County out of a total of \$72,600.58 State and County Ad Valorem taxes; it paid \$2,038.90 in taxes to the Perryton Independent School District out of a total tax payment of \$61,859.68. I do not have the ex-

act figures of taxes paid to the Waka Independent School District but they were in the sum of approximately \$6,200.00. The taxes help pay for the year 1934 paid by the Santa Fe in this immediate community in the sum of approximately \$2,200.00. The taxes help in paying our School, State County and Municipal expense. In many localities where branch Railroads have been taken up in recent years the school terms have been cut short two and three months by reason of the loss in tax revenue from this source. Thus it is seen that the Railroad Company in our community is a heavy tax payer and this is likewise true in each and every community which the great Railway systems serve.

The Railroads of the United States offer the world's finest transportation at the lowest cost in the world. They have air conditioned their Pullman and passenger trains since the fall of 1934 at a total cost of approximately \$19,000,000. I recently boarded one of the Santa Fe passenger trains out of Chicago for Kansas City and found the air-conditioned coaches are so regulated to keep the air pure and well conditioned, free from dust and other objectionable conditions and the air is washed and absolutely pure making travel exceedingly comfortable. It so happened that I met the Superintendent of the Pullman service as I boarded the train and he went into detail explaining and showing me as to the mechanism of the air-conditioning of their passenger trains and it has been a most tremendous expense to the railroad companies to give the public this added comfort and service and they are surely entitled to the consideration and patronage of the traveling public. The railroads have reduced their Pullman fare a third and have reduced passenger fares and freight rates. I cannot give you the exact figures from Perryton, but from Amarillo to California and return there will be summer rates to the California-Pacific Exposition for adults of \$35.00 and for children \$17.50 and that most certainly is the cheapest and safest form of travel.

Last year in the State of Texas 2314 people were injured in Highway accidents and 515 persons were killed. Statistics show that there is only one fatal accident by railway transportation out of 17,921,000 passengers carried. "Safety First" is an old time slogan, but it is still a good one. Let me call your attention that from a reliable source it shows that the average man may board a passenger train and travel continually day and night at an average speed of forty miles per hour and it would take 2,100 years for fatal accident to occur to him, and of course within the space of 2,100 years the average man would be dead and be in Heaven, we hope. The railroads invite the public to ship and travel by train thereby supporting an important home industry, giving employment to local citizens and guaranteeing the continuation of a service that is being constantly improved and which can be depended upon winter or summer, spring or fall, in fair or bad weather.

The railroads have taken it on the chin like every other industry during this depression, but they have not been knocked off their feet or discouraged. They have maintained their right-of-way in good condition and paid taxes thereon including rolling equipment. They have improved their equipment and are continually trying to give the public a better service. They

have shortened their running time wherever possible and consistent with safety. They have made every effort to co-operate with local shippers in modernizing the movement of goods and now offer the pick-up and delivery service.

Without railroads we could never have built our hard surfaced roads, hence we would have little pleasure from our automobiles. We would not have newsprint enough for our newspapers. We would not have mail for the post office to deliver twice a day; we would have to pay huge prices for fresh fruits and vegetables which we take for granted regardless of the season. We could not depend on selling our own products in distant markets nor could we buy many necessities and conveniences in our stores in Perryton at the same prices that people pay in New York, Boston, Chicago or Los Angeles. Without the railroads we would be an isolated community. I have no quarrel to make with the man who operates a truck or has one for sale, for they are necessary as an integral part of our great transportation system, but let us not forget that, after all, the railroads form the backbone of the transportation system of the entire country.

Railroads have never stopped pioneering, nor will they ever stop pioneering. All the advancement and progress made by them is indicative of what the public may constantly expect in the future. The able executives of the railroads, engineering, operating and technical experts are tireless in their efforts to find new ways and means of making a better service. The personnel of the railroad companies are some of our finest citizens, are our friends and neighbors, tax payers of our own communities, contribute their part in the making of our communities. I have stated that I have no quarrel with the man who operates a truck and I do not have, but I do say frankly that if the railroad companies are regulated through governmental agencies, most certainly there should be uniform regulation of truck, air-craft, and water-craft transportation and it is to the interest of John Q. Public, the average American citizen, that all transportation systems be co-ordinated into one great transportation system whether it be by rail, water, air, truck or automobiles, each phase of transportation, while uniformly regulated under one great system, would still have and hold its identity. I say no form of transportation can stand independently of the other and while various modes of transportation are essentially competitors, and each functions best in its own field, yet in another sense they are not competitive for each supplements, and is supplemented by the others. The public and business in general demand and are entitled to fast, regular, economical and safe transportation. Some of the Eastern railways today are trying out the fast type passenger trains of an average speed of ninety to one hundred miles per hour on runs between metropolitan centers. As yet we do not know whether this type of train will be practical and will replace our present type of trains, but we do know that by the expenditure of these large sums, the

great railway executives of the country are diligently endeavoring to give the public the highest practical degree of service.

The Santa Fe Railway appreciates the wonderful co-operation of the fine people of the great Southwest and is constantly endeavoring to render a better service and is spending huge sums to make its service better. When Railroads are busy the country is doing a good business, payrolls are in evidence and, therefore, each community traversed by the railroad is having a better and greater payroll and better business because ninety-five per cent of the railroad payroll is spent in the respective communities where payrolls are made.

There are many things to be said on this important subject but I must close and in closing I wish to say that all the railway companies want or should have a fair deal on this question of transportation. The railroad companies should not be Government regulated with other forms of transportation going practically "Scott free" of regulation. As a matter of fact all forms of transportation should be properly regulated.

As to the matter of Government ownership of the Railroads in my opinion it is out of the question and is highly impractical. Such important industries should be free from politics and changes of administration and for the government to take over railroads will discourage and abuse private initiative which has been the backbone and guiding hand of progress and accomplishments in the American business world.

In a recent summation as to the proper basis of co-ordinating and maintaining adequate transportation service and establishing equality for all shippers, passengers and transportation agencies, Mr. S. T. Bledsoe, President of the Atchafalaya, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company, and who is a real and true friend to the people of this great Southwest country, said:-

"1. Co-ordination of all transportation facilities and services in such manner that each facility will be so employed as to serve best the public needs and authorization for railroads to engage in other forms of transportation on equal terms with others."

"2. Reasonable, just and constructive regulation of rates, practices, accounting, safety, hours of service, responsibility and services of all forms of transportation."

"3. Discontinuance of competition by the United States with, and of the subsidizing either directly, or indirectly, of any form of transportation."

"4. All transportation agencies should be self-supporting. They should be taxpayers and not tax consumers."

"5. Each transportation agency should bear its fair share of the cost of federal, state and municipal government and the education of the youths of the territory it serves."

"6. In the public interest and in fairness to all forms of transportation, rates should be prescribed that will yield, after the payment of all expenses, a fair compensation for the services rendered and a reasonable return on the value of the prop-

erty employed in rendering the service."

7. The history of the development of transportation in this country demonstrates beyond controversy that we cannot have equality in treatment of shippers without regulation; that discrimination and preferential treatment are the inescapable results of unregulated competition; that the situation is aggravated where one agency is fully regulated and another agency is without regulation or partially or inadequately regulated.

8. Reasonable prosperity of the transportation companies is necessary to sustain an adequate transportation system in the public interest. Possibility of such prosperity and the possibility of adequate and efficient transportation agencies are imperiled by unregulated competition."

Thank you gentlemen of the Lions Club for the invitation of speaking to you today on this important subject.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Section 15, of Article 1, of the Constitution of Texas, and providing that the Legislature may authorize the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons, not charged with a criminal offense, for treatment and or observation without the necessity of a trial by jury.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15, of Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 15. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be needed to regulate the same, and to maintain the commitment of mentally ill persons, not charged with a criminal offense, for treatment and or observation without the necessity of a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, qualified to vote on the Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

"Against the Amendment of Article 1, Section 15, of the Constitution by adding to said Section a provision to the effect that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense by the County Court without the necessity of a jury trial."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against the proposed Amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age attending any school within the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One (\$1.00) Dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within scholastic age attending any school in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Laws."

Sec. 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:

Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands heretofore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law; and the available school fund shall be apportioned annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted scholastic age attending any school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on the Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THIS STATE."

Sec. 4. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or as much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitation and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates in any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary proclamation and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions and regulations as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitual drunkard, while such individual is a inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following clause:

"For the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

"Against the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same printed as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Frazier-Lamke Farm Debt Law

Austin, June 10.—Recent decision of the United States Supreme Court declaring the Frazier-Lemke farm debt law unconstitutional will increase the need for farm debtors for voluntary adjustment of their financial difficulties before the county farm debt adjustment committees. It was stated here this week by R. J. Murray, chairman of the Texas Farm Debt Conciliation Committee.

Chairman Murray said that the 254 county committees in Texas are active in adjusting debt cases on a voluntary basis and that in view of the Supreme Court's recent decision, the committees would give all assistance possible to all those debtors who had withheld appealing to the committees until after the high court decided the constitutionality of the Frazier-Lemke act.

Mr. Murray stated that there can be no doubt of the responsibility and the increase in number of cases to be handled by the committees, not only in new cases, but in adjusting with those farm debtors who have filled under sub-section S of Section 75, which is the so-called Frazier-Lemke amendment to the national bankruptcy law.

A great deal of confusion exists in the minds of the general public with reference to the ruling of the Supreme Court holding the Frazier-Lemke act unconstitutional. Mr. Murray said Section 75 of the national bankruptcy law, providing for the appointment of conciliation commissioners and procedure for farmers to docket their cases before conciliation commissioners seeking composition or extension of their indebtedness, was passed by the first session of the 72nd Congress. Mr. Murray pointed out, and this section has not been attacked by the recent decision of the Supreme Court holding the Frazier-Lemke act unconstitutional. The acceptance by majority, in number and amount, of the farmers' creditors is required before confirmation by the court of any composition or extension reached under Section 75, and the docketing of his case with a conciliation commissioner prevents institution for foreclosure or other proceedings against a farmer or his property prior to disposition of his case.

Sub-section S of Section 75, which is known as the Frazier-Lemke act, was passed at the second session of the 73rd Congress and is an amendment to Section 75. This act provides that any farmer failing to obtain the acceptance of a majority, in number and amount, of his creditors whose claims are affected by a composition or extension proposal, or who feels aggrieved by a composition or extension reached before a conciliation commissioner, may amend his original petition filed under Section 75 and ask to be adjudged a bankrupt, and seek the benefits of the debt moratorium provided under sub-section S of the Frazier-Lemke amendment, which provides two methods for the farmer to retain possession of his property for a period of five or six years, under supervision of the court, with the option of re-purchasing the property at the appraised price set thereon by the court.

Due to the fact that the Frazier-Lemke amendment received so much publicity, the general public, the farmers themselves, and a great

many attorneys do not seem to understand that Section 75 down to and including sub-section R, therefore, has not been attacked, and that the relief offered thereunder is in no way affected by the decision of the Supreme Court holding sub-section S of the Frazier-Lemke act unconstitutional, Murray declared.

As the law now stands, a farmer may docket his case with a conciliation commissioner and secure, if possible, a composition or extension of his indebtedness without taking bankruptcy.

Mr. Murray made it clear that the decision does not affect the existence of the state and county farm debt adjustment committees or their procedure in settling debt cases on a voluntary basis, since the committees were not set up and organized by law.

Moisture Penetration Great In Terraces And Contours

Although the rain that occurred May 17 and 18 fell very slowly, 0.1318 of an inch of water was wasted as runoff from terraced land on heavy silt loam soil at Goodwell, Oklahoma, says Harley A. Daniel, acting director of the experiment station.

A total of 1.79 inches fell during the two days, but only that which occurred on May 18 accumulated after the rain showed that the moisture had penetrated 7.8 inches on the terraced land and 15.0 inches on the adjacent plot of the same type of soil on which the land was terraced and contour listed, the moisture penetrated to a depth of 8.75 inches on the listed plots and 21.69 inches on the adjacent terraced and contour listed land.

When moisture studies were also made on another experiment on which the land was listed and chiseled on the contour the data obtained showed that the moisture 9.08 inches on disked plots, 20.33 on listed and 14.21 on the chiseled. These data show very distinctly that listing is a more desirable practice for moisture conservation than chiseling.

Considering the amount of water that is required to make a pound of dry material and based on the runoff that we secured during this rain, there was enough water wasted on the terraced land to make 49.2 pounds of wheat per acre and 76.8 pounds of sorghum per acre. Based on these data and the present price of grain (wheat 86¢ per bu. and grain sorghum 1.1-2¢ per pound) the farmer who did not hold his water on his land lost the equivalent of 69¢ per acre if the land was in wheat and \$1.16 per acre if planted to sorghum.

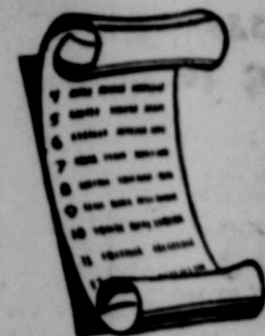
