

Father Of Fly Control Program To Speak Here

Dr. R. C. Bushland, Entomologist Here Apr. 18 For Joint Meet

Ozona ranchmen and others interested will have an opportunity to hear from his own lips the fascinating story of how a scientist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture insect research division studied the life cycle and love life of the screwworm fly until he finally hit on the method by which this expensive pest of the livestock industry can be exterminated.

Dr. R. C. Bushland, entomologist at the Kerrville insect research laboratory, will speak at a joint meeting of the Ozona Lions Club and Ozona Rotary Club here on April 18 at the country club. A "dutch treat" barbecue dinner will be served and all men interested in the program will be invited.

Dr. Bushland will bring for showing a film titled, "The Round-Up" which is a pictorial account of the screwworm fly eradication in Florida where Dr. Bushland's discoveries were put to practical application in ridding Florida and, consequently, all of the southeastern United States of the screwworm fly. A similar program has been launched this spring to eradicate the pest in the Southwest.

Dr. Bushland's story details the research which led to the discovery of characteristics by which the screwworm fly could be distinguished from the ordinary maggot fly, the following discovery that the female of this species mated only once in her brief lifetime and finally, discovery of the method of irradiation by which male screwworm flies could be made sexually sterile. By releasing sterile males, the species could be made to breed itself into extinction, which is exactly what happened in Florida.

The story also includes the development by the researchers of a method of feeding the laboratory raised flies on other than living flesh, their mass production and airdrop delivery to infested areas.

The Light House for the blind provides jobs for the blind and Texas Lions Clubs in turn provide a market for the products which enable the blind person to earn his own living at a worthwhile job and at the same time the project gives Texas Lions Club a fund raising activity.

Rutherford Asks New Term As 16th Dist. Congressman

Odessan Cites Faithful Attendance Record In 4 Terms In Office

Congressman J. T. Rutherford has made his official announcement for re-election as U. S. Representative from Texas' 16th Congressional District.

Rutherford's depth of legislative experience includes four years as State Representative and two as State Senator. Now serving his fourth term in Congress, Rutherford is known for his fidelity to official duty. He has compiled a near-perfect voting-attendance record during his Congressional tenure.

The Congressman introduced a new feature into public service several years ago, by equipping a house-trailer as a mobile office and taking the Congressional office into all points within his 19-county District.

The long-time West Texan, a Democrat, serves on two important Committees in the Congress. He is a member of the House Armed Services Committee and the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee. Rutherford is Chairman of the House National Parks Subcommittee, and is serving his second term on the joint United States-Mexico Interparliamentary Conference. He is Vice-Chairman of the House delegation to that Conference.

"I will have a very limited time to campaign in West Texas due to my Congressional duties here," Congressman Rutherford said in (Continued on Page Three)

Citizens of the community are urged to begin now to clean up, shape up and trim up their premises, vacant lots, streets and alleys so that maximum effect can be realized from the annual clean-up.

Because of the severe winter weather experienced this year, there will be an unusual amount of trimming of trees, shrubs and gardens and this will increase the scope of the clean-up job and the amount of material to be hauled away.

The county trash hauling service operated under management of the Crockett Water Control District, will be in service for free hauling of trash piled up in the clean-up campaign, it was announced. This free hauling will extend through the week following the clean up campaign in order that all trash accumulated in the clean-up is removed.

10th ANNUAL OZONA QUARTER HORSE SHOW SET FOR MAY 26; RAY LEWIS, DELL CITY, JUDGE

The tenth annual Ozona Quarter Horse Show has been set for Saturday, May 26, with approval of the AQHA and the QHA of West Texas.

At a recent meeting of the Ozona Roping Club, Inc., sponsor of the show, Bud Cox was named General Chairman and Carl Appel as entry secretary, Ray Lewis of Dell City, Texas, was selected as show judge and will select winners of halter, performance and children classes.

Complete halter classes for mares, stallions and geldings are set, along with a Get of Sire and Produce of Dam class. Added are classes for 4-H and FFA members with 1961 mares and stallions.

Ribbons are furnished the first six places of each class, with trophies to all first place winners, champion and reserve champion mare, stallion and gelding.

A Grand Champion Horse of the Show will be selected and receive a trophy from Baker Jeweler's of Ozona. To be eligible for this trophy, the horse must show and place at halter and in at least two performance classes. Points will be given to determine the winner, 6 points for a first place, 5 for second place, etc. Entries in the show will compete for a total of 20 handsome trophies, 10 silver belt buckles and 237 rosettes and ribbons.

Halter classes will be judged starting at 8:30 a. m., with performance classes at 1 p. m. Included in the afternoon performance show are Western Riding, Reining, Barrel Race, Roping and Registered Cutting, Junior and senior divisions are set up in the performance classes with the first place winners of each division competing in the night show for a trophy belt buckle.

Entry fees for halter classes are \$10.00. The registered cutting horse contest calls for a \$20.00 entry fee and all other performance classes at \$10.00. One-half of entry fees in performance classes will be paid back to winners.

A Western Parade through downtown Ozona at 5:30 p. m., will precede the night show which starts at 8 p. m. In addition to the finals in the performance classes, a number of riding classes are scheduled for children at the night show. Friend Well Finaled As Dual Gas Producer

Crockett County gained a dual gas-distillate discovery with completion from the Canyon of Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc., No. 1-A Friend, recent Ellenburger discovery, 1½ miles southeast of Ozona and ¾-mile northeast of the depleted one-well Ozona, East (Ellenburger gas-distillate) field.

It was completed from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.85 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 8,200-1, through perforations between 6,422-447 feet, which had been acidized with 16,000 gallons. Gravity of the liquid was 67 degrees.

It was completed Feb. 26 from the Ellenburger for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.2 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 5,800-1, through perforations between 8,315-330 feet.

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

flies at Kerrville will be doubled when a new temporary building is completed. Construction began in February.

Buildings at the former Moore Force Base near Mission, in the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas, are being remodeled into a permanent headquarters for the eradication effort. Construction of these facilities has been accelerated, and they are expected to be ready July 1 to produce 50 to 75 million sterile flies a week.

Florida is making available the state-owned equipment used at Sebring to produce flies for the successful eradication of screwworms from the southeast. Agricultural Research Service equipment will

also be transferred from Sebring to Mission, and the Florida plant will be closed. Production of sterile flies at Kerrville will be discontinued when the Mission facilities are open.

Agricultural Research Service Animal Inspection and Quarantine activities along the Mexican border have been intensified. Year round inspection is normally carried on there to prevent animals carrying ticks and diseases from entering the United States. Now, efforts will be intensified to prevent screwworm-infested animals from entering.

Stockmen, county agents, predator-control workers of Texas and The United States Department of the Interior, and other volunteer observers are cooperating by promptly reporting screwworm cases found in domestic and wild animals.

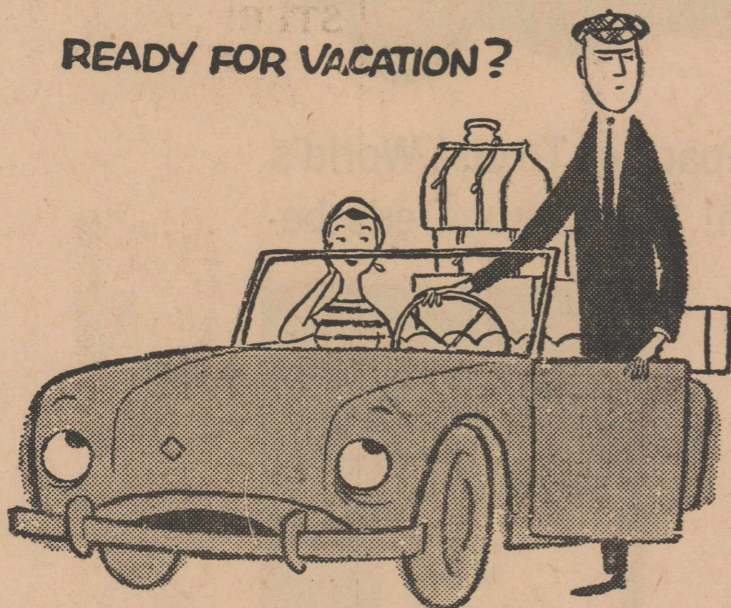

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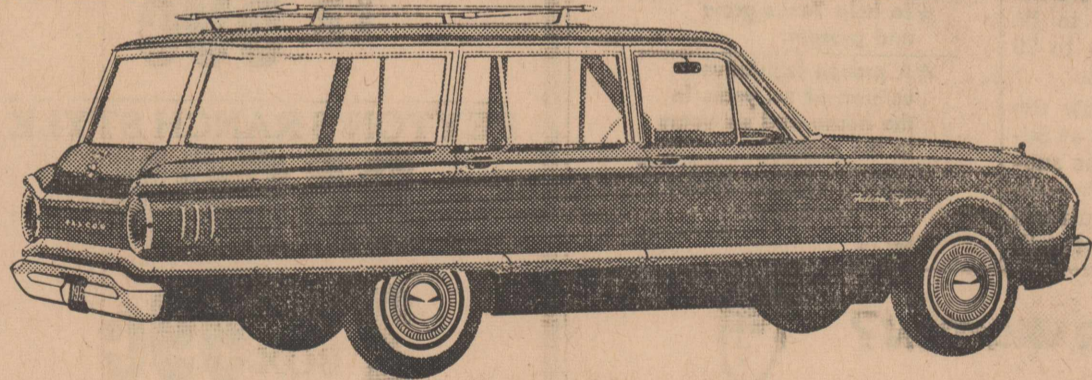

Ozona is all set to entertain between 150 and 200 women visitors and delegates to the 6th District Conference of the Texas Congress of parents & Teachers to be in session here three days next week.

The yo-yo had its day — the jig-saw puzzle had its.

Now the bing-bang. This new concession to the great American demand for amusement made its appearance yesterday and within 15 minutes after the close of school everybody was doing it. In order to get your new plates, it will be necessary for you to bring your certificate of title and your last year's registration papers.

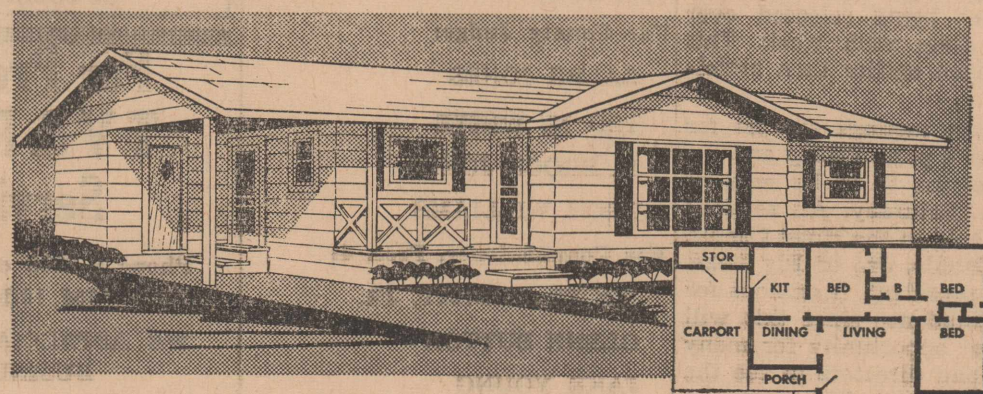

Fourth Producer In West Crockett Field Indicated By Tests

Fourth Clearfork producer and a location west extension to that pay was indicated in the Ozona, West multipay field of Crockett County, with the recovery of oil on one of two drillstem tests at Southland Royalty Co., et al., Midland, No. 2-14-B University Lands, in 14-31-University, 14 miles northwest of Ozona.

Recovery was 88 feet of oil- and gas-cut mud and two feet of oil on a one-hour test taken between 3,475-3,500 feet. Flowing pressure was 30-80 pounds; 30-minute initial and final shut-in pressures were 80 and 105 pounds, respectively.

A subsequent one-hour test between 3,500-525 feet recovered 90 feet of drilling mud.

Operator set 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,455 feet, on total depth of 3,525 feet, and was moving off rotary. The field has two Strawn gas producers.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 1-3 Shannon Estate, in 4-BB-EL&RR, Crockett County deep failure, 19 miles northwest of O-

zona and 7/8-mile northwest of the Todd, North (San Andres) field, 19 miles northwest of Ozona, swabbed eight barrels of new oil in five hours through perforations between 2,011-16 feet, possibly San Andres.

Operator was preparing to install a pump.

Total Depth is 7,900 feet.

The screwworm control program is already under way in Southwest Texas with several million sterile flies being released over livestock areas each week. This project began earlier than anticipated.

Committee meetings are set for 2 p. m. and 4 p. m. Friday and the general session is to be held at 9:30 a. m. Saturday. All sessions are to be held in the Hotel Cactus.

E. G. Cauble, Jr., of Big Lake, TS&GRA president, is anxious for a good attendance since this will be the first opportunity for many members and directors to see the new headquarters home of the association.

Members of the auxiliary, of which Mrs. James Baggett of Ozona is president, will also meet Friday and Saturday with a full program scheduled.

Texaco Crockett Test Indicate Second Pay; Heavy Lanaster Gasser

Second pay, possibly Devonian, has been encountered at Texaco Inc., Midland, No. 1 W. M. Weathered, in 30-31-H&TC, Crockett County detrital prospect, eight miles southeast of McCamey and two miles east of the Pecos County portion of the prolific El Cinco detrital and Devonian field.

Recovery was 660 feet of gas, 390 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 50 feet of free water on a three-hour test between 5,590-5,610 feet. Flowing pressure was 80-160 pounds; 30-minute initial and final shut-in pressures were 2,140 pounds and 1,410 pounds, respectively.

Recovery was 890 feet of gas, 310 feet of medium-cut mud and 180 feet of medium-to-heavy oil and gas-cut mud on a previous two-hour test between 5,570-90 feet. Flowing pressure was 85-130 pounds; 30-minute initial and final shut-in pressures were 700 pounds and 590 pounds, respectively.

Recovery was 270 feet of gas and 120 feet of gas-cut drilling mud on an earlier two-hour test between 5,530-67 feet. Flowing pressure was 85-98 pounds; 30-minute initial and final shut-in pressures were 638 pounds; and 140 pounds, respectively.
 Drilling continued below 5,666 feet in lime and chert on a 6,000-foot Devonian contract.

Detrital production was indicated earlier with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 218,000 cubic feet daily and the recovery of 1,750 feet of free oil and 950 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud on a test between 5,225-75 feet.

The Lancaster Hills multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County gained its third Strawn gas producer and a location east extension to that pay with completion of Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 2-L University Lands, 25 miles west of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 22 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 39,000-1. Gravity of the liquid was 70.7 degrees.

Production was through perforations between 6,850-918 feet.
 Location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 10-29-University.

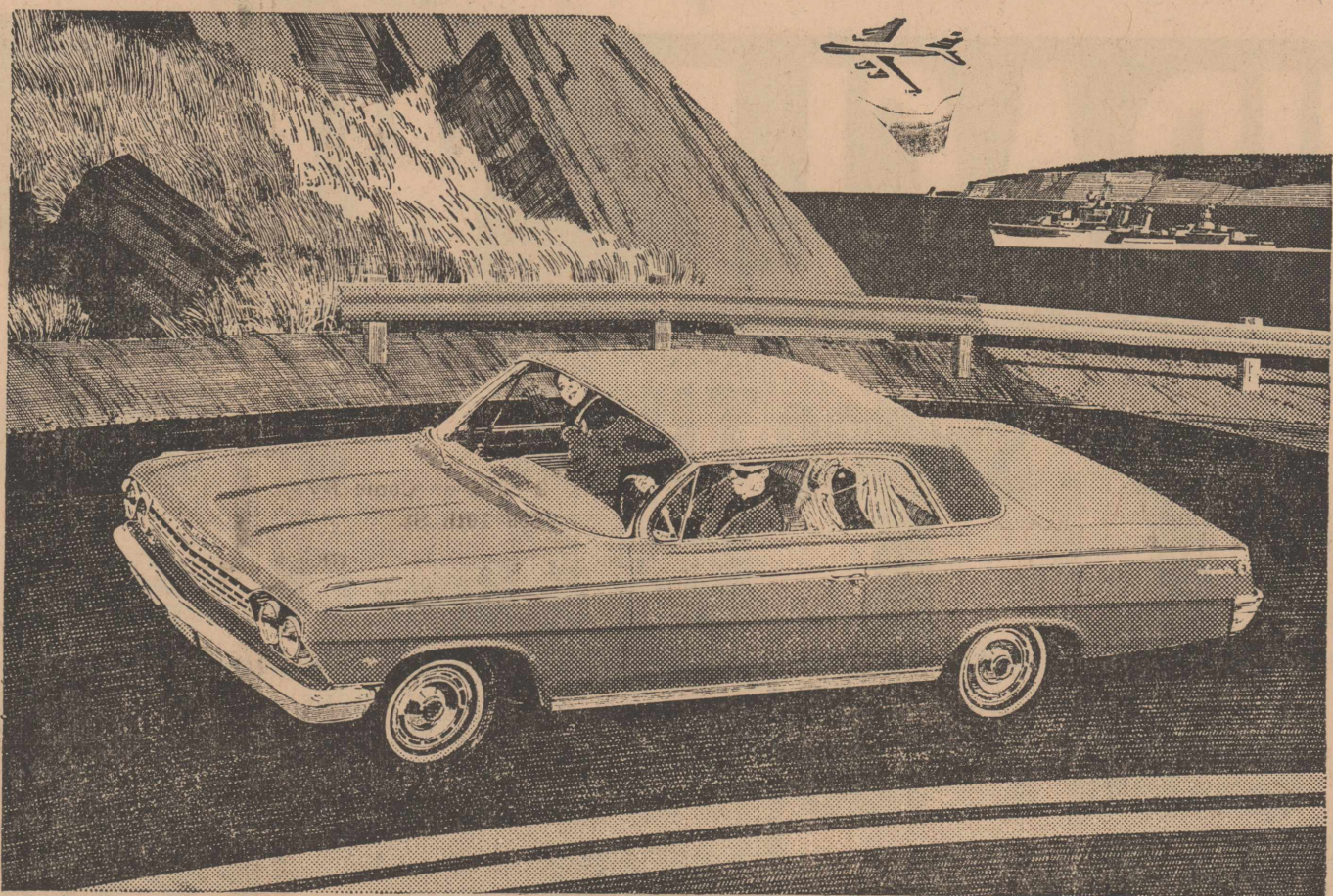
