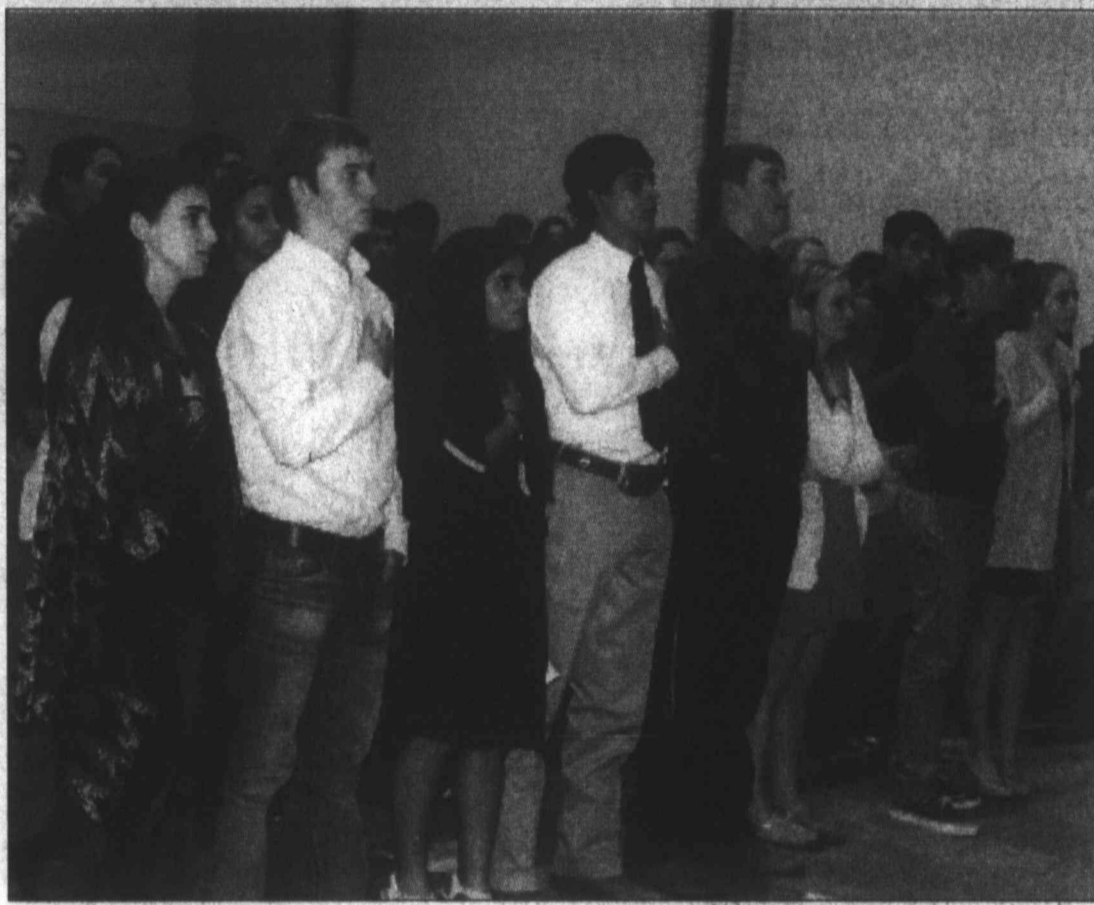

Auditor finds problems in county office

Mitchell County Commissioners Court convened Monday morning and County Auditor Heidi Harris brought the attention of court members to some problems in the tax assessor/collector's office.

Harris has been auditing the various departments within the county, and she found that for the last three years, taxing entities have not been paying the correct amounts to the county for assessing and collecting taxes.

Each taxing entity, i.e. the City of Colorado City, Lone Wolf Groundwater Conservation District, Mitchell County Hospital District and more, pays the county 25 cents per parcel of property

that is taxed each year. The number of parcels per entity is determined by the Mitchell County Appraisal District.

Harris said that the matter came to her attention when it was reported to her that the city and water district had written checks to pay for parcel taxation and the checks had never cleared the bank.

When Harris began to audit the tax office, she found that no entities were billed correctly for the service in 2012. She also found that most entities were underbilled in 2013 and 2014. According to Harris' calculations, the county is owed several thousands for tax

Sharyland customers urged to attend meeting Thursday

The Office of the Public Utilities Counsel (OPUC) will conduct its annual public hearing, and customers of the rural electric delivery company are hoping that Sharyland Utilities customers that are concerned about the fees they are paying will attend the meeting. The meeting will be held at the Hotel Settles on Thursday, November 19th from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., and all are welcome to attend.

OPUC represents the interests of residential and small commercial consumers

in electric, telecommunications and water proceedings before the Public Utility Commission, Electric Reliability Council of Texas and state and federal courts.

According to Nancy Raney, a Sharyland customer and activist, she and others like her hope to see many Sharyland customers attend the meeting so that it shows the OPUC the seriousness of exorbitant electrical delivery rates being charged by the company. She has traveled to Austin and around the state attending town hall

meetings to plead her case to legislators.

Raney said that officials from Sharyland are hoping to put off any rate consideration until the summer of 2016 when the next rate case comes before the Public Utilities Commission.

"In the meantime, we're all (Sharyland customers) stuck paying these ridiculous rates and going out of business because we can't afford to pay out electricity bills," Raney said.

If the OPUC meeting is well-attended,

it could make a difference, according to Raney. She said the state agency defends consumers against high utility bills. The upcoming meeting in Big Spring is being held to seek input from citizens in order to set priorities for the coming year.

The job of the OPUC is to lobby for consumers before the Public Utilities Commission as well as state and federal courts. Taxes pay the salaries of the individuals employed by the OPUC, and

Candidates begin to file for election

Several candidates have already filed to run in the March primary election, and there is already a contested race locally. Those wishing to file have until December 14th to do so.

Incumbent Jesse Muñoz has filed for another term as Mitchell County Commissioner of Precinct 3 with Republican County Chair Teresa Beckmeyer. He will face challenger Kenny Gillespie, who has also filed to run as a Republican.

Local attorney Sterling Burleson has filed to run for the office of County Attorney as a Republican, and Randy Anderson has filed to run as a Republican to be re-elected to the office of Precinct 1 Commissioner.

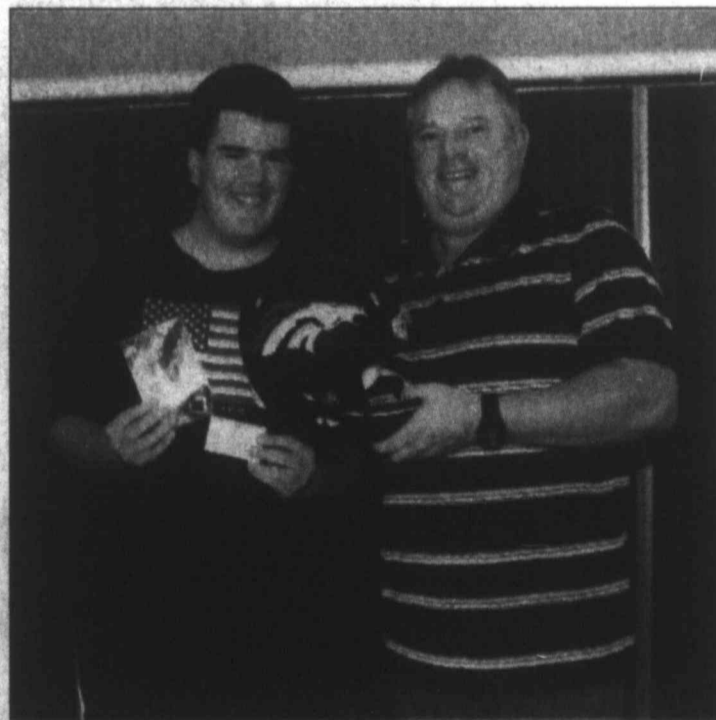
Patrick Toombs will, once

again, seek to be re-elected as sheriff, and Teresa Beckmeyer has filed to continue her position as Republican County Chair.

Tax Assessor/Collector Sylvia Clanton has not yet filed for re-election, but Beckmeyer said she has expressed an intention to do so.

Other seats up for election include the position of District Attorney, currently held by Ann Reed and District Judge, currently held by Glen Harrison.

Anyone wanting to run for office can notify either of the two party chairs, Victoria Harmon, Democratic Chair or Beckmeyer, Republican County Chair. The filing period will continue through 6 p.m. on Monday, December 14th.

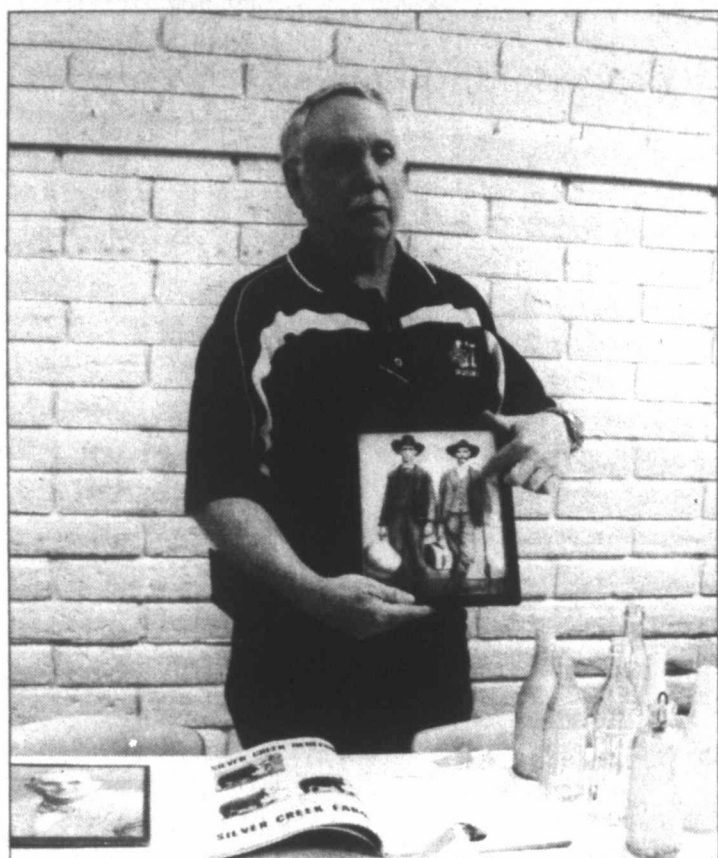

Ratliffs have history in county

The Colorado City Lions Club met for the weekly meeting last Friday, and one of the club's own presented a program. Mike Ratliff brought several items and presented a program about

his family's history in Mitchell County.

Mike's dad, Bob, was in the audience to provide support and assistance, but none was needed as it was clear that Mike was quite versed in his family's history. He began by saying that his great-grandfather, Michael, was born in 1868 in east Texas, near Paris. He was one of 15 children, 13 boys and two girls.

The family traveled west and when he grew up, Michael worked as a cowboy on the JA Ranch. It was there that he became owner of a Colt .45 pistol that Mike has today. In recent years, Mike contacted the pistol's manufacturer and sent a photo of the gun. After verifying that the weapon is authentic, the company sent Mike an authentication certificate.

Mike's grandfather, Harry, was born in Mitchell County and fought in World War I. Mike is the owner of his Springfield rifle. He told the story of how his grandfather met his grandmother on a train by giving up his seat to her.

In the 1920s, Mike's grandfather started the Colorado Bottling Company that continued in operation for 10 years. The company was located in the building that was later Costin Implement and Patriot Mudlogging.

Mike brought some of the interestingly shaped bottles from the company with him. He said that the old bottles were the original recycling project, because once the soda was out, the bottles were returned to the company and recyclers got a small deposit for each bottle.

The Colorado Bottling Co. shut down in the early 30s due to a sugar shortage during The Depression. "The big guys," he said referring to Coca Cola, "had bought up all the sugar."

Harry, also an attorney, was talking with a man one day on the family farm just west of the city where Browne Bros. and the prisons are located now. The man lit a match and tossed it into the river, and the river caught fire.

Thus began the Sunflower Oilfield in 1943. Harry started pumping oil from very near the ground's surface. According to Mike, the well produced a couple of barrels of oil per day for years.

The well was still in operation when the farm was sold to the Ellis family in 1971. Unfortunately, a flood washed away the equipment in 1980 and the well was never rediscovered.

Harry continued his career as an oil and gas attorney. He went on to form the Promising Oil Co. and leased Pike's Peak for drilling.

Mike said two of his grandfather's brothers also settled in the area. His grandfather, Harry, and great-great uncle are credited with founding the museum here.

As he ages, Mike has become more interested in his family's history. He makes it a point to ask his dad and other relatives about family information so that everything can be passed down through the generations.

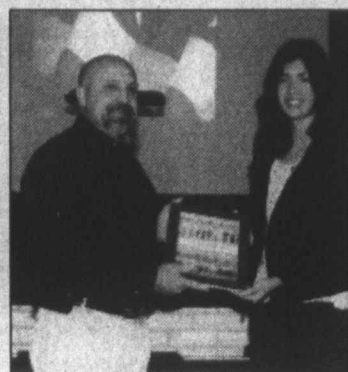

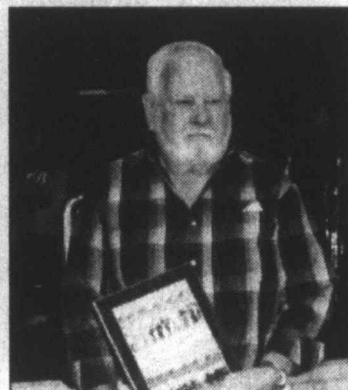

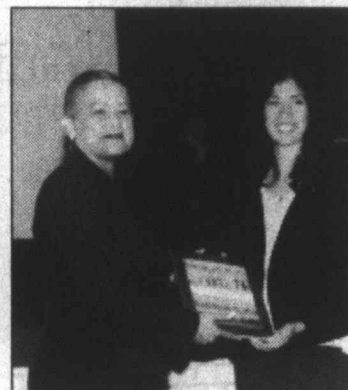

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Going to the same school for 55 years

Bill Giles graduated from Van High School in 1956 and went to college. "Then I came back to the same school in 1960 and started my teaching career here," he says. "I wasn't very much older than the students I was teaching. I came back here when I was 20 years old. Some of my students were 18 years old. It was sort of interesting for me that first year. Also, I taught my wife who was one of my students that first year."

His wife is three years younger than Bill. "She was working in Dallas one summer and we ran into each other. We started dating in June and got married in September."

He started out teaching English and business and is now the Van High School counselor. "I have been in Van High School for 55 years. I've had my wife in school here, I've had my grandson in school here. I've had my daughter in school here. I've had my son in school here. In fact I'm working right now on teaching the fourth generation of some students' families here."

In addition to his counseling duties, he is in charge of placement of international students, something he started doing in 1976.

"I have hosted six exchange students in my home. Every summer my wife and I go to Brazil to see what we still call our boys, even though they're 45 and 50 years old now."

His office looks like he's been there for 55 years. Every bit of wall space, ceiling space, bookshelf space, table space and even some floor space is covered with photographs, flags, banners and memorabilia from his experiences with foreign exchange students. Candles, mugs, pom-poms, bulletin boards, certificates, plaques, trinkets, momentos and souvenirs are everywhere. It is really a showcase of what he has done the past 55 years.

"I've got almost every country represented because I've placed hundreds of students from other countries. I hope to die on the job because I sure don't want to have to clean up this mess. The custodial staff came in here once wanting to paint the walls and I told them 'we're not doing this. You can't see the walls so don't worry about them.'"

He knows of nobody else who has been at the same school for 55 years. "Maybe I'll set a record. It has been an enjoyable place to work, one of the best places I've ever worked. Well, come to think of it, it's the only place I've worked. But it's wonderful and I look forward to coming here every day. I usually get here about six-thirty in the morning and usually stay until four-thirty or five in the afternoon."

services rendered but not billed in the previous years.

Certain aspects of the tax office have never been part of routine audits, and Harris is undertaking the daunting task of auditing each department and office under the county's umbrella.

Harris has spent hours researching the problem and is now letting each entity know what has happened. During the open meeting Monday morning, she offered to take over the billing of each entity.

Texas law states that the checks taken in must be deposited by the seventh day, and officials from

the City of Colorado City have stated that there are two checks sent to the tax office in 2014 that haven't cleared the bank.

Harris has met with the head of each taxing entity over the last couple of days to explain the situation, and as of Tuesday, she said all have expressed understanding and she hopes the county will get paid for the services rendered.

When Harris asked to take over the billing, Commissioners Jeremy Strain and Randy Anderson weighed in.

"It's more work for you, but if you're willing to do it, that would be good," Strain said.

Harris said that it would only take about half an hour to generate the bills, a much shorter time than it has taken to look up all of the information that was incorrect.

"The main thing is you're consistent and actually getting it done," Anderson said.

In other business, votes were canvassed for the November 3rd Constitutional Amendment Election. All proposed amendments passed. Of the over 4,000 registered voters here, 14.76% voted in the election.

Longevity pay was approved, as were a few budget amendments to cover expenses for the rest of the year.

One of the bigger amendments needed was for the sheriff's office. Patrick Toombs was present in the meeting to answer any questions the court might have.

He said that a high rate of turnover in jailers has contributed to more overtime for some. The department has lost five jailers this year and hired five new ones. The new jailers had to attend training and others have to cover shifts while the jail is short-handed.

Toombs said that many transports have also contributed to rising costs coming from the department. The sheriff said his guys are averaging about two transports per week, and sometimes the transports require trips to the valley.

The Mitchell County Sheriff's Office is dealing with an average of about 40 inmates per day, not counting housings from other counties.

Funds needed to help build animal shelter

The City of Colorado City needs an animal shelter, but funds are in short supply. One city employee has taken the cause to heart and is trying to raise the money to help with construction costs.

Rustine Lendermon is the city's Animal Control Officer, and thanks to her job, she knows just how badly Mitchell County needs an animal shelter. The city contracts with Snyder to house the animals, so a shelter here would save those costs. It would also save fuel money and employee time.

Lendermon said personnel at the Snyder shelter do a good job of getting the animals rehomed. They often work with Second Chance Dog Rescue, a group out of Snyder that uses foster homes as temporary lodging until the dogs can find permanent owners. Animals not adopted are euthanized.

Lendermon's supervisor Don-

na Overton drew up a design that can be used as a plan for an animal shelter, and the city has property north of town that could be used as a site.

The problem is the lack of funding. Construction costs to build the shelter have been estimated at \$35,000.

City Manager David Hoover has shown his support for the shelter by opening a special account for donations at City National Bank, and donations can also be dropped off at the police station and city hall.

Now, to make donating easier, Lendermon has set up a gofundme account. Those interested in donating can use credit or debit cards to donate online.

Accident last Thursday kills FedEx truck driver

According to Tom Carlock of the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, a fatal accident occurred near Morgan Creek last Thursday, as the driver of a FedEx tractor-trailer rig hit the trailer of another truck at about 3:30 in the morning.

Carlock said the accident occurred around Mile Marker 211 just east where Morgan Creek crosses under I-20. The call came in as a one-vehicle accident.

When emergency responders arrived on scene it quickly became obvious that the wreck involved two tractor-trailer rigs. The driver of the FedEx truck got too close to the truck in front of him and struck the trailer with the cab of his rig.

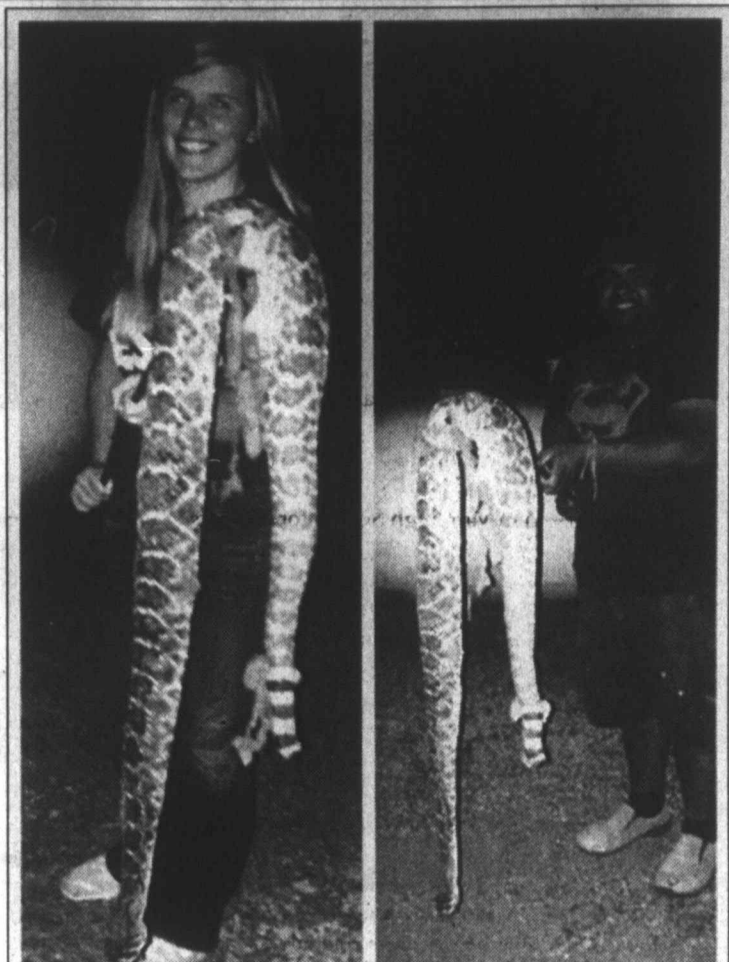
Carlock said that the accident tore up the cab of the FedEx hauler badly. "It was completely destroyed and twisted around backwards where the cab faced the trailer," he said.

According to Carlock, it was

apparent that the driver was already deceased, and emergency responders had to come up with a plan to remove his body from the mangled wreckage. Firefighters used the Jaws of Life to extract the driver's body from the cab over the course of a couple of hours.

The deceased man was from El Paso and routinely drove the FedEx freight route between El Paso and Dallas.

Carlock said that it took three hours for all personnel to clear the scene. Those involved in getting the interstate cleared and open to traffic came from several agencies, including the CCAD, DPS, CCPD, MCSO, TxDOT and Morris Wrecker.

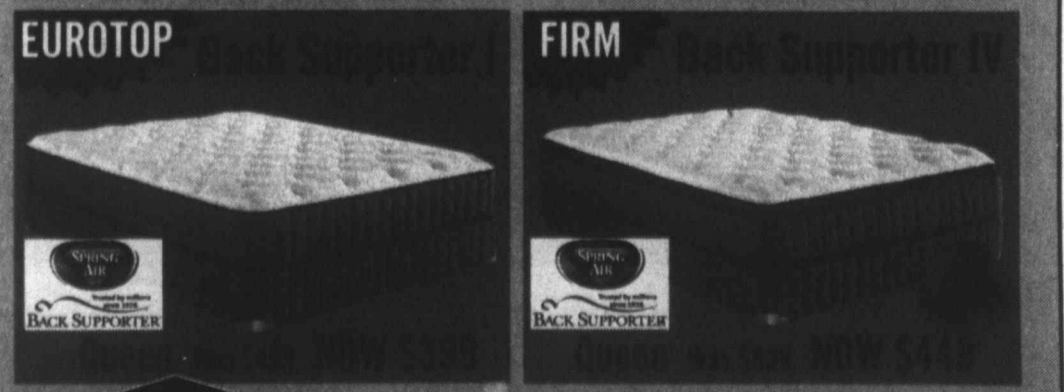
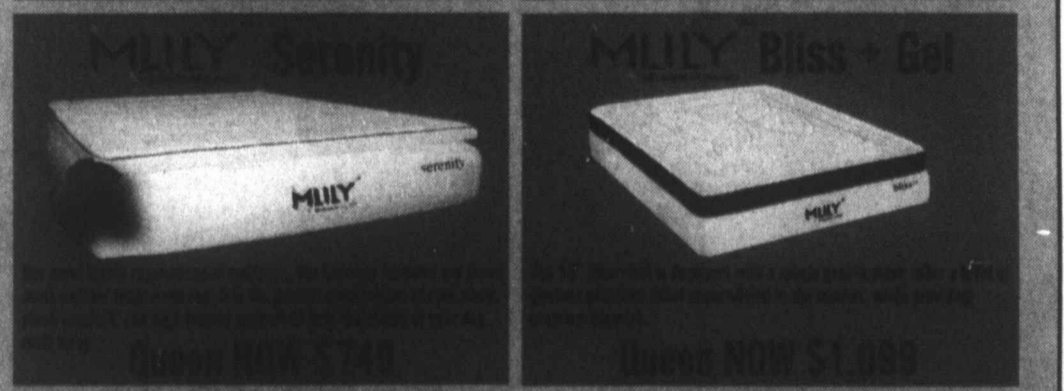
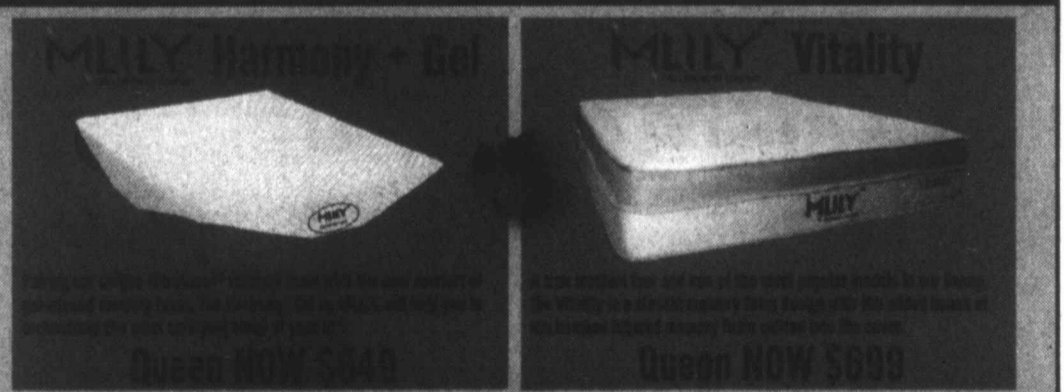

LEAD AND COPPER NOTICE

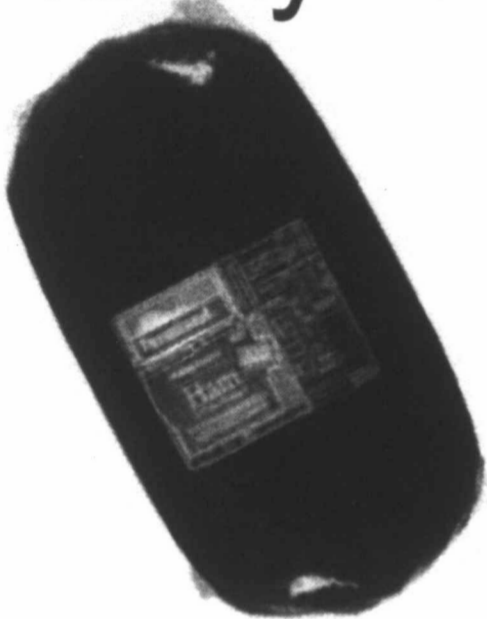
During June 2014, the city collected samples for lead analysis from 20 residential kitchen sinks that were served by the city's public water system. Seventeen of those samples had lead levels significantly below the lead action level of 15 parts per billion (ppb) or 0.015 mg/L. Three of these samples contained lead levels ranging from 63 to 190 ppb. The city is working closely with these three residents in an attempt to identify the source of lead in their household drinking water. It should be noted samples collected from the distribution system have found lead levels of less than 0.4 ppb.

Please note, this is not a violation under federal or state law, it does however, prompt City of Colorado City to have post Lead Public Education and if found to have a high level reading in subsequent sampling, a program in place to minimize lead in your drinking water by the end of December 2015. This program may include adding corrosion control treatment, source water treatment, and if necessary replacing lead service lines.

Blanket survives Bulldogs' late rally

TRENT — Loraine head coach Kyle Hauk looked up at the scoreboard at the end of the third quarter on Friday night and knew his team had to try something radical in an effort to erase a 21-point deficit to Blanket in the bi-district round of the Class A, Division II playoffs.

Loraine rallied from a three-touchdown deficit in the final 10 minutes and seemed poised to claim one of the greatest comebacks in the history of six-man football. The Bulldogs outscored Blanket by a staggering 33-13 clip in the final minutes and rallied to tie the game at 93-93.

Something unexpected happened then. Blanket made a two-point version and Loraine didn't.

"Unfortunately, they came back and scored and kicked the extra point," said Hauk. "We came right back and scored then they got lucky and blocked our extra point attempt. That, really, was the dif-

ference in the game. They just got a hand on an extra-point kick."

The end result was Blanket claimed a stunning 101-99 thriller.

A unsuccessful point conversion with less than a minute to go enabled Blanket to escape with a 101-99 victory. The Tigers had 733 total yards of offense, 447 passing and 286 rushing while the Bulldogs put up 482 yards of offense, 247 rushing and 235 passing.

"It was just one of those games," said Hauk. "We couldn't stop them and they could stop us."

Blanket, now 4-7 overall, got off to a quick start against Loraine. The Tigers outscored the Bulldogs to the tune of 19-13 in the first 10 minutes of play.

Loraine rallied back in the second quarter. Tillis hit Abraham Hernandez on a 32-yard pass and ran for three, 47 and 39-yard touchdown runs along with returning a kick 70-yards.

The Bulldogs reeled off a 30-25

advantage and went into the half trailing by one, at 44-43.

The Tigers posted 36 points in the first 10 minutes of the second half and took a commanding 80-61 cushion into the fourth.

In the third quarter, Blanket was able to get the upper hand scoring five touchdowns while the Bulldogs managed only three. However, Loraine bounced back in the fourth with five touchdowns while holding Blanket to only three.

Hauk said he decided to use the "let them score" approach at that point, hoping to save as much time for his offense. The key to the plan was Loraine's ability to deny Blanket the extra-point attempts.

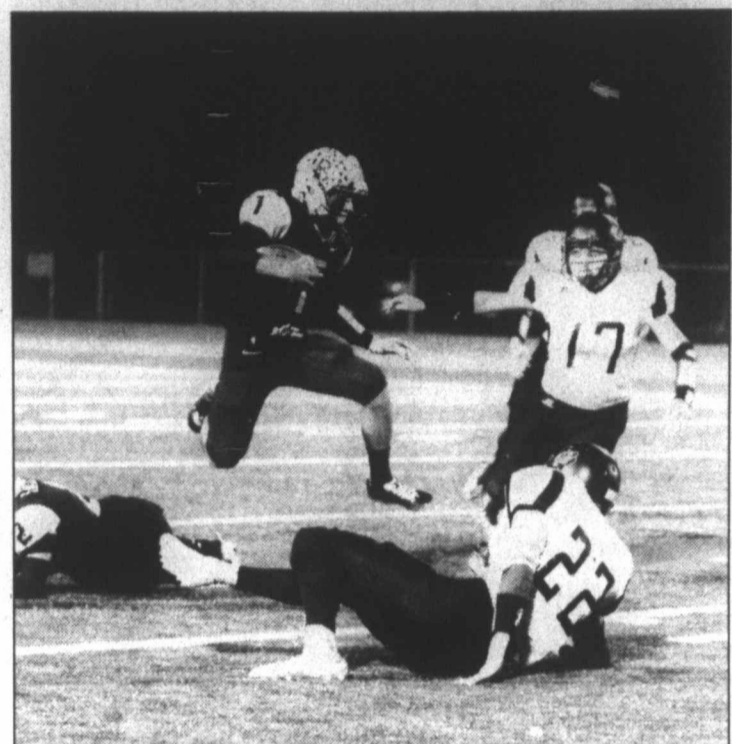

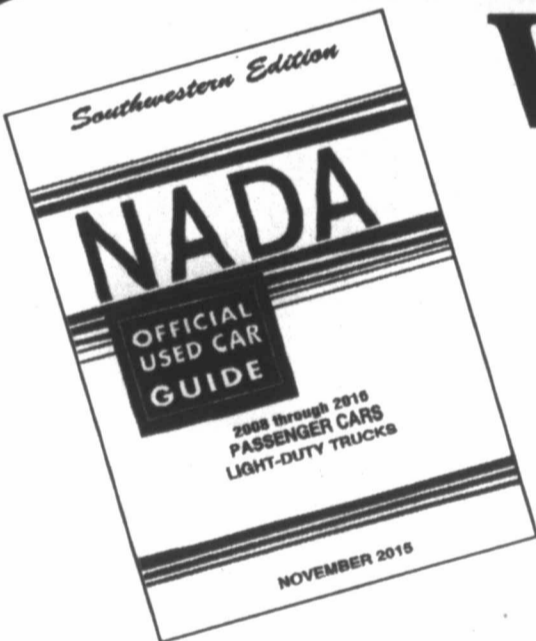

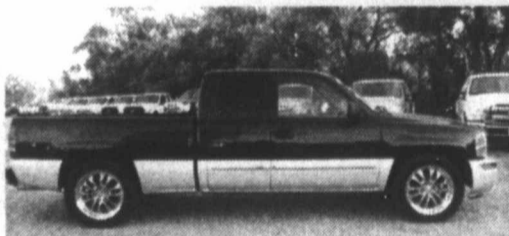

Wolves power their way to next playoff round

FORSAN — For a brief 10-second span on Friday night, it appeared as if the Reagan County Owls might have found enough offense to sneak past the Colorado Wolves on a cool night at Buffalo Stadium in the bi-district round of the Class 3A playoffs.

Appeared was the key word. Just 10 seconds after Reagan County had scored a go-ahead touchdown to take a 15-14 fourth-quarter advantage, Tommy James and Mark Munoz delivered enough shockwaves that rocked three counties. It might have been even less time, but quarterbacks do need time to drop back and set up.

The District 4-3A runner-up, Reagan County managed to get its offense in gear early in the fourth quarter. The Owls capped a 7-play, 65-yard scoring drive on a fourth-down try. On the play, DeLeon rifled a 25-yard scoring strike to running back Juan Sanchez.

Sanchez's touchdown reception gave the Owls a one-point lead, at 15-14, with 10:26 left in the playoff opener.

Colorado City didn't waste any time in dialing up a big play of its own. After taking the Owls' ensuing kick at their own 40, C-City head coach Dan Gainey decided to try and take the wind out of Reagan County's sails quickly.

The best way to do that was simply put the ball in the hands of his playmaker — wide receiver Mark Munoz.

On first down, James took the snap from center and rolled out of the pocket to his right side ... and lofted a strike into the arms of Munoz, who had slipped behind the Owls' defensive coverage and was racing toward the end zone.

A mere 10 seconds after watching Reagan County celebrate a lead, Munoz turned their smile upside down.

His second scoring recep-

tion of the contest, Munoz put Colorado City on top 22-15 with 10:16 left.

While Munoz put the sizzle in the Wolves' offense, the Colorado City defense put the W in the win column moments after Munoz's TD play. The Wolves, keyed by a solid outing from Tony Martinez, Shadda Cansler and Andrew Burrola, gutted out a tense red zone defensive stand with less than 5 minutes to play to seal the victory.

Shortly after Munoz's go-ahead TD, the Owls threatened to regain the upper hand. Reagan County marched inside the C-City 20. A facemask penalty on the Wolves followed, setting the Owls up with a first-and-goal play at the CHS 8.

Reagan County helped the Wolves seconds later. After Sanchez had gained three on first down, the Owls were flagged for holding on the ensuing play. That penalty moved the ball back to the Wolves' 14.

Colorado City's defense turned away three straight passing attempts from there and stalled the RCHS threat.

While defense saved the day, Dylan Meguire and the Colorado High School special teamers started the Wolves' day with a bright spot. Meguire recovered a fumble on the opening kick and gave the CHS offense its first possession at the Owl 33.

Isaiah Jennings took over from there. The senior wide receiver opened the Wolves' first series with a 12-yard run. Two plays later, he turned a pass from James into a 17-yard gain and a first down at the RC 4.

Alex Trujillo capped C-City's opening drive from there. The Wolves' 5-foot-8, 215-pound running back plowed his way into the end zone two plays after Jennings' reception and staked Colorado City to a 7-0 lead with 9:36 left in the opening frame.

Reagan County, which had been limited to just 31 total yards in the first quarter, got on the board early in the second quarter, thanks to a turnover by the Wolves at their own 16.

Sanchez pushed his way into the end zone from 3 yards out with 8:15 to register Reagan County's first score. DeLeon tossed a short pass to tight end R.J. Flores for the two-point conversion and staked the Owls to an 8-7 lead with 8:15 left in the half.

The Owls didn't have long to enjoy the lead. Colorado City roared back less than 5 minutes later to reclaim the lead.

After a RCHS punt had given the Wolves to ball at the Owl 44, Jennings got the CHS offense going with a short run. Two plays later, he pulled in a 9-yard pass from James to give the Wolves a first down at the RC 30.

That was as close as Munoz needed to get to deliver his first sting. One play after Jennings' first-down catch, Munoz sprinted to the end zone and pulled in a 30-yard scoring strike from James. Trujillo added the two-point conversion seconds later by catching a pass from James.

With the win over Reagan County, the Wolves improved to 5-6 for the year and, more importantly, earned the right to face Idalou in the second round of the playoffs. The two teams will face off at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday in Andrews.

The birding walk is perfect for those interested in birds and intrigued by the various species in the area. Those participating will have the opportunity to identify some of the over 200 species of birds at Lake Colorado City State Park. Those planning to attend should bring their binoculars, spotting scope, or cameras to help them see the birds in detail. O'Haver said there will be some walking and driving to the program, so anyone planning to attend should have good footwear, appropriate clothing and a vehicle to take advantage

of the best birding locations. Another installment of All Around the Campfire is set to take place on November 28th as well. O'Haver will be talking about creatures of the night, while visitors gather around a campfire starting at 6 p.m. He urges local citizens to join him and other park staff around the campfire for stories, education, entertainment and more. Conservation planning starts now

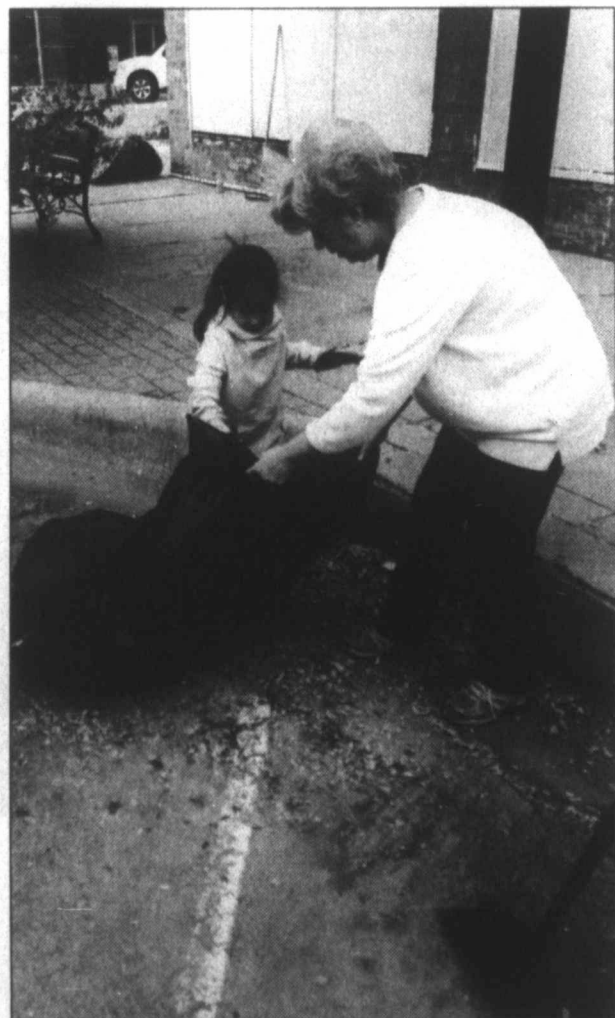
The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has financial assistance programs to assist agriculture producers and landowners to implement conservation practices. The application sign up is continuous, however, now is the time to plan before funding becomes available. The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is one of the largest conservation programs in the current Farm Bill. It is voluntary program that promotes environmental quality and assists local landowners with technical and financial help to install or implement structural, vegetative, and management practices that can benefit the soil, water, air, plants, livestock, and wildlife. The best way to ensure you do not miss any deadlines is to have a conservation plan in place for your application to be completed by the field office staff before funding deadlines are announced. Both conservation plans and EQIP applications require

a farm or ranch visit with the conservation planner to see your operation. This allows the NRCS to help identify any resource concerns that need to be addressed. Once a plan is developed, your application can be easily developed. "Developing your conservation plan now will allow us to have plenty of time to get all of the necessary field work completed and it will allow all paperwork to be checked to ensure you do not miss any deadlines," said Steve Shrode, NRCS District Conservationist in Colorado City. "There are other financial assistance programs that might work better for you and the only way to find out is to go to your local field office and get a conservation plan implemented or updated." December 16th is deadline to donate to Toys4MCKids

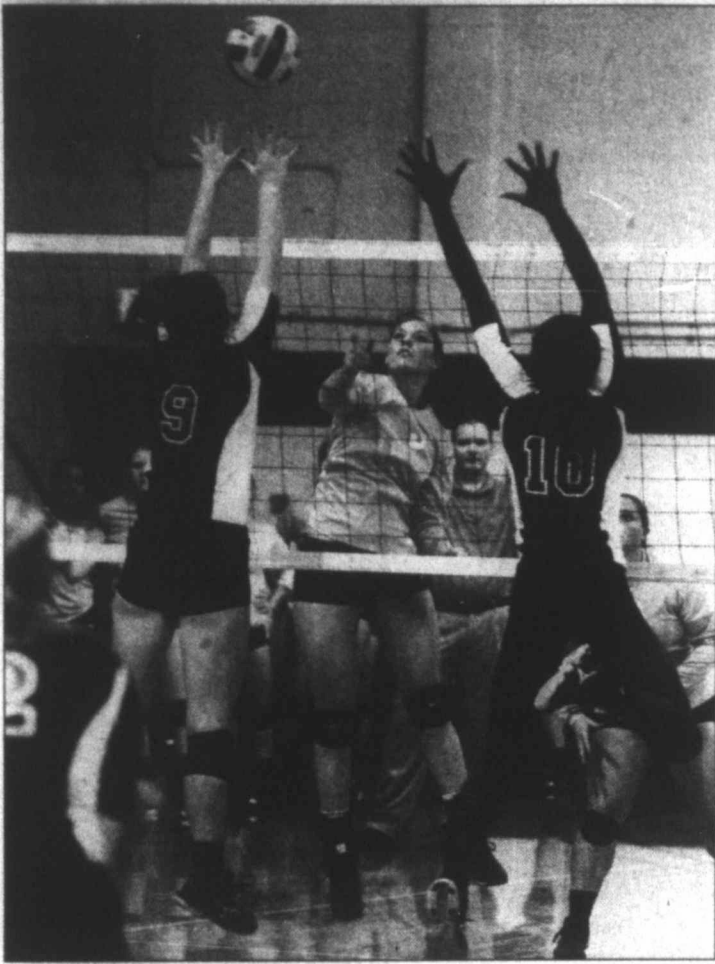
