Giles Again Takes Off On Hawaii Hop

(By International News Service)
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22.—Captain Frederick Giles, British aviator, hopped off for Hawaii at 7:24 o'clock this morning in his Hess Bluebird airplane.
Capt. Giles planned to be in Honolulu before noon tomorrow. From that point the aviator will continue his projected flight to New Zealand via Pacific points.

CLEVER FORGER UNCAUGHT WITH 138 CHECKS SIGNED UNDER DIFFERENT NAMES

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 22.—Call him what you will. Any name will do. In fact, he has used 138 names to designate himself since April, 1926, and therefore is, perhaps, the champion "Jimmy Valentine" of the world.
What his real name is, however, is as elusive a mystery as he himself. For police of several California cities have been unable to locate the multi-christened young fellow. They have 138 checks of about \$20 each, signed by the same hand with 138 different names, according to the California bureau of criminal identification here. The forger has evaded every effort to capture him.

NEW HIGHWAYS LOOM FOR CITY

While Chester Cherry was representing this city at a good roads convention for a federal highway at Menard Monday, J. D. Motley, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was in Wichita Falls attending a meeting of the proposed Petroleum Highway.
The federal highway will run from Fort Sill, Okla., to Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, and Ballinger is a key town on this route. It will be built for the troops which usually make long marches each year from Fort Sam Houston to Fort Sill, regular army posts.
The Petroleum Highway is to run from Tulsa, Oklahoma to Presidio, Texas, and will go thru the major oil fields of Texas, and Ballinger is also a key town on this highway. The route will take in Wichita Falls, Archer City, Olney, Breckenridge, Cisco, Coleman, Ballinger, San Angelo, Rankin, Fort Stockton, Alpine and to Presidio.
Mr. Motley said that Ballinger and Runnels county were definitely on the oil map now, not because there was great production of crude here, but because of the high grade of oil which surpasses that in other sections of the state. The oil discovered here is known as "sweet oil" because it has none of the disagreeable odor which is found in the larger pools in the Southwest.
Mr. Motley declares that Ballinger has an excellent chance to get on both highways and that citizens should be well pleased with the fact that Ballinger will be a key town on both routes if they are perfected as planned.

The measure now goes to the state legislatures for ratification by two-thirds majority.

U. S. Oil Less; West Texas Shows Gain

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 22.—Despite a daily gain of 7,086 barrels of oil produced in West Texas fields during the week ending November 19, the combined total of all fields in the United States decreased 1,177 barrels a day.
The total production of crude petroleum in the United States for the week was 2,464,433 barrels.

CORPORATIONS GET TAX CUT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—The House ways and means committee today voted to slash \$178,000,000 annually from federal tax levies by adopting two proposals pointed to reducing taxes on corporation profits.
The first clause reduces the corporation tax rate from thirty and a half per cent to eleven and a half per cent, while the second exempts from taxation the incomes of all corporations reporting an income of \$3,000 or less.

PARIS, Nov. 22.—The celebrated rose diamond is once more back in its case in the Chateau de Chantilly, from which it was stolen a year ago. For several days the Paris police were unable to trace the culprit. Finally, a French chambermaid bit into an apple belonging to one of the hotel guests, and struck the valuable jewel.

DENIES THOUGHT MAN INNOCENT

Calhoun is declared to have said the Osborne affidavit might cause doubt in many minds.

Jury Fixing Case Comes Up Dec. 5th

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—District Attorney Peyton Gordon went into District of Columbia Supreme Court today and formally petitioned Justice Frederick Siddons to adjudge Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate; H. Mason Day and A. Sheldon Clark, two Sinclair company officials; William J. Burns, head of a detective agency under his name; his son, W. Sherman Burns, and Charles Veitsch, manager of the Burns Detective Agency at Baltimore, in contempt of the federal court.
Justice Siddons ordered the six men to appear before him on December 5th to show cause why they should not be so adjudged.
The petition presented to the court is the outgrowth of "improper surveillance" in jury shadowing during the Fall-Sinclair trial for illegal disposal of oil leases in the Teapot Dome area.

MILES PLANS FOR
BIG DOG EVENTS

MILES, Nov. 22.—For the second time the annual meet of the Texas Futurity and Waterloo will be held at Miles Coursing Park, which is said to be the best in the state. The meet opens Thursday, November 24, and will last three days.

The opening day coming on Thanksgiving Day, a record crowd is expected from all points of the state. 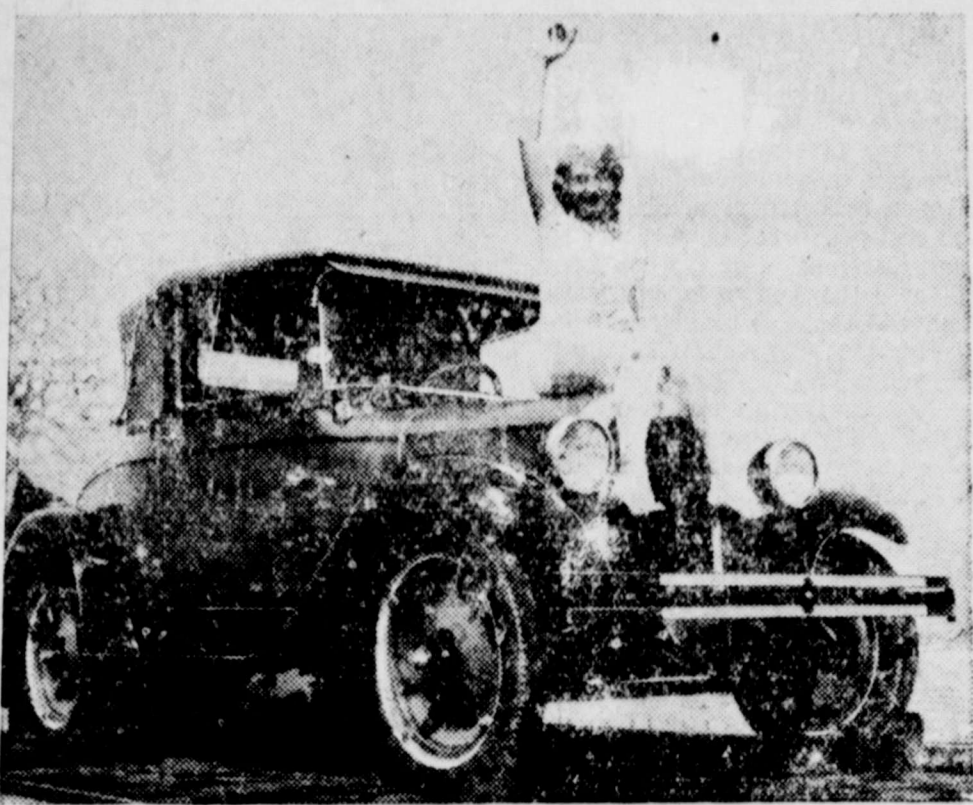

PARIS, Nov. 22. — Desire Landru, the celebrated French Bluebeard, beheaded a few years ago for having killed his twelve wives, has no longer a last resting place for his bones. By special favor, the Landru family was granted a five-year concession in the cemetery of Gonnard. Their lease has not been renewed

and orders were given to make away with the bones and little cross which marked the grave of the murderer.

But if he has no grave, he still has a home which is becoming a little museum, much-frequented by Americans and other tourists who visit Paris. Since the death of Landru, there has been no new tenant. An old guardian sits on the doorstep and receives anyone wishing to see the famous stove which consumed the twelve wives.

PLUM PUDDING SEASON
IS OPENED IN ENGLAND
WITH CHRISTMAS NEAR

LONDON, Nov. 21.—With the approach of Christmas, the plum pudding season is in full swing here.

One catering company has completed its first batch of these delicacies for foreign export, and expects to ship 150,000 to all parts of the world before the festive day arrives.

Among the ingredients required for the first batch were: 22 tons peel, 1 3-4 tons ginger, 47 tons raisins and currants, 11 tons

breadcrumbs, 20 1-2 tons suet, 3,600 bottles of rum, 20 1-2 tons sultanas, 2 tons nutmeg and mixed spices, 11 tons flour, 50,000 eggs, 1,000 gallons milk.

For the benefit of prohibition America the catering company announces that pudding destined for American consumption will not be held up by the customs, inasmuch as the rum contained in them is not sufficient to cause intoxication.

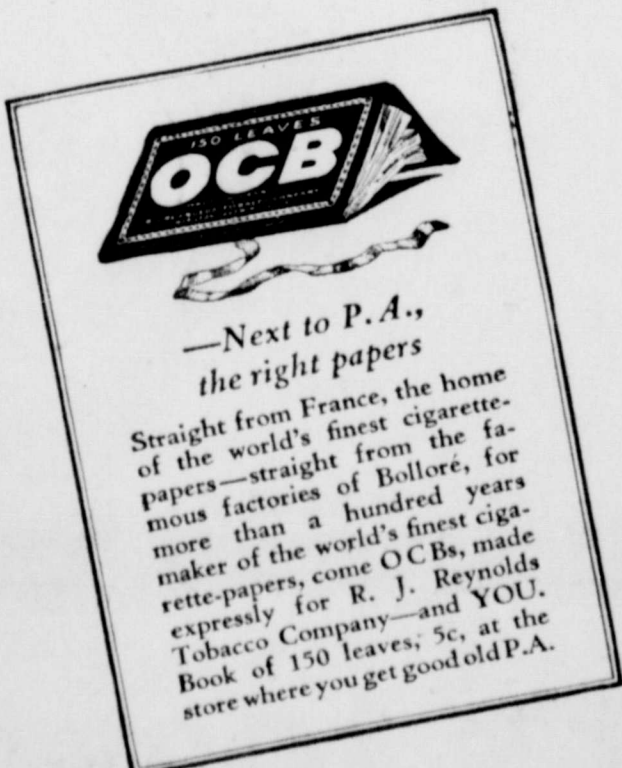

Mrs. Sarah Tyson Rorer, pioneer cooking teacher, and famous as the author of "The Philadelphia Cook Book," advises one to make the dessert and salad dressing the day before, and to plan meals which do not require lots of "last-minute" attention. This gives us more time to spend with our friends.

You will find the following menu tickles the palate and is easily prepared for a large group. Proportions are given for the serving of 12.

Chipped Veal Mashed Potatoes Succotash Harvest Salad Caramel Cream Beverage Bread and Butter

You can easily make the caramel cream the day before, and have it ready for the "company" meal. Use Mrs. Rorer's recipe.



Caramel Cream

Put 4 tablespoonfuls of sugar in a saucepan over a burner at full heat. Shake until it melts and turns a dark brown. Take from fire. Add a quart and a half of milk, 6 more tablespoonfuls of sugar and bring to a boil. Stir in 4 tablespoonfuls of cornstarch moistened in a cup of cold water. Stir over the fire until creamy. Take from fire, add 2 tablespoonfuls of vanilla. Serve cold.

The modern oil stove is a most efficient piece of kitchen equipment. Fuel is consumed only when needed. Quite a contrast to stoves which need to be cooled into action, and take a long time to cool off after the cooking is done.

Mayonnaise Dressing

Make your mayonnaise the day before, too. Mrs. Kate B. Vaughn, director of the household economics department, Los Angeles Evening Express, uses the following good recipe.

1 egg
2 cups salad oil
2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon salt
Pepper, paprika, and mustard to taste, if desired.
Beat the egg well in a cold bowl. Have oil chilled. Add one tablespoon of oil and beat. Add another and beat, and continue the process until one cup of oil is used. Add salt, sugar, 1 tablespoon vinegar, and other seasonings. Beat in second cup of oil gradually. Add second tablespoon of vinegar and continue beating until smooth and thick.



Harvest Salad

You can prepare the salad early in the morning. Peel 12 sound apples, core, rub over with lemon juice. Have syrup of 2 cups of sugar, 1 cup water, juice of 2 lemons boiling, and put in apples to cook. Turn from time to time until tender. Remove from syrup and cool. Fill the core with pineapple, cherries and marshmallows. Stick salted almonds in the apples. Serve with mayonnaise.

Chipped Veal

Now for the preparations of the day. These recipes are Miss Lucy G. Allen's. She is the principal of the Boston School of Cookery.

Remove all skin, meat and tough bits from 1 1/2 pounds of veal cutlet. Cut meat into inch long match-shaped pieces. There should be 4 cups.

Fry 2 chopped onions in 4 tablespoon butter. When nicely browned, add the veal and stir constantly until it changes color, and there are a few spoonfuls of juice in the pan. Season with salt and pepper. Dredge with 4 tablespoon flour. When well mixed, pour in 2 cups of medium cream. Cook for 10 minutes, then let simmer slowly.

Succotash

This combination of cooked corn and lima beans is at its best in summer when fresh vegetables can be used, though it can be made with canned vegetables. Use equal parts of corn and lima beans. Shell and cook beans, and cut corn from the ears. Mix with sufficient milk or cream to moisten. Salt, pepper and season with salt and pepper.

This good meal will be eaten with relish. And you will find it no problem to prepare it for a large number of folks.

Has Hard Time Finding Engineers for Gov't. Work

(By International News Service)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Because the demand for trained engineers in civilian life far exceeds the supply the army is finding it difficult to place qualified men in its own ranks, Major General Edgar Jadwin, chief of engineers, asserts in his annual report issued today.

—Another reason "why it has been very difficult for the chief of engineers to secure qualified applicants for commission from civil life," the report says, "is that the future in the corps of engineers is not as attractive to these young men as the offers which they receive from civilian organizations."

Nevertheless, the report continues, the corps "has a shortage of officers in the grades from colonel to captain, inclusive, and has a surplus of first and second lieutenants." Transferring of officers from other branches of the service has proved unsatisfactory as a remedy for this situation, but Jadwin believes it can ultimately be corrected by commissioning more second lieutenants.

During the year the engineers corps entered into an agreement to assist the Geological Survey and the Coast and Geodetic Survey in mapping the topography of the entire country, with particular attention being paid to the borders and areas of approach to vital industrial centers. This survey is expected to be completed in 20 years.

Since his last annual report, Jadwin continues, the engineers have set up a reproduction plant here which is making maps, photostats, lithographs and similar material for the army and other governmental departments. In the last 12 months 261,424 maps were turned out and 3,888,

606 lithographs printed.

"In connection with plans for defense of the frontiers, insular possessions and the Panama Canal," the report adds, "the chief of engineers has undertaken the collection and dissemination of railway data pertaining to the movement of railway artillery. A large amount of data has been collected from the railways and progress has been made in the distribution of this information to the service in a form which will make it readily accessible for the preparation of defense plans and in case of an emergency. During the year a general railway map of the United States has been completed and issued."

WORLD RAIL RECORD ON SCOTTISH EXPRESS

CARLISLE, Eng., Nov. 22.—By driving the Royal Scot express from London to Carlisle, a distance of 300 miles, in 338 minutes, without an assistant driver, William Ward, of Crewe, has set up a world's railroad record.

This was the first time that this non-stop journey, which is the longest in the world, has been accomplished by a single driver.

The weight of the train including the engine, was 544 tons, plus

the weight of an instrument attached to the engine for timing speed and coal and water consumption.

The express reached seven minutes ahead of time, which had been north of Lancaster a mountain section, included climb up the Shap summit Westmoreland (914 feet where the gradient for six half miles is as severe as seventy-five.

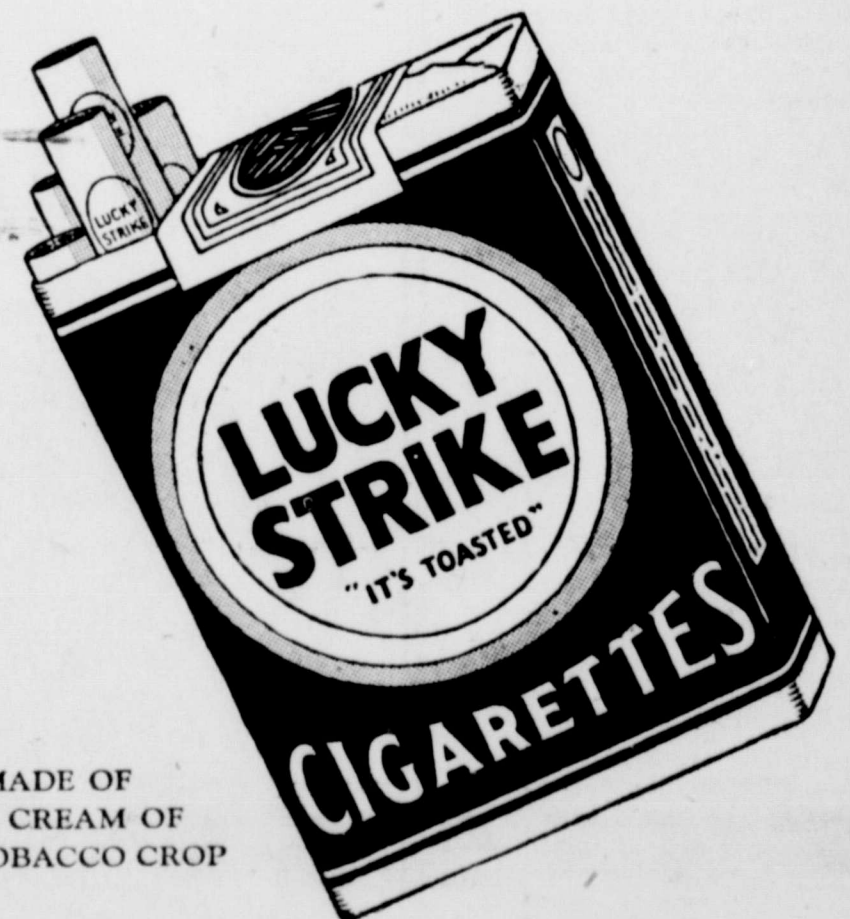

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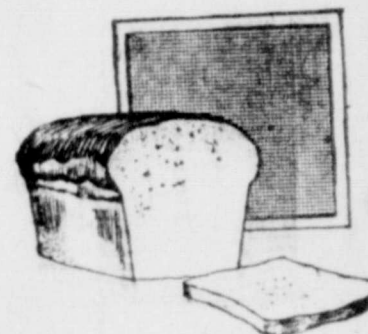

NEW BRIDGE FOR ANGELO-ROBERT LEE HIGHWAY

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 22.—Tom Green county commissioners in a regular session this week awarded a contract to the Austin Bridge Company for the construction of a 34-foot bridge on the Robert Lee road. It is to be 12 feet high and 20 feet wide. This company was low with a bid of \$3,194.09. The County of Tom Green and the McCaug Construction Company were other bidders. The county is to furnish the aggregate and Colorado River sand for the job.

This is the first of a series of bridges which are to be built on that road. This one will be twelve miles from San Angelo. The county is improving crossings by putting in rock dips. The road is to be widened to seventy feet, the state highway standard, and two crossings over Red Creek are to be abolished.

The company is to begin work within thirty days and will be allowed sixty days in which to complete the work.

EAGLES TO MEET LOBOES FRIDAY

ABILENE, Nov. 22.—The annual football classic of West Texas will be staged here on Friday, November 25, when the Abilene Eagles meet the Big Dam Loboes of Cisco high. This game will determine the champion of this half of West Texas and in the opinion of many will select the all-West Texas champion and the team destined to enter the state finals. It will bring together two ancient rivals, two of the most colorful teams of the state and two teams each determined to win or die in the attempt.

Never before have two teams met with the dope more even. Each team has amassed an enormous number of points in their games of the season and both have held their opponents to pitifully small scores. Both teams have scored nearly five hundred points during the season. Each machine has run rough shod over all opposition. Their comparative scores indicate that the Loboes and Eagles are evenly matched. For instance, Abilene downed Ranger 33-0, while the Loboes were able to win from Ranger only 22-0. On the other hand the Loboes swamped Breckenridge 53-6 while Abilene defeated the Breck team only 32-7. However, Ranger was much stronger when they played Cisco than when they met the Eagles. And Breckenridge developed greater strength when they played Abilene. Furthermore, Pete Shotwell, Breck coach, formerly coached Abilene and no doubt his boys fought hard to

win for their coach. This indicates that there is equality of strength between the Eagles and the Loboes.

The game in Abilene will be worth going a long way to see for it will be a spectators game. There is no likelihood of the contest being a deadlock between defensive teams unable to score. There should be much scoring because both elevens are scoring machines. Both backfields are fleet and are proficient with the forward pass. Eddleman, barrel bodied Cisco line runner, puts power into the Cisco backfield. He meets his match in Smith, the towering Eagle fullback. Both men will have strong linesmen to open holes for their plunges. Esco Walter of Abilene and "Chittie" Little of Cisco are amazingly fast and sensational in a broken field. The passing game of Phippen and Keys of Cisco and of Walter and Salkeld of Abilene is remarkable for high school athletics. Sellers of Abilene is an all round backfield ace. Both teams are thoroughly trained and have plenty of plays. Since both teams are full of dynamite the game will be a battle until the final gun.

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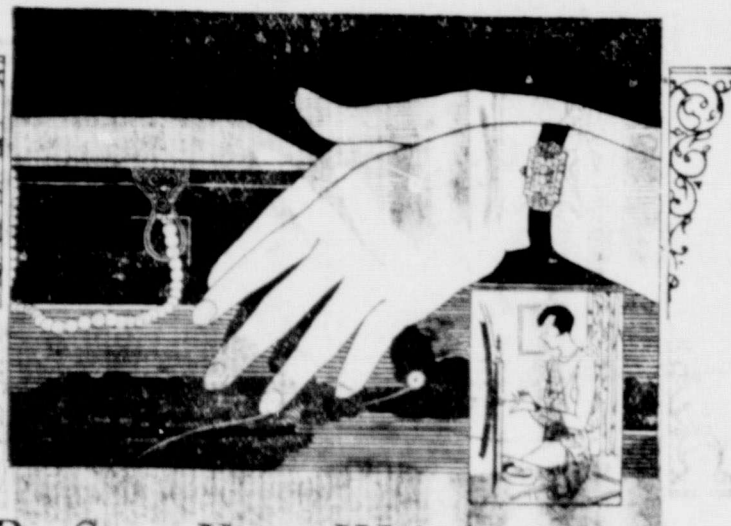

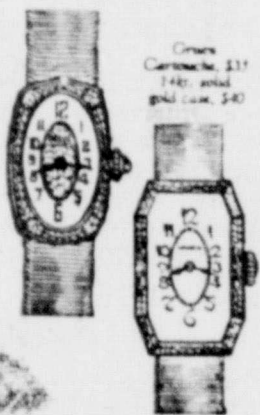
