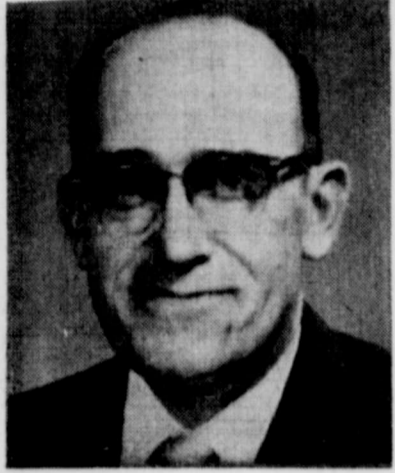

## Manager, Assistant Manager at Tuco Promoted By SWPS Co.

Promotions of two Southwestern Public Service Company Abernathy residents have been announced by Jim Collins, Plains Division manager for the electric light and power company.

Effective April 1st, P. S. Sterrett, longtime plant manager at Tuco generating station, has been promoted to plant manager of the huge 80,000 kilowatt East Plant at Amarillo. Willie Florence, assistant plant manager at Tuco since 1951, has been named plant manager to succeed Mr. Sterrett.

Phil Sterrett was born in Abernathy, attended school here, graduating from high school and going on to Texas Tech where he received his B.S. in Electrical Engineering in 1938. He joined Southwestern Public Service Company as a laborer just three days after his college graduation.

A series of advancements followed and in 1943 Mr. Sterrett was

transferred to Plainview as chief engineer. From there he went to Clovis as plant manager, returning to Tuco Station in 1951 in the same capacity. He has been at Tuco until his recent promotion to East Plant.

Family plans are still incomplete at this time, with Mr. Sterrett commuting to and from his new job. However, the family will probably move to Amarillo after school is out.

Willie Florence, successor to Mr. Sterrett, was born near Tahoka and completed his grammar and high school education at Draw, near Tahoka. He earned his B.S. in Chemical Engineering after having attended Howard Payne College near Brownwood, and after his army service during World War II with the 36th Division. He joined Southwestern Public Service Company in 1948 as a Technical Engineer and was made Engineer in 1949. In 1951 he was named assistant plant manager of Tuco Plant. He successfully completed a supervisor's conference conducted by his company in 1959 and also in 1959 completed a 4-year vocational training program in Plant Skill Improvement. He also has served as an instructor in the latter course.

The Florence family lives here in a new completely electric home. A son, Larry, is a junior in high school here, and daughter, Jan, is a junior high student.

# Cunningham Named Mayor; Jones And Pinson Elected Aldermen In Record Vote

W. V. Cunningham, retired gin operator and farmer, was elected mayor of the City of Abernathy Tuesday in a record vote. A former city alderman, Cunningham polled 184 votes, to 121 for his opponent, Dr. John W. Hale, local dentist, who currently is serving as an alderman. Alderman Lon Carmickle received one write-in vote for mayor.

Roy Jones received 159 votes to succeed W. F. Wolf as alderman, and David Ray Pinson was re-elected alderman with 140 votes. Wolf and Mayor Edgar O. Graham were not candidates for re-election.

All three special issues on the city ballot were approved by a big majority vote.

The 308 votes cast Tuesday may be a record vote for a City of Abernathy election.

Others on the ballot for alderman received the following number of votes: Ed Eldridge, 18; W. A. Scott, 52; James R. Smith, 81; R. R. Struve, 128.

The three special issues received the following votes: No. 1: City Park site for post office, 210 for, 68 against. No. 2: Adoption of ordinance prohibiting keeping of domestic

animals within the city limits; 232 for adoption of ordinance, 49 against.

No. 3: Tuesday was a bad day for dogs. The voters favored keeping City Ordinance No. 85, with 239 voting for the ordinance to 39 against. The ordinance says ALL dogs must be kept on a leash or in a pen. This applies even though the dog is wearing a collar with a license and vaccination tag.

West is president of the board and Lovelace is secretary.

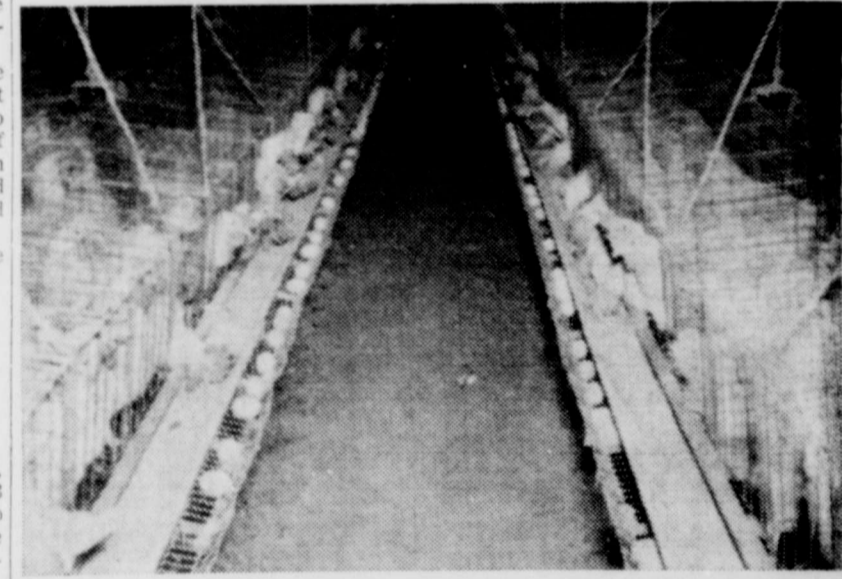
REV. COGGIN WILL SPEAK ON MASONIC PROGRAM APRIL 13

R. J. Jones, Jr., owner of the Cypress Hill Egg Farm located 3 1/2 miles west and 1/2 mile south of Abernathy, has announced that he is now using a new and colorful egg carton, bearing the Larro Sure Fresh label.

The eggs are gathered twice daily by Jones and his wife, Marguerite. The eggs are candled, cleaned, and then graded according to size—small, medium, and large. These eggs, which are guaranteed by General Mills, are distributed to local grocery stores and to Graham's Restaurant. Jones originally started his egg farm in 1957. He now has 2,400 producing hens and 1,200 pullets which should begin laying soon. This month he will purchase 1,000 more Hyline baby chicks which will eventually replace some of the older hens. Producing hens are kept only about 18 months, Jones stated.

### Two Area Gins Recognized For Safe Operation

DALLAS—The City Gin in Abernathy and the Lakeview Gin are among 61 cotton gins in Texas scheduled to receive special recognition April 10 for accident-free operation during the 1960-61 season.

The Texas Cotton Ginners' Association will present plaques noting the accomplishment at its 48th annual convention in Dallas. A representative of each has been invited to receive the award during the convention program.

Association president James P. Walsh congratulated winners of the awards. He said the large number represented a satisfactory climax to the Association's first year of intensive accident prevention work. All gins receiving awards this year will be eligible for second year plaques in 1962, Walsh added.

Around 170 gins registered in the safety award program by

pledging extra attention to accident prevention and holding safety meetings with employees during the ginning season. The Association furnished educational material for the program.

The accident-free operation is especially significant, Walsh said, when you compare it with the state-wide average of one accident for every 1,400 bales ginned. The gins receiving awards turned out over a quarter of million bales of cotton without an accident.



### Area Farm People Cited For Efforts In Soil And Water Conservation Planning

Theory and practice conflict far less than is commonly supposed. Good practice is in accord with good theory. Where theory is lacking we must all look back on the wasteful method of trial and error. With good guiding theory, much of the waste can be avoided.

Research and experience of the past 25 years have led to some substantially sound theories in planning soil and water conservation programs for farm and ranch operating units.

Farmers who have recently worked up Soil and Water Conservation Plans with the help of Soil Conservation Service Technicians are: Mrs. Ova Seago, Martin Schure, John Smith, Billy Silvester, H. M. LaFont, Harvey W. McEachern and Viola Roadhimer in the Plainview area, Ira Davis, Rae Groce and Clifton Smith, Floyd D. Tiffin and V. D. Ross Sr. in the Hale Center area, and Oliver Jackson of Abernathy and Glenn Witten of Halfway.

The knowledge we have gained over the years about the potential behavior of the kinds of soil shown on soil maps serves as one important basis for the conservation plan of an operating unit.

The most effective plan must provide for significant sustained production for efficient use of the soils to obtain an optimum level of productivity.

A minimum of four broad groups of practices in proper relationship to one another, are vital to a successful harvest. Every good harvest on every acre of durable soil in the world has resulted from a combination of these four, either by design or accident: (1) a proper balance of plant nutrients; (2) adequate supplies of air and water in the root zone; (3) appropriate crop varieties; & (4) adequate crop protection from insect, disease, weeds and other hazards.

The vital point is that the prac-

tices to reach all four objectives must be carried out at the proper time to support one another on each acre. Otherwise really high outputs for the labor and materials used cannot be expected. This takes planning and scheduling. Few people can remember the details and carry them out for good success unless the plans and schedules are written down.

Good farm plans cannot be made without considering all of the kinds of soil in all fields within the operating unit. The soil characteristics and management practices on an individual kind of soil in a field influences the other fields. A proper determination of each kind of soil depends upon how it fits into the whole farm unit. Hence each farm has a different plan for the use of each soil.

The goals are individual. The farms and ranches are individual. The complexities are many. Guided by sound theory, a soil map, and knowledge of how the soil responds to alternative combinations of practices, an individual plan can reduce the complexities to practical terms for efficient operation. Only with such a plan can a system be developed that makes maximum use of the skills, labor and investment of the operator.

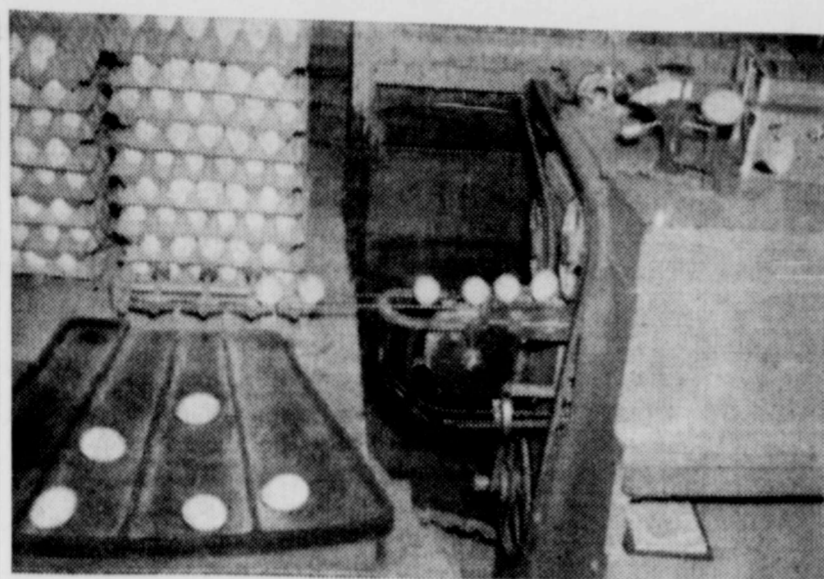
